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

Message from the Director of Boarding





Loreto Normanhurst is a leading Sydney independent, Catholic Day and Boarding school for girls from Year 5 to 12.

Established in 1897, the school is part of a worldwide network of Loreto schools under the care of the Loreto Sisters, now formally recognised as members of the Congregatio Jesu (CJ), and is one of six Loreto schools in Australia.

Our foundress, Mary Ward, a devout and pioneering English woman who lived from 1585-1645, believed that, "Women in time to come will do much."

We provide opportunities for young women to grow with confidence and compassion, developing modern-day Mary Wards who are ready to take on the world - wherever that may lead them.

Aims of Boarding

Loreto Normanhurst has a proud history of boarding, established with the foresight of women such as Mother Gonzaga Barry to provide generations of country girls with an education inspired by the vision of Mary Ward, foundress of the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary. A freedom of spirit, a strong sense of justice, and integrity are fostered in our boarders as part of their development as Christian women, encouraging them to make responsible decisions grounded in informed judgement and their faith.

The boarding community provides a home for students from regional New South Wales, other states and territories, and overseas, helping them grow spiritually, socially, emotionally, physically, and intellectually.

Boarding supports the girls' development by:

- Providing opportunities to participate in the expression of their faith.
- Encouraging spiritual, physical, social, emotional, moral, and intellectual growth.
- Fostering respect and harmonious living with others.
- Encouraging boarders to recognise their gifts and share them with the community.
- Promoting self-motivation, resilience, and self-discipline.
- Providing a safe, supportive, and caring environment.

Loreto boarding also aims to ensure boarders are secure in their values and boundaries by:

- Deepening commitment to understanding, tolerance, empathy, compassion, and resilience.
- Encouraging personal responsibility for learning and daily routines.
- Promoting honesty, integrity, and respect for others.
- Establishing high standards of organisation, punctuality, participation, and care for property and personal appearance.
- Developing leadership and teamwork skills.
- Fostering strong connections within the boarding community and the wider Loreto community.

Within the boarding community, girls are welcomed into one of two houses, Babthorpe or Wigmore, which provide additional support for their holistic growth. Babthorpe, named after Barbara Babthorpe, celebrates compassion and unity, while Wigmore, named after Winifred Wigmore, emphasises care and togetherness.

Faith

The Catholic Christian faith is woven into all we do at Loreto Normanhurst. All members of our community are invited to grow in their knowledge and love of God and to embrace the Gospel in ways that are meaningful and life-giving.

Following the model of the Ignatian tradition, we set time apart from the ordinary to strengthen the spiritual, so that we may truly find God in all things. A rich and varied rhythm of prayer and worship is offered across the school, including midday reflection, early morning Communion Services, a compulsory Sunday evening Boarder Mass, celebrations of the Church's liturgical year, and prayer woven intentionally through the life of the school.

Students experience faith in community through regular Primary and House liturgies, which bring families and students together in prayer, reflection and shared experience. These liturgies are celebrated as welcoming and inclusive gatherings, inviting all—regardless of religious affiliation—to engage with Scripture, reflect on its meaning, and deepen a sense of belonging. Grounded in the spirit and legacy of Mary Ward, they reflect her belief in community, dignity and education, and reinforce our commitment to nurturing faith within a supportive and connected school environment.

From 2026, Loreto Normanhurst will offer a Sacramental Program, following a formal agreement with the Diocese of Broken Bay. Catholic students who have not yet received the Sacraments will be invited into the program based on individual need, with the sequence of Confirmation, Reconciliation and Eucharist (First Holy Communion) offered in accordance with diocesan guidelines. Preparation and celebration of the Sacraments will take place at the school, ensuring accessibility and meaningful engagement for both Day and Boarding families. Non-Catholic families are also warmly welcomed to explore Baptism for their daughter, through respectful and considered conversations with the Faith and Mission Team.

Through our Spirituality and Chaplaincy program, students and staff are given time and space to explore faith both individually and collectively. Spirituality Days, Retreats, liturgies and sacramental experiences encourage students to see prayer and service as the source of all they do, supporting them to grow in faith, reflection and purposeful action.

Loreto Normanhurst provides a holistic education in which each student is challenged to develop her curiosity and capacity for self reflection.

A holistic education in accordance with the Loreto Normanhurst Student Growth Model is one that propels students into their futures. It requires them to be active and compassionate community members, to work effectively with peers and teachers, to have a strong faith which guides their decision making and to strive to achieve their personal academic best. This approach delivers outstanding academic outcomes for students, demonstrated in our consistently excellent HSC results.

We aim to encourage our students to be life-long learners and critical thinkers who take ownership of their education and foster a broad, determined vision for the future.

We are committed to engaging students in an ongoing process of proactive planning for life beyond Loreto Normanhurst through our dedicated Careers department.

Our Academic Enrichment Program seeks to meet the needs and celebrate the gifts of all students with the help of a Diverse Learning team, Homework Help and Gifted and Talented Program.

Academic Care in the Boarding School

The Loreto Normanhurst Boarding School provides an environment in which all girls can strive to reach their academic potential. Girls are encouraged to be consistent and reflective learners and to endeavour to set and reach individual academic goals. Our Boarding staff are mindful of the unique educational backgrounds of all our boarders and work to develop close relationships with the girls in their care and encourage and support them in their studies.

There are several staff available to the boarders onsite every evening for study including the Academic Care Coordinator, Homework Helpers, and teaching staff. New boarders in Year 7 to 9 have an Academic Mentor – a leadership position for our senior boarders. In addition to the available staff, we offer our boarders programs to help support them throughout their studies, including the Year 7 Mentor Program and the Homework Help Program which is offered to all boarders Year 7 to 12.

Study is fully supervised across Year 7 to 10 in classrooms close to the Library, while for Year 11 and 12, the girls are given the opportunity to complete their studies in their rooms or in the Library.

PASTORAL CARE

The aim of our strong Pastoral Care program is to know and guide each student to develop optimism, initiative, resilience, confidence and sound judgement in a supportive and connected educational environment.

Each student enjoys a sense of belonging and security in her House, which is led by staff and student leaders and forms the basis of Pastoral Care structures.

The Primary School has three Houses which allows for camaraderie and leadership opportunities.

The Secondary School has eight Houses with a vertical Tutor Group system. A student and her Tutor or Advisor engage in regular one-on-one conversations to encourage reflection on a student's growth.

The school also has a dedicated Pastoral Care leadership team, including the Director of Pastoral Care and Heads of Houses, as well as school counsellors on site.

A key aspect of Pastoral Care at Loreto Normanhurst is the opportunity for student leadership, particularly in Year 5 and 6, and Year 11 and 12. Year 11 leaders choose a cause and facilitate awareness, raising and fundraising for the annual Loreto Day. The elected Year 12 Student Council work alongside staff to promote the Loreto charism in daily student life.

OAKSEED

This bespoke wellbeing program, developed in consultation with leading child psychologist Dr Danielle Einstein, develops five core social and emotional competencies that support learning and development: self-awareness, self-management, responsible decision-making, relationship skills, and social awareness. The OakSeed Program consists of learning experiences delivered holistically within the Integrated, PDHPE and Pastoral curriculums.

'IT TAKES A VILLAGE' - PARENT ENGAGEMENT AND EDUCATION PROGRAM

At Loreto Normanhurst, we know that strong partnerships between school and families are central to student wellbeing and growth. The best academic, social and emotional outcomes are achieved through collaboration, shared understanding and ongoing conversation.

Parents are actively involved in their daughter's learning and pastoral development through regular Plenary Meetings with teachers and Tutors/Advisors. Our It Takes a Village Parent Engagement and Education Program supports this partnership through a series of expert-led seminars and workshops designed to keep families connected and informed.

In 2026, the program includes IT and Communication drop-in workshops, offering practical guidance on our digital platforms, alongside wellbeing sessions led by school counsellors to support the growth and development of every student. Together, these initiatives reflect our shared commitment to working in partnership with families to nurture confident, capable young women.



PASTORAL SUPPORT IN BOARDING

Within the Boarding School, there is a strong culture of security and social connectedness, and a positive outlook is actively encouraged and fostered. With our Pastoral Care structure, we aim to make boarders feel that they have outstanding opportunities for social, emotional, and academic growth, while being supported to develop into independent, mature, creative, and confident young women.

The Boarding Leadership Team consists of the Director of Boarding and the Dean of Boarding. This team provides strategic direction and oversees programs that support boarders' academic and pastoral growth and development.

The broader boarding team includes the Boarding Heads of Year, who provide care and leadership for each year group. Each Head of Year also manages a specific portfolio area, ensuring that house culture and student wellbeing are actively supported across both boarding houses:

- Year 7 – Recreation Program
- Year 8 – Community Engagement
- Year 9 – Cultural Programs
- Year 10 – Babthorpe
- Year 11 – Academic Care
- Year 12 – Wigmore

The introduction of the Boarding Manager (Operations) role strengthens the operational and pastoral oversight of our boarding facilities. This live-in role ensures the smooth running of the Boarding School during term time and non-term time.

Other essential staff include dormitory Coordinators and Boarding Assistants, who work closely with boarders to provide a safe and secure environment, alongside office staff and the Nursing Team.

The Boarding House system continues to provide a strong sense of community. While pastoral care is now coordinated by year group portfolios rather than by house, Babthorpe and Wigmore Houses maintain their unique identity and traditions, with house activities, culture, and community experiences carefully supported.

At the beginning of each year, parents are provided with a list of key contacts should they have any concerns regarding their daughter's wellbeing or boarding experience.

McCabe House, opening in 2026, will provide modern living and study spaces, vibrant social programs, and dedicated pastoral support to further enhance the boarding experience.

TRANSITION TO BOARDING & ORIENTATION PROCESS

The following programs are just some of the supports in place to assist your daughter to settle into boarding.

Prior to Term One:

Orientation Handbook - your daughter will receive a comprehensive 'Preparing for Boarding' Handbook to prepare her for the start of her boarding journey.

We value our partnership with families and the following supports are in place to ensure a seamless transition to boarding for both the student and her parents. New Year 7 boarders are welcomed into our community by the current Year 6 students, who will become their classmates in Year 7. This is a fun and relaxed way to meet each other and become acquainted with the school.

They also enjoy a sleepover experience in the Boarding School to become familiar with the boarding experience. In this orientation, students and their families are made aware of the support services available, as well as more practical arrangements such as uniform fittings.

Start of Term One:

A vibrant buddy system providing inter-year relationships between the Day and Boarding School, guidance and friendly support from the get-go!

A mentoring program to find connection with a senior boarder who acts as an 'older sister' within the boarding community.

Around the clock access to our Counselling service, a team of professionals who remain connected to your daughters throughout their journey at Loreto. Your daughter will meet the team to learn about the services available to them as a Loreto Normanhurst boarder.

COMMUNICATION

We know our boarders and their parents love to stay in touch. There are several ways to keep in touch throughout the year.

Boarding School Communication

There are many communication channels the school uses to connect with our boarder families.

Boarder Parent Committee

The Boarder Parent Committee consists of parent representatives, the Principal and Director of Boarding, and facilitates communication, updates and suggestions, as well as social functions.

Boarder Facebook Group

Parents and boarders are invited to become members of the Boarder Facebook group to keep up to date with photos and activities.

Loreto Normanhurst has a strict mobile phone policy, and the Boarding School has additional policies in place around the use of mobile phones, laptops and other smart devices, as well as policies around social media use and technology free times.

Extra-Curricular

WE LEARN TO TAKE A DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVE

At Loreto Normanhurst, boarders are encouraged to discover where they can thrive both inside and outside the classroom. Our extensive extra-curricular program — the “E” in our FACE Curriculum — empowers students to think creatively, act with empathy, and embrace challenge with confidence.

Through participation in a wide range of academic, artistic, sporting, cultural and service opportunities, boarders develop resilience, teamwork, and leadership, while learning to see the world from different perspectives. Whether exploring a new interest or refining a long-held passion, each boarder is supported to pursue experiences that bring joy, growth, and purpose.

The School also supports students competing or performing at elite levels across sport, music, dance, oratory, and other disciplines, ensuring they are able to balance excellence with wellbeing and academic success.

Boarders balance their academic pursuits with a variety of extra-curricular activities, including debating, oratory, arts, music, and sport. Leadership opportunities are available through the Boarder Council, Chapel Ensemble, Table Heads, Academic Mentors, and other student-led initiatives.

WEEKEND PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES FOR BOARDERS

Commitment Weekend

Commitment Weekend is a cornerstone of the Boarding School culture. Held on the first weekend of the school year, all boarders and staff participate in community-building activities. Leave is not granted during this weekend.

Community Weekends - Term Two - Four

Community Weekends strengthen the culture of the Boarding School through engaging activities, excursions, and events. Parents are provided dates well in advance. All boarders are required to remain at school from Friday across the weekend, except for Sport Leave.

Recreation Program (Year 7 & 8)

Year 7 and 8 boarders participate in a compulsory Recreation Program on weekends. Activities are designed to be fun, inclusive, and social, helping younger boarders form friendships and make lasting memories. Termly activity plans are communicated to families in advance.

Activities Program (Year 7 to 12)

On selected weekends, optional activities are organised for all boarders to participate in, offering additional opportunities for connection, creativity, and exploration. Families receive details at the end of each term.

Saturday Sport

Sport is compulsory for Years 7–10 boarders and is a vital part of school culture. A wide range of sporting options is available, most requiring a Saturday morning commitment. Leave from boarding does not exempt boarders from attending sport, and they are responsible for arranging their own transport, with support from day families encouraged where possible.

Weekend Leave

Leave outside of the above weekends may be granted at the discretion of the Director of Boarding. Requests are evaluated for safety and suitability, with the wellbeing of all boarders as a priority. The Boarding School uses an electronic leave management system, REACH, accessible to parents, boarders, and staff.

Our Campus

Set on Sydney's leafy Upper North Shore and spanning more than 25 acres on the edge of bushland, Loreto Normanhurst is a harmonious blend of heritage and contemporary architecture. Our spacious grounds provide an inspiring environment in which boarders live, learn, connect and grow.

The campus features beautiful ovals and gardens, playgrounds, tennis and basketball courts, a Gymnasium and Fitness Centre, and an Aquatic Centre with a 25-metre indoor pool. Purpose-built learning environments support all areas of study, including modern Science and Integrated Learning facilities, flexible multi-purpose spaces in the Gonzaga Barry Centre, and specialist precincts for Technologies, Music, Visual Arts and Drama. Students also have access to the Senior and Primary Libraries, housing extensive collections of fiction, non-fiction and digital resources.

From 2026, our boarding community will be housed in McCabe House, a new state-of-the-art facility named in honour of Sister Bruno McCabe IBVM, one of the pioneering Sisters who helped establish the school in 1897. The four-level building provides contemporary, flexible residential and communal spaces for 216 boarders, designed to foster independence, creativity, wellbeing and strong community connections.

Sustainability and environmentally responsible design have been central to the project, ensuring a modern home that reflects Loreto Normanhurst's commitment to care for both students and the environment.

All building developments at Loreto Normanhurst are undertaken strategically and guided by the 30-Year Master Plan, ensuring the campus continues to evolve in line with curriculum innovation and educational best practice — blending innovation with our rich Loreto heritage to provide inspiring spaces in which students can thrive.

Health Centre

Student wellbeing is supported through the Mary Ward Health and Wellness Centre, which is open from 8:00am until the end of the school day (Monday to Friday). The Centre is staffed by three Registered Nurses, five School Counsellors and a First Aid qualified receptionist. The Nurses provide first aid to students and staff daily and are available for advice in person or over the phone.

For boarders, the Health Centre offers after-hours support until 9:00pm Monday to Friday, and for limited hours on weekends, ensuring care and guidance beyond the school day.

Loreto Normanhurst is delighted to welcome boarders to McCabe House, our new state-of-the-art Boarding House, opening in 2026. Named in honour of Sister Bruno McCabe IBVM, one of the pioneering Sisters who helped establish the school in 1897, McCabe House blends contemporary design with the enduring values of care, community, and connection that define Loreto Normanhurst boarding life.

The four-level facility provides a modern, nurturing home for 216 boarders. It features flexible and inviting communal spaces, including multiple common rooms with lounge and TV areas, games spaces, and small kitchen areas for social cooking. A large dining room enables students to share meals together, while day students also have access during the day. Dedicated quiet areas, including a study hub, music rehearsal rooms, and outdoor teaching spaces, support reflection, learning, and wellbeing.

McCabe House has been designed with sustainability and accessibility in mind, ensuring a safe and comfortable environment for all students. Family-friendly spaces, including a welcoming lounge, allow parents and guardians to spend time with their daughters in a comfortable setting, strengthening the home-away-from-home experience.

The new Boarding House also supports the broader school community, offering social, recreational, and learning spaces that enrich the friendships, opportunities, and experiences available to all students. With contemporary accommodation for boarding staff and thoughtfully planned living spaces, McCabe House represents the next chapter in Loreto Normanhurst’s long tradition of nurturing confident, connected, and compassionate young women.



Our Master Plan

Loreto Normanhurst has developed a 30-Year Master Plan to guide the strategic growth of the campus, aiming to increase student capacity incrementally by 850 students by 2047. The plan ensures that buildings and spaces evolve in line with contemporary learning needs while remaining ecologically sensitive and reflective of Loreto's heritage and values.

The Master Plan gradually redevelops or replaces current buildings to create an innovative, unified, and sustainable campus that nurtures community, curiosity, and holistic student development. Recent milestones include:

- **2022:** Completion of collaborative learning spaces in the Mary Ward Centre, opening of St Michael's Tennis Courts, and a new traffic management system.
- **2023:** Unveiling of Osborn Orchards, our Agricultural Technologies Centre, reflecting our commitment to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM).
- **2024–2026:** Construction and completion of McCabe House, our new state-of-the-art Boarding House for 216 students, alongside upgrades to the School Oval. The completion of McCabe House marks a new era of contemporary boarding, providing modern, flexible, and sustainable residential spaces for our students.

PHASE TWO: OPENING DOORS TO INFINITE POSSIBILITIES

Phase Two represents a bold, future-focused investment in learning over the next five to ten years. Central to this vision is the creation of fit-for-purpose, contemporary spaces that inspire curiosity, creativity, and collaboration.

Key initiatives include:

- **Technologies Precinct:** State-of-the-art spaces for Hospitality, Food Technology, Design & Technology, Digital Technology, and Textiles & Design.
- **Music Precinct:** Consolidated and upgraded music learning spaces to support our growing music and performance programs.
- **Expanded General and Open Learning Spaces:** Designed to accommodate increasing demand and contemporary teaching practices.
- **Repurposing the current Boarding School:** Unlocking spaces to create additional classrooms, open learning areas, and a staff lounge, optimising the campus for future needs.

With the completion of McCabe House and ongoing developments in Phase Two, Loreto Normanhurst is delivering on its vision for a unified, future-ready campus — blending innovation, heritage, and sustainability to empower students as confident, capable, and compassionate leaders of tomorrow.



Bursaries and Scholarships

At Loreto Normanhurst, we are committed to ensuring that a Mary Ward education is accessible to students from all walks of life. Thanks to the generosity of donors, our Bursary and Scholarship programs open the doors to the exceptional learning, facilities, and supportive community of Loreto Normanhurst for girls who might not otherwise have the opportunity to attend our School.

We offer a number of scholarships and bursaries each year for students entering Years 7 to 11, with opportunities for both day and boarding students.

Equity Scholarships

Equity Scholarships (formerly known as Bursaries) provide financial support to students who may otherwise face barriers to accessing a Loreto Normanhurst education. These scholarships are means-tested and may cover tuition and/or boarding fees, with the level of support tailored to each family's circumstances.

Applications for an Equity Scholarship can only be submitted once the enrolment process has been successfully completed. Families interested in applying can indicate their interest either on the Application for Enrolment or when the scholarship application period opens.

First Nations Scholarships

Loreto Normanhurst also offers First Nations Scholarships to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students entering Year 7 as boarders. These scholarships support students to maximise their educational outcomes while participating in the School's First Nations Program.

Supported through generous donations and our partnership with the Australian Indigenous Education Foundation (AIEF), these scholarships may cover tuition, boarding fees, and incidental expenses, and can be either full or partial. Assessment includes financial need alongside the criteria used for Equity Scholarships.

Samantha Mar Scholarship

The Samantha Mar Scholarship is a perpetual award made possible through the generosity of the Farrell Family Foundation, honouring Samantha Mar ('93) and her legacy of academic excellence, leadership, and engagement in school life and social justice.

This scholarship is awarded to a student entering Year 7 who demonstrates high academic potential, leadership skills, and active participation in extra-curricular and social justice initiatives. Consideration is also given to family financial circumstances and alignment with Catholic values and the ethos of Loreto Normanhurst.

The Samantha Mar Scholarship is awarded every six years, with the next award scheduled for 2030.

The following information is the standard process to follow for enrolment at Loreto Normanhurst. Boarder applications are given preference in Year 7 to 11 and families are encouraged to contact the Enrolments Team for entry outside these guidelines.

Our main intake year for Boarding is Year 7. We welcome applications for entry to other cohorts dependent on availability and at the Principal's discretion. We commence with the enrolment process a little over two years in advance for our Year 7 intake; and one year in advance for all other years. We encourage all families to apply as early as possible to secure a place on our waiting list.

Applications are subject to availability at all stages of the enrolment process. Priority is given to alumnae, to those with sisters already attending, and to country boarders.

How to Apply

1 Application

We encourage the early submission of applications (accepted from birth).

The Application for Admission form must be completed and submitted together with the student's Birth Certificate and Australian Proof of Citizenship (if applicable) and payment of the non-refundable Application Fee for the student to be placed on the Waitlist.



2 Interview | 📅 December - March

Two years prior to year of entry, families may be invited to attend an interview with the Principal or a member of the Leadership Team.



3 Offer | 📅 February - April

Upon successful completion of the interview process, offers of places are made, subject to availability and at the discretion of the Principal.



4 Acceptance of Offer

Parents will then be given the opportunity to accept an Offer of Confirmed Enrolment by signing the Acceptance of Enrolment Agreement and paying the non-refundable Enrolment Fee.
