As we bid farewell to 2024 and welcome many exciting opportunities in 2025, I would like to take this time to reflect on all of the amazing work that has been done in the City of Taylor this past year. I can not thank our City staff and Council enough for their hard work and dedication to ensuring that Taylor continues to be a thriving and vibrant community. Their unwavering commitment to enhancing the City's strategic pillars of streets/infrastructure, quality of life, and economic vitality are reflected in the work done over this past year.

From improving our roadways to upgrades to our recreational facilities, every effort has been made to create a Taylor where both families and businesses can grow and prosper.

In 2024, the City saw the completion of construction on three major roadways in Taylor - Second Street, Fourth Street, and Mallard Lane. Our Streets and Grounds crew completed 80 street segments spanning 3.5 miles as part of the Level Up Program. We also embarked on the beginning stages of building a new City Hall/Justice Center as plans for the building were created this past year. We've also looked toward the future with the implementation of a Wellness/Recreation Center Feasibility Study and the City began working on updating its Downtown Master Plan.

Thank you for taking the time to review the 2024 Annual Report. Your interest and engagement are vital to the ongoing success of our city, and we are grateful for your commitment to staying informed about the progress and developments that shape our community. As we reflect on the past year, we appreciate the support of our residents, businesses, and partners.


- Adopted new code updates and any other updates as needed for the new Comprehensive Plan.

- Focused on maintaining staffing levels by funding the Compensation Study, raising wages for all of our staff.

FY 2024 Budget Highlights

In 2024, our staff successfully tightened their belts and worked hard to do more with less. With inflation still driving costs up, our team successfully implemented pay increases based on our market study and continued implementation of our Capital Improvement Program with a




tax rate increase of only 1.51%, the lowest increase in the region. Our effective rate (the amount the average household pays) is now the second lowest in the region.



PROPERTY TAXES

The 2024 average residential taxable value is \$239,342, a 7.9% increase from 2023.



1/4 of all sales tax collected by the City/EDC is used to reduce property taxes. The Property Tax rate is reduced by 27¢, reducing the burden for the average homeowner by \$647.
