

Louisville Elementary School recently celebrated a momentous achievement as it was honored with the 1,000,000th book from the 2nd & 7 Foundation. The special book, The Hog Mollies and The Fall Fireworks Festival, was presented to the school as part of the foundation's ongoing partnership with Walsh University. This honor comes on the Leopards' 10th year of collaboration with Walsh University and 2nd & 7, marking a decade of fostering a love for reading among Louisville's young students.

The 2nd & 7 Foundation, established in 1999 by former Ohio State University football players Luke Fickell, Ryan Miller, and Mike Vrabel, has given away more than 1,000,000 books to children in need across the country. Their mission to promote literacy continues to grow, and Louisville Elementary School's longstanding relationship with the foundation and Walsh University made it the perfect recipient of this milestone recognition.

Throughout the past decade, Walsh University athletes have volunteered their time to visit Louisville Elementary several times a year, reading from the Hog Mollies series of books and engaging students with fun, educational activities. These visits have helped to build a connection between the students and athletes, encouraging a love for both reading and community involvement.

The celebration on Thursday, October 24, featured special guests, including the founder and director of 2nd & 7, who joined the Louisville Elementary students and staff for a memorable event. The school's Hog Mollie friends made an appearance, adding to the excitement. In a special presentation, the 1,000,000th book was placed in the school's display case, where it will remain a proud reminder of the achievement for years to come.

A heartfelt thank you goes out to everyone who has contributed to this incredible program over the past 10 years. The impact of the 2nd & 7 Foundation's commitment to literacy and the support from Walsh University have made a lasting difference in the lives of our students.

Louisville Elementary School is honored to be part of such a fantastic initiative and looks forward to continuing this tradition for years to come!

OUR STUDENTS EARN HIGH MARKS

Twenty-two students from Louisville High School have earned AP Scholar Awards in recognition of their exceptional achievement on AP Exams.

The College Board's Advanced Placement Program® (AP®) provides willing and academically prepared students with the opportunity to take rigorous college-level courses while still in high school - allowing students to earn college credit, advanced placement, or both for successful performance on the AP Exams. Students in Ohio who take a College Board Advanced Placement examination and score at least a 3 are guaranteed college credit, usually towards their general education curriculum, upon entering an Ohio Public Institution of Higher Education.


Louisville High School offers ten AP courses for the 2024-2025 school year: AP Art & Design, AP Calculus, AP English Language, AP English Literature, AP Physics, AP Music Theory, AP European History, AP Government and Politics, AP Psychology, and AP U.S. History.

The College Board recognizes several levels of achievement based on students' performance on AP Exams through AP Scholar Awards.

Christopher Anna, Benjamin Balough, Austin Beck, Elizabeth Kandel, and Zachary Hallam qualified for the AP Scholar with Distinction Award by earning an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams.

Four students qualified for the AP Scholar with Honor Award by earning an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams.

NOURISHING OUR STUDENTS ONE **MEAL AT A TIME**

Federal laws and regulations require school food authorities to make reasonable accommodations to children whose disability restricts their diet.

o make this happen

What we need from parents and guardians is a medical statement signed by a State licensed health professional which states:

- Information about the child's physical or mental impairment that is sufficient to allow us to understand how it restricts the child's diet
- An explanation of what must be done to accommodate the child's diet
- The food or foods to be omitted and recommended alternative, if appropriate

We work closely with our school nurses, who help keep us informed when they receive such medical statements.

We also appreciate the close contact we have with parents and guardians. We can work with them on a case-by-case basis.

Each child is different, and there usually isn't a one-size-fits-all approach. The more information we have, the better as it will help us make accommodations that our students can eat.





Louisville High School recently had the honor of hosting Pro Football Hall of Famer Charles Haley, who graciously accepted a special project created by the school's inclusion woodshop class. The project—a refurbished display shelf for the Pro Football Hall of Fame—came to life after the Hall's Senior Director of Hospitality and Events reached out to woodshop teacher Mr. Hoffman with the unique request.

The shelf, which was originally destined for the trash in broken pieces, was rescued and meticulously restored by the talented students in the inclusion class. These students, who face daily challenges that would typically make a project of this scale difficul worked alongside peer mentors to complete the restoration in record time. Their hard work resulted in a beautifully refurbished shelf, now ready to be showcased at the Hall of Fame's events.





During his visit, Charles Haley addressed the entire student body, sharing words of wisdom and encouragement. He also held a special session with the football team, where he inspired the students with his message: "Set your own course, your own dreams, your own desires, and never lower your standards of greatness." Haley also opened up about his personal struggles with mental health, delivering a powerful message: "If you need help, ask for it. There is nothing wrong with mental illness unless you don't ask for help."
