23rd International Conference in Free Syria: Advancing Healthcare and Educational Excellence

rom July 4 to 6, SAMS held its 23rd International Conference—marking the first time this historic gathering took place in Free Syria, hosted at Damascus University's Rida Said Conference Center.

In his opening remarks, Dr. Aref Rifai, SAMS President, emphasized the powerful symbolism of holding this conference in Damascus:

"This is more than just a scientific gathering. It is a message of hope — to every doctor, student, and healthcare worker who dreams of a better future for Syria. Together, we are writing a new chapter — one rooted in science, service, and solidarity."

For millions of Syrians, access to dignified healthcare has remained out of reach. After 14 years of crisis, over 70% of the country's healthcare professionals have been displaced. SAMS volunteers are stepping in to fill these critical gaps — not only by treating patients, but by strengthening the system through mentorship, clinical training, and long-term partnership.

Our teams are offering care in areas that have gone years without it — from oncology and cardiology to pediatrics, surgery, emergency medicine, and dental care.





This unprecedented mission is also timed with a historic milestone: SAMS' first-ever Damascus Conference in a free Syria, which took place between July 4 and July 6. This monumental gathering brought together global experts, frontline practitioners, and the next generation of Syrian healthcare leaders — uniting to rebuild and reimagine healthcare across Syria.

Syria: Humanitarian Challenges and SAMS' Expanding Medical Response

Syria continues to face a deepening humanitarian crisis. Since November, nearly 674,000 individuals have been newly displaced, while over 1 million people have returned to their areas of origin. Despite this, returns remain difficult due to damaged infrastructure, limited services, and the threat of unexploded ordnance. As of April 2025, over 16.5 million people are in need of humanitarian assistance, including 7.4 million internally displaced persons (IDPs).

Within this challenging context, the Syrian American Medical Society (SAMS) has continued to scale its operations across Syria, with significant achievements across health service delivery, medical education, and emergency response.



Strengthening Healthcare Infrastructure

SAMS' Damascus office is now the central hub for coordinating operations across Syria. In Damascus and its suburbs, SAMS signed a new agreement to support Al-Tal Hospital and two PHCCs, expanded mental health support for former detainees, and delivered lab consumables to hospitals in need. In Daraa, SAMS is renovating an Oncology Medication Center and preparing emergency medical shipments to local facilities.

In Aleppo, SAMS-supported Emirates Hospital expanded inpatient capacity, despite ongoing shortages in oncology medications. Meanwhile, Omar Bin Abdulaziz Hospital received new diagnostic equipment and launched infrastructure upgrades, including solar installations.

In Idlib, SAMS is managing 19 operational health facilities. However, several hospitals and PHCs face potential closure by July due to funding gaps—prompting an urgent search for additional donor support.

Expanding Services in the East and South

In eastern Syria, facilities in Deir ez-Zor and Al Bukamal resumed critical services, serving thousands of beneficiaries through multidisciplinary teams. Notably, Mayadeen Hospital and Al-Madina Hospital received vital equipment and funding for sustained operations. In Ar-Raqqa, SAMS conducted focus groups on sustainable healthcare financing and continued psychosocial programming. In Al-Hasakah, PHCs in Qahtaniya and Qamishli remain active with partial operations.



Medical Missions and Specialized Care

In April, SAMS deployed a team of 38 volunteer physicians for its medical mission, delivering care across 23 facilities. The team provided 1,093 consultations and 369 procedures, including complex cardiac surgeries, GI interventions, oncology care, and minimally invasive gynecological surgeries.

Medical Education and Capacity Building

Education remains a core pillar of SAMS' strategy. In April, SAMS organized 59 training sessions, reaching 1,199 healthcare providers. This included an anatomic pathology conference, hands-on workshops, and a four-day scientific conference that attracted 446 participants. SAMS also graduated 20 midwives and continued training 36 physicians in residency and fellowship programs. Simulation labs in Homs and Hama delivered BLS and ACLS training to 76 medical students.



Mental Health Training and Innovation

SAMS is leading efforts to rebuild Syria's mental health infrastructure through capacity-building programs, strategic partnerships, and hands-on training. In Raqqa, SAMS implemented pre-service psychiatry training programs through its AQL and QAMAR initiatives. A regional steering committee was also formed to align mental health efforts with local needs and priorities.

One of the most powerful examples of this work — funded by the European Union — is unfolding in northwest Syria, where SAMS recently celebrated a major milestone: the graduation of the first-ever cohort of its Psychiatric Nursing Diploma Program. This achievement marks a turning point in building Syrian-led, sustainable mental health care — and highlights what's possible when innovation, expertise, and compassion come together.

These graduates represent more than just a successful pilot, they are the future of mental health care in Syria.

SAMS Statement: Standing with Survivors of the Mar Elias Church Attack

Delivering A Lifeline: Volunteers Powering SAMS' Gift-in-Kind Work


An Interview with Amer Ghali, **SAMS Michigan Chapter & Young Professionals Committee**

Can you briefly introduce yourself and share how you got involved with SAMS and the gift-in-kind effort?

My name is Amer Ghali, I'm a third year medical student at the University of Toledo College of Medicine and Life Sciences hoping to pursue a career as a surgical intensivist. I was asked to join the board of the SAMS Michigan chapter in August of 2022, where I founded the Young Professionals Committee (YPC) with the aim of preparing the next generation of Syrian-American medical philanthropists. I became involved with the giftin-kind effort in the immediate aftermath of the devastating earthquakes that affected Turkey and Northwest Syria on February 6th, 2023, where it was student volunteers from the YPC who largely carried out the container loading events and inventorying procedures.

What inspired you to volunteer your time and skills in this specific area of SAMS' work?

I'm grateful to enjoy a long history of involvement with Syria-related philanthropy initiatives, specifically by founding two chapters of Students Organize for Syria (a collection of student groups dedicated to advocacy and raising awareness). As such, when the time came to coordinate the YPC



in order to respond to the developments of the earthquake, I was able to draw on many of the skills and professional contacts I had developed over the years of this work. The scenes of overwhelmed healthcare facilities and reports of easily avoidable diseases that were affecting the population due to lack of access to essential medications drove me to invest my time and energy into doing what I could to address their plight.

Can you walk us through what it takes to identify, collect, and ship donated medical supplies or equipment? What does a typical week or month look like for you?

Our process begins by identifying urgent needs through regular communication with hospitals and clinics on the ground in Syria. We then collect suitable donated items from local health systems or private donors in the United States before verifying their condition and inventorying them at volunteer events hosted at universities or community centers. A typical week includes coordinating with donors, managing YPC members to attend events, and preparing shipments for export.



What are some of the challenges you face in this work—whether logistical, regulatory, or otherwise—and how do you overcome them?


Regulatory barriers and customs restrictions can delay or block shipments, especially for medications and devices. Additionally, logistics in conflict zones can be unpredictable due to rapidly changing developments. We overcome these challenges through careful planning, close legal oversight, and coordination with trusted local partners.

Is there a shipment or moment in this work that has stayed with you—where you really felt the impact of what you were doing?

One of our longtime volunteers (who I know prefers to stay anonymous) attended a loading event for the earthquake victims despite having a severe injury to his ankle's Achilles tendon that left him on crutches. Throughout the day he held supplies in one hand with his crutch in the other, and never complained or rested until the job was over. Seeing his dedication to service and selfless effort inspired me to continue with the work we were doing, even at times it was not always easy to do so amid competing priorities with my academic schedule.

Why is gift-in-kind support so critical for SAMS right now—and what would you want more people to understand about its value?

Gift-in-kind donations allow us to deliver lifesaving supplies without the delays and costs of international procurement while simultaneously benefiting health systems across the United States through Form 8283 tax-incentives as well as inventory removal, as it requires space and resources for them to continue storing unwanted



medical supplies. In crisis zones such as Syria, even basic medical items are scarce or completely unavailable; in turn, this ultimately contributes to serious conditions that may otherwise be entirely avoidable (such as wounds becoming infected due to a lack of surgical gauze or antibiotics). Ideally, it would help a great deal if more understood the idea that these donations directly translate into improved patient care with considerable long-term benefits to recipients' health.

Closing thought: What keeps you going? What gives you hope as you continue this work with SAMS?

I spent every summer and many winters in Syria until the conflict began in 2011, and came to regard the country as my second home. To that end, I am given hope by the possibility that our work plays a role in helping its beleaguered people rebuild their devastated country, as I am able to continue serving them without necessarily being on the ground myself. Finally, the opportunity to work alongside other driven humanitarians is a privilege in and of itself, as I have learned a great deal from my colleagues who have supported this project from its very beginning.



New Study Exposes Critical Gaps in Syria Cancer Care

newly published study by members of the SAMS medical research team, featured in the Avicenna Journal of Medicine, reveals a growing cancer crisis in Syria.

Between 2017 and 2022, 192 breast cancer cases were documented at the Idlib Oncology Center, Syria's only cancer referral center in the northwest, serving over 4.6 million people. The findings are alarming:

- Most patients had aggressive, fast-spreading breast cancer
- ► Diagnoses often came at late stages, when treatment is harder
- ► Radiotherapy was delayed by over 7 months after surgery
- Women displaced by conflict faced lower survival rates

These are not just numbers, they represent real lives and real families enduring an unimaginable burden in a conflict zone. A lack of access to medications and radiotherapy is putting lives at risk every day.

SAMS is working to close this gap. Our oncology program in Syria provides diagnostics, chemotherapy, surgery, and ongoing care, but we need your support to keep going.

n the displacement camps of southern Gaza, a midwife from SAMS Mobile Medical Team initiated a valuable awareness lecture for women on the fundamentals of hygiene and personal cleanliness. The Lecture emphasized the critical importance of these practices in maintaining family health and preventing infectious diseases prevalent in displacement conditions. The midwife addressed various aspects such as handwashing, personal care, food and water sanitation, and proper waste management. The aim of the lecture was to equip women with the knowledge and tools necessary to create as healthy an environment as possible for their families amidst the challenging circumstances.
