Opportunities For Entrepreneurship

It was a busy summer for Defy Ventures Southern California, as more than 220 Entrepreneurs-in-Training (EITs) pursued a journey of transformation and prepared for their culminating event – a shark-tank style business pitch competition and cap and gown graduation. On July 11, Defy Ventures Southern California held the first of six pitch competitions and graduations that took place for our EITs at our partner state correctional facilities throughout Southern California, thanks in part to the support from The Julia Burke Foundation. The July event took place at California State Prison, Los Angeles County, a maximum-security facility where 47 EITs made their business pitches to 29 volunteers. Many innovative ideas were pitched, and the volunteer judges had to work hard to select five of them as finalists.

The winning business pitches included a horse care business, a mobile laundry service, and a

greeting card company. The pitch competition represents the culmination of hundreds of hours of hard work spent studying course materials, completing written assignments and reflecting on life and career goals by participants. Having made their pitches and completed a final exam, our EITs walked in a graduation ceremony in front of assembled family members, volunteers, and other invited guests. For many of our EITs, the graduation ceremony was the first they had ever participated in and represented one of their greatest achievements.

A highlight of the ceremony was a spoken word performance that a Defy EIT prepared for the occasion to celebrate the graduation of his classmates and their entrepreneurial journeys. Gerald Jones, winner of the business pitch

Critical Thinking, Leadership, Advocacy

The Bay Area Urban Debate League (BAUDL) seeks to empower and encourage youth through the academically competitive sport of debate. Through partnerships with under-resourced high schools and middle schools, BAUDL works to provide critical thinking, leadership, and advocacy skills. BAUDL uses debate to engage students and set them on a path for success.

Thanks to the continued support of The Julia Burke Foundation, BAUDL hosted the tenth annual Julia Burke Debate Institute (JBDI), a one-week immersion into speech & debate over the summer. The program is provided free of charge for all low-income students, making up over ninety percent of our participants. Over one hundred students from thirty-nine different Bay Area schools came together to build confidence and leadership while learning to use their voices as powerful tools. Students participated in engaging workshops, games, and lectures before testing their skills in a debate tournament. This year's JBDI tournament was very competitive with an undefeated Varsity team and four undefeated Novice teams!

The JBDI summer program is one of the ways that BAUDL brings the excitement of debate to new students, and the generosity of The Julia Burke Foundation has ensured that the Julia Burke Debate Institute summer camp remains accessible to all Bay Area students. Big Debate For Small School

Through generous support from The Julia Burke Foundation, the Parker School debate team had an action-packed year and several exciting new opportunities. There are thirty-seven enthusiastic students on the Parker School debate team, and at this small, independent day school in Kamuela, on the Big Island of Hawaii, that accounts for roughly thirty percent of the upper school student body!

Given the isolated island location of the school, travel is the largest expense and challenge for this team. Many students do not have opportunities to practice competitive debate prior to entering the debate season. As with any activity, if one does not practice, one does not improve. This year, thanks to support from The Julia Burke Foundation, debaters traveled to California and competed in the Stanford Invitational Debate Tournament in early February 2018. This opportunity provided the students with the valuable experience of competing at the highest level, just before their qualifying meets. This year, the team competed for the first time at the National Student Congress Qualifying Tournament on O'ahu, and had the largest number of speech and debate students in school history qualify for the Hawai'i State Championship Tournament.

When asked what she gained from attending the Stanford Invitational Debate Tournament this year, sophomore Katie Carey said, "Competing at the Stanford Tournament gave me the opportunity to debate nationally-ranked competitors, which gave me confidence going in to the Iolani Tournament. Winning first place in JV Policy at the Iolani Tournament seemed doable and

winnable because I had done so well in speaking points, coming in 25th for the entire Stanford tournament. I was challenged by all of the differences I had to incorporate at the Stanford tournament and this lead to my success at the Iolani Tournament."

Foundation support also provided four top debaters with the exciting opportunity to hone their skills and gain invaluable experience by attending summer debate camps at Gonzaga University, The University of Utah, and Indiana University. Parker School's own Zoe Vann took first place in her debate camp tournament and also defeated the Utah State champ along the way, receiving a \$1,000 scholarship to the University of Utah.

Capacity Building In Panama

Hands for Global Health works to improve the health and welfare of indigenous peoples of Latin America primarily, to empower health professions and students from the United States to take leadership roles in global health research and practice in Latin America, and to engage in public health interventions that reach the unreachable.

For a third year, The Julia Burke Foundation has enhanced their support of a Hands for Global Health program to focus on building capacity and expansion of sustainable initiatives. The objective of capacity building is to develop individuals to function effectively and efficiently and in a sustainable manner to define objectives and priorities, build sustainable institutions and bring solutions to critical problems. Capacity building is a new focus for our global health programs. We have begun to implement a stepwise plan to identify motivated and talented high school students with the desire and drive to attend university to pursue professional careers that would improve the health and welfare of their communities. In June, we started a pilot program of intensive support and coaching for Panamanian high school students to work in a medical and construction brigade with Hands for Global Health in rural Panama. INTERFAITH CENTER FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Renewable Energy In Africa

This past year, The Interfaith Center for Sustainable Development (ICSD) launched The Faith-Inspired Renewable Energy Project in Africa. ICSD works with faith institutions in Africa and a renewable energy platform, Gigawatt Global, to deploy solar and wind fields on church lands in Africa.

Over 600 million people in sub-Saharan Africa lack access to electricity. For nighttime lighting, many of these people use kerosene lamps, which release harmful gases. To cook, women gather wood and dung and use indoor stoves. Such practices result in harmful indoor air pollution, which is a significant cause of sickness and death.

This reality presents a tremendous opportunity for effecting positive change in the lives of Africans. Renewable energy production can significantly reduce reliance on the most polluting fuels and gathered wood. This project brings electricity to Africans, reduces indoor air

pollution and deforestation, and helps mitigate climate change. It also connects to faith-based teachings about caring for creation through sustainable rural development, and helps enable current and future generations to live sustainably.

ICSD received support for this project from the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, the senior Anglican religious figure. ICSD is working with several Anglican bishops—in Mozambique, Malawi, and Swaziland—to site a project on land in their dioceses. Each Anglican bishop will assist in facilitating project approvals from relevant governmental authorities. ICSD has also approached senior Catholic religious figures at the Vatican about engaging Catholic dioceses in Africa on this project.

Dreams For The Future In Zambia

To sleep, perchance to dream...

And that is exactly what many students at the Terranova School in Zambia are able to do, thanks to help from The Julia Burke Foundation. The Terranova School now has a boarding program, with future plans to enroll a total of 200 students.

Zambia is a poor country that needs to educate its people in order to build a strong infrastructure. The problem is that Zambia does not have the funds for an educational system beyond the ninth grade. The government schools will often have as many as eighty students in a class. Very few schools in Zambia offer a quality education through grade twelve, and those that do are out of the price range of most people. Wealthy Zambians tend to send their children to boarding school in South Africa, creating a potential brain drain. But now Zambian students can attend Terranova School and board in the dorms. This means many students who make the several-hours walk EACH WAY to school and home now have the option to board there instead. It also means parents can

board their students at Terranova for a fraction of the cost of educating them in South Africa. Further, it means good students remain in Zambia and will most likely attend a Zambian University. Now Zambians remain in Zambia and Zambia grows stronger as a result. Boarding students can attend classes, are provided nourishing meals, and retire to their dorms. Thanks to The Julia Burke Foundation, at the end of the day, students from all over Zambia can, "Sleep, perchance to dream..." of a brighter future, with a wonderful education and many new and unprecedented opportunities. Putnam Competes At The Top

Just eight years ago, the United States Para-Equestrian Association (USPEA) was established as a resource for disabled riders in all eight disciplines recognized by the International Equestrian Federation. Those disciplines include dressage, combined driving, vaulting, show jumping, endurance riding, eventing, and reining. Establishing this association created a resource for equestrians and veterans with impairments. Through the association's support, disabled athletes have been given the opportunity to attend symposiums around the country, earn their qualifying scores for world games, and even send their horses across the U.S. for international competition. With support from The Julia Burke Foundation this year, individuals like para-driver Stefanie Putnam have been able to compete at the top of their sport and challenge themselves and their abilities.

At the age of 24, Stefanie woke up at a trauma hospital. She could feel nothing from the neck down. She assumed it was just a sting and that she would overcome it. The diagnosis was devastating. From her C7 vertebrae to her C4 vertebrae, her neck had, as Stefanie puts it, "exploded." Her C5 vertebrae had been twisted in a way that doctors believed should have severed her spinal cord. She was paralyzed from the chest down with no function or feeling. Putnam never gave up on herself or her abilities as an equestrian. In 2010, she contacted the USPEA and US Driving for the Disabled and began her journey. Putnam has now traveled the world as one of the top U.S. Para-drivers. Not only has Putnam achieved remarkable success as an equestrian but her name was selected by the Frazier Institute and Research Center as a key participant in the ground-breaking Spinal Cord Injury "Victory Over Paralysis" epidural stimulation implant research study. Putnam and her horse have moved from California to Louisville, Kentucky permanently, to be close to the institute. Putnam explained, "Where there was no hope, there now is hope. To be a part of such a gift to humanity is more than I could possibly ask for."

During this exciting year, Putnam had an opportunity to debut her extraordinary partnership with her horse, Shadow, in the highly competitive "able-bodied" combined driving environment on the East Coast. In three prestigious events (North Carolina, Michigan, and Kentucky) the pair made quite an impression—winning championship ribbons in every contest. Stefanie and Shadow have also been chosen to participate in the very selective United States Equestrian Developing Athlete Program for Combined Driving. The purpose of this program is to provide guidance and resources to cultivate selected athlete/horse combinations who display the potential to contribute to a medal-winning team score at Driving World Championships in the current and next quadrennial. Stefanie Putnam is excited for what the next year will hold, and thanks The Julia Burke Foundation for their support in this personal journey.
