How does our options process work?

Every student at Barnwood Park will study the subjects in our core curriculum.

The core curriculum subjects are as follows:

- English Language
- English Literature
- Mathematics
- Combined Science (2 GCSEs)

All students will also receive curriculum time dedicated to Core PE and PSHE.

These subjects will not be examined.

Option subjects

Every student will make **four** option choices. This will mean that the students will leave Barnwood Park with nine KS4 qualifications.

Students must choose one of the following subjects from Group 1:

- Geography
- History
- French
- Spanish

Students will then have a choice of any three of the remaining subjects from Group 2.

- Business Studies
- Computer Science
- Dance
- Design Technology
- Drama
- Fine Art
- Food Preparation & Nutrition
- French
- Geography
- Health & Social Care
- History
- Music
- PE/Sports Studies
- Photography
- Religious Studies
- Spanish
- Textiles

Students will be asked to choose a reserve subject from Group 2. Once we have received the option choices of all students we will, as much as possible, try to accommodate the choices of all students. However, it is important to note that there may be capacity or timetabling issues which mean a certain combination of options won't work. If this is the case, we will contact you on an individual basis.

Why English Language?

The English Language GCSE assesses students on their writing and reading skills both with fiction and nonfiction texts. During the course they will build on their knowledge gained at Key Stage 3 and learn to write with flair and originality whilst maintaining accurate punctuation and grammar. English Language gives students the opportunity to read a range of texts which explore big ideas that are relevant to society today and teaches them the fundamental skills that they will need in their future when it comes to reading and writing.

Language Paper 2 encourages them to form and write about their own viewpoints and perspectives on issues ranging from climate change to future challenges society faces. Students will also prepare and deliver a spoken language presentation which develops their ability to express their thoughts logically and clearly in readiness for their next steps, whether this is an academic or more vocational route.

Where can it take you?

English Language is one of the core GCSEs that all students need. All colleges and sixth forms will have a minimum requirement for this GCSE and the students will need to achieve this in order to get onto any vocational, apprenticeship and A Level course. It opens up opportunities for many different subjects at A Level such as English Language, English Literature, Media, Criminology, History and Politics.

Why English Literature?

In English Literature, students study a variety of writing forms and learn about the bigger social issues that all of the writers and poets are exploring in their texts. They gain a valuable insight into understanding morality as well exploring humanity across the ages. By reading and analysing the classics such as Macbeth and A Christmas Carol, it opens them up to worlds which they may not know and wider questions about redemption and conflict, which students can then apply to their own real world experiences. Through studying the poetry anthology and unseen poetry, they will learn the different ways in which people express themselves and develop their analytical skills.

Where can it take you?

English Literature GCSE opens up opportunities for many different subjects at A Level such as English Literature, Media, Criminology, History, Politics plus many more. It is especially useful for subjects that require students to write extended essays. It is also a qualification that will support applications for apprenticeships. At university level, English Literature is an incredibly diverse academic subject with elements looking at different authors, different time periods and different forms. Whether you study English Literature at A Level or at university, it will offer a variety of pathways in a wide range of careers including journalism, teaching and even becoming a social media manager.

Overview

The qualification consists of three equally-weighted written examination papers at either Foundation tier or Higher tier. All three papers must be at the same tier of entry and must be completed in the same assessment series.

Paper 1 is a non-calculator assessment.

Paper 2 and 3 are calculator assessments.

Each paper is 1 hour and 30 minutes long. Each paper has 80 marks. The content outlined for each tier will be assessed across all three papers.

Why Maths?

Maths is a subject which enables students to be able to problem solve and reason logically logically. It enables people to make connections across a variety of topics and also understand real-life applications of data. Maths is the study of patterns, making predictions and trying to make sense of the world we live in.

Skills developed

The course aims to encourage you to:

- apply mathematical knowledge and understanding to solve problems;
- think and communicate mathematically – precisely, logically and creatively;
- apply mathematical concepts to situations arising in your own life;
- acquire a firm foundation for further study;
- work cooperatively, independently and practically;
- consolidate basic skills and meet appropriately challenging work.

Where can it take you?

Mathematics provides a strong foundation for both further academic and vocational studies, as well as for securing employment. It equips students with the appropriate mathematical skills, knowledge and understanding necessary to excel in a variety of further and higher education courses. It can lead to numerous career opportunities, including roles as an Engineer, Data Analyst, Cryptographer, Economist and Accountant, among others.

Exam questions are a mixture of multiple-choice, structured, open and closed response, graph skills and calculations. The questions are classified as either low, standard or high demand, depending on their difficulty.

There are foundation and higher tier papers. Foundation tier papers contain low and standard demand questions and are capped at a maximum of a grade 5. Higher tier papers contain standard demand and high demand questions and have no upper cap. However, higher tier papers have a minimum score of a Grade 4 which means that any score below that threshold will receive a U grade.

Whether you are entered for foundation or higher tier exams will be determined by your performance in class alongside results from mock exams and other assessments. Final decisions on tiers of entry are made in Year 11.

There will be no controlled assessment. Investigation skills will be assessed through questions on the exam papers. Students will carry out a number of required practicals during the learning of the content. These are set by the exam board.

Why Science?

During GCSE Science you will continue to develop your scientific knowledge alongside enquiry, analysis and numeracy skills. You will learn how to apply your understanding to new, unfamiliar contexts and develop a host of transferable skills that will help you when applying for sixth form, college and jobs in the future.

Where can Science take you?

Science is a flexible qualification which can be applied to a vast number of career paths such as medicine, military technology, healthcare and midwifery, sport science, ecology and environment, epidemiology, astronomy, electrical/mechanical/chemical engineering and research scientists.

Why Business?

If you are interested in our consumer culture and how it works. You follow current affairs and are interested in the world around you. You are keen on a career in business and have creative ideas. You are keen to learn a lot of new terms and concepts and enjoy written exams. If you are interested in entrepreneurs like the characters seen on Dragon's Den and finding out what made them reach the top of their fields. After studying Business the world will be your oyster.

Skills developed

Successful students will develop a good understanding of the business world, how and why businesses are started, and the decision making processes that make and keep them successful. You will develop an ability to evaluate numbers and statistics, and understand the short-term and long-term impacts of business decisions on finances and people. You will gain an understanding of the importance of planning and effective research to aid better decision making, and gain awareness of the impact of economic and world news on everyday decisions.

Where can it take you?

This course is designed to equip students with business knowledge, commercial skills and an understanding of modern organisations. Ideal for students who are considering further study in a business related discipline, a career in the business world or possibly self-employment. It can lead on to further study of business and marketing ideas at college or 6th Form, including Level 3 courses at college or 6th Form in Business, Economics or Accounting.

Why Computer Science?

Whatever your chosen career path, or even if you are still deciding, the knowledge and understanding of computing and information technology is a key skill in the modern world of work. You will enjoy this course if you like solving problems (whether these are game puzzles or real-life situations), you are a good lateral thinker, are curious about technology which underpins everyday activities and want to know more on programming – Using Python Programming language.

Skills developed

Computer Science is concerned with logical thinking, computer design, and computer programming. It gives learners a real, in-depth understanding of how computer technology works. This course provides excellent preparation for higher study and employment in Computer Science and allows learners to develop critical thinking, analysis and problem-solving skills.

During the course you will gain an in-depth understanding of how the computer works and what you can make it do, exploring networks and systems development.

Where can it take you?

This GCSE can lead to a range of courses at local colleges and 6th forms such as Computing, Media and Graphics. Career areas would include IT or graphic designer, website designer, games developer, and software engineer. This is a course for those interested in one of the most rapidly advancing areas of technology, leading to challenging and stimulating careers.

Overview

Course content outline and how the course is assessed:

This course comprises of 3 components, all of which have a strongly weighted practical element, with the addition of a written element. Two of the units are internally assessed throughout the 2-year course with the students compiling a portfolio of work that will be graded either Pass, Merit, Distinction or Distinction * level.

Component 1 – Exploring the Performing Arts

In this unit, you will look at professional dance in a variety of styles and how all the features of the piece work together to communicate a theme. You will explore the style, ideas, influences, process and people involved in creating the piece.

Component 2 – Developing skills and techniques in the Performing Arts

You will participate in practical workshops to develop your dance skills towards learning and performing a professional group dance piece. You will review your progress and performance throughout the process.

Component 3 – Performing to a Brief

You will be given a brief and a starting point to create a piece of choreography portfolio. This is group work where everyone is encouraged to contribute and work collaboratively to create an effective dance piece that clearly communicates an idea to the audience.

Why Dance?

Dance is about creating your own dances and working with other people to develop your skills as a dancer. You do not need any previous formal dance training. This course is an enjoyable and creative outlet alongside more academic subjects.

Where can it take you?

Those who study Dance may progress onto various pathways in the future such as performance, choreography, fitness and movement therapy, BTEC level 3 course or A level Dance or Performing Arts. It is a strong foundation for those wishing to study Dance or the Performing Arts at university or even the possibility of study at a national dance school.

What students say: “Dance is a thrilling and fun way to explore your own dance abilities as well as adapting your style using inspiration from set works. Don’t be scared to do it. Be bold, be yourself. Everyone can dance.”

Why Design Technology?

GCSE Design and Technology will prepare students to participate confidently and successfully in an increasingly technological world. Students will gain awareness and learn from wider influences on Design and Technology including historical, social, cultural, environmental and economic factors. Students will get the opportunity to work creatively when designing and making, and apply technical and practical expertise.

This GCSE allows students to study core technical and designing and making principles, including a broad range of design processes, materials techniques and equipment. They will also have the opportunity to study specialist technical principles in greater depth.

Where can it take you?

Design and Technology is a versatile subject that will expose learners to a plethora of potential opportunities. Academic and vocational options are a few of these, such as going on to study courses like product design, architecture, fashion design, sculpture, furniture design, biomechanical and structural engineering, to name just a few, at college or sixth form before heading to university or undertaking an apprenticeship as soon as you've left school in things such as carpentry, engineering or multi-trades.

Overview

This course comprises of 3 components, all of which have a strongly weighted practical element, with the addition of a written element. Two of the units are internally assessed throughout the 2-year course with the students compiling a portfolio of work that will be graded either Pass, Merit, Distinction or Distinction * level.

Component 1 – Exploring the Performing Arts

In this unit, you will look at professional drama performances in theatre in a variety of styles and how all the features of the piece work together to communicate a theme. You will explore the style, ideas, influences, process and people involved in creating the piece.

Component 2 – Developing skills and techniques in the Performing Arts

You will participate in practical workshops to develop your drama skills towards learning and performing a professional group drama piece. You will review your progress and performance throughout the process.

Component 3 – Performing to a Brief

You will be given a brief and a starting point to create a piece of devised theatre portfolio. This is group work where everyone is encouraged to contribute and work collaboratively to create an effective drama piece that clearly communicates an idea to the audience.

Why Drama?

Drama is both a creative and academic study. It provides you with the essential soft skills that you need to be successful in applying for future careers. This course is an enjoyable and creative outlet alongside more academic subjects for those students who are interested in creating your own drama pieces and working with other people to develop your skills as an actor. You do not need any previous drama training.

Skills developed

Students will develop a wide range of skills in leadership, analysis, presentation, discussion, imagination and creativity.

Specifically to Drama; vocal projection, spoken language, characterisation, drama structures, movement skills, staging, lighting and sound.

Where can it take you?

Due to the fantastic range of skills that you acquire in GCSE Drama, you can apply these to almost any subject or career choice in the future. Students can go on to pursue a place at Drama School, BTEC courses A-Level Drama and then onto University.

Because you are improving your skills in communication, presentation and teamwork, Drama can be a useful subject and give you skills that employers and universities are looking for especially in careers involving people.

What students say: *“Drama is great for me because I am emotional and I have learned how to use that effectively to create characters in performance. I have also learned that theatre can change the world as well as help me understand myself!”*

Why Fine Art?

If you enjoy being creative, want to increase your practical skills and improve your analytical, communication and research abilities, Art is a great choice. The skills you gain make it a great complement to other subjects. Art encourages self-expression, critical thinking and creativity and can build confidence as well as a sense of individual identity and character. Studying art helps to create a broad and balanced curriculum, which is an excellent foundation for whatever you want to do afterwards. The transferable skills you'll gain in Art will complement a range of other subjects and careers.

Skills developed

- Confidence with handling, exploring and experimenting with a range of artistic media, materials and processes such as painting.
- The ability to be self-motivated and work independently to develop your creative potential.
- The ability to develop exciting sketchbook work and final outcomes using a range of media and materials as well as showing an awareness of work from other artists and cultures and visual language.
- The ability to evaluate through the reflection and modification of your learning to improve progress.

Where can it take you?

Art can open up many opportunities and can provide lots of varied opportunities for future progress. Whether you decide to move on to A Levels or a vocational route, there are many pathways built upon the foundations of Art.


Progression can be to:

- Other creative areas of study including Textiles, Photography and Digital Media
- A Level / BTEC at post-16 education providers including 6th Forms and College of Further Education
- Degree or Higher Diploma

Overview

50% Controlled Assessment (2 tasks) and 50% Exam

Year 10 – Developing practical skills and deepening your understanding of nutrition, food science and culinary theory.

Year 11 – Embedding the practical skills learnt in Year 10 and moving on to assessment tasks to develop the skills before a final exam.

Areas covered include;

- Advanced culinary skills including how to bone a chicken and fillet a fish
- International Cuisine
- Health, safety and food hygiene
- Food preparation, cooking and presentation
- Nutrition and menu planning
- Costing and portion control
- Specialist equipment
- Environmental considerations

Why Food Preparation and Nutrition?

If you love cooking or want to improve your cooking skills, or are interested in working in the catering or hospitality industry, interested in food, its origins and meeting chefs and suppliers and feeding those around you with delicious food, then Food GCSE is a great choice for you.

Skills developed

- High-level culinary skills such as how to make fresh pasta.
- Time keeping and organisation; making sure all your tasks are completed on time and remembering all your ingredients.
- Team work and co-operation; many tasks require teamwork and good communication with others.
- Resilience; bouncing back when a dish has failed.
- Research and evaluative skills are frequently used to improve and develop skills and understanding.

Where can it take you?

According to the British Hospitality Association, hospitality and catering is Britain's fourth largest industry and accounts for around 10% of the total workforce. This course is great preparation for any Hospitality & Catering course or career. If you are planning on going to university or do an apprenticeship, it gives you good skills for being independent and opens up part-time job opportunities.

Throughout the course you will practise the four communication skills: listening, reading, writing and speaking, across multiple topics relating to your own interests and experiences, as well as the wider world.

Skills developed

- Confidence, communication and cultural understanding.
- Language skills developed in a variety of contexts.
- Students develop the confidence to communicate in French in a safe, supportive environment.
- Students learn to appreciate the French culture through the study of not only the French language, but also festivals and traditions as well as aspects of the geography and history of France.

Where can it take you?

The Edexcel GCSE French course builds on the KS3 programme of study and prepares students for further study at A Level and Degree. Careers areas for Modern Foreign Language students could include: translating and interpreting, journalism, travel/tourism and teaching. It is also very useful for business.

Why Geography?

Geography helps make sense of the world around you and how this can affect people, places and the environment. Students will travel the world from the classroom, exploring case studies in the United Kingdom (UK), newly emerging economies (NEEs) and lower income countries (LICs). Topics of study include climate change, poverty, deprivation, global shifts in economic power and the challenge of sustainable resource use. Students are also encouraged to understand their role in society, by considering different viewpoints, values and attitudes.

Where can it take you?

Geography GCSE goes hand in hand with other humanities subjects such as History and Religious Studies as a facilitating subject. Geography is a broad-based subject which provides lots of varied opportunities for future progress. It opens up opportunities for many different subjects at A Level such as Economics, Sociology and Politics, as well as supporting students to access more vocational courses such as level 3 courses in Travel and Tourism.

Why Music?

You will also gain essential skills needed within a variety of professional industries. Such skills include working collaboratively with peers, understanding and responding to complex briefs, pitching and presenting ideas and creativity.

Skills developed

- Performance skills: how to perform with confidence and style on a chosen instrument (including voice).

Skills developed

- Practical skills in a range of physical activities, analysis and evaluating of performance levels.

Where can it take you?

A GCSE PE qualification can lead on to A Level PE, BTEC Sport Level 3 and a range of educational pathways.
