If you have a graduating senior or other student who will not be returning to AWLS next year, please be sure to turn in your child's school-issued Chromebook. These devices can be given to the secretarial staff in your child's school.

Senior Google accounts will be deleted on June 30. Students should start making plans now for backing up their drives. Any files they wish to keep should be saved to a personal device or Google drive. They also should give college admissions departments, recruiters or employers a personal email address for ongoing communications. Instructions will be shared with students before the end of the year.


LUNA'S BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION

Anthony Wayne Board of Education HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE APRIL MEETING:

[VIEW RECORDING]

- All members were present for the regular meeting held on Monday, April 7.
- April is the Month of the Military Child and the Board recognized the District's military-connected students in attendance. They also heard about the District's Purple Star program and celebrated the Purple Star designation renewals for AWHS, Fallen Timbers Middle School and Waterville Primary School.
- The Board voted to approve the [2025-26 District calendar].
- Kerri Johnson discussed the potential impact of the state's pending budget plan on the District's finances, however there is a lot of work to be done and discussions that need to happen before the state budget is signed by the Governor on June 30.
- The Board also approved a Resolution for Execution of Real Estate Purchase Contract 6446 N. Texas Street, Whitehouse. The house will be removed and the property will become part of the Whitehouse Primary School campus.
- With approval from the Board, the following projects will be opened for public bid: Monclova Primary School Roof Replacement, AWJH & FTMS Cooler and Freezer Projects, AWHS Auditorium Lighting and Sound Project. [More details about these Permanent Improvement projects are available online.]
- Member discussion and a vote to make modifications and/or revisions to Board Policies related to Release Time Religious Instruction took place.
- The Board also accepted grants awarded to Waterville Primary School.

STATE BUDGET CREATES UNCERTAINTY FOR DISTRICTS

Every two years, the Governor prepares and proposes a State Biennium Budget. The adjustment and approval process starts in the House, then moves to the Senate before returning to the Governor for signature. The budget must be signed by the Governor by June 30.

The House had several changes, and as of the end of April. there are still many unknowns regarding school funding - making it difficult to predict what our state aid will be for the next two fiscal years.

Here is what we know to date and its potential impact on AWLS:



The House rejected the Governor's proposal to continue the phasing in of the Fair School Funding Plan (FSFP) for school district state aid.

The FSFP is the first equitable funding formula that the state of Ohio has had in over 30 years. Doing away with this funding formula has an unknown impact to schools, since there will be no clear and concise formula to follow.

The House wants to change the Ohio State Constitution by modifying the calculation of the 20-mill floor to include emergency levies and income tax levies.

The District fell below the 20-mill floor following the 2024 Lucas County property tax revaluation. AWLS will receive roughly \$3.4 million as a result of being brought back up to the 20-mill floor. If there are changes to the calculation of this minimum, the District could see a revenue loss - resulting in need to return to voters for operational funding.

The House also proposed that school districts cannot end a fiscal year (June 30) with more than a 30% cash carryover of the General Fund expenditures. They want the Budget Commission to rollback millage and not collect upon those voter-approved tax dollars.

This will not impact AWLS, as we do not have that kind of carryover balance, but it will impact over 400 other districts across the state.

There are still more questions than answers.

An analogy I have shared with the Board of Education is that the state budget process is like a football game. In the first quarter, the Governor has the ball; in the second quarter, the House has control; in the third quarter it shifts to the Senate. We are waiting to see what the fourth quarter brings when the proposals return to the Governor.

In the meantime, the potential changes to the state funding have Ohio school districts doing their best to estimate their budgets. We will share information as we know more.



DISTRICT HONORED FOR FINANCIAL EXCELLENCE

The AWLS Treasurer's Department accepted the Auditor of State Award on April 30. The award signifies a "clean" audit, free of findings for recovery, deficiencies or financial concerns, and affirms the department's attention to detail, compliance with state requirements, and dedication to responsible stewardship of taxpayer dollars.




