REFLECTION

Dancing with the Holy Spirit

Recently, I listened to a woman speak of her encounter with Jesus after many years of disconnection from the church. She spoke of her insatiable appetite to learn more about our Catholic faith, of her desire to spend time with God, and of her amazement and embarrassment at how little she understands of faith. The beauty of the transforming action of the Holy Spirit in her life has brought her so much joy.

When this woman's experience is multiplied in a parish setting, the Holy Spirit can and will help us transform our parishes in very practical ways. This may be through ensuring prayer and worship is at the heart of all we do, growing a stronger sense of belonging and community, and increasing the desire of parishioners to serve and reach out to those in need.

In the New Testament we read of Christ's desire for each one of us: "and it is no longer I who live, but it is Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me (Galatians 2:20)." Like dancing with a strong lead partner, the call on our individual lives and that of our parishes is to surrender to the One who wants to draw us ever closer.

Can we personally and as a parish allow ourselves to be the Holy Spirit's ideal dance partner and surrender our decisions, actions and will to Him? Can we receive Jesus as he pours Himself out to us on the cross and give a wholehearted 'Yes' in return?

Let us pray individually and as part of our parishes for the grace and courage that makes this possible.



First Steps for Transforming Parish Culture

Assume that there are visitors, non-Christians and skeptics at every Mass. Many are likely to be there for the "wrong reasons" (such as their child is involved, or to please someone else etc). See their presence as an opportunity rather than a problem. Address these people directly and warmly, inviting them to take a fresh look at the Catholic faith at every opportunity.



Invest in a course like Alpha or The Search.

These courses are designed for people who are new to faith or who are searching. Having a regular program to help evangelise the people in the parish as well as newcomers is invaluable when you are trying to adopt a missionary stance as a parish.

03

Celebrate the stories of people's lives being changed by Jesus. Have people who have had their lives changed by Jesus tell their stories. When we celebrate such stories we tell people that it is normal for people's lives to change when they enter our parish and meet Jesus.

04

Throw people in the deep end when it comes to ministry and service. Nothing helps people grow more in faith than to call them to serve.

05

Work on defining the future you are aiming for. When you have clarity about what a vital parish community looks like, write it down, and then begin to share it with others. Nothing motivates people more than having a clear picture of the kind of parish you want to be.




Areté Centre Partners with Notre Dame

RANSFORMING /PARISH CULTURE

Since Holy Thursday I have spent some days and hours in hospital with my father who has been unwell, my father surrounded by his vulnerabilities and myself with the grace of loving him to the end. Though he has struggled with breath and energy, my father has over these weeks volunteered himself to be the 'test patient' for exams being sat by young medical students who come to poke and prod him every few days under the watchful eye of their examiners.

When I asked my Dad if he was strong enough to play this role, he shared that this wasn't his way of thinking. He told me that if he is generous to these students, they will one day be good doctors who will care for his children and his grandchildren.

By his witness of life, my father has taught me not to count the cost in our relationship to others, even from the bed of an acute care respiratory ward. He has shown me that new life and gracious possibility can be born if we are willing to give ourselves away.

Today we live in an era of mission, in a society largely unfamiliar with the Christian story, often sceptical if not distrusting of the goodness of the Church, and nonetheless marked by an immense hunger for God. We live in a time when an increasing number of Australians have ceased participating in community, including our local parishes, struggle to experience meaningful community, connection with others or personal care, and yet still pray, believe in God or sense some whisper of the transcendent in their lives.

In a new landscape in which many do not bend the knee to God but still miss him, our parishes are called to recover their identity as missionary communities and each of us our calling as evangelisers or bearers of Good News. In the pattern of the Gospel, we will discover most deeply who we are as parishes and disciples when we give ourselves away.






This has been the story of the great saints, missionaries and martyrs who transformed the world and hue of humanity through their incomparable witness and self-giving love – St Francis Xavier, Maximilian Kolbe, St Alphonsa, and St Laurent Imbert among them. It is the story of Christ himself, who emptied himself, set himself aside as an act of love, to bring humanity back to the Father (Philippians 2:7).

In seeking to transform our parish cultures, we must ask ourselves if we too are willing to not merely believe in Christ from the comfort of our pews but follow him into this missionary movement which he sets before us and upon which future generations depend.

It is a decision that each of us must make and which precedes any program, initiative or strategy we might apply to transform our Catholic parishes.



This is because culture is not the starting point for renewal but the end-product of individuals living out holiness, community and mission, and this begins with discipleship – people making a personal, conscious decision to follow Jesus with their whole lives, in and through His Church.

In an age of all-too-human contradictions – filled with isolated individuals and outraged mobs, personal anonymity and social media exposure, dangerous silences and superficial noise – our parishes can yet be transformed by the Holy Spirit to become centres of personal conversion and authentic communion. Our parishes can become ever more the sacramental presence of Christ's healing and liberating love and outposts of his mission, a mission embodied and made present above all in transformed disciples who offer God's love, mercy, healing and abundance to the world.

My thirst for knowledge and a deeper faith were ignited by the profound impact the program had on her life.


What was a highlight for you during the year?

PARISH RENEWAL & THE THREE 'H'S.



really important element of parish renewal is improving the quality of the Sunday Eucharist. Now, of course, the Mass is the Mass, and we are not at liberty to change much about the liturgy, but that does not mean that we ought to be content with celebrations of the Eucharist that are aesthetically deficient, fail to nourish people, or are cold and unwelcoming to newcomers. As Fr James Mallon memorably puts it, if we are serious about parish renewal then we need to pay attention to the "3 H's" each Sunday - the Hymns, Hospitality, and the Homilies.

Virtually my first act as a first-time parish priest many years ago was to hire a music coordinator. The little parish did not have the money, but I told the finance committee that I would pay for it myself if I had to. We hired a young faith-filled musician who needed a part-time job and the quality of the music at Mass increased exponentially. Other musicians came forward to volunteer and the number of people coming to Mass increased as people experienced the beautiful liturgies. Our finances grew accordingly, and I never had to pay for her role out of my own pocket! 

Hospitality at Sunday Mass is the second 'H' in Fr James' trio, and it is crucial for parish renewal too. Just today, I learnt about a couple who have started attending St Declan's. The lady has not been baptised and had been exploring faith in a local Protestant Church. Her fiancée though, is a Catholic, and so she was enquiring about becoming a Catholic too





While they had gone to a different Catholic parish initially, they had settled on St Declan's because of the warm experience of fellowship they had found there. So the welcome firsttimers receive is often an important initial step on their journey towards Jesus. A gentle, nonthreatening, but sincere welcome from parishioners goes a long way!

Finally, good homilies are an essential element of parish renewal! My brother priests, we need you to preach homilies that touch the hearts of people because they communicate the Gospel. And we need fire from you! Set hearts afire with the love of God! Newcomers and parishioners alike are crying out to be nourished by the Word of God as you break it open for them.

Attention to hymns, hospitality, and homilies make for a better Sunday Mass. What's one thing you can do in each of these areas to improve the quality of Sunday Eucharist in your parish?



FOUNDATIONS OF MISSIONARY LEADERSHIP

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FROM ISOLATION TO INSPIRATION:

When the COVID lockdown restrictions were lifted towards the end of 2021, our Chinese Catholic community cautiously began to gather again in person. At the time, I wondered how our faith community would be revived and resume in parish renewal.

Our community can be quite different to a local parish. While we celebrate our shared Chinese heritage and culture, we come from varied backgrounds - some of us are migrants who came to Australia more than 50 years ago, some have recently arrived seeking more economic and political stability, some are returning after studying here during their youth and an increasing number are "ABCs", or Australian Born Chinese. We speak in Cantonese, Mandarin or English. And so we gather to worship and nurture our faith in a uniquely blended Chinese Catholic culture.

Every Sunday, we gather in either Flemington, Ashfield, or Haymarket for the celebration of the Eucharist. Our homes are scattered all around Sydney and the journey to Mass can be an enormous effort for those who live further away. One obvious challenge after the lockdowns was in encouraging everyone to forgo "Mass in the lounge room" and resume travelling these long distances for in-person community worship.

One of the first initiatives to welcome everyone back was to provide morning tea after Mass, with good coffee and tea, yummy snacks and traditional Chinese foods. This helped to develop our sense of community and belonging after being apart, and gave a reason to linger, reconnect and for the children to let loose. It also inspired an informal group of dads to take turns to run the coffee cart, and provided an opportunity for youths to serve beverages to both young and old.



Recently we had a few special opportunities for the work of evangelisation in our community. We have launched a Pauline Year of Evangelisation consisting of initiatives to "Ignite (formation) and Evangelise (go out)", we welcomed neophytes and invited non-believers to a Pentecost celebration, and we celebrated the blessed role of mums with a Mother's Day morning tea.

At times, one may doubt whether our huge efforts will bear even a little fruit, but I can attest that the Holy Spirit really does draw people to relationship with God, and it helps immensely when we have faith to create some opportunities for Him. Some of the fruits include youth inviting their friends to "come and see" and seeking greater participation in ministries, while other community members having increased desire to contribute to activities and serve. The elderly in our community are filled with hope and sharing their joy in the community events.



I recently received some comments from newcomers expressing that they loved being warmly welcomed by a vibrant community during these activities.

At the Pentecost event, I observed that a good friend had become more open to the work of evangelisation – and without him even realising it (I suspect!).

He has become more comfortable in starting up conversations, approaching newcomers to welcome them and bringing joy to everyone around him. I was pleasantly surprised by this as he is usually one to abstain from engaging with newcomers. I believe this change was greatly influenced by the culture created from providing hospitality and from the heightened focus a shared vision for evangelisation has given us.

Thank you Holy Spirit, that these initiatives have combined to ignite opportunities for growth in discipleship, in my friend, and in the whole community.

Once again, I thank the Lord for what I have gained from the Areté Foundations of Missionary Leadership Program, in opening my eyes to see how we can all better participate in the great mission of evangelisation, and to be filled with excitement, joy and hope in the process. Come Holy Spirit!

June Intensive Weekend: An Unforgettable Journey of Formation, Connection, and Discovery

Small group sessions provided a space for students to practise and hone their newfound skills, encourage one another, and grow in confidence in a safe and supportive environment.



As always, daily Mass was the cornerstone of the program. Gathered in the chapel each day, the students were united in worship and thanksgiving, offering their hearts and intentions to God.

Personally, one of the most heart-stirring elements of Intensive 3 was the deepening signs of fellowship that were evident among the students during mealtime conversations. Students shared their joys, struggles, and spiritual insights with one another, and in the safety of these sacred exchanges, genuine connections were made, souls were nourished, and faith was enriched.

May the seeds sown during Intensive 3 continue to bear fruit, enriching the lives of participants and inspiring them to share Christ's love with others.


























