



SKILLS FOR PSYCHOLOGICAL RECOVERY (SPR)

Learning Community for Region 10 Direct Service Providers

SPR is an evidence-informed, culturally sensitve intervention designed to help individuals gain skills to reduce ongoing distress, promote resilience, and effectively cope in the weeks and months after a disaster or crisis.

In addressing the impact of the ongoing pandemic, we hosted a 7-month learning community to support direct service providers who work with clients as a main role, such as:

- · case managers
- outreach workers
- shelter/housing staff
- peer specialists
- other behavioral health staff

Participants learned SPR skills that focus on improving social support, helpful thinking, problemsolving, managing distressing responses to disaster reminders, and increasing positive activities.




