Pastoral Letter from Pam Priestley

Dear All,

A story is told of a man under the care of a psychiatrist because he had convinced himself that he was really dead. It seemed that no amount of reasoning and persuasion could convince him otherwise. Eventually the psychiatrist came up with a plan. He spoke to the man at length, showed him books and charts and finally the man agreed that dead men don't bleed. The psychiatrist then punctured the man's arm with a needle and watched the blood flow out. 'Success' the psychiatrist thought! The man looked in amazement at his arm and said to him, 'So dead men do bleed after all'.

Evidence is one thing, faith and trust are another. How could a dead man be seen walking and talking by so many people, eat fish and cook breakfast on a beach? How could a huge stone be moved from the entrance of a cave whilst guards were on duty? How could those with broken hearts and lost hopes turn into dynamic, joyful messengers of hope? How could Jesus have been raised from the dead?

Some years ago, that was the question that provoked a certain lawyer, who thought he would put paid to this Christian 'poppycock' once and for all by writing a book to disprove the resurrection. A dead man raised. Not a chance! With his legal mind, he studied the gospel accounts. Slowly the evidence mounted and his conviction grew but a very different conviction to the one he expected He found overwhelmingly that the evidence pointed to the truth of Jesus' resurrection. However the real change for Frank Morrison came not simply to his analytical mind but to his heart. He experienced for himself the risen Lord Jesus.

'I KNOW that my Redeemer liveth', well known words from Handel's Messiah. May that truth enter all your hearts this Easter-tide.

Further our summary of the meeting with Electricity Northwest in the last edition please note that grant funds from Electricity Northwest are still available for projects that improve resilience (e.g. a generator for a village hall) or protect the welfare of vulnerable community members. This grant fund is being managed by Cumbria Community Foundation. You can find the information on eligibility and how to apply at https://www.cumbriafoundation.org/fund/enwl-storm-arwen-community-resilience-fund/ There have been several successful applications in the area.

Westmorland and Furness Council is consulting on its strategy for nature recovery. Having declared a climate emergency, Colton Parish Council will be responding with views, but we also urge individuals to compete the survey by 31st May so your personal views can be taken into account. Colton Parish was happy to support ENMO parish council in applying for a mandatory 20mph limit in Spark Bridge to make the road safer for everyone. We are also delighted to finally see full re-surfacing of the degraded area of road into Bouth. It has taken a lot of persistence but hopefully this repair will stand the test of time. Thanks to our lengthsman, Archie, for clearing and tidying the area in advance to help with these works and ensure drains were clearly visible and not subject to an accidental layer of tarmac. We keep a list of priority highways repair items. These are generally issues that affect road safety for all users including flooding risk. Our district councillor, Suzanne Pender, works very hard to support us on this issue. If you have a serious highways issue that you feel merits being on the priority list, please get in touch with the clerk.

It is election year for parish councils this year. Elections will take place on the 2nd of May. Your parish councillors are your key representatives for local issues in the area. To be effective and responsive, we need enough councillors to cover our three wards. Please consider if you can put yourself forward to be a councillor. Our clerk can provide you with all the information you need to apply, and it is not a difficult process. Current councillors will also be happy to chat, and their contact details can be found on the website. Being a councillor is an important service to the community and an opportunity to meet people you might not otherwise come across as well as learning about the parish and the broader community.

Egton with Newland, Mansriggs and Osmotherley Parish Council

The Council met on the 5th of March 2024. The minutes from the meeting can be viewed at www.enmoparishcouncil.org.uk.

The Council has now completed the purchase of six allotments adjacent to Spark Bridge Village Hall. This will allow us to continue to provide an amenity to the Parish whilst giving the area a protected legal status to ensure they cannot be built on or developed in the future. They will be known as the Nigel Lord Allotments following a bequest from the Nigel Lord estate. All are currently let out and ready for a productive growing season.

The Heritage Project has been gathering pace in the background driven by the efforts of Cllr Hind. A group of volunteer researchers has met to undergo training at Barrow's Archive Centre and to discuss objectives. The aim is to produce a vibrant local history using diverse sources which will stand alongside established historical

works to illustrate life in our community. This will eventually be posted on the Parish website in such a way that it can be added to and develop over time. This project is being funded from legacy monies intended to support community involvement.

As always, we have been maintaining our community assets. Greenodd bus shelter has been reglazed and painted inside and out with the help of a working party from Sedbergh School. We will shortly be adding a bike stand to make it easier for those who cycle in and then take the bus for onward travel. Quotes are also being sought for repairing and improving the bus shelter at Penny Bridge. Our Parish owned woodlands are inspected and reviewed on a regular basis with felling and replanting undertaken as necessary. Sherriff Well Woods is a good example of this, where large, dieback affected ash trees at risk of falling into the A590 were removed and replanted with smaller native trees.

The next Parish Council meeting will be at 7pm on Tuesday 7th May. The venue will be Greenodd Village Hall. Please come along if you have any community issues you would like to raise. From the Soulby's Ulverston Advertiser on December 12th 1854

Coniston & neighbourhood were visited with a heavy fall of rain which continued without ceasing and caused the rivers to overflow their banks and to flood the low ground in and about the village. In many parts the road was impassable for pedestrians. The Mines Beck came roaring down like a cateract (sic) & took away the middle pillars from the Forge Bridge and otherwise injured it. The Black Bull Inn was at one time in danger of being surrounded so that it would have been difficult for a stranger at least to make out the proper water course. But the worst remains to be told.

A little further down, at a place called the Low Bobbin Mill, (now called Low Beck) the flood actually swept away a dwelling, occupied by a miner named William Poole, with all the furniture belonging. At the time this happened Poole was busied in preventing the rain from injuring the bed and his wife was at her domestic employment when he heard a scream from the latter and instantly perceived an opening in the wall. They snatched the children up & made to the door. But scarcely had they crossed the threshold when the house was swept down the beck with all their clothing & furniture. Two tables, a box, a corner cupboard, bedsteads, clock etc were picked up on the opposite side of the lake, the same evening and the following morning; the three first articles nearly broken to pieces and the cupboard very much shaken, but no clothes has yet been found. The sand & other debris has covered a great quantity of land on each side, upwards of a foot thick, together with a wheat field belonging to Mr Wilson. Many houses which laid low were also inundated & the furniture swimming therein.

There was a similar flood in Coniston in 1898, the level of the water in Church Beck at the time is recorded on the upstream side of Church Bridge.

Another bad flood occurred in September 1890 when Church Beck & Yewdale Beck came out & met at Yewdale Bridge flooding the houses there, plus others in the village and damaging Forge Bridge.

There are Kendal Mountain Festival adventure film screenings for families on 13th April, 3-6.30pm at Lanty Slee's (Sticklebarn) as well as evening sessions with dinner for adults.

For more ways to get closer to nature there is a Spring Bird Challenge trail at Sizergh which goes along the Holeslack accessible route and a Springo sheet to tick off the sights and sounds you see and hear while exploring the grounds at Wray.

To see daffodils in their full glory take a stroll through Dora's Field in Rydal or stroll along Ullswater lakeshore as the daffodils that inspired Wordsworth's most famous poem come into bloom. Stagshaw Garden is a hidden gem, just a short walk from Ambleside, which bursts into life with colourful displays of daffies, bluebells, azaleas and rhododendrons.

South Lakes

My council tax seems very high this year, but my income has stayed the same. Everything else seems more expensive - how can I cope?

Contact the council if you are having problems paying your council tax. Firstly, there are discounts available to some people. If you're the only adult in your home, you'll get a 25% discount on your bill. Some adults, e.g. student nurses, are disregarded. If everyone who lives in the property is disregarded, there is a 50% discount.

Next, if you are on a low income or receive benefits, you might be able to get your council tax reduced. The council will ask you details about your income and your circumstances, so they can work out if you're entitled to a reduction. If you have other people living with you who are aged 18 or over, you might all be responsible for paying council tax. The council will make the calculations.

You may also be eligible for additional support if you're reached State Pension age.

Even if none of the reduction criteria apply to you, the council can still make a 'discretionary reduction'. They'll normally only do this if you can show that you're suffering severe hardship. If your immigration status doesn't let you claim public funds, you can still apply for a discretionary reduction, as this doesn't count as public funds.

Council tax is a priority bill because you can be taken to court if you get into arrears, so it's important to tell the council if you can't keep up payments. Contact South Lakes Citizens Advice for more help.

A THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH by Rev. David Gregg APRIL 23RD : ST. GEORGE'S DAY

An old Punch cartoon shows two archetypal Frenchmen, striped jerseys and berets and all, armed with large nets, with one of them having just bagged something over a bush. "What is it?" says the other one. "I don't know," says the captor. "Let's get some garlic and a frying pan, and find out!"

Every nation has prominent personal characteristics. For the French, it is gastronomic prowess; for the Germans, industry and efficiency; for the Dutch, liberal attitudes; for the Italians, passion; for the Scots, frugality; for the Welsh, corporate singing; for the Spanish, the indolence of mañana. So what about the English?

April 23rd is St. George's Day. Perhaps we can find a lead through our patron saint! Very little is known about him for certain. His name is derived from the Greek for "worker of the earth" (i.e. farmer) and he came from Cappadocia (now in

Turkey). He appears to have been a soldier in the Roman Army, put to a martyr's death in c.303 A.D. at the age of 28, for his refusal to renounce his Christian faith. Legends which have grown up about him, particularly the rescuing of the king's daughter from the dragon, have made him the patron saint of chivalry. As such he was adopted by the crusaders, together with his flag – the familiar red cross on a white background. Edward III established him as patron of his new Order of the Garter, hence St. George's Chapel at Windsor. His day (April 23rd) was made a festival of the highest rank in 1415, and the long succession of Hanoverian and later sovereigns bearing his name have firmly cemented him in English tradition.

Perhaps his reputation for dogged persistence, justice and fairness, and "stiff upper lip", could lead to the suggestion that one characteristic of the English that is widely observed by others is *politeness*, with the bowler-hatted English *"Gentleman"* as the proto-type (not forgetting the *"Gentlewoman"*.)

"Gentleness" is listed as one of the nine 'fruits' of the Holy Spirit – the spirit of Jesus Christ. (Galatians ch. 5 vv 15-24). It was used by Jesus of Himself. "Take My yoke upon you, and learn of Me; for I am gentle and humble in heart." (My earliest childhood prayer began "Gentle Jesus, meek and mild.") Gentleness appears in the "Sermon on the Mount" as "Blessed are the *meek*, for they will inherit the earth." (Matthew ch. 5 v. 5). It is humility without self-deprecation; reproof without arrogance; meekness without weakness, and judgement without bitterness. Perhaps those of us who aspire to *be* Polite English Christians should seek to make "gentleness" a lasting legacy of *this* St. George's Day.
