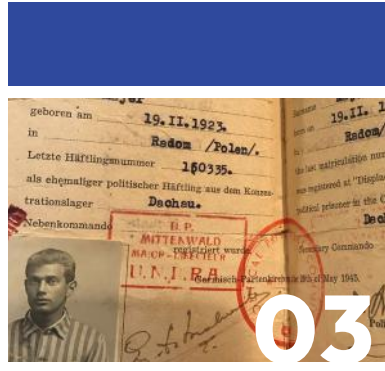

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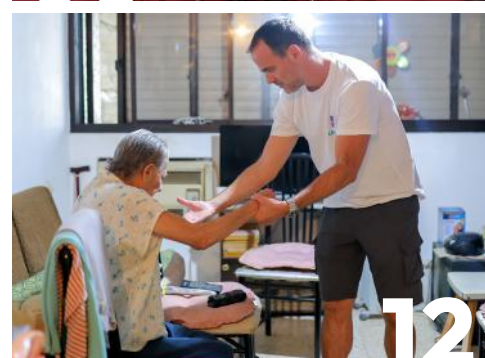
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tomorrow's LEADERS



B'nai Shalom Day School
Committed to the next generation of Jewish children in Greensboro, B'nai Shalom builds an inclusive environment that strengthens, engages, and inspires curiosity in students. **The success of the 2024 annual campaign allowed us to allocate \$245,000 to B'nai Shalom for 2024-25 distribution.**



Overnight Jewish Summer Camp
Jewish camp empowers children with a connection to their Jewish heritage. Ellen and Gary Fischer, and Phyllis and Steve Shavitz generously partner with the Federation to fund grants for families who require assistance with the cost of summer camp.

- **First-Year One Happy Camper Grant:** 1 recipient received \$875
- **Second-Year Shavitz Fund:** 1 recipient received a \$500 grant
- **Jewish Family Services** distributed \$25,000 in scholarships to 15 campers



PJ Library & PJ Our Way
PJ Library and PJ Our Way sends free, award-winning books that celebrate Jewish ideas, traditions, and culture to families with children from birth through 12 years old. Through the generosity of Mimi Levin and the Harold Grinspoon Foundation, the Greensboro Jewish Federation offers free PJ Library and PJ Our Way subscriptions to every child in our community.

- 122 children enrolled in PJ Library
- 19 children enrolled in PJ Our Way
- 200 families were engaged at events



The Greensboro Jewish Federation is helping ensure that the next generation stays committed to their Jewish values, culture, and traditions.



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Jewish Educational Opportunities

The Jewish Educational Loan Fund (JELF) grants interest-free loans to Jewish students from Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia for post-secondary study at accredited institutions. These loans can be used for study at a college or university, graduate school or professional/vocational school that leads to a degree or certificate.

This year, **8 students from Greensboro were awarded \$36,850 with an average loan of \$4,606.**



Jewish Experiences

We are committed to empowering young adults by equipping them with the skills to succeed, while maintaining a strong connection to their Jewish heritage.

Thanks to Federation subsidies, **14 local Jewish teens were able to take part in impactful programs such as BBYO Conventions, the L'Taken Social Justice Seminar, and JCC Maccabi Games.**

NC Hillel engages nearly **1,200 students** across eight campuses. Hillel's more than **450 events** brought together Jewish students from multiple campuses, fostering camaraderie and cultural celebration. The success of the 2024 campaign enabled us to allocate the following for 2024-25 distribution:

- \$43,000 to NC Hillel
- \$1,000 to Hillel International
- \$13,000 to Triad Hillels (Elon, WFU, and HPU)



Holocaust Education

The Greensboro Jewish Federation believes teaching and learning about the Holocaust inspires critical thinking, societal awareness, and personal growth.

The Mark W. Lancberg Holocaust Education Scholarship Fund provides opportunities for College, High School and Middle School educators based in North Carolina to increase their understanding of the Holocaust.

One teacher was awarded the scholarship in 2024, and was provided with the skills, knowledge and confidence necessary to teach the subject and its lessons effectively.

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JTriad

JTriad is a Jewish young adult group offering engaging social, *Tikkun Olam*, and educational events. Led by volunteers, they hosted **22 events with 391 attendees**.

Jews and Brews

The atmosphere buzzed with excitement as **45 community members** gathered for the annual Jews & Brews event.

Shalom Greensboro Magazine

Each issue reached more than **1,700 households** through direct mail, with **200 additional copies distributed locally**. The magazine also saw more than **3,600 online reads** and gained **69 new subscribers**.

Women's Joint Opening Tea

Nearly **140 women** gathered at Temple Emanuel for the **Women's Joint Opening Tea to honor volunteers**. The event featured Dr. Pamela Nadell, who spoke on the history of Jewish women in America. Volunteers of the year included Cheryl Greenberg, Valerie Greenstein, Alina Gerlovin Spaulding, Emily Kranz, Sara Jacobs, Michele Gordon, and Marlene Baruch.

Together, We Shine

The Federation partnered with Schiffman's Jewelers to host *Together, We Shine*, a gem of an event that raised **\$500** for the Jewish Family Services Van. The **58 guests** helped subsidize **1,168 rides** provided by the JFS van.

Cardozo Society

The Cardozo Society fosters connections among Jewish attorneys, judges, and law students in Greensboro through educational and leadership opportunities. This year, the society hosted **two events—*Religious Liberty and the Supreme Court* and *Extreme Punishment***—which drew over **50 attendees**.

Honoring Our History and Heroes

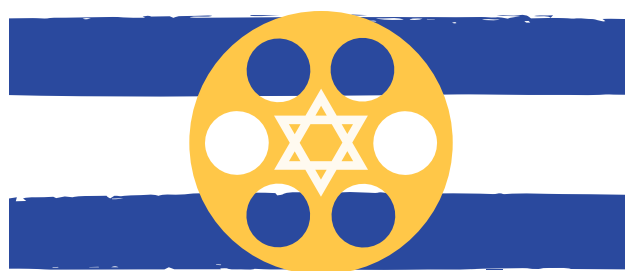
More than 300 people gathered at Temple Emanuel for **Yom HaShoah**, honoring the lives of Jewish Holocaust victims.

Triad Jewish Film Festival

The 2024 Triad Jewish Film Festival brought people together for laughs, tears, and immersion in Jewish culture. With four in-person films and four streaming films, the festival continued a successful hybrid format offering maximum choice for attendees.

In-person screenings took place at the luxurious Virginia Somerville Sutton Theater at Well-Spring.

JEWISH family services



Yom Tikkun Olam

Nearly 180 volunteers participated in hands-on work for a variety of local nonprofits for **Yom Tikkun Olam**, or *day of repairing the world*. Tikkun olam is a central value in the Jewish faith, emphasizing the obligation for acts of social responsibility and kindness.

This day of service (previously known as Mitzvah Day) has taken place annually since 1996. Organizers included Jewish Family Services, Beth David Synagogue, Temple Emanuel, and B'nai Shalom Day School.



David D. Frazier Food Pantry

This year, Jewish Family Services launched a Shuk at the Food Pantry, providing clients with access to household essentials beyond the weekly bags.

A new partnership with Second Harvest Food Bank digitized the Pantry, reducing paper waste and enabling demographic reporting. This collaboration also allows JFS to purchase food at lower rates and receive fresh produce for free. With a newly acquired glass refrigerator funded by community efforts, JFS can now offer dairy products, giving clients even more options for their families.

Women's Giving Circle

The Jewish Foundation of Greensboro launched the Women's Giving Circle this year, co-chaired by Caren Appel and Janis Fields. The Women's Giving Circle was created to educate and empower women as philanthropists, funders, and decision makers. Guided by Jewish values, it seeks to improve the lives of women and children in the Greensboro community and in Israel.

The Giving Circle has flourished, expanding to include more than 35 dedicated members. Annually, this remarkable group will distribute grants to nonprofit organizations in Greensboro, Israel, and to Jewish women in need worldwide.

Donor Reception

A reception was hosted by Linda and Tom Sloan at their home for Greensboro Jewish Foundation donors and affiliate representatives. **The event, sponsored by MV Financial, welcomed 86 donors from Greensboro and across North Carolina.**

The Lawrence M. Cohen Endowment Fund

Scholarships honor the memory of Lawrence M. Cohen, z"l, a beloved leader in the Greensboro Jewish community, who considered education, Israel and the welfare of the Jewish people his personal priorities. His generous gift endows the survival of Jewish heritage by supporting Jewish education.

SAFETY and SECURITY



Antisemitism Legislation

Representatives from the Greensboro Jewish Federation joined a coalition including Jewish Federation of Greater Charlotte, Jewish Federation of Greater Raleigh, Jewish For Good, Hadassah, and Voice4Israel to advocate for the **Shalom Act (HB 942)** at the North Carolina State Legislature in Raleigh.

The group met directly with **Governor Cooper** and Greensboro's local representatives to address the unique needs and safety concerns of our local Jewish community.

The new law, which passed in the Senate with a vote of 45-2 and in the House with a vote of 105-3, aims to combat the rise of antisemitism by officially adopting the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) Definition of antisemitism.

Adopting the IHRA definition ensures that antisemitism is clearly and comprehensively defined across North Carolina, thereby offering better protection and response to antisemitic acts.

Standing Together Against Hate

The Greensboro Jewish Federation worked to ensure Jewish voices were heard at a pivotal City Council meeting which addressed the far-reaching impact of the October 7 attack. Members of the Jewish community filled the chamber, expressing gratitude to the Council for considering their concerns and acting in alignment with the city's values.

The Council passed a ceremonial resolution that acknowledged the impacts of the October 7 attack on Israel, including on civilians in Israel, Gaza, and Greensboro, and emphasized the shared desire for peace and a community free from hate and harassment.



Secure Community Network

The **Secure Community Network (SCN)** serves as the central organization dedicated exclusively to the safety and security of the American Jewish community, working across 146 federations, as well as with other partners in the public, private, non-profit and academic sectors.

Through our partnership with the Jewish Federations of North America, SCN supports the Greensboro Jewish Federation by offering training, security assessments, crisis management, and critical news updates.

Because of an alarming rise of antisemitism, hate speech and hate crimes, a **coalition was created** with Winston-Salem, Raleigh, Durham and Chapel Hill to engage Secure Community Network to further strengthen our region's security.

In 2024, the Federation made significant strides with SCN to establish a **regional security advisor** for North Carolina, to be based here, in Greensboro.

These security efforts were generously supported by community partners Temple Emanuel, Beth David Synagogue, Chabad of Greensboro, and B'nai Shalom Day School. Thanks to the visionary leadership of former President Keith Rosen, the Federation established Guardians of Greensboro, a group of dedicated donors committed to prioritizing safety in our community.

Additionally, the Federation **secured a \$140,605 LiveSecure grant from JFNA** — a three-year, 1-to-1 matching grant involving Greensboro, Winston-Salem, Raleigh, Durham, and Chapel Hill — to protect against rising antisemitic threats and safeguard Jewish spaces, ensuring the safety and resilience of Jewish Greensboro.



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ISRAEL connections

Partnership2Gether

The Partnership2Gether (P2G) platform creates a living bridge between Greensboro, communities in the Southeastern U.S., Prague, and the Hadera-Eiron region of Israel. **This year, the Greensboro Jewish Federation has budgeted \$20,000 for 2024-25 distribution** for peer-to-peer programs, cultural exchanges, home hospitality, teen exchanges, and educational programming.

The **ShinShinim Young Ambassadors Program** through P2G offers Israeli high school graduates an opportunity to delay mandatory service in the Israel Defense Forces to volunteer in Jewish communities.

Thanks to a grant from the Zeff Family Foundation, and generous local donors, **Noa Balfour and Noga Bareket** were welcomed in Greensboro where they shared their love and knowledge of Israel with our community. **In nine months, two ShinShinim completed 12,000+ hours of student interaction, and hosted 20+ community events with 500+ attendees.**

In Late July 2023, the Greensboro Jewish Federation hosted a **delegation of seven Israeli teen leaders**. The teens came to Greensboro with their teachers to learn about our Jewish community. An additional **seven local teens joined the group as Federation ambassadors**.

In April 2024, one Greensboro community member was among 24 participants who joined the **P2G Volunteer Mission to Israel**. Volunteers dedicated their time to agricultural, educational, and community service projects, with most efforts focused in the Hadera-Eiron region.

Israel Experience Grants

Israel experiences are one of the best ways to strengthen Jewish identity. Financial support is available to applicants with a desire to increase their faith and overall connection to the global Jewish community.

This year, a grant from the Greensboro Jewish Federation was awarded to one young adult, and one recipient received a scholarship from the Jacke W. and Lottie K. Samet Israel Scholarship Fund.

Together, we are strong, and together, we continue to **do good that goes everywhere**.

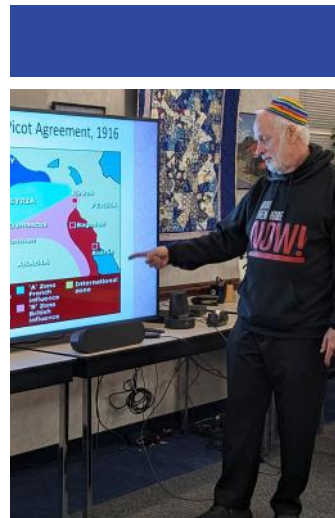

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Solidarity with Israel

The horrific attacks on civilians that took place on October 7 were unprecedented in Israel's history. It was crucial that our community come together in solidarity to support Israel, as well as each other.

At the **Greensboro Solidarity with Israel Service** at Temple Emanuel, we heard from Rabbis from our community as well as communal leadership, and came together as a Greensboro Jewish community for reflection and prayer.

March For Israel

In the face of the October 7 attack on Israel and the rise in antisemitism, the Greensboro Jewish community came together to show the world that we are a force for good.

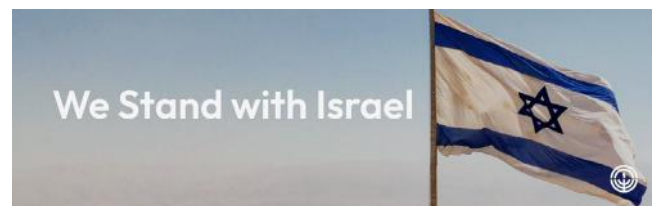
Two busses with 98 community members traveled to Washington, D.C. to participate in a pro-Israel rally that took a stand against hate and demanded the release of the hostages. This rally proved to be the largest pro-Israel gathering in history.

Israel 101

In challenging times, education is essential for keeping the Jewish community strong. As misinformation and antisemitism spread following the events of October 7, **Rabbi Eli Sneiderman**, the Federation's Director of Community Relations, along with **Rabbi Andy Koren** of Temple Emanuel and **Rabbi Grace Gleason** of Beth David Synagogue, launched Israel 101, a five-week class series. The purpose of Israel 101 was clear — to combat harmful myths with knowledge. Attendees left each session equipped with historical facts, prepared to counter misinformation in the media and strengthen their understanding of Israel's story.

Solidarity Mission to Israel

Sixteen representatives from the Greensboro Jewish community traveled to Israel in late January for a **four-day Solidarity Mission to Israel**. The delegation dedicated their time to understanding the impact of the October 7 tragedy through the artworks of Hostages Square and family stories. They witnessed the work of Brothers and Sisters for Israel, JFNA, and United Hatzalah. They also spent time volunteering at Leket Israel, visiting the Gaza envelope, and finding hope at schools like Hand in Hand and in the Hadera-Eiron region. The mission deepened their sense of unity and commitment, embodying the spirit of Am Yisrael Chai.



Israel Emergency Fund

The Greensboro Jewish Federation led a community-wide Israel Emergency Fund campaign to support victims, rebuild damaged infrastructure, and address the immense levels of trauma caused by the horrific attacks on October 7.

A dedicated group of volunteers made up of Randall Kaplan, Larry Appel, Matt Slaine, Alina Gerlovin Spaulding, and John Cohen ensured that our community surpassed our goal of \$1,134,000.

As of September 30, 2024, 444 Greensboro donors have contributed \$1,226,174 to the Israel Emergency Fund.

Federation Secures \$100,000 Grant

The Greensboro Jewish Federation received a **\$100,000 grant from The Leon Levine Foundation** to establish an emergency relief fund to support our local Jewish communal organizations' responses to Hamas's attack on Israel on October 7, 2023.

In 2023-2024, the Federation distributed a total of \$69,918.99 to Beth David Synagogue, B'nai Shalom Day School, Greensboro Jewish Federation, Jewish Family Services, NC Hillel, and Temple Emanuel. The funds enabled Jewish our communal agencies to recoup some of the costs associated with supporting displaced Israeli families, counseling, mental health and trauma response services, increased security costs, community-wide programming, and advocacy efforts to combat antisemitism and anti-Israel activity. The remaining funds will be distributed during FY2025.



A commitment to Jewish values has driven us to act with compassion and purpose in the face of adversity.

GLOBAL reach



American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee

The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee (JDC) puts Jewish values into action when the world needs it most. The JDC is the leading global Jewish humanitarian organization, providing programs benefiting more than a million Jews in 69 countries.

Thanks to a successful 2024 Annual Campaign, the JDC will continue its essential work of aiding vulnerable Jews with next year's Federation allocation of \$98,000 in core support. An additional \$19,000 is specifically designated for Beltsy, Moldova.

National Young Leadership Cabinet's focus is to provide tools for participants to better themselves and their capacity as leaders through continued learning, reflection, and action.



Global Emergency Fund

Year after year, our annual campaign ensures core funding to overseas partners who quickly respond when crises arise. Thanks to this readiness, they are able to assess needs and implement immediate, effective actions.

However, when unforeseen emergencies occur, the needs grow beyond what our core foundation can support, requiring us to do more. **This year, donations to the Greensboro Jewish Federation's Global Emergency Fund allowed us to distribute funds to Ukraine, Hawaii, and Morocco.**

- \$1,632 to support those affected by the war in Ukraine
- \$3,607 for wildfire disaster relief on Maui Island
- \$1,159 to assist earthquake survivors in Morocco

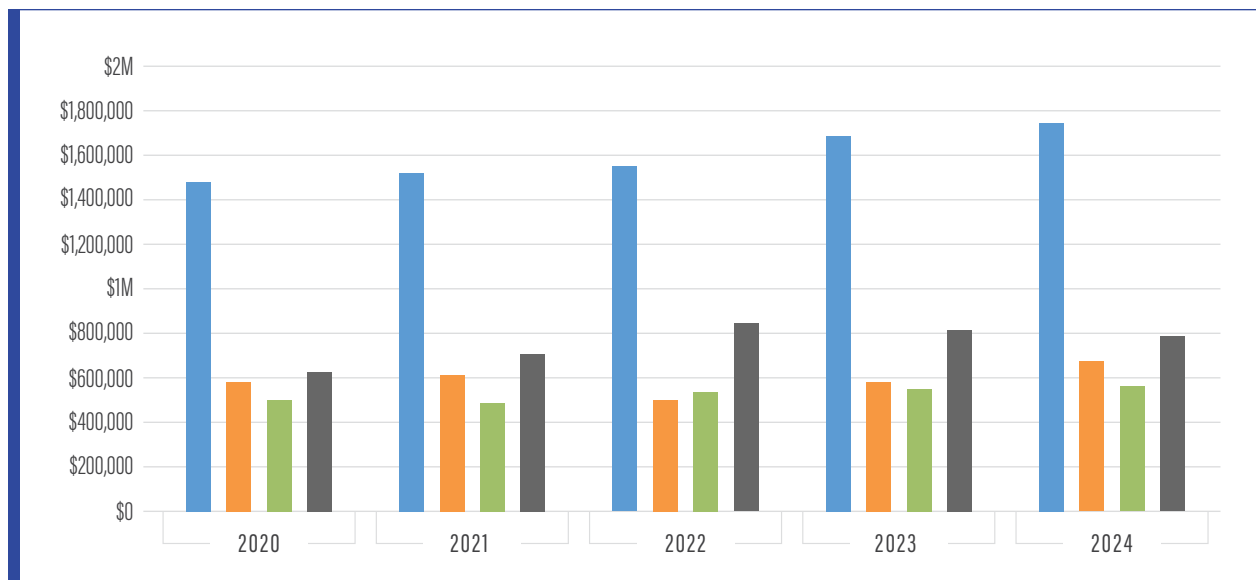

FINANCIAL overview

Tracking our Impact: a five-year look at key allocation areas

Over the past five years, funding has shown a clear trend across several key areas: domestic and overseas allocations, support for Jewish Family Services, and Federation's programs and services. These essential giving opportunities are all funded by the previous year's annual campaign dollars.

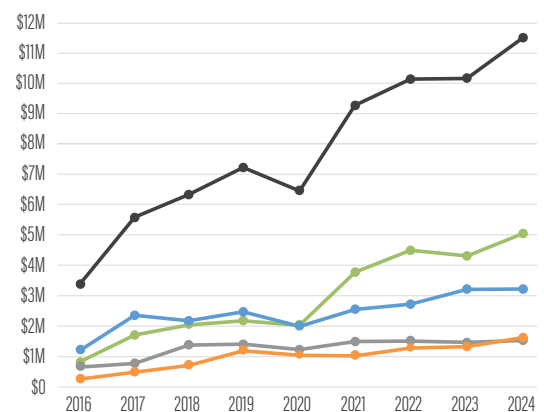
