We are so thankful to our growing community of readers, as you are all helping us make the celebration of women fashionable.



However, during her teens, she was exposed to the rich world of quantity surveyors, and she realized the path that her life needed to take. It took simple inspiration from someone close to her for this idea to cement.

I spent one holiday at her house and visited her offices, and that is exactly what inspired me. The fact that I had met up with one of the very few women in the country who was in the field of the built environment," she

Andiswa strives to build a company that rivals pre-established companies and is African women-led where there is a sorority, equality, and togetherness. Andiswa is not only the Managing Director of Okuhle Project Management but also Pivotal Technology Consulting. Both Okuhle Project Management and Pivotal Technology Consulting are built on the shoulders of young black women. The entities employ 80% young black women in their key personnel. Their commitment to the empowerment of black women is also reflected on their projects on site where 60% of their unskilled laborer's are black women. Business is one of many ways she strives to enact change and in her spare time, she also actively gives back to charity.

During her career in the construction industry, Andiswa gained her experience through her involvement in high profile projects such as SANRAL's Gauteng Freeway Improvement Project, the Kusile and Medupi Power Stations, Leewupoort Housing Development Project and the John Dube Mega Housing Project to name a few.

For future women, she wants to leave a single message.

"It's time. It's our time. I think that everything

the heroes of this country fought for and continue to fight for is exactly where we are now. Ours is to take the baton and continue fighting and moving forward, unafraid to do

so".

Very few people start a business without the intention to grow it and expand into multiple streams of growth. The same goes for people who enter the workplace, very rarely have they not considered how much further they want to go up the company structures. This becomes even more evident when you look at the number of people that often elevate their qualifications once they join the company, to stand a better chance at promotional opportunities. What often impacts women mostly after building a clear career foundation for themselves, is when they enter into serious relationships promising marriage, and or get married and have children. Why? Because what was once crystal clear in how they want to advance in their careers, now has an additional leg of consideration, and that is, how will this move impact my household.

Often times, people are faced with the decision to choose which of the two is more important, this especially when they are faced with a big or progressive opportunity that mav destabilise their home relationships. Should you choose your relationship, then there is a possibility you may need to give up on the other thing entirely. It seems almost impossible for there to be any compromise here — if one thing is more important than another, it's either all or nothing — it's difficult for there to be anything in between or so we think.

I bet if you were to ask many people this question, most would say that maybe having both career and relationships isn't perfect. Settling with the right person and ultimately getting married is tough enough as it is, therefore prioritising your career over that happy home may just not be worth it. Priorities change and ambitions and aspirations get adjusted once you enter into a commitment. This is the reality for so many women and becomes the canvas for why women believe they must choose between the two.

With that said, most women who have homemaker responsibilities - including being married and having children, they tend to already feel tired from these responsibilities; for example, further studies, dropping off and picking up the children at school, waking up earlier to see to the family and helping with the homework. In most cases, women don't have time to invest or do something more than that. Women tend to give what's left of their energy which is one of the major contributors of why they struggle to get promoted or their career progression tends to be a bit slower in high competitive environments. In fact, it may also affect their work performance. Its easy for the lack of energy to disguise itself in one's performance at work, as there is very little mental capacity left to contribute creatively. This off course does not apply to all women and cannot be solely attributed to why progress is slow, but it certainly lands itself in the mix.

The difference between men and women in this regard. For some, who may be presented with the opportunity for mobility, for example, career change, moving away from home, perhaps an international assignment, changing jobs, take up a new bigger project where they may work more hours, men are more likely to jump into these opportunities as opposed to women, women will most likely tend to procrastinate. This doesn't have to be negative, women are more likely to consider their families, whether they may have the time to give to this task and may consult their husbands perhaps get permission and justify their reasoning for wanting to the extra responsibilities. In that regard, this is one of the reasons why career advancement is slower for women – their stability linked to love and/or the relationship often tends to take priority. For an opportunity to go abroad, its easy for men to pack and go and sometimes the wife follows, resigning form her job as the partners prospects in what the opportunity will bring, outweighs what she is making today. However the likelihood of a male partner doing the same, is very rare.

CAN YOU HAVE IT ALL?

I think that every person should be able to choose how they spend their time and energy. I don't think it's wrong to want to make a lot of money or to find or share love with someone at the same time, and in equal parts. We need to create that balance for ourselves, delegate where we can. Being a homemaker doesn't confine you to only focus on that and or tire yourself out without any help because you are at home all day. The choice is yours how else you want to use that time to push small business ideas and divide your time to get to everything without always feeling worn out.

Being a career woman is not about moving up only as a means of growth, but looking for lateral projects or jobs that will expand your mental capacity and acumen can come in various shapes or forms. We need to always listen out for those opportunities and make the time for what we truly want. Nothing is more disappointing than looking back at your life and resenting the choices you have made and feeling defeat for the sacrifices you made along the way. We need to learn to make multiple bets on ourselves despite who comes into our lives. Here are three things I believe can sometimes be overwhelming but equally rewarding. Giving and receiving love must come in equal parts. Check yourself that you are not just a giver or love to multiple people but not receiving it back.

Manage family commitments and demands so to not drain and or overextend yourself. Takers have no limits and boundaries, therefore create one that will ensure there is support and responsibility is shared.

Don't neglect your time with friends, as sharing experiences and helps unlock another way of thinking and living. Friends shouldn't only be there for you to remember each other's birthdays, but mutually benefit from both life and professional experiences

"Getting myself to where I am right now has to do with how my parents groomed me to be the young lady that I am, and basically, I've always had the morals of helping others," she proudly states.

In her eyes, power is the ability of communities to unite regardless of their differences. Yet, the more she looked at the realistic conditions of the world and the treatment of women, the more she realised that she needed to do something to change this.

"The ability to have young girls have a voice for themselves. The ability of inspiration. Because, in homes parents are busy and they don't always have time to nurture young girls. So through my work that I do, I try to encourage. To Inspire. To bring young girls together with problems," she states.

Her platform, The Feminine Empowerment and Growth Blog can be considered a love child between being a personal diary and musings meant to be educational. Yet, her own life wasn't easy in the beginning. Coming from an educated family, when she failed a module during her course in Business Management in Accounting. Yet she chose to rise above. In her own words, she's taken risks and knew that sometimes you needed to believe in something other than yourself. Although she attempted university, in her heart she knew where she wanted to be: the feminine wellness and beauty industry.

"I am a very feminine woman, so I feel like the more we as women can tap into a feminine energy, it brings out really who we are," she states.

Her expression of femineity includes self-care and feeling good about yourself in your skin through makeup.

"For me personally, it is more than the aesthetic. I feel like it has to do more with affirmations we tell ourselves each and every day, " she adds.

With this in mind, Sabbionne views makeup as an enhancer more than a tool that is accessible to everyone and shouldn't ascribe to one standard of beauty. To the layman, Sabbionne's work might seem simply surface level. Yet at the beginning of her journey, she chose the philanthropist role of giving girls attending their matric-ball free makeup. Her depth speaks for itself in her simple answer that authenticity in womanhood is powerful, and this power can make the world shake in reverence. As she grows more in her power, she sees herself in the future as a woman who leads an academy that seeks to distil skills to shape young women and groom them while also wishing for her salon at some point. Her passion led her to the idea of establishing an NPO. She has a single message for women.

"They've got this. Any circumstances, any obstacles that come their way, they got this," she firmly states.

PUSELETSO MANYAKA

With STEM pushing the world towards the Fourth Industrial Revolution, the science fraternity has made many strides to change the world. With this space has been created for women, and today it is no longer a field only associated with a certain type of man. However, women in the industry seldom receive praise for the scientific advancements they contribute to, and this needs to change fast. This is partially because of the idea that women should sit back and allow advancements in science only to be made by men, but also the idea that women will never have as much acclaim as men. Although this phenomenon is slowly fading with the advent of gender reform in the workplace. Puseletso Manyaka, Medical Biological Scientist, is a testament to both strength and not getting recognized for the work that you do.

Puseletso rarely calls herself adventurous. This spirit of enterprise makes sense if one considers the career field she chose to follow, science. Science can open eyes to how the world works, despite the consensus that science is dull to the mind.

Puseletso's decision to pursue science stems from a childhood spirit of innocence and wonder, which her schooling and teacher mother enhanced.

"I was inquisitive as a child, so I wanted to find out how things and basically the biology of things works. It was mostly my mother who inspired and pushed me because she is also a teacher. I remember the first experience when I wanted to move into sciences, it was when I had a project to do with the heart, and how it pumps blood in and out. That experience sparked something within me, and the rest is history." she reminisced.

Scientists possess the remarkable ability to make the world a better place for our future generation and the world has been witnessing this for a long time now. The first successful heart transplant in the world was accomplished on our very soil by Christian Barnard on 3 December 1967. To Puseletso Manyaka, science has a similar power of influence as she believes that science is critical to society.

In her profession, her field, Diagnostics, can be considered the backbone of medical sciences.

"If somebody goes to the doctor, they draw your blood, the testing that is done is not done by that doctor but elsewhere and by someone else. By the time the results come back, I would have been the one in the lab having processed and made sure these results are correct," she says.

Puseletso's work as a clinical medical scientist was only further shown during the height of the COVID-19 Pandemic. Many people lost their lives during the pandemic globally, and the world is still recovering. However, like many on the front lines, the pandemic was particularly draining to one's physical and mental health

Puseletso strives for a world where women can feel the right to claim space in any maledominated field with grace. And wants women to understand that it will always be challenging no matter what, but one's own resilience is critical and plays an important role is achieving the success we want.

Puseletso understands the demands that come with not only being a woman in her field, but also being a mother and a wife. Balancing all these can be hard sometimes and perhaps impact on your productivity, but one must find the balance in all of these. Being a woman who has or is expected to multitask cannot be our excuse forever. With the birth of her child came the need to choose between her family and furthering her career. She had to choose between completing her Master's Degree or taking the job offer, which led to her choosing employment to continue her child's stability and has no regrets about her choice.

"I'm quite fulfilled now in my career," she happily states.

Her last statement sums up the work she has done and her spirit.
