Women's College Community

Semester 2 at The Women's College

The second semester at Women's College has been marked by growth, resilience, and achievement. Students have continued to embrace new challenges, build stronger connections, and demonstrate remarkable determination in both academic and extra-curricular pursuits. From vibrant on-campus activities to focused study, this semester reflects the students' ongoing commitment to excellence and community spirit.

Student Academics

At the start of the semester, students participated in early planning and goal-setting sessions with Emma Campbell (Dean of Students) and Gayle Harris (Dean of Student Life). These sessions helped residents build on the study habits developed earlier in the year. Many reconnected with Academic Mentors, while others took full advantage of the tutorial program to deepen their understanding and confidence. This proactive approach set students up for success and continues to strengthen a culture of academic excellence at the College.

Student Leadership

Our incredible Student Leadership Team – 14 elected Student Club Executive members and 16 appointed Residential Assistants – returned ahead of Semester 2 to continue their leadership development. Focus groups, facilitated by the Student Services team, were designed to build collaboration and refine leadership skills. With a renewed sense of purpose, the team planned a vibrant lineup of welcome-back events and creative activities, ensuring every Wooza felt connected and excited for the term ahead.

The first week back for QUT students saw the launch of Early Bird Week, designed to re-engage students through social activities before UQ residents returned. Once the College was full again, Re-O Week brought everyone together through a series of fun, community-building events, highlighted by the Semester 2 Commencement Formal Dinner.

Ready to Lead

The Ready to Lead program continued to empower students with a series of practical workshops, including sessions on team building, leadership, crafting standout resumes, and mastering interviews. A highlight was the presentation evening for students aspiring to 2026 leadership positions, where current leaders shared insights from their experience.

More than 50 students applied for leadership positions in 2026 – an outstanding show of enthusiasm. Following a two-week interview process, the Student Club AGM on Sunday 12 October saw the election of the new Executive, showcasing the professionalism and efficiency of our current leaders. United in their vision, the 2025 SLT have been exceptional role models for the incoming 2026 team, who will soon engage in comprehensive handover and training before the semester ends.

Student Life



This year, the Student Club Executive Auction raised over \$11,000 for The Lodge Youth Support Service, while helping to organise Mary Wooza's Giving Games for The Women's College & Student Club Scholarship. Altogether, students raised more than \$43,000 for various causes, reflecting the College's enduring motto: We take that we may share.

Celebrate our Special Award Winners

Three special awards were presented at the event, and we congratulate the students who won the following awards.

Outstanding Commitment: Ready to Lead Program Award

For the first time in its history, this award was presented to two winners, **Ekheera Birk and Ariella Paliza**. The Ready to Lead Program provides students with the opportunity to engage in workshops and seminars that will prepare them for work and life beyond College. This award acknowledges a student who has been fully involved in the program and who has attended the majority of the workshops throughout the academic year. This award was introduced in 2022.

Associate Award

Presented to **Kirby Auchter**, this award recognises the contribution of a committed First-Year Associate who has been an outstanding member of the Women's College community. The Associate Award was presented for the first time in 2022 and was an initiative of Zoe Garraway (2021 Associate Officer Resident Assistant) and Anna Kneipp (2022 Associate Officer Resident Assistants). The Resident Assistants Team is responsible for nominations for this award.

Women's Wooza Award

The 2025 Women's Wooza Award was presented to **Orla Crowley**. The 2020 Student Club Executive created the Women's Wooza Award to acknowledge a student who embodies the College's core values of Community, Diversity, Empowerment, Excellence, Integrity and Respect. Each year, this award is presented to a student who is a generous contributor to College life. The Women's Wooza is the consummate all-rounder.

To determine The Women's Wooza Award recipient, the 28 members of the Student Leadership Team each nominate a person who they deem deserving of this prestigious award. From this list, the nominees with the most number of votes are shortlisted to five students. The entire student body then votes from this shortlist to determine the recipient of the Women's Wooza Award.



Operations Update

2025 has been a year of growth and progress across the College, with each operational team contributing to projects that have enhanced the student experience and strengthened our campus community. From facility upgrades to service improvements, these initiatives reflect our continued commitment to providing a safe, welcoming, and well-supported environment for everyone who lives, studies, and works at the College. As we look ahead to 2026, we're excited to continue this momentum with new projects that will further enrich daily life on campus.

A year of progress

This year, we focused on making our campus an even better place to live and learn. From refreshed spaces to practical upgrades, these improvements were designed to make daily life more comfortable and enjoyable for everyone. Key projects completed in 2025 included:

- An update to furniture in all common rooms.
- Installation of a new door lock access system and a modern CCTV network to enhance security in rooms and common areas.
- Renovation of all 17 bathrooms in Piddington Wing.
- Installation of solar panels as part of the College's sustainability initiatives.
- Construction of the new Wellbeing Precinct.
- An upgrade to the Reception/Foyer bathrooms.

The Joan & Denise Robinson Wellbeing Precinct has quickly become a space for students and the community to come together for wellbeing activities, social events, studying and more. Construction of this area took four months to complete.

- Enhancement of the the mains power connection.
- Replacement of the two projectors in the Chislehurst Room.
- Replacement of the Centenary building's hot water system.
- Installation of ducted air conditioning in all rooms and the common room on the top floor of Third Wing.

Looking ahead to 2026

Plans for 2026 include a range of upgrades and initiatives that will build on this year's progress and further improve the resident experience.

Planned improvements for 2026 include:

- Replacing both wheelchair lifts.
- Installing air conditioning in additional buildings.
- Upgrading the fire alarm speaker system.
- · Refurbishing the bathrooms in Centenary Wing.
- Installing additional internal doors with electronic locks.
- Replacing key kitchen appliances.
- Transforming the Playhouse backstage area into a dedicated storage space for sporting equipment.
