This can be a daunting time for all involved with so much information to navigate, this guide provides you with all the information you need to understand the range of pathways available all in one place.

As a young person, identifying your 'next best step' can be a daunting task. This guide will support you to think about what the right path might be for you as well as signposting you to the local offer across Herefordshire, Shropshire, Telford & Wrekin.

Parents/carers and teachers are two key influencers of young people; therefore, it is crucial that you understand the range of pathways available to support you in providing impartial, accurate information to our young people. This guide can be used to expand your knowledge and understanding of the range of pathways on offer. You can use it to refer to when supporting young people to identify what the right pathway for them might look like.

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PREPARATION TIMELINE

It might seem like ages away but if you take the time to research and plan now you can make more confident choices - and complete your applications earlier. So, you've got more time to focus on your GCSEs.

SUMMER TERM YEAR 10

- 
- Think about your future strengths and favourite subjects.
 - Find out more about careers that interest you.
 - Think about how your strengths might fit with your career ideas.
 - Discuss your ideas with people whose opinions you value.
 - Do some online research into the local college and training options.

AUTUMN TERM YEAR 11

- 
- Build confidence in strengths and favourite subjects.
 - Go to information events and learn about all the different options.
 - Book some taster sessions.
 - Check college application deadlines. Some colleges might require an application this term.
 - Make contact with employers if seeking an Apprenticeship.

SPRING TERM YEAR 11

- 
- Complete applications (key dates will be given out in Y11) but most applications are completed by the end of January.
 - Attend interviews.
 - Attend additional taster events.
 - Work hard to secure an apprenticeship placement.
 - Make sure you have a back-up plan.

SUMMER TERM YEAR 11

- 
- Concentrate on exam prep.
 - Finalise your placement if intending on an Apprenticeship.
 - Attend any summer transitions days after exams. Many colleges run welcome events.

YOUR BEST NEXT STEP

There are numerous career progression routes available, each tailored to suit different individuals. The key is selecting the most suitable path to reach your goals.

For instance, you may opt for BTEC's, T-Levels or A-Levels to pursue a university degree, or alternatively, consider apprenticeships, which offer the opportunity to combine work and study.

A T Level gives you a mix of learning in the classroom and on the job. Businesses and employers helped design T Levels to teach you the skills you'll need.







APPRENTICESHIPS

An apprenticeship is a paid job with training where you work alongside experienced staff, gaining job-specific skills and earning a wage. You follow an apprenticeship standard outlining the knowledge, skills, and behaviours needed for success.



For young individuals aged 16 to 24 with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) who possess an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP). This structured, work-based study program aims to provide a valuable work experience facilitated by a dedicated job coach.

Entry Requirements

Don't worry if you don't meet every entry requirement – colleges and sixth forms are here to support you. They'll look at your personal circumstances and help you find a course that suits your goals and interests.

Why English and Maths matter

Aiming for Grade 4 or above in English and Maths is really important, as it opens more doors for your future study and career. If you don't quite get there, you won't be left behind — you'll continue working towards these alongside your main course.

Course-specific requirements

Some subjects, like science, engineering or health, may ask for certain GCSEs at Grade 4 or above. Tutors will explain what's needed and guide you through your options.

Different pathways, different entry points

Entry requirements can vary depending on the course and the level. Some courses are open to everyone, while others ask for passes in a few subjects. Higher-level courses may expect more.

The image below gives you a general idea of what's usually expected — and remember, if one route isn't right for you, there will always be another way forward.

Level

What you'll need...

Level 3

You typically need to have **five GCSEs or equivalent grade 9-4**, inc English & Maths grade 5/4.

Level 2

You typically need to have three to **four GCSEs grade 9-3**.

Level 1

You typically need to have **three to four GCSEs at grades 1-2**.

Entry

No GCSEs.

Step-by-step guide to help you secure an apprenticeship – whether through a college, a training provider, or direct with an employer.

STEP 1: START YOUR SEARCH

TOP TIPS

Set up alerts for your area and your chosen industry so you never miss a new opportunity.

Colleges and training providers often **help match students** with local employers – **don't be afraid to ask!**



STEP 2: HELPFUL EXTRAS TO BOOST YOUR PLAN

1

Apply Direct to Employers

- Make a list of companies in your chosen industry.
- Visit their websites/social media channels and check their careers pages.
- Email with your CV, course details, and enthusiasm.
- Follow up if you don't hear back in a week or two.

2

Apply via a College or Training Provider

- Apply for an apprenticeship subject you're interested in.
- Ask if they help match students with employers.
- Apply for the full-time course too (as backup).
- Attend open days or taster sessions.

3

Start a Full-Time Course First

- Choose a course linked to your future apprenticeship goals.
- Build confidence and skills in a classroom or workshop.
- Improve English, maths, and employability skills.
- Look and apply for apprenticeships during the course.



What If You Don't Find an Employer Right Away?

- Join the course anyway — colleges & training providers often help you find an employer.
- Keep applying for apprenticeship vacancies.
- You can switch over once you find an employer.

POST-16 TOP TIPS

1

Attend careers and skills fairs

These are ideal for meeting colleges, training providers, apprenticeship providers, employers, and careers advisers.

2

Discuss your ideas

Talk to parents or carers, family and friends to get other viewpoints on your choices.

3

Get advice

Talk to teachers and career advisers – they have lots of knowledge and wisdom to share!

4

Open events and taster sessions

They're a great opportunity to visit schools and colleges, find out about the courses on offer, and speak to staff and students.

5


It is your life and your choice

Don't be influenced by where your friends are going. Ask yourself: what do I enjoy? What would I like to do and what do I want to get out of my life?

Personal Statements

Most sixth forms and colleges will ask for a personal statement as part of your application. This is your chance to explain:

- Why you're applying to that particular place.
- Why you want to study the subjects or courses you've chosen.
- What your goals are for the future.



Not everyone asks for one!

Some providers just want:

- Your predicted grades
- A reference from school
- Or a short interview

What YOU need to do:

Check each place you're interested in and ask:

- Do they need a personal statement?
- What else do they ask for?
- When is the deadline?

Open Evenings

What You Need to Know

Why Are They Important?

Open evenings and taster days are a great way to explore your next steps. Whether it's sixth form, college, or a specialist course, you can:

- Get a feel for the place.
- Meet staff and students.
- Ask questions about subjects, support, and student life.
- Get a feel for what suits you best.



What can you expect?

Open Evenings are usually after school or at the weekend and give you a chance to:

- Tour the building.
- Listen to talks about courses.
- Chat to staff and students.
- Collect prospectuses and useful info.

What If Dates Aren't Available Yet?

Don't worry! Most schools and colleges release their open event dates in the autumn term (usually from September onwards). While you're waiting:

- Make a list of the places you're interested in.
- Follow them on social media for announcements.
- Bookmark their websites.
- Open day dates will be added to the school website in Sept.



Be Ready to Make the Most of It

Here are some quick tips for when the time comes:

- 1. Write down your questions.** Think about subjects, transport, clubs, support, and future pathways.
- 2. Take notes or photos** (if allowed) to help you remember what you liked.
- 3. Go with an open mind** — you might be surprised by places you hadn't considered!
- 4. Chat to students** — they'll give you an honest view of what it's really like.
