# From

## Starting point

We use from to show  
the time or point in time  
when something starts



# From

## Example:

**Tickets for the concert are on sale from Monday.**

**The finals take place from 1.30 pm on Sunday.**

We use from to show the level that things begin at, such as numbers or prices:

## Example:

Prices start from \$366 per week  
for a hotel room

**We use from to talk about  
distance in relation to  
somewhere else:**

## Example:

The bus station is nearby and we are only five minutes from the highway.

We use from to refer to the place where someone or something starts or originates:

Bernie comes from New York.

We get our vegetables from the farm.
