Rocks – **Giba**

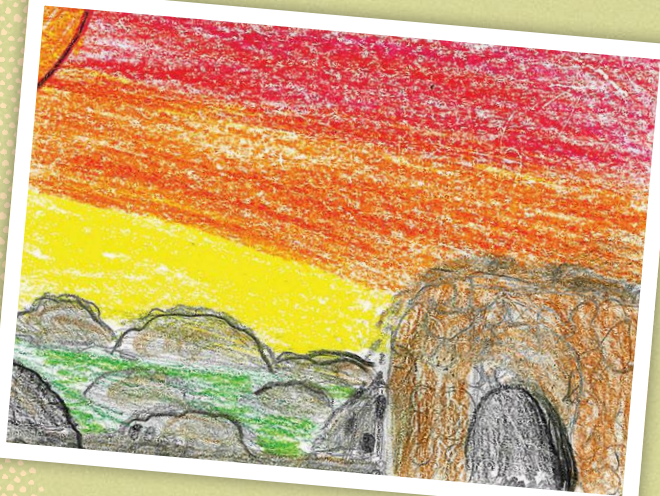
The large orange **giba** stood

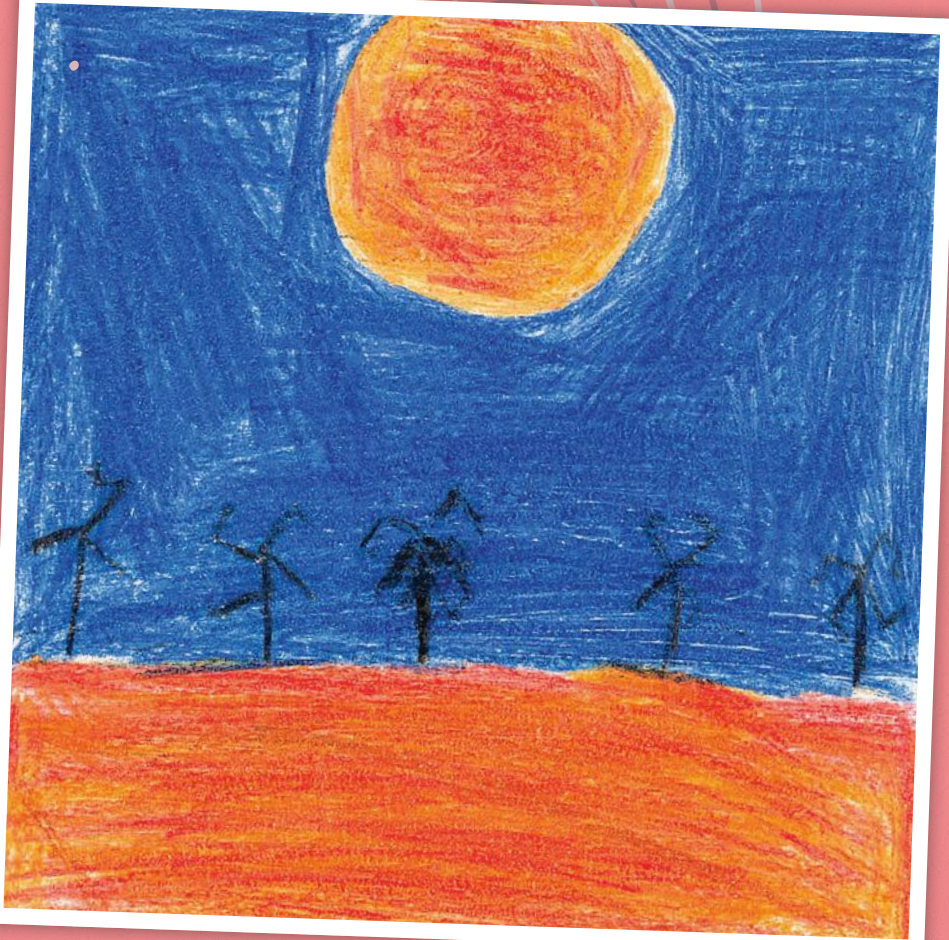
