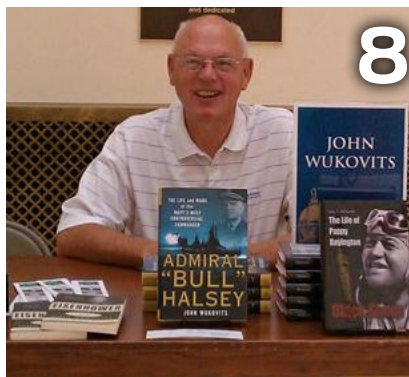

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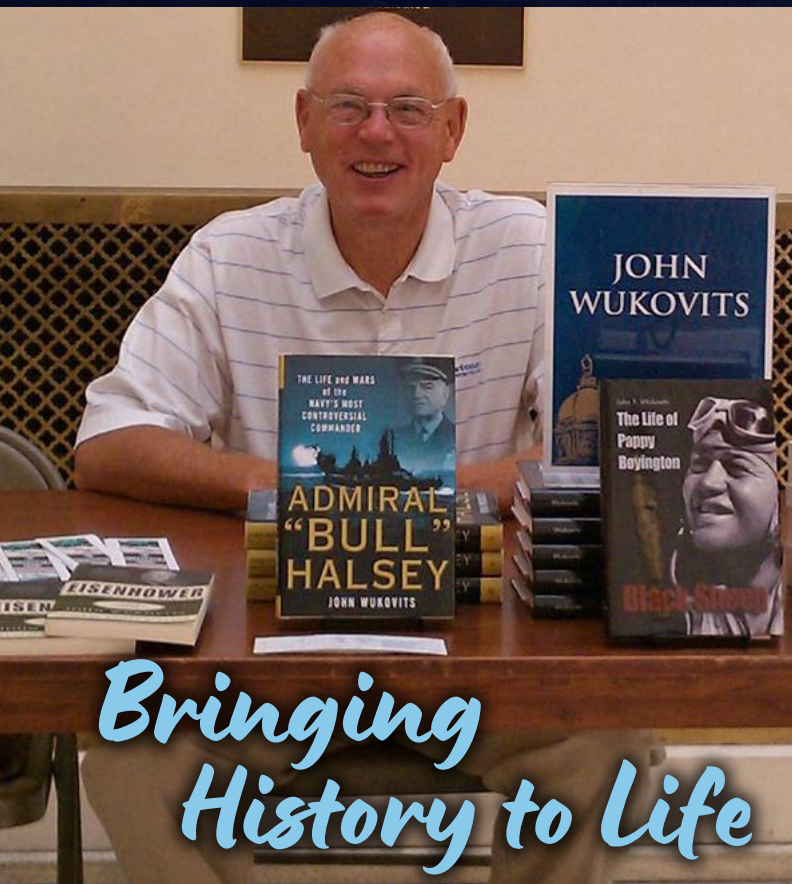
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Bringing History to Life

Military historian John Wukovits preserving the stories of America's Greatest Generation

JOHN Wukovits was in fourth grade when a library book changed the course of his life.

"I read a book about the Battle of the Coral Sea, and I was hooked," he said. "I was fascinated by the contrast between beautiful South Pacific islands with blue lagoons and the incredible violence that took place there."

More than seven decades later, Wukovits is one of America's foremost historians of the Pacific Theater during World War II.

Born in Akron, Ohio, in 1944, Wukovits moved to Trenton with his family in 1956 after his father, an employee of Firestone Tire and Rubber Company, transferred to the Detroit area. He attended St. Joseph Catholic School before enrolling at Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit, initially believing he might become a Catholic priest.

"Instead, history became my calling," he said.

After earning a bachelor's degree in history from the University of Notre Dame and a master's degree in American history from Michigan State University in 1968, Wukovits began a 30-year teaching career. In 1982, he decided it was time to follow the same advice he had long given his students.

"I was always telling my eighth graders to chase their dreams," he said. "One day I realized I wasn't doing that myself."

His first published article, for the *Wyandotte News-Herald*,

earned him \$20. Soon afterward, he pulled out his Smith Corona typewriter and rattled off letters to 40 of the nation's leading military historians asking for advice.

"Twenty-one of them wrote back," he recalled. "Tom Buell became a mentor, and eventually asked me to help research one of his projects. That opened a lot of doors."

Today, Wukovits has authored 14 books for major publishers, including "Tin Can Titans", "One Square Mile of Hell" and "Pacific Alamo". His work has earned national recognition, including the prestigious Samuel Eliot Morison Award for Naval Literature, and his research has led to interviews with nearly 400 World War II veterans.

One story has stayed with him more than any other.

"Charles Natter was just 19 years old during the Battle off Samar (1944)," Wukovits said. "After his ship was sunk, he repeatedly swam through dangerous currents to rescue fellow sailors. Eventually, both he and his friend Tom Mazura were killed by sharks. That level of courage and selflessness is unforgettable."

For Wukovits, history is more than dates and battle maps.

"I know I've found the emotional center of a story when it moves me personally," he said. "I want readers to feel like they're in the middle of the action, to experience the fear, the sorrow, the courage."

His decades in the classroom continue to shape his writing.

"When I'm writing, I often picture my eighth-grade students," he said. "If they can understand it, then I've done my job."

Now 81, Wukovits is researching his next book, focusing on Notre Dame alumni who served during World War II. Away from his desk, he enjoys golf, watching sports and reading from his personal library of more than 2,000 books, 80 percent of which are World War II related.

He also remains grateful for the community he has called home for nearly 70 years.

"I love the Trenton-Woodhaven area," he said. "It still has that great small-town feel. One of the best parts is running into former students all these years later."

His advice to aspiring writers is as timeless as the history he preserves.

"Read constantly. Write every day," he said. "Great passion produces great writing."



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Hard Work, Dedication, Discipline

IN 2001, Dave Christie took the lessons of hard work, dedication and discipline that he developed from his time serving his country, and applied them to serving his family and employees when he founded CMAC Transportation in Brownstown. Twenty-five years later his company has become a national logistics heavyweight, with more than 100 trucks, 400 trailers, and 1 million square feet of warehouse space in the Detroit area.

A certified Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business (SDVOSB), CMAC Transportation continues to put its foot on the gas with even higher expectations and goals to become bigger and better.

"My goal was to run an honest, disciplined, customer-first transportation company rooted in the values I learned during my time in the service," Christie said. "Twenty-five years later, I am proud to say we have done that and more. I believe my military background has shaped CMAC's culture of precision, reliability and accountability – and why it still shows in every load."

This milestone anniversary isn't just a number – it's a story about what happens when military discipline meets entrepreneurial grit, and how a southeast Michigan company quietly became an indispensable part of the regional supply chain, serving automotive giants, industrial manufacturers and beyond.

Today, CMAC's leadership team – including Scott Christie, Stephen Tripp, Jacob Christie, and Brad New – reflects the company's values of trust, teamwork and long-term relationships.

"It's been a long run for us," said Scott Christie, president/CEO. "When we started we had five trucks and 15 people. Over the years, we have been fortunate to

have good customers, good business relationships and partnerships and some of the best people in the trucking industry working for us. And it's these people who have driven this company to where it's at right now."

The business has earned a truck load of accomplishments, honors and accolades over the past 25 years, including Brownstown Township Business of the Year, Yanfeng Automotive Supplier Excellence Award,



Ford Motor Company Leadership Profile, Expeditors Supplier of the Year, VOBRT Lifetime Achievement Award (Dave Christie), SmartWay Transport Partner, and Certified SDVOSB | Women-Owned via MSH Logistics (WBENC).



CMAC Transportation, which provides domestic and international warehousing, consolidation, transportation, and logistics, took delivery in late 2022 of an all-electric, zero-emissions semi-tractor to haul auto parts within Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties. The company was selected by the state for this FTP grant project because of their longstanding reputation and

commitment to technology and driver safety.

"We are continuously pushing the bar as far as technology in our organization," Scott Christie said. "We have been in business for 25 years with one mission, and have grown from a local carrier to a national logistics provider while staying true to our small-business roots."

Roughly 20 percent of the CMAC workforce is made up of veterans, with over 265 years of combined military service across the company.

After you submit the application, a calendar will pop up allowing you to schedule an appointment with our enrollment specialist to finalize the enrollment and turn in necessary documentation.

About Kindergarten and Young 5's:

ABOUT GETTING YOUR CHILD STARTED

EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT

In education, everything begins at the beginning — and today, that "beginning" is earlier than ever.

Studies have shown that the earlier a child enters a structured educational environment, the better s/he will do in later grades.

To help parents give their youngsters a leg up on their education, we have a number of early childhood development programs aimed at doing just that:

- First, our **all-day kindergarten** program is available in all five elementary schools.
- Our **Young Fives** program is designed for younger children whose parents feel they are not yet ready for traditional kindergarten.
- In partnership with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, WBSD provides free books on a monthly basis for children ages 0 to 5 years old who live in the school district.
- Kinder Lit Lab is a four-week summer program developed by Wayne RESA that focuses on literacy and STEM. Each elementary school has one section with up to 15 students. This program is facilitated by WBSD teachers and paraprofessionals.
- **Early Childhood Special Education** preschool is for children 3-5 years old who qualify for services under an Individual Educational Plan.
- **TOTE/Early On — the Teach Our Tots Early program** provides early intervention special education home visits for children up to 3 years old with moderate to severe developmental delays.
- **Great Start Readiness (GSRP)** — is a free preschool program for 4-year-olds who have identified risks for academic difficulties and/or meet low-income requirements.

WOODHAVEN UPPER ELEMENTARY

Woodhaven Upper Elementary is the home to fifth- and sixth-grade students in the district.

The WBSD developed a comprehensive reconfiguration plan that involved years of research and development. The fifth- and sixth-grade Woodhaven Upper Elementary School began large-scale updates to include new playgrounds, a STEM classroom, a technology lab, middle and high-school robotics, Learning Commons, classroom renovations, new art studios, and a new band and choir space.

Students are in houses of approximately 100-115 students. They travel to specials and lunch with their house each day. The fifth-grade students have two core subject teachers who each teach mathematics and reading to their homeroom class, and either science or social studies. The sixth-grade students have four core subject teachers, one for mathematics, reading, social studies, and science. Along with the four core academic areas, fifth graders will have music, art, STEM and gym specials.

Sixth graders will have the same core academic areas, including advanced math, as they do now and the following

non-core courses, including STEM, gym, art, world language, band and choir.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES KEEP STUDENTS "YOUNGER LONGER"

We developed a program that includes playgrounds and intentionally designed houses within the building to keep it smaller. This isn't a middle school, but rather an upper elementary.

GRADUAL RELEASE OF RESPONSIBILITY

In the program, fifth graders have two teachers and four teachers in sixth grade. This gradual release is developmentally appropriate and sets our students up for success.

STUDENT-CENTERED

From the core and beyond, each element of the program is student-centered. The building also has implemented time to provide daily academic and social-emotional intervention and enrichment.

ECM is a blend of high school and college courses leading to a tuition-free associate degree while still in high school. 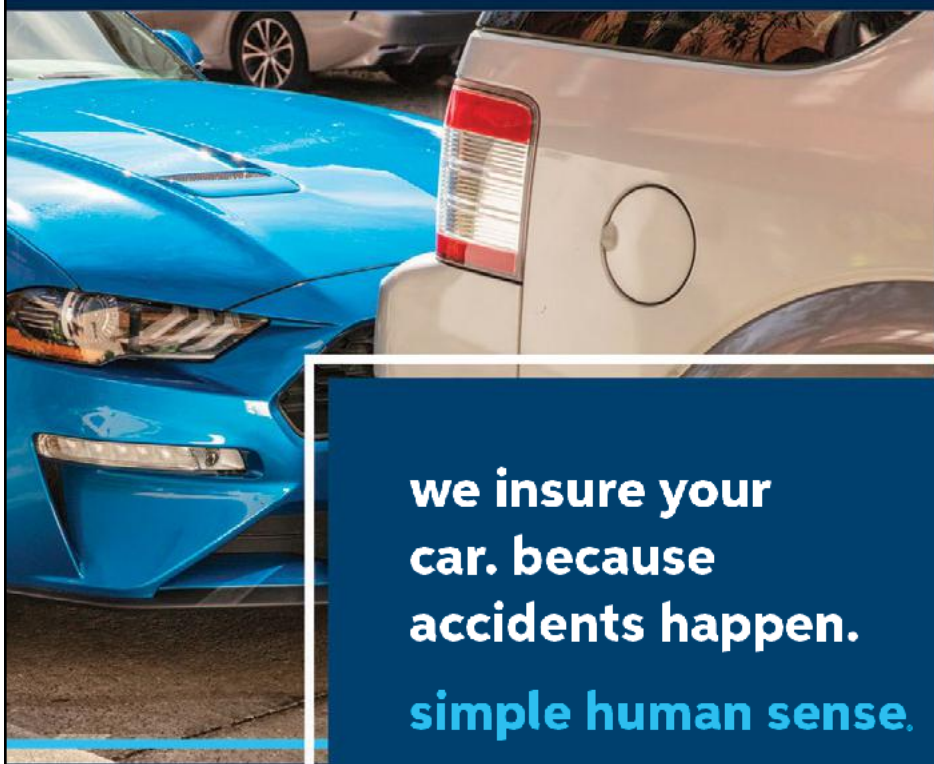

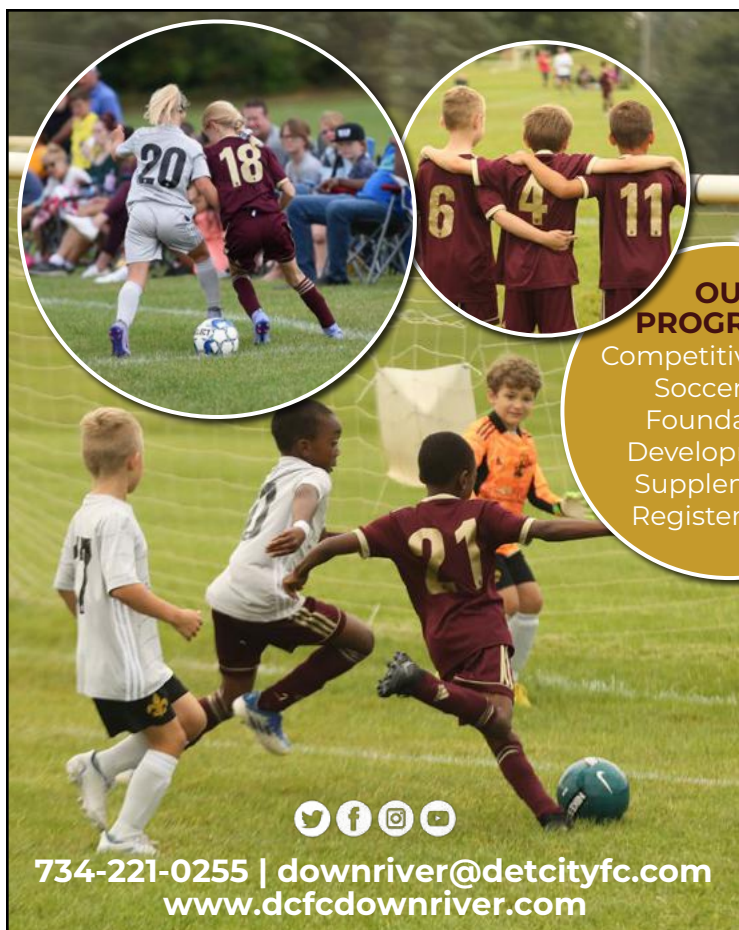

THE Pointe Mouillee Waterfowl Festival is not only America's oldest Waterfowl Festival but helps support a number of important groups, including the Pointe Mouillee State Game Area and conservation efforts, youth organizations and the local community.

Proceeds will benefit habitat at Pointe Mouillee State Game Area, the largest freshwater marsh restoration project in North America, located in the Detroit River International Wildlife Refuge.

This family-friendly event has been a Downriver tradition where nature lovers truly enjoy a wide range of fun outdoor activities, including popular events such as dog-jumping competitions and archery challenges.

"It all started in 1947 when duck hunters debated who was best at various duck-hunting techniques, such as setting decoys, shooting, punting, rowing, and carving decoys. It has since blossomed into what we have today," said Bob Whitwam, executive director of the Pointe Mouillee Waterfowl Festival. "There is something to see, do or buy for all ages."

This year's event, September 19-20, will feature longtime favorites including the large trading post, art tent, decoy tent, lake championship layout shoot (Saturday), Michigan Duck Hunters tour (Sunday), Huron River championship dog jump, puppy row, dog demonstration, kids tent (free), bow and arrow shoots (free), BB gun shoot (free), muck race (for ages, free and \$100 for winners), food trucks, beer tent, and live music.

The event also includes hourly raffles.

"This event could not be done without the help of the festival board/committee, volunteers and our great sponsors who make this work possible," Whitwam said.

"Pointe Mouillee Waterfowl Festival is a 501(c)(3) organization and our funds support various projects, youth activities

and equipment. The latest project is our second ADA hunting blind/walkway, which makes Pointe Mouillee Game Area accessible year-round."

Pointe Mouillee is rich in duck-hunting



tradition, but it is so much more: it is in the middle of the international wildlife refuge and is one of the major hubs for migratory birds and home to many other animals.

Pet-friendly events are planned for this year's festival, along with the annual arts and crafts show where vendors offer a variety of

waterfowl and wildlife art-based items for sale. Also continuing this year will be a kids tent with face painting and outdoor-themed games sponsored by the Huron-Clinton Metroparks and other local sponsors.

It does not matter if you are not a hunter – everyone is welcome to come and enjoy the festival.

"So spend a day or two with us – bring the family to enjoy Mother Nature at the Pointe Mouillee Waterfowl Festival," Whitwam said.

The Pointe Mouillee State Game Area also hosts an annual walleye tournament (May 30) and Bill Barrow Memorial Sporting Clay Shoot (July 25).

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SPINNING RECORDS, BUILDING COMMUNITY

Justin McMillen blends automotive expertise, electronic music and a passion for collecting

FROM automotive paint shops to underground warehouses, Brownstown's Justin McMillen has spent most of his life immersed in two worlds: the automotive industry and Detroit's legendary electronic music scene.

Born and raised Downriver in Riverview, McMillen credits his family and upbringing for shaping his career and lifelong love of music.

"My mom is from Southgate and my dad grew up in Newcomerstown, Ohio," he said. "We were always a music family."

McMillen graduated from Light and Life Christian School in Taylor before earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Exercise Physiology from Wayne State University.

Today, he works for PPG Industries, one of the world's largest paint manufacturers, where he supports multi-shop organizations (MSOs) and collision repair centers throughout the automotive refinishing industry.

"I've spent most of my career in automotive," he said. "I've worked in OEM roles, business development, sales, and even as a plant manager. Every position taught me something different."

In 2016, Justin and his wife Jamie moved to Brownstown.

"We built our house and moved here with our sons, Brady and Liam," he said. "The location is fantastic. We feel close to everything, and the township has seen a lot of positive growth over the past several years."

Outside of work, McMillen is perhaps best known in music circles for a passion that stretches back more than three decades.

"I started DJing in 1993," he said. "Back then, Detroit's underground scene was incredible."

He performed at legendary venues and events including Motor Lounge in Hamtramck, warehouse parties in Belleville, Under the Bridge, the Firehouse, Timbo's, and several other spots during the golden age of Detroit's electronic music scene.

"My very first rave was a Richie Hawtin event," he

recalled with a laugh. "The police showed up, and all 400 of us ended up getting trespassing tickets."

In 2005, McMillen launched Kolour Recordings, an independent vinyl label devoted to soulful and deep house music.

"We eventually expanded into several sub-labels," he said. "One project I was especially proud of was House Is The Cure. Artists donated tracks, we'd press records and the proceeds helped families dealing with cancer, funeral expenses and other hardships."

After 15 years, McMillen sold the Kolour catalog to a major distributor in 2020, while ensuring artists retained ownership of their music. His music collection remains legendary among friends.

"I have over 9,000 vinyl records," he said.

"Everything from house and techno to jazz, soul, rock, and hip hop."

His collecting interests extend well beyond music. McMillen also accumulates vintage horror memorabilia, Detroit-related antiques, sports cards, and 1980s Santa Cruz skateboard decks.

"My favorite horror movie is Return of the Living Dead," he said. "One of the stars, Linnea Quigley, actually sent me her cast jacket from the original film. It's one of my favorite collectibles."

When it's time to travel, McMillen enjoys exploring Detroit itself.

"I'm a big believer in the Detroit staycation," he said. "But we also love Chicago and Fort Lauderdale."

Closer to home, you'll often find him enjoying Baldo's Restaurant, Olympic Coney Island or walking around downtown Wyandotte.

For McMillen, life ultimately comes down to a few key things.

"Collect the music, cherish the memories and take care of the people around you," he said. "Those are the things that matter most."

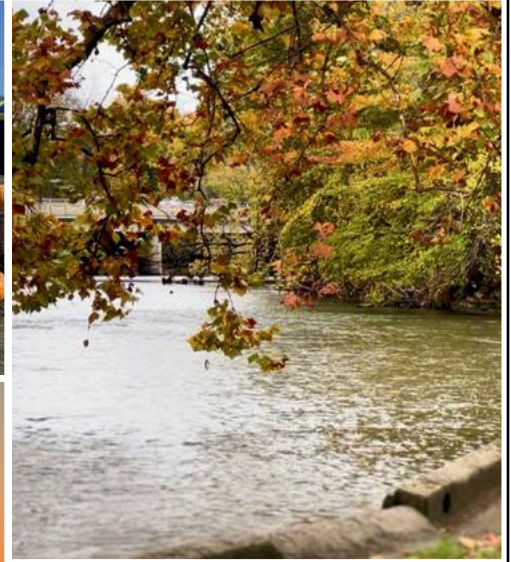

SUMMER 2026



Construction continues to make steady progress on projects funded through the 2023 Bond Program, bringing meaningful improvements to learning environments across Gibraltar School District.

At the elementary level, students at Hunter Elementary, Parsons Elementary, and Rockwood Early Learning Center will soon enjoy new playgrounds designed to encourage active play, collaboration, and social development. Playground improvements are scheduled for completion in summer 2026.

At Parsons Elementary, heating system improvements and updated classrooms painting, casework, including new cabinets and bookshelves, are underway and expected to be completed in summer 2026. Construction also continues on the school's new classrooms and Gym addition, which is anticipated to be completed in fall 2027.

Rockwood Early Learning Center is receiving several important upgrades this summer. Classroom flooring is being replaced, the parking lot is being updated to improve traffic flow and accessibility, and the building's exterior façade is being refreshed to create a welcoming environment for students, families, and staff.

Carlson High School is undergoing a significant transformation. The auditorium is being renovated with new seating, flooring, lighting, sound systems, and a refinished stage, creating an enhanced space for student performances and community events. These improvements are scheduled for completion in summer 2026. Also the South Main entrance façade is being replaced with a new brick and metal panel for a new modern feel.

These projects reflect the district's continued commitment to providing safe, modern, and engaging learning environments that support student success for years to come.

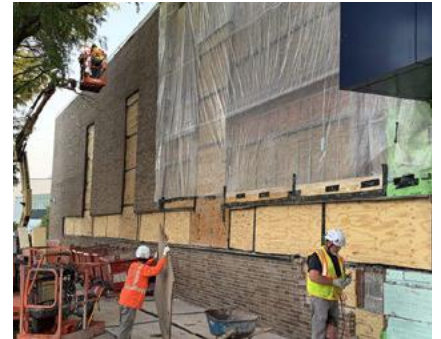

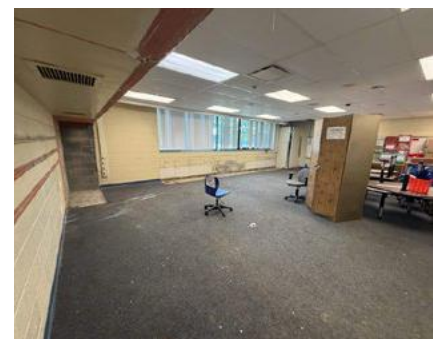

A Historic Run for Carlson Girls Flag Football

THE Carlson High School Girls Flag Football team capped off a historic 2026 season by earning its second consecutive undefeated regular season and regional championship before finishing as the MHSAA state runner-up at Ford Field.

Entering the state finals, the Marauders had not allowed a single point during the regular season. They opened tournament play with a dominant 46-0 victory over Detroit Leadership Academy in the Sweet 16. Sophomore Jillian Gates led the ground attack with 125 rushing yards and two touchdowns, while junior quarterback Jordan Sikora threw for 166 yards and three touchdowns.

Carlson followed with a hard-fought 6-0 win over a talented Brighton team. The game's only score came on a spectacular interception return for a touchdown by senior Addison Wallace, who will

playing Division I flag football at Eastern Michigan University.

The Marauders continued their impressive run in the state semifinals, defeating L'Anse Creuse North 19-0. Sophomore All-State receiver Jillian Farago starred with eight receptions for 101 yards and two touchdowns.

Although Carlson's remarkable season came to an end in the championship game with a 28-12 loss to St. Joseph High School, the team battled until the final whistle. Freshman receivers Juju Atcheson and Blake Zachary each caught touchdown passes from senior quarterback Lauren Dunwoody as the Marauders mounted a late comeback effort.

Girls flag football continues to be the fastest-growing sport in Michigan. More than 85 schools participated



during the 2026 season, and participation is expected to double over the next two years. Carlson's back-to-back undefeated regular

seasons, consecutive regional championships and appearance in the state championship game have firmly established the Marauders as one of the premier programs in the state.

Downriver STEM @ Weiss: Learning Beyond the Classroom

AT Downriver STEM @ Weiss, learning extends beyond traditional classroom lessons. Through project-based learning, community partnerships and authentic experiences, students are challenged to think critically, solve problems, collaborate with others, and take ownership of their learning. This year, students had numerous opportunities to apply their knowledge in meaningful ways while developing skills for future success.

One of the most exciting examples of authentic learning was our student-driven Makerspace project. Rather than simply using the space, students researched equipment, developed plans and helped bring their vision to life.

Their work was so impressive that Wayne RESA invited 10 Weiss students and their teachers to present at the Maker STEM Summit in the grand ballroom of The Henry Ford Museum of American Innovation. These students shared their learning journey with educators from across southeast Michigan, demonstrating the power of student leadership and innovation.

Students also showcased their creativity and problem-solving skills during our annual Innovation Night. Families and community members explored student-created robots, inventions, LEGO robotics projects, terrariums, plant packaging designs, innovative art creations, and other STEM-based projects. Students explained how they used the engineering design process to improve their ideas and solve problems. Innovation Night provided an authentic audience and a chance for students to proudly share their learning with the community.

Real-world connections remained a priority throughout the year. Our fifth-grade student government planned and organized a school-wide trip to

the Toledo Zoo, gaining valuable leadership experience while creating a memorable learning opportunity for the entire school.

Students also explored future careers during our fifth annual Career Day, where professionals from aerospace, healthcare, engineering, law enforcement, robotics, and skilled trades shared their experiences. Third graders even connected virtually with aerospace leader Jerry Jason, a flight director with Sierra Space and former NASA flight director, who inspired students by showing how today's learning can lead to extraordinary careers tomorrow.

Beyond STEM, students also learned the importance of community, culture and service. Our annual Culture Day celebrated more than 10 cultures and nations represented within our school community, while fifth-grade students participated in a community outreach project with seniors at the Flat Rock Community Center.

These experiences remind us that while STEM and innovation are important, developing empathy, leadership and strong relationships remains at the heart of everything we do at Downriver STEM @ Weiss.

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It Shouldn't Replace Thinking

Artificial Intelligence and Your Child By Tracy Willis

WHETHER we like it or not, artificial intelligence is all around us. It's a part of your child's daily life – be it homework help, search engines or browsing recommendations on Tik Tok, your child's world view is already shaped by AI.

You've probably wondered: Is this safe? Will this replace real learning? How do I support my child when AI technology is changing at lightning speed? Luckily, you don't need to know all the ins and outs to support your child.

Take fear out of the equation.

Conversations about AI are often fear-based. Instead, start from a place of curiosity.

"How do you use AI?"

"What do you like about it?"

"What is frustrating about artificial intelligence?"

You might share your own experiences after listening to those of your child. If you start from a place of curiosity instead of judgment, you'll get honesty.

Recognize AI as a tool.

When first exposed to AI, students often see a potential shortcut: I can use this to do my homework! A healthier way to think about and use AI is as a tool for thinking. It shouldn't replace thinking.

One of your important roles is to help your child learn the difference between using AI to explore a topic versus using AI to replace thinking. Topic exploration could mean using AI to brainstorm ideas, ask follow-up questions or get deeper explanations. Using AI to replace thinking looks like



copying answers or submitting writing or work that your child doesn't really understand.

Teach critical thinking, not rules.

Your child needs to understand that AI makes mistakes. It is faulty.

- It can be biased.
- It can misrepresent facts.
- It sounds confident, even when it's incorrect.
- It doesn't consider values, ethics or truth when it shares information.

If your child chooses to use AI, they need to understand that they must fact check by comparing it to multiple sources. They need to ask: Who might benefit from sharing this information in this way? Information, artificial or otherwise, is often angled to persuade or sway thinking. You should also discuss how the information that is shared is influenced by the number of clicks something gets, not by the quality of the information.

Be open about ethics and values.

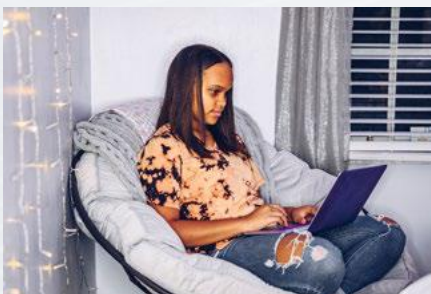
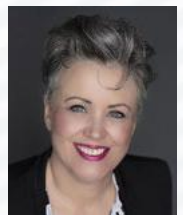
Author Sherrilyn Kenyon once said, "Just because you can doesn't mean you should." Artificial intelligence is a powerful tool. That doesn't mean it should be used for everything.

At-home discussions with you about the following questions will help set boundaries around AI for you and your family:

- Is it okay to use AI for art or writing?
- When is it acceptable to use AI for homework? When isn't it?
- Who owns AI-generated work?
- How do we protect our personal data when we use it?
- What types of AI feel unsafe or inappropriate to use?

One of the most powerful statements you can say to your child is, "I don't know all the answers. I'm learning this, too." This isn't about being the perfect parent. Helping your child navigate AI is about open conversations, your presence and attention to their lives and your willingness to learn with them.

Crowd Pleasing Dishes to Pass at this Summer's Cookouts

F there's one thing that brings people together during Michigan summers, it's gathering with loved ones and enjoying good food.

From backyard barbecues and family picnics to graduation parties and cookouts, there is always a summer occasion to prepare crowd-pleasing appetizers and desserts to enhance the main course.

The following dishes travel well and are easy to make in large batches:

Appetizers

Caprese Skewers: This easy, no-cook recipe offers a fresh bite, perfect for a summer day. Assemble cherry tomatoes, fresh basil leaves and fresh mozzarella pearls sequentially on toothpicks. Top with a sprinkle of salt and pepper and drizzle with extra virgin olive oil and balsamic glaze.



Zippy Corn Dip: This simple dip recipe will be gone before you know it. Mix 1 can of drained corn with peppers, 1 cup of sour cream, 1 cup of mayonnaise, 8 ounces of shredded Mexican-style cheese, a 4-ounce can of diced green chiles, a fresh diced jalapeño and 2 diced green onions

together in a bowl. Chill in the fridge for a few hours or overnight and serve with your favorite tortilla chips.

Peach Salsa: This sweet and spicy salsa will bring a fresh kick to any event. All you need to do is mix together 2 or 3 ripe diced peaches, half of a diced red bell pepper, a 1/4 cup of diced red onion, a 1/4 cup of fresh chopped cilantro, the juice and zest of 1 lime, 1 small grated garlic clove, 1/2 of a minced jalapeño and a 1/4 teaspoon of sea salt. Serve with tortilla chips.



Veggie Pizza: In a bowl, combine 4 ounces of cream cheese, a 1/2 cup of sour cream and 1 tablespoon each of

fresh chives and dill, chopped. Chill for 15 minutes in the fridge. Bake an 8-ounce can of refrigerated crescent dough sheets according to package directions and let cool. Spread chilled cream cheese mixture on cooled dough and top with fresh chopped vegetables like broccoli, peppers, carrots, etc. Slice into individual pieces for serving.



Desserts

Cornbread Muffins:

Nothing goes with barbecue quite like cornbread. To make things easier for serving, buy a box of your favorite cornbread mix (or make your own from scratch) and bake it in muffin pans with liners to skip the mess.



Frozen Graham Cracker Cool Whip Sandwiches: You just need two ingredients and a freezer for this easy, light dessert that's sure to satisfy any sweet tooth. For each sandwich you will need 1 graham cracker sheet (chocolate works well for this recipe) broken in half to form two squares. Place 2 tablespoons of thawed cool whip on the bottom cracker and top with the other half. Freeze until solid.



Mini Fruit Tarts: For a simple, refreshing treat, buy pre-made tart shells from the baking aisle or freezer aisle at your local grocery store. Keep it simple by filling each shell with instant pudding in flavors like vanilla, French vanilla, lemon or cheesecake. Top with classic fruit tart toppings like berries, mandarin orange slices and kiwi.

Remembering Detroit Dragway

If you ask people about their memories of Detroit Dragway, they will tell you about ground-shaking funny cars, the smell of octane and all the weekends spent watching friends and family race their cars. People from miles away recall hearing the sounds of the engines roar.

It all started in 1959 with track owner and promoter Gil Kohn, who opened Detroit Dragway.

Located on Sibley Road between Dix and Allen Roads, it was a quarter-mile strip that became closely associated with the booming Detroit muscle-car era. The dragway quickly became one of the country's best-known straight-line racing venues.

The track was also widely recognized for its iconic "Sunday! Sunday! Sunday!" radio advertisements, which aimed to draw crowds out to race on Sundays. Its most legendary commercial highlighted the voices of popular local disc jockeys Joel Sebastian and Rube Weiss.

During the 1960s and 1970s, the track drew top names such as Connie Kalitta, Don Garlits, Don Nicholson, Dick Landy, Ronnie Sox, and Shirley Muldowney. It was especially important because Detroit-area factories, tuners and racers used it as a proving ground for performance cars.

By the 1990s, attendance had fallen among changing times. The last races were held in 1997. Today, the site of the dragway is an industrial/logistics complex.

Why Community Engagement matters to the Brownstown Fire Department

Public education is one of the greatest benefits of these events. Every year, firefighters respond to emergencies that could have been prevented through awareness and preparedness. Whether we are teaching children how to develop a home escape plan, discussing the importance of working smoke alarms or sharing information about severe weather preparedness, our goal is to help keep Brownstown families safe before an emergency occurs.

Community events also allow residents to see firsthand



what today's fire department does. While many people naturally associate firefighters with structure fires, the reality is that our personnel respond to a wide variety of emergencies, including medical emergencies, vehicle crashes, hazardous materials incidents, and severe weather events. Public outreach provides an opportunity to showcase the many ways the department serves the community every day.



For our younger residents, these events can be especially meaningful. A child who visits a fire station, sits in a fire engine or meets a firefighter at a school event often leaves with a better understanding of fire safety and a positive impression of public service. These experiences can reduce fear during emergencies and sometimes inspire future careers in the fire service, healthcare or other public safety professions.

The Brownstown Fire Department is proud to be part of this community. Our firefighters are not just emergency responders – they are your neighbors, coaches, volunteers, parents, and friends. We share the same commitment to making Brownstown a safe and welcoming place to live, work and raise a family.

Emergency response will always be at the heart of what we do, but building connections with the people we serve is what makes us truly effective. At the Brownstown Fire Department, we believe that community safety begins long before the sirens sound.



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COP ON THE BLOCK

Policing Where You Live

THERE is something powerful about a police officer who doesn't wait for the phone to ring. The Brownstown Police Department believes that true public safety isn't in the response to crime; instead, it's built in neighborhoods, on sidewalks and in kitchen table conversations to stop crime before it happens. That belief is the foundation of Cop on the Block.

What Is Cop on the Block?

Cop on the Block is a community meeting unlike any other because we come to you! Rather than asking residents to drive to a station or sit in a municipal building, we partner with a community host and bring our officers, detectives and senior administration directly into a subdivision, apartment complex or mobile home park. We meet you where you live.

These one-hour sessions give residents direct access to Chief Jeff Watson and members of our command staff. You will hear about current crime trends from a law enforcement perspective, ask questions you've always wondered and share concerns that matter most to you and your family.

More importantly, we listen. Not just to acknowledge what we've heard, but to build an action plan to begin addressing those issues right away.

Why It Matters

While Cop on the Block has become a cornerstone of community engagement in Brownstown Township, the concept did not originate here. The initiative was originally created by Detective Jim Thorburn (Ret.) of the Allen Park Police Department, who recognized the value of bringing officers directly into neighborhoods to build trust and address community concerns in a more personal setting. Detective Thorburn graciously shared this idea with our department, allowing us to adapt and implement it for the residents of Brownstown Township.

Our mission is rooted in a simple truth: trust is earned through relationships. Our mission statement calls us to "build and maintain trusting relationships to ensure our

residents feel safe in their homes and neighborhood."

Cop on the Block is one of the most direct ways we live that out.

Quality of life issues like traffic safety concerns, vandalism and drug activity rarely make the evening news, but they shape how safe you feel every single day. These are exactly the issues Cop on the Block is designed to surface and solve. When a resident tells us their street has a speeding problem, we don't just write it down – we act.

Who Should Attend?

Everyone! Whether you have a complaint, a compliment, a question, or simply a concern you've been hesitant to raise, Cop on the Block is your forum. We are there to listen, engage and work alongside you. Every voice matters.

How to Host a Cop on the Block Event

Bringing Cop on the Block to your neighborhood is simple. All it takes is one resident willing to serve as a community host – someone to help identify a gathering space, whether that's a driveway, a community room or a common area, and then spread the word. We handle the rest.
