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About the Project

Paralympic Sports Science Research Inspiring women and people with disabilities

The program's overarching goal is to establish research collaborations through sport, to share sports science Lessons from Australian Paralympic success, and to Inspire Women and People with Disability in the Middle East.

The research exchange program will focus on academic staff from Curtin University visiting UAE, Jordan and Oman to promote high-quality research collaboration and provide support for women and people with disability. We will focus on the following research outcomes and practical examples from Australian Paralympic research and participation. This will include research outcomes to improve health in people with physical disability. Promote sports science through practical workshops and research presentations.

The exchange program will use the knowledge gained from recent research outcomes in sports science to promote sports participation for individuals with a disability and expand it in Jordan, UAE, and Oman. Showcase research in Paralympic

sports with a focus on improving women in the Middle East. The activities will include presentations and workshops for research outcomes in Olympic and Paralympic athletes, Cerebral Palsy football research and football research in general. It will also include sharing the experiences of Australian elite athletes, coaches and researchers with their counterparts in the Middle East. Furthermore, it will have a component in cultural exchange and promoting relationships between the Arab world and Australia.

Activities included presentations, workshops and meetings between all stakeholders in the four countries.

Dr. Fadi Maayah from the School of Education is the lead investigator on a \$40,000 collaboration project funded by the Council for Australian-Arab Relations (CAAR). The first stage was conducted by having Dr. Fadi Maayah and Dr. Dale Chapman visit Oman, the United Arab Emirates, and Jordan this year. In addition, Dr. Sacha Fulton and Paralympian Champion, Gold winner, and OAM Katrina Porter presented online.

Oman Visit

The first visit was in Oman at Sultan Qaboos University in Muscat with Dr Ali Alyarubi, head of Physical Education and Sports Science at the School of Education.

Presentations were conducted over two days with a high level of attendance. Dr Alyarubi said the trip's goal was to establish collaboration between Sultan Qaboos University and promote research collaboration while encouraging inclusivity for people with disabilities.






Dr Dale Chapman and Dr Fadi were captivated by The Burj Khalifa during their visit to the UAE.
