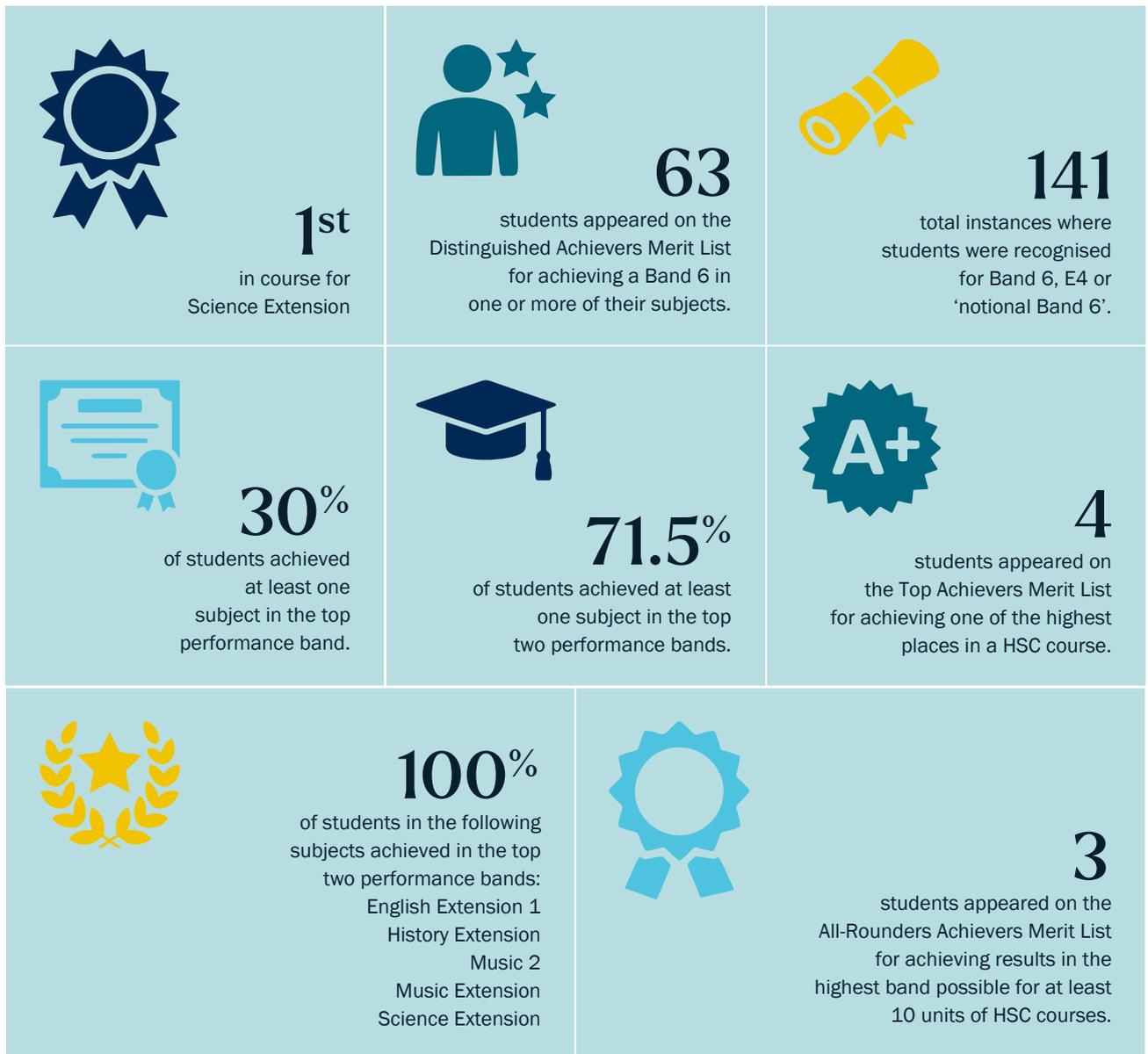

Being named Dux of the College for 2025 reflected years of focus, discipline and intentional learning for Matthew Willett. Having been at the College since Year 2 in 2015, he brought both experience and perspective into his senior years, where his habits and determination fully took flight. “I have definitely seen myself grow and mature into a more well-rounded person,” said Matthew. “I’ve seen a lot of growth in my personal worldview and how I can try to become a more positive influence for others around me.”

That desire to positively influence others was strengthened through service, especially activities that pushed him beyond his comfort zone. “Even small actions can make a big difference in a variety of different communities,” he reflected, taking that lesson beyond the College gates to make an impact in his new surroundings.

Teachers also left a lasting mark on Matthew’s journey. Ms Moon, his English teacher, “refused to give up on me” and “encouraged and empowered me to put as much effort in as possible and seek improvement”, helping him build confidence and critical thinking. Another teacher cheering him on was Mr Macourt who challenged him in Business Studies to extend himself inside and outside the classroom and was always available for advice and mentorship. Their support reinforced habits of responsibility, diligence and resilience that shaped his senior years.

These experiences informed Matthew’s understanding of what it means to be an extraordinary learner. He described an extraordinary learner as “someone who is able to

holistically and consistently work towards their goals and aspirations. Everybody has different goals for their learning journeys but what remains consistent regardless of goals is the need to achieve balance across all aspects of life, whether that be academics or Co-curriculars, leadership or personal wellness.” Being goal-driven was central to Matthew’s success: consistent effort, rather than last-minute work, allowed him to take advantage of the “compound effect” rather than cramming around assessment tasks.

As Matthew begins a Bachelor of Actuarial Studies and Commerce at the University of NSW, he carries not only the achievement of Dux, but also the mindset, habits and heart of an extraordinary learner.

Faith was at the heart of Grace Karam’s journey at William Clarke College, shaping both her approach to learning and the way she engaged with the world. Believing that God had a plan for her, she attended Mass and prayed before exams, allowing herself to surrender her worries and approach each challenge with confidence, calmness and clarity. “I trusted that God was present throughout each exam and challenge,” she said, a perspective that guided her throughout Year 11 and 12 as she became increasingly dedicated and disciplined in her studies.

Her dedication combined confidence, belief in her own ability and practical organisation. She credited a strong support system who constantly encouraged and prayed for her as key to her success, alongside strategies such as creating daily to-do lists, planning her week in advance, setting personal deadlines ahead of official due dates and breaking larger tasks into manageable goals.

Maintaining a healthy balance was equally important. Evenings were often reserved for reading or watching television as a reward for completed tasks, while piano lessons continued until HSC Trials, providing a creative outlet that supported her wellbeing. Walks through quiet streets helped clear her mind when the pressure felt overwhelming, sustaining her energy and focus.

Service became another way for Grace to live out her faith. Through helping others, she learned that “true joy is found in selflessness,” deepening her understanding of Christ’s teachings and the importance of supporting those around

her. Her growth was reinforced by dedicated teachers and Mr Arthur, Head of Year, who consistently offered encouragement, guidance and feedback.

As she prepares to enrol in a Bachelor of Commerce and Bachelor of Laws at the University of Sydney, Grace carries with her both the habits of an extraordinary learner – someone, as she described, “who demonstrates consistency, resilience and commitment in their studies” – and the virtues that have shaped her journey. “Compassion guided me to support and uplift my peers. The HSC had once felt like an insurmountable challenge for Shahaan Choksey but through determination and persistence he became confident in the power of hard work. Admitting he was terrified by the HSC, this driven student experienced a shift in thinking, realising the value of giving 100 per cent and celebrating the success that follows. “Looking back I see how facets of my school life transformed me into a student that didn’t see school as ‘hard’ or ‘serious’, and instead as an opportunity just to do my best and to make memories,” he said.

Consistency and a strong support network were central to Shahaan’s success. “I studied every single day, even if it was just for an hour. I’d hold myself accountable with a schedule and made sure I never let the end goal out of sight,” he explained.

Encouragement from teachers, family and friends kept him motivated, while understanding the HSC system and planning strategically allowed him to steadily improve his results. “It’s testament that anyone can succeed no matter where they started, even someone like me who failed my Year 9 Math yearly,” said Shahaan with a smile.

With this attitude, it is no wonder that Shahaan defined an extraordinary learner as “someone who can give their best whilst encouraging others to do so too. Someone who keeps asking questions, pestering teachers for feedback and helping their classmates when needed.”

Now aiming to undertake a double degree in Economics and Commerce at the University of NSW, Shahaan believes

faith played a major role in his learning, something that will undoubtedly sustain him in this next chapter. “It kept me grounded and also allowed me to have trust in God that things would work out,” he recalled. “Before every test I’d pray to ask for help and clarity of mind, and looking back, it gave me so much confidence and hence success.”

Service became another lens for growth. Helping friends with assignments or offering guidance reminded him his value extended beyond marks, and being part of the Leadership Team provided further opportunities to support others. “Hearing the differing perspectives and ideas of the Leadership Team reminded me that everyone is unique. We can all contribute to make the College, or any community, a better place. It really is incredibly rewarding to help people.”

From her early days of arriving at William Clarke College in 2024, Aarna Agarwal knew she was drawn to a future spent serving others. Her hope to pursue medicine and become a surgeon has been shaped not only by academic discipline but also by a steady growth in character across her time at the College.

“I have grown significantly in confidence, resilience and self-awareness,” said Aarna. “I have learnt how to manage challenges, accept feedback and persevere when things are difficult. Academically, I have become more disciplined and independent, and I have also developed a clearer sense of my values and the type of person I want to be.”

That growth influenced how Aarna approached learning itself. She came to see an extraordinary learner as someone who is “curious, reflective and willing to step outside their comfort zone”, understanding that responsibility and improvement go hand in hand, and that “mistakes are an essential part of growth”.

This mindset sustained her through the demands of Years 11-12, where she discovered that consistency mattered more than intensity. Careful organisation, effective time management and breaking tasks into manageable goals became key, supported by teachers and peers who encouraged her to keep working effectively.

In her senior years, Aarna learnt the importance of balance by being intentional with her time. While she prioritised preparation for exams and assessments, she enjoyed being a part of Co-curricular Music in Year 11, which helped her

stay motivated and connected. Making space for rest on weekends also allowed her to return to her studies with focus and clarity.

Aarna also discovered that “small actions can have a significant impact” and she felt most fulfilled when supporting those around her, adding that serving others “also taught me empathy, patience and the importance of listening”. However, for Aarna it was the College virtue of compassion that shaped her the most. “It has influenced how I treat others, how I respond to challenges and how I see my future. Compassion has guided my desire to pursue medicine and reminds me that my personal success is based on the impact I have on others.”

Of the six virtues, hope became the steady thread through Charlotte Wiggins' journey at William Clarke College, shaping how she approached challenges, learning and life beyond the classroom. "Even through tough times, or when life felt dull or difficult, hope helped me keep moving forward and stay positive," she reflected. "It reminded me that challenges are temporary, that effort and perseverance matter, and that better days are always ahead."

That spirit of hope was evident in Charlotte's growth during her time at the College. She became more confident in herself and her abilities, learning to manage responsibilities independently and to meet setbacks with resilience. Leadership further strengthened this growth, as she realised "leadership is about responsibility and integrity, not power", and that genuine influence comes from leading by example while remaining grounded in friendships, wellbeing and studies.

Academically, Charlotte discovered that mindset mattered as much as talent. She realised that anything was possible if she was willing to put in the time and effort, and that consistent application helped her push past self-doubt. Support from teachers in her senior years encouraged deeper thinking and engagement, and learning to enjoy the process made the workload feel less overwhelming. Mrs Kroll inspired her to enter Lions Youth of the Year, helping her find her voice, while Mr Macourt's guidance helped her "see the value in asking questions, thinking critically and using knowledge to make a positive impact". For Charlotte, this reflected what it meant to be an extraordinary learner, giving

her best while also managing time, supporting others and making space for the things that brought her joy.

Service revealed another dimension of her character. Through helping others, she learnt "how rewarding it can be to make a positive difference, even in small ways", and discovered strengths in patience, listening and teamwork. She learnt how important it is to approach service with empathy and understanding, but most importantly of all, it showed her "that serving others not only benefits them, but also helps me grow as a person".

Looking ahead, Charlotte hopes to study psychology or psychiatry while making space to travel and embrace new experiences. Shaped by hope, she steps forward with confidence, purpose and a desire to make a meaningful difference.

Being named first in NSW for Science Extension for the 2025 HSC was a moment Rowen McLean will never forget. She credits much of this achievement to her Science teacher Dr Ontedhu, whose blend of brilliance and humility redefined the way she understood learning. "In the world of academics, it's easy to get wrapped up in ego and competition, but she embodied the side of academia that uses intelligence not as a weapon to bolster oneself but as a tool to help grow, inspire and impassion students to have that zeal for learning and what it can do to shape a better world."

Under Dr Ontedhu's guidance, Rowen discovered that being an extraordinary learner was not about perfect marks but about curiosity, discipline and the willingness to go that little bit further than expected. "I don't think [an extraordinary learner] is defined by something as linear as an A," Rowen reflected. "It's the quiet personal challenge to try and do better than last time and accepting that may be a slow process."

After starting Year 9 at the College, Rowen grew steadily in confidence. She found teachers who helped her believe that high achievement was possible through persistence. Equally important was the College's holistic vision. She learnt that character mattered more than accolades and that showing Christ's love through her work would always outweigh any result on paper, a perspective she believes is vital for the competitive path of medicine she is looking forward to undertaking at university.

For Rowen, success came from holding tightly to a clear goal. Visualising herself as a doctor carried her through long seasons of study, while consistency built momentum. She is honest about the cost. Dropping sport and Co-curricular Activities in Year 12 led to burnout, a lesson she now shares with younger students about the importance of balance.

Most importantly, faith shaped Rowen's approach to learning and leadership. She described "worrying about not doing enough and slipping behind in the vicious cycle of comparison the HSC can force upon you. But my faith was the anchor that I drew back to when I felt like I wasn't enough, reminding me that simply being alive and a child of God is the greatest blessing regardless of my academic performance."

Nirja Shah's plans beyond William Clarke College are driven by a deep concern for both people and planet. She hopes to commence a double degree in Advanced Science and Engineering at the University of NSW, motivated by the belief that the changing conditions of the earth demand practical and compassionate action.

Over time, she became increasingly aware that environmental challenges are not shared equally. "The nations hit the hardest are often those that lack access to the resources we take for granted such as clean water and sanitation, electricity and adequate infrastructure," she exclaimed. With the skills from her degree, Nirja hopes to develop sustainable engineering solutions to improve livelihoods and protect the environment for future generations.

This sense of responsibility grew through her experiences of service. From Clean Up Australia Day to flood relief, hamper drives and youth leadership, Nirja saw how care for people and creation are closely connected, learning that service was less about tasks and more about relationships. "Seeing the smile brought on someone's face upon receiving a kind act of service is the most valuable sort," she said, embracing the phrase that "in the joy of others lies our own".

During her time at the College, Nirja noticed a quieter transformation within herself. By her senior years, she viewed those around her with greater openness and compassion, realising that everyone carried their own story. This shift also shaped the way she approached learning. For Nirja, an extraordinary learner is someone who refuses to give up, who

allows curiosity to lead them deeper and who treats mistakes as stepping stones rather than setbacks. "Whilst they may not have all the answers, they are willing to exceed their expectations, due to their love of learning," she said.

Consistency and discipline became the keys to her success, built through steady routines and intentional effort. However, she was quick to point out that faith strengthened that foundation, giving her hope during exams and reminding her that her worth was never measured by a final number. "Faith has definitely taught me that success in academics only comes through a combination of hard work and prayer, as either one alone would not have got me to where I am today."

Teachers played a defining role in that transformation. Bianca speaks warmly of Mrs Totonjian, whose personal example showed her how to face adversity with courage and grace. She credits her Mentors and Mr Arthur with providing both challenge and encouragement, creating a sense of community that carried her through the intensity of senior study. Their belief in her became the confidence she needed to believe in herself.

That growing assurance shaped the way Bianca approached learning. For her, being an extraordinary learner was not only about marks but about passion and generosity. She found that enjoying her subjects allowed her to excel, while supporting classmates gave purpose to her effort. Consistency became her anchor. As Darling House Captain, Bianca discovered another layer of growth. The role developed her Public Speaking and collaboration skills and taught her how to balance responsibility with relationships. This leadership role provided her “with a forum to connect with younger grades, gaining valuable insights into their beliefs and values,” she stated.

Bianca now hopes to study a double degree in Law and Arts, majoring in Politics and International Relations, with the goal of working in international law and human rights. She carries forward a desire to make genuine, positive change, convinced that courage, the virtue that shaped her most, will continue to guide the path ahead.

For Chanel Van Neijenhoff, academic success was never about a straight, uninterrupted climb. It was about learning how to bend without breaking. She believes her senior year turning point was developing clear goals while staying flexible when plans shifted. “If you stay too rigid in the face of setbacks, you’ll topple over and feel like your end goal is unachievable,” she mused. “The key to my academic success was being able to shift my mindset to seeing setbacks as learning curbs rather than roadblocks.”

That change in thinking reshaped the way she approached school. As she discovered subjects she loved, particularly Economics and Legal Studies, learning became something she pursued rather than endured. She moved from “someone who simply sat in class and absorbed information to someone who actively sought out knowledge for the sole purpose of satiating my new curiosities”, a shift that awakened both confidence and independence.

This attitude sits at the heart of what Chanel believes makes an extraordinary learner. For her, it is “someone who not only reflects on mistakes but uses mistakes to fuel success by wielding setbacks as tools to grow,” she stated. “It means being responsible for your own learning and not aiming to just know the answer, but aiming to understand, improve and keep learning each day.”

However, she is quick to point out that this attitude did not develop in isolation. Compassion, she says, was the virtue that shaped her most, largely through the example of her teachers. Their willingness to always be available, patiently

revisiting concepts, convinced her that they genuinely believed in her potential. “One of the main reasons I believe I did well is because of all the extra time after class my teachers spent with me solidifying topics when I asked,” reflected Chanel. That kindness became her motivation, giving her the confidence to persist through challenges, especially when topics felt difficult, and to see setbacks as part of the process.

Today, Chanel hopes to study Environmental Law and Urban Planning, fields that reflect her intellectual interests and love of learning. She heads into this new phase of life with the lessons of curiosity, resilience and responsibility, ready to approach each new challenge with the mindset of an extraordinary learner.

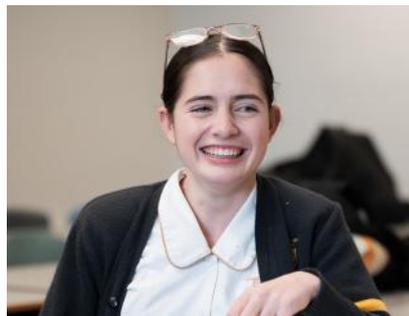
