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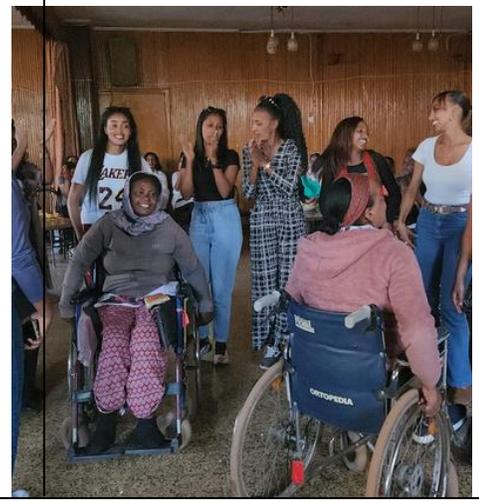

FROM MARATHONER TURNS TO SUPPORT DISABLED ERITREANS

Dr. Solomon, a dedicated, proud Eritrean American has always been supportive of and proud of his heritage. He has now embarked on a campaign to advocate on behalf of disabled Eritreans through HabenEri. He did this by running the Houston Marathon on January 11, 2026, with a single purpose highlighting and supporting HabenEri mission of raising funds for disabled Eritreans.

Dr. Solomon stated, "I am at the peak of my best health and physical fitness at age 67". He has competed in five full marathons and in IRONMAAN race (170.4 miles in less than 16 hours). He wants to use his blessings of physical fitness to motivate and inspire the rest of us to remain fit by committing ourselves to regular exercise. Most importantly Dr. Solomon is using his fitness to raise money on behalf of disabled people in the country of his

birth. He is challenging all of us to contribute to the campaign by donating any amount that our budget allows. Dr. Solomon has contacted his colleagues, staff, friends, and family to challenge them to sponsor his Houston Marathon runs. By doing so he is able to raise more than \$28,785 USD from his marathon campaign.

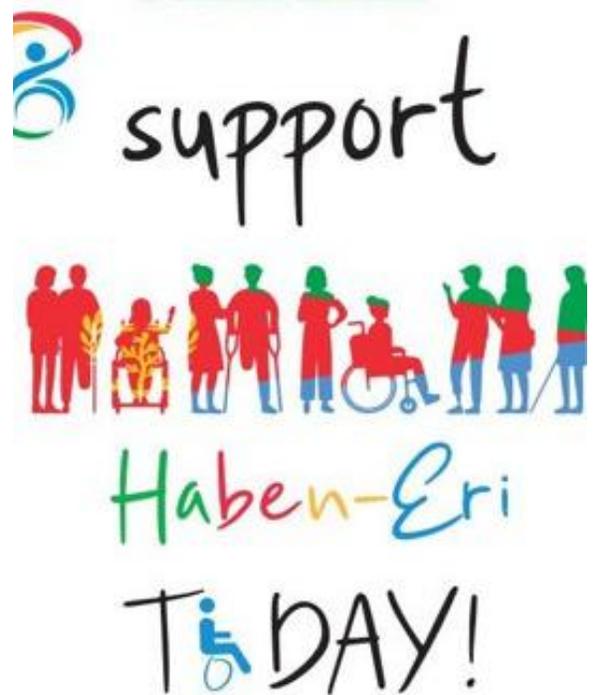

My name is Fitsum Baire from Atlanta I recently celebrated my birthday on Sep 12, 2025. The day was more than just my birthday—it became a day of purpose, reflection, and collective impact.

This year, instead of celebrating with gifts and parties alone, I decided to use my birthday to support a cause that is close to my heart: HabenEri, (North America Support Group Of Disabled Eritreans) an organization dedicated to helping disabled Eritreans in Eritrea live with dignity, independence, and hope.

Why HabenEri? HabenEri Inc. is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, officially authorized by the

National Association of Eritrean Disabled (NAEWDV) to raise funds in support of individuals with disabilities in Eritrea. Disabled Eritreans face daily challenges that many of us never see or experience.

HabenEri works to bridge that gap by providing support, resources, and advocacy for individuals who are too often overlooked. Their mission is rooted in compassion, inclusion, and community—values that deeply resonate with me. I realized that my birthday could be more than a personal milestone. It could be a platform to raise awareness and inspire action. I used Facebook to Spread the Message On my birthday, I shared a Facebook....

post explaining why HabenEri matters to me and how people could turn my celebration into an act of giving. Instead of asking for gifts, I made a simple request:

A Heart Of Service: Dr. Samuela Zerai's Journey at Denden Clinic Asmara, Eritrea

Q & A

1, What motivated you to volunteer at Denden Clinic, and what was your role during the four months you spent in Eritrea serving people with disabilities?

A: My background is as a critical care nurse in the private sector for over 15 years. I have since continued my career as a board-certified advanced Family Nurse practitioner working in the federal government. The experience and exposure I gained from working with a population of diverse medical problems gave me the experience, confidence and motivation to help disabled Eritreans in my native country of Eritrea. When I first visited the Denden clinic in Asmara, I was fortunate to have been introduced to the then Director of the National War Disabled Veterans Association, Gebrebrhan Eyassu

who has since passed on. I was also fortunate to meet the medical director of the association, Dr. Rezene Mebrahtu. I am grateful to both for introducing me to the Denden Clinic, its staff, the patients and for helping me navigate the system.

The Denden Clinic is located at the former Kagnew station, and this is where many of the seriously disabled veterans and their families live. The Clinic treats several war veterans with extensive disabilities including quadriplegia and paraplegia. There are also children with blindness, deafness and autism living within the community. I got involved in participating in the care of the disabled population at this location and in outlying rural areas as well.

2, Can you share one or two moments from your time at the clinic that were especially meaningful or satisfying for you, and why they left a lasting impression?

A: the hospital is really like a gathering of family members who share similar experiences, disability, and challenges. This group and their extended families laugh together tell jokes and share their experiences and try to enjoy life to their best ability. They consider themselves physically disabled but remain very motivated to fully remain active and live life. They don't seem to harbor any bad feelings or regrets and don't feel sorry for themselves. One event that stuck in my mind was at the time of the famous Eritrean cyclist, >>>>>

Biniam Girmay approaching the finishing line at the Tour de France where a large group of disabled veterans and their family's watching television erupted with cheers, screams of joy and dancing (lying in bed or on their wheelchairs). The disabled veterans live in groups. Each room has either two occupants or up to six in the larger rooms. Each room is equipped with TV with access to local, regional, and international news/activities. There is a strong camaraderie and sense of community within the group. To my surprise I did not find anybody on psychiatric medications, and I did not observe anybody with any signs of PTSD. This is a large part due to the fact that they are proud of the cause they fought for and take pride in having participated in the liberation of the country.

3,What were some of the main challenges you encountered while providing care to disabled patients at Denden Clinic, and how did you and the local team work through them?

A: there are many challenges that are facing the disabled people. There is lack of modern equipment to facilitate mobility. They need equipped ambulances and there is shortage of trained healthcare workers. The recreational areas also need rehabilitation and improved equipment. The need for material support is very long. As you can imagine, when you have paraplegia or some form of spinal cord injury, there always a need for three-way and straight Foley catheters. There is need for topical antibiotics, skin antiseptics, Daykin's solution, and other supplies for wound care related issues. There could benefit from activities from computer training, handcrafting, reading and language skills and other activities that can keep them busy that may even help them generate income. There's also need for visiting vascular surgeons, urologists and other healthcare providers including experienced nurses to provide bedside nurse and teaching.

4,What key lessons—professional or personal—did you take away from this experience that you believe will stay with you for life?

A:There is a need for material and financial support to improve the quality of life of the disabled. I came away very impressed by the positive attitude, lack of self-pity, the motivation to get better and to improve quality of life and their ability to get along with one another despite the challenges they face. They can benefit from any goodwill persons willing to help financially for purchasing essentials meds and supplies. There is also a need for teaching be it by physical therapists, nurses, doctors or any other healthcare provider. Anyone who is interested to engage either personally or to support the disabled people in Eritrea (indirectly or directly) can contact HabenEri either through its website (HabenEri.org) or by contacting one of its volunteers. HabenEri is a 501-C not-for-profit organization that is legally registered in the US. Its mission is to help support the various needs of the disabled veterans and civilians in Eritrea with special emphasis on health care.

Thank you, Dr. Samuela, for taking the time to share your experience and reflection. Your dedication, compassion, and service at Denden clinic continue to inspire our community.

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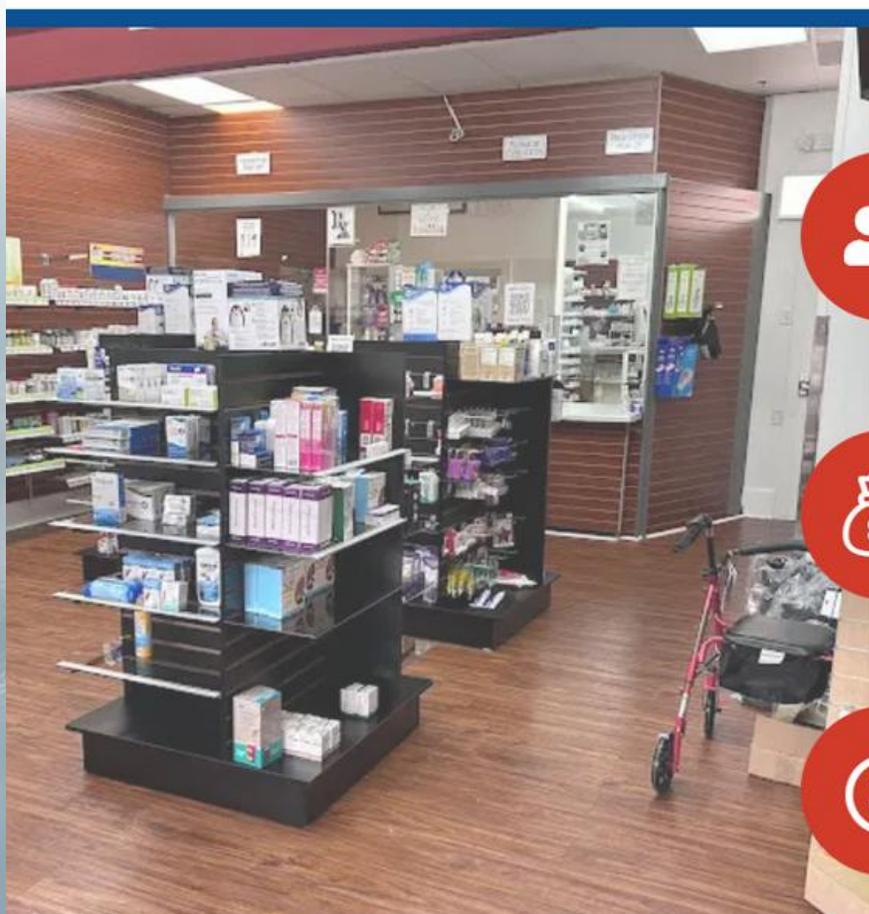
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
