

#### Chairman's Report: Bryanston High School Management Council -1991

The year past will be recorded as a watershed in the history of Bryanston High School.

In keeping with the changes sweeping through the entire socio economic and political order of our country, ninety-seven percent of the parent body voted for the Model B option, enabling the school in future to determine its own admission criteria without forfeiting the current levels of State subsidisation. In determining the minimum requirements for admission to the school, Management Council, in consultation with parents and academic staff, elected to serve primarily the community in which the school functions without compromising its cultural, academic, linguistic, sporting and financial ecology. It was decided that the school should address the needs of the new South Africa without succumbing to them.



1991 was also a year in which it became abundantly clear that any notion of education being free, and an obligation of the State to taxpayers, is now little more than a nostalgic memory. As South Africa moves towards parity of education for all under a single education department parents will have to contribute more directly and more onerously to the provision and maintenance of the educational facilities they wish their children to enjoy. The national vision for the future places greater emphasis on vocation-based training and the quality of the educational service available will be directly proportional to the amount of money parents are inclined to invest in it.

I am pleased to report that in 1991, more Bryanston High parents paid their School Fund and Trust Fund contributions than in any of the previous five years. While the school has sympathy for and structures to accommodate those parents who, either temporarily or permanently, cannot meet their total obligations, there has been a distinct hardening of attitude to obdurate evaders of moral responsibility.

The immediate priority for our school is to pay off the Media Centre debt to Nedbank and to establish a reserve fund of approximately R100,000:00 to maintain and upgrade the school's existing facilities. During the year, we were pleased to welcome Mr Rolf van der Merwe as the resident estate manager of our valuable assets.

Following the opening of new schools in the Bryanston area, pupil enrolment this year stabilized at about 840. With 190 matriculants leaving at the end of the year, and the same number expected to exit at the end of 1992, we need to attract an annual intake of approximately 180 pupils to maintain a total complement of 900, which is considered appropriate for the kind of school we wish Bryanston to be. For this reason, applications will continue to be considered and even canvassed from outside our feeder area provided that the pupils meet our minimum criteria for admission.

1991 will also be remembered for its farewells to two wonderful people with a rich tradition of service to Bryanston High. Val Andrews is retiring after a monumental career in Biology teaching, while Lorraine Stafford, who for so many years led the mothers of the school in catering and functions, is finally handing over the reins. The service and commitment of these two ladies has generated a debt of gratitude which the school will never be able to repay.

For the greater part of the year, Mr paige was absent on post graduate study leave at Rand Afrikaans University and we thank Mr McFarland for acting as Headmaster in his absence. The numerous achievements recorded both curricularly and extra murally during the year testify to an excellent Captain having handed over to an equally outstanding First Officer. I would like to express my gratitude to my colleagues on the management Council, the Parents' Association, the Trustees, the Staff and the Mothers' Group for their support and valuable contribution to the effective running and growth of the school.

The challenges of 1992 will be daunting but I believe that Bryanston High is well positioned, not only to face them, but also to make a meaningful contribution to the emergence of the new South Africa. Jacques Sellschop Chairman

The goals for the P.A. this year have been twofold: to try and involve parents move in acitivites at the school, and to try and raise some much needed money to help finance certain projects.

To this end we held a very successful and enjoyable dance at the Bryanston Country Club on 30th August. 


To Sandy de Villiers who was always willing to help with last minute notices.



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
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#### POTTERY CLUB

#### WILDLIFE


The wildlife club consisted of eight people, three of them from local primary schools. During the year we went to the Snake Park and to Delta Park and its museum.


That night we stayed at Sabie Youth Hostel which brought new meaning to the word "discipline" ....

None of us will ever forget the 1991 leadership camp for the skills and leadership qualities we learnt which will benefit us in the future. Matthew Chersich










#### **VELDSCHOOL 1991**

pretty exhausting.

Six hours of Tuesday were spent hiking up and up and up until I thought surely I'd reach the clouds. The trip was made better by a certain Miss MacQuilkan behind us to urge us on, and I can tell you, that with my aching muscles and burning skin, I needed that urging. Rising from the depths of the ocean Neptune excelled to great heights in 1991, taking first place in five events.



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


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#### **BOY"S HOCKEY SEASON**




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#### CROSS COUNTRY TOUR 1991


# ATHLETICS

I would like to thank everybody who made my year so successful and I wish Bryanston Interact lots of luck for the future.




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### FIRST AID 1991






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# **PUBLIC SPEAKING AND DEBATING**



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


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### DRIVERS EDUCATION


The response to <u>old clothes</u>, even though not as good as last year, was still appreciable. So our heartfelt thanks go to all contributors.


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
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### VALEDICTORY - 1991 ACTING HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS



# **YOUNG HISTORIANS' CONFERENCE**

The annual young Historians' Conference begun in Natal in 1979 under the auspices of the Natal History Teachers' Association, has become a prestigious event countrywide over the past few years. The competition stipulates a broad theme, syllabus-based, for each standard (8 - 10), and the entrant may interpret and narrow the theme at will, delivering a 10 minute speech with whatever audio-visual aids are appropriate.

At Bryanston, the number of hopeful entrants was so large that an internal elimination round was necessary. Eventually, the 6 entrants for the first round were finalised, and Sharon Chapman, Harlen Henderson (Std 8), Judy van Nieuwkerk, Lisa Blignaut (Std 9), Melissa Davidson and Sarah Lincoln (Std 10) competed against several other schools in a Regional Competition at St Andrews. Although only Sarah Lincoln managed to move through to the Area Competition, the Std 8 & 9 winners, were both National finalists, and the Bryanston entrants acquitted themselves exceptionally well.

Sarah Lincoln eventually came second in the Transvaal finals, and was thus promoted to the National finals in East London on 27 - 29 September, where she was placed second (by one point!) But the standard of all six of the Bryanston entrants' research and public speaking skills seem to point to even greater success in the years to come. Well done to all the 1991 Young Historians, and good luck for future competitions.




