FINISHING STRONG: PRELIMINARY SPRING TESTING DATA SHOWS ACADEMIC GAINS

Anthony Wayne Local Schools is proud to share promising preliminary results from the 2025 Ohio State Tests and End-of-Course exams. Early data indicates continued growth in student achievement across the District, with an increase in the percentage of students reaching proficiency or higher.

Preview data shows that 64% of all student scores fell into the state's top performance categories of *Accomplished* and *Advanced*. Additionally, the District improved its proficiency rates in 13 out of the 20 assessed areas—an exciting sign of continued academic progress.

While these results are considered preliminary until the official State Report Card is released this fall, the District is already reviewing the early data to continue to improve instruction and student support.

Thank you to our students, staff, and families for your tremendous effort and encouragement throughout the testing season. Your commitment to academic excellence continues to drive our District forward and prepare our students to be future-ready.



AWLS BOARD OF EDUCATION BRIEFS



MAY MEETING ACTIVITY

The Board heard from Rep. Josh Williams who spoke about the school funding formula and its potential effects on the District. AWLS building representatives presented their Positive Behavior Interventions & Supports (PBIS) frameworks.

They also voted on several items of new business, including AWEA and OAPSE contracts, the adoption of the Ohio Model Policies for Special Education and the hiring of Dr. Kevin Pfefferle as the District's new Assistant Superintendent.

A recording of the meeting is available on YouTube, and a recap of meeting activities was shared in a letter to stakeholders.

FINANCIAL UPDATES

FIVE-YEAR FORECAST

<u>The state requires the District to prepare a 5-Year Financial Forecast Update</u> in May each year. It is based on information that is available at the time of preparation. There are several variables that could affect the District's General Fund budget. They are detailed in the <u>5-Year Assumptions document</u>.

DONATIONS ACCEPTED

During its May meeting, the Board accepted \$10,650 in donations from various individuals and organizations in support of student activities and scholarships. A list of donations received during the 2025-26 school year is available online.



FACILITIES MASTER PLAN UPDATES



TRACK RECONSTRUCTION

Henry W. Bergeman, Inc. was selected to remove and reconstruct the track at AWHS, with the project expected to be complete by August 2025. View design.



MONCLOVA PRIMARY ROOF REPLACEMENT

The Board contracted with Bill Jackson Roofing, Inc. to replace ~62,000 sq. ft. of roof, with work completion expected in August 2025.



AWHS AUDITORIUM LIGHTING & SOUND AWJH & FTMS COOLER / FREEZER REPLACEMENTS

The Board is expected to vote on the contracts for this project at its regular June meeting. Work is anticipated to be complete in October 2025.



WATERVILLE PRIMARY CHILLERS & BOILERS REPLACEMENT

The Board approved a Resolution of Urgent Necessity and contract with Trane for this project. It is expected to be complete in Winter 2026.

GENERALS ATHLETICS




