ABOUT THE AIA AUSTIN DESIGN AWARDS

The AIA Austin Design Awards program recognizes outstanding architectural projects completed by AIA Austin members. Winning work spans a diverse spectrum of project sizes, types, locations, and clients.

Each year, an invited jury of respected design professionals reviews submissions and selects exceptional projects. Compelling submissions are commended for their architectural design, technical ability, environmental response, and/or social impact. Innovation is recognized at multiple scales, from urban strategies down to detail resolution. We will also highlight the importance of sustainable design—the jury may select award winners to also receive a commendation for sustainable design at their discretion.

The jury's selections are announced at the annual Awards Celebration. Winning projects are promoted within the Austin community, cultivating an ongoing public interest in architectural excellence.

AWARD LEVELS | JURORS | CELEBRATION

DESIGN AWARDS LEVELS

The AIA Austin Design Awards program recognizes three levels of achievement and one community award:

Award of Excellence

Project demonstrates the highest level of design, performance, and sustainability.

Award of Merit

Project demonstrates exceptional design and performance and above-average sustainability.

Award of Commendation

Project demonstrates exemplary design and performance as determined by the Jury. A project may also receive a Sustainability Commendation if it demonstrates best-in-class sustainability measures.

Community Impact Award

The Community Impact Award is awarded to a publicly funded project that has a positive impact on the Austin community. Qualifying projects are fully or partially funded by the City of Austin. This award can be given in addition to awards of excellence, merit, or commendation.

AWARD ELIGIBILITY

All Submissions:

- 1. Projects must be submitted in the name of the firm that executed the commission. If that firm has been dissolved or its name has been changed, an individual or successor firm may enter projects under the name of the firm at the time the project was executed.
- 2. Multiple entries of the same project by successor individuals or firms will not be accepted.
- 3. For projects that involve multiple buildings, the architect submitting the project (or a portion thereof) must designate authorship of each portion of the project.

All components are required. The additional information is used to promote the Awards program. All submission materialmust be properly uploaded online via Submittable prior to the deadline. You may submit multiple projects.

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS (1-4)

All Submission Components:

- 1. Do not show any individual's name, the firm's name, or any other identifying information on any submission materials, except as required in Submittable fields and on the Team List.
- 2. Name all files to match the name entered in the Submittable Project Name field and first/title page of the graphic presentation.
- 3. Do not insert spaces into the file name; fill spaces with underscores, e.g. Austin_Housing_Project.pdf.

1) NARRATIVE

- Tell the abbreviated story of the project. Discuss critical issues such as site constraints, design and detail innovations, environmental considerations, context, and history.

- Include one (1) representative image no larger than 5"x7"





3) GRAPHIC PRESENTATION

- First page must be a title page with the Project Name matching all other materials
- First/title page may include additional text or images.
- · Do not include the category.
- Plans must immediately follow the title page. Include, as applicable, a Site Plan and Building Plan.
- Site Plan requirement does not apply to interior projects.
- Include the building plan(s) necessary to describe the building arrangement and envelope.
- · Additional drawings may include elevations, sections, wall sections, details, diagrams, or renderings.
- If including section or elevation drawings, indicate their location on the plans.
- · Include photos to adequately describe the site/building.
- If the project is a restoration or adaptive reuse project, include at least one image that describes conditions before work began.
- Graphic presentations shall not contain any sound, animation, video, interactive graphics, or links to other files.

All Submission Images:

- 1. These images will be used for publication purposes. All images submitted must be copyrighted and cleared for use by the submitter.
- 2. Photo credit must be included for all images.
- 3. Name the images to match the name of the submitted project and, where possible, in an explanatory sequential order as to match the graphic presentation; e.g. Austin_Housing_Project.jpg.

The AIA Austin Design Awards program recognizes architecture and interior architecture of exceptional design and sustainable solutions. It celebrates projects that demonstrate real innovation and commitment on the part of the owner and design team to protect and sustain Austin's past, present, and future environment and resources. Therefore, the AIA Austin Design Awards requires the AIA Common Application for Design Excellence worksheet for all submissions.

The AIA's <u>Framework for Design Excellence</u> represents the defining principles of good design in the 21st century. This Framework is a living document managed by the AIA's Committee on the Environment (COTE) with considerable input and leadership from AIA Austin COTE. Comprised of 10 principles and accompanied by searching questions, the Framework seeks to inform progress toward a zero-carbon, equitable, resilient, and healthy built environment.

All Common App Uploads:

- 1. In the Project Information section, along with indetifying information, please include whether or not your firm is a 2030 Commitment signatory and list any relevant certifications or awards (LEED, Austin Energy Green Building, Living Building Challenge, COTE Top Ten, etc.)
- 2. In the Design for Integration Project Summary Statement, please summarize how your team executed the Measures of Design Excellence in your project.
- 3. Not all 10 Measures are required; however, they are encouraged to demonstrate project performance.

Submitters are encouraged to provide more than the minimum Common App requirements, particularly how the project addresses any or all of the Principles below. Suggested questions for each Principle can be found <u>here</u>.

10 PRINCIPLES OF DESIGN EXCELLENCE

- **1. Design for Integration** Sustainability is essential to design excellence, and vice versa. Give examples of how individual design strategies provide multiple benefits across the full triple bottom line of social, economic, and environmental value.
- **2. Design for Equitable Communities** Sustainability is inextricably tied to the wellness of communities. How does this project contribute to creating a walkable, human-scaled community inside and outside the property lines?
- **3. Design for Ecosystems** Sustainable design protects and benefits natural ecosystems and habitat in the presence of human development.
- **4. Design for Water** Sustainable design conserves and improves the quality of water as a precious resource.
- 5. Design for Economy Providing abundance while living within our means is a fundamental challenge of sustainability.
- **6. Design for Energy** The burning of fossil fuels to provide energy for buildings is a major component of global GHG emissions, driving climate change. Sustainable design conserves energy while improving building performance, function, comfort, and enjoyment.
- **7. Design for Wellbeing** Sustainable design supports comfort, health, and wellness for the people who inhabit or visit buildings.
- **8. Design for Resources** Sustainable design includes the informed selection of materials and products to reduce product-cycle environmental impacts while enhancing building performance.
- **9. Design for Change** Reuse, adaptability, and resilience are essential to sustainable design, which seeks to maintain and enhance usability, functionality, and value over time.
- **10. Design for Discovery** Sustainable design strategies and best practices evolve over time through documented performance and shared knowledge of lessons learned.
