WHERE ARE THE TRASH CANS?

Since 2016, the Fair has been working to reduce waste. In 2024, thanks to our dedicated staff and volunteers, we diverted nearly 60% of waste from the landfill at our waste stations.

In 2023 we added a back-of-house sorting activity. Our goal was to further boost diversion by sorting the trash that doesn't make its way to the sorting stations.



We learned just how many types of packaging there are at the fair! So we have launched a multi-year purchasing program to further simplify and streamline the disposal process for fairgoers.

This year, we're turning the sorting into a party:

- Look for the green "WASTE STATION" tents to separate and dispose of all trash, recycling and food scraps. There will be NO TRASH CANS in the food booth areas.







The Pet Show is only for children. No animals may be entered here that could be entered elsewhere. No adult dogs or farm animals.



Tractor Pull Rules

- The Martha's Vineyard Agricultural Society assumes no responsibility for loss, theft and/or injury to the participant or property competing.
- Tractors must be standard make, at least 25 years old, rubber tread, wheel type, equipped for farm use. No four wheel drives allowed, no dual tires, no studs or chains permitted. All power must be transmitted to the wheels. No hydrostatic drives allowed.
- 3. The order of pulling in each class will be determined by drawing numbers for each class at the time of weighing in.
- 4. The pull director will determine the number of classes you may enter.
- The first-place winner may enter the next class and pull last in order. The second-place tractor will only be allowed to enter the next class if the pull director determines that the class is less than full and time allows.
- 6. All pullers will have a total of 4 minutes of pulling time. During that 4 minutes they can make as many hitches as they want with only longest pull counting. The pin resets with rehitching.
- 7. All pulls must be made on the concrete slab provided. Dead hitch to boat by cable, clevis and pin provided. Hitch for tractors under 2,000 pounds must not be over 12 inches from the slab. Any hydraulic drawbar found raised after original check will be cause for disqualification. All drawbars to be stationary (rigid) in all directions at all times. Hitch for tractors over 2000 pounds must be less than 20 inches from the slab.
- 8. Load must be pulled six feet in one hitch from the starting point. Distance is measured to the point where the boat first stops forward motion. Any yank pull, which tips the concrete block off the load, will be cause for disqualification of both operator and the tractor for this contest. No previous tries will be counted for awards.
- 9. All tractors must be weighed on fairground scales. Weight is to include the operator.
- 10. The winner of the previous class may add weight to correspond to the next class.
- 11. No portion of the tractor may interfere with the boat.
- 12. All weight must be safely secured to the tractor and must not move rearward while pulling.
- 13. All tractors must have a rigid seat and tip seats must be secured while pulling.
- 14. The Fair strongly recommends the use of stabilizer bars.
- 15. Operators will use all due consideration for the safety of other operators, track crew, and spectators and remain in the seat at all times. No operator shall allow their tractor to continue spinning after the boat has stopped and they have been signaled by an official.
- 16. The rules and classes are subject to change. Any changes will be announced before the contest starts.
- 17. All four tires must remain on pad while pulling.
- 18. The drawbar hole must be easily accessible to hookup. The hole size is to be no smaller than 1 1/4 inches.
- Any loss of liquid on the pulling surface or loss of weights or safety equipment may be cause for disqualification.

Preregistration is not required.

Rules:

- 1. All rulings by judges are final.
- Shuckers may wear gloves, use their own knives and carry an extra knife for use in case the first breaks.
- 3. Each contestant will receive the same amount of oysters that will be randomly selected by the judges. Four of oysters may be exchanged by the shuckers if I they don't like the look.
- 4. The shuckers may arrange the oysters in front of him/her for the event.
- 5. Time-keepers from the audience and/or the judges will keep track of each shucker's time of completion. At the start of the event the Judges will yell "Go!", initiating the start of the event.
- 6. When a contestant has finished shucking and is satisfied with his/her arrangement of the shucked oysters, he/she will raise their hands and the timekeepers will stop their stopwatches.
- 7. The shuckers may not touch their trays after they have signaled completion.

Note: <u>Presentation is of utmost importance</u>. An appetizing arrangement is rewarded over a "sloppy" or "hacked" presentation.

PENALTIES: Judges will add seconds of time accordingly:

Three (3) second penalties

An oyster is not completely severed from the shell.

An oyster presented on a broken shell (No penalty if placed on the top shell).

An oyster presented with grit, blood or other foreign substances.

An oyster is cut.

An oyster is not placed properly in its shell.

Twenty (20) second penalty

An oyster is missing from the shell or plate.

BONUS: Judges may (optionally) award a bonus reduction of ten (10) seconds as an award for the tray whose presentation is deemed outstanding.

The Judges will then declare the winner by the shucker with the fastest time, including all penalties and bonuses.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES

In addition to complying with all laws and regulations governing animal health issues (M.G.L.C.128 ss214D, 14E, 44 and 330 CMR 4.03, 4.07, 16.03), all fairs must adopt and enforce the following rules for governance of the fair.

2025 ANIMAL HEALTH RULES FOR FAIRS AND SHOWS

NO animal will be admitted to the fairgrounds unless it meets the requirements below. NO animal is to be unloaded or enter a barn or tie-out stall until the animal and its paperwork have been inspected and approved for entry.

Special Notices from the New England State Veterinarians: Due to the continuing US outbreak of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) in domesticated and wild birds and in dairy cattle, Animal Health Officials from all six New England States are united in advising the following for agricultural fairs, competitions, exhibitions, shows, swaps, or other in-person events that encourage the gathering or co-mingling of birds and/or cattle:

<u>Avian species</u> The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of domestic and wild waterfowl species and may recommend delaying or canceling domestic fowl or poultry shows. If events are held, best practices for biosecurity should be implemented.

Bovine species The New England State Veterinarians strongly discourage the exhibition of any bovines, including both dairy and beef cattle, that have been present in any state at the time that state had a current outbreak of HPAI in cattle. Bovines that have been shipped from currently affected states in 2025 should not be allowed on the premises of New England fairs or shows. Moving to or from an affected state for any reason will void any New England Fair and Show Season Official Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (OCVIs) that have been issued for such cattle for the remainder of the 2025 season.

The states currently affected by HPAI in cattle can be found on the USDA website: https://www.aphis.usda.gov/livestock-poultry-disease/avian/avian-influenza/hpai-detections/hpai-confirmed-cases-livestock

The USDA APHIS Veterinary Services Federal Order Requiring Testing for and Reporting of Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza in Livestock issued on April 24, 2024, remains in effect. It can be found on the USDA website: www.aphis.usda.gov/sites/default/files/dairy-federal-order.pdf

A plan for managing lactating dairy cattle (LDC), including the handling of milk collected at the exhibition facility, should be in place for all fairs and shows where LDC will be on the premises. The state veterinarian's office can provide assistance developing a plan.

<u>All species</u> Animals of all species susceptible to HPAI are potentially subject to quarantine as ordered by the State Veterinarian if HPAI is detected on a premises where the animal is or was exhibited.

If HPAI is detected in cattle in any New England State, the Agreement between the New England State Veterinarians to allow the use of a single, fair and show season OCVI for New England animals being exhibited in New England will be voided. All exhibited animals would need to be accompanied by an OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of being checked in at the show premises and/or other state import requirements.

Best biosecurity practices for all species should be implemented.

Contact the state where animals will be exhibited for the latest updated information.

General Requirements for all Species

Currently an Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) is required for each state for every animal movement across state lines. Animals crossing state lines must be properly (officially) identified per federal and state Animal Disease Traceability (ADT) requirements. Each state to which an animal travels needs to be contacted to verify that all traceability and movement permit requirements are met before shipping.

Recognizing that during the agricultural fair and show season exhibition animals may be moving to multiple states and locations within a state, the New England state veterinarians, working through the New England States Animal Agricultural Security Alliance (NESAASA), have developed a protocol to facilitate animal movement. The New England State Veterinarians have agreed to allow a show/fair certificate to be valid for the 2025 show season provided the OCVI complies with all federal and state ADT rules.

One OCVI may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (CT, *ME, MA, **NH, RI, and ***VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved.

Note that *ME, **NH, and ***VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these states are valid for a shorter time and may have additional language, movement, and permit requirements. See details below.

For the 2025 Show and Fair Season, livestock animals being exhibited in New England states must have OCVIs that meet the following requirements

- CT, MA, ME, and RI: OCVIs issued on or after January 1, 2025, may be used for animals being shown at fairs and shows in CT, MA, ME, and RI through the 2025 show/fair season ending October 31, 2025. o Special Note on The Big E, West Springfield, MA: All bovines must have official USDA RFID tags,
- *CT and ME: An importation permit for exhibition animals is also required. Contact CT Dept. of Agriculture (860-713-2504) or ME State Veterinarian's Office (207-287-3701) for permits or questions.
- **NH: Animals exhibited in NH must originate in a New England state and move on OCVIs issued on or after April 1, 2025, to participating NH fairs and shows from July 1 to October 31, 2025. Contact NH State Veterinarian's Office (603) 271-2404 for details and permits.
- ***VT: The fair season is defined as May 1- October 31, 2025. Contact the VT Animal Health Office (802- 828-2421) for specific import requirements and permits.
- A single OCVI from the animals' home state may be completed for travel to and from the New England states in which the animals will be exhibited.
- Multiple animals of the same species may be listed on one OCVI with

appropriate individual IDs and descriptions. Animals of different species may not be listed on the same official health certificate.

- An itinerary of the names and locations for each New England fair or show at which owner expects to show the listed animals and the dates when each animal is expected to be on each site, must be prepared by the owner and presented to the veterinarian at the time the OCVI is written.
- A copy of this planned itinerary must be attached to the OCVI (import and export) for it to be used for more than one fair or show. o That proposed list should be signed by the veterinarian and the owner/ exhibitor and reference the relevant OCVI number(s). o Electronic OCVIs must include this list of exhibition names, addresses, and dated in the "remarks and comments" section
- The name and address of the first show or fair where the listed animals will be exhibited is to be used as the "destination" along with "New England Fair Season" on the OCVI form. In addition, "See attached list" or a similar statement directing Animal Health Officials or Fair Inspectors to the attached proposed itinerary must be included.
- Exhibitors must keep an accurate list of the show locations and dates when their animals were physically on the show/fairgrounds. This record must be available to fair inspectors at each inspection and check- in.
- Any animal listed on an OCVI that becomes sick must remain home. If the animal is refused entry to any exhibition during 2025 for health reasons it must have a new OCVI issued by an accredited veterinarian within 30 days of the next interstate movement.
- Any New England state may end their participation in this agreement and revert to the standard published requirements for livestock imports in the state at any time, in the event of foreign animal disease outbreak or changes to state legislation.

Remember: One certificate for shows in CT, MA, ME, NH, RI, and VT. Contact each state for specific requirements. Import permits are issued by each individual state and must be listed on the OCVI. The list of events, with dates and locations, where the animals are expected to be shown must accompany the OCVI. Use one certificate per species. All animals must be listed individually, with appropriate official ID numbers and physical descriptions. Sick animals may not be shipped anywhere. MA General Rules

A. General Rules for All Animals: See M.G.L. c. 128 §2C, 129 §2

- All animals must be in proper physical condition, be properly identified and free
 of visual evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease at time of
 arrival. Specific diseases and conditions which will disqualify an animal for entry
 are identified for each species in the following sections of the rules. Animals of
 any species with open or draining wounds will not be approved for entry.
- 2. Evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease or failure to produce the

- necessary documents for health certification, vaccination or testing will result in the animal's rejection for entry. THE INSPECTOR'S DECISION IS FINAL.
- 3. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly-licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 4. Official ID: See Final Rule: Summary of Traceability for Livestock Moved Interstate (Summary of general requirements by species) All livestock must have proper official, individual ID as required and approved for the species, e.g., official metal ear tag, tattoo, scrapie tag, or microchip. Registration forms must accompany health certificates when used as part of official identification.
- 5. Health Certificates: -- One Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) may be allowed for animals of the same species to be exhibited at fairs or shows in any of the New England states (CT, *ME, MA, **NH, RI, and ***VT) when submitted with an itinerary of the dates and locations of the events at which the listed animals are expected to be shown. Only animals that are healthy at the time of shipment may be moved. Note that *ME, **NH, and ***VT have additional requirements. Certificates of veterinary inspection in these states are valid for a shorter period of time and may have additional language, movement and permit requirements. See Special Statement starting on Page 43.

B. Cattle: See M.G.L. c. 129 §§2, 39 and 330 CMR 4.04(2).

- 1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795). All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, cowpox and open or draining wounds.
- 2. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all cattle be currently vaccinated for rabies.
- 3. Note: The Big E is requiring RFID official identification tags for all cattle entering the Big E Fairgrounds premises in 2025. Other fairs may add this requirement. Contact fair office with questions.

C. Poultry: See M.G.L. c. §§2, 129, and 330 CMR 5.02.

- 1. No poultry will be admitted to a fairground until it has been individually inspected.
- 2. All poultry must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: infectious bronchitis, coryza, pullorum typhoid, fowl-pox, external parasites and laryngotracheitis.

- 3. Each bird must be accompanied by written proof (ID card or test report) that the breeding flock was blood tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within one year prior to entry date. 4.
- 4. Birds from quarantined states will not be permitted entry.
- 5. All birds over 16 weeks of age as of January 1, 2025 shall be individually leg banded with a state leg band. This includes out of state exhibitors.
- 6. No bird vaccinated for laryngotracheitis within thirty days of the fair will be admitted.

D. Goats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, 9 CFR 79.6 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- 1. TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals.
- 2. All goats and kids presented, regardless of age, must be individually listed and identified on the health certificate. All goats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds. All goats must also be free of sore mouth and scrapie exposure.
- Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508-363- 2290.

E. Camelids (Llamas, Alpacas, etc.): See M.G.L. c. 129 §2, M.G. l. c. 131, §23,321 CMR 9.02.

- TB and Brucellosis testing is not required for animals from TB-Accredited and Brucellosis-Free States and in-state animals. Current brucellosis and TB status in the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state. If the exhibitor's state is not TB-Accredited or Brucellosis-Free, then the exhibitor must call the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health for entry requirements (617-626-1795).
- 2. All Camelids originating from outside the Commonwealth are required to be tested for Blue Tongue. Exception: Animals from a USDA declared "Low Incident State" are exempt. New England and New York are low incident states.
- 3. All animals must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: foot rot, mange, pinkeye, ringworm, warts, pox and open or draining wounds.

F. Swine: See M.G.L. c. 129 §14E, 330 CMR 11.04(2), 9 CFR 71.19

- 1. All swine must be identified by an official ear tag or registration.
- 2. Swine must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, manage and open or draining wounds.
- 3. No person shall import into Massachusetts from outside the state any swine which have been pseudorabies vaccinated. M.G.L. c. 129 §14E.

- No person shall import into Massachusetts swine from Stage I or Stage II
 Pseudorabies States.
- All swine shall originate from qualified pseudorabies-free herds or monitored herds in qualified pseudorabies free States only. The pseudorabies status of the exhibitor's state can be obtained from the state veterinarian's office in each state.

G. Sheep: See 9 CFR 79 and Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06.

- 1. No sheep will be allowed entry from flocks in which Scrapie has been diagnosed or in which animals are under surveillance for Scrapie during the previous eighteen months. Based on the Federal Scrapie Eradication Program (FSEP), goats and sheep of any age or sex brought to show or exhibition from either out of state or within state must possess a USDA official individual identification tag or registry tattoo accompanied by current registration papers consistent with the requirements of the FSEP and the Massachusetts Emergency Order 1-AHO-06. Information is available from USDA-APHIS at 508 -363-2290.
- No sheep will be permitted entry from flocks in which soremouth has existed or in which soremouth Vaccine has been administered in the previous sixty (60) days.
- 3. Sheep must be free from visual evidence of foot rot, sore mouth, pink eye, ringworm, and open and draining wounds. While not required, it is strongly recommended that sheep be currently vaccinated against rabies.

H. Equine: M.G.L. c. 128 §§2C, 44, 330 CMR 16.05.

- 1. All equines entering a Massachusetts fairground must have a valid health certificate. Note: The Big E Fairgrounds in West Springfield requires a CVI issued within the prior 30 days for all equines entering the premises for any show, fair, or exhibition.
- 2. All equines must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases and conditions: mange, ringworm, soring, strangles, and open or draining wounds.
- 3. All equines originating from within and outside of the Commonwealth must have a negative USDA approved EIA test (i.e., Coggins test or ELISA test) dated within twelve months of entry.
- 4. While not required, it is strongly recommended that all equines be vaccinated for rabies, tetanus, EEE and WNV within one year of the fair.

I. Rabbits: See M.G.L. c. 129 §2

Rabbits must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: rabbit hemorrhagic Disease Virus 2 (RHDV2), snuffles, wet tail, and skin and ear infections. Microchips may be used for ID in rabbits originating in MA.

J. Dogs and Cats: See M.G.L. c. 129 §39G

- 1. All dogs and cats must be free of visual evidence of the following diseases: kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm and mange.
- 2. All dogs and cats must be accompanied by a valid and current vaccination certificate for rabies.

ENTRY SCHEDULE AND INFORMATION

- 1. Please fill out the entry registration completely and submit them via fairentry.com or by paper to the Entry Clerk.
 - No **HALL** entry registrations (paper or online) will be accepted after 7:00pm August 14, 2025.
 - No BARN entry registrations (paper or online) will be accepted after 5:00pm August 17, 2025
- 2. Please make sure to enter in a Commercial Category if you are a professional. A person is considered a professional if he/she teaches, sells, demonstrates, lectures; or is connected with a shop, studio, or stand. If you are one of these, you are very welcome in the professional class of your expertise.
- 3. Entries entered in the "Other" Category must be identified.
- 4. **All Non-perishable Hall entry items** must be brought to the Agricultural Hall between 1:00pm and 6:00pm on August 16th or 17th. Preserving is considered Non-perishable.
- 5. **ALL JUNIOR Perishable entry items** MUST be brought to the Hall on Wednesday, August 20, 2025 between 10:00am and 5:00pm. No Junior perishables will be accepted after 5:00pm. Judging is done Wednesday.
- 6. Adult Perishable Entry items may be brought on Wednesday, August 20, 2025 between 10:00am and 5:00pm or between 7:00am and 8:30am on Thursday, August 21, 2025.
- 7. **All Eggs and Butter** should be brought to the Hall by 9AM on Friday August 22, 2025.
- 8. **All Animals and Poultry** should be brought in between 3-7PM on Wednesday or 7-9AM on Thursday. Animals leaving before 4PM Sunday forfeit any prize money which they might receive unless arrangements are made with the Barn Manager.
- 9. **PETS** Register with the Pet Show Committee at the stage on Friday August 22nd. Show starts at 3:00PM.
- 10. Exhibits may be accompanied by descriptive information, but the exhibitor's name must not appear until after the judging. The Society provides a tag for all Hall exhibits, with information to assist in judging. This tag must be firmly attached to the exhibit by the exhibitor.
- 11. The Chair of any Department may establish a special category

- if there is a wide divergence in the entries of any one Class. Such new class is eligible for Ribbon Awards. The judges record of awards shall be final.
- 12. The judges are under no obligation to award a 1st prize in each category if they feel the entry does not warrant it. Judges shall award only one first, second, third prize in a particular category. Some exhibits warrant an honorable mention.
- 13. All exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the owner. The MVAS will not be responsible for loss or damage but will use every reasonable precaution to protect entries.
- 14. No exhibit which violates the laws of the Commonwealth will be allowed on the grounds. Please be sure you have checked all conservation laws.
- 15. No art or craft project that has feathers on it or incorporated in it will be allowed. This includes Junior and Adult departments.
- 16. All entries must be removed from the Hall between 8:00am and 6pm Monday August 25th. The MVAS will not be responsible for any exhibits remaining in the Hall after 6pm Monday. Tag stubs must be shown in order to remove any exhibit from the Hall. All perishable products not called for by 6pm Monday, August 25th will be disposed of properly.
- 17. Winners will be paid on Monday August 25th after 10:00am. Tag stubs must be shown in order to collect prizes.

ENDANGERED OR RARE WILDFLOWERS OF MARTHA'S VINEYARD

NOT TO BE PICKED OR UPROOTED

The Martha's Vineyard Garden Club has provided us with the following list of wildflowers which are in special need of conservation on the island. These flowers are uncommon or considered threatened by reason of their susceptibility to picking, digging or disturbance of their habitat. Some are listed by the MassWildlife Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) as endangered, threatened or of special concern, and as such are officially protected. Do not pick any flower without being certain of its identity.

PICKING WILDFLOWERS


NEVER pick all the flowers in bloom in one area. Leave more than half the flowers to make seeds for next year. Use scissors or a knife so you do not disturb the roots.
