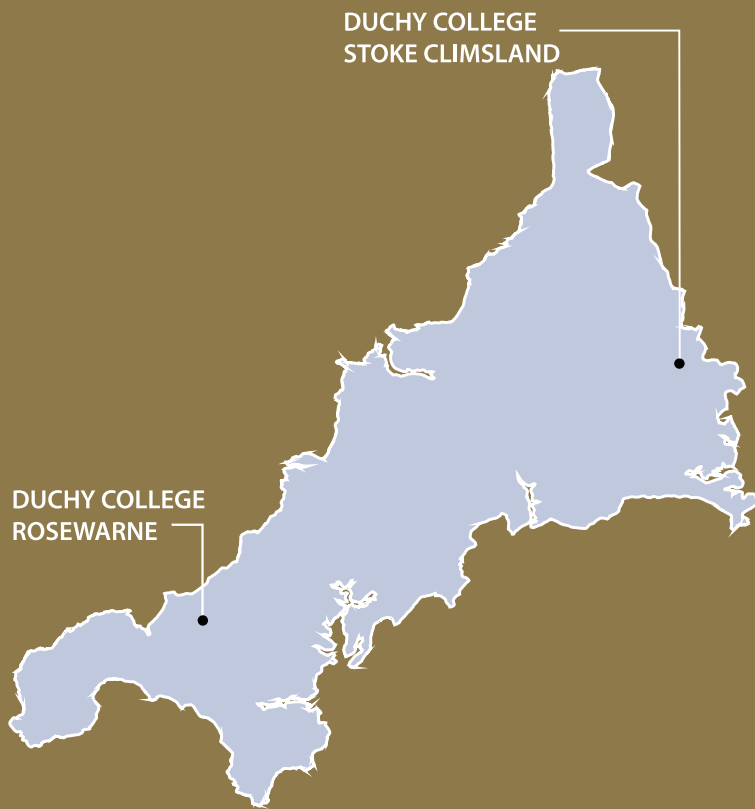

# Riding High

**DUCHY COLLEGE STOKE CLIMSLAND OFFERS A RANGE OF EQUINE courses, providing students with the skills they need to pursue exciting careers working with horses. We caught up with three of our former students to see where their studies have taken them.**

## Showjumping success

For Meg Jeffs, studying Equine Management wasn't just about gaining a qualification – it was the starting point for the career she had always dreamt of.

After completing her course, Meg went on to establish her own yard and business, developing, competing and selling showjumping horses. Today, her time is spent training horses for competition and travelling to events, doing exactly what she always wanted to do.

Meg credits her time at Duchy with giving her the professional foundations needed to run a successful equine business.

The practical skills Meg developed during her studies continue to play a key role in her day-to-day work. Knowledge around horse health, injury management and rehabilitation has proved especially valuable over the years.

Meg said "I feel I got most of my knowledge on how to professionally run a yard from my course at Duchy College. I learnt a lot about managing horses with injuries and aiding in their recovery, which has come in very handy. I also learnt how to create fitness plans for horses coming into work and how to maintain their fitness."





## Igniting interests

Charlotte Ann Fisher works as an instructor for Great Trethew Trekking, a friendly, family-run riding school that has been sharing the magic of horses with our community for over 15 years.

Charlotte Ann still uses everything she learnt at Duchy College every day in both her job and her life. These skills have allowed her to progress in her current teaching role as an instructor.

## Developing talent

Jemimah Channon is a freelance equine coach and lecturer. She teaches a range of further and higher education courses, as well as specialised training for clients such as the Thames Valley Mounted Police, The Light Cavalry and Wellington Riding.

With her individual clients, Jemimah helps people to develop their show jumping, dressage and eventing skills at riding club level. She also rides and trains clients' horses, and offers advice on purchasing and training horses.

After completing her Extended Diploma in Equine Management at Duchy College, Jemimah went on to study for a degree

and a master's degree in Equine Science.

She said: "I would have never got a degree or a master's if I didn't do this course, as I was uninspired by 'normal' subjects with curriculums that didn't include any practical or applied elements.

"I enjoyed the variety of assessment methods including written, verbal and practical. I thought it gave students an opportunity to thrive in a variety of ways, not just written exams, which suited me. This is something that I am now passionate about when working in education, giving young people the opportunity to gain skills and qualifications no matter their background and learning style."

**DUCHY COLLEGE'S RURAL BUSINESS SCHOOL is a pioneer in sustainable agriculture and resource management, combining education, training, business support and applied research to benefit both people and the land.**

Since 2006, the Rural Business School has helped thousands of farms to adopt new practices, prioritising the environment and animal welfare to create a more sustainable and productive agricultural industry.

The Rural Business School brings the industry to our students, enabling them to work alongside researchers on active farm trials and environmental projects. Using cutting-edge research, like soil carbon measurement and natural capital planning, students gain skills that can't be found in the traditional classroom.





## Current projects

Here are just some of the Rural Business School-led initiatives helping to shape the future of the rural sector in the South West.



### Farm Net Zero

A collaborative project empowering farms to reduce greenhouse gas emissions through soil sampling, carbon footprinting and shared learning.

### Home Farm Natural Capital

An ambitious 25-year environmental plan to enhance biodiversity, sequester carbon and create wildlife habitats in nearly 50 hectares of natural habitat, surrounding the Stoke Climsland campus.



### Agri Carbon Kernow

Helping Cornish farmers reduce carbon footprints, improve water resilience and enhance environmental assets through tailored support plans.

### Resilient Catchment Communities

This initiative brings farmers and communities together to boost the understanding of river resilience, using natural solutions to protect ecosystems and reduce flood risk.

### Dairy-4-Future and Future Farm

The £3.6m research centre opened in 2020 to drive improvements in efficiency, animal welfare and environmental best practice, all while training the next generation of agricultural leaders.

# *bouquet*

There's something special about stepping outside with a pair of scissors or secateurs, and bringing the garden indoors, especially when the flowers you grow are doing good as well as looking beautiful.

With a sunny spot and a handful of well-chosen plants, you can grow bouquets that feel natural, seasonal, and full of life, while also supporting bees, butterflies, and other pollinators.

These plants are easy to grow, lovely to arrange, and genuinely valuable to pollinators:

**Aquilegia vulgaris (Columbine)**

- soft, nodding flowers that add movement and elegance

**Leucanthemum vulgare (Oxeye daisy)** - fresh, cheerful blooms that bring structure and brightness

**Papaver rhoeas & Papaver somniferum (Poppies)** - bold colour, silky petals, and rich pollen for bees

**Centaurea cyanus (Cornflower)** - a clear blue every bouquet needs, loved by bees and butterflies

**Achillea ptarmica (Sneezewort)** - delicate white clusters that soften stronger colours

**Agrostemma githago (Corncockle)**

- tall and airy, with an effortless meadow feel

**Limonium vulgare (Sea lavender)** - light, papery texture that lasts well when cut

## Top tip

Most of these flowers prefer sun and simple conditions. Just avoid over-feeding and sow in small batches during spring to give you flowers for longer. You might find that things begin to self-seed, creating a truly wild garden!



**1 Prepare**  
Strip leaves from the lower 15cm of each stem and trim to around 30cm. Lay flowers out by type so they're easy to grab.

**2 Start**  
Hold a sturdy piece of foliage in your non-dominant hand as the anchor stem.



**3 Create the spiral**  
Add stems one by one at a 45-degree angle, turning the posy slightly as you go. Keep adding flowers and foliage in the same direction until the shape looks balanced. If it doesn't feel right, put it down and start again.



# Make your own FLORAL ARRANGEMENT

WE SPOKE TO LIZI NEWBURY, Floristry and Horticulture lecturer at Rosewarne to show us how to make the perfect spring posy:

#### Flowers and tools

Spring flowers such as iris, daffodils, tulips and hyacinth, with filler flowers and foliage. You'll need sharp scissors, garden twine, and a jug or vase.



**4 Tie and trim**  
Secure the stems with a 50cm length of twine where your hand has been holding them. Trim the ends evenly so the posy sits neatly in the jug.



**5 Enjoy**  
Place in water and enjoy your relaxed spring arrangement.

## **What made you decide to study Sports Coaching & Development?**

I was passionate about coaching football and felt this course would support me to progress into a role at a professional club such as Plymouth Argyle.

Before starting the course, I went to an open day, which included a training session with Plymouth Argyle staff. I learnt that football training would be a big part of the course, which really appealed to me.

## **What did you learn during your course?**

The most important thing I learnt on the course was being able to put together coaching plans and deliver them in real settings. I still use all of these coaching skills in my work now, from planning sessions to implementing different coaching styles.

## **What did you enjoy most about your course?**

It's hard to beat training and playing football three times a week as a highlight of the course!

## **What happened after you finished your studies?**

I was really lucky, in that I was employed by Plymouth Argyle while I was still on the course, and I haven't looked back since.



Now, I work as the Women & Girls Football Development Officer, where I help to increase participation in football, reduce the barriers to playing, and build a clear pathway from grassroots games to playing higher level football.

I love the work that I do, as it becomes incredibly rewarding to see the growth and

success of the players that you support, and the impact you have.

## **What advice would you give to someone looking to go into football coaching?**

I would really recommend studying this course to anyone who sees a career in the sports industry. The course opens up a lot of doors, whether that's future work opportunities or studying at university.

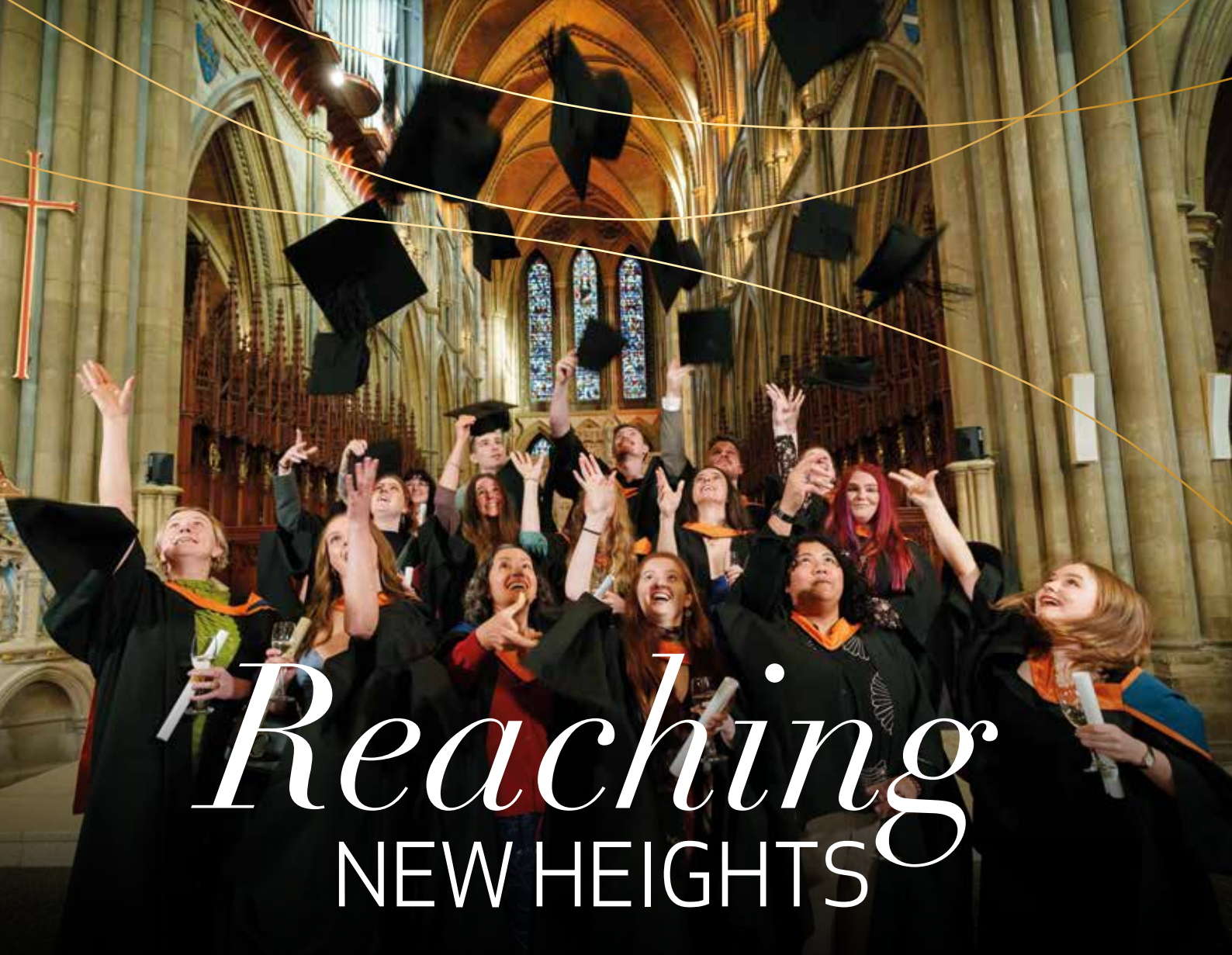

**FOR JACOB BOLTON, STUDYING MILITARY and Protective Services was more than a step in his education, it was the foundation that prepared him for life in the Royal Navy and the demands of military aviation.**

Now serving as an Air Engineer Technician (Mechanical) in the Royal Navy, Jacob works on the Merlin Mk2 aircraft, where precision, discipline and teamwork are essential. His role involves everything from routine servicing and maintenance to marshalling and deep restoration of the aircraft's airframe.

The skills Jacob developed during the course continue to play a key role in his everyday working life. From understanding rank structure and discipline to maintaining mental and physical wellbeing, the course closely mirrored the realities of military service.

"Yes, I still use what I learnt," Jacob explained. "The MaPS course taught me all about discipline, rank structure, mental and physical wellness and much more. The coursework prepared me for the task books I had to complete during training, especially in terms of structure and language."

Jacob's journey into the Royal Navy began early. Just weeks into his first year on the MaPS course, he applied to his local Armed Forces Careers Office in Redruth and secured an interview. With his career goal already in sight, the two years he spent at college became an opportunity to sharpen his skills and prepare fully for basic training.

By the time Jacob reached the end of his course, his joining date for the Royal Navy was only weeks away. With the support of his tutors, he was fast-tracked through his final assignments, completing them early and leaving college with two diplomas – before joining the Navy shortly afterwards.

Jacob studied the Level 3 Military & Protective Services (MaPS) course at Cornwall College's Camborne campus, achieving a Distinction Star before continuing onto the Level 3 Extended course, where he was again awarded a Distinction.

Reflecting on his time at college, Jacob says the MaPS course gave him far more than academic qualifications.

"I enjoyed my time back at Cornwall College and it more than prepared me for what lay ahead in Basic Training and beyond," he said.

Now focused on progressing towards a supervisory role within the mechanical side of engineering, Jacob credits Cornwall College with giving him the confidence, structure and resilience needed to succeed.

# Hedgehogs

## Did you know?

There are 17 species of hedgehog in the world, but the UK is home to only one species of these elusive creatures.

Hedgehogs are now on the Red List: "Vulnerable to extinction"

We spoke with Jayne (our Industry Placement & Work Experience Co-ordinator) and part-time hedgehog rescuer at **Bits & Bobs at Hoglodge**, to discuss ways we can help improve numbers in our local areas.



## What can you do to help?



**Put out shallow bowls of water and some kitten food.** Creating a feeding station will keep the food dry and keep other animals.

**Leave space in your fence for them to come and go.** The average hedgehog roams 2km a night looking for food, somewhere to nest and a mate!

**Build a Hedgehog House.** They are easy to make and take up a small corner of your garden. →



**Never offer milk to hedgehogs or feed mealworms!** Hedgehogs are lactose intolerant and mealworms can lead to metabolic bone disease.

## Welcome wildlife to your garden

If you're interested in welcoming more than just hedgehogs into your garden, here are some handy tips to create a space that will welcome a variety of wildlife!


**Keep a year-round source of water in your garden.** Whether you provide a shallow dish or want to create a pond, water can provide more than somewhere to drink for amphibians, insects and birds.

**Create some new housing.** You can keep houses for more than just birds, including bees, bugs, butterflies and hedgehogs!

**Grow a wild patch.** Allowing some areas to grow wild will create a diverse and welcoming habitat. Short on space? You can grow a small wildflower garden in a plant pot!

**Wildlife corridors.** Much like hedgehogs, other wildlife will benefit from gaps in your fence and boundaries.

**Avoid using harsh chemicals.** Where possible, avoid using harsh chemicals on your plants and lawn. Chemicals and poisons enter the food chain and can cause harm to more than just one animal.

## Just remember – out in the day? Not OK!

**Spotted a hedgehog out in the day? While it might look ok, it's in serious need of help!**

**1** Use gardening gloves or clothing to place the animal onto a towel, in a cosy cardboard box

**2** Place the box in a warm and quiet location

**3** Fill a hot water bottle and put it in the box (leaving room for the hedgehog to move about)

**4** Cover the hedgehog in a towel

**5** Contact a rescue centre - [helpwildlife.co.uk](http://helpwildlife.co.uk)

Through his extensive research, he discovered that an apprenticeship would be the best way to begin his new career – studying theory at our Rosewarne campus, while carrying out practical training at Penmellyn Vets in St Columb.

Bruce said: “I’m really enjoying this course – combining the theory side of things that you learn in college with the practical side, and being able to carry out all of these things in reality. It’s a super appealing way of learning for me.”

When asked what advice he’d give to anyone looking to join the field, Bruce said: “I would say it’s a tough road sometimes because you’re dealing with animals that are struggling. It can also be a little bit mentally challenging to go through that but it’s totally worth it when you just think about the good work that you’re doing. Plus, it’s very rewarding when you see the animals go home at the end of the day.”

Stories from around our campuses and communities

## Great growth at Rosewarne

We've seen amazing growth in our Agriculture offering at Rosewarne, with the number of learners leaping from four to 34 in just one year. These students are working hard ploughing and seeding the farmland, preparing the ground for the introduction of livestock.



## Top honours for Emily

Duchy College Stoke Climsland student Emily Borner was one of just three sea cadets named Royal Navy First Sea Lord Cadet last year. This prestigious honour was given in recognition of her dedication and ability to inspire others. As part of the role, Emily was invited to the MOD headquarters in London and visited 10 Downing Street.



## Learning traditional techniques

Horticulture apprentices from Duchy College Rosewarne have been visiting Trevince Estate in Gwennap to learn about some of the techniques used across the 200-year-old grounds. This includes a full site tour from the head gardener, along with practical activities around espalier fruit tree pruning.



## From the classroom to the community

Working with Antony House – a National Trust property in Torpoint – Employment Pathway students from Duchy College Stoke Climsland are supporting with many aspects of ground maintenance to improve their skills and work towards a future career.

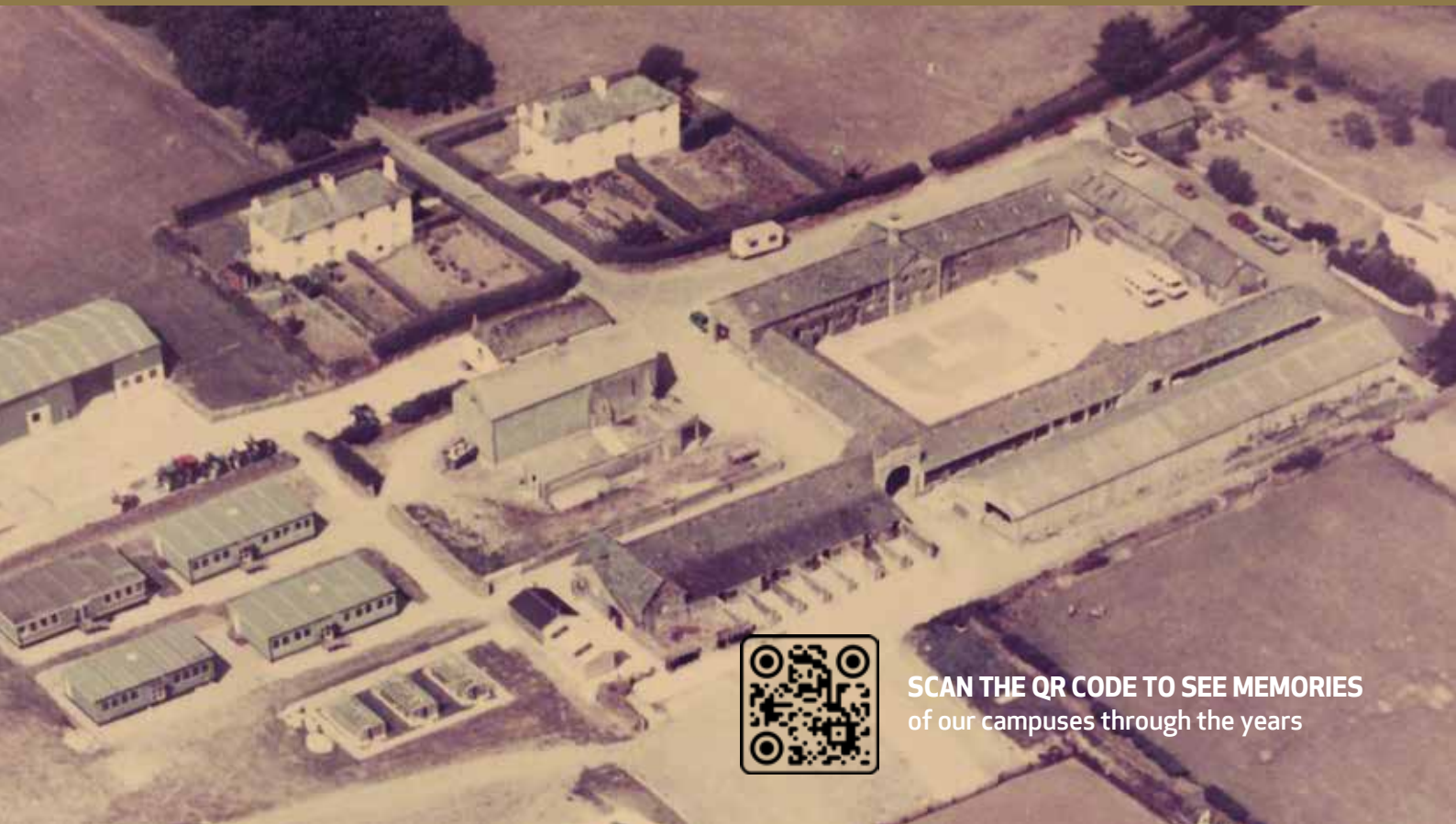

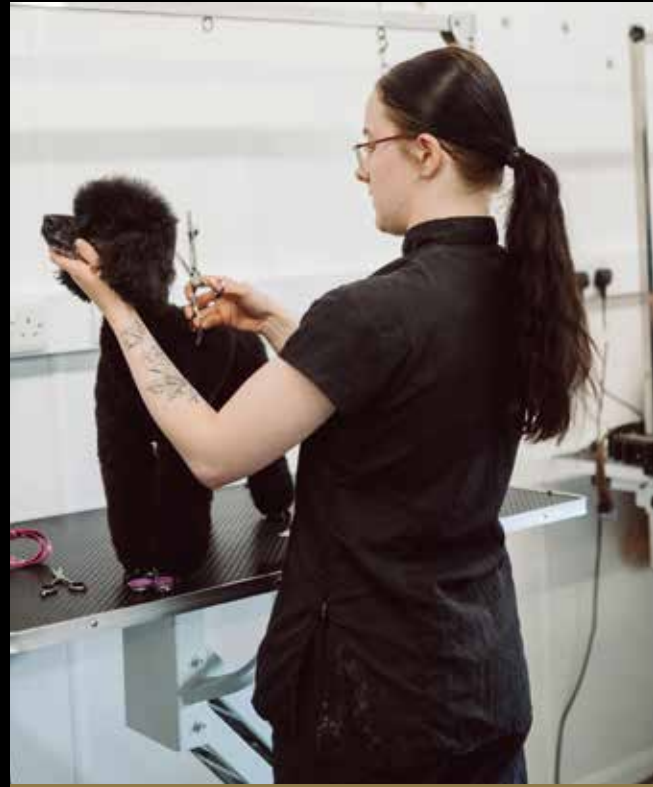
