We want pupils to embrace joyful failure, to try things and love them, to listen and to lead. We want them to have ambition and to take hold of the opportunities on offer. We firmly believe that the co-curricular life of the school provides opportunities in abundance to help do this.

### **Academic Loynton Lecture Series**

### All

Academic Enrichment talks run approximately twice per half term. These 30-minute talks are designed to showcase the wider academic life of the school and ignite the pupils' intellectual curiosity. The talks are delivered by a range of internal and visiting guest speakers and focus on a diverse and exciting range of topics, from 'Presidential Politics' to 'Superconducting Magnets' and 'The History of Solihull School: 1560 – 2024'. Details of upcoming talks are advertised through Form Tutors and screens around school.

### **Art Club: Mindful Drawing**

### **Fourth Form**

A space for pupils to explore using different mediums and also a chance for them to approach their drawing in different ways. An opportunity to be creative!

### **British Sign Language**

### Third Form

Pupils will learn the basics of British Sign Language. This will range from learning key gestures to finger spelling the alphabet.

### **Chemistry Challenge Extension Group**

### **Lower Fifth**

Pupils will be stretched with some high level chemistry challenges and discussion sessions. A lunchtime club, and one that will be sure to really develop the knowledge and understanding of this subject through practicals and high level questioning.

### Chess

### All

A weekly club that allows pupils to develop their game play. Inter school matches are also played during the course of the year, which can sometimes take place virtually. Chess is a popular club, with school fixtures planned (both virtually and in person) and House Chess being a highlight of the year!

### **Classics Society**

### All

Events as advertised, including guest speakers and a trip to the British Museum! An opportunity to explore the world of classics in depth and detail.

### Computing

### Lower School

A weekly lunchtime club where pupils can explore coding and other aspects of computing. This will be advertised in the Easter term.

### **Creative Writing**

### ΑII

Within Creative Writing, pupils have the opportunity to explore forms of writing outside of lessons and build on a range of creative writing skills.

### **CREST Science Award**

### Fourth Form to Lower Sixth

CREST Silver Awards are designed to stretch pupils and enrich their STEM studies. Pupils develop their own project idea and gain in-depth experience of the scientific method or engineering design process. CREST Silver has been shown to improve GCSE grades, promote continued interest in STEM subjects and can be used to enhance students' UCAS personal statements. Pupils who gain a Silver Award receive a personalised certificate.

### **Debating Society**

### AII

Debating is a wonderful opportunity for pupils to test out their ideas, formulate arguments and practice their communicative and persuasive skills. Many competitions are entered throughout the year, with teams often achieving national level rankings. This open discussion group explores challenging ideas and develops debating skills. It is an excellent opportunity for all pupils to engage in (of course!) debate, but also to develop confidence in themselves and their abilities.

### **Dungeons and Dragons**

### Third Form and Shell Form

A pupil-led, cooperative game where pupils take on different roles and characters within a story whilst trying to complete different quests.


### **Econ Society**

Run off timetable, this is a challenging course for pupils. It is delivered by our Classics Department and provides pupils will a terrific opportunity to explore the language and culture of this fascinating subject.

### **History and Politics Society**

Book reviews, discussion groups and extension activities form part of this society's activity. Pupils have the opportunity to enter writing competitions, creative challenges and a trebuchet competition at various points throughout the year! A History Extension group also runs during lunchtime for those pupils thinking of studying the subject at university. Marginal Gains, the school Politics magazine is produced each half term featuring thought provoking articles from current Politics students.

### **Philosophy**

### Lower and Middle School

This space provides pupils with the opportunity to discuss and analyse key philosophical concepts. Critical thinking and constructive discussion are central to this. The pupils regularly enter the Ethics Cup, often with regional and national success.

A thought provoking activity focusing on moral principles that influence human behaviour and the study of knowledge, truth and meaning.

### **Fourth Form**

An interesting opportunity to learn some of the basics of photography work, using digital cameras and computer software. A interesting introduction to this area of art that may be new to many pupils.

### **Lower School**

Maths enrichment including solving puzzles and possible preparation for external maths competitions. A hugely popular club amongst our Lower School pupils!

### Sixth Form

An opportunity to explore different areas of psychology not covered in lessons - recent articles and research are all part of ongoing discussions and investigations.

### **Schools Challenge Team**

Pupils from across the Senior School are able to join this club where lunchtime quiz training takes place. The school then competes locally in the first round of a national competition - a real test of general knowledge and guizzing skills!

A number of leadership roles are available for pupils within the system and it should also provide them with regular opportunities to exercise and to learn to value their pupil voice. Pupils are encouraged to both participate in and to support House events, with Fetherston, Jago, Pole, Shenstone and Windsor forming an important aspect of their time at school. Learning to appreciate the efforts of others is fundamental to the system and the cross year group activities should help to promote a sense of inclusivity and whole school community. The system is not solely about competition, and not all pupils may want to be in the spotlight performing, or running, or singing, for example. However, there should be a culture where pupils learn the importance of being part of a team, by learning to support their peers, to encourage others and to work behind the scenes in order to obtain a common goal. ### **Chamber Music**


### All

### **Concert Band**

### **Jazz 793**

Jazz 793 is a jazz improvisation group, where a smaller group of musicians are taught the skills necessary to improvise by working on a number of different jazz standards.

### **Love Singing Chorally (L.S.C.)**

### Third Form to Upper Fifth

This choir is open to all Lower and Middle School pupils and focuses on singing lighter secular repertoire, including songs from the shows – no audition is required. Previous singing experience is not required and all are welcome.

### **Lower School Orchestra (LSO)**

### **Lower School**

This orchestra started in the era of 'bubbling' with pupils from a single year group joining together to form a small symphony orchestra. The group has since expanded to include pupils from all Lower School with limited spaces for wind and brass, and an open invitation for string players of a suitable standard for the selected repertoire.

### **Music Theory Training**

One-to-one or small group teaching is available for pupils who would value some additional support to prepare for their grade 5 Music Theory exam.

### **Rock Bands**

### **Senior Flute Choir**

### **CCF**

### **Fourth Form upwards**

The Combined Cadet Force is open to all pupils in the Fourth Form and above: many pupils also join the CCF on entry to the Sixth Form. In the Fourth Form pupils begin some basic elements of the training, and this takes place after school on a Tuesday. In the Fourth Form and above, there are two sections, the Army Section and the RAF Section, and the organisation operate out of The Martyn Garner Building for Outdoor Education on the Field of Mars. The weekly parades take place on Monday after school and there are many opportunities throughout the year to be involved in various activities. These can include camps in the summer and at Easter, military training weekends, signals training days, shooting competitions, flying and gliding. The activities of the CCF are often linked in with the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme, and some of the activities can count towards the completion of an award. Due to changes in the age requirements for the CCF, Shells will have the opportunity to join the CCF in the summer term, before continuing in the Fourths should they wish to. ### Duke of Edinburgh's Award\* (Bronze, Silver and Gold)

### **Fourth Form upwards**

The 'DofE' Award scheme is designed to develop a young person's independence and responsibility. Many pupils are involved at one of the three different levels. The Fourth Form is when pupils have the opportunity to enrol at Bronze Level with some pupils progressing onwards to ultimately complete their Silver and Gold Awards in the Middle School and Sixth Form. To achieve the Award a 'Volunteering', 'Skill' and a 'Physical' section have to be completed successfully along with the 'Expedition' section which involves both a two day practice and separate two day assessment, at Bronze Level. This of course increases in length and difficulty as the level of award increases. It is a hugely challenging award scheme overall, where pupils are required to show real commitment and improvement in their chosen activities for each section. Pupils are communicated with directly by Mr Bate regarding the enrolment process, and they are encouraged to take responsibility for this, and indeed throughout the rest of their award process. ### **Fishing**

Run in the summer holidays, pupils can sign up and go to either Packington Fisheries or Blythe Water for an afternoon of fishing. No previous experience necessary.

During the course of the year local and regional walks are organised as part of Mountain Club.

### **Terriers**

### **Third Form**

Terriers is a non-military organisation inside the school curriculum especially designed for pupils of Third Form age. It meets weekly for two periods on a Thursday and aims to extend the horizon of pupils by introducing them to outdoor activities which are not only of an adventurous nature, but also give an understanding of the countryside around us. In the first half of the year, pupils undertake courses for the award of a First Class Terriers Certificate. In this, various skills such as basic first aid, climbing, abseiling, map and compass work, orienteering, knots and water safety, are taught and examined. In the second half of the year pupils take part in a wide range of topics, including canoeing, camp cooking, command tasks, kite-flying, advanced climbing, safe cycling and cycle maintenance. These courses are not assessed. The pupils are taught by staff and by Sixth Form instructors.

### Snowdonia School

### **Shell Form**


Every pupil in the Shell Form attends Snowdonia School. Snowdonia School involves spending time at the Snod School, the David Fricke Mountain Cottage in Mynydd Llandegai in Snowdonia, with a group of approximately 15 other pupils. Members of staff lead the week's activities during which there is the opportunity to go mountain walking, when possible, to the top of Snowdon, visiting a castle and Anglesey, canoeing, rock climbing and visiting a local slate mine. The experience of living together in a small community away from home is also very valuable. This experience also leads into the opportunities provided by the CCF and Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme in the Fourth Form and beyond. It is an incredible week, and one that often features fondly in leavers' messages in the Upper Sixth and beyond!

### **Drama Clubs / Productions**

Weekly Drama Clubs run throughout the year for various different year groups. Pupils have the opportunity to develop their production and performance skills, with a range of different outcomes. House Drama is a key feature of the first term for the Third Form, with Sixth Form students helping to produce the shows, and further productions are then open to pupils throughout the year. Some productions are year group focused, however some, such as the annual school Musical will be cross year group with pupils from across the school community taking part. Plays, monologues, musical theatre and more are all features of the Drama Club productions, and participation is encouraged. ### **Athletics (Summer Term)**

### AII

Athletics Club is open to all SS pupils. Sessions take place in the summer term at both lunchtime and after school, with inter-school fixtures also an option. Participation is encouraged and pupils have the opportunity to keep active and focus on specific elements of both track and field events.

### **Athletic Development**

### AII

Pupils are able to work with a specialist coach and equipment to develop different aspects of fitness to supplement their sport specific training. This is for all pupils, and is not just about lifting weights! Core strength, speed and muscle strength will be worked on in the sessions. opportunities to develop aspects of athletic develop in pupils who are competing, or taking part in sport, health and fitness at all levels. On SOCS there are a number of age relevant sessions that are available for sign up.

### **Badminton**

### **Fourth Form**

Badminton Club is open to pupils of any level. The atmosphere is relaxed and informal with an emphasis on recreation, although competition is available within the session.

### **Basketball**

### Sixth Form

This will be an informal, sociable activity run during a lunchtime for the Sixth Form. Key skills and game play will be the main focus of the session.



### Clay Pigeon Shooting\*

### **Senior Games Option**

Clay Pigeon Shooting is a Senior Games option that is run on a Wednesday afternoon. There is an additional charge for this activity, and details regarding this and arrangements for selecting this as an option will be communicated by the Sport Department when appropriate.

We have reintroduced our Senior School Fencing Club, pupils enjoyed working with our external coach Mr Raph Eldis, during the course of the summer term. This is an after school club run on a Thursday in the Preparatory School Sports Hall from 4:30-5:45pm. 
