## Lee Garrett new public works director

At Monday night's County Council meeting, Council chairman Billy Norris introduced Lee Garrett as the County's new director of public works.

Garrett, formerly the mayor of Calhoun Falls, was also sworn in by Norris as a County code enforcement officer.

County Director David Garner praised Garrett on Tuesday as someone well qualified for the job.

County Council passed third reading of an ordinance to approve for the sale of approximately 23.69 acres, previously listed as 25.46 acres, located off South Carolina Highway 72 in Calhoun Falls in Abbeville County. Council had first reading on two ordinances. All first readings are read into the record by the chairman, and a vote is not necessary, per Ordinance 05-11. These ordinances included the following:

Ordinance 2021-11 to amend the County zoning map for a parcel of land of approximately two acres located at 20 Wooden Bridge Road, from Forest Residential.

Ordinance 2021-12 to emend the Zoning Map for a parcel of land of approximately nine acres located at 741 East Greenwood Street, from Restricted Residential to General

Commercial.

Council also Monday

--Passed a resolution to authorize the expenditure of accommodations tax monies as recommended by the accommodations tax committee.

--Passed a resolution authorizing the County Director to enter into a purchase agreement with Axon Enterprises, Inc., for the purchase of 16 Axon Bodycam 3 and other equipment not to exceed \$57,284.93.

--Passed a resolution authorizing the County Director to enter into a purchase agreement with Vic Bailey Ford for the purchase of three 2022 Ford F150 vehicles for Building Codes and County Mechanic not to exceed \$81,813.

The money is coming from revenue from a General Obligation Bond.

--Passed a resolution authorizing the County Director to enter into a purchase agreement with Computer Consultants & Merchants, Inc., for the purchase of 32 Verkada cameras to be installed Agricultural to General in the Detention Center in the additional money from the amount not to exceed \$68,940.

Council also voted to appoint Donald Burton to the GLEAMNS board.

Following an executive session, Council came back into open session. Council member James McCord made a motion to authorize the County Director to enter into a contract with AT&T for cell phone services for the County employees.

Council member Jason Bonds seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

In other matters Monday night, Norris praised County employees who worked together in the aftermath of the heavy rains. "We have an outstanding crew," he said.

Garner said during his County Director's report that as many as a dozen County roads have been closed or damaged.

Abbeville County Council voted Monday night to amend the accommodations tax committee recommendations to give the Lake Russell Recreation and Tourism Coalition \$2,000 more, and to take the City of Abbeville's expenditure.

Every year Council distributes money gained from an accommodations tax to organizations which use it typically for the en-

## Community Night at Career Center in September enormously successful

Good things have been happening at the Abbeville County Career Center.

The Career Center, located on the Old Calhoun Falls Highway on the outskirts of Abbeville, recently presented its annual Community Night/Industry Showcase program on Sept. 27.

This has become a late September tradition, and it provides an opportunity for the public to check out what the Career Center has to offer in terms of courses, and to highlight local industries.

The Career Center is the Abbeville County School District's center for technical education, and representatives of its course offerings were on hand to greet the public.

The Career Center has eight programs, including cosmetology, carpentry/ building construction, welding, automotive technology, culinary arts, health science, Project Lead the Way,

a pre-engineering program, firefighting, and information technology, according to Dorinda Bell, Career Center director.

"We have 123 students," she said, noting that the Career Center welcomes students from Abbeville, Dixie and Calhoun Falls Charter, and McCormick high schools, as well as home school and private school students.

Community Night, meanwhile, was a chance to have fun as well as to learn about educational opportunities.

Providing entertainment was Rockin' Robin Music Show, featuring a DJ, and opportunities for karaoke.

There were "inflatables for the kids, and free hot dogs and chips for all persons who registered," she said. In addition, there were representatives of various agencies, organizations, and industries, such as Prysmian, ACS Manufacturing, and WCTEL, just to

name a few.

Piedmont Tech was also represented. "Actually they brought 14 different departments," she said. "They were well represented."

Others included Great Clips, Liyahs Luxury Hair Studios, Holston Air and Gas, Self Regional Healthcare, Bakers Creek State Park, Hickory Knob State Park, Calhoun Falls State Park, Abbeville County voter registration, Abbeville County 911, Abbeville County animal services, Abbeville County School District food and nutrition department, Abbeville County School District adult education and the Wheels of Time car show.

Bell said that this year's Community Night was well-attended, and quite successful.

There were 248 people in attendance who registered, Bell continued.

## **Knowing God**

my help and my deliverer; do not delay, O my God."

A father relates this story about his five year old son who wondered about his pastor's theology one Sunday morning. His son, Paul, was seated near the front with his parents. The pastor was preaching away, and exhorting people to a deeper understanding of God and to a stronger commitment to Him and the church. In an attempt to sound profound, the pastor paused, leaned forward over the pulpit, and raised a rhetorical question: "And God-who is God?" In the hush of the moment, Paul looked up at his father and, loud enough to be heard by

Well, in this passage of Scripture in the way David expresses himself, he most surely does know God. He is well aware of the character of God. Three thoughts come to my mind from this passage of Scripture. The first one is that David recognized his need. He states that "he is poor and needy..." yet the Lord thought about him. That means God knew his present

day, Dad, doesn't he know?"

condition, God took notice of his poor and needy condition. Dear one, the world may not pay much attention to the poor and needy, but God sure does. Listen to what God said about that in Exodus 22:22-24 "You shall not afflict any widow or fatherless child. If you afflict them in any way and they cry at all unto me, I will surely hear their cry; and my wrath will become hot, and I will kill you with the sword; your wives shall be widows and your children fatherless." As you can see from that passage, God is very much aware of the plight of the poor and needy. David recognizes his condition and he is humble. Some folks recognize their need but they do not humble themselves before the Lord. 1 Peter 5:6 "therefore humble yourself under the mighty hand of God that He may exalt you in due time."

Secondly this was a recognition of the One who could meet that need. David knew that God was the only one who could help him in his poor and needy condition.

David knew that if God did not help him then he would not be helped. Folks, our nation needs to recognize that the only one who can help us out of the mess we are in is God. ## John de la Howe president Tim Keown speaks at CF Chamber event

The Governor's School of Agriculture at John de la Howe is unique in the United States, said school president Tim Keown in a presentation at the Calhoun Fall Chamber of Commerce banquet Thursday night.

It is one of three Governor's Schools in South Carolina. The others include the Governor's School for Science and Math in Hartsville, and the Governor's School for Arts and Humanities in Greenville.

John de la Howe is the only residential high school devoted to agriculture in the United States, he said. It is the latest incarnation of a school whose roots go all the way back to 1797, when Dr. John de la Howe made provisions in his will for an agricultural seminary for poor boys and poor girls.

Providing a thumbnail sketch of the school's history, Keown noted that following its founding by the physician John de la Howe the school served different purposes at different times--an orphanage and a school for troubled

John de la Howe opened as a School for Agriculture in August of 2020 with 31 students. The students come from various locations throughout South Carolina.

"We had a very successful year," said Keown, noting

that De la Howe teams won championships in events such as livestock judging. And the enrollment has

risen, he said. "We now have 61 students," he said. Keown painted a positive picture of life at De la Howe. "All of our core

classes are on an honors level," he said. In addition, students have chores before and after school. De la Howe does not offer football, but it does offer agriculture-related

activities such as rodeo, and the school also has teams in such endeavors as livestock showing, bass fishing, and shotgun shooting. He touched on some neg-

ative publicity the school received several months ago, and the state audited the school's books, and everything was found to be clear, he said.

At John de la Howe, which also maintains a herd of cattle, students are responsible for breeding animals. "We're raising our own pigs now," he said.

There is also a forestry program at the school, whose staff is highly qualified. "We have three PhDs on our staff," he said, noting that most of the other teachers have masters degrees.

John de la Howe has 12 dormitories and nine residential advisors as well as a small business office. "We have 12 day stu-

dents," he said. Last year, the school had a very successful plant sale, as well as an Ag Fest, with more than 500 exhibitors and a 5K event. which last year featured 96 runners.

John de la Howe, which has three miles of shoreline on Lake Thurmond, recently signed a memorandum of agreement with South Carolina State to support each other in educational activities.

The Governor's School for Agriculture has a number of goals--both short term and long-term.

One of those is to increase enrollment. "Our goal is to have 100 students," he said. Keown would also like

to see additional sports teams, such as that of baseball.

One long term goal is to develop the Lake Thurmond shoreline.

De la Howe plans to grad-

uate 24 students this year with Governor Henry Mc-Master to be the keynote speaker.

Students who want to apply to John de la Howe need to have a 2.8 GPA, and three letters of recommendation.

A Clemson graduate, Keown grew up on a farm in the Iva area, and student taught at Abbeville High School in 2004.

The John de la Howe president was introduced by Calhoun Falls Mayor Chris Cowan, and he spoke to a group of about 50 people.

It was the first time he and his family had seen the Stones.


"We bought the tickets for the concert in 2019, I think, then they postponed due to COVID," said Tom.

## County Council

## Proposed ordinance sparks discussion

### By Henry E. Green

Aproposed ordinance concerning ambulance service and an EMS fee stimulated considerable discussion among County Council members Monday night at the County Council meeting. Council held a public hearing and passed second reading on an ordinance to authorize intergovernmental agreements with the City of Abbeville, the Town of Due West, the Town of Lowndesville, the Town of Honea Path, the Town of Donalds, the Town of Ware Shoals, and the Town of Calhoun Falls for the provision of ambulance services, and to authorize the County to charge the public safety/ EMS fee, formerly the public safety fee, to defray the cost of providing ambulance services in Abbeville County.

During the discussion which preceded the vote,

County Attorney Lee Roper explained that the new measure provides for the public safety/ EMS fee to be used to pay for ambulance service within the county.

The proposed ordinance changes the name of the fee, but the fee amount remains the same, and the budget remain the same.

Services previously paid for through the public safety/EMS fee will now be paid for through the general fund, said Abbeville County Director David Garner.

These services include Abbeville County E-911 and a small portion of the detention center budget, Garner said Tuesday.

"There's no net loss or gain either way," he said.

The amount the emergency services budget will be reduced in the general fund will be balanced by the public safety/EMS fee.

The proposed ordinance is in response to insuring the current fees reflect the constitutional language as passed by the General Assembly.

Council members Charles Goodwin and Drew Simpson voted in opposition during second reading.

Also, during the public hearing, Council heard from Mack Beaty, who was curious as to what the ordinance aimed to do.

He called on Council to do more to explain, in simple terms, proposed ordinanc-

"Tell us what's going on,"

He noted that the Association of Counties suggested giving members of the media and the local library agenda packets.

"The word we're looking for is 'transparency,'" he said.

Mennonites have, from their roots in the Anabaptist movement during the Reformation, been a people of

"A forgiving love in all of life: this ideal has resulted in most groups through the centuries refusing to participate in war--any war," write Merle and Phyllis Goode in 20 Most Asked Questions about the Amish and Mennonites.

"Peace is a way of life-with one's family, church members, neighbors and all human beings everywhere in the world," they write.

Here in Abbeville County,

Wendell Hochstetler concurred.

"We as Mennonites are conscientious objectors and we are this because of the teachings of Jesus where He asks us to Love our enemies and do good to those who mistreat us," he said in an email Friday.

"There are many commands in the New Testament that teach this lifestyle and we are simply following what Jesus asks us to do. I can give you much more information on this if you

"Most Mennonites would not serve in the military even in non-combat roles. However, we do help in government programs outside of the military as long as it does not violate Jesus' teachings.

"Along with this belief we do not file lawsuits or take people to court but rather deal with these situations outside of court. We also feel we cannot participate with jury duty and ask to be exempt. We will attend and be there for the duration of the court hearing but rather not be a part of the jury decision."

"We want to honor and glorify the Lord Jesus Christ in all we do. We are not a perfect people and do not feel we are the only church but only follow Christ's teaching."

One long-term goal is that of a ninth grade "virtual academy," which John de la Howe president Tim Keown says is in the planning

"This is in the long range plans to create," he said in an email Friday. "We are in the infant stages of developing this program. Since we do not allow 9th grade residential students, we are going to develop a 9th grade virtual academy for students across the state. This will

begin to funnel those students to our school rather than going to their home school first then coming here in 10th grade."

Also in the planning stages is a "magnet school" for tourism and culinary arts.

"We are also developing this program as a part of our long term goals for the school. We would like to combine agriculture with tourism which are SC's two largest industries. Within this program, we would also recruit the state's top students who are interested in becoming a chef or enter into the tourism industry.

With agri-tourism and "farm to table" restaurants on the rise, we want our students to be the front-runners for this expanding business. Our students could be a part of the entire economy, from raising products on the farm to preparing for the consumers on their table."

The school is officially called the South Carolina Governor's School for Agriculture at John de la Howe.

# Dixie achieves lofty high school ranking

Dixie High School, in a ranking based on 20-21 school year test scores, is ranked #18 out of the 225 high schools in South Carolina, according to SchoolDigger.com, said Dixie principal Paul Prescott.

"Nine of the schools above us are nontraditional schools that have restrictive admission requirements," he said. "Dixie is different from these schools because we enroll all students living in our attendance zone. With that being considered, this puts us in the top ten of all traditional high schools in the state of South Carolina. This is a significant accomplishment considering school year."

The district leadership teams should be commended for keeping the schools open when many districts went to 100% online learning, according to the principal.
