Each month someone hosted and set a theme, with everyone bringing a dish that fits the theme. We carefully coordinated to avoid ending up with eight desserts and no mains! Much like those memories, this community dinner did not disappoint. It was very enjoyable tasting how others cook-from vegan and gluten-free marvels so tasty you'd swear they were made with butter, to hearty casseroles and perfectly roasted vegetables. ### What Happens If You Have to Step Away from Your Business?

Imagine this: you're laid up with a broken leg. Or there's a family emergency and you suddenly have to drop everything. Could your business keep ticking over without you?

For many small, regional businesses, the answer is no.

Most small business owners start out doing everything themselves, and in many cases, still are. Whether you run a local trade business, a retail store or provide a professional service, there's a good chance a part of your business runs off memory, old habits and whatever systems you've pieced together over time.

But what happens when life throws a curveball? Who steps in? And would they even know where to start?

The Reality for Regional Small Businesses

In Australia, 98% of businesses are small businesses, many of them family-run. In regional areas, that number feels even higher. Looking at our local area specifically, recent ABS data shows there are over 4.200 active businesses in the Surf Coast region. Of those, 2,666 are nonemploying businesses, and a further 1,612 have fewer than 20 employees. Most report an annual turnover between \$200,000 and \$2 million.

These businesses are nimble and hardworking, but they're also vulnerable to disruption.

When something unexpected happens, it's not just your health or family that's affected. It's your income, your team, your clients and your ability to bounce back quickly.

And while insurance might help with financial losses, it doesn't solve the problem of who actually keeps things running. The doing still needs doing.

Where to Start

You don't need to solve it all at once, but here are a few practical things to consider:

Key Processes - Jot down the essentials of how the work gets done. If someone had to step in, how would they know what to do?



Helping regional businesses run better behind the scenes

Access & Info – Store client details, other key contacts and systems access info somewhere secure (and no, not on a sticky note!).

**Communication** – Plan out who needs to be contacted (clients, suppliers, team, etc.) and how they'll be informed.

Sorting out just a few of these can make a big difference, because business continuity planning isn't just a box to tick, it's an investment in your business' long-term resilience.

And if you're not sure where to begin, you don't have to do it alone. With the right support, it's easier than you think to put a simple, practical plan in place, so things run more smoothly when life doesn't.

# **Buckley and Modewarre**

Have you ever wondered why the area between Lake Modewarre and Winchelsea is known as 'Buckley'?

Here's an interesting story about the intersection of Indigenous and colonial cultures in the Winchelsea area. Buckley was named after William Buckley (c.1776-1856). There are many homages to Buckley in Victoria in place names, eg. Buckleys Falls in Fvansford and Bucklev's Cave under the Point Lonsdale Lighthouse. Buckley has been immortalised in the common Australian expression

"you've got Buckley's hope". Colonial Historians such as James Bonwick dubbed Buckley the dubious title "wild white man". Buckley's portrait hangs in the State Library of Victoria near that of Wurrundjeri elder and artist William Barak and colonial settlers and statesman. Buckley has become a key figure in the colonial history of Victoria and is a fascinating example of conciliation between Indigenous and colonial cultures.

Buckley was born in Cheshire, UK. As a child orphan, he was raised by his grandfather. He worked as a bricklayer, and aged 19 enlisted in the British Army where he fought against Napoleon in The Netherlands. He served until 1802 when he was convicted of stealing a roll of fabric, which Buckley said he was asked to carry to the Garrison. Buckley was sentenced to transportation to Australia, where as a convict he helped Colonel David Collins construct the first European settlement in Victoria, a penal settlement at Sullivan bay, near Sorrento in 1803. Collins deemed Port Phillip was no place for a colony and moved to the Derwent River in Van Diemen's Land, Leaving Port Phillip on 30 January 1804.

Meanwhile, Buckley had escaped the settlement in December 1803

and was assumed dead when the colony was abandoned. Buckley made out on foot around the bay hoping he could overland to Sydney. After some time surviving on shellfish and badly malnourished Buckley Rested on what turned out to be a grave mound, picking up a broken spear he found there. He was discovered by women of the Wallarranga tribe of the Wadawurrung Nation. The women recognised him as their deceased chief "Murrangurk" who's spear he was holding.

This is where we get the name of Murrengurk Rd, in Buckley, East of Winchelsea, and Moranghurk estate near Meredith. They rationalised his pale skin and the fact that he was unable to communicate with them as evidence of the fact that he had returned from the dead. They adopted him into their tribe where he lived as a Wadawurrung man for 32 years. Buckley was aware of Europeans on the coast during that time and chose not to contact them.

Buckley describes his time in the Winchelsea area thus:

We next went... to a place they call Kironamaat; there is near to it a lake about ten miles in circumference... we hunted all the way; we halted near a well of fresh water, the lake being brackish, and there was a great plain near us. We here made nets with strips of bark, and caught with them great quantities of shrimps. We lived very sumptuously and in peace for many months at this place, and then went to the borders of another lake, called Moodewarri: the water of which was perfectly fresh, abounding in large eels, which we caught in great abundance. In this lake, as well as in most of the others inland, and in the deep water rivers, is a very extraordinary amphibious animal, which the natives call Bunyip.

In 1835 Buckley walked into John Batman's camp at Indented head near St. Leonards on the Bellarine Peninsula. A tattoo of his initials. WB. confirmed his identity. Buckley received a pardon and acted as an intermediary and interpreter between the whites and Aborigines for two years but he never trusted colonial people and had lost the support of his Wadawurrung family. He moved to Tasmania, found employment, and married. He died in 1856 at the age of 76.

#### WINCHELSEA HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

The Hortucultural Society started at the Shire Hall on 20th August 1903 but during war time shows were suspended.

Shows featured potted plants, floral displays, hanging baskets, fruit and vegetables and art and craft.

The annual subscription was set at two shillings and sixpence and in less than three months the first show was presented in the Temperance Hall on 5th November. It attracted about five hundred entries.

"When the hall was thrown open to the public a very pretty picture met the eye. A table running up the centre of the building was devoted to a fine display of foliage plants, maidenhair ferns, begonias and mimulus. Along the front of the stage was a table bearing floral designs. In the corner of the room rare artistic displays were seen."


The show provided the occasion for friends to meet and spend a few pleasurable hours together.

Amusements included nail driving competitions, hat-trimming and drawing a pig blindfolded.



Proceeds from the first show were retained for future shows, which were a huge success, and later a surplus of funds was distributed to community groups and the patriotic fund. Spring shows were held every year and autumn shows from time to time.

On 13th September 1982 an affiliate Winchelsea and District Club was inaugurated, the foundation president being Mrs Peg Bone and secretary Mrs J Robertson. It conducted regular monthly general meetings but is now in recess.



# Councillor **Update**

Last Friday afternoon there was an induction for the new members of the Positive Ageing Advisory Committee (PAAC), which I and most of the existing members also went along to. It's the first time the Shire has held an induction for this group, so a good grounding for all concerned. The PAAC is all about ensuring that Council is kept in touch with the needs of the older members of our community, and is particularly important given the predicted skewing of Surf Coast Shire population ages towards the higher end over the next decade or so.

There are 11 members, and each is drawn from a particular location to ensure representation from our quite different and diverse townships. Jenny Mathison represents Winchelsea, Lyn

Batson is Moriac. The PAAC meets every 2 months, it's not a high demand role but is a critical input for Council. Aireys Inlet needs a representative so if you know someone who would like to volunteer for that town please suggest they call the Shire. I am the Councillor representative for at least this year (chosen every 12 months). It's good to be a part of the PAAC, a friendly, engaged and important bunch. You can find out more at surfcoast.vic.gov.au/ Community/Positive-ageing

The Shire also held a staff awards session last week, recognising those who had been with the Shire 5, 10, 15, 20 30, 40 and even 45 years. Winchelsea's local legend PK was recognised for his 15 years of service, plus snag-cooking skills. Councillors are deliberately separated from most staff other than senior management (in fact, State government expects this), which made this awards session a rare opportunity to see how dedicated the staff are, and how positive the workplace culture is. A very happy occasion!

Turning to the next 4-Year Council Plan, the 45-member community panel has now wrapped up and presented their 8 principles to Council, which will help us set directions, themes and strategies. The 4-Year Plan must be published by October, so it's certainly a key focus for Councillors over the next couple of months. The draft version will be presented to the community for feedback, be sure to take the opportunity to give it a once-over when it appears (August?).

The Winchelsea Pool has now closed for the season – it saw around 3,000 enjoy the renovated and revamped heated swimming pool, which is a fabulous take-up by all. Along with the verynearly-finished adventure playground, the barbecue hut with its communitypowered cob walls, and the 2 viewing platforms due to begin construction this month, that area is set to be a major drawcard for locals and visitors alike. Next on the list is to review the traffic flow and parking on Barwon Terrace ahead of the summer season.

# **Fire Services** Levy Stalls In Parliament, **Farmer Concerns Linger**

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) has welcomed the decision to stall the deeply flawed proposed Fire Services Levy Bill and says the reprieve must be used to iron out the fundamental issues facing farmers and regional communities.

VFF President Brett Hosking said while farmers would be breathing a temporary sigh of relief, legitimate concerns still linger regarding the proposed cash-grab.

"This is a step in the right direction. The government tried to push through a flawed tax without consultation and they have clearly failed to secure the numbers. I thank those MP's who have demonstrated strong leadership slowing the passage of this new tax without proper community and stakeholder consultation."

"The VFF's focus will remain on highlighting the very real destruction that this Bill will cause and making sure the government doesn't steamroll through with a reckless decision."

"We have families struggling with skyrocketing costs, and farmers battling

drought, bushfires, and rising expenses. A cost of living crisis is not the time to introduce an unnecessary new tax. The stalling of the Bill gives us hope and more time, but we must see sweeping changes to the proposal," Mr Hosking

Mr Hosking said there would be no letting up on the opposition towards the Bill, despite today's stall.

"This blatantly wrong tax is wrong today and it will be wrong in the coming days and weeks. The opposition towards it has been overwhelming and we must keep up the pressure to ensure farmers and regional Victorians aren't hung out to dry."

"Our message to the government couldn't be clearer. Talk to us, consult with us and work collaboratively to get ideas that actually work and don't risk taking a sledgehammer to the livelihoods of hard-working Victorian



famers," Mr Hosking said.

Mr Hosking thanked those passionate VFF members who took the time to write directly to their local MP to voice their opposition as well as those rural focussed organisations who joined with VFF to support our voice.

"We are encouraging you to keep fighting. Keep up the pressure by having your saying using the information provided on our website vff.org.au."

# Winchelsea Swimming Pool Community Voice

With the recent upgrade of the Winchelsea Swimming Pool complete, we are looking ahead with a hopeful vision of what the future holds for our ability to maximise this wonderful venue's utilisation. I have been a strong advocate for better community access to the pool for over 20 years.

From feedback I have received recently. it appears there are a few teething problems to still be sorted out with the new pool. Namely, there seems to be some problems with the safety of the surface of the children's 'middle sized pool' with several parents reporting that their young children have had painful cuts on their feet after its use. Please reach out to me on the contact info provided below if this has affected you or your family. Another big issue raised is the lack of shaded areas. The old pool layout ensured the toddlers area was completely covered by shade, and there were several areas around the pool where shade sails and picnic tables ensured sunsmart options for supervising parents and patrons to sit. Shade is essential as is the availability of multiple seating and picnic table options, and this is definitely something the Shire must consider rectifying in the near future. I am astounded that these issues have not already been addressed adequately and considered in the initial planning and design process?

Having grown up in Winchelsea, I remember the golden era of the pool under community management in the capable hands of Lesley Berg and Barb Holmes before the Surfcoast Shire became involved. What a service to the community these women and the original pool committee gave. Back in those days, the pool was the place where all the kids in town congregated during the summer months. On the stinking hot days, these wonderful women would keep the pool open till well after dinner, and parents would gather after work and organise dinner runs to the fish and chip or pizza shop, while the resident BBQ was also ignited. The very best way to end a hot day, with many dads often appearing after a long hot pre-dawn day of harvesting hay and farm work, to have a quick dip with the family to cool down before starting it all

again the next day.

As new friendships forged with kids from neighbouring towns or outlying rural farms, countless hours were spent in the water. When we were blue with cold, and shrivelled like prunes, we would take a rest for an hour lying on the hot concrete to warm up, munching on sunny boys, or a 20 cent bag of lollies from the canteen. If you were really cold, (and lucky), you got a bag of hot chips or a couple of potato cakes drizzled in sauce or vinegar to help warm up.

Back in those days, there was also a diving board and a water slide, access to which marked a 'graduation ritual' of being allowed to move from the 'middle pool' to the 'big pool' under watchful parental gaze. As a kid, I loved that diving board so much. I even dreamed about it! It had the perfect amount of bouncy spring (way more than modern diving boards) to get great height for a one-and a half pike or somersault. Withstanding the cold breeze as you shivered in line, tolerating the boisterous local lads reckless antics, it was all worth the wait... if you pulled off a good dive and didn't waste your turn! Igniting the imagination, In the air, we were birds, and once under the water, we became seals or dolphins. Of course there was always the included ritual of swimming to the bottom to touch the floor before the next turn.

My love of springboard diving and swimming in general began at the winch pool. In later years I went on to swim and dive in state level competitions and in my late teens and early twenties I became a learn to swim instructor and Hydrotherapy facilitator for rehab and seniors Arthritis management classes as part of my 30+ year career in Rehabilitation, Musculoskeletal medicine and Osteopathy. Lap-swimming and open water ocean swimming has been a lifelong daily and weekly activity I have engaged in for management of my own mental and physical health and wellbeing my whole life. A lifetime relationship with watersports, all from my love of swimming at the Winch pool which started as a toddler in the late 1970s. As a country kid, growing up 30+ kms away from the coast, the Winch

pool became a godsend for us during those summer months.

When my own children were young, I would juggle work hours and take them to the pool to share in the fun. The children of my childhood friends kept them company as new friendships were once again forged amongst the next generations. After my own children were grown, I would still get to the pool myself in-between work shifts to lap-swim as much as possible (despite the difficult opening hours), and often enjoyed time with friends and their families, always loving seeing the joy and delight of young children learning to swim and also fostering a love of the water as their imaginations ran wild.

Sadly though, for the last 20 years or so, the pools opening hours and season length has been greatly reduced. 12pm - 6pm was all we got once the Surfcoast Shire took over the pools management, and despite the increasing number of very hot days in February, March, and April, the pool was only open from early December to late January. I have written and contacted the shire on many occasions over the years, with minimal response. On the odd occasion where I did receive a response, minimal budget allocations, high operational costs and staffing issues were always the excuse given for such poor hours and season length. After spending close to 9 million tax payers dollars on a rebuild, these excuses are no longer acceptable. It is time that we as a community stand united and speak up about our need for a longer season, and better opening

The Winchelsea community is growing rapidly, with data from the Australian Bureau of Statistic showing a relatively stable growth rate of approximately 1000 people every 3 years for the last few census gathering time frames. The demographic of new residents ranges from newcomers with young children who seek a great rural community to raise their families all the way to semior full retiree's wishing for a 'country change', an escape from the rat race. A future need for access to swimming lessons for kids, and hydrotherapy programs etc for healthy aging is blindingly obvious.

I understand that everything comes down to money, and that operational costs are significant, but this is not a definitive and prohibitive reason or excuse to limit community use and access now we have a new 9 million dollar venue! In order to problem solve and address this issue successfully, I will be asking our councillors and the Surfcoast Shire for full transparency in relation to historical annual budget allocations for the operation of the Winchelsea pool. I would also like to speak directly with those at the Council who make decisions on future budget and operational management plans moving forward. Do I have confidence that the Shire will openly share such information? Let's wait and see. It would be an interesting cross study to investigate and compare the access to resources and budgeting that goes on between the inland rural townships within the Surfcoast Shire's jurisdiction Versus the Coastal townships.

What is the point of having spent 8.9 Million dollars on a resource that will be locked up and unavailable for 10 months of the year? A slap in the face for Winch folk who drive by on their way to or from a coffee at La hoot, a walk along the

river, or a visit to the playground with the kids. A locked up 9 million dollar facility we cant even get adequate use or access to! For the 2 months open, to have it only open 6 hours a day when a large portion of the community have clearly stated they cannot access it at these times due to work, weather, travel, other family commitments is just another blatant sign that Winchelsea's communities' needs are not taken seriously.

It is time the shire heard the communities voice on this issue, and it is time that the community gets what it is asking for. The Surfcoast shire closed our pool for 2 seasons, leaving residents without any option for watersport recreation this whole time. Beach visits during summer has become increasingly hard due to overcrowding and completely inadequate parking. This is another very real problem the Surfcoast shire fails to successfully resolve. Instead, parking fees and fines along the coastal beach access hot spots during peak season helps raise revenue as the volume of no parking signs and yellow lines increases. At the very least, give us access to a pool from early November to End April with hours we can actually attend. I wonder what the

opening hours and season length of the new Pool they are building in Torquay will be? You can bet it will be in line with Leisurelink or Kardinia Pool in Geelong.

I do not accept the Shire's rationale of Budget costs, attendance figures, staffing issues, and high operational costs as a viable excuse any longer. There are countless rural pools throughout all of southwest Victoria who manage to offer better access and solve budgeting and operational cost issues with all kinds of solutions. Community Committees, fundraising, local business sponsorship, and council decision making that prioritises community value for health, wellbeing and social interactions over financial profit and loss sheet data is essential and just plain common sense. If our community had access to swimming lessons, early morning and after work lap swimming hours, and other such opportunities, I am confident the Pools regular attendance data would increase. What parent wouldn't want to save petrol costs and travel time and benefit from a local swim school!

My vision for the immediate next few seasons as the momentum grows for embracing this resource can be outlined with:

- Longer season length, opening the first weekend in November, and running to the end of the April / Easter School Holidays.
- A split shift opening hours of 6.30am – 11.30am, and 2.30pm – 7.30pm at minimum, Mon – Wed and Fri, with the view to extend these hours towards 5 days a week. (Tues / Thurs could be a single shift of 2.30pm – 7.30pm just as a suggestion).
- Weekend and public holiday opening hours 8 hrs a day: eg: 10am – 6pm with a 4hr morning shift, then changeover at 2pm and an afternoon shift till 6pm.
- Swimming lessons and Hydrotherapy / water aerobics classes available on a regular basis throughout the season length.
- 5. Establishment of a Winchelsea Pool Committee to contribute to fundraising, sponsorship, program development and to liase and work with local council in the administration and operational aspects of the pool to maximise community access.

6. Local training of First Aid, Swim Instructor and life saver certification to provide opportunities for local Winchelsea residents to gain local employment. Building a team of approx. 6 staff members to rotate through shifts / weekdays and weekend rosters to ensure adequate staffing. Possible involvement of community volunteers / engagement of the Winchelsea Pool Committee to assist in administrative and operational aspects of delivering a successful seasonal program.

Results from survey respondents already gathered reflect a clear calling for these improvements along with many other valuable contributions and insights. Other data shows that the pool services residents not just from Winchelsea, but many associated rural regions including Deans Marsh, Birregurra, Cressy, Beeac, Inverleigh, Bannockburn, and Moriac regions. This reflects patterns of usage that have existed for the past 40 years, showing the pool services the wider rural populations and townships within the region. Results also show a clear demand for affordable family membership and access to a longer pool season with approx 80% of respondents asking for a longer season length and stating they would be willing to pay a family membership that reflects this. Families are also

asking for a family pass to not be limited to 2 adults and 2 children, with many families with more than 2 children feeling unfairly financially burdened by this limitation.

If the Winchelsea and surrounding rural community wants a positive change that benefits local residents, now is the time to start speaking up. Decisions will be made in the next couple of months about the 2025/6 summer season so it is becoming urgent that we collate this information and prepare our submissions to local council.

Please jump online and complete the Winchelsea Pool Community Voice survey to register your views and vision now. We have close to 200 responses, but my goal is 1000. Tell your local friends and families about this survey and please ask for their involvement. The survey is posted weekly on the Winchelsea Community Facebook page. 
