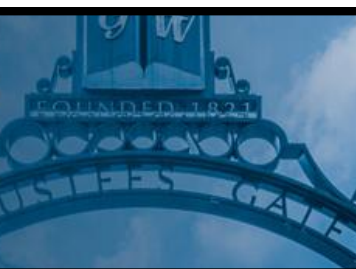


## A New Era for Antitrust Private Litigation in Mexico

Sessions focused on digital markets, AI enforcement, and green cooperation, and they drew from recent decisions by the TCA, EC and global regulatory developments. The event fostered dialogue on the practical design of next-generation regulation that balances economic efficiency with societal values.

## Competition Policy in Practice: Institutional Design and Emerging Challenges

We were pleased to organize a conference in Buenos Aires on November 5th for an in-depth conversation on the evolving landscape of competition policy in Argentina and Latin America.

The event featured two dynamic sessions.

The first panel examined how institutional architecture, independence, and resources determine the effectiveness of competition authorities, drawing lessons from regional experiences; the second dove into the intersection of data, artificial intelligence, and competition, exploring how algorithmic collusion, digital ecosystems, and fast-paced innovation are reshaping the way competition is enforced.





In 2025, the lab made an effort to become more involved with events on Capitol Hill. On November 20th, the first of our Hill Briefing Series in the U.S. Congress was a huge success.

Sponsored by Representative Scott Fitzgerald (R-WI), Professor Portuese and a team of panelists discussed the intersection of free speech and antitrust as well as the government's responsibility to both the public and U.S. companies.
