### About

Montgomery County is one of the fastest-growing counties in the nation and East Montgomery County (EMC) is no exception. Building on a foundation of hometown values and community pride, EMC is home to award-winning master-planned communities and the most visited open-air shopping center in the Houston MSA. This combined with quality education and healthcare, EMC continues to grow residentially and commercially with unlimited potential and opportunity.

East Montgomery County is an unincorporated region with a few cities within. It is best described using two areas, EMC Proper and Greater EMC. EMC Proper is a 158-square-mile area with more than 80,000 residents. It is defined and served by the East Montgomery County Improvement District (EMCID) with specific boundaries mostly within the New Caney & Splendora Independent School Districts. These include Porter, New Caney, Splendora, Patton Village, Roman Forest, Woodbranch Village, and a portion of Kingwood.

The Greater EMC region is the area served by the Greater EMC Chamber (GEMCC). It includes EMC Proper, Kingwood, and portions of Spring and Conroe.








## Wage Trends





As of 2024Q1, total employment for Greater East Montgomery County was 26,936 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2024Q1, employment increased 3.7% in the region.

#### Average Annual Wages for Greater East Montgomery County



The average worker in Greater East Montgomery County earned annual wages of \$63,315 as of 2024Q1. Average annual wages per worker decreased 0.4% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$70,857 in the nation as of 2024Q1.

# Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 3.2% lower in Greater East Montgomery County than the U.S. average.



#### PROJECTED ANNUAL GROWTH

Over the next year, employment in Greater East Montgomery County is projected to expand by 809 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Management of Companies and Enterprises with a +3.6% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Health Care and Social Assistance (+139 jobs), Educational Services (+117), and Accommodation and Food Services (+100).

Employment in Greater East Montgomery County is projected to expand by **2,362** jobs.

## Top Industries

The largest major occupation group in Greater East Montgomery County is Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations, employing 3,359 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Educational Instruction and Library Occupations (3,183 workers) and Office and Administrative Support Occupations (2,976). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Educational Instruction and Library Occupations (LQ = 2.20), Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (1.54), and Construction and Extraction Occupations (1.35).

# Education and Employment Growth

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in Greater East Montgomery County is projected to grow 3.0% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to grow 3.3% per year, those requiring a bachelor's degree are forecast to grow 3.2% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to grow 3.4% per year.
