Carnival 2023 and 2024

After a hugely successful Maccabiah Games in 2022, it left Maccabi Victoria at a disadvantage in its campaign to support Maccabi Australia's delivery of Carnival in January 2023. We encountered various challenges, including families experiencing their first uninterrupted summer since the COVID pandemic (taking the opportunity to go on vacation). Consequently, there was a decrease in the number of available participants and youth leaders. This had a nationwide impact, with a substantial reduction in numbers from other states.

Despite this, with the commitment of thousands of hours of work from the office, Carnival manager **Tali Friede**, a handful of dedicated youth leaders, and numerous parent volunteers, we successfully pulled it off and the Carnival brand lived up to its reputation of connecting children from around the country for a week of sport, fun, and friendship. Our sincere thanks to Bialik for their genuine help and support. Our ongoing cooperation to maximise the use of community facilities is a precedent for other community organisations.

Furthermore, thank you to Carnival Patron **Cr. Sam Parasol OAM** for his support and dedication to Maccabi.

CARNIVAL IS BACK AND IT'S GOING TO BE HUGE – Sydney 2024 2024 is shaping up to be the best Carnival in decades. With only a few months to go, there are record numbers of registrations – both from Victoria and nationally – and we are all preparing for an event to be remembered.



Maccabi Hardship Relief Fund

In these tough economic times, Maccabi Victoria, the Maccabi Foundation, and our major donors are extremely proud to be able to support our families in need. Our goal is to ensure that every Jewish athlete that wants to play sport amongst their peers will have the opportunity, and we can see a growing need in the community for this support. On a weekly basis, our committee receive requests and in 2023, Maccabi Victoria gave over \$17,478 of support to 58 families to participate in 6 Maccabi Victoria Clubs and Junior Carnival. This financial year to date we have provided \$3,317 in support to 15 families.

Giving Day:

Our planned annual giving day was on track to occur in late October until the atrocities in Israel unfolded. Whilst it is pivotal to this organisation, as we rely on the generosity of our community, there was an immediate move to reschedule it, and instead direct our loyal donors to supporting Kfar Maccabiah, which is housing displaced Israeli families.



Maccabi Aquatics:

Last year **Brian Swersky**, our outgoing President, spoke of the success of launching the Maccabi Aquatics initiative and of future profits to Maccabi Victoria. What a success it has been! We are proud to share that Maccabi Aquatics made a profit of \$288,948 in FY '23 and the Maccabi Foundation received a distribution of \$100,000. Operationally, our programs are growing and participation numbers across 'Learn to Swim' and squad levels have exceeded 860 individual swimmers. Added to this, we provided 6 schools (approx. 1800 students) with a range of curriculum programs during the year.

It is anticipated that this year numbers will continue to grow and the partnership between Maccabi and Bialik will remain strong.

Thank you to **Michelle Whytcross** (Head of Aquatics), **Barry Carp** (Chairman) and the Maccabi Aquatics Board, Bialik College, and to all the sponsors whose commitment to Maccabi Aquatics has also facilitated the rebirth of the Maccabi Ajax Swimming Club.

Maccabi One Property Committee:

The purpose of the Maccabi One Property Committee is to remain focused on finding homes for all Maccabi Victoria clubs and to focus on the future needs of our organisation. **Tim Bursztyn** leads the committee and over the past year, there have been ongoing discussions with Bialik College, Mount Scopus College, and the Caulfield Racecourse Trust.

- Bialik College Maccabi Victoria's relationship with Bialik is moving from strength to strength, and together they are discussing ways to expand on the Maccabi Aquatics venture and create new opportunities for other clubs. Discussions are underway around additional spaces in the Sports Centre which could potentially house other Maccabi clubs such as Table Tennis.
- Mount Scopus We remain committed and connected to the Mount Scopus opportunity in Caulfield, and the Committee and the Maccabi Foundation continue to remain in touch with the College Foundation.
- Caulfield Racecourse Trust This opportunity is fast developing, and we have been shortlisted to be involved in the redevelopment of the land. In recent times, we have been requested to submit our requirements and we believe further discussions are imminent.

The next decade looks promising, and our intention is to create long term future homes for our clubs to continue to thrive.

Archive Project:

Yvonne Fayman, Russell Jaffe, and a dedicated team of volunteers this year continued to work to archive Maccabi's history. At this point, the project is on hold due to the current facility being too small to cater for the volume of materials. Maccabi Victoria are seeking a larger pro bono space for the records to be stored and displayed.

Henry Jolson Pathways Program:

The school engagement aspect of this program continues to evolve under the guidance of **Martin Jona**. We now provide sporting programs and skills coaching to almost all the Jewish schools, including several orthodox schools.



In 2022-2023, over 490 hours of programs were run at 6 schools, introducing over 566 young people to Maccabi clubs and coaches in sports including AFL, athletics, basketball, cricket, futsal, golf, hockey, lawn bowls, netball, soccer and volleyball.

In September this year, Maccabi Victoria was awarded a government grant for \$58,000. This grant is going to allow the expansion of the Interfaith and Multicultural program, and in 2024, the plan is for Maccabi and Indigenous teams to compete in several other sports.

Due to the War in Israel, there are not currently any discussions occurring regarding the Jolson Houli Cup. Maccabi are committed to running interfaith and multicultural programs, and we hope there is a future where Muslim and Jews can stand together, hand in hand, to celebrate peace through sport in this country.

We thank the **Jolson Family** for their ongoing support and believe that the late **Henry Jolson QC OAM** would be very proud of the work being done.

All Abilities

Maccabi All Abilities has had a busy year with regular programming, competitive sports, and social opportunities. Programs of basketball, cricket and swimming continued with enthusiasm. A notable highlight was the formation of an All-Abilities Football team, which joined the FIDA league. Despite a slow start, the team improved and just narrowly missed the finals. The team celebrated each match with a BBQ and were supported by the Ajax club members, fostering a sense of inclusion and belonging.

Furthermore, It has been incredible to see inclusion become such a popular theme among many of our clubs, with Maccabi Aquatics and Maccabi FC Caulfield introducing All Abilities programs of their own. We would like to thank **Kate Lustig**, our All Abilities Program Officer, for her ongoing support and care in delivering this outstanding program to our community.

Centralised Services

We have long recognised the incredible burden on Club committees and volunteers in managing their clubs. As the clubs grow, the need for additional support is becoming essential. Maccabi has developed a centralised service model where the clubs can lean on the Mac Vic office for support across a variety of services.

These include, but are not limited to, registrations, enquiries, finance, coach admin, and more. In 2023, Maccabi Victoria subsidised over 1,900 hours for clubs, including basketball, soccer, and golf. In the coming months and years, this service will expand and continue to ease the burden on club volunteers.

Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to present the Treasurer's report for Maccabi Victoria ("Mac Vic") for the period **ending 30 June 2023**. As the Treasurer, it is my duty to provide a transparent overview of our financial activities and status.

The financial statements reflect an operating deficit of **\$57,724**. This is a **\$5,609** improvement compared to the prior year. The key operating financial activity for the year included; (i) after a 3 year relief period the affiliation fees from our clubs were reinstated; (ii) Maccabi Victoria increased the centralised services delivered to our clubs, a program which we intend to continue to grow in the future; (iii) funding was received from Maccabi Australia for the assistance provided for the large administrative role taken by Mac Vic in organising Junior Carnival; and (iv) the launching of the holiday program which continues to generate additional revenues.

Additionally, we are incredibly grateful for the funding and support received from the Maccabi Foundation.

Our financial health remains strong, with cash reserves of **\$52,091** in our accounts. This balance ensures that we have the necessary resources to maintain our programs.

The financials for the All Abilities, Henry Jolson Pathways and Women in Sport programs are included in the Maccabi Victoria Financial Statement. All programs are funded primarily through grants from the Maccabi Foundation, private donors and grants including those from the State Government of Victoria. We thank the generous supporters who donate to make these programs possible.

I've received outstanding support in my role as treasurer by a number of people including the Mac Vic office team, in particular **Ruth Clare** (Finance Manager) and **Shari Cohen** (General Manager). Additionally, I want to acknowledge the support of the Maccabi Foundation, especially treasurer **Michael Same** who has been a great mentor to me.

I would like to thank **Hilton Miller** and **Nicky Postan** of Postan, Miller and Associates for their services in relation to the audit of the financial statements.

Lastly, I want to express my gratitude to our donors, volunteers, and Board members for their unwavering support. It is through your dedication that we can continue making a positive impact in our sporting community.

The last 12 months were marked by the extraordinary value that our volunteers bring to Maccabi across Australia.

Due to the amazing resolve, resilience and determination of the hundreds of volunteers who make Maccabi Proud, Maccabi Australia has had a successful year, however one measures it. We could not be more grateful for their tireless efforts (under challenging circumstances) to get us moving again. In tandem with our dedicated staff, they have helped guide Maccabi sport and wellbeing through a challenging period and enabled the organisation to achieve so much this year.

Maccabi Australia, together with our member states and affiliated clubs, exists to promote Jewish identity and continuity – connecting our Jewish community through sport and wellbeing.

We are the largest Jewish grassroots organisation in Australia, with a history that spans 99 years, we have an unenviable reach into the community with over 34% of the Jewish population having had some involvement with the organisation over their lifetime.

We have evolved a clear and bold vision for sport, this includes active participation and wellbeing in the community and through our club structure as well as the Maccabi LIFE program, we provide more reasons and options for the broader community to engage in a healthy lifestyle.

We continue to be the organisation of first choice for the Australian Jewish Community for sport and wellbeing activities and our future will be created by:

- Using sport to promote social inclusion and cohesion.
- Promoting exercise and regular activity as a positive benefit to both physical and mental wellbeing.
- Creating and supporting programs that will inspire the next generation.
- Advocating and leading the way on relevant health and wellbeing matters.

This year has been instructional in so many ways. It has taught us how important sport and wellbeing is in our daily lives, especially in a post covid period. It has shown us the need to be nimble, responsive and cohesive in the face of an ever-changing and challenging landscape.

Most importantly, it has shown us the power of community, volunteerism, teamwork and respect - values that have guided us through a return to normality.

Sports Development - Since returning from the highly successful Maccabiah Games in July 2022, we have conducted an in-depth review of our operations and have already starting planning for the next Games to be held in 2025. Our senior leadership team has been appointed – Sam Gamsu and Giselle Berlinski will lead a team of around 160 to the Pan Am Games to be held in Argentina in December 2023 and then a contingent of around 500 to Maccabiah 2025.

At the Maccabi World Union Congress in May 2023 the new logo for Maccabiah 2025 was launched and with it, the announcement of new sports including beach tennis, catchball, mountain bike cycling, motocross, ninja and pickleball – all intended to grow participation and keep the Games fresh and relevant.

Over 300 registered for 2024 Junior Carnival

Our 42nd Junior carnival will be held in Sydney in January 2024 and at the time of writing this report over 300 kids have registered for what will be a fun-filled program, connecting Jewish youth from around the country.

Brand Development – During the year our brand presence and reach continued to grow through not only social channels but also as a result of direct communication with over 24,000 people on our database. The engagement has been instrumental in promoting all aspects of our vast array of programs which have resonated across a wide demographic. Over 1,600 pieces of communication were sent out and we proudly launched our Maccazine – a lifestyle publication which covers sport, wellbeing and community topics.

Wellbeing – The Maccabi LIFE program continues to expand by pioneering health and wellbeing solutions curated to enrich the physical and mental health literacy of the Jewish community. It is unique in that it is the only program that combines Jewish culture and wellbeing.

It offers hundreds of recipes, articles of interest, online exercise programs, wellbeing tools and nutrition advice and it's completely free for the community. It has been rolled out into New Zealand and will play a role in other Jewish communities in Asia.

Confederation Development – In agreement with Maccabi World Union we set a new objective this year and that is to expand the Australian Maccabi territory to an Australasian confederation. Whilst the work in this area is only beginning, we have early success in New Zealand – and will be hosting some of their community at our next Carnival. Fruitful conversations are also afoot in India, Singapore, Hong Kong and Taiwan. This will be an exciting phase for us on the world stage.

Leadership – Our youth development program is in full swing and there are a passionate group of leaders who have been instrumental in managing Junior Carnival and will continue to play a role in the forthcoming 2024 Carnival. Their involvement at Carnival is a pathway to our Future Leaders program and we are fortunate to have been able to include some outstanding candidates in the Future Leader Forum held in Israel. In addition, a select group will be appointed to be mentored and take their place in the Maccabiah leadership team.



Maccabi World Union – A new President was elected at the last Congress – we welcome Michael Siegal to the role. He was the Chairman of the Jewish Agency Board of Governors from 2017 to 2022 and received the Israeli Presidential Medal of Honour. After 9 years in the role, Tom Goldman's term as Vice President concluded and he was replaced by Lisa Borowick. I want to acknowledge the outstanding contribution Tom Goldman has made as the MWU VP - his guidance and mentorship in Australia has been nothing short of significant. In addition, several Australians were elected to various positions on Maccabi World Union committees including Sam Gamsu and Lauren Ehrlich – International Sport Committee, Susannah Swiatlo – Leadership / education committee, Sam Strunin – Marketing and Digital Communication Committee, Jason Rhine - Maccabiah IT/ Innovation Committee and David Michaelson – Safety and Security Committee. Jeff Sher continues in his role as Vice Chairman of MWU. This is testimony to the capability and commitment of our Australian leaders who have been recognised in this way.

The year ahead - The year ahead promises significant changes in our sporting landscape. Sportification and gamification are gaining momentum, leading to the emergence of new sports and the gradual decline of some traditional ones. Individual and unstructured activities are on the rise, overshadowing team sports. Technology continues to disrupt, integrating e-games into the broader sporting landscape.

Foundation Chairman's Report



It is with immense pride and gratitude that I reflect on the continued development and progress the Maccabi Foundation has made over the past year.

Maccabi's mission has always been to 'connect our community through sport and wellbeing', and I am thrilled to report that we continue to lift the bar in our efforts to deliver the best possible experience for our members and the community at large. As we review the past year's achievements and challenges, we can take great pride in what the entire organisation has accomplished.

First and foremost, I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to our committed donors and passionate supporters. Your unwavering financial support for our clubs and programs has been instrumental in ensuring we have the resources in place to deliver high quality outcomes for all those that participate under the Maccabi banner. Thank you for sharing our vision and for supporting us in all that we do.

As a community organisation that relies substantially on the generous financial support from a broad number of foundations, families and individuals we are cognisant of the importance of developing alternate revenue streams that can lead Maccabi towards financial independence and self-sustainability.

The first example of such an enterprise is 'Maccabi Aquatics'. This innovative joint venture between Bialik College, the Maccabi Ajax Swimming Club, and Maccabi Victoria has become a highly successful model showcasing what true vision and innovation looks like in our community.



Through the hard work of **Clive Aarons, Mark Roseman** and their team, Maccabi Aquatics at Bialik have grown their swimming school participant numbers to almost 900 members, and have moved from a start-up business to a thriving, profitable enterprise. In less than 2 years, Maccabi Aquatics has demonstrated the power of true community based partnership, co-operation and social enterprise. The Maccabi Foundation is proud of the role it played in seed funding Maccabi Aquatics, and is actively seeking similar opportunities that can derive future financial benefit to our organisation and wider community.

Throughout 2022/3 the Foundation continued to provide financial support to those clubs, programs and families that required it. Throughout the past 12 months we have provided \$55,985 of financial assistance to clubs via our Victorian Club Development Grants, as well as \$17,478 to 58 families, via our Hardship Relief Fund - ensuring all Jewish athletes have every available opportunity to play their chosen sport, or join their friends at a Maccabi club remains at the heart of what we do. Again, none of this is possible without the generous financial support from our donor base. 58

In recent months the Foundation also provided funding commitments towards the continued development of our Member Protection and Compliance program. Newly renamed "Integrity and Governance", and now led by **Jacquie Seemann** (Board Member, MAI), the updated policy framework and resourcing is aimed at ensuring the continued protection and safety of all our members, coaches, staff and volunteers. There is no more critical responsibility that the leadership of our organisation has than to ensure the safety and protection of all those within our Maccabi family.

Looking ahead, we have exciting plans and ambitions for the future. We will continue to support and invest in our national clubs, our vital programs, and provide opportunities for inclusion and participation via our unique and thriving All Abilities Program. The Foundation also continues to work closely with Maccabi Victoria to identify sporting facilities that can further strengthen our place within the Melbourne community; with the ambition of creating a much needed 'hub' of sport and wellbeing in Melbourne.

The tragic events in Israel on October 7th led to the postponement of our Annual Giving Day, and the Foundation's immediate focus switched to providing financial assistance to those most in need in Israel. Maccabi World Union headquarters, Kfar Maccabiah, was transformed into a refuge for displaced families, and continues to provide up to 1,000 beds, food, clothing and a place of respite for those without homes. Through the efforts of our local community we raised \$110,000 in 72 hours to support this relief effort. Thank you to all those that contributed.




General Manager's Report

With that in mind, I can confidently say that 2023 has been a year of success stories of all shapes and sizes.



3000+ Athletes















We united through sport

2023 saw over 3000 athletes playing sport for Maccabi. Each week the Maccabi Victoria clubs bring together thousands of members of the Jewish community – athletes, family members, supporters, volunteers, coaches, team managers and officials – for their common love of sport. I want to congratulate everyone who has taken to the grounds this year and represented us – whether it was your first season of Auskick or Netball Pups, whether you've grown up in Athletics, or whether you're a soccer stalwart – we're so proud of you and everything you've achieved.

Our All Abilities Program, a staple part of Maccabi Victoria, reached new heights with the Maccabi Ajax All Abilities All Stars competing in the FIDA Football (AFL) League. This was the first time that many of our members had the opportunity to participate in a regular sporting season, the first time Maccabi had a team in the FIDA League, and for some families, the first time they have been able to go and watch their children and friends play competitive sport – something that so many of us take for granted.



Also taking on a life of its own this year was the Soccer Mums Program run by MFCC. What started as a small group of women kicking a ball around grew into a multi-faceted program with both social and competitive options. Alongside programs such as Catchball and Walking Football, it shows the growing need for social sport opportunities in our community.

Many of our clubs have marked milestones this year and we have been honoured to share in their achievements – from our Tennis Club reaching 100 years to the opening of the new Ajax club rooms – there's been no shortage of reasons to celebrate.

We connected beyond the clubs

Whilst the clubs are our lifeblood, we also focus on programs and opportunities beyond them. This year, Victoria was proud to host the first national Junior Carnival since Covid, with over 200 young athletes from 4 different states coming together in January to play sport, socialise, and create lifelong memories.



A huge thank you to Carnival Manager **Tali Friede**, and to the whole team who put together such a wonderful week. We are now looking ahead to Carnival 2024 in Sydney and have a team of over 150 Victorians ready to take part under the guidance of Team Managers **Nat Dodge** and **Bec Wolman**.

This year marked the relaunch of Maccabi Victoria Mega Camp holiday programs, offering children the opportunity to experience a variety of sports, including basketball, soccer, netball, volleyball, badminton, and more. We're excited to continue offering these programs in 2024.

During term time we have been running programs through the Jewish schools as part of the Henry Jolson Pathways Program. This initiative enables us to connect with hundreds of students by offering sport coaching before, during and after school.

We also are so proud to be a part of the Maccabi Aquatics journey. A social enterprise, Maccabi Aquatics offers highend swimming lessons and squad training to the Jewish and broader community. It is growing from strength to strength, and I want to thank the committee for their tireless efforts.





We supported our families

Our Hardship Relief Fund continues to offer support to ensure that no one in the Jewish community misses out on playing sport due to financial constraints. We recognise both the importance of sport in people's lives and the financial challenges faced with the rising cost of living, and in 2023 we supported over 58 families to ensure they could participate in Junior Carnival and in regular club sport.

We took part in the community

This year we ran a highly successful lunch for our Friends of Maccabi. Featuring a panel of esteemed Maccabi stalwarts, the event was well attended and provided a wonderful opportunity for people to connect and reconnect with the Maccabi community.

We also partnered with various community organisations to offer sporting activities as part of their events, with Maccabi Victoria making appearances at In One Voice, Yom Ha'atzmaut, various UJEB events, and even a Caulfield Shul family day!

As is now tradition, Maccabi Victoria clubs also partnered with the Holocaust Museum to mark Yom HaShoah, with online campaigns, messages read at games, and some very special visits from survivors and descendants.



It's important for us to never forget how lucky we are to be able to come together, as Jews, and play sport under the Maccabi banner.

We helped our clubs

We recognise the incredible work that committees and volunteers undertake to ensure that our clubs keep running week after week and year after year. We continue to focus on supporting our clubs and providing support as required – whether creating marketing assets, subsidising admin assistance, providing club development grants, or just being on the other end of the phone to talk through any challenges.

We're looking ahead

Plans are already underway for 2024 and we can't wait to share what's in store. We are very excited to have received some funding from the Department of Sport and Recreation (Victoria) to support continuing and expanding our interfaith and multicultural activities as part of the Henry Jolson Pathways



Property Report




As many of you would be aware, Maccabi Victoria established its Major Projects Committee in 2020. The purpose of this Committee is to explore opportunities as we seek to find a 'home' for Maccabi Victoria. Knowing the difficulties of accommodating Maccabi Victoria's 23 Clubs and Members under the one roof, including all outdoor sporting fields etc, the Committee is certainly open to centralising Maccabi's activities to a few key sites located to suit our demographic. The Maccabi One Committee, as it is known, recently welcomed **Ilan Kraus**. Ilan is a solicitor at Maddocks law firm and is a welcome addition with his extensive property law expertise.

The two main potential sites we are currently exploring are the proposed redevelopment of the Caulfield Racecourse and the proposed move by Mount Scopus College to the Caulfield Hospital site.

With regards to Mount Scopus, we have previously presented a plan for this new site to accommodate sporting courts, fields and indoor spaces for health and well-being and Maccabi offices. Whilst Maccabi Victoria has been named as a partner in this project, the process is ongoing for the school and the other major stakeholders and we await further advice. We are certainly in contact with those involved in the project from Mount Scopus, but at this stage there is nothing further to do but wait for any developments.

The Caulfield Racecourse redevelopment has progressed somewhat over the past year. Our submission to activate, develop and manage the Neerim Hub part of the site (which is the old Stables section of the site and sits outside the race course proper), was very well received by the Caulfield Racecourse Reserve Trust (CRRT). We are currently in the process of signing an MOU with the CRRT.

Only two other parties of all those who originally presented submissions for the Neerim Hub are at this stage.





Once the MOU is signed, we will be involved in the next stage of proceedings, which includes the preparation of a feasibility study of the Neerim Hub. This is being prepared for the CRRT, with our involvement, and which will ultimately be presented to the State Government for them to then do their own assessments as to the viability of the site for the intended use.

Finally, as an update, Maccabi Aquatics is now very much up and running. Based at Bialik College, this new full-service swim school has been established as part of a long term partnership between Maccabi Victoria and Bialik as a social enterprise model. The utilisation of a prime asset to the benefit of both beneficiaries and the community has surpassed initial forecasts and on the back of this success will continue to grow its offerings as a swim school to the Jewish and wider communities.

So whilst we appreciate that any major development takes time, we feel comfortable that we have two excellent propositions sitting in the wings that would go a long way to help Maccabi Victoria achieve its goals.



Maccabi Athletic Club



In 2023, the Maccabi Athletic Club experienced a landmark year, showcasing an impressive blend of performance, inclusivity, and future planning. The Club's activities are divided into winter and summer seasons, with the former focusing on cross country—mainly attracting senior competitors—and the latter emphasising track and field, which is generally more popular among juniors. Training sessions are held three times a week, year round and are technique-oriented, social, and inclusive, thereby fostering an environment that encourages individual growth and community-building.

Achievements


In terms of athletic achievements, the year was a success. The Club earned a promotion to a higher division after finishing an impressive second out of 12 clubs in the 2022-2023 summer season. **Jemima Montag** (a Maccabi Alumnus) won silver at the World Champs 20K race walk in Budapest. Similarly, club member **Ori Drabkin** secured silver in the long jump and 100m (T38) at the Commonwealth Youth Games in Trinidad and Tobago. These firsts are not just milestones for the athletes but also for the Club, marking the first time club athletes have earned medals at such prestigious global events. **Emma de Jong** and **Zac Ashkanasy** also brought home national and state medals, elevating the Club's status.

On the organisational side, two young coaches, **David Blecher** and **Jarrod Zuchowski**, have been added to the coaching team, bringing youthful energy and novel perspectives. Alongside them, a Youth Leadership team has been formed to work under the guidance of club Secretary **Zac Ashkanasy**. The Club has also introduced its first interstate committee member, **Bronwyn Elbourne** from Sydney.



Strategically, the Maccabi Athletic Club is in the process of rolling out its 5-year plan for 2023-2027, having engaged with "Club Builder 2032" for insights. The vision is "Faster, Further, Higher - together," and the mission aims to engage the Australian Jewish Community in athletic pursuits. Core values like inclusivity, community, and respect guide this mission. As part of its future outlook, the Club is developing alliances with other Maccabi clubs and Jewish Schools, aiming to create a synergistic ecosystem that encourages physical activity and wellness for all age groups and skill levels.

Spotlight on Ori

The winter season of 2023 saw Maccabi Basketball Club in full swing with 79 teams in action. At Waverley, 26 of the Club's teams advanced to the semi-finals, and 11 went on to contest in the Grand Finals. Impressively, 7 of those teams emerged champions. At McKinnon, the success continued with 8 teams reaching the semi-finals and 5 making it to the Grand Finals, out of which 2 were crowned winners.

The U16 and U18 Boys' squads experienced the thrill of competing in three major basketball tournaments. These events, which attracted teams from both interstate and overseas, provided an excellent platform for the Club's young talent to challenge themselves against top-notch competition.

As the Summer 2023/24 season approached, the Club boasted 86 teams, indicating a rising trend in engagement. An enthusiastic call to parents for coaching in the U8-U10 categories yielded a response from 30 parents, a notable increase from the previous season's 19. Moreover, the club took a progressive step by organising teams based on age, ensuring a balanced competitive experience for all. **Hayley Blieden** and **Jenna Lewski's** initiative in introducing a Coach Handbook streamlined the coaching process.

On the digital front, **Emily Nadelman** rejuvenated the Club's social media presence, capturing its spirit vividly on Instagram and showcasing the signature Maccabi Basketball colours.

Change was a significant theme as **Julian Dunne** and **Nathan Sable** assumed the roles of Co-Presidents. They brought fresh energy and filled newly created management positions, helping redefine the Club's future direction. A nod of appreciation goes to Maccabi Victoria for their consistent support during this period of transition, especially in the Club's restructuring efforts. **Ruth Clare's** role in overseeing the financial operations was also crucial in ensuring stability.



In terms of membership, the Club proudly hosts around 750 members. The junior segment showed a healthy growth from 665 members in Winter 2023 to 691 by Summer 2023/24.
