The local Women's History Week activities met with enthusiastic response, and dozens of schools planned special programs for Women's History Week. Over one-hundred community women participated by doing special presentations in classrooms throughout the country and an annual "Real Woman" Essay Contest drew hundreds of entries. The finale for the week was a celebratory parade and program held in the center of downtown Santa Rosa, California.





RUBEN E. CANEDO

UC Berkeley

Ruben E. Canedo (he/they) has dedicated the last 15 years to caring, supporting, and advocating for communities as a public speaker. Most recently, Ruben was awarded the National TRIO Achievers Award for his impact across healing, disability, and transformative justice efforts in public higher education and non-

profit organizations. In addition to his public speaking career, Ruben is consistently sought after to design and facilitate team retreats, leadership meetings, and values-centered strategy processes. Fun fact, Ruben grew up in a traditional karate family and is currently a third-degree black belt.



DR. KEITH CURRYPresident, Compton College

Dr. Keith Curry is the President of the Compton College and CEO of the Compton Community College District. Compton College is the 114th California Community College, achieving initial accreditation status on June 7, 2017. Dr. Curry is responsible for overseeing all departments and functions of Compton

College and the District and serves as secretary for the CCCD Board of Trustees. He brings an abundance of energy and innovative ideas to Compton College, along with a wealth of experience as a postsecondary education administrator.

Dr. Curry is an active member of the Foundation for Compton Community College District, the Association of California Community College Administrators, the California Community College Athletic Association, the Statewide Association of Community Colleges (SWACC), the Hope Center for College, Community, and Justice Advisory Board, and the President's Roundtable. He has participated on Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) Visiting Teams, most recently for San Quentin University Prison Project.

In 2018, Dr. Curry received the Harry Buttimer Distinguished Administrator Award. The Association of California Community College Administrators bestows the award to administrators who demonstrate integrity, principle, compassion, strength in leadership, and who have made significant contributions to the college district and community.

At the 2019 Community College League of California Annual Conference, Dr. Curry was honored as one of three 2019 Champions of Equity by the Campaign for College Opportunity and the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials Educational fund. The award honors those who prioritize student-centered policies that produce equitable outcomes and expand opportunities for Californians.

In June 2020, Dr. Curry was invited by Governor Newsom's Senior Policy Advisor for Higher Education Lande Ajose to serve on the California Higher Education Recovery with Equity Task Force.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Dr. Curry earned his doctorate in educational leadership from the University of California, Irvine, and a bachelor's degree in American studies from the University of California, Santa Cruz. Dr. Curry is an adjunct faculty member for the College of Education at California State University, Fullerton.

DR. DAISY GONZALESDeputy Chancellor, California Community College

Daisy Gonzales, Ph.D., serves as the Deputy Chancellor of the Califronia Community Colleges, the largest system of public higher education in the United States. She leads the 116-community college system, which serves over 1.9 million students with a student-centered mindset and a goal of creating equitable and

supportive ecosystems where students thrive.

She is an experienced and unapologetic advocate for student success. Born into an immigrant family in Southern California and raised as a former foster youth, Dr. Gonzales was among the first in her family to attend college. She credits her time in the Los Angeles foster care system and schools as having shaped her views of the integral role public institutions play in the lives of students and the economic development in a community.

Dr. Gonzales was appointed interim chancellor in August 2022 by the California Community Colleges Board of Governors. Prior to this appointment, she served as a deputy chancellor from 2018-2022, and served as acting chancellor from July through November 2021.

Prior to joining the Chanellor's Office in 2017, Dr. Gonzales served students as a dual-immersion third-grade teacher; a budget consultant for the California State Assembly Budget Committee, where she managed \$11.2 billion in state and federal programs; and was the principal consultant for the Assembly Appropriations Committee. She also served as associate director for Policy Analysis for California Education (PACE), a non-partisan research center at Stanford University focued on designing equitable outcomes at all levels of the state's education system.

Dr. Gonzales is a proud community college alum of Los Angeles Valley College. She graduated from Mills College with a bachelor's degree in public policy and earned a master's degree and Ph.D. in sociology from UC Santa Barbara. She is also a former Aspen Institute presidential fellow, serves on the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) and is the co-founder of the Sacramento Latina; eaders Network and the California Community Colleges Women's Caucus. In 2021, she received the California Legislative Women's Caucus Woman of the Year Award from Lt. Gov. Eleni Kounalakis, in recognition f her leadership throughout the COVID-19 pandemic.

DR. JOSHUA MOON-JOHNSON

Provost/Vice President of Academic Affairs, West Valley College

Dr. Joshua Moon-Johnson (he or they) is a best-selling author, social justice consultant, and speaker who has dedicated his career and life to LGBTQ+ advocacy, racial justice, and education reform. Dr. Moon-Johnson serves as the Provost & Vice President of Academic Affairs at West Valley College. They also

previously served in diverse roles including as the Vice President of Student Services at the College of San Mateo, Dean of Equity at American River College where they oversaw eight TRiO programs, Assistant Dean/Director of the Multicultural Student Center at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and the Director of the LGBTQ Center at UCSB. Joshua also served as a resident assistant for the Upward Bound program at the University of South Alabama. Joshua's understanding of identity, equity, and conflict has led him to a career educating on topics of social justice and has led to becoming a best-selling author with his first book, Beyond Surviving: From Religious Oppression to Queer Activism, which was also ranked #3 on Book Authority's 20 Best-Selling LGBT Activism Books of All Time. Joshua also published Queer People of Color in Higher Education in 2017, and his newest book, Queer & Trans Advocacy in the Community College, published with Dr. Emilie Mitchell and Dr. Lemuel Watson came out in 2022.



DR. MIA SETTLES-TIDWELL

Vice President for Inclusive Excellence and University Diversity Officer, California State University, Sacramento

Dr. Mia Settles-Tidwell is currently the Vice President for Inclusive Excellence and University Diversity Officer at Sacramento State. Earning three degrees: her bachelor's degree in Social Welfare from the University of California, Berkeley and

her Masters and Doctorate from California State University, East Bay in Educational Leadership for Social Justice. She is a self-proclaimed, At the Table Activist, with over 30 years of educational leadership expertise in both K-12 and higher education systems. Mia is leading the implementation of Sac State's Antiracism and Inclusive Campus Action Plan, and co-leads efforts like the Black Success Initiative, Title IX Assessment Implementation Team, Taskforces to Address Antisemitism and Islamophobia, and the CSU Juneteenth Symposium to name a few. In addition, she teaches Organizational Leadership in the Education Doctoral Program at Sac State. She is known for her effective and stealth approach to challenging institutions to examine inequitable practices and remove barriers that impede success for underserved groups. Dr. Settles-Tidwell believes strongly that we have all inherited "isms" and "phobias" yet we are situated very differently to address them. Therefore, she models an unwavering commitment to use her position of influence to elevate the voices of those who have been silenced. She applies innovative and equity-centered strategies to common educational equity-centered dilemmas, and nurtures strong cultural, racial, and social partnerships amongst diverse groups. In her spare time, she enjoys spending time with her husband and family, writing poetry, fine dining, and watching reality TV shows.

Seher Awan is a passionate social justice advocate. As a first-generation community college student, she has dedicated her career to building on her passion for helping others. Dr. Awan has an extensive educational background and has earned a Bachelor's of Science in Business Administration, a Masters of

Business Administration, a Masters of Public Administration and a Doctorate in Organizational Leadership. Dr. Awan has served in numerous roles within higher education. In 2014, she was hired as Vice President of Administrative Services for San Diego City College. With her career beginnings in student services, she brought a unique approach to finance and administrative services. In 2018, Dr. Awan became the youngest California Community College President at 32. Joining the Los Angeles Southwest College team as president, Dr. Awan jumped in with enthusiasm, energy, and a focus on student-centered care. She led the college through extensive organizational change, fiscal recovery, and the COVID-19 Pandemic, keeping students at the center of her decision-making. She established new community partnerships and brought in resources every year of her tenure. In 2022, Dr. Awan transitioned to become the President of Mission College in Santa Clara, CA. Dr. Awan served as a Wheelhouse Fellow in 2019 and is an Aspen Institute New Presidents Fellow. She has over eighteen years of experience in higher education, with an intentional focus on equity and social justice, empowering the most underserved communities through education.

KIMBERLY JONES

COE President

On October 1, 2023, Kimberly Jones assumed the presidency of the Council for Opportunity in Education. For nearly two decades, she has served as a leading advocate for low-income students, first-generation students, students with disabilities, and other marginalized learners. Previously, Ms. Jones fulfilled several

roles at the Council. In her present role, she serves as the chief executive officer of the Council, which represents the interests of its member colleges, universities, and community-based agencies that serve nearly 900,000 students in the Federal TRIO Programs. As president, she serves as the primary liaison between the Council and the United States Congress, the Executive Branch, and all governmental agencies as well as all other postsecondary education associations. Additionally, she oversees the organization's professional development offerings for college access and success educators; scholarly and experiential learning opportunities for low-income, first-generation students; and the research agenda of COE's Pell Institute for the Study of Higher Education.

Prior to joining COE, Ms. Jones was an Associate in the Communications Practice Group at the law firm of Dow Lohnes, PLLC (now Cooley LLP), where she advised clients on a variety of broadcast and media law issues.

Ms. Jones has served in leadership roles within various professional and civic organizations, including the Committee for Education Funding, of which she served as President. She is an inaugural Advisory Board Member for Black History 365, a comprehensive textbook and curriculum guide designed for students and educators that spans the breadth of Black American history, and a Board Member of Marked By COVID, a non-partisan charitable organization that promotes accountability, recognition, and justice for the millions of victims of COVID-19, including her father. Ms. Jones also a member of the Junior League of Washington and volunteers with the DC Family & Youth Initiative, an organization that provides mentorship and support for young people in and aging out of the foster care system in the Washington, DC metro area.

A Harry S. Truman Scholar, Ms. Jones is a graduate of Yale University and the Georgetown University Law Center. In 2016, Ms. Jones was named one of the "40 Under 40 Nation's Best Advocates" by the National Bar Association and also received the organization's Excellence in Activism Award. In 2018, she was selected for the Diversity Executive Leadership Program sponsored by ASAE, the American Society of Association Executives. In 2021, she earned the Certified Association Executive (CAE) credential from ASAE.

With the emphasis on diversity, equity, inclusion, and antiracism training within our institutions and organizations, a large group of students and professionals are being overlooked - the Homegirls and Homeboys, or Homies who represent 'Hood Culture. We cannot address the issues of diversity, equity, inclusion, and antiracism without addressing the dynamics that got us here: Colonization and its effects on all our lives, especially how 'Hood Culture is bullied out of academia for students and their families, well into professional experiences. This session is an educational and experiential workshop designed to equip participants to take a deep dive into engaging in productive conversations about the impacts of colonization and its effects on society, with significant emphasis on the lived experiences of - the Homegirls and Homeboys, or Homies who represent 'Hood Culture. This session will prepare participants for real change regarding our racial and social dynamics by addressing the root of racial inequities and social injustices and providing a path toward cultural healing.

W4. Everyone Wants to Become a Doctor, Very Few Know HOW to Become One! Presented By: Kenia Ramirez Moreno and Jarell Green Room: Blossom III

If first-generation, low-income, underrepresented groups of K-12 or incoming college freshmen were surveyed about their career aspirations, becoming a medical doctor would often sit at the top of the list. The primary issue with these aspirations is most students do not understand how to bring their medical dreams to fruition. This workshop, led by a former intensive care registered nurse turned TRIO professional and another powerhouse TRIO professional, will explore how to actually position your students to be competitive medical school applicants and explore an innovative collaboration that the University of Nevada, Reno's First-Generation Student Center and the University of Nevada, Reno's School of Medicine have created that will ensure the success of aspiring first-generation, low-income, underrepresented med school hopefuls.
