It truly did rain on the UL parade last Wednesday, as hundreds of UL students protested at the main entrances of the University, seeking recognition and equality of treatment for students. Limerick weather did itself proud it attempting to dampen the spirits of those gathered at the East Gate, but to no avail. The various highs and lows experienced by the protesters that morning has restored the faith of many in the student body of U.L. No longer was this particular band going to be pushed aside, as the University pandered to investors, visitors, business and just about anyone else on campus who could prove they weren't a student. Instead, many of the students of this institution choose to stand up and be counted, to have their voic-

es heard, to finally ask that we, the people upon whom the existence of all these lovely fountains and trees and buildings exist, finally get the respect we deserve.

It was a heartening experience to see people show up at the East Gate at 6.55 in the morning. The layers of clothes worn by those present wouldn't look out of place in the Artic. They came well pre-

pared, even with a flask of coffee (with something extra for the cold, thank you very much Ms. Troy) and later the S.U. provided some tasty sandwiches. That is, they were tasty if your taste buds had not been frozen off after three hours in the cold. As soon as the early birds arrived at the East Gate the protest showed its effectiveness. Several

STUDENT PROTEST: JUST ABOUT CAR PARKING?...WAS THIS THE OPINION ON CAMPUS?

You would have to have been asleep on campus for the past fortnight to be oblivious to the protest. If you missed the signs practically wallpapering the university walls, the e-mails', 'An Focal articles' and leaflets should have brought you up to date. If all this is news to you, you've obviously been spending more time at home eating super noodles and watching Jerry Springer than attending college.

As if the posters, leaflets, e-mails, and articles in the last 'An Focal' weren't

enough, the hardworking student unions representatives went even further and campaigned door to door on the two nights preceding the protest to personally inform each house in all the student estates of the protest.

Seven am of the 14th of November dawned, cold, dark and wet. Despite these atrocious conditions a crowd of about 300 protestors disentangled themselves from the warm cocoon of their beds, not to mention away from teddy, and ventured out into the cold to protest for a range of students

Education Tirade

During the last graduation ceremony, I listened to Dr. Rodger Downer's speech to the graduating students and their families on the value of a University of Limerick degree. He said he would make no apology for how difficult it is to attain a qualification from this university, for it is this that makes a UL parchment so valuable. In stating this he was acknowledging to the graduating students how difficult it was for them to reach this accolade. He was recognising their achievement and telling them to be proud.

We here in the Students' Union would echo his sentiments. Three out of four of the sabbatical officers have completed their four-year degree courses here, (I've still got a year to go), so we are personally aware of just how difficult earning that parchment really is. Let me first state, that for the purpose of this article, the difficulty I am referring to (and which I believe Dr. Downer referred to also) relates to the high academic standard required of students. Our system here is perhaps the toughest in the country and is

certainly in the top two or three.

However, what has not been addressed so far, is the realisation that there are many unnecessary extra barriers placed before students of this University on this already difficult path. For instance, a library that cannot meet the requirements of the students it caters for, student teacher ratios that most second level institutions would find unacceptable, students not getting the final result on their summer exam until week six of the following semester, a class that is so big the students are sitting in the aisles, vital support staff leaving key areas because they aren't being paid enough, to mention but a few. These are all symptoms of where the real difficulties in UL lie, namely resources!

At present the powers that be are more interested in constructing additional buildings, expanding the campus and developing new areas. All commendable in their own right, but secondary to the primary function of this university, i.e. education. There is absolutely no point in enlarging the physical size of this university unless structures already in existence, are consolidated. There are already rumblings of a system near collapse. To illustrate this point, I am reliably informed that unless there is a dramatic change in Student Services, there will be a serious problem in that department come the start of the next semester. Remember that the warnings were sounded here when the mud hits the fan come February!

At the ground level the people in these departments are putting phenomenal effort into keeping the boat afloat. For example the staff of Student Services put in long hours and work weekends at peak pressure times to meet deadlines, above and beyond what should be reasonably expected of them. The library has set up a Library Student User group to examine how it may best serve student's needs and make better use of its facilities. This extra effort should not be expected ands cannot be sustained, especially in light of the pay scale and dependence on contract only employees.

A complete turnaround in the

allocation of funding is necessary to remove the barriers that have been mentioned. The focus of the university fundraisers needs to be redirected towards providing adequate funds for these vital services and support areas. The government must be lobbied to increase the number of teachers in this institution; student teacher ratios of 40 to 1 are no longer acceptable. There are other universities where the more desirable ratio of 7 to 1 has been achieved.

The University of Limerick has a great student environment, in a lovely setting. But because of the University's relative youth and distance from resources enjoyed by other third level institutions, extra effort needs to be made to maintain the competitiveness of this university. Dublin colleges have all the resources associated with being in the capital city plus, most of the universities there, have had more time to build on their resources, the same being true for all the NUI colleges. Unless we want to be left behind, resources for education must be

issues including increased car park spaces, the medical centre, student services, lighting and security on campus among others.

Rain continued to fall as the protestors armed with umbrellas, placards, and loud-speakers upheld the protest. There was a buoyant mood in the air, the protesters cheering as they turned away cars and singing to take their minds off the cold.

Reactions to the protest were mixed among the staff of the University. Many lecturers were very compassionate to the students and even went so far as to cancel classes although this was not asked for by the Students Union. Despite the hassle of getting to work without a car one lecturer pointed out that although it was inconvienient to walk it was more inconvenient for the students to have to protest in the rain.

Admiration was held towards the protestors, one lecturer saying, "I under - stand why they're doing it, there should be car parking for everybody, it should be free for everybody and each new building should be planned with adequate car park spac - ing". Many lecturers were under the impression that the protest was solely about car park spacing, unaware of the other issues being addressed but nevertheless said the students had a 'fair case' and supported them. One lecturer rallied around the student cause when he said, "there comes a time when people have to be supported to stand up and be counted, so I

support them in their cause". As one staff member correctly pointed out, "The University wouldn't exist without students, they need to be supported"

Not all of the lecturers however were quite so encouraging and several were very annoyed at the picket. One said, "I can't see any point, I can't see what it's all about", he went on to say that a recent past student survey had been "very positive" and that students were wrong to be protest ing. But while past student surveys may well have been positive it does not alter the fact that the same problems prevail year after year and are as yet unsolved. The University Management declined to comment on the situation, as they were 'too busy'. It is important to remember with regard to the car park spaces that more spaces would not only benefit students but would aid staff also.

Thus while there were some lecturers totally unaware, or those angered by the protest, the majority supported the students. An unconfirmed staff strike on these issues is rumoured for the 27th November.

The 300 odd people on the picket made their voice well known and attracted media attention from 95FM, 'The Irish Times', and the RTE news among others, as well as causing massive disruption to traffic in Castletroy and throughout Limerick city. But why out of a college of more than 8000 students did only 300 join in the protest? Granted, to be awoken to the

sound of wind and rain howling at the window combined with darkness made leaving the house an unappealing idea. Alarm clocks failing to go off and hangovers could be attributed to others absence, the list goes on.

But what does it say about us as students that such a small percentage were bothered to stand up for student rights? A lot of people said they didn't know what the strike was about, one girl saying, "I've no idea what it's all about, all I know is that we were given leaflets yesterday evening leaving work, I know it's nothing to do with me". This was the attitude of numerous students I talked to, they felt too much emphasis was placed on car parking and because that didn't affect them directly they felt detached from the protest.

Despite the huge amount of effort the SU put into informing students of the reasons behind the strike countless were still unaware of why it was going on. Many people I talked to were supportive of their fellow students and admired their actions but week 8 essay deadlines and study pressures took priority, while others who had planned to join the picket found on the morning that they couldn't make it for various reasons. Some were dissuaded by the foul weather, while sleeping in deterred even more, projects, the flu, and unawareness all contributed, and then finally of course there were those who didn't care and just couldn't be bothered.

cars were turned away in the opening minutes of the protest, with that number increasing throughout the morning. Thankfully, the numbers protesting rose rapidly as the morning passed. It took a lot of effort to climb out of those warm havens of tranquillity and repose at such an early hour to march around in the rain, but those who did deserve to be commended. That includes those who commuted to UL to be here in time for the 7.00 start! Students came out because they believed in what they were protesting for.

It is, of course, a huge pity that the numbers weren't in there thousands, after all UL does have over 8,000 students. A petition was handed out to students walking in to college, the idea being that if you weren't going to protest physically, then a minute to sign your name wasn't going to take too much out of anyone. Many students did sign this and showed support for those out in the rain. But it is a surprise to see numbers of students walking past, refusing to sign or offer support. If this protest proves effective in attaining a positive response from the University for the needs of students, then it is all students who will benefit. Each and every registered student of the University will receive the same benefits, the same improvements and the same increase

in efficiency and quality. A minority was doing the hard work for the majority and yet many of the students couldn't be bothered to stop and sign their name. A similar occurrence took place at the rally at eleven. Although there was a sizable turnout, many more could have stopped for 5 minutes or come out of the library, simply to show support and appreciation for those people who got up and got active on your behalf. Hopefully, when all the students of the uni-

versity see the positive effect a united stand can have, there will be more support and a greater sense of community among the student body.

But don't think that this took from the spirit or the effectiveness of those manning the front at the East Gate. Anyone who passed by cannot deny that there was often a party atmosphere, with much singing, the odd train and even a Mexican wave ensuring the mood was always upbeat. As the crowd gathered and the placards were handed out a sense of camaraderie pervaded. This was especially evident when cars attempted to pass through, as unfortunately some did. Several protesters were carrying the bruises of their labour the following day, as cars drove through, slowly but deliberately. Due to the legalities concerning the nature of the protest, the students had to keep moving and could not deliberately block or restrict traffic. Several cars took advantage of this, worming their way through, with some drivers being very abu-


sive. This included staff, some more then others. Once rush hour hit, chaos ensued. Traffic was backed up from the Annacotty roundabout to Parkway, with delays throughout the city, all because students of the city's university were sick and tired of being treated as the second-class citizens of U.L. The Gardai at the East Gate

were friendly, but requested that 15 cars be allowed through every 5 minutes to lessen the traffic mayhem that had ensued on Limerick's roads. Although this was initially disagreed to, once traffic hell was caused, this minor concession didn't have a huge affect on the flow. Constant singing, shouting and general revelry kept the party going,

with requests on Limerick 95FM and Tipp FM (!!!!!!!!) for the protesters ensuring the message was getting out around the country. The protest calmed down at 10.30 as students blocked one lane into the college and allowed cars to travel on the other. This continued until eleven, when the remaining hard core protesters made their way through the University to the square outside the main

reception, led by the Piped Piper of Mayhem himself, for a rally with the other protesters. Those who attended were vocal in their wholehearted support for recognition and equality for all students, even those who didn't make any effort to assist.

The rally ended with a song, which wasn't unusual for anyone who had been within a half mile of the East Gate, they were hard. It truly did rain on the UL parade laot to hear (try as you might) and a feeling amongst those present of being extras in "Michael Collins". The majority of people were on a high and the sense of community and achievement was almost tangible. Finally, enough U.L. students had gotten up and made a stand. Finally enough people had cared. Finally the University would have to listen, not just to our student representatives but also to the student body as a whole. U.L. is no longer the safe haven of corporations and business it once was. Its true heirs, the students, have rightfully reclaimed it.



HOW MUCH DO THE UL STAFF LIKE THEIR JOBS?..... ENOUGH TO DRIVE THROUGH THEIR CUSTOMERS

On a day when so many students did so much to attempt and achieve some decent recognition from the university authorities there was a much sadder sight to be seen. I turned up to the protest at the east gates of the university at around half past eight and was very impressed and proud to see so many people in attendence, however not iong after this did I notice that there were some cars trying to barge their way through the protest.

Haiving joined in the circular march I was again shocked to find a number of drivers actually driving straight through the middle of the protest in a manner that could have left a number of students with an overnight stay in hospital. Two cases in particular stand out, though the number of actually dangerous incidents is far more. Firstly the Communications and Campaigns Officer, Mr Fergal Fennessy, was attempting to capture, upon camera, the registration plate of one of the said offenders when the driver accelerated towards him. Thankfully he was alert and managed to escape without any serious damage done to himself. though the driver of car 00-LK-1079 will want to hope that his insurance broker does not see the pictures in this issue.

The second case involves a four wheel drive off road vehicle. At around nine o'clock when the whole area of Castletroy was in the throes of traffic mayhem the said vehicle pulled right up to the protest. Upon

finding himself with no clear way through the blockade the driver began to rev his engine in the hope that he may scare away some of those standing before him. Discovering that this crowd were far more resilient than he had given them credit for he pulled up to the protest and used the bullbars on the front of the jeep to barge his way through the first part of the blockade. At this point it seems necessary to point out to any elected representatives that the stalling of policy to make this apparatus for vehicles illegal may need to be refreshed. After passing the intial movement of students to find himself, as they said in reservoir dogs, 'stuck in the middle' with us he continued to accelerate and actually dragged a student for some twenty yards beyond the protest before allowing them to escape.

Fellow offenders caught on camera include the following the owners of the following registration plates; 90-L-15, 97-L-1704, 00-LK-3061 (a navy blue BMW 520i at that). There are also the pictures of the bearded man looking increasingly irate and enraged at the whole trauma of having to answer to a crowd of angry protesters. What is really sad about the behaviour of the aforementioned people is their lack of respect for their fellow man. This is an independent nation founded on the basic tenets of democracy and as such allows it's citizens to express themselves when they are being trated unjustly and inappropriately. I would hope that all of those mentioned in



this article will be able to act in a similar manner the next time that the trucks drivers or the taxi men decide to mobilise their convoy and achieve a similar fate as theStudents of UL on Wednesday last. Heaven forbid if the staff of the University of Limerick ever feel the need for support from the student that form the life blood of this Institute ofEducation. They can be sure however that they will receive sufficient respect for their cause as the students of UL would never be immature enough to sulk over having to walk a few extra yards to the library and not to their offices to earn over £25,000 a year ,may I add.

On a final a word to the Building manager Brian Hand, the only reason that the University of Limerick has more parking spaces than any other college in Ireland is location. I hardly see it as likely that the Governing Authorities at Trinity College Dublin are going to rip out St. Stephens Green, and the same can be said of practically all of Universities within Ireland. Such a statement is like saying that Ireland lost fewer matches in the World Cup finals than Germany over the years, just because we weren't there.

Proposed £3m Construction Plan of New Student Village in Bloodsuckers dispute

Feeling a few pangs of peckishness they silently wait in anticipation of a light lunch. Sensing a few ripples in vicinity nearby, they slowly glide through the water in search of their innocent prev. Suddenly they come fin to fin and the lamprey strikes with lightening force. He wraps his long slithery body around the unsuspecting Tom Trout or Sal Salmon, and with ruthless stamina proceeds to suck as much blood from the poor victim as will quench his thirsty urges. Who or what could perform such a demonic act? The answer is the three species of lamprey that do so on daily basis only metres from the college in the River Shannon. Now there,s some food for thought the next time you tuck into fish,n,chips in the Stables!

How on earth, I hear you ask is this in any way related to the proposed construc-

tion plan of the college. The University hopes to develop a student village to accommodate over 500 undergraduates, postgraduates and faculty staff on the northern banks of the Shannon River. A link bridge and access road is to connect the village to the present campus and it is this feature of the project that is a primary source of complaint and objection. Following the University,s application for planning permission with both Limerick and Clare County Councils (the proposed project overlaps the county boundaries), objections were raised from a number of organizations and groups. The stretch of the River Shannon located alongside the campus is one of the most important salmon spawning grounds in the Shannon catchment area. It also had populations of three species of lamprey (jawless bloodsuckers), which are protected under a

EU directive and are actually considered to be of international ecological significance. Soon authorities will be demanding protective habitats for cannibals! Because of these circumstances Duchas and Taisce, (both state heritage bodies), the Shannon Regional Fisheries Board and the Shannon Mulclair and District Anglers Association all objected to the present design and location of the bridge.

Gordon Daly, Executive Planner with the Limerick Co.Co. told *An Focal* that the current status with regard to the application is that further information is requested and matters remain to be resolved,. He also stated that An Taisce and the Fisheries Board are prescribed bodies entitled to comment and Limerick Co. Co. must take on board their concerns in any decisions reached,. At present the Co. Co. has requested a

detailed report on the extent and location of salmon spawning in the vicinity of the application site, and, an assessment of the impact of construction of a bridge on this spawning. Interestingly, this must be carried out in conjunction with the Shannon Regional Fisheries Board, who has voiced a lot of concern over the project. The fishing folk of the Shannon Mulclair and District Anglers Association in a joint statement concluded that the construction phase would have a serious detrimental impact on the riverbed aquatic life and all resident fish species,.

So will this prevent a bridge being built over the Shannon? Mr. Brian Hand, Building and Estates Director at the University of Limerick informed *An Focal* that the University is in the process of compiling the additional information requested to submit

to the two planning authorities. The concerns of the Angling community and the Fisheries Board are being taken into account, but the fact the proposed bridge location is a primary Angling area is a difficulty,. The University undertook an extensive Environmental Impact Study with regard to the project and was aware of the protected species (Species IV: Bloodsuckers to be viewed at a river near you, coming soon!) and the spawning area. Mr. Hand said that discussions had taken place, but that moving the position of the bridge wasn't seen as good planning. It is believed that because the bridge's proposed location is in a shallow part of the river, it shouldn't interfere with spawning or cause a major threat to the protected lamprey. A survey of fish life will, however be carried out in the river and an expert has been engaged for this purpose. In his statement to An

Focal Mr. Hand said that any developments would be sensitive, and aim to address the various voices of concern. He is hopeful that a position can be reached that will satisfy all interested parties.

One thing remains certain though; the bloodsuckers will continue to roam among the reeds and pools of the riverbed, poised to pounce on their prey. Even their name Lamprey indicates their murderous intentions, hunting down prey with a cool calculated ness. OK, I know we all need to supply ourselves with food and hunting is inbred in the nature of all creatures and mammals, but theses guys seem to be taking the thing a little far! Well I guess if that bridge is constructed it will at least literally kill the time for voyeurs as they may then have the chance of actually viewing this excruciating experience!

Strike One to the Student's: The Aftermath of the Protest

We all tramped out to the main gates on a cold and frosty morning. We got wet and cold. We really annoyed an awful lot of people all over Limerick City, Castletroy and in the University itself, also receiving some very nasty and critical phonecalls at the SU. And for what, do the greater number of UL students ask? What happened next?

Well, one of the main results of the student protest on Wednesday the 16th of November last was that new dialogue has taken place between the ULSU sabbatical officers and representatives of the university management. This is progress. Issues that have previously been ignored are again being brought to the attention of the university at the highest level. The Students' Union representatives have met with the President of the University, Dr. Roger G.H. Downer, and a high-ranking member of the University executive in UL.

The resource problems facing Student Personnel Services, Student Services and the Medical Centre were highlighted during these discussions. The Students' Union pointed out that Student Personnel Services has lost two counsellors since the summer, mainly due to lack of funding. This is of grave concern to the Students' Union and the general student population, in light of the stressful conditions that exist in this institution. It was also highlighted that, in the opinion of the Students' Union, Student Services would be facing extreme difficulties at the start of Semester Two this year because of these resourcing problems. These problems have contributed in no small way to the high rate of staff turnover.

The recent protest has resulted in some movement on the car parking issue. The university management authorities have granted a few minor improvements, for example more covered bus shelters will be constructed, as well as covered bicycle shelters to offer an alternative to bringing cars on campus. However on the really large and contentious issues, there has been, as yet, no movement from the University management. According to Mr. Tom O'Donovan, Students' Union Education Officer, when speaking to this reporter, "The concessions that have been made, are not an awful lot. These few sops have been neither constructive, nor, in the spirit of cooperation, very helpful and seem to be an effort to divide the staff and student consensus". From Monday 27th of November, any

From Monday 27th of November, any car without a permit in a 'staff only' carpark will be clamped. A number of spaces, approximately 100, have been taken from staff only carparks to extend the spaces used by 'students and visitors' in University of Limerick. Therefore students in this college are effectively still deemed as having the same value to this campus as a visitor and with no extra rights or privileges. A fact that, quite frankly, is not likely to appease the 12,000 students enrolled at this college!

Mr. O'Donovan also said that, "despite the actions of management on this to date, the Students' Union has not yet exhausted all the avenues open to it". He went on to reiterate that, "while the car parking issue was the final spark to light the flame, it was for the Students' Union only the tip of an extremly large iceberg." He said, "resources and organisational structure are the main problems in this University at the moment.

UL is still caught up in its NIHE/Thomond mindset, even though it is now much more than that. It would appear that the focus of the the money people and the planners of the University's future is the further expansion and physical development of the campus, with little regard for consolidating what is already here".

Certain issues that were raised by the Students' Union with the University, for example Student - Teacher ratios, have been deemed beyond the realm of their control. According to the University, this problem actually lies with the Government whose responsibility it is to regulate the number of lecturers per student and also allocate funding for the provision of teaching staff. The average student: lecturer ratio at the University is 22 to 1. This in itself is the worst in Europe and in some departments far exceeds this level, with a ratio of as much as 40 to 1.

The fact that the University can afford to spend a six figure sum on erecting flagpoles outside the college gates but cannot afford to staff or adequately pay the staff already employed in these essential departments, is of serious concern to the Students' Union.

It is the seeming insignificance of students to the University of Limerick management that has students riled up enough that they see fit to protest at the gates of the college. Let us hope that similar action is not necessary again and that the university will work to accommodate the students in their quest to achieve an equitable agreement.

Public opinion in the twenty six counties of Ireland is very much misinformed and doesn't understand the conflict that has plagued this islandof late. That inescapable fact was in my own humble opinion encapsulated by Gerard Gill letter in your last issue.

He starts off "I decided to do some research into that controversial march", vet blatantly omits the truism that Roy Kells has openly supported the orangemen at Drumcree by instigating and directing disruption tactics. Whose single minded endeavour is to terrorize the nationalist community into capitulating to the wishes of theOrange Order, as a consequence of his "co-curricular activities" nationalists boycotted his clothes shops in Lisnaskea, Irvinestown and Enniskillen. Roy Kells's career in the UDR/RIR is also selectively missing as are the allegations made by the Catholic Church and the G.A.A in ermanagh of collusion between the loyalist paramilitaries and the regiment of which Mr Kells was a senoir member. The UDR/RIR in Fermanagh was also involved in the desicration of graves belonging to nationalists killed by the security forces. Homework is obviously not one of Gerard Gills strong points.

Sinn Fein is not the IRA, Sinn Fein longs for the day when the IRA no longer exists. Sinn Fein is an open political party with councillors, TDs, MPs, and MLAs it has the third largest voting strength on the island of Ireland. Sinn Fein has an elected national executive like all the major partys on the island and in tune with those partys has an annual conference. Sinn Fein was not involved in armed struggle and contests elections on the basis of policy documents. Individual Sinn Fein members reaction to IRA actions which inadvertantly lead to civilian casualities is one of shock, horror and anger. Sinn Feins' distinction from the IRA was probabley best highlighted last spring by David Trimble when he called for seperate statements fromboth organisations on the arms issue, surely if Sinn Fein and the IRA were one and the same only one statement would be suffice to satisfy Mr Trimble.

The IRA is an armed secretive organisation. It doesn't contest elections as an organisation, it was involved in armed struggle. The IRA is symptomatic of the conflict its raison d'etre comes from the British military presence in those six north easterly counties of Ireland and the refusal of the Brtish government to allow the people of Ireland to excercise their right to national self-determination. The IRA is now on ceasefire its fourth in the last thirty years, a figure which compares favourably to none called by the British Army. Whose presence in South Armagh was described by an Taoiseach Bertie Ahearn as intimadatory, inflammatory and unhelpful. The IRA shares the same ultimate objective as Sinn Fein i.e a solemn belief that the ownership of Ireland is vested exclusively with the people of Ireland and no one else.

Sinn Fein is no more part of the IRAthan Fianna Fail is, even though three of its ministers were alleged to have armed the aforementioned group in 1970 and scores of party memebers have been detained about IRA activity particularily in the border counties and in England. Nor is the SDLP the IRA despite the fact that many SDLP activists have continued to pay their IRAstipend whilst continuing to be a member of the party. The most notable of these was Tommy Murray an SDLP councillor in Tyrone during the eighties.

To read Mr Gills letter one would think that the IRA is the sole source of violence in Ireland. Loyalist violence actually predates IRA violence(Peter Ward murdered by the UVF 1966) as does British Army violence. The IRA emerged as a response to the onslaughts of both those armed groups on their community. According to Jack Lynch the Taoiseach in 1969 the responsibility for outbreak of violence which snowballed into thirty years of conflict lay with past and present Stormont administrations. "The present situation is the inevitable outcome of policies by succesive Stormont governments"

Mr Gills claim that in his eyes "some may say that Sinn Fein has contributed little to achieving reconciliation and integration in the north". Is once again like the bones of his letter ignorant of the facts and biased in the extreme. Sinn Fein sits on committees in district councils throughout the six counties and on committees in Stormont with partys that posess all ahades of diverse opinion in that statelet. It has been universally praised for its work in the peace process by such opponents of Irish republicanism as the former chairman of the UUP, the last four secretarys of state for Northern Ireland and by nearly every editor of the British Daily broadsheets. Sinn Fein has also participated and engineeered numerous cross community projects in the north.

Sinn Feins problem with the Orange Order is that they want to march in areas where the host community hasn't being consulted or consent from that community hasn't being requested. Republicans only object to marches taken this route when there are alternative less contentious routes available. For instance nationalists don't protest when the orange order marches down the catholic Ardoyne road because there is no alternative route. Republicans don't march in loyalists areas so why should the Orange Order be permitted to march through nationalist housing estates.

Mr Gill states that "people need information from both sides to form a true picture of the conflict". That is very true its high time a South African style truth and reconciliation was established to investigate open wounds such as collusion and the dissappeared. In sum, why Mr Gill do you seek to

inform yourself and comprehend the British viewpoint of the conflict, when quiet clearly you don't understand the Irish side of it?.

Draconian is the only word that can describe, with any degree of accuracy this country's legislation regarding those people who wish to enter Ireland and seek refugee status. The Oireachtas in its ultimate wisdom decided only a few years ago to adopt legislation in the form of a refugee act which gave imposing new powers to the minister and department of justice to 'handle' the refugee migration into Ireland. But it is only now in recent weeks that an aspect of the legislation has come into force which allows the Minister for Justice a type of censorship that amounts to discrimination of the worst kind towards our fellow man. Now the media are obliged to seek the permission of the Minister for Justice if they want to broadcast the individual story of a refugee who is seeking asylum in this country. How can we justify this utter tripe that our politicians have passed in our name? Not only is in contemptible and offensive, but it ranks of racism, of a kind that has not been seen in this country since the Penal Laws of the eighteenth century. Then Roman Catholics and Presbyterians or dissenters were discriminated against and not allowed political or religious free-

Ireland is now depriving people who may legitimately require asylum in our county of the right to openly present their case to the Irish people through the media. This can only lead to the continuation of perceptions, held by many Irish

people, surrounding the 'problem' (as they tend to believe) of refugees. As these perceptions go unchallenged, as refugees are not allowed to make their case in an open fashion through normal societal mediums, such as television, the growing hatred of racism will emerge and be augmented. Ireland has a massive racism problem. We might like to forget or hide it, but it is there. We have seen it this year when towns and villages refused access to refugees who could not be housed in Dublin due a shortage of spaces. Now our legislation abounds of it too. We easily forget that our family relatives were once refugees fleeing this country because of several political, economic and social reasons. We gained entry into countries and sometimes were discriminated against because they were Irish. How easily then we forget when we are in the position of authority and can dictate events that we are the oppressors. Is it that we don't have enough space in this country? Is it that we don't want to give away our vast accumulation of wealth and prosperity? Is it that we don't like the colour of their skin? Or is it a combination of these and more?

It is not true to say that we can travel and live in any part of the world. It is more difficult now than any other time in history for a person to travel to any place they wish and reside there. Our borders are closed. European Union citizenship is held so tightly that few gain it. American and

Australian citizenship are likewise coveted by people, so much that they await the results of lotteries to determine their suitability. And even when we have agreed to open our borders to people in distress, they remain, more often than not, closed. The United Nations charter and other ancillary agreements all seek to protect the people of the world who fall victim of famine, war, pestilence, disease and the many other ills that afflict this planet. Yes we send aid and yes we condone political actions which cause death. But do we try to help the actual people escape from their predicament, whose only wish is to survive and live. NO! We tell them that your application will be processed. That you cannot tell your story to the people of Ireland because it may somehow affect you or them. That more than likely your application will be turned down and that you will be sent back to your last port of call before arriving in Ireland. But am I being unfair, I wonder? Did not the minister say that he would more than likely allow any journalist, who applied to him, to use the story of individual refugees? Did not he say that he would be lenient if the law permits it? Maybe he did. But when the law itself is draconian, how can the minister be fair?

We as a nation have failed to show compassion and friendliness to the people that need it. We must hang our heads in shame that we have allowed the adoption of laws which are vile and degrading. We are every day turning into a racist people who fail to realise the Christian and democratic values that we profess to believe in. 





Continuing The Belltable Film Club 2000, Carlos Saura's *Tango* (1998, Argentina) concerns the production of the ultimate film about tango. Deadly serious filmmaker Mario, uncomfortably approaching middle age, struggles against the traditional rigidity of his aging collaborators to bring a new dimension to tango. Cue mucho shots of Mario brooding against beautiful stage backdrops, grappling with his muse. Enter his muse, a ridiculously beautiful tango dancer, auditioning for the film, who just happens to be, handily enough, the reluctant moll of the local Big Gangster who just happens to be, handily enough, paying for most of the film's production. She is brought to Mario's attention when Gangster No.1 asks him to "consider" her for a part in the film. Physical grappling with his muse ensues. And so the screenwriter puts the kettle on, sits down, feet up...his work is done.

Tango is beautifully shot and never fails to impress visually, despite its confinement to the film studio and rare glimpses of other interiors. The story moves forward episodically, broken up by some of the most incredibly erotic and tasteful (i.e. fully clothed) dancing committed to celluloid. However, enjoyment of the dancing diminishes as the lack of narrative drive persists and impatience takes hold. A key scene finds Mario engaged in some quality brooding, recounting the main points of his film's plot and coming to the conclusion that it's all one big cliché: "Inspiration, where are you?" a relevant question at this point. He looks for a fresh angle to an old tale, but Tango itself fails to find one.

As distraction from the plot, aside from the dancing, we are presented with The Message. Mario insists on adding an elaborate dance sequence depicting the dark period in Argentinean history in which thousands 'disappeared' through fascist purges.

Responding to opposition from his peers and financiers to this dramatic sequence (that it's too jarring for a musical), Mario utters something vaguely Orwellian about the victors of history rewriting the past and the responsibility of all of us to keep the past alive. The importance of this responsibility is reiterated and underlined in the closing moments of the film. In a wide mirror we see the reflection of a film set, previously home to a scene of turn-of-the-century drama, now empty and silent. A camera glides slowly down on a crane. It moves closer until it stops, staring at us in the mirror's reflection, implicating us, the people, in the responsibility for preserving the past.

Filmmakers of the past have delved into the use of point-of-view, implicating the viewer in the act on screen, based on psychoanalytic theories of vicarious participation in what we see. Hitchcock, although never explicitly declaring an interest in Freudian theory, explored his ideas of voyeurism with brilliant technique and imagination, particularly in *Rear Window*. Michael (The Red Shoes, A Matter Of Life and Death, The Life And Times Of Colonel Blimp, Black Narcissus) Powell's determination to explore voyeurism and viewer participation with the then shocking (and still creepy and perfectly nasty) Peeping Tom (1960), the story of a killer who films his crimes, effectively destroyed a sparkling career in his native Britain. Whatever Powell's extremes, he never stooped to use such a blunt device as in Saura's closing scene. And there, under the weight of its own heavy-handedness, Tango collapses, prompting "Is that it?" responses from the audience.

The Belltable Season improved considerably with the following week's presentations. Patrick Carey's 20 minute short *Reflections* (Ireland, 1978), with fitting music from Paddy Moloney and the Chieftains, offered the perfect antidote to a rough weekend. Described as a "National Geographic Special" by my lovely but misguided assistant, *Reflections* gazed across beautiful rural Irish scenes, catching patterns in the landscapes and waters. Even the reflections of *Reflections* on the Exit door were a joy.

And then on to the main event, Tomas Guitierrez Alea's *Guantanamara* (1995), and an introduction to certain drawbacks of the Belltable Arts Centre as a cinema. Every time (i.e. rarely enough) there's a heavy bass sound, the theatre rattles like an offroad Bus Eireann excursion. And wrap up very carefully because it's frickin' freezing in

there. But while the multiplexes continue to flick cinematic turds at us on a weekly basis, it's the only show in town.

Perhaps the greatest of film genres, the road movie has blessed us with likes of The Wizard Of Oz, Easy Rider, Vanishing Point, Roger Corman's Death Race 2000, Cheech & Chong's Up In Smoke, Van Sant's My Own Private Idaho, David Lynch's return to Oz in Wild At Heart and many other disparate classics. When the credits proclaim Guantanamara a Road Movie Production, hopes rise. Happily, it's a worthy addition to the genre. Spelling mistakes in the subtitles led me to imagine the involvement of a team of over-worked, uncaring, illiterate, bilingual idiots. But these mistakes flow with the good spirit of the film, a freewheeling, carefree and highly enjoy-

The story: housewife Georgina is tethered to her tosser husband, Adolpho, a selfimportant bureaucratic official in Cuba's communist government. When Georgina's aunt dies during a reunion with her long departed true love, a kindly old gentleman musician, Georgina, tosser husband and Kindly Old Gentleman Musician head across Cuba to bury her body in the country's only (and thus probably very large) cemetery. With hilarious results. Really. Georgina is herself reunited many times with a rugged old flame (with heart-warming results), and tosser Adolpho repeatedly falls foul of the bureaucracy he strives to enforce (with hilarious and socially critical results). Its insightful observations are carried off with a warmly humorous lightness of touch, a refreshing contrast to the weighty pretension that sank Tango. Nice one.

Sadly, the Belltable Film Club 2000 series concludes on December 3rd with *Three Seasons*, the first film to be shot in Vietnam since the war. However, the following night they are presenting a Christmas Fancy Dress Party, with a screening of Tim Burton's *The Nightmare Before Christmas* at 8pm.






The Nine Types of Lovers Daphne Rose Kingma Colourbooks: 1999



Carter entered the arena to a reassuring applause. Starting off with more upbeat and heavier sounds, Jon added a new spark to the already raging dance fire. Building up to






The CD is more than it would seem don't let the fact that it is to be given away free take the precedant it is a worthy CD and well worth the hike you may have to take to recieve it.

The new Charlie's Angels is less of an update than a translation for the year 2000. Its accompanying soundtrack attempts to bridge decades by selecting classic '70s

tracks (best appreciated now, in hindsight) mixed with a few fresh musical equivalents.

The featured single comes from the rocky diva team of Destinys Child. "Independent Woman Part 1" begins with a shout-out to the new bevy of Angels, then morphs into a shopping list, itemizing the goods they've recently bought for themselves. It's a holler of equality, directly equating wealth with independence: "All the honeys / Makin' money / Throw your hands up." It's sharp, catchy, and stylish -- even if it is a wee bit misguided in its feminist philosophy. This is Charlie's Angels, after all, not the National Organization of Women.

The album continues with offers of feathered-hair, glitter-ball ditties like Leo Sayer 's "You Make Me Feel Like Dancing" and "Brandy" by Looking Glass (with an awful a cappella intro courtesy of Tom Green). Angel-themed music abounds with "Heaven Must Be Missing an Angel" by Tavares and "Angel's Eye" from Aerosmith.

Apollo Four Forty, the band last heard butchering John Williams' Lost in Space theme, can now be found slaying the original Charlie's Angels theme. The remix sounds like cheesy mood music for the laser tag arena at the local mall.

There are lots of entertaining inclusions here, such as Sir Mix-A-Lot's "Baby Got Back," the Vapors' "Turning Japanese," and Deee-Lite 's "Groove Is in the Heart." One baffling addition, though, is Spandau Ballet's sappy ode to sentimentality, "True." It just doesn't belong in the company of this otherwise winning collection.



Outdoor Pursuits The Year So Far.....

Millenium Youth Initiative



'On reflection after my recent trip to the Himalayas in Nepal, I realise that the past three years have indeed encompassed a multitude of unforgettable experiences. It was a sheer privilege to have been selected back in 1998 from over 400 applicants to participate with seventeen other young people from North and South of Ireland, in a three year mountaineering programme called 'The Millennium Youth Initiative .It was a prestigious and high profile undertaking ran under the auspices of The Mountaineering Council of Ireland and we had as our mentors and instructors such leading climbers as Dawson Stelfox and Frank Nugent, members of the First Irish Everest Expedition in 1993.

Following several training weekends in Ireland our initial introduction to winter mountaineering came in 1998 with the Scottish highlands as our base for a week. Here on Ben Nevis and the Glencoe region we familiarised ourselves with the technicalities of items such as crampons and ice axes. Our next adventure saw us amidst the Swiss Alps for a fortnight in July for our first taste of alpine mountaineering. The rugged and spectacular setting of the Swiss Alps provided our first introduction to serious altitude with heights of over 4000m being accomplished (that's over four times the height of Carrountohil!)Features such as crevices, cornices and seracswere were now familiar yet surmountable obstacles. By now a U.L student holidays were dexterously utilised, and post exam relaxation necessitated a trip to the French Alps in January! With plenty of ice-climbing and rock-climbing being availed of, this action packed trip saw us flavour the thrills of other fantastic winter pursuits such as snowboarding, skiing and blading.

Unavoidably, a week of college was tearfully sacrificed last February for another winter trip to Scotland, with the cream of Irish and British mountaineering in the vicinity to advise on routes and conditions. Last July the French Alps once again played host

to Irish mountaineers seeking the challenges and thrills of alpine climbing. Here JohnHarrison, a fellow U.L student and I, got in some final preparation before our expedition as part of the MYI this September for five weeks to the Himalayas in Nepal.

The fact that when questioned about the trip I respond in a single breath using words such as spectacular, amazing, unbelievable, is but a mere indicator of how fantastic the trip really was. My head, still freshly laden with vibrant images and memories finds it difficult to accentuate specific moments, for the trip in its entirety was the most amazing experience thinkable. As we trekked, the ubiquitous presence of the sublime peaks of the Himalayas was aweinspiring. The cultural insight we received was enormous, from the inhabitants of desolate villages to the gregarious and highly talented team of thirty Nepalese who worked with us. Unforgettable was actually climbing peaks in the Himalayas, scaling heights of 6000m saw dreams being largely realised in the most uniquely superb environment in the world. Vivacious images such as watching the sunrise on Everest from the splendid position of Kala Pattar, a 5586m trekking peak and gazing at the worlds highest mountains such Nuptse, Lhotse, Cho Oyu, Pumori and Ama Dablam looming tall starkly contrasted with the ethnic experience of Kathmandu. The jovial interaction with our eclectic staff are also memories which still captivate my thoughts and will undoubtedly be perpetually engraved on my mind forever.

John and I would like to extend our sincerest appreciation to the U.L Sports Department and the Outdoor Pursuits Club for their generous support and encouragement.'

Diary of a first year climber

Oh, what a year it has been. Unfortunately, it has gone by all too quickly. Last October,



I wandered into the climbing wall to see what it was all about, and found myself going back night after night. Within a week or so, the lads in the Outdoor Pursuits Club asked me to be the 1st year Rep. Naturally, I accepted and was thrilled with my position within the club, and was determined to do a good job. Before joining the club I hadn't even walked up a hill much less climb a mountain, which it appeared was all the guys ever seemed to do. I had also been smoking like a chimney up to this point. This was all to change drastically, as I set off for my first day in the hills. Destination: Caher Mountain, in Kerry. Fortunately, I survived this trip (only just) and after that I was a regular attendant. It was the first of many trips and within the following months, a strong 1st year base was built up. There was also a great sense of comaradery among all of us. This could be clearly seen during our expedition to Wales, in January, during which we conquered Snowdon, not once, not twice, but three times - the last being on a stormy wet night. Trips like the traditional Christmas as trip to Doolin, and the Intervarsities in Belfast brought many funny stories, as well as many drunken climbers. (No smart comments Dodgy!) The Intervarsities was a great trip, as we surprised our opponents and ourselves, by winning the overall team award. It was one of the final club trips before the summer and a great way to wrap up our college year, but the activities didn't stop there. I am going to give you a glimpse of what my summer of outdoor pursuits was like.

I had secured a job with Wild Country Ltd. (a climbing equipment manufacturer) in England. The company was situated in the heart of rock-climbing in England - The Peak District. I started work in early June, working in reception. It didn't take them long to load me down with tonnes of filing!!! My co-workers were obsessed climbers; two of them are legends in their own time -Basher Atkinson and Richie Patterson. Even though I was very intimidated by them, I went climbing with them to some of the world's most famous crags. These included Ravens Tor, Stanage, Froggatt, The Coaches, Millstone, and of course Burbage - home of the first gritstone E10, erected by Neil Bentley. The Peak District can be divided into two distinct areas - the White Peak and the Dark Peak. This signifies the main stone or minerals in each area i.e. White Peak contains limestone, and Dark Peak contains gritstone. I found it strange climbing on gritstone for the first few times, having only ever climbed on limestone, but soon came to love it and all of its friction. If only there was a gritstone crag nearby.

France for 2 weeks. My destination was Ailefroide, in the French Alps for the MCI Alpine Meet. After spending the night in Charles de Gaulle airport, I met up with my friends and we caught the train down south. It was an overnight train, so we got a chance to get some shut-eye. There were 5 UL students at the Meet, consisting of myself, Dee McCarthy, Barry Watts, John Harrison and Miguel Nicolau. We all had varying levels of alpine experience. This was my first time in the Alps, so I decided to sign up for 2 courses -Introduction to Alpine Mountaineering, and Hut-to-Hut Walking. I found both courses extremely beneficial and I learned how to use crampons, rope-work for glacier walking, crevasse rescue, ice climbing and numerous other things. I was also involved in an epic while I was rock-climbing. My climbing partner and myself had to climb the last pitch of a 9-pitch route in the dark and then wait at the top for somebody to show us the way down. We had not expected that the route would take us so long and had brought no provisions with us. Luckily, some guys who had also been caught in the same situation a few days previously, came up and brought us down. I learned

a valuable lesson - that you shouldn't start a 9-pitch route at 1.00pm, having only done your first multipitch the day before and having only one person leading. In any case the trip for me was very successful, I was dead chuffed at summiting the Roche Meane, at a height of 3762m.

After my alpine trip, I returned to England to continue working for Wild Country. In the following weeks, I led my first trad climb and was progressing quickly until my climbing partner hurt his wrist. I then turned to bouldering, of which there is an abundance of, in the Peak District. It is also something that doesn't require a climbing partner. I left the Peak District with a promise that I would return as soon as possible.

My first year in the Outdoor Pursuits Club has been highly successful. I have progressed from never walking up a hill, to scaling the heights of the Alps. I have also made a fantastic lot of friends both within and outside UL. I would like to thank all the members for making my first year in the OPC so memorable, and here's to many more.


