

ESA'S Fine Arts Festival

For several years, ESA artists and musicians have attended the Independent Schools Association of the Southwest's spring Fine Arts Festival to network with other students, perform on music and drama stages, and exhibit artwork. With the ISAS festival cancelled for the second year in a row, the visual and performing arts departments decided to host a fine arts festival in Cade. The event kicked off with the Senior Art Show Reception, which featured classical music played by ESA students. On Saturday, the Cade Campus was transformed into festival grounds complete with art displays; a jazz stage; painting, ceramics, cyanotype, and improv workshops; video screenings; drama and musical theatre performances; a coffeehouse stage; and a final concert on the soccer field.







SPRING ON THE LAFAYETTE CAMPUS

Right: Lower School Head Kathleen O'Shaughnessy issued a design challenge to art teacher Claire Caffery's fifth-grade students. She asked them to create coverage for the windows in the EC workrooms while still allowing in maximum natural light. The students analyzed, researched, sketched, collaborated, communicated, met with clients to get input and direction, prototyped, then created the full scale pieces. The finished products were installed this spring.

Left: In March, fifth-grade students enjoyed two Adventures Days led by staff members from Inside Out, the organization that hosts ESA's eighth-grade wilderness trip in North Carolina. The students learned how to use a compass, how to light a fire, and how to collaborate and solve problems to complete tasks, all in the wooded and less-traveled areas of the Cade Campus.



Right: The first-grade Storm Cluster met with KATC Chief Meteorologist Rob Perillo to better understand local weather phenomena. The students had been researching dangerous weather and storms for weeks. Mr. Perillo answered their questions, showed videos and graphics to help them better understand, and gave them a tour of the weather station and KATC news station. The Storm Cluster shared what they learned by offering safety tips through a slideshow presented in chapel.

Below: The Lafayette Campus participated in Global Play Day, a full day of unstructured play. With this year's event held on May the 4th (be with you), the event became a Galactic Play Day. Students were given the freedom to choose where to play, create, and rest all day long. Options included a fort building area, art stations, quiet places, an outdoor music space full of instruments, classrooms filled with craft supplies, and a movement room with items for active play.



Left: Fifth graders in the Outdoor Classroom Cluster and their team of volunteers cleared an area of the Lafayette Campus near the Vermilion River to serve as an outdoor academic space. 


Story Frantzen is one of 30 Stanford juniors elected to Phi Beta Kappa, the nationwide honor society.


