

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From the Principals Desk

I started at Bryanston High as the new principal on 2 May 2000. I was excited about the prospect of joining a very successful High School and was very nervous of meeting the challenges the new post offered. It is always a daunting task to have to meet new teachers, students and their parents and to learn the systems and the procedures by which the school is managed.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Mrs Webb for managing the school so well in the difficult transition period between Mr Visser leaving and my arrival. It is a privilege to be able to work with the quality of teachers such as Mrs Webb and the other staff at Bryanston.

It was strange to be appointed by Dr Swemmer's out going Governing Body and then to run elections for the new Governing Body. I would like to thank Dr Swemmer for his massive contribution to Bryanston High School.

The Bryanston parents turned out in mass to support the elections and we were one of the few schools to achieve a quorum. It was great to welcome Mr Azzie as the new chairman to face the challenge of looking after Bryanston for the next three years.

Little did I know that within four weeks I would be faced with a crisis that would place the school at the forefront of the South African Media . I believe that the students, staff and I have had an experience that we will never forget. I want to be specific when I say that I have no regrets on how I handled the issue. I was motivated by the principles of justice, fairness and transparency and I would like to believe that I did not allow the media to influence the proceedings at any stage. A big concern I do have is that the issue was taken out of the School's hands when I firmly believed that the Governing Body and I could have solved the matter to the satisfaction of all parties. The staff of Bryanston High have the educational experience to deal with the matter without, so-called interested parties, running to the media and imposing unnecessary pressure and exposing minors to reporters who are not concerned with educational priorities or the effect the experience might have on young and impressionable lives.

Now, the matter is closed. The School and I need to move to new challenges and to harbor no bitterness and anger about what has happened. I have been encouraged by the work of Dr Charlton and the Foundation for Educational Tolerance to teach the students that it is a complicated world they are going into and how they deal with those issues will effect how successful they will be in life. Emotional Intelligence training has become just as important as the cognitive and knowledge skills we also need to have. I also believe that the events of the past three months must not be seen negatively, but as an opportunity to learn from the experience and to take advantage of the new opportunities that it offers.

I would like to thank Mr Azzie, Mr De Bruyn, the Governing Body and the Parents Association for all their support. The PA has been impressive in their fund raising work. The Tuck shop is a symbol of the good work Mr De Bruyn and the PA have done. The golf Day was also a fantastic success and raised nearly R30 000. The MTN Festival also did very well, but much of the money raised was stolen in the School's burglary at the beginning of May. Nevertheless, it was wonderful to be able to host such a prestigious event. I would like to thank Mr Skelton and his team for running the event so successfully.

My focus is now on the future of the school. I am very motivated to ensure the students at the school receive the best possible computer training because it is a skill essential to their future careers. We intend upgrading the centres and to introduce a comprehensive computer curriculum so that all students receive a certificate for their acquired abilities.

I am concerned about the academic standards at the school. They are very high but I believe that they still could be much better and it is going to require a lot of drive from the teachers and the support of the parents to ensure all students are motivated to do their best.

OBE will become part of the school next year. I am encouraged by the process because it does offer the teachers the opportunity to prepare the students for the future by giving them the skills they will need. The biggest change that parents will notice next year will be in the assessment of the work the students do.

Bryanston is blessed with many talented students and, while our sporting and cultural success is superb, we are still not mobilizing all the talent available to make the school and those individuals even more successful. We are all endowed with special and unique talents and I encourage all students to explore what they are and to develop them to the fullest. In that way, successful and happy lives are created.

MESSAGE FROM THE PAST CHAIRPERSON OF THE GOVERNING BODY

THEN AND NOW

In looking back on the life of the first full representative Governing Body that ended its period of office in May 2000, the members can reflect with satisfaction on the use they made of their time.

The major achievements in the three years were:

- the success in bringing operational expenditure back within budget and moving substantially toward eliminating old financial obligations;
- the development of a three year strategic plan and the regular review of the actions required to bring the plan to fruition, coupled with the attainment of most of the objectives set;
- bridging the School through the change of principalship from Mr
 Paige to the appointment of Mr Visser and then repeating
 the process when he resigned and was succeeded by
 Mr Robinson;
- coping with the retirement of the bursar, Mr J Alkema, succession by Mr Mullin and the subsequent appointment of Mrs Peacock to the position:
- the creation of two actively-used computer class-rooms despite the stringent financial position of the School; and
- developing the range of policies and revised procedures required by the new legislative framework.

On behalf of all of those associated with the School, I wish to pay tribute to all of those who served on the Governing Body during the three years from 1997 to 2000. The representatives of the academic staff, support staff, learners and parents deliberated wisely in making the decisions that governed the School's focus and activity during this period.

These achievements would not have been possible without:

- •the significant support of the Parents Association under the enthusiastic leadership of Andre de Bruyn;
- the many parents who volunteer their services for the cause of the School, prominent amongst whom is Lynne Blane;
- the financial responsibility exercised fully by the vast majority of our parent-body and with sacrifice by several others;
 and
- the professional expertise and extensive involvement of our academic and other personnel.

I express sincere gratitude to all of them. In particular, however, I wish to pay special tribute to the Senior Deputy-Principal, Mrs Webb, whose loyal and dedicated support has meant so much to me personally and to the School in particular.

So much for then, but what of now? We had hardly stepped down when the School was catapulted into the news and the new leadership of Bryanston High was called upon to exercise compassionate and wise decision-making in coping with a difficult incident and the subsequent period of public scrutiny. The risk for the School was that it might allow this incident to distract from the central purpose of its activities.

There will always be individuals and groups of people who will be critical of the processes that Bryanston High and its leaders have had to follow since then.

The challenge for the School is to resist inappropriate pressures while responding handsomely to the warranted demands.

To those inside and outside the School community, who believe that matters might have been handled differently and who would wish to speak critically or act precipitately, I urge that the words of the Sioux prayer with which I end my message should be taken to heart and should govern any intervention:

Oh, Great Spirit, keep me from ever judging a man until I have walked a mile in his moccasins.

MESSAGE FROM PETER AZZIE CHAIRMAN OF THE GOVERNING BODY

The first year of the new millennium has witnessed a very difficult and trying time for Bryanston High, its teachers and its governing body, but it has always been my maxim to "accentuate the positive", as the song goes, rather than to dwell on one's travails.

Before I do just that, however, I would like to commend the word "tolerance" to the vocabularies of everyone associated with the school. It is tolerance which allows us to be objective, impartial and merciful in dealing with the type of problems which the school has had to face in recent times. It is that same tolerance which we must encompass in judging those less gifted than others. There is a special talent in each and every one of us and it is up to all of us to try to recognise that talent in others, and to give credit and praise where it is due.

I am pleased to be able to report on a great many positives over the past 12 months, starting with the pleasing Matric results of the Class of '99, which achieved a 99% pass rate. That is a good result by most schools' standards, but not what we're striving for, in my book. We have to set our goal at nothing less than 100%, if the school is going to be a springboard for success in the lives of all its learners.

Providing a holistic education which will equip young people with the knowledge and life skills necessary to succeed is what we are all about. This requires a balanced curriculum of learning, in the academic sense, cultural activities and sporting pursuits, which Bryanston High undoubtedly provides.

In the area of academic excellence, one of our students was placed in the top 100 in the Maths Olympiad, whilst two past students have been awarded top academic achievement awards at the Rand Afrikaans University, this year.

The school play is always a useful yardstick by which to judge a school's cultural standards and this year's production, the Broadway musical hit, "A Funny Thing Happened On The Way To The Forum", was, by all accounts, another superb entertainment. Sadly, I missed it, due to hospitalisation, but it was a great success at the box office and we may have to schedule extra performances of our school shows in future.

Our Debating Society also held its end up, winning the interschools UN debate, whilst a number of students were awarded Triple A diplomas for their presentations at the Eisteddfod, with Bryanston High once again winning the Best School award. In the sporting arena, the school hosted the MTN Rugby Festival, this year, which proved a huge success. Our First Rugby side also fared well, winning 10 of its fifteen matches during the season.

Both our male and female hockey teams also performed with distinction, the measure of their success being that a number of Bryanston High players have been selected to represent their province. Hopefully there will come a time when our boy hockey players will once again be able to set their sights on representing their country at the level of the Olympics.

Unfortunately, our athletics teams have come off the high of last season, but we continue to strive for success with two teams, an A and B side, competing in the Inter-Schools League.

Bryanston High has always been noted for the high standards of its swimmers and the school continues to perform competitively in the A League.

In conclusion, it would be remiss of me not to comment on the very unfortunate incidents which have marred the year under review, these including the theft of computer equipment (so essential in modern education, and an area which will come in for serious review) and the disciplinary hearings which have had to be conducted. The latter, in my view, were far more the consequence of raised testosterone levels than any racial motivation, but such behaviour cannot be condoned in civilised society.

Again, however, I must draw on the positive aspects arising from these incidents. In dealing with the problems, we have undoubtedly emerged stronger as a school. From my own perspective, having been thrown in the deep end in June of this year, I have to say that our new Headmaster, Dave Robinson, who found himself in a similar situation, has been a tower of strength, as have the teaching staff and my fellow members of the governing body. Learners and parents alike have also been extremely supportive.

With the esprit d'corps evidence by all associated with the school during these turbulent times, Bryanston High can only go from strength to strength.







WHICH WAY UP? (Life Orientation)

Dear, dear! How queer everything is today! And yesterday things went on just as usual. I wonder if I've been changed in the night? Let me think. Was I the same when I got up this morning? I almost think I can remember feeling a little different. But if I'm not the same, the next question is "who in the world am I?" Ah, that's the puzzle!

Lewis Carroll's Alice could have been one of our grade eight learners, standing in the quadrangle on the first day of school this year, or she could be one of our Grade 12s on the verge of leaving us to enter yet another "new world" - or simply one of our learners in between these two stages.

The emphasis of Life Orientation at schools is shifting towards using the self-concept as a guidance system. Of all the things that we learn, nothing seems to affect our search for personal significance and identity more than our self-perception - our view of who we are and how we fit into the world. Research shows that we evaluate our worth according to how we are seen by those who are important to us. Of particular note for us, as teachers and parents, is the knowledge that our learners and children are heavily influenced by those who treat them as able, valuable and responsible - as well as by those who treat them as unable, worthless and irresponsible.

Alice's question "who in the world am I?" really means: "who do you say I am?" The answer to that question influences how our pupils behave and what they become. No amount of academic theory or career guidance can substitute for a positive self-image. To succeed in school, they need enough confidence in themselves and their abilities to make the effort. The more self-esteem they have, the greater the desire and ability to take control of their lives becomes and the more consistent is their social behaviour.

We are lucky, at Bryanston High, to have engaged Laine Katzin as our residential educational psychologist. This year, the Grade 9 learners were give a full battery of tests to co-ordinate career, emotional and ability factors in their choice of subjects for the rest of their schooling.

Mr Smith has been our "full time" guidance teacher who has so ably held the fort for the last year with regard to Guidance at the school. Miss Tetley, Miss Pretorius and Mr Basson have also had their share of guiding our pupils through a "much publicised" year for the school!

Our department is also richer for Mr Robinson's emphatic support for Life Orientation as a subject. Exciting developments have been his introduction of Mr Rod Charlton, cross-cultural psychologist, who is taking our learners on a journey of understanding others around them. Through Mrs Skeen, we were fortunate to obtain the attention of the Foundation for Tolerance where our learners have been challenged to take an historical look at human rights. All of this must set a favourable tone, within the school, for empathy and compassion....ultimately, good self-images.

Having dealt with the administrative duties of Life Orientation, I will leave the English classroom to join my department next year. Through the looking glass, there probably won't be much difference: literature is an analysis of life!


Take a look at him now. An outcast to society. The outstanding achievements mean nothing to South Africa now, except disappointment.

JUSTICE - THE REINSTATING OF THE DEATH PENALTY

The Bible says "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth" but it also says "Thou shalt not kill!" Both statements can be used as valid arguments on the issue of reinstating the death sentence. This issue has been argued many times in the past yet still nothing is done to bring justice to those who have violated the most important right of innocent victims ... the right to live.

Reinstating the death penalty would dramatically change South Africa. The most obvious and noticeable change would be the decrease in crime. Innocent people are killed every day in South Africa for the most insignificant reasons, ranging from their wallets to their watches, yet there is a simple way to stop this.

South Africa is known as "the crime capital of the world", because of the high incidence of violent crimes like rape and murder. The only way our reputation can be changed, is for the people who are committing these crimes to be convicted, not to prison for a few years, but to death.

Unfortunately for every argument there is a downside and that is the possible conviction of innocent people. It is so easy for an innocent person to be framed and convicted for committing a crime with which they had nothing to do. But, if all murder and rape cases are investigated properly such instances could easily be avoided.

Another argument is that you cannot correct a mistake by using another. By killing someone who has murdered or raped, we are no better than they are. Killing a murderer will not bring back the victim and killing a rapist will not take away the pain and humiliation of being raped. It might, however give the victims and their families the satisfaction of knowing that they may have saved another person from being raped or murdered. A dead man can't rape or kill anyone else.

If a person is killed for committing a serious felony their family can be badly affected, especially if they did not know that they were living with a criminal. Their income and social reputation could be negatively affected.

If the felon is put into prison the lives of his family members would be equally affected. The reinstatement of the death penalty would also ensure that prisons are not over-crowded. Prisoners would only be people convicted of committing crimes like petty theft.

Most criminals commit felonies because they know they can get away with it. Rapists and murderers stay in prison for a few months and are released on parole or receive bail of low amounts. Those criminals will go out, commit the same crime, go back to prison, be released within a few months and the cycle will continue.

Criminals will think twice before committing murder or rape if the death sentence is reinstated. No sane person would willingly commit a crime knowing that they could be put to death for it. In some countries such as Singapore, there are low crime rates because there are proper deterrents for every crime. If the death penalty were to be reinstated, South Africa would be more like Singapore.

The future of South Africa depends on the reinstating of the death penalty. The ideal South Africa would have no crime, the streets would be safe and peaceful. There would be no need for prisons and the space used to build them could be put to better use. In closing, I think that we should look upon the death penalty not as an act of revenge, but as an act of justice: An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.

We "graduated" from the high school stage to perform at the Wits theatre, which was a wonderful experience for everyone. The cast had a "fantabulous" time creating this "thing" for the stage and by interpreting it on any level they wished, each member of Efil added his or her own "chocolate sauce" to the delicious play.

Kezia and I wrote this play in order to present a different view of theatre to the audience. On observing many different types of theatre and productions, we decided to offer a change to what has become the 'normal high school play' and in doing so, to challenge school theatre to move with the times.

Our play, the theme of which is "life", provokes thought on a subject relevant to every breathing member of the audience - "What is my life?" We wanted to move away from the clichéd drug, sex, alcohol and aids message and, for a teenager, found that one's identity is a very big part of our lives.

At 17 years old and as teenagers, I'm sure you'll agree that Kezia and I know exactly what life is all about. However, by taking a satirical, almost comical view on the topic, the fact that people can only discover this for themselves was enhanced.

We used obscure and diverse situations like a past life help line, an imaginary Simpson's world and a "Who wants to get a life?" game show. Wacky? Maybe. But at the same time, each one brought out a tiny segment of ourselves. It is a play that allowed each actor to extend his or her ability, being honed to rely less on sets and props. Our most significant prop was simply an umbrella. It represented a simple answer but also how humanity all too often reaches for external appliances and insignificant things in their lives when the beauty of living is to be found in themselves.

Efil was a kaleidoscope of ideas, provoking thought and creativity, all submerged together and bounded by the single golden thread of enthusiasm for LIFE.

INTER-HOUSE PLAYWRIGHT AWARD WINNER

The play, 'The Cage', does not draw any conclusions about family life and parent-child relations as a whole. If anything, it is a character study. It is the study of an individual in a difficult predicament and how she copes with it. The psychology behind Louise, the mother, is what propels the play in its limited examination of a dysfunctional family unit. She could hardly be mistaken for a martyr or a saint, and reflects the beliefs of more of us than, perhaps, we'd like to admit.

The mother-child relationship is explored in that we see how the alienation between mother and handicapped child can completely undermine any sort of healthy relationship they might have. The play questions that bond which is generally regarded as sacred. Is the love between a mother and her child unconditional? predicament the mother finds herself in, having given birth to a living being which she neither understands nor relates to, is an intriguing one.

To a certain extent the concept of variable realities is explored. Our automatic reaction to mentally handicapped people is pity and sympathy. The world as they perceive it, however, could be far more beautiful and subtle than our town. Through their eyes, our buildings and streets could appear as artworks. This altered world would be the only world that they would know, however, and so they would not recognize their vision as artworks as such. Just as we accept that grass is green, so they could perceive and accept that grass is white and glassy, like ashen shards. This relative perception of beauty applies to all of us. The difference is that the mentally handicapped generally don't have the skills to articulate this beauty, and so their vision is locked in their minds.

We assume that it is the mentally handicapped who are in a confining mental cage, but it is perhaps we who confine ourselves. What we perceive as "mental handicap" may simply be the visible symptoms of Knowing the Truth - about mankind, about creation. We label sufferers 'slow' and 'dim', but it may be that what appears to us as slow or dim is, in fact, the nature of omniscience.

The question we must ask ourselves is: who is caged and who is not? Who, in the broadest possible sense, is liberated and who is enslaved?



















FAREWELL SPEECH - 27 JANUARY 2000

Good Evening, Ladies and Gentlemen






