John Knox Village's Culture Involves Interest in Volunteerism, Health and Fitness



of the natural world through diverse techniques. From microscopic organisms to flowers and sea creatures, Sara's artwork unveils the magical essence within these realms.



- *Artist workshops and classes led by the artist currently on exhibition*



Broward Navy Days

Fleet Week Port Everglades is the signature event for Broward Navy Days each spring. The organization plans welcoming events and shore leave activities for visiting Navy ships periodically throughout the year. Broward Navy Days also helps plan the commissioning of new Navy ships and Coast Guard cutters in South Florida and supports the change of command ceremonies for Navy and Coast Guard commands.

Dillard Center for the Arts

Dillard Center for the Arts (DCA) provides training in dance, music, theater and visual arts, complemented by a rigorous academic curriculum. Students must demonstrate ability and interest in one of the four artistic disciplines to be considered for acceptance. DCA is fully accredited and offers the same academic curriculum and graduation requirements as all Broward County high schools; the major difference in the academic program is that they offer the added ingredient of correlating the arts with academics, rather than treating as isolated disciplines. All students spend three hours per day in their art areas, and the remainder of the time in academics or electives.

It also has the country's largest collection of paintings and drawings by the American realist William Glackens, the most extensive holdings in the U.S. of works by post-World War II, avant-garde artists who resisted German occupation during World War II and emerged in the war's wake.

Sample-McDougald House

The Sample-McDougald House is a distinctive historic house museum known for its unique architecture, history and cultural background. It was built by Pompano Beach pioneer Albert Neal Sample, who served as a community leader until his death in 1941. The Colonial Georgian-revival home was sold to William and Sarah McDougald in 1943. Generations of McDougalds were raised in the home until the 1990s and they preserved the architectural integrity of the home. During urbanization, the McDougald family sought to donate and preserve the home. The Sample-McDougald House Preservation Society, Inc. was formed in 1999 and was then moved to its current location in Centennial Park in May 2001.

Historic Stranahan House

The Stranahan House was built in 1901 by Frank Stranahan, credited as Ft. Lauderdale's founding father, and his wife Ivy Cromartie Stranahan, the area's first schoolteacher. It is the oldest surviving structure in Broward County and has served as a trading post, post office, community gathering and home to the Stranahans. The mission of the Historic Stranahan House Museum is to tell the story of the birth of our community through the lives of two extraordinary people and the homestead they created and to serve as an enduring legacy for historic preservation.

Musicfor America: Bringing Music Appreciation to JKV Residents

In each Gazette ACE, we will focus on JKV Community Partners to showcase the alliances developed among JKV and the South Florida Arts/Culture/Entertainment organizations. In the current issue, we spotlight Musicfor America, which has been an integral part of the John Knox Village entertainment and concert scene for years.

Musicfor America is actually the newest arm of the Musicfor International Alliance. It is dedicated to the humanitarian use of the arts to improve individual lives and communities throughout the U.S. and the Americas.

Under the leadership of Lorenzo Turchi-Floris, Artistic Director, and James Brooks Bruzzese, Maestro of Musical Outreach, efforts of the Musicfor Alliance focus on the promotion and support of music education programs, performance and outreach, presenting scholarships and musical instruments to de-

serving students and sharing the magic of live musical presentations. Nearly 1,000 musicians and professionals in various parts of the world work together for this common purpose.

South Florida's Musicians

We are fortunate to have a rich collection of talented musicians here in the South Florida area

from all genres of music: From rock to pop, and jazz to the classics. Musicfor America has assembled many of these musicians to give back to the larger South Florida community through performance and education.

During the past months, Musicfor America has arranged a series of concerts at JKV that are designed to entertain and educate.

Through the JKV Life Enrichment Department, this series of concerts has featured quartets and quintets focused on the different families of instruments in a symphony orchestra or jazz band.

Most recently, the Woodwinds were featured in concert. The program included an historical explanation of the development of each instrument, solo performances by each musician, and a full ensemble mini-concert of familiar classical tunes arranged specifically for the Woodwinds.

In past visits to JKV, Musicfor America has featured the Brass, the Strings, and the Percussion instruments – each in their own

dedicated mini-concerts.

Musicfor America is all about educating the audience in the history and structure of music and how the variety of musicians and their instruments work together to produce the sounds of duets, quartets, quintets and the full symphony orchestra.

At JKV, Musicfor America took music education one step further, by offering classes in learning the ukelele to residents.

Music is an integral part of our lives. Musicfor America is a vital Community Partner which brings performance and appreciation to the many JKV residents.

Musicfor International: Quartett Orfeo

Rome's Acclaimed String Quartet Visits South Florida

In the previous Gazette Ace article, the importance of Musicfor America was explained, as it applies to South Florida in general and JKV in particular. Musicfor America, the newest arm of the Musicfor International alliance, welcomed its QuartettOrfeo, based in Rome, for a summer cultural exchange residency with young musicians in South Florida.

As part of the South Florida visit, this internationally acclaimed quartet presented master classes and side-by-side performances, with participant organizations including Gold Coast Youth Orchestra, and Musicall, a South Florida music conservatory.

In addition to its educational mission, Musicfor International presented a weeklong series of concerts featuring the Quartett Orfeo in worship performances at Ft. Lauderdale's St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Plantation's St. Gregory Catholic Church and Bay Harbour Islands' Church by the Sea.

Two bookend performances,

however, included full chamber orchestra concerts featuring the pipe organs at Ft. Lauderdale's United Church of Christ followed a week later at the Sunshine Cathedral.

Maestro Lorenzo Turchi-Floris, who is familiar to many John Knox Village concert-goers during his visiting conductorship from 2010 to 2019 with the Sym-

phony of the Americas' "Summerfest" appearances, led the orchestra in a varied program. The selections emphasized the talents of the Quartett's soloists, as well as the musicianship of Ft. Lauderdale organist David Charles Dunlap, who is currently in his 11th year as Director of Music at United Church of Christ Ft. Lauderdale.

The concert performances began with "Divertimento in D dur - KV136" by W.A. Mozart. Then featured violist Barbara Kammer took center stage in "Grave for Viola and String Orchestra" by Johann Benda. Ms. Kammer is a versatile musician: She also plays at international jazz music festivals around the world.

David Charles Dunlap then took the stage in a stirring organ performance of Tomaso Albinoni's "Adagio in G Minor for Strings and Organ."

Additional featured soloists included French violinist Charlotte

Orcel performing Ludwig van Beethoven's, "*Romance in F Major Op. 50 for Violin and Orchestra*," followed by Italian cellist Ilaria Calabró Altan performing Enrique Granados "*Danza Española No 2, Oriental*," both arranged for String Orchestra by Lorenzo Turchi-Floris.

The concerts closed with two full orchestra compositions, which were very familiar to the audiences and made famous in two of the most iconic movies in American history: The "*Love Theme*" from "*The Godfather*," composed by Nino Rota, and "*Over*

the Rainbow," by Harold Harlen featured in the 1939 film, "*The Wizard of Oz*."

The inspiring performances by Quartett Orfeo and the musicians of Musicfor International showcased the exceptional music available to South Florida audiences in smaller venues beyond the major concert halls in Miami, Ft. Lauderdale and West Palm Beach.

Hollywood and NYC Street Photography of Benn Mitchell

The Boca Raton Museum of Art is a delightful and modern facility located in Boca's Mizner Park, just 12 miles from the John Knox Village Campus. As a Community Partner, JKV residents enjoy numerous benefits including: *Invitations to opening night receptions; discounts in the Museum Store; free or discounted lectures, concerts, films; and special programs on the JKV campus including lectures and workshops.*

The JKV Life Enrichment Team regularly schedules visits to the Boca Raton Museum of Art for the variety of featured exhibitions. During the most recent visit, museum-goers enjoyed a docent-led exhibition entitled: *"Benn Mitchell Photographs: Hollywood to NYC."*

The Museum's website describes the Mitchell exhibition: "From the age of 13, when he received his first camera, Mitchell produced photographs that capture a particularly American vitality.

"Born in New York City in 1926, he sold his first photograph to *Life Magazine* when he was 16. Then, at age 17, he headed west, gaining permission from Warner Brothers to frequent the studios, shooting Hollywood stars on various sets and sound stages. One of his most valued photographs in this exhibition features Humphrey Bogart in a rare moment of respite, having a cigarette break between takes.


"After two years of duty as a Navy photographer, he returned to New York City and worked as a photographer in a large commercial studio. In 1951, he started a commercial studio. Finally, he retired to Boca Raton, where he and his wife Esther avidly supported the Museum, donating many of Mitchell's photographs to the collection."

The JKV visitors were intrigued by the vast collection of Mitchell's photographs. The black and white prints showcased two distinct categories of his creative efforts. The first group presents the glamour of Hollywood: The movie stars, film sets and publicity photos of Hollywood's halcyon days. The second collection focuses on Mr. Mitchell's New York City street photography starting in the 1950s.

The composition of his photos and his ability to capture the essence of the moment are two hallmarks of his photography.

And now I'll be looking forward with you to getting some of your pictures in soon again.

Bonnet House Museum and Gardens is one of the Community Partners that offers art instructions directly on the JKV campus.

Through this connection, gifted colored pencil artist, Galal Ramadan was invited to teach his artistic craft to JKV residents.

Mr. Ramadan is of a similar age to his many art students. He actually is self-taught and is working on developing his own technique which he shares with his students.

I did not want to buy expensive art material, so I bought a small set of colored pencils to practice, to draw and paint. I never stopped."


He now works with a full set of 150 Prismacolor colored pencils and a Faber Castell set of 120 pencils. So his entry into the world of art came on a budget. From a thrifty start as a self-taught artist, Galal has achieved notariety both locally and internationally.

"My artwork has earned many awards and recognitions, and has been featured in several articles published in National Art Magazines." During the last five years he participated in more than 65 solo, national, and international exhibitions.

Galal was born and raised in Alexandria, Egypt and now resides in Ft. Lauderdale. After retiring from a career in graphic design, marketing and business, Galal now dedicates his time to his art.

Galal attributes that his interest in art helped him "reduce stress and rewired my brain." His mission is now to further his technique and to interest others through his instructional classes.



"I have been teaching colored pencil art workshops at Bonnet House Museum and Gardens for the last

four years. We have workshops for beginners, intermediates and advanced artists. We also have a "Creative Healing Through Colored Pencil" workshop which integrates mindfulness living and meditation."

In his classes at JKV, Galal observed, "it was a wonderful experience to share my knowledge with such art enthusiasts. Art can be therapeutic and help improve our cognitive function: Challenging ourselves to learn new things can stimulate our brains to grow new cells, produce new neural pathways, and, potentially, combat memory loss and dementia."


Steve was in the U.S. Marines in the '60s when he was bitten by

"I started using SLR [single lens reflex] film cameras in the USMC and continued to upgrade cameras as technology improved camera performance," Steve told the Gazette ACE. "I studied photography books before the internet was available, took online classes and attended photography seminars. I converted to digital cameras and studied computing to be able to utilize photography software."

During the '80s, Steve was a passionate athlete competing in running, bicycle racing and duathlons at regional and national levels. He considered his identity as an athlete.

"In 1995, I was diagnosed with cancer and the resulting treatments and surgeries ended my ability to train and compete in sports," he said. "I had to let go of my athletic identity and choose another area in which to concentrate. I made it my goal to become a photographic-artist and




"Ice Curtain," by Steve Waldschmidt.

spent the following years immersed in improving and developing my photographic abilities.

"I am proficient with most of the professional-level photo software that is currently available. I have 29 different photo software programs on my 27-inch iMac computer."

Anyone who has seen Steve's photo images will agree to his

artistic prowess with both the camera and computer. Steve currently uses a Nikon D800, Sony a6300 and Sony a7II cameras to capture his images.

With his decades of photo experience, Steve understands his equipment, environment and perspective during his shoots, so the process becomes reactive to his subject matter.

"If I can see it, I can capture it in a manner that allows me to present it in a creative way," he said. "I strive to find art in places and things that are not typical targets of casual photography. "If I know ahead of time that I am going to a specific venue, I select the cameras and lenses that will allow me to capture my vision of how I want to present that venue. If I am photographing things spontaneously, I have to rely on my instincts of what to do to get usable images. I can later adjust the image, as needed, with cropping, contrast, saturation, and other techniques."

Babette Siegel and her husband Harold have been living at JKV in Village Towers for the past two and a half years. They share their home with two very cute schnauzers, Sweetie and Sophie, and their calico cat Cally. Harold is a retired veterinarian who had his own practice in Miami, and the couple's love for animals is immediately apparent.

Babs, as she is affectionately known, is a true South Floridian, having grown up in Miami in the '40s and '50s. She says that Miami was a wonderful place in which to grow up, but does also remember the divisive Jim Crow laws and rampant antisemitism. Her family was not welcome at Miami's Surf Club because they were Jewish. Before moving to JKV, Babs and Harold, who have been married for 30 years and together for 33 years, had a waterfront home in North Miami.

When Babs was a little girl, her grandmother lived with her family, and it was her grandma who first taught Babs how to knit and needlepoint. From an early age, she was hooked and to this day creates gorgeous fiber art which includes knitting, sculpture, collages, handbags and more.

Babs is also an accomplished weaver. For many years she had a 4-post Navajo floor loom and created many large, one-of-a-kind works of art. Word got

around by friends and acquaintances in her community, and soon after she started creating commissioned pieces, including wall hangings, rugs and blankets for homes in Miami and Aventura. She still does loom work but on a much smaller scale.

Babs has always wanted to master the craft of watercolor painting, but found it a difficult process. As a child, she had an older cousin she idolized who was a great painter. Babs found it hard to “get her creativity out” with this medium. However, she has taken a watercolor class at JKV and would like to continue with classes and instruction.

Babs attended the University of Miami to study art and teaching but had to drop out as her parents could no longer afford tuition. She ended up going to computer school and worked at Microsoft for many years, writing programs for the medical field, hospitals and doctors.

Her love of art, however, has always sustained and inspired her. In 2015, Babs was diagnosed

with Parkinson’s disease, a brain disorder that causes unintended or uncontrollable movements. Babs says that her art projects really help her body calm down as she is so focused on each task at hand, keeping her busy. And busy she is. Her walls are adorned with her many fiber art sculptures, weaves, collages, knitting projects and watercolors.

For inspiration, Babs loves to watch artists on YouTube, as well as read her many art books. She recently has become an avid doodler. She says that doodling has become a real “thing” for artists now as it helps unlock new ideas.

Babs will be presenting some of her art at JKV in October during ArtSage week. This is something she has not done before and is looking forward to it.

At JKV, the definition of culture takes on a much larger meaning than just an appreciation for the arts. Many of JKV's residents live their lives based upon a deep principle of charity and volunteerism.

In fact, nearly 50 percent of residents volunteer their time and talents either at JKV or to the larger community.

That commitment to volunteerism extends to the entire JKV community: Residents, staff and oftentimes to their families as well. An example of the JKV family coordinating to help the greater Pompano Beach community occurred a few weeks ago. Team Members Jasmine Tennie, JKV's Fitness Outreach Coordinator, and Gloria Gantes, JKV's Meaningful Life Manager gathered a group of residents and employees to volunteer with Habitat for Humanity.

Jasmine and Gloria are not newcomers to volunteer efforts – they are members of Leadership Broward, the educational program focused on leadership skills, providing practical community

action experience, and facilitating interaction with established community leaders. The two ladies had been part of the same volunteer group with the

Director for Family Services at Habitat for Humanity of Broward. From that initial meeting, Jasmine and Gloria participated with Habitat for Humanity.

"It was wonderfully fulfilling," Jasmine told Gazette ACE. "I knew right away that JKV residents and employees would love an opportunity to volunteer. When I publicized the JKV Habitat opportunity, every person who signed up expressed that they always wanted to try, or had already done it before, and were eager to volunteer again."

Habitat for Humanity is famously known as a non-profit organization supported by former President Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalynn. It was founded in 1976 by Millard and Linda Fuller. The idea that became Habitat for Humanity grew from the fertile soil of Koinonia Farm, a small, interracial, Christian farming community outside of Americus, GA.

Locally, Habitat for Humanity of Broward brings people together to build homes, communities and hope. Habitat Broward offers a "hand up" not a "hand out" to empower families who are willing to work hard to improve their family's lives through affordable home ownership.

The JKV volunteers worked at the Rick Case Habitat Community featuring 76 homes in Pompano Beach. The new community is transforming the area into a vibrant, beautiful single-family home neighborhood.

The JKV Habitat build crew consisted of a full-work team of 10 volunteers: Five employees and five residents. While not involved in the heavy construction, the JKV volunteers had plenty to do.

"We were tasked with touching up paint on existing homes," Jasmine said. "Everyone was ready and willing. We even had some residents climbing ladders."

"I learned how unstoppable our JKV residents are. They have taught me to always live life to the fullest. I always have such a great time during outings. The residents are full of laughs and great conversations. We even had JKV Fitness Professional Brooke Bayliss and her boyfriend eagerly helping and supporting the cause."

Jasmine shares the feelings of the JKV volunteers who help to make homeownership more affordable for Broward County families.

"It warms my heart to know that so many people are able to own a home because of Habitat for Humanity. I love that families are able to have a home to come back to for generations."



“Think & Move™” Exercise Machine

Furthering a Culture Focused on Health and Fitness

By bringing the global standard in cognitive-motor training devices to its residents, John Knox Village has once again proven to be one of the most innovative Life-Plan Continuing Care Retirement Communities in the country.

Designed by Switzerland-based Davidat Senso, the “Think & Move™” exercise machine allows residents to work the brain and body simultaneously, all in the comfort of the campus Fitness Studio.

“JKV has many wonderful choices for intellectual stimulation [for our residents] with lectures, performances and activities found daily around campus and in the community,” JKV Fitness and Aquatics Manager Marsha Dixon told the *Gazette ACE*. “We also have a plethora of fitness opportunities in our Fitness Studio and Aquatic Complex, however, we now have an instrument that engages cognitive focus with movement. The Davidat Senso is a dual-tasking machine, requiring neuromotor collaboration to execute a specific task, thus being best described as the Think and Move machine.”

Davidat Senso Exergames

Designed for all fitness levels, Davidat Senso was 24.

developed in multiple global research projects over the past decade and is used in the overall promotion of an active and healthy lifestyle.

As stated on the Davidat website: “Our engaging exergames ensure the development of cognitive motor skills in a fun and safe environment.”

Every resident-user receives an RFID (radio frequency identification) bracelet that is used to initiate a training session and, using progressive algorithms, provides reports to ensure their goals and continual progress are being achieved.

Residents step on the pressure-sensitive platform and select from over 17 engaging exergames, that offer training from cognitive flexibility, working memory and spatial orientation to divided and sustained attention, static and dynamic balance, and step strategy for gait improvement. That sensitive four-armed platform measures every movement for cognitive agility, reaction time and alertness. Residents have the option of using the handrails for additional support while they game.

Each game has a specific focus or task. For example, the game “Targets” works to improve forward thinking, anticipation and timing. A resident sees

four targets on the screen. From all directions, flying balls appear on the screen toward the different targets. The goal is to step in the direction of the target as soon as a ball reaches it. Whenever the resident “captures” a ball inside a target, the Senso sounds a gentle bell encouraging and reinforcing correct execution. As the resident progresses confidently, so does the Senso, increasing the number of flying balls and the speed at which they appear on the screen.

At the end of each game, residents can view their scores on a chart allowing them to compare their progression over time. Marsha Dixon also has the capability to review scores, determine baselines, and assign new games to keep the residents engaged.

“Reviewing results gives me insight into each of the resident’s neuromotor training sessions,” Marsha added.

“For example, if I notice a particular resident scoring below his or her baseline, a conversation is initiated to understand the reason for the shift in performance. Together we address any of changes and work on a plan to move forward successfully. The residents love the Senso. It’s fun, challenging, and it is quickly gaining in popularity.”

To get the most out of the Dividat Senso, it is recommended to use it three to five times per week, with sessions ranging from five to 10 minutes, or for as long as the participant likes.
