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

GARY MAO'S GLOBAL TRADE SUCCESS: TURNING CHALLENGES INTO OPPORTUNITIES

Gary Mao's journey is one of transformation and opportunity. Originally a veterinarian in China, he moved to the U.S. in 2003 with his partner in pursuit of a new future. Like many newcomers, he started with a corporate job, but his entrepreneurial spirit led him to something bigger. He noticed that import cargo returning to Asia often traveled empty and saw a chance to fill those shipments with U.S. grains and agricultural products in high demand. In 2007, he took a leap and started his own commodity trading and export business, turning a simple idea into a thriving global enterprise.

Connecting U.S. Agriculture and Farms to Markets in Asia

Northwest Grains International, LLC specializes in export sales, catering primarily to key markets in China, Taiwan, Vietnam, and the Philippines. The company is dedicated to high-volume bulk agricultural exports, including Dried Distillers Grains (DDGS), corn, soybeans, cotton seeds, protein, and soybean meal. These commodities require specific distribution channels to ensure efficient and reliable delivery to international buyers. By leveraging strong industry relationships and expertise in global trade logistics, Northwest Grains International plays a crucial role in connecting U.S. agricultural producers with overseas markets, supporting sustainable and mutually beneficial commerce.

How Cultural Values Drive Northwest Grains International

Chinese culture has played a significant role in shaping both the professional and personal journey of Gary. Deep-rooted values of family connections and strong business relationships have influenced how they navigate the global trade industry. Having built a career through long-standing connections, they credit much of their success to these cultural principles. A large portion of their clientele comes from Chinese communities, particularly in South Asia, where many business owners share similar backgrounds and expectations. This cultural alignment has helped Northwest Grains International establish trust and credibility in the market. Additionally, working with Chinese business partners, who tend to be highly selective and detail-oriented, has refined the company's approach to quality control and customer service, ensuring that every transaction meets the highest standards.

Turning Challenges into Opportunities: Gary Mao's Entrepreneurial Leap

Gary's path to launching his business was driven by vision and determination rather than prior experience. While working for Northwest Protein, he built a reputation for integrity, reliable shipping, and excellent service with customers in China and other countries. During this time, his supplier, Northwest Grains International, faced financial struggles. At first, Gary worked alongside them to find a solution, but as their situation worsened, they asked him to take over. Seeing an opportunity, he stepped in. Although he didn't start with experience in commodity trading, he recognized a gap in the market—cargo shipments returning to Asia were often empty despite the high demand for U.S. agricultural products. Relying on his strong connections in China, he took a leap, reached out to buyers, and learned the trade as he built his business from the ground up.



From Struggles to Strength: Gary's Journey in Managing Cross-Cultural Teams

Starting and running a successful business came with its fair share of challenges for him, particularly as someone with a Chinese cultural background adapting to the American business landscape. One of the biggest hurdles was managing a team in an environment where workplace expectations and communication styles differed significantly from what he was accustomed to. Additionally, language barriers posed difficulties—some partners or employees found it hard to understand his accent, making negotiations and relationship-building more challenging.

To overcome these obstacles, he took it upon himself to first understand American business culture, learning how to navigate conversations and leadership dynamics. Over time, he also brought in an HR manager to help bridge communication gaps and provide guidance on best practices for team management. Looking back, he acknowledges that having access to mentorship and practical advice on leadership and communication would have made the transition smoother, but through perseverance and adaptability, he was able to establish a thriving business.

Tips for Asian Entrepreneurs: Exploring Opportunities in Exports and Beyond

For aspiring entrepreneurs looking to break into the agricultural export industry, Gary emphasizes that opportunities abound, especially for Asian entrepreneurs. With global demand for agricultural commodities constantly growing, those who remain proactive and continuously seek new opportunities can carve out a successful path. Hard work is the key to success in this industry—putting in the effort and staying persistent can yield significant rewards. The American Dream is within reach for those willing to dedicate themselves, build strong relationships, and adapt to the ever-changing market. By staying resilient and forward-thinking, aspiring business owners can establish themselves in the competitive world of international trade.

CREATING SPACES OF BELONGING: AIA MINNESOTA'S VISION FOR ASIAN SENIOR HOUSING


AlA Minnesota members volunteered their time from February 1–8 to develop a draft design for Asian senior housing as part of the Sears site redevelopment. The American Institute of Architects (AIA) Minnesota, a professional association representing architects across the state, is collaborating with the Sears redevelopment project to ensure the voices of community members are heard. Through brainstorming sessions, AIA members are working on a plan that reflects the cultural and living needs of Asian elders. This effort is part of the larger initiative to engage architects and the community in shaping a thoughtful and inclusive redevelopment. By actively listening to ideas and feedback, the project aims to create a senior living space that truly serves the community. This article explores the initial concepts behind the Asian senior housing design and highlights the ongoing collaboration between architects, community members, and the Sears redevelopment team.

Blending Tradition and Sustainability

During the brainstorming sessions, AIA Minnesota members explored design principles to create a culturally responsive and sustainable senior housing development at the Sears site. A key idea was to establish a World Heritage Cultural Hub, transforming the space into a landmark that celebrates Asian heritage, fosters cross-cultural connections, and provides a strong sense of belonging for Asian seniors.

Sustainability was another major focus, with proposals to reduce urban heat effects by incorporating green spaces, tree planting, and a rooftop community garden. In addition to housing, the design includes cultural and recreational spaces that promote both community engagement and well-being, such as:

- Courtyards inspired by Asian landscaping traditions for peaceful gatherings
- Cultural and recreational areas for heritage-language movies and music
- A Community Technology Hub where seniors can build digital skills and stay connected with family



Inspiration Meets Purpose: Designing Culturally Rooted Senior Housing

AIA Minnesota members developed several design concepts and visual representations to illustrate their ideas for the Asian senior housing project. The concepts focus on creating a culturally familiar and functional living environment, incorporating spaces such as:

- Multi-use room/prayer room for spiritual and communal activities
- Theater space for entertainment and cultural programming
- Lobby collage to create a welcoming entrance
- Community garden to promote outdoor relaxation and social interaction
- Dining room designed for shared meals and gatherings
- Living room as a central space for comfort and connection

The design approach draws inspiration from traditional Asian homes, emphasizing cultural preferences, accessibility, and wellness. Spatial planning prioritizes natural light in all rooms and ensures smooth transitions between key areas, such as the kitchen, dining room, and living room. Research into traditional layouts highlighted the preference for enclosed kitchens, in contrast to open American designs. To enhance comfort and familiarity, the design incorporates natural materials like wood and stone, along with soft lighting to create a warm and inviting atmosphere. Additionally, small shrine spaces are designed with feng shui ("wind and water") or wabi-sabi (a Japanese aesthetic that embraces imperfection, transience, and simplicity) principles, further reinforcing a sense of harmony and cultural connection.

Thoughtful Features for Senior Well-being

Additionally, the design carefully considers the lifestyle and needs of Asian elders by including:

- Entryways with space for changing shoes, respecting cultural traditions and hygiene practices
- Community-focused spaces that encourage social interaction and prevent isolation
- Larger kitchens for multi-generational gatherings
- Thoughtful counter heights to improve accessibility and support independent living

By integrating these culturally responsive features, the AIA Minnesota team aims to create a senior housing environment that not only meets practical needs but also fosters a deep sense of belonging and well-being.

The Sears redevelopment project's collaboration with AIA Minnesota highlights the power of thoughtful design in creating a senior housing space that truly reflects the needs of Asian elders. By working closely with architects, community members, and cultural experts, the project is shaping a living environment that blends tradition, accessibility, and sustainability. This initiative is more than just a housing plan—it is a commitment to honoring cultural heritage while fostering a connected and supportive community. As the redevelopment continues, this collaborative approach will ensure that the voices of those it serves remain at the heart of the design process.




