Community Comes Together to Serve 1,000 Hot Meals in Channelview, Texas

In the aftermath of Hurricane Beryl, Sewa International partnered with seven other organizations to pack and distribute over 1,000 hot meals to those in need at the Praise Christian Church in Channelview, Texas, on July 14 as the community could not access clean drinking water and lacked power. The event was spearheaded by high school LEADs, who demonstrated exceptional leadership and organizational skills in bringing the community together.

Partners in this initiative included Praise Christian Church, Houston Responds, the American Society of Indian Engineers (ASIE), Lubrizol Volunteers, and the Houston Police Department officers. Each organization played a vital role in making the event a success.

Sewa volunteers packed and distributed the meals prepared by "Just the Crumbs Disaster Relief Ministries" into to-go boxes,

managed car lines, and delivered food to the local neighborhood.

In the wake of Hurricane Beryl's devastating impact, the volunteers have been working tirelessly to support affected communities across the city. The hurricane, which made landfall on July 8, has resulted in 36 fatalities, affected two million people, and caused an estimated \$3.3 billion in damages.

Sewa's relief efforts began immediately, with volunteers responding to calls from those stranded without power and food. Upon reviewing the initial efforts, Arun Kankani, President of Sewa International, said, "We have made progress, but there is still much work to be done. We urge the community to support our efforts through our Facebook fundraising campaign or by donating through our website."

Sewa Supports Hollyoak Retirement Center

Volunteers began their efforts when Brooks Spangler, Community Disaster Program Manager at the American Red Cross of Georgia, reached out to Sewa about the dire situation at the Hollyoak Retirement Center on July 11. Within hours, they delivered hot meals donated by Maharaja Bhog, a Houston-based restaurant and food vendor, to the affected seniors.

Sewa's relief efforts began a day before the storm, with volunteers sharing non-emergency phone lines with the community, gathering emergency supplies, and preparing families for the impending disaster. During the storm, they alerted residents to evacuate, avoid damaged buildings and power lines, and consume safe water and food.

In the aftermath of the storm, Sewa volunteers worked tirelessly to reach out to families without power, delivering ice to help them cope with the heat and sharing information on roofing contractors and cooling shelters.

"I want to thank the many Sewa volunteers who are helping others despite facing challenges at their own homes, such as power outages and roof leaks," said President Arun Kankani, Sewa International. "Their selfless dedication is a testament to the spirit of community and compassion."











Stranded Students Get Aid after Hurricane Beryl

Within hours of receiving the call, Sewa volunteers mobilized to set up a hot meal table, providing much-needed sustenance to the students, who were not only without power but also unable to venture out for food due to the severe weather conditions.

Furthermore, Sewa offered a two-night accommodation with power to over twenty students at a nearby facility, relieving them from the heat-related stress they were enduring.

The Houston Chronicle Recognizes Sewa for Outstanding Efforts





Uttarakhand Villages Get Healthcare

The Sewa Mobile Medical Unit (MMU) travels 24 days a month, reaching over 300 villages to provide essential medical services directly to residents' doorsteps in the hilly terrain of Uttarakhand, India, where hospital access can be challenging.

The MMU offers a range of primary healthcare services, including blood tests, X-rays, and ECGs, ensuring timely checkups and referrals to hospitals in emergencies. Specialized services include eye care, dental care, women's health, general check-ups, BMI assessments, prenatal and postnatal tests, pathology, and Ayurvedic treatment. Villagers also receive basic medications for a nominal fee. This initiative serves a broad demographic, from infants to senior citizens, ensuring that even the most remote communities can access essential healthcare.

Chicago LEADs Cohort Makes Significant Impact

The 2024 cohort of Sewa Chicago's LEAD program, comprising 132 participants, contributed over 3,000 hours of service on June 28. Their efforts included mulching the land in a local park.

The activities of the LEADs cohort spanned a wide range of areas, including environmental protection, security, education, and support for family shelters.

Besides their service work, the participants enjoyed holistic activities like yoga and meditation, with career support.
