## UNDERSTANDING OBESITY: CAUSES, COMPLICATIONS, AND TREATMENT OPTIONS

#### What is obesity?

Obesity is a condition characterized by excessive body weight. It is commonly assessed using the Body Mass Index (BMI), which is a calculation based on your weight-to-height ratio.

#### **BMI Categories**

BMI < 18: Underweight

BMI 18-24: Normal range

BMI 25-29: Overweight

BMI ≥ 30: Obesity

#### What are the complications that can happen with obesity?

Obesity can affect nearly every organ in the body and lead to a wide range of health problems, including:

- Increased risk of heart attacks and strokes
- High blood pressure
- Fatty Liver
- · Obstructive sleep apnea
- Increased uric acid levels
- · Joint problems and osteoarthritis
- Spinal problems

In short, obesity can involve and impact almost all organs of the body.

#### What are the causes of obesity?

There are several factors that contribute to obesity. Most often, it is due to a combination of the following that increases your risk of obesity:

- Lifestyle: A sedentary lifestyle leads to burning fewer calories.
- 2. **Diet:** High-calorie intake, especially from unhealthy foods.
- Genetics: A family history of obesity increases your risk.
- 4. **Hormonal disorders:** Certain underlying hormonal conditions can contribute to weight gain.


#### How do you treat obesity?

There are four main treatment approaches, often used in combination:

- Diet Modification: Key dietary changes that reduce the risk of obesity include: avoiding refined sugars, limiting fast food, cold drinks, and juices, Reducing portion sizes and eplacing white rice and white bread with brown rice and whole-grain bread.
- 2. **Physical Activity:** Aim for at least 30 minutes of walking per day, 6 days a week.
- 3. **Medications:** If lifestyle changes are not enough, medications may be recommended. Current medications can help achieve significant weight loss (up to 20–25 kg). Although they may have side effects, these medications often provide added benefits such as: Cardiovascular protection, kidney protection, takes care of fatty liver, controls diabetes.
- 4. **Surgery:** Bariatric surgery, including procedures that reduce stomach size or bypass part of the digestive system, can lead to substantial weight loss. These surgeries may also help reverse diabetes and other obesity-related complications in many patients.

#### **Key Message**

Obesity is a preventable condition. With proper diet, lifestyle changes, (and when needed), medications or surgery, its complications can be significantly reduced. Managing your weight is essential to protecting your overall health.



## PROTECTING THOSE WHO PROTECT OTHERS: AEH'S COMMITMENT TO OCCUPATIONAL HEALTH & SAFETY

At Addu Equatorial Hospital (AEH), safety is more than a policy. It is a culture that protects our greatest asset: our people. As healthcare professionals, we are constantly exposed to biological risks that can endanger both staff and patients. Recognizing this, AEH has taken a landmark step forward by establishing a formal Immunization Policy for Healthcare Workers, now awaiting final ratification, to institutionalize protection against **Hepatitis B** and seasonal **Influenza** for all staff across AEH and its satellite centers.

#### **Building a Safer Workplace Through Immunization**

Vaccination is one of the simplest yet most powerful occupational safety measures in healthcare. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), vaccines prevent millions of deaths each year and significantly reduce the transmission of infectious diseases within hospitals. For AEH, strengthening healthcare worker immunization means not only safeguarding staff but also ensuring safer care for every patient we serve.

The new policy, led by Dr. Ibrahim Yasir Ahmed, aligns directly with WHO's Global Patient Safety Action Plan 2021–2030 and Joint Commission International (JCI) 8th Edition Standards, particularly IPSG 5 and SQE 02.01. It positions vaccination as an integral component of infection prevention and occupational safety, ensuring that all AEH staff, from doctors and nurses to lab technologists, housekeeping, and outsourced personnel, are protected through a structured and equitable immunization framework.

#### From Vision to Action: AEH's Progress So Far

AEH's journey began with a project proposal submitted in July 2025, followed by policy drafting, baseline assessment, and sensitization sessions. By September 2025, vaccination campaigns were successfully launched across all centers, marking the start of a coordinated rollout.

As of October 2025, AEH achieved the following milestones:

- Influenza Vaccination Coverage: 52% of all AEH staff (301 of 577) have been vaccinated a significant rise from 24% in August.
- Hepatitis B Vaccination Coverage: 172 staff members (34%) have confirmed protective antibody levels, while over 111 have now completed all 3 doses.
- Vaccination Rounds: Two major campaigns were held, on 1 September and 16 October, with active monitoring and weekly reporting led by the Public Health Service.

These achievements represent a major organizational shift moving from fragmented practices to a policy-driven, measurable, and accountable safety program.

#### **Next Steps: Activating Department Focal Points**

Once the Immunization Policy is formally ratified, the departmental focal points will be activated across all clinical and support areas. Each focal point will coordinate with the Public Health Service and Human Resources Department to ensure that staff vaccination, documentation, and follow-up are carried out promptly. Their leadership at the departmental level will be vital in maintaining continuous vaccine coverage, monitoring compliance, and ensuring no one is left behind.

#### Preparing for the November Mass Vaccination Rounds

As AEH moves into the November 2025 phase, preparations are already underway for the next round of mass vaccination for both Influenza and Hepatitis B. This campaign aims to build on the success of earlier rounds and push AEH closer to its year-end goals≥50% influenza coverage and ≥70% completion of the second Hepatitis B dose by December.

We call upon all AEH employees, clinical, administrative, and outsourced, to actively support this initiative. Your participation is not only about compliance; it is about protecting your own health, your colleagues, and your patients. Together, we can make AEH a model of safety and responsibility for the entire health system.

#### **Championing a Culture of Safety**

AEH's Immunization Policy is more than a document; it is a symbol of shared responsibility. As per new policy, each department will have a Vaccination Orientation Focal Point responsible for guiding new staff through immunization steps within their first five days of duty. The Public Health Service, Human Resources, Laboratory, and Procurement & Stores teams jointly oversee vaccine logistics, record-keeping, and cold-chain maintenance, ensuring every dose is delivered safely and documented accurately.

Education remains a cornerstone of this effort. Through sensitization sessions, FAQs, and staff counseling, AEH continues to address common fears and misconceptions about vaccines, building confidence and encouraging participation.

#### **Looking Ahead**

With continued leadership commitment and full staff participation, AEH is on track to achieve a safer, healthier, and more resilient workforce. Annual reviews, refresher training, and sustained monitoring will keep this initiative active beyond 2025, embedding immunization as a permanent part of our occupational health and safety system.

#### A Message to All Staff

Vaccination is not merely compliance: It is compassion in action.

By protecting yourself, you protect your patients, your colleagues, and your family.

Let's come together for the November vaccination rounds and help AEH achieve its mission of

"Zero avoidable harm - for patients and for those who care for them."
