BPW INTERNATIONAL BOARD ONLINE ZOOM MEETING FEBRUARY 17, 2024

MINUTES

1. Meeting Open

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart convened the meeting. She asked Constitutional Advisory Committee (CAC) Chair, Carolyn Savage to take the floor.

2. Zoom Protocol

CAC Chair, Carolyn Savage, explained the online meeting housekeeping matters, including how to vote on Zoom.

3. Welcome

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart, welcomed delegates, Board members, observers and staff members to the first International Board meeting of this triennium.

During the proceedings of the 2021 Congress, members asked for more Board meetings to be informed and to participate in decisions.

There are three motions on the floor today, on which voting all the delegates can vote after the closing of the International Board meeting and until 24 hours later. That means that the voting platform will close tomorrow at the same time as this meeting is finished. Results will be communicated to the delegates on Monday, 19th of February 2024, until 12 o⁻clock Central European Time (CET). There was a typo regarding the date in her last communique to the delegates; it is 19th of February and not 10th of February.

She thanked especially the staff members who were supported the whole process and working additional hours. They are the Director of President's Office, Trudy Morel-Neuhaus; and Reham Abdelkader of the President's Office. Without the foresight and organisation of BPW International Communications Officer, Ursula Schmid the process would have been stuck. She worked wonders. Wonderful advisors and supporters were the Constitutional Advisory Committee and its Chair, Carolyn Savage. She thanked them all for their passion and support. She also thanked the Credentials Committee, the Scrutineers Committee, and the BPW International Executive.

She reported that the Executive had to take one very difficult decision which hurt the whole Latin America Region: to change the Congress from Mar del Plata, Argentina to St. Kitts in the Caribbean. The Executive and the International President had no intention to hurt anybody. The Executive was forced to act due to circumstances which no one could have imagined beforehand. Therefore, presented at the beginning of this meeting a Special Award of Appreciation to the President of BPW Argentina – dear Professor Olga Ahumada and the Host Planning Team of BPW Argentina. BPW Mar del Plata and its representatives gave members of the International Planning Committee very warm welcome twice and arranged meetings with officials of Mar Del Plata and other officials, where they were received as guests of honour. President Olga Ahumada, BPW Argentina was very helpful in providing the International Planning Committee with quotes for the preparation of the budget. She commented that in her personal preparations she had started to study the Spanish language and continued to so because she wanted with all her heart to go to Argentina and wanted to be able to personally interact with Spanish-speaking members. The situation in Argentina became politically and



economically very unstable during the last few years. This included an enormous inflations rate, problems to have direct banking contacts, and often varying quotes provided by the hotel. Therefore, the International Executive decided, after long discussions, on 11 January, 2024, that it was in the financial interest of BPW International to interrupt the long preparations for the Congress under the leadership of President Professor Olga Ahumada, BPW Argentina. External conditions posed a great financial and organizational risks which BPW International was not in a position to shoulder. This was personally by far the most painful decision of the triennium and not easily taken. On behalf of BPW International, she thanked President Olga Ahumada, BPW Argentina, for all, she and her team have done to organize the BPW International Congress. The whole International Executive and President Dr. Catherine Bosshart acknowledge all their efforts and asked her and her team forgiveness for having been forced to relocate the Congress to another Region. 2027 will be the turn of Latin America Region to organize the 32nd Congress of BPW International, and all the organisation hope that the new Government of Argentina will have stabilised the political and financial situation of the wonderful country of Argentina by then. She thanks from all her heart for their efforts. BPW International will hand an official Certificate of Appreciation during the Leaders, Summit in March 2025 in New York Citv.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart recognised President Olga Ahumada, BPW Argentina.

President Olga Ahumada, BPW Argentina, thanked International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart for her words and congratulations. She stated that recently Mar Del Plata had celebrated its 150th anniversary. They welcomed not local visitors but also from the entire Argentinian Republic, ambassadors from the whole world, with world-wide recognition. There was a change of government in Argentina which did not provide a pleasant profile during the transition of power, but it can be said that there were difficulties internally in the country. These difficulties were not near Mar Del Plata; these were 500 km away. Our country is safe. The country is economically and financially in a very favourable situation, as far as the world is concerned. She was very proud at the 150th anniversary celebration. She stated that she was sorry that these factors were not taken into account. Because a great effort was carried and at the last moment they succeeded, with the change of Government, with the authorities of the City, and with the Government of Mar Del Plata to present a lower budget. As foreign currencies could not be received, the Provincial, National and Town governments all committed to this Congress so that it could be held in November 2024. Therefore, they made a huge effort to give priority to this Congress. She thanked all for their attention.

President Olga Ahumada, BPW Argentina stated that it would have been good to have a motion to decide that the Congress can still be held in Mar Del Plata, because everything is organized for it and conditions are all there to have all to come to Mar Del Plata.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart thanked President Olga Ahumada, BPW Argentina, for her comments. She stated that she believed the situation was changing. On the other hand, they had to move forward. 2027 Congress will be held on the wonderful continent of South America, and that she hoped all could enjoy Mar Del Plata. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that the decision has been made to move the Congress.

It was reported by several members that Observers on the Observers[,] YouTube channel could not hear the translation. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart provided a summary of President Olga Ahumada[,]s comments so that these could be translated.

4. Collect and Candle Lighting



Vice President Membership, Dr. Giuseppina Seidita, read the BPW International Collect and lit a candle.

5. Reading of the Aims of BPW International

Executive Finance Officer, Dr. Eufemia Ippolito, read the Aims of BPW International.

6. Opening Comments by International President, Dr. Catherine Bosshart

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that according to the BPW International Constitution, the International President can call a Board meeting with a written request of one-third of members. More than half of BPW International's financial membership voted last week to have an International Board meeting, which meets the desire of our International Board members to be involved in the International businesses. She stressed that today's votes will be on three motions, and not on any amendments to the Constitution.

There will be voting on three motions:

- I. Motion 1: To hold an Extraordinary Virtual Assembly.
- II. Motion 2: To vote on unbudgeted expenses which occurred and will occur with the registration of BPW International in Switzerland; and
- III. Motion 3: To vote on a motion proposed by the Federation of BPW Nepal, seconded by the Federation of BPW Nigeria, to hold the next international congress in a hybrid form.

She stressed that there will be no voting on Amendments on the Constitution; that can only be done at a General Assembly, be it Extraordinary or during Congress. BPW International Constitution states that BPW International is under Association Laws of the Swiss Civil Code, Paragraphs 60 to 79. This in force for our actual Constitution whether we are registered or not. The Swiss Civil Code provides a framework for associations, which will be specified in the statutes of respective associations. That is a legal principle in Switzerland. In the 19th paragraph of the Swiss Civil Code, it is stated that in case the statutes of an Association do not mention, for instance, the right to ask for the Extraordinary General Assembly, or any other matter mentioned in the Swiss Civil Code, then the Civil Code would enter into force. Our delegates can ask for an Extraordinary General Assembly as their democratic right. Once again, there will not be any voting on the Constitutional amendments.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart, noted a request from President Ambica Shrestha, BPW Nepal, to place the third motion first because she needs to leave the meeting early. She asked the parliamentarians, opinion on adding this to the agenda.

7. Voting Strength

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart asked the Margaret Tipper, Chair, Credentials Committee, about the voting strength. Voting strength was confirmed - 107 registered; 86 voting strength confirmed. Therefore, a quorum has been established against 146 possible votes.

8. Appointment of Minutes Secretary

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart asked Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla to address the appointment of the Minutes Secretary.

Moved by: Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla.

Seconded by: International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart.

Moved: that Dawn Nason, BPW Canada be appointed as Minutes secretary for the purposes of record keeping.

Vote was called.



Yes: 82%. No: 8%. Abstain: 10%. **Motion adopted on division**.

9. Roll call and Apologies

Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla brought greetings from BPW Canada. She explained that International Board comprises of affiliate federations having two delegates, affiliate clubs having one delegate per country, the Executive, Past Presidents, and Standing Committee Chairpersons. Recorded for this meeting is 107 registered with the Credentials Chair confirming 86 delegates, bringing us to quorum. The apologies would be recorded based on the recording taking place. Any observers at this meeting need to exit the delegates Zoom and join the link on YouTube for Observers. She acknowledged and welcomed the Observers who are watching through a separate platform on YouTube. It basically allows to view this meeting as it takes place live but does not enable them to speak or actively participate. She thanked the Observers and all those attending the meeting.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart thanked Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla.

10. Discussion of Motion 3 Being on the Agenda

International President, Dr. Catherine Bosshart, recognized Regional Coordinator Europe Anu Viks who asked about the third motion, because the meeting has been called to vote on two motions. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that the third motion had arrived about a month before the International Board meeting who discussed whether to include it on the agenda, as it is an amendment to the Constitution. On the other hand, there are many affiliates who are in economic crises, and for them, it is not possible to attend an International Congress in person. She gave her opinion that this needs to be discussed and be voted on, i.e. whether to have an International Congress which is hybrid. If this motion is only discussed at Congress or even at the Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly then it would probably be too late, if the hybrid option is adopted. That is the reason why it is being proposed that third motion be discussed at this meeting, and not exclude sisters facing incredible economic difficulties.

Regional Coordinator Europe Anu Viks thanked International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart and said that she was sorry about this difficult situation. The BPW International budget will be impacted, e.g. on-line systems, translators, etc., and impacts how much participants coming to Congress will have to pay. It is a trickly situation.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshard, recognized Bessie Hironimus regarding a point of order, who stated that this is a special Board meeting called. When there is a special meeting called the agenda has to be followed; new business cannot be brought to the table. Parliamentary rules should be followed.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart asked for a time out to confer with the Parliamentarians. Anita Devcich, Chief, Parliamentarian, indicated that she needed to determine that agenda timeline. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart indicated that the motion was announced to the whole Board directly by the President of BPW Nepal and it is not on the agenda.

Francesca Burak, Chair, Standing Committee on Development, Training & Employment asked for clarification of the above statement. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart restated. All the Presidents received the text of Motion 3 but not likely chairs of Standing Committees. Francesca Burak, Chair, Standing Committee on Development, Training & Employment, stated that the meeting was told that there would be no votes on Constitutional matters, and encouraged keeping the



meeting on track in the interests of time. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart acknowledged the observation.

President Shaika Hend Bint Salman Alkhalifa, BPW Bahrain, asked about a member not able to vote. It was confirmed that President Dr. Shafeeqa Al Ameri, BPW UAE, should be voting.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart recognised Past International President Dr. Yasmin Darwish who stated that she supports Bessie Hironimus, statement as the agenda is not being followed, the items need to be discussed. Timekeeper should let Board members to know how long to speak.

BPW International Communications Officer, Ursula Schmid, asked for hands to be put up, and talk upon being recognised by International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart.

President Jo Kinsey, BPW UK stated that she did not receive the communication on the third motion from President Ambica, BPW Nepal, and that there are problems in the YouTube channel and observers cannot understand any of the official languages because there is no translation available to them. The vote that she will be making is on behalf of her Federation after discussion with them. If they cannot hear the proceedings, they cannot be part of the discussion to determine the BPW UK vote. She asked that this be noted. There is no point viewing the video without translation.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart asked for subtitles for translations. Communications Officer Ursula Schmid indicated that this was not technically possible.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart recognised International President Elizabeth Benham who commented on the delay in approving the agenda. Many members did not receive the notice of the new motion. She expressed her concerns that the new motion is a major amendment to the Constitution which is a huge financial risk for BPW International, and it will require a lot of discussion. She stated that supported prior observations made during the meeting that this motion cannot be introduced into this meeting.

11. Announcements (call for General business items)

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart: asked, besides the issue of Motion 3 being discussed – which is not yet solved – if there were for any points to be added to the General Business item on the agenda. Any requests should be put in Chat.

Regional Coordinator Europe Anu Viks stated that YouTube channel does not seem to be functioning well. President Mariella Camilleri, BPW Malta, observed that the YouTube channel was frozen, and asked that it be checked.

12. Voting Strength

Margaret Tipper, Chair, Credential Committee announced that Voting Strength was 86.

13. Appointments

Appointment of Credentials Chair

Moved by: International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart.

Seconded by: Past International President Freda Miriklis.

Moved: That Margaret Tipper, Former Executive Secretary, BPW Australia, is appointed Credentials Chair.

Zoom polling line was opened for voting. Yes: 83%.



No: 4%. Abstain: 13%. **Motion: Carried upon division**.

Having been pointed out that IPC could not make a motion while she is chairing, she passed the Chair to First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya who introduced herself.

Moved by: International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart.

Seconded by: Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla.

Moved: That Anita Devcich, BPW New Zealand is appointed Chief Parliamentarian.

Moved: that Maide Yazar, BPW Canada and Carla Laura Petruzelli, BPW Italy, are appointed Parliamentarians.

Zoom polling line was opened for voting. Yes: 78%. No: ??. Abstain: ??. **Motion: Carried upon division**.

Chair reverted to International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart.

Appointment of Scrutineers

Moved by: Regional Coordinator Europe Anu Viks. Seconded by: Regional Coordinator Latin America Diana Barragán. Moved: that Goðrún Jakobsdúóttir, BPW Iceland is appointed Chief Scrutineer. Zoom polling line was opened for voting. Yes: 88%. No: ??. Abstain: ??. Motion: Carried upon division.

Moved by: Regional Coordinator Europe Anu Viks.

Seconded by: Regional Coordinator Latin America Diana Barragán.

Moved: that Beatriz Rosa, BPW Brazil; Carole Shaw, BPW Australia; Anita Weil, BPW Switzerland: Kelly Tallon Franklin, BPW Canada; Chavalan Atthasuwan, Young BPW Thailand be appointed as Scrutineers.

Zoom polling line was opened for voting. Yes: 82%. No: ??. Abstain: ??. **Motion: Carried upon division**.

Appointment of Timekeepers

Moved by: Francesca Burak, Standing Committee on Development, Training & Employment. **Seconded by**: Past International President Sylvia Perry.

Moved: That Daniela Rigassi, Project Leader, BPW International; and Benita Shaw, Young BPW Thailand be appointment Timekeepers.

Zoom polling line was opened for voting. Yes: 88%.



No: 2%. Abstain: 11%. **Motion Carried upon division**.

14. Discussion

IP Catherine recognized President Maria Angelica, BPW Santiago Chile; Past National President Yinka Ajibola, BPW Nigeria; and Janet Gibson to speak in the order recognized.

President Maria Angelica, BPW Santiago Chile, would like to present a motion. In Latin America members are willing to travel to Mar Del Plata. It would be much nicer to go Mar Del Plata because it will be impossible for Latin America members to travel to St. Kitts due to economic issues. International President Dr. Catherine Boashart responded that this item is not on agenda.

Past National President Yinka Ajibola, BPW Nigeria, commented on the Motion 3 was sent sometime ago. There should have enough time to go through to the Executive and onto the International Board. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart explained that President Ambika, BPW Nepal, sent it directly to whole International Board. Executive was reluctant to include the motion because it is a change to the Constitution.

15. Voting Strength

Margaret Tipper, Chair, Credential Committee announced that Voting Strength was 86.

16. Discussion (Continued)

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart recognized Past International Yasmin Darwich, who commented that Observers are unable to hear the meeting on YouTube and that they have a Constitutional right to listen to the meeting and have access to translation. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart commented that unfortunately translations are not possible on the YouTube channel, which is a real problem. They had practiced the live stream which had worked fine but it is not now.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart recognized President Jo Kinsey, BPW UK, who asked that since the Observers could not hear nor understand what is being said, should this meeting be paused and reconvened another time.

Ursula Schmid, Communications Officer stated that Live stream can be restarted after the polling.

Chief Parliamentarian Anita Devcich stated that there is nothing in our rules about ensuring how a meeting of this type should operate. The technology is new to BPW International. Live stream does not seem to be working. Need someone experienced in IT set up this meeting. At the moment, there does not appear to be any need to stop this important meeting and should continue.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart offered to share all meeting documents, including the minutes, which can be sent out to all participants. Observers can translate online to their language. This meeting is being held at great cost and should not be paused.

17. Adoption of Standing Orders

Moved by: Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdullah.

Seconded by: Past International Freda Miriklis.

Moved: To accept the Standing Orders that have been issued for the purposes of this meeting. Zoom polling line was opened for voting.

Yes: 64%.



No: 22%. Abstain: 14%. **Motion: Carried upon division**.

18. Adoption of the Agenda

In summary, the discussion on whether to discuss and vote on Motion 3 continued. With several members arguing to add it to the agenda, expressing concern about affordability of attending Congress in person and the need for members to participate at the international level. Parliamentarians, CAC Chair, International President and several other members arguing that it is a Constitutional amendment and requires a different process. Financial consequences are yet to be determined. The following points were made:

- Immediate Past International President Dr. Amany Asfour asked about the status of Motion #3, and that it should be put on the agenda. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart ask an opinion from Chief Parliamentarian, Margaret Tipper, who stated that the problem was some members did not get the agenda. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that Motion 3 was not included in the agenda of this meeting. As it is a Constitutional change, it needs to be voted at an Extraordinary General Assembly or Congress.
- Bessie Hironimus reminded the members that she had raised a point of order, which takes precedence, i.e., the agenda needs to be followed.
- Immediate Past International President Dr. Amany Asfour responded that motion was sent long before the agenda. She stated that Affiliates have a right to put motions on the floor at International Board meetings for a vote.
- Regional Coordinator Latin America Diana Barragán reminded those who received the motion, that CAC Chair, Carolyn Savage has said that this is a constitutional amendment, and it cannot be presented today.
- Chair, Standing Committee for Legislation, Stella Kammitsi stated that the agenda she received on February 13 had two motions.
- International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that Motion 3 may be discussed at an Extraordinary General Assembly. However, it is a constitutional change. Nevertheless, she expressed her concern about ability of members to attend an in-person Congress.
- □ Vice-President Myriam Heidelberger, BPW Switzerland, stated that she supports the statement of International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart, and reminded that BPW International is operating under Swiss Civil Code. That means if we did not duly announce agenda items, we can only discuss them under Swiss Civil Code if the Constitution expressly permits this. In this case, it does not.
- Past President Liz Benham pointed that Bessie Hironimus has a point of order. Bessie Hironimus stated that she made a point of order which was to be answered based on what the Parliamentarians advised. Parliamentary rule is any item not included in the agenda cannot be discussed.
- International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated another meeting may be needed to vote on Motion 3. Chief, Parliamentarian stated that it can be discussed under "any other business", with which International Past President Dr. Catherine Bosshart concurred.
- International Past President Dr. Catherine Bosshart handed the microphone to CAC Chair, Carolyn Savage, who reminded members that no one can speak to a matter more than once, as per Standing Orders.
- President Ambika, BPW Nepal, commented that at this meeting things are being done that are not in the Constitution. This is a very crucial motion. The International Congress will not be wellattended. She stated the motion and its rationale. There are countries like Nepal, who cannot



afford to travel. If people from around the world to attend and participate in this international organization, then this motion is needed.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart asked for a vote on the agenda as it was presented.

Moved by: Immediate Past President Jacqueline Graham, BPW Australia Seconded by: Past President Liz Benham, Moved: that the agenda issued on February 10, 2024 as circulated be adopted. Zoom polling line was opened for voting. Yes: 61%. No: 33% Abstain 5%. Motion: Carried upon division.

10-minute Break was taken, after which the meeting reconvened.

19. Formal Voting Procedure

Daniela Rigassi, Timekeeper, remined that comments are to be limited to 1 minute, according to the Standing Orders for this meeting. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart reminded that a point could only be addressed once by a member.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart requested that CAC Chair, Carolyn Savage continue her presentation on the Formal Voting Procedure, which she proceeded to do based on the Standing Orders for the meeting, which were pre-circulated CAC Chair, Carolyn Savage shared a PowerPoint presentation on the Standing Orders, with respect to presentation of motions and debate. Simple majority is required for a motion or resolution to pass in accordance with the Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual. A voting test run was done with two fun questions.

Chair recognised Past International President Yasmin Darwich who commented that Constitution is clear; an Affiliate cannot place a motion to the International Board in between meetings. The Executive should be the one to send motions to the International Board. There is an agenda of this meeting already in place. We cannot add more changes than the ones we discussed approved.

Parliamentarian stated the third motion may be brought up at the end of the meeting, under General Business, but not at this point. She asked a non-voting delegate to advise her on who will be speaking next. First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya concurred.

20. Motion 1

Motion Session convened. International President (Chairperson) will vacate the chair and First Vice President United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya, will Chair the following session on the motions being moved by International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart, seconded by Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla.

Chair was handed to First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya, who read out the first motion.

Motion #1:

Mover: International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart,

Seconder: Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla.

Moved: To hold an Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly to address a serious matter of legal compliance requiring amendments to BPW International Constitution. This will be for



the specific purpose of review, debate, voting and adoption of the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) to meet the minimum requirements for registration under Swiss Civil Code with the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva, Switzerland by the 1^{st of} July 2024 and to meet the Anti-Money Laundering Act (AMLA) and its implementing provisions (RO 2021 656).

Rationale: The dates/timeframe of the Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly will be six months from issue of this "Call to the International Board" over the following dates/times:

- □ Friday 14th June, period of three (3) hours
- Saturday 15th June, 8.5 hours (including breaks)
- Sunday 16th June, 8.5 hours (including breaks)

Additional supporting information as requested by members and issued in writing:

- Budget to hold an EVGA (which is permitted under Art. 64, cl 3 The meeting is convened in accordance with the provision of the Articles of Association and by law if one fifth (1/5th) of the members requests a meeting of the Swiss Civil Code 2010, which BPW International conforms with (as per existing Constitution and Regulations).
- □ Total Budget for an Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly (software, interpretation, configuration of voting system: €24,654
- □ Costs to amend the constitution during the General Assembly 2.5 more days based on 63 proposed amendments at 20 minutes each:
 - Fixed costs per additional Congress Day ca.€40,000 x 2.5 days.€100,000
 - Additional costs per member €250 per day x 3= €750

Mover, International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart was invited to open her microphone to speak to the motion.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that the last major changes to the Constitution were last done in 2011 at the last General Assembly in Helsinki. The General Assembly decided to register BPW International in Switzerland. This was done, but, unfortunately, at the wrong place. BPW International was registered at the Centre d'Accueille Nationale de la Genève Internationale, which is called CAGI, and the Geneva Welcoming Centre for NGOs is working to facilitate NGOs to go down to find a place for offices in Geneva and make their facilities available for NGOs for their meetings. They ask to be registered their proceedings to every General Assembly and audited annual financial statements. As BPW International had no proceedings of the Virtual General Assembly in Cairo, International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart could not hand in documents, but she gave them our yearly audited financial statements. The correct registration is to be at the Office of Registry of the Canton of Geneva. Up to 2023 registration for an Association was understood under Swiss Law to be not mandatory. World-wide the legislation has become stricter, to do everything possible to prevent money laundering and the financing of terrorism. In Switzerland the Anti Money Laundering Act came into force for Associations on January 1, 2023, with the transition period until July 1, 2024. Our organization has now to register because we are not able to fulfil the accumulated conditions to be existing. The cumulative conditions are that we distribute not more than 200,000 CHF over two years. The distribution has to be done by an independent commercial company and that a permanent representative is domiciled in Switzerland. If we are not registered until July 1st, 2024, then we have to ask for an additional transition period until the Congress in November and we would have to fill in an additional form which would state that we confer with exemptions and/or pay a high fine.



Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thanked International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart and invited the Seconder, Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla, to open her microphone and speak to the motion.

Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla stated that BPW International is a truly inclusive organisation, and this right here is evidence that the Executive wanted to include the entire International Board to be a part of these important discussions that deal with the serious matter of compliance to meet the minimum requirements for registration. Of course, one could say that it is the right of the International Board to be included but remember that it is the Executive according to the Constitution that is responsible for operational and management matters. Registration is an operational and management matter. We know many federations and affiliates who would normally deal with this as such without involving anyone outside the Executive. However, because registration requires us to update our Constitution, we considered this as a new action. We wanted to truly live up to our triennium's theme of New Actions Through Cooperation. This here is evidence of that willingness to collaborate and that belief in teamwork and sisterhood updating our Constitution should be an inclusive process. Yes, we have no choice to update to legally meet the registration requirements but we want all of you to understand and be a part of this governance process. The Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly, first of its kind to meet the minimum requirements for legal registration, which has now been a long-standing dispute, will position BPW International solidly into the future. That common future awaits all of us no matter which part of the world we are in.

First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thanked Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla, and opened the session for debate, and stated the Standing Orders regarding debate. Those wishing to speak to the motion should indicate by typing into the Chat Box, indicating whether they wish to speak for or against the motion.

Parliamentarian stated not everyone has indicated their federation. This is important because only one person can speak from each federation. Speakers need to say who they are and identify their federation or their Executive status.

Speaker #1: Against the Motion – Mariella Camilleri President, BPW Malta. Speaking against the motion primarily from the perspective of an organization that is governed by the documents of BPW International. It is very clear in the Constitutional documents that if we look at Section 58 of the Constitutional Regulatory document it states very clearly that the Constitution can only be amended at a General Assembly. Section R (indistinct) can only be changed by the General Assembly. Section R.8.4 of the Constitutional Regulations – Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations submitted must comply with the requirements in the Procedure Manual. However, of you read further down is the Section 8.6 it says that amendments to the Constitution can only be amended during the General Assembly which has to happen during the International Congress which happens once every three years. I therefore the whole process that we are undergoing the discussion of looking at amendments to the Constitution and Regulations of BPW International during an Extraordinary General Assembly is illegal and goes against all three governance documents that we abide by both at the international level and at local levels.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thanked the speaker, and invited Speaker #1 in favour of this motion to open her microphone.

Speaker #1: Sioban Dilly, Vice President, BPW New Zealand – Issues, spoke for the motion. Propose an amendment for financial reporting and lines of reporting to be considered seriously by the membership, given inclusive opportunity for adoption. So how to make this happen in a way that is most inclusive of our membership and most democratic? BPW Nigeria and Nepal have raised very



serious concerns about their ability to have representation at Congress in St. Kitts due to costs of travel. Certainly, BPW New Zealand can talk to the costs of travel far away from where they are. How can we assure that Congress, our first in person in many years is a joyful celebration of the work of our sisters and an equal opportunity for the growth and development of our organisation? The COVID-19 pandemic has shown us all at tremendous cost what can be achieved through digital on-line meetings. We need to be a modern, solutions focused organisation to maintain relevancy and we see a unique opportunity here. One final note is to thank the Executive for doing the work to address matters of our registration in accordance with the Swiss Civil Code in recognition of being required to do so.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya, thanked the Speaker.

Chair, VP UN invited Speaker #2 to speak against the motion, Myriam Heidelberger, Vice President, BPW Switzerland. Based on the Swiss legal code, virtual general assemblies are only possible if expressly mentioned in the Constitution. Speaker #1 against this motion, Mariella Camilleri, has shown clearly that this is not the case. So legally we are not able to do this. Secondly, the Virtual General Assembly of 2021, where we were not able to discuss well together and based on that experience are showing me very clearly that we are not yet able to hold a meeting in this manner. Thirdly, concerning the time, it is no rush to be in this Commercial Register before November as International President Catherine Bosshart has already described. So, we have a possibility to register later. And to add. Fourth point: Because there is still some time left and I am deepest in my heart with our friends from all over the world because it is very, very cost consuming to travel around for international meetings and I truly hope that BPW International Executive will find a way to set up a travel fund to make it possible for most of us to be there.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thanked Myriam Heidelberger, Vice President, BPW Switzerland.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya invited Speaker #2 to speak for the motion to open her microphone.

Ms. Gillian Lewis, President, BPW Australia stated she has cancelled her request.

First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya invited Speaker #3 to speak against the motion - Past International President Dr. Yasmin Darwich.

At this point in the discussion, the debate was closed, as the 20-minute mark had been reached as per the meeting Standing Orders. Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya invited the Mover, International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart for her right of reply.

Mover Right of Reply: International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart explained that the statutes of Swiss Law permit an Extraordinary General Assembly which overrules the statutes of BPW International. What cannot be done is the fact that we have a virtual meeting. We would need to vote so that we can have a virtual meeting. We have to register by 1st of July. If we do not do it, we have to write the Registry Office and leave it in their hands if they accept extension or if we will be fined immediately or even imprisonment. I will sign the form excusing us from the Registry, because it is simply not true. We have closed an MOU with UN Women in October 2023. This MOU specifically for developing countries globally. With this MOU, we have the possibility to finance projects through UN Women. We would not be able to do this if we are not registered.



First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thanked International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart. She stated that as noted previously the voting for this motion will be open at the end of the debate of the third motion.

21. Motion 1 Results

Results of the voting on Motion 1 will be announced after the polls close.

22. Motion #2:

Mover: International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart.

Seconder: Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani Adullah.

Moved: To settle the financial expenses incurred with respect to legal compliance and registration of BPW International.

Rationale:

An independent Swiss Law Firm as retained to advise and assist the Executive Board and the Constitutional Advisory Committee in the drafting of the proposed amendments to ensure legal compliance of Registration of BPW International as required and adopted in the XXVII BPW International Congress, Helsinki, Fifth and Sixth Business Sessions, 21 June 2021 (Congress Proceedings). The debt incurred to date will be treated as a receivable until it is approved.

Additional supporting information as requested by members and issued in writing:

Costs associated with the expertise of registration lawyers in Switzerland following a review of BPW International existing Constitution and Regulations and historic review including original minutes of the formation of BPW International in Geneva, Switzerland in 1930.

□ Budget for Registration of BPW International is a total €21,367.

Mover International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart was invited by Chair, First Vice President -United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya to open her microphone to speak in favour of the motion.

Mover, International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart explained that the Executive tried to do the registration. We presented all the immediate papers. These were clearly rejected because the Constitution was not in compliance with the Swiss Civil Code. The Swiss Civil Code has not changed much since 2011, except with some provisions for anti-money laundering. At that moment we got the address of a law firm in Geneva specializing in Association Law. Informing the Executive, I handed them the Report of the Registry Office and our Constitution and asked to roughly give a review of what was lacking in the Constitution and a quote. What came back was a meticulously presented wording of an amended Constitution and an invoice. They told us that they had refrained from invoicing a full amount as we are an NGO. In the presentation of expenses is also a quote for the work of tax exemption, as this would need to be done very carefully. The tax exemption has to be asking at the Swiss Department of Finance of each Canton and there is only one chance to get tax exemption, so if the papers are not hundred per cent correct, there is no possibility to come back. The Executive has been very well informed that we got this proposal of the Law Firm with an invoice, which was a surprise because she wanted to have had a comprehensive quote but apparently that was not done. So, she is asking for the approval of the expenses.

Seconder, Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla. was invited by Chair, First Vice President -United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya to open her microphone to speak in favour of the motion.



Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla stated that we all understand the importance of registration, but those who have been around for the last three trienniums know that this has been a long-standing dispute that needed an independent third-party intervention. We understand why this is complicated, because registration has not just recently lapsed, and we need to understand that over time the minimum requirements have changed to deal with the evolving challenges that have led to the application of the Anti-Money Laundering Act to NGOs as well. To meet these minimum requirements the Constitution is now legally required to be updated. Those of you that have attended the sessions on updating our Constitution clearly understand the enormous amount of work and the need for legal professionals who are specialising the registration of NGOs to guide us through this process in a systematic way. Their knowledge and experience have been crucial for our Constitutional Advisory Committee to then undertake the responsibility of advising the Executive and ensure compliance while making decisions on registration, reviewing amendments to our governance documents and seeking cooperation from the International Board. Professional legal advice costs money. An independent third-party specialised experts cost money, and these expenses are unavoidable to ensure that we are guided in the most proficient manner possible. BPS International's interest is truly at stake, and this will have legal and financial impact on our organization, so it is most definitely worth the investment.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thank Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla. She declared that the motion was now open for debate. She read out the Standing Orders for debate.

Speaker #1: Against the Motion – Chair, Standing Committee for Legislation Stella Kammitsi. She stated that being a lawyer and being Chair of a Committee where all the representatives are lawyers, and could have assisted on this matter, advising and liaising with other BPW members in Switzerland and avoiding legal costs. Experience in her own jurisdiction, they have registered all their clubs of their federation with no legal expenses at all because all the legal services have been offered by their members to support everybody. Second point, as per the remarks of Vice-President, Switzerland, there could have been a request for extension on the registration, so we had the time, if requested by us to pull together the resources of lawyers within BPW to assist and avoid these costs.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thanked the speaker, and invited Speaker #1 in favour of this motion to open her microphone. No speaker for the motion having been identified, the Chair closed the debate.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya recognized Bessie Hironimus on a Point of Information. Bessie Hironimus stated that she was raising the Point of Information related to the first motion. She asked why is it that we are considering Article 62 of the Swiss Civil Code which says that the associations which have not yet acquired legal personality will be treated as simple partnerships. Why can't we be a simple partnership?

The Parliamentarian intervened that this point could not be discussed as it has to do with a previous motion.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya invited the Mover, International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart for her right of reply.

Mover Right of Reply: International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that she has seen the questions in the Chat as to why we did not budget for this item. She stated that they had no idea of the costs. She thanked Stella Kammitsi, Chair, Standing Committee for Legislation, for her input. It



would have been difficult for lawyers outside of Switzerland to deal with this matter. There are about 1,500 NGOs registered in Switzerland. The Registry is very picky; what they want needs to provided exactly. Re: the question from Bessie, paragraph 62 of the Swiss Civil Code, BPW International does not correspond with that. Our organization is much too big to a partnership association. This option was examined very closely and found to be not feasible. We have \$300,000 is USA and have no means to access this amount. The organisation has no legal standing and no registration number.

Chair, First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya thanked the Mover, International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart. She reminded that the voting on this motion will be open at the conclusion of the debate of the third motion.

23. Motion 2 Results

Voting will be open at the end of the discussion on this motion, as third motion will not be discussed. Results of the voting on Motion 2 will be announced after the polls close.

24. Voting Strength

Margaret Tipper, Chair, Credentials Committee reported that voting strength is 75.

25. General Business

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart opened the discussion under General Business section. She asked to do justice to President Ambica Shrestha, BPW Nepal. Although this motion was not on the agenda, the Board should decide whether to vote on this motion. As the mover of the third motion, President Ambica Shrestha, BPW Nepal is not present, this question was not pursued.

Past International President Dr. Yasmin Darwich wanted to express her opinion. She is against Motion 2. Budget should have been approved prior to expenditure being incurred. The procedures were not followed.

Past International President Liz Benham expressed her opinion on the process has been undemocratic with not enough time to speak and hear from all the speakers who wanted to speak.

CAC Chair, Carolyn Savage commented that there are clear processes in the Standin Orders as to how to go through motions and their debate. We cannot have five or six people speaking against a motion. These need to be balanced with those speaking for a motion. The Standing Orders are very clear and have been followed for several past Congresses. Points of Clarification are not opportunities for people to raise and debate motions on the table.

Immediate Past International President Dr. Amany Asfour commented on the motion of BPW Nepal and BPW Nigeria, which she feels should have been put on the agenda be heard by the International Board. As the motion arrived long ago. Motion is important to developing nations and it was going to be discussed under "Other Business". She asked that it be voted on.

President Jinka Ajibola, BPW Nigeria she stated that she wanted to make some strong points about Motion 3. It was submitted a long time ago, so that it could be discussed. Challenges of devaluation, high cost of living are known. It is unfair to exclude the International Board from taking the decision. The motion should be heard, as there is a risk of not being able to participate in person due to costs of participation at Congress. The motion should be considered.

Executive Finance Officer, Dr. Eufemia Ippolito, stated that she is against the discussion of Motion #3, as the agreed upon agenda has two motions; a third one, would be against the Constitution.



Chair declared electronic voting open as of 11:20 Swiss Time. All voting results will be checked by the Scrutineers and Credentials Chair and confirmed within 24 hours following the closing of the electronic voting. Time frame is for them to cross check and prepare their reports. The results will be translated in all five languages. She declared the session on motions closed.

Chair, 1st Vice President vacated the Chair, the International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart assumed the Chair. She thanked 1st Vice President Chularat for chairing the session of the Motions that have been presented, and all those who have participated as speakers.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that Motion 3 is under "other business". She would like to determine if the International Board wants to vote on this motion or not. Communications Officer Ursula has prepared a poll on whether to discuss at the International Bord or at Congress. The question would be: "are you accepting to vote on the third motion which is asking for a hybrid Congress".

Chair recognized President Jo Kinsey, BPW UK, who stated that many had not received the communication on Motion #3, which was acknowledged by the International President. She is disappointed that this has now come to the floor without notice. She felt that this cannot be voted on because there has not been enough time for her federation to consider this motion.

International President Dr. Catherine Bossart anyone can present business, under "Other Business". It was not to vote on the motion here, but it was to have the International Board voting if they agree to vote on the motion or not. If today's vote is no, then this motion will not be pursued.

Chief Parliamentarian, Margaret Tipper, confirmed that an opinion can be asked. If this motion passes, then it can be discussed at an Extraordinary General Assembly or Congress.

Credentials Chair reported that the voting numbers are dropping.

Another Parliamentarian advised that it is a Constitutional amendment, and asked can this be discussed at an Extraordinary General Assembly as a friendly amendment that could be done at an Extraordinary General Assembly or at the International Congress, whatever the International Board decides. She reiterated that Extraordinary General Assembly is feasible under Swiss Law. It is the Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly that would need to be accepted by the International Board.

CAC Chair advised that there should not vote on the third motion. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart asked for any other general business. She thanked all. She reminded about the voting.

Liz Benham on point of information re the third motion. It has financial implications and cannot be discussed there. Secondly, you mentioned credentials that BPW Egypt was not financial. Therefore, is Immediate Past International President Amany Asfour financial and eligible to vote?

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart: Voting right of past international presidents does not depend on the financial status of their federation/affiliate and is dependent on the service they gave to BPW International.

Past International President Liz Benham asked for confirmation that past presidents did not have to pay their dues to be able to vote at BPW International meetings.



International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart remarked that they have to pay their dues. The rights of Past International Presidents have been usual practice. They have lifelong voting rights, because of their service. They are above the financial situation of their Federation/Affiliate. Nothing is mentioned in the Constitution. All people are equal under Swiss Civil Code. This should be clarified for the International Congress.

Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla commented that the Constitution and Regulations are silent on the matter.

President Shaika Hind Alkhalifa, BPW Bahrain stated that it is a democratic procedure to put all motions for voting on all motions. Not voting on BPW Nepal's motion is against democratic procedures.

Past International President Dr. Yasmin Darwish commented that BPW has allowed in the past PIPs to be exempt from the financial rules. Only those who are present during the discussion can be able to vote.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart stated that delegates have the right to vote.

Past National President Jacquiline Graham, BPW Australia asked if it would be possible to circulate the motion and take a vote after. International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart responded that could be done with financial information.

National President Shan McEwing, BPW Canada asked for a motion to close the discussion.

Moved by: Executive Secretary Jenny Gulamani-Abdulla Seconded by: First Vice President - United Nations Chularat (Toyting) Israngkool Na Ayutthaya Moved: That the meeting be brought to a close.

International President Dr. Catherine Bosshart thanked the delegates.

Meeting closed at 11:48 Swiss Time. The voting will close in 24 hours. Candle was blown out by Vice President Membership, Dr. Giuseppina Seidita.

Chapter 2



Standing Orders



BPW INTERNATIONAL STANDING ORDERS

These Standing Orders were developed by the Constitutional Advisory Committee from previous Standing Orders, with an overview from the Resolutions Chair and Executive.

These Standing Orders set out the procedures to be used during the XXXI BPW International Congress, St Kitts, 17-21 November 2024, at the pre and post International Board Meetings and the General Assembly Business Sessions.

The Standing Orders cover the rules for discussion, timeframes, who may speak and who may vote.

The conduct of the meeting is controlled by the general will of the membership, giving a majority decision after a full and fair consideration of the issues involved. The Standing Orders are designed to provide for constructive and democratic meetings to help, not hinder, the business of the meeting. •Undue strictness•should never be allowed to intimidate members or limit full participation.

During the General Assembly, the President chairs the meeting, with the following exception:

- the presentation of the President's Report when the First Vice President takes the Chair
- discussion and voting on amendments to the Constitution and Regulations when the Constitution Advisory Committee (CAC) Chairperson takes the Chair
- discussion and voting on the resolutions when the Resolutions Committee Chairperson takes the Chair
- discussions and voting when the Elections Committee Chairperson takes the Chair.

If for any reason, the President is unavailable, the First Vice President takes the Chair.

Any Chairperson of a General Assembly session or International Board meeting must always be impartial. The Chairperson, including the President, cannot take part in a discussion or speak for or against a motion or resolution, and should not chair an item of business where she may want to express a view.

To take part in any discussion the President (or Chairperson) must vacate the Chair at the start of the item of business and announce that the Chair is being passed to the appointed officer, and to permit to speak to the item of business. To take part in the discussion the Chairperson (or President) must vacate the Char at the start of the item of business and announce the Chair is being passed to another appointed officer and must speak from the floor of the meeting. The Chairperson (or President) cannot resume the Chair until the matter has been concluded, and if it is adjourned, must vacate the Chair each time the matter is discussed.

At the pre-Congress International Board Meeting, the President nominates a Chief Parliamentarian and two (2) other Parliamentarians for approval by the International Board. All Parliamentarians must be familiar with the Constitution. Regulations and Procedure Manual and be impartial members with



experience in meeting procedure who advice the Chairperson on issues which arise during the discussion. Parliamentarians cannot be members of the Executive or Delegates and may not participate in the discussions. They do not have a right to vote.

A. ATTENDEES:

- 1. The pre-Congress International Board Meeting is open for the following (as per existing Constitutional and Regulations approved March 2021):
 - Members of the International Executive
 - BPW International Past Presidents
 - Affiliate Federations, represented by two (2) appointed representatives, and all dues (and outstanding penalties) are paid in full by time of registration
 - Affiliate Clubs, represented by 1 (one) appointed representative per country and all dues (and penalties) are paid in full by time of registration
 - BPW International Standing Committees Chairpersons and all dues (and penalties) are paid in full by their Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club.
- 2. Observers will be provided access but will have no speaking rights at the International Board Meeting.
- 3. The General Assembly is open for the following (as per the Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual approved March 2021) and noted as above that all dues (and outstanding penalties) have been paid in full by time of registration:
 - Members of the International Executive
 - BPW International Past Presidents
 - Affiliate Federations, represented by their delegates (numbers as per outlined under the Constitution and Regulations [C&R] and Procedure Manual [PM]).Affiliate Clubs, represented by 1 (one) appointed representative per country
 - BPW International Standing Committees Chairpersons
 - Observers
- 4. Post-Congress International Board Meeting is open to all of the above, with the possible change in representation by Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs, following the voting and ratification of the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) 2024 and the Procedure Manual 8.7.3.

B. VOTING:

1. Only Delegates (and when appropriate Alternative Delegates), members of the Executive, Chairpersons of Standing Committees and Past Presidents of BPW International may vote. These are referred to as:

"Voting Members"

2. Credential Chair must announce the voting strength prior to the Adoption of the Standing Orders and before any voting sessions are to commence.



3. Each Delegate, or the Alternate Delegate, on the floor has one vote. Each Executive Member, Standing Committee Chairperson and Past President of BPW International has one vote if she does not already hold a vote in any other capacity. Please see table below:

- 4. Where an Executive or Past International President has another role e.g. Chair of a Standing Committee, they are only entitled to one (1) vote at the pre and post International Board Meetings and through the General Assembly.
- 5. As per clause R12.5 and PM 8.7.1, the President has the casting vote when the vote is tied, except in the case of presidential elections.
- 6. Decisions are made by a simple majority of the voting representation, except for constitutional changes or where otherwise specified in the Regulations or these Standing Orders (Rules of Debate). Voting Members may choose to abstain, but abstentions are not counted in the total vote.
- 7. Voting may be by electronic or manual means, for example a show of hands, raising of coloured cards (as will be obtained at time of sign-in before each General Business Session), as appropriate or necessary.
- C. ELECTIONS: (as per clause 8.4, 8.4.1)
 - 1. Elections are done by secret ballots which can be conducted by electronic means or paper ballots and the final vote is communicated to the General Assembly:



- Electronic voting uses digital voting devices that record the total vote for each candidate and take account of voting allocations
- If paper ballots are used, they must be destroyed after the decision voted by the General Assembly.
- 2. The elections process will take place of the candidates on:
 - 20th November: for President
 - The name(s) of the unsuccessful candidate(s) for President are incorporated in the list of nominations for Vice Presidents (if she wishes to stand and is eligible to stand as a Vice President), according to the preferred Vice President role indicated by the candidate.
 - **21st November**: all other candidates for the Executive, Regional Coordinators and Standing Committee Chairs.
- 3. The Election Committee Chairperson:
 - announces the result of voting for the Executive and Standing Committee Chairpersons during the General Assembly programme
 - advises the President if there is a tied vote

D. QUORUM:

A valid quorum is required for a vote to proceed. The quorum is:

- one-quarter [1/4] of the Board members at the pre- and post- Congress International Board meetings
- one-third [1/3] of the voting representation in the General Assembly

E. OPEN DISCUSSION AND PRESENTATION OF REPORTS

The following process is for reports and discussions held during the BPW International Congress pre and post International Board meetings and the General Assembly.

- 1. After reports have been presented and seconded, discussion is open to the Voting Members
- 2. Observers may speak only after the Chairperson has ascertained that no more Voting Members wish to speak, and if she announces that the meeting is open to other speakers.
- No individual speaker may speak to the same discussion more than once, except to establish a point of order or a point of information on a specific question as defined below under Roberts Rules.
- 4. Other than for the presentation of reports, no one may speak for more than 2 minutes.
- 5. After a report has been received, but before it has been adopted, any recommendation arising from a report must be seconded before it can be put to the vote, and a simple majority is required to pass the recommendation.



F. MOTIONS, RESOLUTIONS AND AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND REGULATIONS

The following formal process will be applied to the pre and post International Board meetings and the General Assembly, when a business matter also known as a motion is put to the floor and seconded and opened for positive and interactive debate. The overall time allocated for debate of each individual motion will be 20 minutes.

Motions, Resolutions and Amendments presented:

- 1. In these Standing Orders, motions include Resolutions and Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations.
- 2. Only Voting Members may move and second motions.
- 3. The Executive Secretary will announce the voting strength based on the Credentials Chair report. If anyone leaves the room they must sign out and sign back in to ensure the voting strength is accurate at all times. If a delegate should leave the room, their alternate delegate can sign in and take her place.
- 4. The Credentials Chair will confirm if any changes to the voting strength prior to voting.
- 5. Parts of a motion may be voted on separately at the request of any voting Member:
 - Unless it is a mandatory clause, and therefore must be voted in full
 - unless the mover of the motion objects.

If there is an objection, the matter is put to a vote.

6. Due to the significant work that was done by all the movers and seconders of motions for proposed amendments to the constitution, regulations, procedure manual and internal and external resolutions a call for any proposed amendments was issued on the 17th July with these to be submitted by the 17th September (two (2) months) prior to Congress.

Any proposed amendments that have been presented for the original movers to accept as a friendly amendment, will be sent to the movers and if agreed the proposed new or updated text will be included in the final documents issued two weeks before Congress.

If the proposed amendments were not accepted these will be presented in the General Assembly to debate/vote on if they become the substantive motion.

Note: to ensure all business can be completed within the timeframes:

- No proposed amendment for a word or grammatical change of any resolution or proposed amendment will be accepted from the floor.
- > No new amendment that requires voting will be accepted.
- If a friendly amendment has been submitted and the proposer has accepted it, it would proceed without the need to vote.



- It an ·urgent amendment is submitted it will be presented in writing (e.g. by email and hardcopy to the CAC or Resolutions Chair), for review to determine if it can be accepted, following the cut-off date of the 17th September. If it is accepted it will be made ready to be put on the screen for the next business session.
- 7. Any proposed friendly amendment to a motion is to be received by the **17th September**, in writing, to the Chairperson before being moved or seconded and a copy made available to all Voting Members in the printed document titled "Addendum" in their congress bags at time of registration.
- 8. When an amendment to a motion alters the original motion, the amendment is put to the vote first and, if it is passed, the amended motion replaces the original motion and is put to the vote.
- 9. In respect to the following:
 - a. The mover of the motion has the right of reply to the discussion but must not introduce any new matter.
 - b. If there is an amendment to the motion, the mover of the original motion may exercise her right of reply either before the amendment is put to a vote, or before the final vote on the amended motion.
 - c. The mover of an amendment to a motion does not have a right of reply.
 - d. In all other cases, no one may speak more than once (refer to process below) and no delegation may speak more than twice to a motion (or an amendment to a motion) except to raise a point of order or point of information in respect to a specific question.

The Debate process is as follows (see diagram below):

- 1. Time limit for mover of a motion can speak for three (3) minutes. The time limit for the seconder of the motion, and for each speaker participating in a debate is two (2) minutes per person.
 - a. The first speaker is the mover of the motion and the seconder follows.
 - b. After the mover and the seconder have spoken, the Chair will invite Voting Members (as noted in the Section B, table above) who wish to speak to the motion to join one of two lines of speakers, one side will be designated for speakers wishing to speak FOR the motion, and the other side speakers AGAINST the motion.
 - c. The Chair of the business session will invite speakers to speak alternatively between AGAINST and FOR.
 - i. Each speaker must identify herself, her BPW position and her country before she speaks.
 - ii. The first speaker following the mover and seconder (who have spoken for the motion) will be a speaker AGAINST the motion to open the debate.

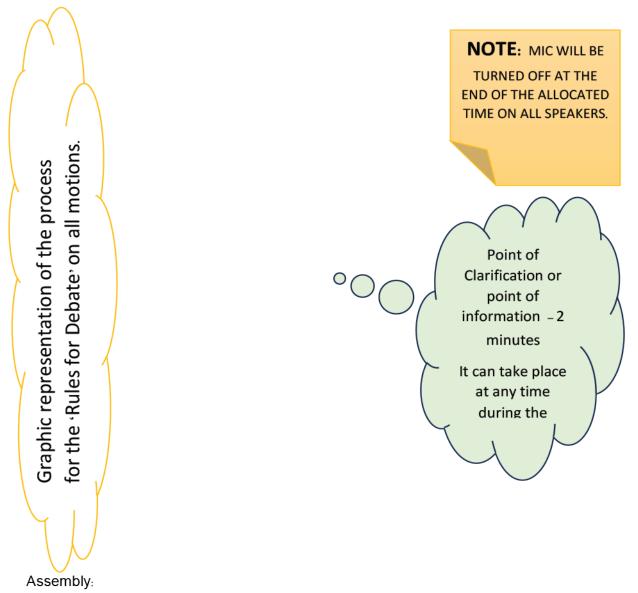


- iii. Three (3) speakers either FOR or AGAINST cannot speak in succession. So if there is no one speaking AGAINST after the mover and seconder speak, the debate ends.
- iv. If either the queue of FOR or AGAINST runs out, the debate ends.
- v. To ensure a fair and democratic process, those who have not had the opportunity to speak to a prior motion(s) will be provided first opportunity to speak.
- vi. No one may speak more than once for a motion and no delegation may speak more than twice.
- d. <u>Point of Clarification or Point of Information</u>: Voting delegates can raise a point of clarification during the debate if permitted by the Chair of the meeting. Her question should not take longer than two (2) minutes.
- e. <u>Observers</u>: may speak to the motion (or to an amendment to a motion) only after the Chairperson has ascertained that no more Voting Members or Chairpersons of other committees (such as Taskforces and Ad Hoc Committees) wish to speak, and if she announces that the meeting is open to other speakers.
- f. <u>Mover's Right of Reply</u>: At the end of the debate, the mover of the motion has the 'Right of Reply' for two (2) minutes to the discussion but must not introduce any new matters.
- g. <u>The time limit</u> for the entire debate for each motion is a maximum 20 minutes, including point of clarification and the mover s right of reply. Speakers are accepted alternatively, Against and For the motion until there are no further speakers on one side, at which point the mover of the motion may exercise her right of reply and then the motion is put to a vote.
- h. <u>Voting</u>: the Chair will check the voting strength, then proceed to call for voting FOR, AGAINST or ABSTENTIONS to the motion. Voting will be done through the raising of the cards provided to each of the delegates at time of registration for the relevant business session (see notes below).



G. POINTS OF ORDER

The following process applies to the proceedings of the BPW International XXXI Congress, St Kitts, 17-21 November 2024, pre and post International Board meetings and the General



- 1. During discussion on any matter, a Voting Delegate may raise a point of order. In this case the Chairperson may confer with the Parliamentarians and then immediately states her ruling.
- 2. The Chair would allow two (2) minutes for the person who raises the point of order, provided that she did not already raise a point of order during that session.
- 3. No other speaker can raise the same point of order.
- 4. The Chairperson may confer with the Parliamentarians and then she will immediately state the ruling. If it is challenged, the Chairperson immediately submits her ruling to the meeting for voting and her ruling stands unless overruled.
- 5. At the end of any speech, any voting Member who has not already spoken in the discussion may move that the question is now put to a vote. If this motion is seconded,



discussion stops and the General Assembly immediately votes on whether the motion should be put to a vote. If this vote is passed, the motion or the amendment under discussion is immediately voted on.

- 6. At the end of any speech, any voting Member who has not already spoken in the discussion may move that the next business be now proceeded with. If this motion is seconded, the General Assembly immediately votes on if the meeting should proceed with the next item on the agenda. If this vote is passed, the General Assembly immediately proceeds with the next item on the agenda.
- 7. A Point of Order or Point of Information as per **Roberts Rules**:
 - **Point of Order**: When a member thinks that the rules of the assembly are being violated, she can make a Point of Order (or "raise a question of order," as it is sometimes expressed), thereby calling upon the chair for a ruling and an enforcement of the regular rules.
 - **Point of Information**: a *request for information* on a specific question, either about process or about the content of a motion. A point of information does not give the speaker the privilege to provide information. If you have information for the body, raise your hand to be put on the speakers list.

H. RESOLUTIONS

- 1. An amendment to increase the figures proposed in a resolution on finance or dues cannot be accepted from the floor of the General Assembly. Any proposed amendment with a financial or budgetary impact must be circulated to Affiliates four (4) months before the General Assembly. Any proposed amendment(s) to the original resolution must be issued two (2) months prior to Congress to be accepted or declined by the mover. Should the mover not accept the proposed amendment the procedure on motions as outlined above will comply.
- Due to the number of proposed amendments to the Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual, the requirement to include proposed amendments from 2021 that were ·left on the table XXXI BPW International General Assembly note only an emergency Resolution would be accepted if:
 - An emergency Resolution may be presented at a General Assembly if it relates to something which has happened since the deadline for receiving Resolutions.
 - It must be referred to the Resolutions Committee.
 - Is a Resolution that is a direct result on the impact on women and girls.
- 3. If the Resolutions Committee decides it qualifies an emergency (urgent) resolution, it will be put to the next voting session of the General Assembly for voting to accept it as an emergency Resolution. The Resolution must be circulated to Voting Members at least one session before it is to be discussed. Only a simple majority is required for it to be passed. The emergency Resolution would then be presented by the mover and seconder.



I. VOTING PROCESS

The following process applies to the proceedings of the pre and post International Board meetings and the General Assembly:

 <u>Registration</u> forms for delegates (and alternate delegates) will be issued to ensure a checklist is available for the Credentials Chair and her committee to identify Voting Delegates, names, Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs, Executive Members, Past Presidents of BPW International and Standing Committee Chairs at time of sign-in for each business session.

2. Open Voting: Standard Process, raising of hands/cards

At the pre- and post-Congress International Board Meeting a simple request for voting members to 'Raise their Hand' to vote FOR/AGAINST or ABSTAIN on motions or positions where required, for example:

- appointment of the Parliamentarians, Scrutineers (aka tellers) and Timekeepers Chairs and committee members
- General Assembly Committees: Credentials, Election and Nominations Chairs and committee members.

During the Business Sessions of the General Assembly, voting members will be required to sign in and obtain a coloured card for that session. They will be required to sign-out if they leave the room and hand over their card, sign back in and collect their card when they go back into the session. If another delegate (or alternate delegate) from their Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club is to go into the room in their place, they are to sign out, the other delegate is to sign-in and receive the card.

3. <u>Closed Voting</u>: Electronic Voting

An introduction to the independent voting process will be distributed to all delegates and a ·test-run· will be held prior to the opening of the official voting process, to ensure all delegates have access to the voting portal.

The online voting method must enable the confirmation of the voting member, such as unique login, password through the secure independent web-based voting system and:

- i. voting will be opened to all delegates through their username and password and is accessible via mobile phone, tablet, laptop or computer
- ii. voting will be opened for three (3) minutes
- iii. once delegates submit their vote a message will be displayed to say their vote was successfully submitted
- iv. receipt of the votes, as they are made, will be automatically updated on the screen for all members to see
- v. independent web-based online voting system will record all the relevant voting responses and will be available for the Chief Scrutineer and the Scrutineers Committee members to check and verify only one vote per delegate, IP address, username have been received
- vi. final total results will be presented and include the following:
 - voting strength (as confirmed prior to voting commencing)
 - voting results: FOR, AGAINST, ABSTAIN

4.1 Executive Reports



BPW International Executive Reports



During my term as International President, my team and I have worked hard to move the organisation forward to achieve the triennium aim of 'New Actions through Cooperation'.

We have been successful in the building of New Partnerships with the signing of a global Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with UN Women for a 'Women's Inclusive Trade Hub (WITH) Program' which forms part of UN Women's Expo Implementation Strategy. This work is already under way, with guaranteed funding to start in West Africa. Other regions are currently under review.

We have also worked hard and successfully to strengthen communication and membership, and to create platforms to show our members' work globally through the projects website and education programs run by our members.

Furthermore. we have supported, through aid and action, our sisters in countries that suffer through conflict, especially in Ukraine, and those who have suffered from natural disasters, especially in Türkiye and Syria, and I remain deeply grateful for the kindness, solidarity and generosity of our members who have contributed to these actions.

Lastly, in my role as International elected President I inherited a number of important issues to deal with. These were matters arising mainly from the BPW International Congress XXIX held in Cairo in 2017 and addressing the outstanding financial issues as well as legal identity and registration of BPW International.

Below is my in-depth report on these areas.

1. New Actions through Cooperation

Memorandum of Understanding with UN Women

During my time as Vice President UN during the triennium 2017 to 2021, I already had a vision of cooperation with UN Women. We have now been successful in the building of a New Partnership with the signing of a global Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with UN Women for a 'Women's Inclusive Trade Hub (WITH) Program' which forms part of UN Women's Expo Implementation Strategy. This work is already under way, with guaranteed funding to start in West Africa. Other regions are currently under review.

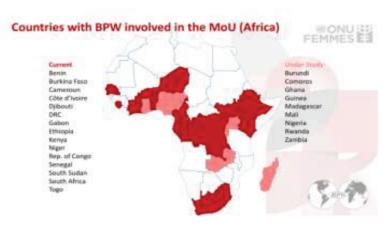


In 2021, UN Women had launched a program called UN Women's Entrepreneurship EXPO which is a unique partnership platform to promote women's entrepreneurship ecosystem building. EXPO provides an interactive space for women entrepreneurs, investors and private sector representatives for collaboration, ideas generation, capacity building and business development. With my lead, BPW International started to work on a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) together with regional UN Women offices and the UN Women legal department.

Finally, on 26 October, 2023, IFBPW officially signed a global MoU, for partnership for the next three years. The program of BPW International Women's Inclusive Trade Hub (WITH program) is part of UN Women's Expo implementation strategy. We started immediately to work with the BPW Regional Coordinator on West and East Africa, visited the UN Women Regional Coordinator for West Africa, Mrs. Elena Ruiz (s. photo above with Fathia Cissé and Phiippe Lambert), and asked her to inform all national UN Women Representatives about the MoU. The interest in West Africa was great. First, we started to work on a project in Niger, then Sierra Leone, Benin and DRC Congo.

The project in DRC Congo is now most advanced of all. The funds for the first half year from January 2025 to June 2025 are now guaranteed. 80% of the funds will be allocated to the project, while 12% will be directed to BPW International and 8% to UN Wo-men for the overhead expenses.

Moreover, we have already had information sessions with UN Women and BPW Clubs of Eastern Europe, Latin America and Asia Pacific.

Other Partnership



The BPW International Business, Trade and Technology Standing Committee Chair, Paz Martin, worked tirelessly to initiate partnerships which I officially finalised. BPW International has recently signed on a partnership with the NGO «Equal Salary». This NGO certifies companies which are ready to have their records verified

BPW International will, through its own Ambassadors create exposure for this NGO to showcase our support for the Women's Empowerment Principles and equal salary for equal work. Our first ambassador, Judith Baumberger, will introduce the program at the Congress in St. Kitts.

2. Administration and Communication

One of my aims was to strengthen the communication internally and externally through actualising the new website, introducing a directory for the members, and regular information flow through monthly newsletters and webinars.

I would like to thank my collaborator, Mrs. Ursula Schmid, who did a wonderful job in all the fields of communication. That encompassed also the update of all the programs and licenses. Without her efforts and initiatives, we would not have been able to achieve what we did. Thank you, Ursula, from the bottom of my heart for your unwavering support during my triennium.

A sincere thank you goes also to the translation team. First of all I would like to mention our English editor, Janice Bancroft, who did a wonderful job in shortest of times. Ursula Schmid took care of the German translations, Giuseppina Seidita of the Italian ones, the President's Office director, Trudy Morel, of the French ones, Paz Martin of the Spanish ones and Claudia Pirani of the Portuguese ones. The translations represent a huge workload, already before the Congress preparations. There had been no Newsletters in 6 languages before.

As each member has to register personally due to the data protection laws worldwide, we would like to request the presidents of the Clubs and Federations to better communicate with their members and to tell them that there is a directory, a newsletter and a project database on the international level where the projects have to be registered, the members can receive information and the projects showcase the activities of BPW International.

Website

After I was elected in 2021, I worked with my team right from the beginning on an update of the BPWI website. Already as VP UN I had expanded the UN Website. The same thing was going to happen to the whole website. As a new way of cooperation each Standing Committee and each Taskforce had the possibility to have its own webpage integrated in the international site. We tried to incite every Federation and Club to insert all their projects to showcase what BPW was doing in an international framework. According to the feedback I got from foundations this list comes into effect and is highly appreciated also by non-members.

«Directory»

Thanks to an anonymous gift donated to PIP Dr. Antoinette Rüegg for a project for women, we were able to have a directory designed for our members which would give the possibility to all of them to publicise their professional skills and their expertise.

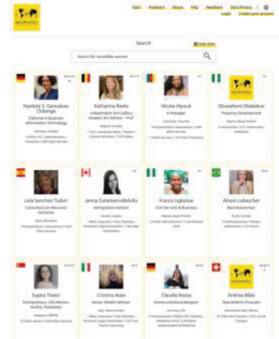
In February 2022, a test phase was launched of this directory which lasted half a year. In summer all flaws were eliminated, and we could start for good with the finalised version.

The directory is only for members of BPW. To check this we had to introduced a step that each president needed to confirm the membership as BPW.

In 2023, each enrolled member got her own URL and had room for more free text. Moreover, we introduced more search filters The database is developing further.

In 2024 a brush up and activity feed was introduced, and the look has been modernised.

What I underestimated is the fact that each new tool takes time to be introduced and abundantly used. So far, we have 446 members in the database. What proved to be a hurdle is the activation through the Club presidents. There are still 106 members waiting for the approval through their Club presidents. It takes time and we make every effort to strengthen this new tool, because it is unique for an NGO to have such a tool and could \square with a large participation \square



strengthen the cohesion of our members around the world. It is a unique chance for each individual member to create her worldwide network.

Newsletter

Part of my communication strategy was the introduction of a regular newsletter. We started in May 2021 with the first Newsletter in four languages and extended the language versions by adding a German and later a Portuguese version as the membership in Brazil grew and as we have now a new federation in Portugal.

3. Aid Fund for Ukraine and the Earthquake zone in South Türkiye and North Syria

After the crisis in Ukraine turned into a veritable war in February 2022 through the Russian attack, BPW International organised a help action for our Ukraine members in Chernihiv and for Ukrainian refugees in European countries. Thanks to the generosity of our Taiwanese and Thai members we collected an amount of approximately Euros 85,000 (Eighty five thousand Euros). With this money we financed seven scholarships for Ukrainian students in Italy, financed trauma release classes and dance seminars for Ukrainian children in Poland. Madrid created an incubator to help Ukrainian refugees build their own businesses. Our members in several countries offered language classes. One truck load of help goods went directly to Chernihiv, and finally, we financed an RV which was bought in Bulgaria and then transported to Chernihiv to support our members there. BPW UK launched a help program to fill this car with needed goods and medication and to cover the transport costs from Bulgaria to Chernihiv.

When the terrible earthquake occurred on 6 March, 2023, in the south of Türkiye and northern Syria we financed two containers for families in Antakya. We tried to do the same when the earthquake in Morocco happened, but suddenly the generosity of the members slowed down and we were not able to support to the same degree.

4. Travels

Travels are usually connected with presentations and speeches from the International President. The most strenuous were the missions to Africa with a great number of conferences with different ministries and stakeholders. The Missions to UN Agencies were demanding as well, but also very important for networking, cooperations and direct contacts with the members.

5. Transition from BPWI

Congress XXIX (2017) in Cairo and Three Motions

As I started my role as BPW International President, there were some important and unresolved issues related to the BPW International Congress XXIX (2017) held in Cairo. It is important to note that, at the end of the previous triennium three motions had been accepted by the International Board. These three motions were actions to be taken to resolve the outstanding issues.

Background

As of December 2020, the final invoice of the Congress Service Centre in Egypt for the BPW International Congress XXIX (2017) Cairo had not been paid. BPW International had received two legal notices from the lawyer of the Congress Service Centre in Cairo and a legal case at an Egyptian Tribunal was pending.

In order to avoid a lawsuit, on the 9th of December 2020, BPW Kuwait issued three motions to the BPW International Board to be voted on electronically. These three motions were presented to finalise the Cairo Congress Financial Matters as required by the BPW International Constitution.

As required by our governance documents the audited financial Congress Balance Sheet had to be presented after one year of Congress and the Congress Account had to be handed over to the new Executive.

Below you will find the exact text of the three motions and the results of the electronic voting.

«Also in response to the need to prevent a lawsuit after BPW International received two legal notices from the lawyer of Congress Service Centre (CSC – which organised Cairo Congress in 2017) dated 10 August, 2020, and 2 December, 2020, which requested the final payment which was about 3 years overdue.

Motion 1: Congress Accounts to be finalised by Executive Finance Officer (EFO) G. Seidita with accountant R. Strange

The International Board of BPW transfers immediately the task to finalise the Congress Account with a profit and loss as well as a balance statement to the [Executive] Finance Officer, Giuseppina Seidita, with the support from the previous [Executive] Finance Officer, Roshan Strange.

Motion seconded by the Federations of Italy, France, Bahrain and the Club Edea, Cameroon.

Motion 2: Transfer of Congress money in Chase Bank to HSBC account

The Immediate Past International President Dr. Yasmin Darwich and signatory Bessie Hironimus send immediately the content of the Congress Account at Chase Bank USA (Congress Account # 3377302897) to the BPW International Accounts at HSBC in London. Moreover, they have to hand in a financial statement with all the documents to be audited to the current Executive Finance Officer of BPW International.

Motion seconded by the Federations of Italy, France, Bahrain and the Club Edea, Cameroon.

Motion 3: Payment of the Congress debt to Congress Service Centre

The International Board authorizes that the outstanding payment to the Congress Service Centre in Cairo of US\$191,613 be paid immediately.

Virtual Voting

The virtual voting by the International Board took place from 21 February to 24 February, 2021. According to the two Scrutineers, Judith van Unen, Past President of BPW Australia, and Ann Swain, Past President of UK Great Britain. The quorum for the International Board voting required one-quarter (1/4) of the voting representation. The voting strength was 133 and the quorum was achieved. The voting results were as follows.

Voting strength was 133.

Motion # 1 carried with 55 yes (79.71%), 14 no (20.29%), no abstentions, 64 delegates did not vote.

Motion #2 carried with 54 yes (78.26%), 14 no (20.29%) and 1 abstention (1.45%), 64 delegates did not vote.

Motion #3 carried with 53 yes (76.81%), 14 no (20.29%) and 2 abstentions (2.9%), 64 delegates did not vote.

These decisions required a quorum to be reached and a simple majority vote to pass.

Actions

In March 2021, we received a court citation for the outstanding amount of US\$191,613 (One hundred and ninety one thousand six hundred and thirteen US dollars) which was avoided through payment of the invoice by the EFO of that time. In early summer, I travelled to Geneva to sign and collect the formal citation from the police station. This was necessary even after the payment had been made. What was remaining for the official handover was to transfer the funds from the Chase Bank Congress Account in the USA to the HSBC Congress account in the United Kingdom.

An extraction of the minutes of the Virtual Congress (2021) which certified the new Executive signed by the Past International President (PIP) Dr Armany Asfour and myself was prepared. The lawyer in Zurich liaised with the legal department of the Chase Bank and indicated that according to the bank there was no need to close the existing account since the Past Executive Secretary was listed as an administrator (appointed on 1 September, 2016) for that triennium. This appointment expired at the end of term was not renewed in the next two triennia. Moreover, according to the information received in person in 22 March directly from the Vice-Director of the Chase Bank at 3rd Ave in Manhattan, New York, the administrator appeared as the only signatory of the two bank accounts. It was confirmed that no other individuals had signatory rights for these accounts. This financial handover matter remains unresolved with BPW International not having financial control over its financial Congress assets.

6. Registration of BPW International in Switzerland

In the last triennium, I had become aware that BPW International was not formally registered as an association at the office of registration in the Canton of Geneva and had lost its legal identity.

BPW International was still registered at the Centre d'Acceuil de la Genève Internationale (CAGI) which is a welcoming organisation of the Canton of Geneva for all the Nongovernmental Organisations working with the UN. This is not the same as being formally registered with legal identity.

To maintain this CAGI registration, we were still required to send annually the audited financial balance sheet and after each International Congress, the Proceedings. When we could not provide the last two Congress reports, this registration at CAGI was cancelled on the 6th of March 2024.

In order to protect BPW International, it was necessary to seek external legal advice about BPW International having lost control of its financial assets related to the BPW International Congress XXIX (2017) Cairo and the loss of legal identity. It was evident that to pursue the financial matter, BPW International had to stabilise its legal status by formal registration.

Formal registration needs to take place at the canton of Geneva because BPW International's Constitution and Regulations are based on the Swiss Civil Code as ruled at the XXVII BPW International Congress in Helsinki (2011). This is the reason why other countries are not being considered.

BPW International is a global organisation that aims to be compliant and meet the minimum registration criteria. On 1 January, 2023, the Anti- Money Laundering Act came into effect making it mandatory for an association, the size and scope of BPW International, to register. This would require an update to the constitution in order to meet those registration requirements.

BPW International Constitutional Advisory Committee (CAC) Chair, Carolyn Savage, has worked tirelessly to put the updated Constitution, Regulations and the Procedure Manual together. Her workload has represented half a year of a full-time job which she dedicated to BPW International. I cannot thank her enough.

Since the autumn of 2023, we have organised in all regions information sessions on the Constitution and Regulations, and called the International Board for a vote on having a virtual Board Meeting which could have decided if an Extraordinary General Assembly was possible before 1 July, 2024. That was the deadline set for registering based on the Anti-Money Laundering Act. As you can see in the minutes from this meeting (see Section 1 workbook), an Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly was not possible, and this is the main reason why we will need to discuss the amendments to the Constitution and Regulations during this Congress in St Kitts.

Matters still to be resolved

In August 2022, PIP Dr. Yasmin Darwich requested by email, for a in person meeting to discuss the BPW International Congress XXIX (2017) Cairo financial accounts and balance sheets, during the national convention of NFBPWC USA in Sacramento. PIP Elizabeth Benham was invited to attend the meeting to act as a mediator. Regional Coordinators (RC's) of Latin America and North America and the Caribbean along with Past Executive Secretary were in attendance. During this meeting, PIP Dr. Yasmin Darwich promised to finalise the BPW International Congress XXIX (2017) Cairo accounts, but that was not done. RC North America and the Caribbean was tasked to find a qualified auditor, the price for this work was defined as US\$ 5,000 (Five Thousand US dollars).

I had prepared the BPW International Congress XXIX (2017) Cairo, Draft Congress Proceedings and made them available on the BPW International Website. Concerning the XX (Virtual) 2020 Congress Proceedings, I helped to do a review of them and send them to IPP Dr. Amany Asfour.

A follow up meeting was called during the Latin American Regional Conference in Santiago Chile in September 2023 to obtain the audited BPW International Congress XXIX accounts (Cairo, 2017) and the BPW International Congress XXIX (Cairo, 2017) funds, however this meeting did not formally take place.

Executive Secretary Dr. Jenny Gulamani Abdulla managed to discuss the matter with PIP Dr. Yasmin Darwich, PIP Elizabeth Benham and Past Executive Secretary who again promised to deliver actions which never materialised.

Through the president's office a verbal request was made that the invoices for the Congress in St Kitts could be forwarded to the Past Executive Secretary who remained as the administrator on the Chase Bank account without being appointed by the current Executive. Without this formal appointment, I could not have shared confidential information including invoices from the vendors directly to her, as doing so would imply that such an appointment existed.

It was noted in the Chase Bank statement dated 30 September, 2024 that a bit under US\$20,000 (Twenty Thousand US dollars) had been withdrawn from the account without the knowledge and consent of the current Executive. Since individuals outside of the current Executive were acting as principal officers of the organisation and on my behalf without my approval and any formal appointment, I had no choice but to issue a letter of cessation of membership on 18th August, 2024 to protect the financial interests of BPW International. All of the individuals who had not handed in the signed final Congress XXIX and Congress XXX reports including proceedings and financial statements were faced with cessation of membership allowing them 90 days to exercise their right to reply. It will be up to the International Board to then decide next steps including the removal process.

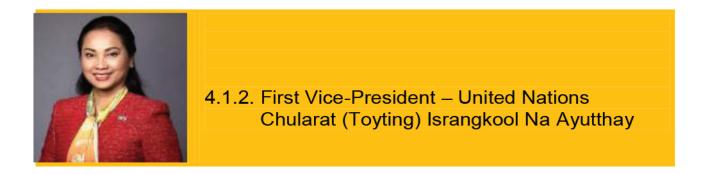

This triennium, I have had the honour of serving as the 1st Vice President for United Nations (UN) Matters and Chair of the UN Standing Committee. In these roles I have been dedicated to advancing women's empowerment, promoting gender equality, and strengthening BPW International's (BPWI) engagement with the UN.

Active Engagement

BPWI has maintained a robust presence with 30 dedicated UN representatives collaborating across various UN agencies and 22 standing committees worldwide. This network has been instrumental in advocating for women's rights and empowerment globally, ensuring BPW's voice is heard on critical issues affecting women and girls.

I extend heartfelt gratitude to International President (IP) Catherine Bosshart for her leadership. Under her guidance, BPWI's influence within the UN has expanded significantly, we have strengthened partnerships with NGOs and enhanced our advocacy efforts on a global scale. In addition, IP has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with UN Women to start collaborative entrepreneurial initiatives globally. This MoU highlights a key factor for women's economic independence and prosperity as it defines further BPW International's commitment for financing to advancing global gender equality through strategic partnerships and collaborative initiatives for all BPW clubs around the world.

A primary objective over the last triennial has been to amplify BPW International's voice within the UN and among NGOs through strategic collaborations and impactful engagements. This includes advocating for gender-responsive policies, sustainable development initiatives, and gender equality initiatives that resonate globally. Further information on these you will find in the reports of UN Representatives and UN, Standing Committees.

Our UN Standing Committee has been actively engaged in addressing a wide range of critical issues including human rights, CEDAW, Commission on the Status of Women (CSW), education and advocacy. These areas underscore our commitment to advancing gender equality and empowering women across different sectors worldwide.





Regional Engagement and Strategic Meetings

Over the triennium, the UN Standing Committee organised and participated in over 24 global Zoom meetings. Despite challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic, we successfully transitioned our operations online, ensuring continuity in advocacy efforts and joint initiatives.

These meetings were pivotal in fostering dialogue, aligning strategic objectives, and strengthening collaboration from diverse regions, ensuring a cohesive approach to our advocacy efforts.

On International Women's Day and throughout the year, we actively encouraged young BPW members to assume leadership roles and participate in UN advocacy efforts. These initiatives empowered Young BPW to contribute effectively to our advocacy work, such as organising parallel events at the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) in New York and participating in UN conferences.

I have established meaningful partnerships with key UN representatives globally, leveraging these alliances to advocate and for joint initiatives that advance BPWI's mission. Collaborative efforts with governments and NGOs have included organising webinars, meetings with NGO CSW in New York and Geneva, and strengthening advocacy efforts across various forums.

BPW International expanded to include a new representative at the United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (UN ECLAC) in Santiago, Chile, enhancing our advocacy for women's empowerment in Latin America and globally.

Annually, BPW International diligently submitted comprehensive reports and statements to the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW), following the theme of each Commission and reaffirming our commitment to advancing gender equality and women's empowerment globally. Presenting oral statements at the UN Headquarters amplified BPWI's advocacy efforts, and contributed to global recognition of our commitments and initiatives and ensuring BPWI's presence is noted.

Quadrennial Report to ECOSOC and Prestigious Engagements

As an organisation with consultative status at the UN through the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) since 1947, it is imperative for us to submit a quadrennial report every four years. This report to ECOSOC is crucial for maintaining our UN status and highlights our achievements and outlines our future goals in advancing women's rights and empowerment.

An important price is UNESCO's Prize for projects in Girls and Women Education (GWE), a prize in which BPW International encouraged its Federations and Clubs to participate. Marie Claude Honoré Machon, our Main Representative at UNESCO, has played a pivotal role in these efforts and BPW Benin and BPW Nepal actively participated in the GWE UNESCO Prize by submitting their exemplary projects. Our goal is to see increased participation from BPW affiliated clubs globally in this prestigious award every year. This engagement not only highlights our collective efforts but also strengthens our resolve to continue advocating for women's education and gender equality on an international scale.



This triennium has been characterised by significant strides in advocating for women's rights, enhancing BPW International's engagement with the UN. Moving forward, BPWI remains steadfast in amplifying women's voices within the UN system, nurturing leadership among members, and collaborating with global partners to achieve sustainable and inclusive development worldwide.

This report underscores our unwavering commitment to advancing BPW's mission on the international stage, ensuring that women's contributions are not only recognized but valued in our collective pursuit of a more equitable and peaceful world.

I wish to acknowledge the exceptional contributions of Bettina Herold (BPW Germany) assistance team to our UN Standing Committee. Her dedication and support have significantly enhanced our ability to advocate effectively for women's rights on the global stage.

I express gratitude for the dedication and commitment of all UN representatives, standing committee members, and BPW affiliates worldwide who have worked tirelessly toward these shared goals. You are always in my heart.

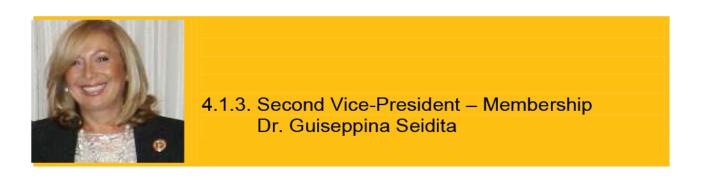

As Executive Secretary at BPW International, it has been an immense pleasure to serve not only at the Executive level but also as ex-officio member on both the Constitutional Advisory Committee and the Resolutions Committee. No other role on the executive has the full exposure and breadth of governance as does this role (with the exception of the President's role).

Stepping into this role was extra special, as Past President of BPW Canada, since it is one of the six Founding Federations of BPW International. It is with great honour that I serve in this international role. The theme of this triennium "New Actions Through Cooperation" was fitting in light of the pandemic and as the world focused on health and economy, at the executive level we realised the urgent need to simultaneously focus on peace and justice.

I am privileged to bring my legal background to this role to offer my perspective on matters related to compliance including settlement of disputes, reviewing constitutions, providing input on resolutions, and supporting affiliation procedures. During this triennium, all of us have recognized the urgency of responsible transition and financial handover. BPW International has been at risk due to its expired registration and legal status while previous executive members retain access to its congress fund account which is not permitted based on our governance documents (PM 6.3.2).



As business and professional women, we all understand the legal implications and importance of registration because this would be normal course of business in our countries whether we are operating in for profit or not for profit sectors. In the BPW International context, for those of us who have been around for the last few triennia, we are familiar with the long-standing dispute over this from the perspectives of previous executives who have clearly violated transition rules by not providing instructions to the financial institution to change signatures, securing banking access for the new executive, removing access for the previous executive. Their argument is that the financial audit was not handled by the previous executive finance officer. This argument however does not justify their non-compliance. This is why we needed an independent third-party intervention to protect the interest of BPW International. Let us keep in mind that BPW International's registration has not expired recently and we need to understand that over time, the minimum requirements for registration have changed too.

BPW International is now faced with evolving challenges that have led to the application of the Anti-money Laundering Act which now applies to all NGOs as well.

То meet these minimum requirements, the constitution is now legally required to be updated and those of you that have attended the sessions on updating our constitution clearly understand the enormous amount of work and the need for legal professionals who are specializing in registration of NGOs to quide us through this process in a systematic way. Their knowledge and experience have been crucial for our Constitutional Advisory Committee to then



undertake the responsibility of advising the executive and ensure compliance in making decisions on registration, reviewing amendments to our governance documents and seeking cooperation from the International Board.

Needless to say, that professional legal advice costs money, independent third-party specialized experts cost money, and these expenses are unavoidable to ensure that we are guided in the most proficient manner possible. BPW International's interest is truly at stake and this will have legal and financial impact on our organization and so it is most definitely worth the investment.

Registration requires BPW International to update its constitution and we have made every effort through the Constitutional Advisory Committee to make this an inclusive process so that every member can understand and be a part of the updating of our governance structures and processes. I assure you that reviving BPW International's registration will protect BPW International solidly, both legally and financially, in the future.

Budget Report Three-year period 2021-2023

Premise

It has been an honour and privilege for me to serve BPW International for the period 2021-2024 as Executive Finance Officer (EFO). It was a very demanding job, and I tried to do it as best I could and in the interests of BPW and the conservation of its patrimony. I have always made sure that all expenses were within the budget planned and approved at the International Congress in 2021. I have always complied with the rules of the Procedure Manual and punctually sent all the financial documentation to the Financial Management Team, to the Executive and to the Regional Coordinators, monitoring not only the expenses, but also the payment of the Fees by the Federations and of associated Clubs. My action plan was carried out in compliance with legality and accounting principles. I have implemented the financial policies of the IFBPW in accordance with the BPW Constitution and the BPW Procedure Manual and Regulations. I am committed to managing the international budget effectively and efficiently. I tried to support Clubs and Federations in difficulty.

Financial Report

During the three-year period 2021-2023, together with the Accountant Dr. Barbara Russo, I developed the periodic financial reports and updated the situation of the Dues Outstanding, providing the appropriate payment reminders. As a result, we have collected over 85% of the Dues owing. My approach to transparency and accountability has characterised my mandate and I think everyone has been able to see this.

For BPW International's financial year, which runs from 1 January to 31 December each year, I have drawn up the Balance Sheet and the annual Profit & Loss (P&L) with the report and the Notes to the financial statements explaining the main items. Each financial situation has been examined annually by the independent auditor.

The annual audit usually starts around March each year and ends in June. The International Board receives each year's Balance Sheet and P&L by the end of January each year, the fiscal year end report of the independent examiner (6) months after closing the year and the EFO Report.

Financial surplus

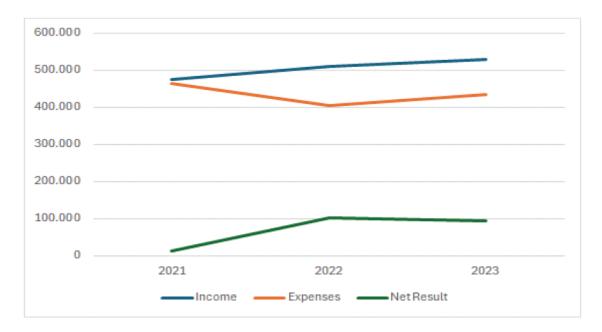
In this three-year period, BPW International has almost always had a conservative surplus.

BPW International's main source of income is membership fees. However, other sources of income such as the sale of pins and scarves also contributed to increasing budgetary income to support BPW's secretarial costs.

The expenses include various elements: the costs of the President's Staff, important for carrying out the President's mandate; the costs of the ordinary management of BPW, bank charges, expenses assigned to each member of the Executive and to the Regional Coordinators, currency gains or losses as BPW pays invoices mainly in euros but also in other currencies. Thanks to the donations received we were able to finance projects, especially in Ukraine considering the war that has now continued for over 2 years.

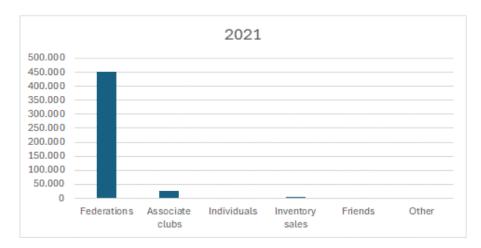

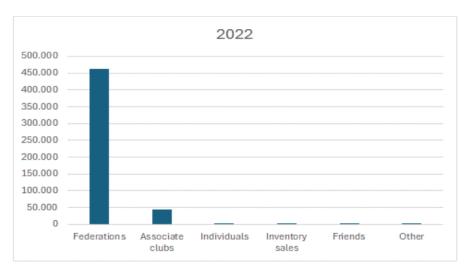

Below is the graph showing 2021 revenue as a percentage:

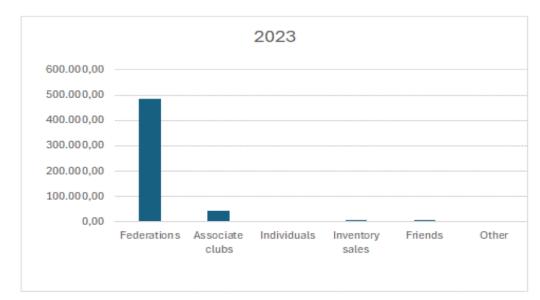


Below is the graph showing 2022 revenue as a percentage:

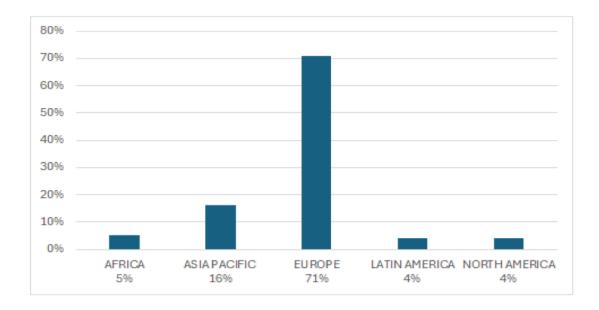

2021, total expenses were kept below the budget by 7%, considering that an amount of €141,840 was set aside for the credit risk fund for the 2017 Cairo congress.

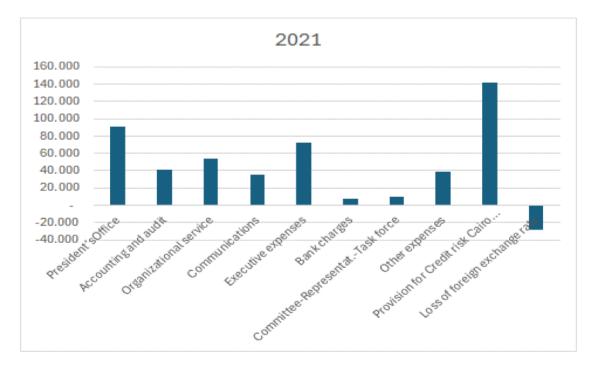
In 2022, total expenses were carefully managed under budget by 18%.

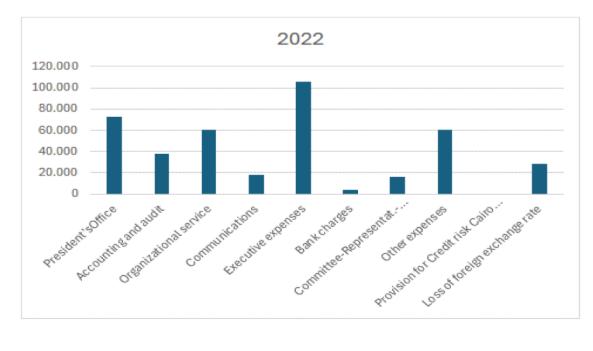
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Below is the graph showing **2021 expenses as a percentage:**

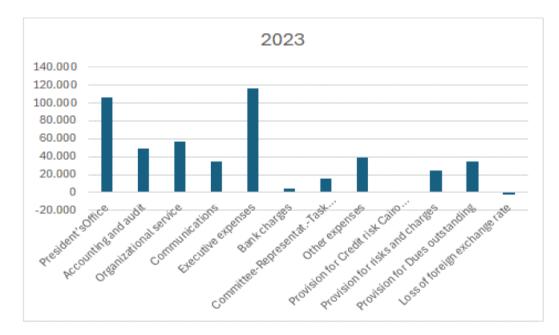


Below is the graph showing 2022 expenses as a percentage:

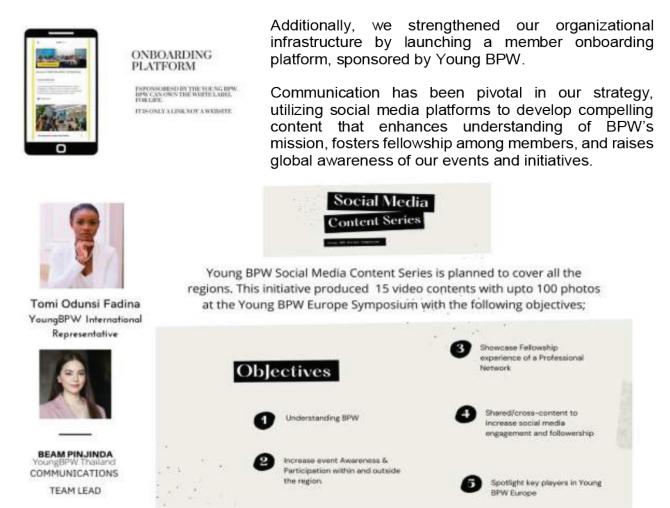

Campaigns like #YoungBPW4Earth spotlight Young BPW's eco-friendly and sustainable businesses worldwide. Led by Yasmin Knight (Young BPW UK) and Tomi Odunsi Fadina (Young BPW International Representative), initiatives like "Break the Bias" aim to challenge stereotypes and promote gender equality within and beyond BPW International. Young BPW Projects.

1. Young BPW USA launched 'The Afghan Women Project' in August 2021 to support Afghan women refugees arriving in the US, offering training and mentoring. Emily Vanvleck was a finalist for the AFS Award for Young Global Citizens at the 27th Annual Youth Assembly.

2. Young BPW Nigeria initiated the 'Young BPW Lite Club' to empower young girls in schools,



establishing clubs across Nigeria. Over 3000 girls benefited, and the 'Back2School Project' continues in Lagos, Nigeria.

3. Young BPW Brazil launched the 'Empower HER Project' to foster collaboration among young BPWs and entrepreneurs, promoting entrepreneurial spirit among girls. Led by Micaille Dias Waqueed.

4. 'EL LIGADO Project' by Young BPW Latin America connects young professional women across the region, promoting collaboration and networking under Camillia Robeiro's leadership.

5. 'PROJECT PAD IT UP', with BPW LEKKI CLUB (NIGERIA), educates girls on menstrual hygiene and distributes sanitary pads, empowering them. Led by Ada Dike, BPW Nigeria.

6. Young BPW Germany's 'BPW Onboarding Project' offers a 10-week email course covering BPW offerings, structure, contacts, and values, automatically enrolling new members.

Report from BPW International Asia-Pacific Regional Coordinator, Narudee Kiengsiri BPW Asia Pacific Committee Members



BPW International Asia-Pacific region is one of the organisation's five global regions. The BPW Asia-Pacific Region comprises 28 countries across 5 Sub-Regions:

- 1. The ASEAN Sub Region coordinated by Myrna Yao, includes Indonesia, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore and Thailand.
- 2. The East Asia Sub Region coordinated by Catarina Hyun Park includes Hong Kong, Japan, Korea, Mongolia, and Taiwan.
- 3. The Oceania Sub Region coordinated by Carolyn Savage includes American Samoa, Australia, New Zealand, and Papua New Guinea.
- 4. The South and Central Asia Sub Region coordinated by Era Prasai includes India, Kazakhstan, Nepal, and Pakistan.
- 5. **The West Asia Sub Region** coordinated by HRH Dr. Sheikha Hissah Saad Al-Sabah includes Bahrain, Iraq, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Palestine, Syria, Yemen and UAE.

BPW International President Catherine Bosshart, promotes "New actions through cooperation". BPW Asia-Pacific Regional Coordinator, Narudee Kiengsiri, has for this triennium translated this vision into Five Regional Goals and Strategies referred to as the 5E's and the 3C's.

The 5E Goals focus on Education, Empowerment, Economy, Elderly, and Ecosystem.

The 3C Strategies focus on Creativity, Cooperation and Connection.

These goals and strategies help BPW Asia-Pacific Affiliate Presidents in planning and executing their projects.

During this triennium, the COVID-19 Pandemic has posed significant challenges impacting on women's lives globally and necessitating lifestyle changes. In response, the BPW Asia-Pacific Committee decided to support its members by waiving 100% of Regional



Dues for 2022 and Reducing Regional dues by 50% for 2023. This measure aimed to alleviate financial burdens and encourage continued participation and support within the BPW community during these difficult times. The smooth implementation of this Financial Support Policy was enabled through the good co-operation between BPW Asia Pacific Regional Executive Finance Officer, Atchara Visasvora and The BPW International Executive Finance Officer, Eufemia Ippolito.

In 2021 – 2022, we followed up on overdue payments across the region, resulting in more than 70% recovery.

In 2023 we provided financial support for one young member from each of the 5 Sub-Regions to attend The Young Symposium in Taiwan. Additionally, we offered partial financial assistance for the Asia-Pacific Regional Committee Members to join the Asia-Pacific Regional Conference in Bahrain in 2023.

In addition, we awarded one country per Sub-Region with financial support for their projects. The 5 outstanding countries that were awarded project support in 2023 at the BPW Asia-Pacific Regional Congress were Malaysia, Taiwan, Papua New Guinea, Nepal and Bahrain. Congratulations for their wonderful works.

Triennium Highlights of Asia-Pacific Region

We held the Asia-Pacific Regional Conference in Manama. Bahrain. in November of 2023. The Organising Chairperson was Sheikha Hind Bint Salman Al Khalifa, the Federation President for BPW Bahrain.

At the Conference we held a Presidents Meeting, and Awards Presentation. There were many good speakers and interesting panels. We also voted to accept our Regional



Regulations Updates, to make it align with International Constitution, Regulation, and Procedure Manuals. We accept virtual meetings into our regulations. Thanks to the Constitution Advisory Chair, Carolyn Savage, for all her hard work which builds on the good base started by Dr. Chonchanok Viravan, our beloved Regional Constitution Advisor and Past BPWI President who sadly passed away this triennium.



During this triennium, we succeeded in gaining 5 new affiliate clubs and 4 new federations in 7 new countries. Our quarterly reports and regional newsletters communicate within our region.

In April 2023, we had the **BPW Asia Pacific 3rd Young Symposium in Taiwan**. The Organising Chairperson was Chiahua Li. The BPW Asia Pacific Young Representative, Chiahua and her team held a wonderful symposium. They successfully managed to have the Taiwan Government sponsored the participating young BPW members registration fee. The theme was 'Women in Leadership: Thriving in a Post – Pandemic World'. The Symposium had many quality speakers, interesting topics and excellent networking among attendees.



The Asia-Pacific Regional Coordinator attended several annual events, including the UNESCAP functions and the UNCSW (Commission on the Status of Women) in New York City. The Asia-Pacific Regional Coordinator also participated in the Global Summit of Women (GSW) in Bangkok (2022), Dubai (2023), and Madrid (2024).

Additionally, the Executive Board meets every March in New York City, every October in Switzerland, and holds monthly online meetings.

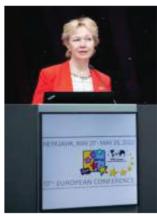

The Triennium started for me with the enormous task of organizing the 17th European Regional Conference 27-29 May 2022 and 9th Young BPW Symposium in Reykjavik Iceland.

The post COVID-19 pandemic environment was challenging, and travel had not recovered. The most difficult issue was to estimate the number of participants. BPW Iceland made a great effort to select the best and most interesting places for the venue and dinners. BPW Iceland and European Coordination Committee worked hard to make the Conference and the Symposium a success and we managed – 250 participants, 15 workshops, top level speakers, sponsor and amazing places for the venues.



To bring the Presidents of Europe together and to share information and best practices regular online President's meetings were launched. The first online meeting took place at the end of 2020. These regular meetings have made European Presidents a strong, friendly and well organised working group.

The feeling of sisterhood was especially important during COVID-19 times to keep the Clubs operating and active. Giving each other advice and support helped many Clubs to get through the challenging COVID-19 time and keep up the numbers of membership.

BPW Europe had many working groups, my intention was to carry on the work of the groups and create new ones. With the help of two seasoned members the revision on the Groups was made, current working groups are Equal Pay Day, Learning for Leadership, Women on Boards, Charter on the Girls Rights. In addition, two new working groups have been established – Green and Sustainable and WEPs. All groups are now well established and active.

BPW Europe has been unitedly working to support our Club in Chernihiv Ukraine and refugees from Ukraine. BPW Poland has been receiving and helping the refugees who arrived after the start of the war in February 2022. Many Federations have received funds from BPW International Support Ukraine Fund for projects – Poland, Ireland, Romania, Madrid Spain to support refugees and BPW UK to finance a van in Ukraine.

BPW UK together with BOW International project was focused on helping the BPW Chemihiv Club in Ukraine. From the funds a van was purchased to help people in need to get to the medical facilities and groceries. The van was packed with goods needed in Chemihiv and delivered in April 2024.



New members to the European Communications Committee (ECC) were elected in 2020 -Regional Coordinator Anu Viks, Estonia, Secretary Carmen Taheny, Ireland, Finance Officer Gudrun Jakobsdottir, Iceland, Young Representative Alice Minuto, Italy, Communication Officer Sheerah Kim, Switzerland. Communication is essential as we are the biggest region in BPW International with almost 18,000 members in 32 countries.

BPW Europe website has been modernised, social media channels have been reactivated, Newsletter was launched, and LinkedIn account was created.

BPW Europe is registered in Brussels, Belgium in the hub of women organisations Amazone building. The new registration required the updating of the Statute of BPW Europe. BPW Europe has representation in the European Women's Lobby (EWL). In 2024 BPW Europe presented the Manifesto to EWL consisting of 5 main points – empowerment, gender equality, proportional representation in equal pay for equal work, women on Boards and decision-making and leadership in Europe.

BPW International and BPW Europe have Representative in the Council of Europe. The Representative takes part in the online and Face to Face meetings and reports the actions of BPW to the Council of Europe.

BPW Europe is represented in the European Institute for Gender Equality (EIGE). EIGE is the body of the European Union established in 2006. EIGE headquarters is in Vilnius Lithuania. BPW Europe is represented by the members of Vilnius Chamber Club.

BPW Europes face to face Presidents meeting takes place annually. In 2021 it was held in Barcelona hosted by BPW Spain. In 2022 it took place in Reykjavik, Iceland as part of the European Regional Conference.

In 2023 we took the Presidents meeting to the place of our registration – Brussels and for the first time opened the meeting for all members. The events were hosted by BPW Belgium. Brussels is the seat of the European Parliament and institutions. My intention was to introduce the institutions and their work to our members. We had a seminar in the European Parliament Info Hub, visited the European Parliament, had the round tables with five women organisations - BPW Europe invited EWL, European Women on Boards, Coface Families Europe, Soroptimists International of Europe. EIGE, workshops were held on different topics by BPW Europe, EWL and EIGE.

The 2024 Presidents meeting took place in Rome from 22-23 March and was hosted by BPW Italy. BPW Italy arranged visits to businesswomen from the Rome Club, the visit and seminar on Equal Pay in the Senate of Italy in Palazzo Giustiniani.

At the Presidents meeting on 23 March 2024 the new members to the Executive Council (name as by the renewed Statute of BPW Europe) were selected – Anu Viks Regional Coordinator (second term), Carmen Taheny Secretary (second term), Mariane Pontone Treasurer, Valentina Ceban Communication Officer and Anna Zimmerman Young Representative.



By tradition the Young BPW Symposium is held every year at the same time with the Presidents' meeting. The 11th Young BPW Europe Symposium took place in Rome with 25 Young members present.

My work as the Regional Coordinator can be best described in 3 important words – inclusion, innovation and inspiration.

As the Regional Coordinator 2021-2024, I have taken part in many meetings and General Assemblies of European members – Iceland, Germany, Cyprus, Turkey, Austria, UK, Italy, Finland, Estonia, Ireland, Czech Republic, Belgium, Spain, Latvia, Lithuania.

As the member of the BPW International Executive I participated at the Regional Conferences of other Regions, I have been the speaker at webinars, workshops, trainings and conferences. I have participated at the online Executive meetings and the yearly face to face meetings in Switzerland.

These three years have been extremely busy, challenging, inclusive, innovative and rewarding. My great appreciation to all who stood by me and supported me during these years.

- Organisational Program; To establish systems, regular meetings, emails, controls, communication, and information that offer Affiliates a feeling of inclusion, stability and continuity.
- Environment Program: We are privileged to have among the members of its Executive, Yara Blochtein, who has demonstrated her commitment to Nature and who is in charge of this program that constitutes an important niche in which our members can get involved under her wise leadership.
- Leadership Program: The leadership program is essential for our action, and young business and professional women need to be motivated in order to assure our continuity. Our Regional Young BPW has developed a leadership program to attract new young members.



 Mentoring and Entrepreneurship program: Another means to achieve this is to help our members through mentoring projects. Among these programs, we recently promoted the WITH program from our MoU with UN Women for Latin American Affiliates.

Projects

- Water Ambassadors: Our program "Water Ambassadors' Training" was held at simultaneous online academies in seven countries in Latin America, sharing knowledge about regional water scarcity using a pilot model and technical training support. The program targeted women community leaders, intergovernmental institutions, women's organizations, and civil society. It resulted in a total of 249 qualified Water Ambassadors with the mission to become multipliers and disseminators of this knowledge at regional and local levels. The program is ongoing and well appreciated by our members.
- The Legacy: The project "El Legado" (The Legacy), led by the Regional Young BPW, Camila Ribeiro, is a series of videos that aim to introduce and promote the young members of BPW Latin America, fostering entrepreneurship, developing the maximum potential of each young member, and encouraging the use of their skills for the benefit of other women and girls. Please visit this link. Topics include: - From paper to reality: Strategies to boost your business results. - Women's Health: How to promote body and mind integration. -Digital Marketing: The power of communication for your business. - Sustainable projects: What are they and how to do them?
- Web Page: With our Communication Director, Romi Ruff, we have been working on the texts for our Latin America Web page. The goal is to have, among other things, a special thumbnail of the region's history.

Regional Activities

- Online International Event on August 25, 2022: Latin America held an international event with simultaneous translation in three languages addressing the whole BPW community. With this, we succeeded in our purpose, which was to be inclusive of other regions (120 members from 31 countries). We had speakers from 8 of our Affiliate countries. The theme was: "Advances, challenges, and strategies of public policies for women. Equal rights and opportunities - Work - Health - Eradication of violence."
- BPW International 92nd and 93rd Anniversaries online celebration and Regional Candle Lighting Ceremony: In August 2022 and 2023, BPW Latin America celebrated the 92nd and 93rd Anniversary of BPW International with brief speeches from our members, followed by our Candle Lighting Ceremony.
- **Regional Board and Regional Executive Meetings**: Ongoing regular activities, leading us towards the institutionalisation of the region. The Regional Executive has had over 18 meetings, and the Regional Board has had over 20 meetings since 2021.
- Visits to Affiliates: Because of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Regional Coordinator has only visited: - BPW Argentina: International Congress inspection visit. - BPW Brazil: CONFAM - BPW Santiago de Chile: Latin America 10th Regional Conference. 10th Regional Conference in Santiago de Chile: The 10th BPW Latin America Regional Conference took place in Santiago, Chile, from September 7th to 9th, 2023. It featured



participation of over 80 members from 19 countries from all five of the BPW Regions and renowned speakers from within and outside the organisation. The International Executive, two former presidents of BPW International, Liz Benham and Yasmin Darwich, and a former International Executive Secretary honoured us with their presence.

Results according to Objectives

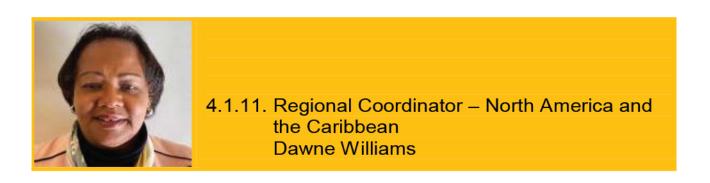
Our plan sought mainly to:

- **Boost regional growth**: There are 10 new Clubs and we have participated in the creation of 8 of them.
- Ensure a good understanding of the governance, and inclusion: We have had a webinar about governance for the Affiliates. Additionally, every time there are newcomers, the RC presented BPW International to them. We have met regularly during the triennium.
- Improve communication and promote the image of Affiliates and the Region: Strong presence in the social media and Website.
- Launch new regional programs and programs: These programs, projects and activities, have resulted in a joint effort by the Affiliates of the Region and a greater sense of belonging.

Other Activities

Participation of the Regional Coordinator in International Executive Face-to-face Meetings, online International Executive Meetings, and other International Conferences. The Regional Coordinator attended four International Executive face-to-face meetings in Saanenmöser, Switzerland, and about 20 online meetings. Additionally, the RC attended other international conferences and meetings in Europe and North America.





Using the BPW International triennial theme, "New Actions through Cooperation," as our backdrop, the North America and Caribbean region embarked on a journey to get stronger on all fronts.

To do this we had a laser sharp focus on three pillars:

- 1. Constitutional Compliance
- 2. Growth
- 3. Training and Development.

As we move toward the end of triennium, we are happy to report that we have made good progress and are on our way to fully realizing each of these targets, by October 2024.

Constitutional Compliance

The Constitutional Advisor - Bessie Hironimus, engaged with the affiliates within the region to ensure that their governance documents were updated and in line with what subsists at the International Level. She completed reviews and engaged with the leaders as was necessary. We continue to hold our leaders accountable for good governance by their affiliates.

Growth

In terms of Growth, the affiliate clubs focused on increasing their numbers. However, for different reasons, countries like Jamaica, Barbados and Haiti, continued to struggle to grow their numbers.

Jamaica has twinned with BPW California, with a view to network and get assistance in growth and other strategies. Barbados continues with the push to improve their numbers. Haiti on the other hand continues to be plagued with political and social issues so unable to meet and grow. We continue to applaud President Irvika for her strength, resilience and unwavering commitment to BPW. She attends meetings. as her situation allows.

We continue to encourage Anguilla and Bermuda in pursuit of having them up and functioning to capacity following COVID. This has not been met with much success, but we continue to keep the communication lines open and include them in all we do.

There is an intentional focus within the region to recruit young members to ensure sustainability of BPW.

In terms of new clubs, there were three onboarded during the triennium, BPW Liamigua, BPW Nevis and BPW The Bahamas. Plans are in progress to have our first Caribbean Federation by October 2024.



Training and Development

Training and Development was a feature throughout, the triennium, with sessions being held at the local, regional and international levels. During this period, we exposed members to training and development opportunities, providing them with the opportunity to move into executive positions.

These sessions included the NAC Regional Conference, the Leaders' Summit and CSW. During the triennium every active affiliate club and federation, ushered in a new President and National President respectively. These transitions were all seamless, which speaks to the high-level Succession Planning within the region.

As a region, we met via formal meetings bimonthly, informal meetings as was necessary and were active at the local, regional and international events. Most worthy of note was the 2023 North America and The Caribbean Regional Conference that was a pinnacle of learning, networking, engagement and fun, set in a relaxed atmosphere.

At the President's meeting held during the Regional Conference, Past National President Karin of Canada, was selected by the Region to be the next Regional Coordinator.



The election will take place at Congress 2024, and we wish the nominates Regional Coordinator, Karin a successful election and eventual reign.



BPW Jamaica celebrated their 50th anniversary in 2024 and BPW St. Kitts is looking forward to celebrating 50 years in 2025. Whenever possible members travel to support each other at their special events.

The affiliates continue to work on their projects and concentrate on the WEPS.

The USA and Canada represented the region at CSW in 2023 and 2024 and did us proud. Each affiliate club and federation has been active in their

community. Thanks to all for showing up and unleashing the BPW vision in the communities you serve.

We turn our focus to Congress 2024; we are ecstatic to host in the North America and the Caribbean region and in St. Kitts specifically. We look forward to a lifechanging event as BPW ends one triennium and starts another. We know that the learning, friendships and partnerships forged will serve to make BPW better.

2022: Championing Equal Pay and Global Collaborations

The Standing Committee for Business, Trade and Technology continued its unwavering commitment to promoting equal pay and fostering international connections to advance women's empowerment.

Key Initiatives:

- Equal Pay Campaign: The Standing Committee partnered with the international company TRASMED-GRIMALDI GROUP, endorsed by the Spanish Minister of Industry, Trade, and Tourism, to raise awareness about equal pay by flying the Equal Pay Flag on their ships throughout February.

- "TOWARDS EQUALITY" Meeting (Madrid, October): Co-organized with SALVAMENTO MARITIMO, this meeting brought together the international maritime sector to focus on achieving SDG 5 (Gender Equality), highlighting the importance of collaboration in addressing gender-related challenges in the maritime industry.
- XXXIV CONFAM (Campo Grande, November): The Standing Committee presented the Action Plan and BPWI's networking tools, fostering new connections with women entrepreneurs in Latin America, expanding the committee's global reach and impact.
- Shock Plan for Ukrainian Refugee Crisis (April-December): The committee played a vital role in this initiative, which supported the economic inclusion of Ukrainian women refugees in the Spanish economy by providing job training, business guidance, and employment assistance, demonstrating the committee's commitment to social responsibility and humanitarian support.

Scientific conference on environment and sustainability to be held in 2025.

The BPW Standing Committee on Environment and Sustainability met regularly. Our main achievement during this triennium is the successful collaboration of the SC with the Environment Commission and the Italian Ministry of Tourism. The BPW Standing Committee on Environment and Sustainability successfully participated in the 'Montagna' call for proposals by the Italian Ministry of Tourism. We were selected as winners and awarded a budget of approximately 20,000 euros. This funding will be crucial for organising a hybrid conference.

Throughout the bid planning and application process, several meetings were held with the Standing Committee members and the Environment Commission (Italy) to discuss and refine our project proposal. These collaborative sessions were crucial in shaping the vision and execution plan for the conference.

Additionally, as representatives of BPW, we actively participated in several Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) meetings. These engagements provided valuable insights and partnerships that both supported the successful bid and will serve to enhance the scientific conference on environment and sustainability scope and impact.

We are excited to organise this international conference and look forward to the positive impact it will have.

Project Ideas and Additional Initiatives

The Environment Commission and the SC has also deliberated on several project ideas aimed at utilising reclaimed materials to create artworks. This initiative has culminated in a virtual art exhibition featuring both American and Italian artists. The exhibition is already active and will be promoted through BPW channels in September and October. The exhibition will showcase and encourage good practices in environmental sustainability.

The next three years will be instrumental in executing these initiatives, and we are confident that our efforts will catalyse positive change and inspire sustainable practices globally.

Introduction

Empowering Women Through Health: A Holistic Approach to Wellness and Well-Being

A healthy woman is able to produce, work and implement. I have witnessed this myself in the last few years when I had health challenges that prevented me from performing several duties especially in my role for promoting health and as a Professor of Radiology responsible about serving patients. However, I have been able to collaborate with several stakeholders.

This report highlights the key activities undertaken in the domain of women's health awareness, with a particular focus on Egypt. The report covers collaborations with the Egyptian Medical Women Association, participation in cancer awareness webinars, efforts in promoting early breast cancer screening through mammography, and the co-organisation of a webinar on climate change's impact on health, business, and displacement in June 2024.

Through my profession as a Professor of Radiology and Head of Radiology Departments in 7 University hospitals and Head of the Women Imaging Unit in Tanta University I have organised many campaigns for health awareness for women, and implemented several projects for early screening for breast cancer.

I have contributed to several outreach convoys in rural areas in Egypt to raise the health awareness among women in the rural areas. I have conducted several awareness sessions regarding Female Genital Mutilation. (FGM) Collaboration with the Egyptian Medical Women Association.

In a strategic move to enhance women's health awareness in Egypt, we have spearheaded a series of campaigns in partnership with the Egyptian Medical Women Association. These campaigns are designed to educate women on various health issues, emphasising the importance of regular health check-ups and preventive measures. The initiatives have reached a wide audience.

Webinars on Cancer Awareness: Recognising the critical need for education on cancer prevention and early detection, I have participated in numerous webinars focused on cancer awareness. These webinars, attended by a diverse group of stakeholders, provided comprehensive information on the signs and symptoms of various cancers, risk factors, and the importance of early diagnosis. Special attention was given to breast cancer, highlighting the life-saving benefits of regular mammography screenings.

Promotion of Early Breast Cancer Screening: One of the cornerstone efforts has been the vigorous promotion of early breast cancer screening through mammography. A disease that I have myself suffered from.I have been collaborating with national health campaigns and advocated for accessible and affordable mammography services for women across Egypt. Public service announcements, social media campaigns, and community outreach programs were utilised to encourage women to undergo regular screenings, thereby improving early detection rates and outcomes.

National Health Awareness Campaigns: In alignment with national health initiatives, I have joined forces with various health organisations in Egypt to amplify the message of preventive health care. Participation in these national campaigns has included distributing educational pamphlets, and setting up mobile clinics to provide screenings and health consultations. These efforts have significantly contributed to raising public awareness and fostering a culture of proactive health management among women.

Webinar on Climate Change and Its Impact on Health, Business, and Displacement: In June 2024, the Health Standing Committee has co-organised a landmark webinar addressing the intersection of climate change, health, business, and displacement. This event brought together experts from multiple disciplines to discuss the far-reaching implications of climate change on public health and economic stability from across BPW International. Topics covered included the health risks posed by environmental changes, the impact on business operations and workforce displacement, and strategies for building resilient communities. The webinar not only educated participants but also spurred dialogue on developing sustainable solutions to these pressing global challenges.

The Membership SC regularly organised Zoom meetings with the team to carry out our activities. I would like to share with you two important activities we have undertaken together during this triennium.

- 1. We prepared a "Member Satisfaction Plan" to help our Presidents to manage their clubs and to give their members the opportunity to take an active part in our BPWI.
- 2. We developed a project "AWARD about women's rights".

Member Satisfaction Plan

We believe that it is important to welcome new members, but it is also fundamental to get them involved in clubs' activities. We wanted to support the Presidents and provide them with the necessary tools (questionnaires) in order to:

- 1. Define "member satisfaction" for your club.
- 2. Create a Member Satisfaction Plan.
- 3. Implement and refine the plan.

They could also use our existing resources, our website, newsletters and our newest resource, the Directory. I want to highlight the main steps of the plan.

STEP 1: Defining "member satisfaction" for the club is the first phase to ensure that members may have a positive experience and know what they want from their club.

Making changes which reflect the members' needs and wants is the key to guarantee a good experience. You can use the three questionnaires we have provided to help you do this.

STEP 2: Create a member satisfaction plan. Membership loss is a problem for many clubs, and the reasons are often the same: 1) Conflict within the club: this is the very first reason why members leave their club. 2) Fear of not making a difference: if the club doesn't involve members in the activities they want to do, or if they don't feel that their voices matter, even the best projects can't make members feel like they're making a difference. 3) Lack of a sense of belonging: members who do not feel a sense of belonging will not stay in the club for long.

STEP 3: Implement and refine your plan. Once you have surveyed your members and considered their responses and concerns, it is time to propose changes and remove barriers.

It is necessary to communicate your plan for member satisfaction. Remember that one of the reasons a member stays in a club is because he /she understands the club's goals.

A member who knows what's going on in the club feels like an important part of the club.

AWARD about Women's Rights

We have also prepared a project "AWARD about women's rights" and put it on our website in "BPW Projects", thanks to the member Adriana Sabato from FIDAPA BPW Italy. The project aims to promote education and respect for women's rights in schools. The project would like to award a prize to highlight the best topic or classroom work:

- Violence against women or
- Women's Rights

The prize will be awarded annually. Therefore, each year a different club - selected in rotation by the members of the Standing Committee - will organise the competition at local level. The prize will be given to girls in their final year of secondary school. The school will be chosen by the local club through appropriate contacts with the headmaster.

The Municipality of Ferrara, Italy, implemented the project for the school year 2022/2023 on the International Women's Day. BPW International, FIDAPA BPW Italy - Club Ferrara and IIS "N. Copernico - A. Carpeggiani" School Institute of Ferrara concluded a long process of working together to transmit knowledge about the situation of women to the younger generations. The final ceremony of the "AWARD of Business and Professional Women International" took place on March 8th in the "Scotti" classroom of the school.

Steering Committee Meetings

We worked well together and I have been at their disposal for any suggestions and advice. Through a number of zoom meetings, we had the opportunity to exchange ideas and define together the actions to help our members and to promote membership. During the meetings each member presented the situation about membership in her Region, the requests from Affiliates and we defined the best way to support them.

What emerged was the very difficult situations in some clubs to pay the dues for the critical economic situation in their countries. We communicated these problems to the Executive Finance Officer to find the best solution to meet their needs. All the members promoted the communication with our Affiliates all over the world. Clear and effective communication is very important to improve our membership and to promote the associative leadership.

All the members of the standing committee were given the information about membership and the documents to create new clubs and all necessary explanation. The results are very significant, thanks to our activities to promote the membership according to the best practice: now BPW International has 50 new Clubs and 4 new Federations. BPW International counts Affiliates in 118 new countries, particularly in 25 new countries.

The United Nations Steering Committee is organised by First Vice President and comprised of four Working Group Chairpersons and members. A diverse collective of twenty-two women from twenty member states, we operated in a spirit of collaboration, cross-sectional engagement, playing crucial roles enhancing activities.



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The teams are shown in the image below.



Convening monthly United Nations Standing Committee (UN SC) worked in groups and we wish to acknowledge the multiple contributions of diverse women across the triennium who have joined us, left us, and supported us in fulfilling the vision of "new actions through cooperation." We acknowledge the leadership of Judith van Unen, who sadly died during the second year of her leadership as Chair of the the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) Team, her work continues.

UN SC Working Groups made progress by informing members of the various processes at United Nations, UN Women and navigation of the UN System.

Mutual learning and informing across time zones and cultures was instrumental in supporting individuals, and Projects. Work in our collective advocacy spanned 17 SDG Goals and shared herewith:

Education and Advocacy UN Working Group affirms education and advocacy as the basis of our society. Our group acted as a Clearinghouse for Information on UNESCO mandate for peace through education, science and culture, with education as a key enabler of the SDGs. BPW International's role as an official partner is advocating for Girls' and women's empowerment through Education in STEM, ICT, TVET, and AI. We advocate for leadership in all areas, including STI, Entrepreneurship in Africa, and water, theme of 2023 International NGO-Liaison Committee Webinar led by BPW International with group contributions.

The core of our mission is to build capacity for key messages on Inclusive, Equitable Quality Education as a human right, consult members for local inputs to collective drafts for HPL SDG4-Steering Committee & TES through CCNGO-Education 2030 representation and youth.



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We served as voices of voiceless, using knowledge to transform mentalities based on – UNESCO Instruments, Education recommendations, AI Ethics, Digital Literacy for Gender Equality, Sustainable Development. Applications for UNESCO GWE/Literacy prizes submitted (2021-24) by BPW Benin 's project "Digital Literacy for Girls and Women from Disadvantaged Environments" pre-selected in 2021. Members were encouraged to register projects on Education on the BPW website, UNESCO Coalition Platform served as partners for accelerating Gender Equality. Group Members appreciated enrichment, good practices, challenges, and unique experiences of cooperation for change.

CEDAW Working Group

The UN CEDAW committee is the body of independent experts monitoring implementation of the most important human rights treaty for women. Conventions of CEDAW oblige ratified States legally in key areas. For more information: <u>https://www.ohchr.org/en/treaty-bodies/cedaw</u>.

Our three UN SC CEDAW working group members participated in meetings, attended UN CSW, provided reports, and gave input into panel discussions.

Global UN CEDAW contributions were undertaken by BPW Member States as follows: *Brazil* underwent review by UN CEDAW Council assessing girls' and women's rights concerning sexual, reproductive rights, escalating and (often) forced child/adolescent pregnancies. Canada (ratified 1981, optional protocols 2002) undertook complaint recommendations 2012 regarding women's property rights. CEDAW established *Canada* "should provide monetary compensation matching deprivation. *Nepal* engaged in initiatives to promote gender equality, women's rights establishing groups with decent employment/equal wages, social protection with National Women's Commission (NWC) of Nepal tracking CEDAW's observation progress and found areas to improve: gender-based violence, educational access, health services, participation in political/public life, agency access to government aid.

Brazilian, Nepalese and Canadian states highlighted recommendations needed in health protocol for children in cases of sexual violence and: training professionals – decriminalising abortion – gender equality – equal family responsibilities –combating human trafficking.

UN SC CEDAW was also empowered to advance UN SDG Goals by utilising mechanisms of CEDAW.

Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) Working Group

Throughout this triennium the CSW working group guided BPW International contributions and efforts leading to 66th, 67th and 68th session of UN CSW. BPW clubs worldwide participated in monitoring, preparation, advocacy, policy support. This working group supported the drafting of the annual BPW International Statements to CSW these can be found on the NGO Participation section of each CSW.

Collaborative efforts ensured comprehensive input. BPW International organised impactful parallel events during CSW 67th and 68th sessions (and virtually during the COVID impeded 66th Session), addressing complex challenges faced by women.



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Examples from CSW 68th Session include:

'Transformational Leadership: Systems Thinking to Address Poly-crises and Structural Challenges in Women's Access' – explored innovative strategies for financial inclusion, entrepreneurship, equitable workplaces to accelerate gender equality. Speakers emphasised the importance of a human rights-based approach in tackling economic, social and political gender gaps.

'Breaking Single Parent Poverty Trap' – aimed at addressing economic challenges faced by single parents, focusing on gender-sensitive solutions strategies to alleviate poverty among single-parent families.

'Global Collaboration to Tackle Period Poverty' — Addressing global issue of period poverty and impact on women's health and opportunities. Featuring collaboration between BPW USA, BPW Canada, and international partners.

'Breaking Barriers: Transforming Institutions for Gender-Responsive Change' – focused on institutional reforms to support gender equality, empowerment of women across various sectors, promoting gender-responsive policies/practices.

At CSW 68th Session - BPW International members contributed (collectively, and to their own governments), to a submission for the recommendations to be included in the Zero Draft agreed conclusions. Recommendations focused on gender-responsive actions on 3 / 3 climate change, fostering inclusive digital technologies, equitable policies, collaborative international efforts to advance women's empowerment.

Human Rights (HR) Working Group

The Human Rights Working Group collaborates with all other working groups in the UN SC and shares the UN Human Rights Council structure, actions and articles of thirty human rights documents found at https://www.ohchr.org/en/universal-declaration-of-human-rights.

Members of the HR Working Group have participated in multiple forums, including CSW, UNESCO, CEDAW Reporting and UDHR reporting. Group members both reported back to and informed the other members of the UN SC and broader BPW International members.

The UN SC Human Rights Committee has served to inform work opportunities for multilateral collaboration, cross-sectoral, and transnational applications. During the triennium they collaborated on:

- UN revitalization processes (and UN reform processes)
- NGO Caucus dialogues, collaboration, and substantive inputs
- Young BPW, Regional, National dialogues
- Complexities of Beijing +30 rules for Civil Society
- UN Women (DGC) NGONY, OSCE/ODIHR bodies of work
- Recommendation papers for BPW Statements, National work



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For the Summit of the Future UN Civil Society Conference held in Nairobi – the HR SC supported the Delegation in their key engagements:

- Dr. Mary Lawlor SR on situations of human rights defenders.
- Ms. Reem Alsalem SR on violence against women and girls.
- Prof. Tomoya Obokata SR on contemporary forms of slavery.

HR Working Groups Member State work:

- Brazil's coordinator of Climate Justice Program Public Defender's Office hosted First Congress in São Paulo, working ahead to UNFCCC COP 30.
- Malaysia's campaigns on Cybersecurity for women garnering government attention and funding.
- Australia contributed to a key review of a potential National Human Rights Act raising key issues on economic security, diversity and inclusion and safety and security.
- Canada presented at Permanent Missions of Malta NYC, with Permanent Mission Representatives: Sweden, Tajikistan, Albania, Deputy to Ambassador US Dept of State, UNODC introducing topic: Women and Organized Crime to UNCSW, United Nations, historically.

Overview:

The Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force, within the International Federation of Business and Professional Women (IFBPW), is a diverse collective of active and peripheral members. Each encouraged to participate, contributing time, energy guiding work and information, thereby showcasing the power of collective action.

Our Task Force, formed with steadfast commitments, dedicated to address the multi-faceted crisis facing women and girls. Particularly in areas of economy, migration, conflict, food insecurity, education, employment. These crises heightened risks, exploitation of women and girls, necessitating coordinated, committed response.

Human trafficking encompasses sexual exploitation, forced labour, debt bondage, domestic servitude, organ removal, forced begging, child soldiers, forced marriage, linked crimes.

Objectives of the Taskforce: build awareness, education, community engagement, resource development, policy/advocacy methodology utilising multi-pronged approach executing our strategy plan via:

- Regular Meetings discussions, news, discussions, activity planning.
- Educational Initiatives, professional training task force, webinars, panels.
- Communication: private WhatsApp group assisted navigation in language/culture.



- Resource Sharing created Google Docs reports, data research briefs.
- Event Participation Presentations regionally, internationally agencies, Government, Stakeholders.
- Collaboration Reporting
- IFPBW trend sharing, analysis and influence

Achievements

The achievements of the Anti-Human Trafficking Task Force stand as a testament to collective efforts. As a significant group, we made strides in key areas, instilling a sense of productivity and encouragement among members. We have to date:

- **Diverse members** from four of five global regions serving two trienniums.
- Increased awareness engagement through concerted effort in education awareness, engaging audiences, including civil society and our Social media project on July 30th, gained notable success and significant attention.
- Developed Resources. We have developed high-quality videos and educational posts. The series completed at the end of 2024 have provided resources that are invaluable for member sharing presentations.
- Proactively advocated for influencing advanced Policy making related to human trafficking and positioned to advance relevant ongoing work.
- Community Building strategies: These initiatives have fostered a sense of community, member support, shared skills, joint perspectives and worked towards common goals.
- A Shared leadership model effectively providing members opportunities to speak and lead.

Challenges:

Despite marked progress-hurdles remain, these are:

- Resource Limitations: High-quality educational materials, videos, webinars requires time and secured funding.
- Global Coordination: Time zones, language, diverse regions posed hurdles, but member commitment and flexibility navigated them successfully.
- **Engagement and Participation**: Sustaining high levels of engagement and participation, given diverse situations, ages, and responsibilities, meant accepting commitment in all capacities without criticism or comparison.

Recommendations:

To build on successes, address challenges faced, the following recommendations are proposed:

- Resource Allocation: Secure dedicated funding for development.
- Enhanced Communication Tools: refine, improve communication tools, platforms to facilitate coordination.



- **Member Engagement**: recognising member commitments, training with certificates accolades.
- **Implement Strategies**: Sustain, increase member engagement, provide leader development opportunities.
- Strategic Partnerships: Amplify impact to leverage expertise in short or long-term efforts.
- Policy Advocacy: Train members to approach Member States, pragmatic meetings, relational dialogue, understanding Country's positions to assist influence, prepare for invitations.
- **Capacity Building**: Find members whose primary focus is on human rights concerns in Human Trafficking Gender Based Violence (GBV) nationally and globally.

Key Activities:

These activities have worked towards the advancement of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) 1, 4, 5, 8.7, 16, 17 and have linkages to Treaties, Conventions, Accords – Beijing Accord, Turkish Treaty CEDAW, 1949 Articles of Trafficking UN:

- Created National Outreach February 22nd National Human Trafficking Awareness Day #ProjectMapleLeaf signalling awareness.
- Created Global Outreach July 30th #ProjectInterclusion in variopus languages with culturally sensitive imaging. (United Nations World Day to End Trafficking in Persons).
- Resources PDFs for global support hotlines.
- Created a Task Force Logo and nail files.
- Mentored members to attend Member State Ambassadors Civil Society meetings and apply for National, United Nations jobs.
- Planned and presented six years of CSW in person, virtual Side/ Parallel events, meetings with UNDOC, UNCAC UNHRC.
- Undertook leadership roles/engaged in Caucuses, Federations, Organisations to strengthen membership and influence (Soroptimists, NGO NY, Caucus Europe & North America, Women's Resource Institute, International Council of Women, Rotary Int'l, Women Graduates, Widows for Peace Through Democracy, Women's Aid.

During this triennium, I had not much time to dedicate to the archives. We found the first printed minutes of the foundation meeting of BPW International which lasted from 24 to 26 of August 1930 in Geneva, Switzerland.

"Atria" Archives in Amsterdam – the place where our documents are deposited – have during my triennium changed as well in regard of staff as in its structures. All the responsible historians with whom I worked retired or left the archives. These circumstances make it more difficult to finalize the repertory of the BPW International archives.

To help advance the project, the Executive agreed to create a fund called "Archives" where we deposited each year the rest of the money which was supposed to be used for a repertory of the BPW International "Archives". The aim is to find in the long run a young archivist who can support me to finalize the repertory of the whole archives.

4.3.3 Child Marriage Prevention

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Child marriage is a serious violation of human rights, and we cannot allow it. Statistics show that every three seconds a girl under the age of 18 is married - that means 10 million underage girls get married every year - mostly without their consent and usually to an older man. Most of these marriages take place in Africa, particularly in sub-Saharan Africa. According to the UNICEF Research Digest, Africa has the highest incidence of child marriage. Demographic and health data for Africa show that in Niger, Chad, and Mali, more than 70% of girls get married before the age of 18. The battle against child marriage is linked to SDG 5, Target 5.3 as well as SDG4.

Recent research on child marriage in Africa shows that most national governments in the region are either unaware of the seriousness of the issue and/or have not prioritised child marriage as a serious problem which has far-reaching implications for health, education, and the economic development indices. Many girls around the world are forced into marriage without being able to exercise their right to choose. The main causes of the phenomenon are the entrenched poverty, cultural norms and the religious beliefs deeply rooted in patriarchal traditions.

Child marriage undermines efforts to reduce gender-based violence, increase education, overcome poverty, and improve health indicators for girls and women.

Child brides are often forced into early sexual activity and soon become pregnant. Most countries have passed laws to control and reduce the spread of this phenomenon, but other customary and religious laws have greater influence on family life or personal matters. More efforts are needed to increase investment in girls' education, in economic empowerment programmes to educate girls, and in awareness campaigns to educate people about the negative economic and health consequences.

For African societies in transition towards urbanisation and modernisation, gatekeepers of traditional beliefs and moral codes, strongly defend child marriage as the "last holdout" of "culture" in the midst of profound development pressures and globalisation.

Consequently, traditional authority figures seek to consolidate their influence by focusing on the family, sexual relations and other "private" aspects of social relations. Thus, the practice of early marriage in Africa and Asia is reinforced in the short term by the very process of 'development'. There is therefore an urgent need for self-efficacy training programmes to change mindsets that are bound by entrenched poverty, cultural norms/religious beliefs and deeply rooted in patriarchal traditions. I believe it is our duty to help the many children around the world who are victims of this violence and are forced into early marriages.

All BPW members should give their support to BPW friends around the world who are dealing with this terrible problem. What can a BPW club do for that?

- Undertake projects to promote education and raise awareness of the 'value of education' to the family and community.
- Carry out health education projects for girls and communities.
- Undertake projects to promote the education and empowerment of women.



- Taking legal action to defend the rights of child brides.
- Promote an information and awareness campaign on this sad phenomenon.
- Carry out awareness-raising activities to overcome gender stereotypes and the culture of stereotypes; Promote social welfare and gender policies.
- Promote women's empowerment.

The members of the Task Force and I have always cooperated with the BPW clubs, and we want to continue our collaboration to fight this terrible phenomenon. During CSW 68 in New York, we took part in some side events on this topic to promote our activities. In various countries we have organised meetings with BPW members and political representatives to discuss this issue and launch an information and awareness campaign. The meetings were attended by representatives of UNICEF and other international organisations. We need to create a network between our clubs and other organisations around the world to work together against this sad phenomenon.

Today this problem still exists, even in Italy, in fact we have many migrants from African countries and from countries at war, and unfortunately this practice has been implemented. Many women and girls from African countries live in Italy, some of them arrived by boat and are accommodated in shelters.

It is necessary to raise awareness among governments and at the same time promote the education and empowerment of young women in order to change this bad situation. It is very important to create a cultural change through education, because this is the best strategy to fight the problem.

We are running an information and awareness campaign about child marriage in the world. Our campaign includes some meetings in the different regions of BPW. In Burkina Faso, a member of the Task Force, Rasmata Kabre, is implementing a project to help young women with obstetric fistula: she provides them with accommodation, health care and education. In Sicily, with club BPW Messina Capo Peloro, we achieved the opportunity to create media awareness of this phenomenon with a symbol for the campaign against child marriage: a white zagara flower. We made a pin offered to all BPW members around the world. I hope we will be able to eliminate this terrible phenomenon very soon.

I would like to conclude this short report with a thought of my own: being members of BPW International must lead us to work for a stronger, more meaningful, and more prosperous society, a society built on commitment, innovation, economic development and human rights. A society that cares for the less fortunate and promotes justice with respect for diversity. We all have a strong desire to promote the empowerment of women to achieve equal opportunities in all fields of society and their full affirmation in society.



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4.3.4 COVID 19 Reshaping the Future

The BPW International Women Reshaping Future Taskforce acted on multiple fronts following the motto of our International President Catherine Bosshart, and in the light of the 17 SDGs identified by the U.N. to be reached by 2030. **BPW Italy**

I would point out that the pandemic first and then the wars, have greatly reduced the activities of the affiliates in the world.

4.3.5 Equal Pay

The Equal Pay Day Taskforce supports the global awareness campaign for Equal Pay launched by BPW International in 2009.

The task force is primarily aimed at the members of BPW International and their individual BPW clubs, but is also available for inquiries from other organisations and works together with other task forces as required.





Task Force Reports

Since the start of the campaign, more than 40 countries have actively addressed the issue of Equal Pay through the activities of BPW and most of them have introduced an Equal Pay Day. Almost all member countries are involved in the campaign. Thanks to BPW, the campaign has become a global movement.

The aim of raising awareness of Equal Pay through the campaign has been achieved. However, as Equal Pay has not yet been achieved and women still receive overall less pay for paid work than men, and in some cases receive less pay on average for the same work. This injustice is no longer tolerable and it is time the gender pay gap is abolished.

The task force has, and is, also working on this by supporting the Equal Pay campaign. To raise awareness of this issue, a side event on "Closing the Wage Gap" was held during the CSW in New York for over a decade. We invited politicians, entrepreneurs and experts to this side event and discussed with them how the global wage gap could be closed. The side events were always very well attended. After each side event, more countries joined the campaign.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, face-to-face events changed and the task force worked mainly online. However, we are planning to hold face-to-face CSW events again in the coming years.

The task force and its members were available to the countries as contacts and provided them with support. We took part in internet events and sought direct contact with BPW clubs and exchanged ideas with them.

With the help of the campaign, the issue of "equal pay for equal work" has achieved a high level of awareness worldwide. BPW International has cooperated with other institutions and organisations. Many BPW clubs have established contacts with their respective governments, parliaments, governments, companies, trade unions and the public.

Every year, more and more supporters come forward for this important issue. The activities in the countries vary, but are always carried out with great commitment from the members. From individual small events or meetings to large demonstrations and high-profile media events. Several countries have received financial support for the Equal Pay campaign from their governments or from companies. Companies offer discounts equal to the pay gap on Equal Pay Day.

In many countries, Equal Pay Day is reported on television, on the radio and in the newspapers. Trade unions have also taken up the issue. In many countries, the pay gap has also become an election issue for political parties.

However, BPW has also succeeded in working with associations that attract a great deal of attention. For example, national women's soccer teams support Equal Pay. Numerous websites have been set up for Equal Pay Day and the demand for equal pay. The internet is full of the topic "Equal Pay". The campaign uses a logo developed by a BPW for its activities to highlight the pay gap. In Germany, for example, the task force has succeeded in getting the "Equal Pay Day" campaign included in a school textbook. Our campaign has resulted in laws being passed in some countries to prevent pay

inequality. The task force has also maintained contact with the European Commission in Europe, among others, which is working very hard for equal pay. Our campaign has succeeded in raising awareness of unequal pay among large sections of the population and increasing the pressure on politicians and companies. We have found many allies in the process. The issue has become a global topic, and not just at BPW. Even if the pay gap still exists worldwide, we can see that the gap is closing. BPW is driving this issue forward and all countries and members are proud that BPW has done much to close the pay gap. The task force with its members, BPW International and the many active BPW women have contributed to this.

Ad Hoc Committee Reports

To begin a very warm thank you is extended to the amazing women who agreed to be members of this committee and when family, work or health commitments resulted in a step back then no shame in being human and having to put yourself, your career or family first. Our Aims are about respect, mentoring, support, education and leadership and we all learn and grow because of the empowerment we give each other.

Following Congress 2021, I felt honoured to be asked to be the Constitutional Advisory Committee (CAC) Chair for 2021-24, following in the footsteps of former Chairs and mentors Past International President (PIP) Sylvia Perry (2014-17, 2017-21) and Past International President (PIP) Chonchanok (Nok) Viravan (2011-14). The success of your Ad-hoc CAC Committee, was due to exceptional women, their experience, knowledge and representation from the five (5) Regions.

The CAC had several unique challenges and sensitive issues requiring diplomacy and confidentiality. The meetings had a clear agenda (unfortunately still some not achieved) and minutes:

- CAC met at least every six (6) weeks in the last two and half years
- provided constitutional advice for the President and Executive on non-compliance issues
- the last two (2) months, met almost weekly to review the proposed amendments and resolutions

An overview of the work of the CAC committee for 2021-24:

- 1. Ensured the latest versions of the Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual, with any changes that had been voted on and completed by PIP Sylvia Perry 2021, were uploaded into the BPW International website.
- 2. Found that the BPW International Policy Advocacy Resolutions Register and Operations Resolutions Register had not been updated since 2014, these urgently needed the proceedings from 2017 and 2021 on the passed resolutions to be included and uploaded into the website. Members have had no access to this vital advocacy information since 2014.
- 3. Following the XXX BPW International online Congress 2021, there have been no published proceedings and had to review the draft proceedings on what was voted on:
 - find if any motion for the proposed amendments which could not be presented be 'left on the table':
 - no motion was recorded but the CAC committee reviewed those submitted 2020/21 and have incorporated into the detailed updates
 - provided the mover (or if no longer an Executive member as four (4) years since they were submitted) they have a new mover, with acknowledgement of the original mover included as supporters of motions, being 'lifted off the table' at Congress 2024



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- motion on the transfer of money from BPW International account held in the Chase Bank USA, which was voted in favour, but *'no proceedings, no motion'* has been noted by some
- review of the letter that had been issued to the International Board, from the Young BPW members on the proceedings and items of concern and what should be changed in the procedure manual, for example use of social media.
 - Mid-2021: had started to review the existing Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual. Plus
 - Organisation Guidelines CAC version 2 (dated 11/29/2013)
 - Regional Coordinating Committee Regulations, Bylaws or Guidelines
- 4. In brief:
 - Organisation Guidelines have invaluable sections that should be added as appendices to the Procedure Manual, e.g. congress planning and specifications, application for Affiliation to BPW International as an Affiliate Club or Affiliate Federation
 - Bylaws and Regulations had significant sections that did not comply with BPW International governance documents and will need updating (Asia-Pacific updated 2022-23)
- 5. BPW International Registration and existing Constitution and Regulations, the process to date:
 - February 2022: presented to the BPW Intercontinental meeting that we had started a more detailed review of our Constitution and Regulations
 - End of 2022: International President was advised:
 - BPW International could not be registered in the Geneva Registre de Commerce
 - the CAGI Welcoming Centre for non-profit organisations (NGOs), Geneva, where BPW International was registered in 2011, advised their legal team would review our documents
 - instructed to work with NGO specialist lawyers to help in the update of the documents for registration.
 - January 2023: the Anti-Money Laundry Act (AMLA) was updated, as per other international laws in respect to risks of money laundering on non-profit organisations
 - October 2023: A detailed update of the Constitution and Regulations were completed, presented to the Executive
 - October-December 2023: online and face-to-face PowerPoint presentations across all the Regions were held



- December 2023: draft proposed amendments, with rationales, issued to International Board to vote on two motions, accepting these being presented at an Extraordinary Virtual General Assembly (EVGA) and to pay for registration costs in Switzerland
- January 2024: updated presentation at the BPW Intercontinental meeting
- February 2024: International Board online meeting to vote on EVGA was lost
- March 2024: presentation at the Leadership Summit.
- 6. This piece of work to update the existing Constitution and Regulations (C&R), has resulted in:
 - Significant number of meetings and PowerPoint presentations
 - early morning and overnight meetings in New Zealand time
 - updated draft document for review by Swiss legal team, their recommendations included in final updates for Congress 2024
 - 4,470 'woman hours' to complete the documentation to date
- 7. Congress 2024: following information prepared, with some proposed amendments included into C&R updates:
 - Sections:

5.1	20 -	detailed draft updated Constitution amendments
5.2	41 -	draft updated Regulations amendments
5.3	18 -	proposed amendments, 13 (2020/21), 5 (2024)
5.4	6 -	proposed internal resolutions

- 5.5 **14** proposed procedure manual amendments, one (1) from Regulations, **9** (2020/21), **4** (2024)
- Three amendments required further information or did not comply with the Aims; therefore mover advised accordingly these could not be accepted as is.
- Draft Constitution and Regulations (Statutes), in book form and colour with proposed changes.
- Standing Orders (Rules of Debate), noted that proposed friendly amendments be issued by the 17th September to help the process (new).

CAC 2021-24 hopes the next committee achieve the same level of collaboration and pleasure in respecting our organisation in a democratic and responsible manner, with due care while acknowledging our origins and without forgetting our sustainable future.



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4.4.2. German Feminist Foreign Policy (FFP)

During her term as W7 Advisor in 2022, Christine Heinze was asked by the German Ministry of Foreign Affairs to moderate the initial panel discussion "Women in the Global Economy" which led to a call for position papers from the international civil society on German Feminist Foreign Policy.

On behalf of BPW Germany / BPW International, Christine wrote a position paper and, since then, was invited a couple of times to contribute further to the process.

Nadine was invited to contribute the perspectives of Young BPW in a series of workshops at the German Ministry of Foreign Affairs to review the draft of German Feminist Foreign Policy. In March 2023, the final strategy on Germany Feminist Foreign Policy was presented by Annalena Baerbock, German Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Historical Context and Initiation

Germany's development of a Feminist Foreign Policy (FFP) was part of a broader global trend influenced by countries like Sweden, which pioneered FFP in 2014. Germany's approach to feminist foreign policy has been shaped by its commitment to gender equality, human rights, and sustainable development.

Initiation and Key Milestones:

- 1. **Influence from International Models**: Inspired by Sweden's pioneering efforts, German policymakers began to explore feminist perspectives in foreign policy. This movement gained momentum with the support of civil society organisations and advocacy groups pushing for a more inclusive and equitable foreign policy framework.
- Political Advocacy: The advocacy work of groups like Women7 (W7), during Germany's G7 presidency, played a significant role. Organisations under W7 called for gender equality and women's rights to be prioritised in G7 policies, leading to significant political and financial commitments from the German government.
- Institutional Support: The establishment of the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development's (BMZ) Gender Equality Strategy in 2014 marked an important step. The strategy aimed to integrate gender perspectives into all aspects of German development cooperation.
- 4. **Policy Formulation**: In 2021, the Federal Foreign Office under Annalena Baerbock, who became Germany's first female Foreign Minister, formally introduced feminist principles into German foreign policy. This policy emphasizes intersectional approaches, human rights, and the dismantling of structural inequalities.

Core Components of German FFP

1. Intersectionality: German FFP addresses the intersection of various forms of discrimination, including those based on gender, race, and economic status. This



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approach ensures that policies do not merely focus on gender in isolation but consider the broader socio-economic and political contexts.

- 2. **Human Rights and Justice**: A central pillar of German FFP is the promotion of human rights and social justice globally. This includes supporting women's rights, advocating for LGBTQ+ rights, and challenging oppressive regimes that violate these principles.
- 3. **Economic Empowerment**: Economic empowerment is crucial, with a focus on promoting women's participation in the economy through initiatives like microfinancing, entrepreneurship support, and fair trade practices.
- 4. **Inclusive Peace and Security**: German FFP prioritises the inclusion of women in peace processes and conflict resolution. This is based on evidence that women's participation leads to more sustainable and effective peace agreements.
- 5. Environmental Sustainability: The policy integrates gender perspectives into environmental sustainability, recognizing the disproportionate impact of climate change on women and advocating for their role in climate action and decision-making.

Implementation and Results

- Policy Integration: Since its formal adoption, FFP principles have been integrated across various sectors of Germany's foreign policy. This includes diplomatic efforts, development cooperation, and international trade agreements, reflecting a commitment to mainstream gender equality across all areas.
- Increased Funding for Gender Initiatives: Germany has increased its funding for programs that support gender equality and women's empowerment globally. This includes support for women's rights organisations, initiatives to combat gender-based violence, and efforts to enhance women's economic opportunities.
- 3. Advocacy and Diplomacy: Germany has actively used its diplomatic influence to advocate for feminist principles in international forums, including the United Nations and the European Union. This has led to stronger international resolutions and agreements that support gender equality.
- Women's Participation in Peace Processes: German FFP has contributed to increasing women's participation in peacebuilding and conflict resolution efforts. This aligns with global frameworks like UNSCR 1325, which emphasises the importance of women in peace processes.
- Environmental Initiatives: Programs addressing environmental issues now consider gender impacts, supporting women in climate-vulnerable regions and advocating for their leadership in environmental governance.

Challenges and Criticisms

- Implementation Gaps: Despite progress, there remain gaps in the implementation of FFP principles, particularly in regions with strong patriarchal structures and in areas where gender equality is met with resistance.
- Measurement of Impact: Quantifying the impact of FFP remains a challenge. There is ongoing work to develop better metrics and evaluation frameworks to assess the effectiveness of feminist policies.



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3. **Resource Allocation**: Ensuring consistent and adequate funding for FFP initiatives is a continuing challenge. Competing priorities and limited resources can sometimes undermine the sustainability of gender-focused programs.

Conclusion

German Feminist Foreign Policy represents a significant evolution in how foreign policy can incorporate gender perspectives to achieve broader goals of equality, justice, and sustainability. While there are challenges in implementation, the strides made in integrating feminist principles into various aspects of Germany's international engagements underscore the transformative potential of such an approach. The ongoing commitment to refining and expanding these policies will be crucial in addressing the complex global issues of the 21st century.

4.4.3. Resolutions Chair Report for Congress 2024

Chair: Vicky Mee (BPW New Zealand)

Resolutions for debate at this Congress were due by 17th May. Nineteen resolutions were received by that date but six were determined to lie with the CAC Committee. Thirteen resolutions submitted in 2024 were considered by the Resolutions Committee.

At the XXX Virtual General Assembly from 21-30 March 2021 time constraints prevented the presentation of six internal resolutions and, as Resolutions Chair, I checked with the movers of those resolutions to see if they wanted to maintain them for the XXXI General Assembly. Three of the movers requested that their proposed resolutions be resubmitted for this Congress and they were 2020-11, 2020-12 and 2020-18.

In all sixteen resolutions were reviewed by the Resolutions Committee with eight being in the external advocacy category and eight in the internal operational category. The resolutions were ready and posted on the Congress website by 17th July 2024.

For the first time for BPW International a pre-Congress amendment process is in place with amendments to resolutions to be submitted by 17 September 2024. Those accepted by the movers will be classed as friendly amendments and the wording provided in the Congress bags. Those submitted by 17th September but not accepted by the movers can be debated at the General Assembly but no new amendments will be voted on at the General Assembly.



I encourage delegates to attend the Resolutions workshop held prior to the Congress to discuss the resolutions. Some are complex and the proposers will be present at the workshop to help clarify and answer any questions raised. This is also an opportunity for all delegates to learn or to refresh about resolution processes and timing to ensure all goes smoothly on the Congress floor.

Resolutions underly much of BPW International's advocacy work and they provide a mandate for new internal initiatives. My thanks go to all those who developed and submitted resolutions for their dedication to the work of BPW International.

I would like to thank the Resolutions Committee for their committment and expertise in reviewing the documents prior to Congress and my thanks also go to CAC Chair Carolyn for her advice on procedural matters.

4.4.4. Women 7 (W7)

Author: Christine Heinze, W7 Advisor and Co-Chair Economic Empowerment, Justice and Rights during the German G7 presidency in 2022 BPW Germany

Introduction

Women 7 (W7) is an official engagement group of the Group of Seven (G7), focusing on promoting gender equality and women's empowerment within the G7 agenda. During Germany's presidency of the G7 in 2022, the W7 process played a significant role in advocating for gender-focused policies and commitments. This report outlines the key activities, outcomes, and recommendations of the W7 under the German G7 presidency.

- 1. Overview of Women 7 (W7) The Women 7 (W7) engagement group brings together civil society organisations and experts to influence G7 policies on gender equality. Established to ensure that gender issues remain central to G7 discussions, W7 operates by:
 - Conducting policy dialogues.
 - Developing comprehensive recommendations.
 - Engaging directly with G7 leaders and policymakers.

In 2022, W7 was tasked with addressing persistent and emerging gender equality challenges, with a particular focus on the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, climate change, and economic inequality.

- The W7 Process during the German G7 Presidency a. Objectives Under Germany's G7 presidency, W7 aimed to:
 - Advocate for gender-responsive pandemic recovery strategies.
 - Highlight the disproportionate impact of climate change on women.
 - Promote economic justice and empowerment for women globally.
 - Push for increased political representation and participation of women.



Methodology

W7 employed a multi-faceted approach to achieve its objectives:

- Consultations: Engaging with a wide range of stakeholders including NGOs, experts, and activists.
- Research and Reports: Publishing detailed recommendations and analysis on key issues.
- Dialogues: Organising virtual and in-person meetings with G7 ministers and representatives.
- Advocacy Campaigns: Launching public campaigns to raise awareness and mobilise support.

Key Activities

- 1. W7 Summit: Held in May 2022, the summit gathered over 60 civil society representatives and gender experts to finalize the W7 recommendations.
- Policy Recommendations: The "W7 Recommendations to the G7" document was presented, focusing on integrating gender equality into all areas of the G7's work. 3. Engagement with G7 Leaders: W7 representatives held direct meetings with G7 ministers and sherpas to discuss the implementation of the recommendations.
- 3. Key Recommendations and Policy Proposals The W7 recommendations covered several critical areas:
 - a. Economic Justice and Empowerment
 - Gender-Responsive Recovery: Implementing policies to ensure that economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic addresses the needs of women and marginalized groups.
 - Equal Pay and Labor Rights: Enforcing measures to close the gender pay gap and protect labour rights for women, including those in informal sectors.

b. Climate Justice

- Gender-Inclusive Climate Action: Integrating gender perspectives into climate policies and ensuring women's participation in climate decision-making processes.
- Support for Women in Climate-Vulnerable Regions: Providing targeted financial and technical support to women in regions most affected by climate change.

c. Political Participation and Representation

- Quotas and Targets: Introducing and enforcing quotas for women's representation in political and decision-making bodies.
- Support for Women Leaders: Enhancing support mechanisms for women leaders and candidates, including training and mentorship programs.



- d. Healthcare and Education
- Access to Healthcare: Guaranteeing universal access to sexual and reproductive health services and rights.
- Education Initiatives: Investing in education programs that address gender disparities and promote STEM education for girls.

Outcomes of the W7 Process

- a. Integration into G7 Agenda Many of the W7's recommendations were reflected in the official G7 communiqué and related documents. Key achievements included:
- Commitments to Gender-Responsive Recovery: G7 leaders acknowledged the need for inclusive economic recovery strategies.
- Climate Policy Inclusion: The G7 agreed to consider gender impacts in their climate action plans.
- Support for Women's Leadership: Enhanced support for increasing women's participation in political processes was noted.
- b. Enhanced Visibility and Advocacy The W7 process elevated the visibility of gender equality issues within the G7 framework, ensuring sustained advocacy and action:
- Increased Civil Society Engagement: Strengthened collaboration between G7 governments and civil society on gender issues.
- Ongoing Monitoring: W7 established mechanisms for tracking the implementation of G7 commitments to gender equality.
- c. Challenges and Areas for Improvement Despite significant progress, the W7 process also highlighted ongoing challenges:
- Implementation Gaps: Ensuring that G7 commitments translate into concrete actions at national and international levels remains a challenge.
- Sustaining Momentum: Maintaining focus on gender equality beyond the German presidency requires continuous advocacy and monitoring.

Conclusion

The W7 engagement under the German G7 presidency in 2022 marked a crucial step in integrating gender equality into global governance frameworks. By actively participating in the G7 process, W7 succeeded in advocating for policies that address the needs and rights of women and girls worldwide.

Continued efforts are needed to translate these commitments into tangible outcomes and to ensure that gender equality remains a priority in future G7 agendas.

IFBPW New York UN Report 2021 - 2024

This report is submitted on June 12th, 2024, by Dr. Helena Kane Finn, Main Representative, IFBPW United Nations New York.

This document includes reports from the IFBPW New York UN Representatives: Nermin Ahmad, Francesca Burack, Judi Kilachand, Tess Mateo, Susan O'Malley, Alison Smale, Shyama Venkateswar and Helena Finn covering the years 2021 – 2024.

It is a clear and definitive illustration of the dedication of the IFBPW New York Representatives to the United Nations.

Nermin Ahmad, is UN Representative for IFBPW, President of NFBPWC-NYC Affiliate Chapter and Chair of the NFBPWC Women on the Move Initiative. Nermin's areas of primary concern is Migration and Sustainable Development.

Nermin also served as Rapporteur for the monthly IFBPW meetings of the IFBPW New York UN Representatives. She became Treasurer for the Committee on Migration in 2022 and will continue in that capacity until 2026. She is the Convener of the Subcommittee on Xenophobia, Racism and Social Inclusion through June 2026. Among her many accomplishments, she has been involved with the Afghan Women Project, identifying migrants for interview. She presented at the Achieving Economic Empowerment for Displaced Business and Professional Women, CSW 67 event.

Nermin Represented Subcommittee on Xenophobia and Social Inclusion during a visit with Moroccan Representative to the UN, H.E. Omar Hillale. In the Subcommittee on Xenophobia and Social Inclusion, Nermin co-wrote the final report made available to all UN member countries. She co-authored the Subcommittee's statement on combatting xenophobia for refugees leaving Ukraine. Her blog was accepted by the United Nations Network on Migration for publication on behalf of the Subcommittee on Xenophobia, Racism and Social Inclusion published in late spring 2023. She served as Speaker at the Journalists' Fourth International Forum for Migration (JIFORM), Toronto Canada, in November 2023.

Francesca Burack, IFBPW UN New York Representative. Francesca has continued to focus on learning, literacy, and education. She has been actively working with the former Vice Chair of the Literacy and Learning NGO to push a global massive long-term action that would bring



children around the world up to grade level reading using artificial intelligence (AI) tools for education. Francesca attended the UN supported meeting, The Future We Want Model UN. She attended all of the CSW's during this triennium, supporting a variety of BPW presentations and panels in person, including those that included both our present international president and our immediate past president.

Francesca attended the reception hosted by the Turkish Consulate during CSW67. Annually, she organizes the dinner out in Harlem for our BPW members during CSW. She has mentored many Young BPWs. She has attended the meetings of the General Secretary. At the Intercontinental Meeting Group, together with two members of her team, from Spain and Uganda, she presented on the importance of teamwork, BPW Standing Committees and collaboration. Members of her standing committee have also presented twice at the Leaders' Summit. She attended the Secretary General's monthly meetings open to the NGO's. Francesca also attended meetings on the passage of the ILO Convention 190: The Right of Everyone to a World of Work.

Judi Kilachand, IFBPW UN New York Representative. Judi has worked on the BPW International Standing Committee on Development, Training & Employment (DT&E), headed by Committee Chair Francesca Burack; activities around the BPW Leaders' Summit in 2022 and 2023; the UN - meetings of the CSW 67 & 68 and the Committee on Migration; and a partnership between NFBPWNYC/IFBPWNYC with OneShared.World (OSW). Judi worked as a member of BPW International's Standing Committee on Development, Training & Employment (DT&E), headed by Committee Chair Francesca Burack. During the last quarter of 2023, Standing Committee DT& E has been working on a training program or workshop on Intergenerational Dialogue and Communication looking at communication of generation groups: Baby Boomers, Gen X, Millennials, Gen Z, and Generation Alpha using role playing and interactive conversations.

The blog entitled, From Strangers to Sisterhood: Our Collaboration Journey, was published in the November 2022 BPW International newsletter. DT&E completed a centralised Resource Guide listing training, development and employment programs projects and activities in the BPW Worldwide community which is now housed on the NFBPW website. Judi attended the BPW International Leaders' Summit in March 2023 and 2022 and assisted in the presentations about DT&E Standing Committee's work each year with BPW International Standing Committee DT&E Chair Francesca Burack and Jordan representative Mona Naffa.

Tess Mateo, UN Rep NYHQ/ DPI/NGO 2021-2024. Tess worked in supporting activities on behalf of BPW International and all women and girls today and tomorrow. Tess focuses on increasing the number of females in high growth, high margin, wealth creating renewable energy, technology, and sustainable food/STEM sectors that are critical on the only remaining path to a sustainable 2050. She is a trusted advisor to the leaders of UN Women, UNCTAD, UN Global Compact, ITU, ILO, ITC, UNDESA and others in the UN Sustainable Development Network and several countries. She is a featured speaker at UNGA, CSW, International Day for Women and Girls in Science, Global Summit of Women, Global InvestHer, UN STI and SDG Summits. Given her global networks and knowledge of the private sector and having opened the stock exchanges in over 20 countries, she is a sought-out collaborator.



Tess regularly disseminates information on renewable energy, STEM, emerging technologies and sustainable food information, and shares UN communications to global BPW networks.

To build a pipeline and ecosystem of future leaders, Tess recruits female students from universities and Young BPW to engage with the UN's and GSW's Youth Forum.

Tess works with dozens of IFBPW members to share knowledge and amplify messages in regional and local networks and is asked to contribute to and review many UN publications as well as IFBPW position statements and remarks.

Susan O'Malley, IFBPW New York UN Representative has attended monthly meetings of IFBPW UN representatives and supported with agendas, reports, and minutes. She has attended Clare Fulcher events.

Susan edited IFBPW Statement for UN Women's listing of ECOSOC accredited NGOs for CSW68. She wrote a UN Column for NFBPWC monthly Newsletter.

In NGO CSW/NY Susan served as Advisor to Co-chairs Pamela Morgan and Ivy Koek, where she attended monthly meetings, and co-chaired a parallel event with Canadian Senator Marilou McPhedran, Parliamentarians Against Poverty for CSW68. She spoke at 3 parallel events on widows representing WPD Widows for Peace through Democracy as their UN Representative with the Global Fund for Widows and NAWO (UK). She attended NGO CSW/UN Women/ Commission on the Status of Women briefing, the Vienna Cafe round table discussions, two briefings for US NGOs at the US Mission. Susan plays cello in the UN Orchestra four concerts a year.

Susan serves as Advisor to NGO Save Cambodia (Thayyvie Sin): working on Universal Periodic Review for Cambodia. Susan works with Fahima Gaheez (NGO Afghan Women's Fund) to secure a humanitarian parole for Afghan Mohammad Shah Janat who was jailed and tortured by the Taliban. Janat worked with Fahima for 5 years to build and run schools for girls in rural Afghanistan.

Alison Smale, Former UN Under-Secretary-General for Global Communications Report. Areas of Concern: Global communications; impact of food scarcity on women.

Alison believes that we should benefit more than we do now as a group from the experiences of our wonderfully diverse membership. For example, we all travel. Where have people heeded our experiences with the UN? Is there a way to collect our experiences each month into good practical guidance e.g., for younger women who we can advise?

Brainstorming sessions revealed that the tastes and backgrounds of individuals leading the groups influence our work perhaps more than they should. It is so hard to fathom how much our world has changed in the past 3 years. Alison points out that we have stuck to our goals and used the clarity they can bring to support the UN in crucial matters such as the delivery of grain and other vital supplies.

All UN Representative New York's deliberations have been well served by Helena's leadership and emphasis on the importance of human rights. Exposing atrocities wherever they occur is



vital, just as is uniting to lend heft to our actions is one of the most important things to preserve. It is a truism, but we can only overcome the fears and fright of recent times if we do so together!!

Shyama Venkateswar, IFPBW UN Representative. Areas of Concern: Future of Work for Women; Diversity in the workplace.

BPW International Committee event planned with Judi Kilachand. Shyama also planned a Development, Training and Employment Standing Committee (DT&E) event headed by Francesca Burack. The topic was Transformative Leadership. Shyama's talk explored how business leaders can change their perspective from a singular focus on shareholder capitalism to incorporate a wider and more nuanced understanding of stakeholder capitalism. This is a crucial lens that business leaders must buy into so that there is shared consensus in investments in communities, sustainability, climate change, and social well-being of all across lines of difference. The discussions focussed on:

- 1. How do we build inclusion;
- 2. What behaviours and actions are required?
- 3. What is the legacy of leadership that each one of us wants to leave behind?

Shyama joined CSW in November 2022, hoping to promote Women in Tech. There is a great deal of need in more intentional DE&I efforts in the tech space so that women and equity-deserving groups can advance. With Judi Kilachand, she is discussing the possibility of convening women leaders in tech to talk about challenges, some of the initiatives that they are implementing to make a difference, and how they can mobilise allies in this work.

Our monthly meetings have served to intensify the cooperation amongst the eight IFBPW New York UN Representatives on issues ranging from migration to diversity in the workplace. Our talented and dedicated group of eight New York Reps have endeavoured to fulfill the goals set forth by our organisation. They have brought to bear their varied experience in business, academia, journalism, foundation management and advocacy. I have held monthly meetings of our group so that they can exchange information and find ways to cooperate on projects of mutual interest. For example, Judi Kilachand has coordinated with Francesca Burack on Development, Training and Employment. She has also provided mentorship for our newest member, Shyama Venkateswar, whose expertise in the areas of diversity and tech are invaluable assets to our group going forward. Susan O'Malley has shared her vast experience with our entire group, providing them with guidance, particularly about the CSW. Susan's work on widows has helped to highlight an aspect of potential empowerment that is frequently overlooked. Alison Smale, an accomplished journalist who has formerly held a very senior post at the UN, has briefed our group on the impact of the current crisis in Europe on local communities. Tess Mateo has been an inspiration to us all through her energetic participation



in multi-faceted endeavours designed to promote the cause of equality for women and girls. Nermin Ahmad has utilised her considerable bureaucratic skills in running the NFBPWC-NYC. Her work on immigration and women on the move has improved the lives of women in transition. Francesca Burack has heightened awareness of trafficking of women and girls through her work with the task force.

Overall, our meetings have promoted harmonious and productive exchanges amongst our members. It has been very rewarding to witness the high level of cross-fertilisation amongst those in our small group. It has been my responsibility to make sure that we all find ways to promote the overall Mission. First and foremost, we wanted to make sure all of us, working both with one another and in different channels, were seeking to help women to realise the Sustainable Development Goals.

4.5.2 United Nations – Geneva



IFBPW Triennium Report 2021 - 2024

This report is submitted on 30 June 2024 by Doris Gerber Cerrud Viquez, Main Representative, IFBPW United Nations Geneva.

This document includes reports from 2 of the IFBPW representatives to the United Nations Geneva, Françoise van Leeuven and Doris Gerber Cerrud Viquez, covering the years 2021 to 2024 and is an overview of the work and commitment of the IFBPW representatives in Geneva, within the United Nations.

Françoise van Leeuwen, IFBPW UN Geneva Representative / ECE, ILO. (CEDAW – Slovakia report on Roma Women; UNECE Water Convention and Protocol on Water and Health and ILO update on Apprentiships)

CEDAW Slovakia: The experts commend Slovakia on the adoption of temporary special measures for Roma women. The Committee asked about:

- Services provided to female Ukrainian refugees and healthcare for Roma women.
- The right to abortion for Roma women and the integration of children into school.
- In the context of Slovakian Anti-Discrimination Act about legal treatment and National Action Plan: is there any concrete change?
- Career counselling provided to Roma women, and access to healthcare?
- Measures taken to increase awareness among women about pension benefits and social security.

UNECE - The Water Convention and the Protocol on Water and Health. The Convention on the protection and use of transboundary watercourses and international lakes is a unique international instrument and intergovernmental platform which aims to ensure the sustainable use of transboundary water resources by facilitating cooperation. It is open to all UN member States, since 2016. The Convention supports countries through the application of its strategy for implementation at global level.



ILO - Apprenticeships to ensure fair and transparent process.

Protection: taken measures to respect, promote and realise the fundamental principles and rights at work in apprenticeships.

Agreement: written an agreement between an apprentice and a host enterprise.

Equality and diversity in quality apprenticeship: Taking special account of the situation and needs of persons belonging to one or more vulnerable groups or groups in situation of vulnerability.

Promotion of quality apprenticeships: Setting national goals and allocating resources for education, vocational training, lifelong learning and employment policies.

Facilitating effective public-private partnership. Promoting a culture of lifelong learning with high technology.

Doris Gerber Cerrud Viquez, IFBPW UN Geneva Representative / ECOSOC, ILO. (CEDAW overview, Turkey's Istanbul Convention

Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW)

At each session, the CEDAW Committee examines eight to ten State party reports and adopts concluding observations. A report is published at the end of each session, below is a summary of each of the sessions from July 2021 to October 2023.

79th Session, 21 June to 9 July 2021.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the CEDAW committee held online meetings and postponed the review of eight State party reports. However, they progressed on other activities to protect women and girls. On June 24, the Committee held a discussion on the rights of indigenous women and girls, with contributions from various states and organisations. The Committee adopted statements on Turkey's withdrawal from the Istanbul Convention and on children born of violence in conflicts. Guidelines for addressing reprisals were established. Updates to working methods were made, including limiting online sessions. The Committee adopted decisions under the Optional Protocol and engaged with various organisations.

80th Session, 18 October to 12 November 2021.

The CEDAW committee met in person in Geneva after one and a half years, reviewed reports from ten States, and engaged with NGOs and national human rights institutions. Significant progress was made on rationalising working methods and addressing gender-based violence. An exceptional report was requested about women and girls in Afghanistan. The Committee also adopted follow-up assessments and final decisions on individual communications and engaged in meaningful exchanges with various stakeholders.

81st Session, 7 to 25 February 2022.

The CEDAW committee expressed deep concern over the situation in Ukraine and urged for peace and women's equal participation in peace processes. The Committee met in Geneva,



reviewed reports from eight States parties, and engaged with NGOs and national human rights institutions. They discussed the Committee's 40th anniversary, future general recommendations, and regional sessions. Progress was made on working methods, accessibility for persons with disabilities, and gender-based violence. Task forces on Afghanistan and indigenous women advanced their work. The Committee also adopted follow-up assessments, final decisions on communications, and continued inquiry proceedings. The session included valuable exchanges with various stakeholders.

82nd Session, 13 June to 1st July 2022.

The CEDAW committee considered eight State party reports and adopted concluding observations on those reports. It had published a statement on women's access to safe and legal abortion in the United States of America and had participated in an informal meeting with States parties on the Committee's draft general recommendation on the rights of indigenous women and girls. It had also held a meeting with the Human Rights Committee.

83rd Session, 10 to 28 October 2022.

The CEDAW committee reviewed eight State party reports, engaged with NGOs and national human rights institutions, and improved working methods. They made significant progress in addressing gender-based violence and the situation of women and girls in Afghanistan. Additionally, they adopted General Recommendation No. 39 on the rights of indigenous women and girls, marking a milestone in addressing intersectional discrimination.

84th Session, 6 to 24 February 2023.

The CEDAW committee reviewed eight State party reports, engaged with NGOs and (National Human Rights Institutions (NHRIs), and appreciated the support from International Women's Rights Action Watch Asia Pacific (IWRAW) and Fundación CERMI Mujeres. The Committee thanked UN entities and other bodies for their information and acknowledged progress in working methods and hybrid session planning. Highlights included a discussion on women's representation in decision-making, five decisions on individual communications, and key exchanges with various stakeholders. The Committee offered its condolences for the victims of the earthquake in Syria and Turkey.

85th Session, 8 to 26 May 2023.

The CEDAW committee reviewed eight State party reports, adopted concluding observations, and held informal meetings with NGOs and NHRIs. The Committee expressed gratitude for detailed information from UN entities and intergovernmental bodies, including contributions from UN country teams. A notable highlight was the joint review with the Committee on the Rights of the Child for Sao Tome and Principe. Progress was made in harmonising working methods, developing recommendations on gender-based violence and women's participation in decision-making, and preparatory work on gender stereotyping. Task forces on Afghanistan and Ukraine analysed relevant information and prepared for follow-up visits. The Committee also adopted three follow-up assessments and three final decisions on individual communications and advanced several inquiry proceedings. Positive interactions occurred with UN-Women, the Committee on the Rights of the Child, and the Special Rapporteur on violence against women and girls.



86th Session, 9 to 27 October 2023.

The CEDAW committee reviewed nine State party reports, including a provisional review of Nicaragua and requested an exceptional report from the Democratic Republic of the Congo on conflict-related sexual violence. They held meetings with NGOs and NHRIs, noted high engagement, and received valuable information from UN entities. Progress was made in harmonising working methods, planning general recommendations, and addressing gender-based violence. Task forces on gender stereotyping and gender/sex self-identification made headway in their respective areas. The Committee also analysed gender persecution in Afghanistan and received briefings on the situation in Ukraine. They adopted statements on Israel-Palestine peace and safeguarding girls' health, conducted follow-up assessments, and discussed inquiry proceedings. The session included fruitful events and exchanges with various UN bodies and experts.

4.5.3 United Nations – Vienna

IFBPW Triennium Report 2021 - 2024

This report is submitted by Rita Assogna, Main Representative, IFBPW United Nations Vienna



During the last three years I have represented IFBPW-International at the United Nations Vienna.

In Vienna there are two UN-Commissions reporting to ECOSOC members: the Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) and the Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice (CCPCJ), which I have attended regularly as observer.

The two other UN Offices located in Vienna, namely the UN Office for Industrial Development (UNIDO) and the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) do not enjoy any close or ongoing relationship with ECOSOC members.

There are six NGO Committees in UN Vienna, namely: Committee on Ageing, Committee on Peace, Committee on Status of Women, Committee on Sustainable Development, Committee on Drugs and Committee on Family.

In 2023 I became the Main representative after the sad death of Marlene Parenzan, who had previously managed the entire organisation of work as the main representative. This meant in addition to the two Committees of which I was already a member, and in which I am on the boards (on Ageing and Peace), I also stepped up to take care of the two Committees of whom Marlene was in charge: CSW (status of Women) and CSD (Sustainable development).

All four committees have held meetings almost once a month – partially in hybrid form to facilitate participation as much as possible - with the aim to provide a forum for NGOs interested in discussing and analysing the work of the UN intergovernmental bodies.



Since there are only two Commissions in the UN Vienna with which the NGOs are in contact, namely the Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) and the Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice (CCPCJ), in the last two years the NGO-Committees have considered that all their efforts should be aimed at working together with these two Commissions. This means that the NGO-Committees should either deal with problems associated with drugs or with crimes. Furthermore, the NGO-Committees should intensify contacts with each other to work together with the two Commissions.

As Vice Chair of the Committee on Ageing I was actively involved in the preparation of the side event "New form of Criminal Acts Against (and Abuse of) Older Persons - a Rapidly Growing Threat to Vulnerable Persons using ordinary and Advanced Communication Tools" on May 14th 2024, which received a considerable success. Furthermore, I was involved in the preparation of the IDOP 2022 and 2023 (International Day of Older Persons) which takes place on October 1st every year. I was invited to participate in the "Celebration of the 75th Anniversary of CoNGO" in Vienna (28 April 2023) and also in the "Vienna Human Rights Conference and Human Rights Fair advertising the flyer of the working Paper Stop Non-State Torture: Enforcing Human Rights for Everyone" (10-11 December 2023). I also participated in the "Humanity at the Crossroads: Autonomous Weapons Systems and the Challenge of Regulation" on 29-30 April 2024 in Vienna.

4.5.4 United Nations – Food and Agriculture (FAO) Rome



IFBPW Triennium Report 2021 - 2024

This report is submitted in June 2024 by Cristina Gorajski Visconti BPW-representative to Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) / Chair of Standing Committee Agriculture Rome-Ancona

The Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) is a specialised Agency of the United Nations leading international efforts to defeat hunger. FAO's goal is to achieve food and security for all and make sure that people have regular access to enough high-quality food and lead active, healthy lives. The FAO helps governments and development agencies coordinate their activities to improve and develop agriculture, forestry, fisheries, and land and water resources.

IBPW is one of the international non-governmental organisations active at FAO for almost 20 years. IBPW has accumulated knowledge through discussions and collaborations with other NGOs and Civil Society associations that can help reflecting on the issue 'Role of Women in achieving the objectives contained in the 2030 Agenda' (the well-known SDGs).

It is generally considered, that the efforts in meeting the Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 1 of defeating hunger and poverty have been pushed back by the COVID-19 Pandemic, which has devastated lives and livelihoods. In addition, efforts in poverty reduction have been increasingly harmed by environmental disasters, political tensions, war and violence and this is why the implementation of all the SDGs is only 12% on track!



Attending the FAO in Rome it was possible to be regularly informed about international agricultural conditions and to be able to transform issues and topics into Advocacy programs and projects for the benefit of all BPW members.

In person and online sessions are the most important opportunities for the UN-system to work with Member States and other institutions (from Movements, Academia, Groups, to Private sector).

Since the COVID-19 pandemic, meetings have been held in hybrid mode or totally online. This provides the opportunity to observe and participate with the FAO, and other Rome Based Agencies like International Fund for Agriculture Development (IFAD) and the World Food Program (WFP), to understand the leveraging of joint funding mechanisms and the development of policy tools to facilitate the localisation and integration of the Agrifood systems approach based on UN development frameworks for Actions at the global, regional and country level.

As representative of BPWI I attended specialised meetings:

- FAO Conference and working groups held in person and online recently convened by CSIP Mechanism (https://www.csm4cfs.org/).
- The Committee for Food Security (CFS) Plenary #51 was held in Rome in October and was adjourned in November to conclude the discussions and adopt the Final Report. The 10 page long adopted document contains very important recommendations, namely:
 - Stressing the need to refrain from using food and water as weapons of war in conflict areas, and
 - Endorsement of the CFS Voluntary Guidelines 23/51/3 on Gender Equality and the Empowerment of women and girls in the context of Food security and Nutrition as a key State agreed global policy framework in support of countryled efforts towards achieving food security and nutrition. With involvement of women, girls and youth.

Considering the non-binding nature of the document, this will be presented to the UN General Assembly through ECOSOC to ensure wide dissemination to all relevant UN agencies, and Commissions, including the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW).

During this triennium as BPW Main representative, as well as during my time as Coordinator of the Ad Hoc Group of INGOs at FAO (come to end in 2022) I have witnessed how clear the importance of Agriculture is as an irreplaceable human activity. It has long been said 'there will be no food security without Rural Women'. I am proud to have proposed to BPW International to establish a Standing Committee Agriculture (with very valuable advice from members representing rural women almost all over the world)

My activities in 2023 were severely limited due to the inability to attend meetings in person but I assured connection to online meetings especially those concerning contributions to CFS working groups (on food, women, NGOs) and the FAO Global Forum on Food Security and Nutrition (FSN Forum).



Agriculture is an important part of Humanitarian Aid, and particularly for women who fall into the technology gap and who remain 'offline' in many zones worldwide.

With BPW Clubs, I implemented the dissemination of Programs and Projects in Agriculture and encouraged Actions and Cooperation at national level also using the contacts offered by Gèraldine Crevat during the BPW Intercontinental Meetings.

A very interesting response was received for our Kitchen Gardening, started by BPW Lebanon members and adopted in different zones (more information: https://www.bpw-international.org/update-kitchen-gardening-benefits/)

Conclusions

Quoting from a speech by FAO Director General last year emphasising the role of young people, and rural women currently busy in the Family Farming tasks (visit https://www.fao.org/familyfarming-decade/home/en/):

"The bottom line is that all of us can act effectively and efficiently, in a coherent manner and with greater compassion, by speaking up and influencing decision-makers to ensure no-one is left behind. We can also waste less food, eat nutritious, seasonal food and care for our natural resources like soils and water."

The speech was presented to the 194 members States and recognised Non-State Actors.

For IBPW together with other women-lead organisations, the proposals in favour of achieving the SDGs by leaving no one behind require Alliances and Collaborations. To radically reinvent our food systems, we must understand and correctly interpret the positive signs of implementation coming from rural societies. Crop and livestock farmers, fishers, pastoralists, producers and small retailers-especially women are turning to innovative ideas and digital technologies.

Improvements in production and less waste keeps more money in our pockets also helping to reverse environmental degradation. Agrifood systems can be transformed ... Leaving no one behind. So, there is room for BPW International to confirm and implement our special set of Actions and Cooperations from our Federations/Members that can prepare environmental services and train Agents for change to contribute to the Agrifood system transformation. I remain available for further information and to collaborate where appropriate.



4.5.4 United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural III Organisation (UNESCO)



IFBPW Triennium Report 2021 - 2024

This report is submitted on 29 June 2024 by Marie-Claude Machon-Honoré, IBPW Main Representative at UNESCO.

After 2 years' mandate as Chair of the International Conference of NGOs & President of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee, I ran for the ICNGO Elections in December 2020 and was re-elected on behalf of IFBPW (2021-22) as member of the NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee, in the first ballot for Europe & North America regional seat, with Lesha Witmer as alternate.



As Representative of the Liaison Committee to the CCNGO-Education 2030 Coordination Group since 201, I kept on pushing for SDG 4-5-6-17 at the HPL SDG4-SC. I had IFBPW registered as member of the CCNGO-Ed2030 and was nominated Lead of Education & Advocacy group of BPW-UN SC.

I thus pursued conducting collective consultation with NGOs across sectors including IFBPW for inputs from countries, inter-alia, on the Futures of Education, the Independent Report of the CCNGO-Ed 2030, the Berlin draft Declaration on ESD, Paris Declaration and co-construction of UNESCO Global Cooperation Mechanism on Education up to the UNESCO pre-Transforming Education Summit in June 2022 and UN TES in September 2022.

I facilitated the presence of Young BPW representatives, connecting them to the CCNGO Coordination members of the HPL-UN-TES Advisory Committee. The UN TES was a key political process, with youth as central actors and education at the top of the global political agenda of governments. We supported a call for commitment to action to achieve SDG 4 targets including, inter alia, Inclusive Education, Adult Learning, Women's and Girls' Education. CCNGO/CSOs members enabled a strong voice, calling for a real transformation of education, framed within a rights-based, inter-generational, climate-saving and gender-transformative agenda and BPW International was part of this.

Further to the TES and Futures of Education, IFBPW contributed written inputs to the zero draft of the Pact of the Future based on the CCNGO-Ed 2030 collectively revised Draft, on 12-02-2024.

As member of the Liaison Committee & CCNGO-Ed 2030 CG, I was invited by UNESCO-NGO major partners, inter alia, the CMAtlv (Lifelong Learning World Committee) to speak at its 6th international hybrid forum, on the Role and Engagement of Civil Society Organisations in the Futures of Education as well as co-ordinate & moderate a workshop on Gender Equality, inviting BPW IDF to speak and Women Organisation partners.



I delivered a key note speech "The Arts at the heart of Education-Going beyond our differences for the sake of Humanity and Peace" for the In SEA's General Assembly (June2022), sharing BPW International diverse actions through cooperation.

As Observer to the UNESCO'S 41ST General Conference on behalf of IFBPW, I took the floor on 11 -11- 2021 before the Education Commission to urge UNESCO and delegations to further develop gender specific programs across sectors to accelerate girls' women's learning like the WWAP new flagship project and coalition of which BPW is a member; for gender equality in the water domain; and to acknowledge and upscale initiatives from partners, like BPW International STEM Task Force members from Houston, Gagliato, Paris, NYC, Kigali (Rwanda), Abuja (Nigeria), sharing knowledge that resulted in implementing new classes and after-school programs training hundreds of African girls in STEM and climate actions.

After participating in all key UNESCO meetings on Education as Observer from the Berlin Conference up to the July Global Education Meeting, I was a panellist addressing the role of partnerships with the Coordination group in the online 10th Global Meeting of the Collective Consultation of NGOs-Education 2030 in December 2021.

I was actively involved with Lesha Witmer (WfWP advocacy Lead) in the Committee's reflection to update the documents on Strengthening Partnerships presented to the Chair of the Non-Governmental Partners Committee and approved by the 2020 ICNGO. We also participated in the consultation on the 2012 UNESCO Directives, advocating for reinitiating the thematic debates to open up a dialogue between NGOs and Member States at the NGP Committee as recommended by the 40th UNESCO General Conference.

BPW International was the Lead for the international NGO-UNESCO Liaison Committee first International Webinar on Science Technology and Innovation & Entrepreneurship in support of SDGs (24 May 2022). The theme was proposed by BPW International President to the 2018 ICNGO for an International UNESCO-NGO Forum postponed due to the pandemic and recommended by the 2020 ICNGO again. Together with Lesha Witmer, (WfWP advocacy Lead), we convened two round tables with UNESCO Heads of Education, Inclusion & Gender Equality and WWAP as key note speakers and partners, and high level panellists from CSOs and Academia, with a focus on Arica. A young member of BPW Benin-Cottonou was invited as panellist on the digital opportunities and entrepreneurship. Given the success of the webinar and need for more girls and women to get an education in STEM -STI at academic and vocational levels. We elaborated a recommendation for adoption by the 2022 ICNGO, on a follow-up to the first international webinar on STI & Entrepreneurship, to continue mobilising multi-stakeholders and NGOs across sectors.

BPW International ran for the 2022 ICNGO Elections for the Liaison Committee for the 3rd time and shortly lost the elections with 2nd best score for the regional seat and at large. It was a significant change in our approach of work and advocacy at UNESCO but it enabled new actions through cooperation, strengthening our bilateral partnerships with the sectors to accelerate Gender Equality.

I co-organised & moderated a thematic session for the 2022 ICNGO on Education-The evolving role and future of CSOs and partnerships in the global movement, for the transformation of education in a fast changing and challenging world. We presented with high



level speakers of the CCNGO-Ed2030 coordination group and NGO partners, consolidating our partnerships & advocacy on Education as a Human Right.

Since the COVID 19 pandemic, UNESCO had been engaged in a multistakeholder approach and global coalitions through digital platforms like the Global Education Coalition.

Along this line, the Global conference on the Internet of Trust (21-23 February, 2023) was convened in a hybrid mode enabling debates in person and a vast online multi stakeholder consultation that BPW international contributed to regarding the Guidelines for the Regulation of Digital Platforms for Information as a Public Good. As one of the key UNESCO partners for Gender Equality, BPW International was invited by the UNESCO Education, Inclusion and Gender Equality section to share the call for nominations of the UNESCO Prize for Girls' and Women's Education (8 March 2023) among its network and submitted three candidatures-from Nepal, Biratnagar on Literacy and two from Nigeria (SHEcodesAJ & MIRAISHA project) in STEM. I facilitated their applications with UNESCO Education sector. UNESCO and BPW International are grateful for their hard work which shows BPW actions and commitment across countries to gender equality in and through Education, in STEM and with a Lifelong learning perspective. Nepal was the only candidate in 2024. After being invited to a virtual meeting (July 2023) by the Chief of Education, Inclusion, Gender Equality sector with the UNESCO-UNICEF stakeholder coalition for Gender Equality and Girls' and Women's Empowerment in and through Education, BPW International was included as member of the Advocacy group and its logo posted on the "Global Accountability Dashboard" launched at the 42nd General Conference.

With the support of UN VP, we organized a webinar to call for contributions of transformative actions and advocacy strategy (survey filled in on 12-January 2023) from BPW federations across countries to respond to this Call to Action for Gender Equality (UN TES 2022). As an Observer I was invited to the first online meeting for consultation on the revision of the 1974 Recommendation, and participated in the Inter-governmental Special Committee meeting on the Revision of the Recommendation on Education for International Understanding, Cooperation and Peace and Education relating to Human rights and Fundamental Freedoms (30 May-2 June 2023) at UNESCO. BPW was one of the few NGOS to take the floor to thank UNESCO for including NGOs in the process and to recall our attachment to human rights, advocacy for SDG4, Gender Equality and Peace.

A second session took place in person in July 2023 to finalise the revised text for adoption by the 42nd session of the General Conference as The Recommendation on Education for Peace, Human Rights and Sustainable Development. The Committee on Non-Governmental Partners of the Executive Board is the opportunity for NGO partners to make their actions in cooperation with UNESCO visible. I took the floor on behalf of BPW International at its 217th session, on our new actions through cooperation as aligned with UNESCO's programmes and priorities.

The 42nd session of the General Conference took place from November 7 to 22, 2023, at UNESCO Headquarters. Member States and Observers including BPW International were able to speak for 3 minutes (13 Nov 2023. 1pm) in the Plenary session of the general policy debate. A forum for partnerships took place in a dedicated space, allowing interventions of Collectives of NGO partners. BPW intervened as member of the collective group Voix des Filles, to present the advocacy and actions of BPW in CI and Francophone Africa (Burkina



Faso and Senegal) and for the 2023 celebration of the International Day of the Girls' Rights with the active contribution of BPW Bassam-Impérial president, member of the Voix des Filles Executive Bureau.

BPW is also active in the steering committee of the collective NGOs group-Sharing Dance for Peace-to celebrate the 2024 edition the International Day of Peace. I addressed the audience to mention the commitment of the Founder of BPW International to intercultural dialogue and Peace and key role of women in the resolution conflicts and negotiations for Peace.

On 14 December 2023, Partners of the Global Education Coalition were invited to attend the Formal Dialogue on the Evolving Right to Education in a lifelong perspective to foster a global consultation, and to take this Initiative forward. The Formal Dialogue centred on the evolving right to education, recognising education as a fundamental human right that needs to be protected and promoted throughout life. It reflected on persisting key challenges in education, such as equity and inclusion, gender equality and also the relevance of the existing framework and the need of its adaption to changing global dynamics like digitalisation and climate change.

The 15th NGO-UNESCO International Forum was the opportunity for BPW International President, Dr Catherine Bosshart to come to UNESCO as invited panellist with three Women's International NGOs 'Presidents, to address the question of Transforming Mentalities, January, 25, 2024. It was also the opportunity to meet with UN VP Chularat Toyting for the first time in person and exchange on our work.

On November 7, 2023, together with Nolwenn Leroy, newly appointed representative to UNESCO, we attended the launch of the Report-UNESCO in Action for Gender Equality to address pressing challenges with solutions and data. BPW attended the High Level panel discussion on the occasion of the 30th Anniversary of Salamanca Statement, organised by UNESCO,13 March 2024.Despite significant progress in making education inclusive in the last decade, deep disparities remain. Millions of children and youth are still denied their right to education. Poverty, geographical location, gender, language, disability, ethnicity, migration or displacement status continue to dictate and limit education opportunities. It is in this context that BPW International signed a joint NGO letter to Human Rights Council members regarding the resolution to advance the right to education through a new optional protocol to the Convention of the Rights of the Child.

On 29 May 2024, I attended the dialogue with the Laureates of I'Oreal and 17 June 2024 was another occasion to take stock of the Transforming Education Summit (TES); the Global Platform for Gender Equality held a side event to showcase countries' transformative actions in taking forward the TES Call to Action on advancing gender equality and girls' and women's rights in and through education. The last questionnaire for consultation on 43/C5 that was filled in by BPW International was about the relevance of UNESCO in these troubled times. Its role as Laboratory of Ideas on the Futures with the first setting standard instrument on the Ethics of AI at UN level, its Convening Power for SDG 4 and partnerships, with priorities on Gender Equality, Youth & Africa is more necessary than ever.

UN Representative Reports

4.5.5. United Nations Industrial Development Organisation (UNIDO)

IFBPW Triennium Report 2021 - 2024

This report is submitted on 21 June 2024 by Beatriz Vidigal Xavier da Silveira, IBPW Main Representative at UNIDO São Paulo, Brazil.

The UNIDO agency in Brazil, is located in Brasília. UNIDO is working hard in the energy sector, a sector that I know well because of my professional activity.

UNIDO implemented in this triennial the GEF Biogás Brasil project, which is led by the Ministry of Science, Technology and Innovations (MCTI) and financed by the Global Environment Fund (GEF) and has the International Center for Renewable Energy (CIBiogás) as the main executor entity.

As part of this project, several biogas plants managed by women received investment to purchase equipment and services to promote efficiency and safety improvement. The Women of Biogas network, created by Brazilian professionals in the sector and incubated by Instituto 17, was a Brazilian Highlight during the World Biogas Summit in the United Kingdom, and won the award in the AD Hero of the Year category ("Hero of the Year in Anaerobic Digestion") in recognition of the organisation's catalytic role in the country. I highlight that UNIDO's role in Brazil in recognising and developing the work of women entrepreneurs in the energy sector is evident, as was promised to us (BPW) years ago.

Over the years, BPW International has contributed significantly to the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UNESCAP). Despite the challenges posed by COVID-19 and other crises, BPW International has prioritised its efforts to promote gender equality and women's empowerment, aligning closely with UNESCAP's goals.

BPW's Contribution to UNESCAP

BPW International aims to develop women's professional and leadership potential at all levels. It promotes inclusive and sustainable development in the Asia-Pacific region, focusing on women's empowerment with these goals: UN Women Asia-Pacific WEPs Awards - two members of BPW Thailand got this award for Leadership Commitment to a Gender-inclusive Workplace.

Advancing Gender Equality with Sustainable Development Goal 5: UNESCAP recognises gender equality is essential for sustainable development, making BPW's contributions highly relevant.

Economic Development: Empower women economically to broader economic growth. BPW's programs enhance women's entrepreneurial skills for regional economic development and poverty reduction.

Capacity Building: BPW's focus on education and training increases women's capacity to participate in the economy and society, aligning with UNESCAP's emphasis on building inclusive societies.

Policy Influence: BPW influences policies at national and regional levels, supporting UNESCAP's mandate to foster policy dialogue and cooperation among member states, civil society, and stakeholders.



Key Contributions of BPW to UNESCAP's Work (2021-2023)

Digitalisation and Women's Empowerment - Digital Literacy Programs: BPW launched several initiatives to bridge the digital divide for women in the Asia-Pacific region to enhance thousands of women with essential digital skills, enabling them to access information, participate in online education, and engage in digital economies.

Online Business Training: In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, BPW adapted its business training programs to online platforms, empowering women entrepreneurs to leverage digital tools for business development, marketing, and e-commerce.

Climate Action and Environmental Sustainability -Green Entrepreneurship Initiatives: BPW has promoted green entrepreneurship by supporting women-led businesses focusing on sustainable practices.

Climate Policies Advocacy: BPW has participated in UNESCAP forums and conferences, advocating for gender-responsive climate policies and promoting the women's perspectives in climate action plans.

Financing for Women - Financial Program Access: BPW has partnered with financial institutions to develop women's access to finance programs, including financial literacy training, credit facilitation, and women-led startups support.

Gender-Responsive Budgeting Advocacy: BPW has advocated for gender-responsive budgeting at national and regional levels, ensuring that public budgets address the needs of females.

Integration of Key Events and Initiatives from 2021 to 2023:

2021: Building Back Better: The 77th Commission session (CS77) of UNESCAP, held on 26-29 April 2021, focused on "Building back better from crises through regional cooperation in Asia and the Pacific." This session analysed the socio-economic impacts of the pandemic and set out a policy agenda for building back better with four critical interconnected areas: broadening social protection, investing in a sustained recovery, strengthening connectivity and supply chains, and mending the relationship with nature.

2022: Agenda for Sustainable Development: The 78th Commission session (CS78), held online and on-site in Bangkok from 23-27 May 2022, focused on "A Common Agenda to Advance Sustainable Development in Asia and the Pacific." This session outlined pathways for sustainable post-pandemic recovery, emphasised digital opportunities, financial resources, climate action, and gender equality. The Bangkok Declaration commemorated the 75th Anniversary of UNESCAP, underscoring the need for a people-centric approach and new partnerships.

The Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC), (CEPAL as Spanish acronym), which is headquartered in Santiago Chile, is one of the five regional commissions of the United Nations. It was founded with the purpose of contributing to the



economic development of the region, reinforcing economic ties among countries and with other nations, and promoting social development as one of its primary objectives.

Brief summary of some UNECLAC virtual meetings which were focused in our advocacy:

2023 - October 5th Session of the Regional Conference on Social Development in Latin America and the Caribbean. In the "2014-2023 decade, the average economic growth was just 0.8%, average growth in the number of people employed was 1.3%, marking the lowest level in 70 years. In the region, 47,9% of workers are employed informally and women represented 69,8% of all inactive persons in 2022. According to ECLAC's data, a high proportion of households lives in conditions of vulnerability: in 2021, nearly 60% of Latin America's population was in the low-income stratum, meaning it lived with income below 1.8 poverty lines, and nearly 80% had income below three times the poverty line"

2023-October 65th Meeting of the Presiding Officers of the Regional Conference on Women in Latin America and the Caribbean "Delegations from participant countries shared their current situation regarding: - indigenous women, afro descendent women, - rural women, women with disabilities/living with HIV, - migrant women, young women and LGBTI+people and how they have been working on programs, education, feminist movements, sexual and reproductive rights, care systems, equal conditions of work, equal participation of women in position of leadership"

2023-November 16 days: UN Secretary-General and ECLAC staff join the UNITE Campaign to eliminate violence against women and girls "Orange colour has become the symbol of the campaign which runs from the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. According to UNECLAC report at least 4,050 women were victims of femicide in 26 countries in the region"

2023-December Child marriages and early unions: inequality and poverty among women, girls and adolescents in Latin America and the Caribbean "general information of the region with early unions which are more prevalent than marriages, some consequences, socioeconomic inequalities and ethnicity as an important factor"

2024-January ECLAC and ILO: low economic growth in the region affected the dynamism of labour markets during 2023 the latest report published by both UN agencies informed about the increase in the regional employment rate recorded in 2022, which was significantly attenuated in the first six months of 2023.

2024-February Briefing for Ministers and High-level Authorities of the Machineries for the Advancement of Women in Latin America and the Caribbean about CSW68. During the event, the document the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and the Regional Gender Agenda in Latin America and the Caribbean Gender Indicators to 2023 was presented. And it was also shared progress and information from the region to support the participation of governments in the deliberations of the CSW.

2024-February and March Enhancing Statistical Capacity through the Global Training on Small Area Estimation: Lessons from Asia Pacific, Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean. This meeting recognises the importance of data for informed decision-making. The objectives were to facilitate the knowledge exchange among researchers, statisticians and



policymakers, so participants could gain insights into methodologies, best practices and collaboration with other institutions.

2024-April Panel discussion: The fundamental role of women and gender mainstreaming in the implementation of the Escazú Agreement. During the Third meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Escazú Agreement, the Draft decision on mainstreaming the gender perspective, the Draft decision on the action plan on human rights defenders in environmental matters in Latin America and the Caribbean, and the Draft decision on national implementation were reviewed.

2024-April Preparatory meeting for the third meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Escazú Agreement (preCOP3): "The Parties approved the Action Plan on Human Rights Defenders in Environmental Matters. At the COP3, the States Parties approved a draft decision in which they welcome all measures, initiatives and activities aimed at integrating and strengthening the gender perspective in matters related to the Escazú Agreement. They also encourage Parties to continue to promote the full and effective participation of women in all their diversity, including indigenous women, and the incorporation of a gender equality perspective into the Agreement's implementation "

2024-May Presentation of the Project "Strengthening Feminist Foreign Policy and Feminist International Cooperation through a community of practice among Chile, Colombia, Mexico, Germany and ECLAC. The region has shown significant progress in terms of Feminist Foreign Policy. Chile, Colombia and Mexico are currently three countries that have a Feminist Foreign Policy. Mexico was the first country to adopt it in 2020 and on the other hand, Chile is the first South America country to adopt it and working on it since 2022 and officially presenting it in June 2023. The objective is to establish the principle of equality and non-discrimination as a guiding axis. Later in 2023, as part of the commemoration of Women's Day, Chile launched its first Feminist Foreign Policy Action Plan. Among other milestones in the region, Colombia presented its Feminist Foreign Policy in March 2024 during the CSW68. This is the first triangular cooperation measure on gender equality and feminist ECLAC participates it. https://www.cepal.org/en cooperation in which in https://www.cepal.org/es.

4.5.9. World Health Organisation (WHO)

It is for me a great honour to serve as the Representative at the United Nations in Geneva. Throughout the years 2021-2024, I have been able to follow the work and accompanying the work of the UN in various forms and contexts.



Extract:

It is more than important to bring BPW International together with other important international organisations, such as in 2023 and 2024 with the World Federation for Mental Health (WFMH), which has a consultative status with the WHO and which has UN representatives at the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) in New York, USA and whose future president Prof. Dr. Sabine Bährer-Kohler will be from 2025-2027.

From September 2023 to springtime 2024 we had an intensive exchange about the Global Platform for Gender Equality In and Through Education's Initiative and a possible contribution of another international NGO. Prof. Dr. Sabine Bährer-Kohler gave an international presentation about BPW International and the Global Platform for Gender Equality In and Through Education's Initiative.

In April 2023 the BPW International member project for Good Health & Wellness for Woman had an outstanding event about health and resilience in Switzerland. It was a great pleasure for Prof. Dr. Sabine Bährer-Kohler to support this valuable event.

In July 2022 Prof. Dr. Sabine Bährer-Kohler participated at the session of the Security Council and on the situation of the Sahara/West Africa at the World Kiswahili Language Day. She was impressed about the situations and concerns of the different countries. The speakers focussed on the very complex situation of women and networks.

In 2021 the Civil Society Unit, Department of Global Communications, United Nations informed about the announcements for the Civil Society Representatives. Prof. Dr. Sabine Bährer-Kohler pointed out, among other things, that one candidate in particular included gender equality.

4.5.10 Conference of Non-Governmental Organisations in Consultative Relationship with the United Nations (CoNGO)

This report is submitted by Dr Catherine Bosshart, IBPW Main Representative at CoNGO.

The Conference of Non-Governmental Organisations in Consultative Relationship with the United Nations (*Co*NGO) is an independent, international membership association founded in 1948, the year of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. As a non-governmental organisation (NGO) in general consultative status with the UN Economic and Social Council, this organisation's work relates to the entire United Nations System: the Secretariat, Agencies, Treaty Bodies, Regional Commissions, Institutes, Summits and World Conferences.

CoNGO is an umbrella organisation and its membership consists of diverse NGOs working in consultation with the United Nations, in collaboration with each other, and in cooperation with other like-minded stakeholders. The Organisation is also representing the interests of its



members at the UN which is crucial as the member States seek in general to restrain the influence of the NGO's.

What is IFBPW's role in CoNGO?

IFBPW was during two periods of legislation represented by PIP Liz Benham as Treasurer on the Board of CoNGO. During the 26th General Assembly in November 2021, IFBPW was again elected on the Board for the period of 2021 to 2025. As I have often attended the CoNGO General Assemblies and Board Meetings, I was familiar with CoNGO's structure and functions. Unfortunately, I was never able to be present physically at the Board meetings but participated virtually. I was active in the working group membership, trying to make CoNGO more known and attractive for new member organisations.

On the 27th of February 2024, the President of the 78th General Assembly of the UN, Dennis Frances, former Ambassador of Trinidad and Tobago to the UN, held a Town Hall Meeting at the UN of Geneva before he visited the Human Rights Council. Cyril Ritchie and I presented our concerns in regard of the role of the NGOs at the UN agencies. President Frances thanked all the NGOs for their work and promised to support our work.

For IFBPW is very important to be represented in this organism as our voice within the UN System is much stronger united with other NGO's.

4.5.11. Council of Europe (CoE)

IFBPW Report – Spring Session 2024 : Strasbourg, 8 -10 April 2024 Spring Session 08 April

This report is submitted on the 25th June 2024 by Pinella Bombaci, BPW Main Representative at the Council of Europe.

The first part of the Council of Europe Spring Session on 9-10 April 2024 was dedicated to the speech of the newly elected Commissioner for Human Rights, Mr.Michael O'Flaherty.

He was delighted to have this opportunity, considering civil society as crucial to the promotion and protection of human rights. This is his speech :

"Dear friends, Thank you for inviting me to this exchange of views with the Council of Europe's Conference of International non-Governmental Organisations. This is my first public address since taking up office, and I am truly delighted to have such an opportunity, as civil society is crucial to the promotion and protection of human rights. NGOs, trade unions, academia, the media, cultural practitioners and faith communities are both the lubricant and a key component of the human rights protection system. Several examples illustrate this. "The genesis of every

human rights norm or idea has come from the heart of civil society – from the reflection on a Universal Declaration of Human Rights by philosophers in Paris to the UN Convention against Torture, which was heavily influenced by the work of Amnesty International. The fingerprints of civil society can also be seen in the development of our institutional frameworks. I saw this in the negotiations for the establishment of the International Criminal Court, where civil society was instrumental in achieving this remarkable goal. And civil society is a critical watchdog of the human rights system, challenging it to perform at its best and to maintain its integrity. This aspect is crucial at all levels, from the local to the international. It is a driving force for reform, often at the forefront of the establishment of national human rights structures. In the particular context of the Council of Europe, it plays a crucial role in litigation before the European Court of Human Rights. Finally, and perhaps most importantly, civil society's heroic defence of human rights, often at considerable personal risk, deserves the deepest respect and gratitude. Staying with the issue of risk and danger, I acknowledge that these are challenging times for civil society, marked by the pressures of excessive regulation, denial of access to decisionmakers, threats and intimidation, and restrictions on such fundamental human rights, as freedom of assembly, expression, and movement. Such adversities must be seen for what they are: calculated efforts to instil fear and silence civil society. These threats are not evenly spread. They are very specific to certain geographies and to certain issues. If you are working on environmental issues, you can face very serious threats and attacks. If you stand up for the human rights of LGBTI people or of women, you can find yourself in an extremely vulnerable and dangerous situation. Moreover, faith-based groups, such as the Jewish or Muslim communities, face intense scrutiny and pressure. In the midst of these challenges, the need to protect civil society has risen to unprecedented levels. As Commissioner, I pledge to prioritise the defence of civil society, continuing the work of my predecessors, and in particular of Dunja Mijatović, who spared no effort in supporting human rights defenders. What will my pledge look like in practice? Here are five elements. First, I intend to engage with civil society through continuous dialogue and roundtable discussions, and to consult with them on issues related to specific countries or themes, to ensure that their perspectives are integrated into my analysis and understanding. Second, I will integrate the civil society perspective into the work program where relevant, to ensure that issues with a civil society component are thoroughly addressed. Third, a hallmark of the Commissioner's role is to support those at risk, and I intend to follow in the footsteps of my predecessors by standing by human rights defenders and rights holders and offering my support wherever possible. Fourth, I will work closely with partners, including the relevant UN Special Rapporteurs, to strengthen our collective efforts to defend civil society. Finally, my engagement will extend internally within the Council of Europe, aligning with key initiatives such as the Secretary General's roadmap on civil society, to ensure a coherent and supportive approach. This first experience of the NGO world revealed to me the central role of civil society in shaping a better world, a lesson that has stayed with me to this day. I can assure you that the lessons I have learned since then, and throughout my professional life, will continue to inform my commitment to stand with you in our shared quest for a better world." This light must remain lit on the many problems that still afflict the world of women, and we must be very careful so that the light of the NGO is never turned off! There are problems that still exist and that deserve to be solved: • gender equality • violence against women • Cyber violence, with the artificial intelligence issue • the problem of migrants • the problem of multireligiousness and how to encourage interreligious dialogue • the importance of teaching respect for human rights • Criminal liability for human rights violations • Lack of protection policies'.



09 April Gerhard Ermischer has been re-elected President of the Conference of INGOs

"But much has been done to foster the Conference of INGO's (CINGO's) role and it is now increasingly consulted on new instruments and policies, including by the Committee of Ministers and the Parliamentary Assembly. The participation of civil society in the Council of Europe activities was recognised as an important objective at the Reykjavik Summit but we now need to climb a steep mountain".

On 9 April, the Conference held elections to designate its governing bodies. Gerhard Ermischer was re-elected President to lead the Conference for another three year mandate together with a new Standing Committee composed of five women and five men. "We are experiencing challenging times, marked inter alia by the recent COVID crisis, Russia's full scale invasion of Ukraine and a steadily hostile environment for civil society in many countries", Mr Ermischer said. "But much has been done to foster the Conference of INGO's (CINGO's) role and it is now increasingly consulted on new instruments and policies, including by the Committee of Ministers and the Parliamentary Assembly. The participation of civil society in the Council of Europe activities was recognized as an important objective at the Reykjavik Summit but we now need to climb a steep mountain".

Work will start immediately on the preparation of the three-year strategic plan for 2025-2027 to be finalised and adopted at CINGO's next session in the autumn, encouraging online meeting systems for constant contacts. As Vice Presidents were elected:

The proposal aims to strengthen education and democracy, inclusion and sustainability, within the Council of Europe recognising education as a crucial tool for democratic self-governance and societal prosperity. It emphasises the need to address challenges such as universal



access to high-quality education, equity, and non - discrimination, particularly focusing on reducing gaps between social backgrounds and integrating new paradigms like digital access.

The committee also highlighted the importance of minority rights and equal opportunities in education and research, focusing on the right to quality education for all. Another important action is the work of the Committee of experts on the rights of the child. Promoting the rights of the child is crucial for our future. In the Convention on the Rights of the Child, a child means every human being below the age of eighteen years; babies, children and adolescents. Art.2 To ensure that this child is protected against all forms of discrimination or punishment on the basis of the status, activities, expressed opinions, or beliefs of the child's parents. Art.3 In all actions concerning children, whether undertaken by courts of law, administrative authorities and so on, the best interests of the child shall be a primary consideration. Art.8 To respect the right of the child to preserve his or her identity, including nationality, name and family relations Art.9 To maintain child's personal relations and direct contact with both parents on a regular basis, except if it is contrary to the child's best interest. To ensure recognition of the principle that both parents have common responsibilities for the upbringing and development of the child. Art.11 To combat the illicit transfer of children abroad Art.20 A child temporally or permanently deprived of his or her family environment, or whose own best interests cannot be allowed to remain in that environment, shall be entitled to special protection and assistance. Art.21 The system of adoption shall ensure that the best interests of the child shall be the paramount consideration. Art.22 To ensure that a child who is seeking refugee status or who is considered a refugee shall, whether unaccompanied or accompanied by his parents or her parents or by another person, receive appropriate protection and humanitarian assistance.

Particular attention was also dedicated to the topic of artificial intelligence. The following needs were represented:

- Speed
- Legal rules to protect man and his rights
- Action by the Council of Europe in synergy with other European bodies
- Recommendation to the European Committee of Human Rights Finally, war crimes were discussed and some concepts were shared:
- Educate young people against violence
- Find peace again Don't accept the unacceptable
- Peace is possible and non-governmental organisations together with the COE must play an important role, intervening to alleviate the consequences, helping the people involved and especially the children; it is a never-ending job.

Closely connected is the concept of spreading the importance of sport among young people and not just for physical well-being. Sport can prove to be an exceptional tool for disseminating important values among young people such as equality, acceptance of other cultures, the integration of migrants, against discrimination, poverty, homophobia and racism. Human rights are universal, indivisible and interdependent (Vienna Declaration adopted at the World Conference on Human Rights in 1993). Also social, economic and cultural rights need, fullfledged, to be implemented. The Committee also highlighted the importance of minority rights and equal opportunities in education and research, particularly focusing on the right to quality education for all, it emphasizes the necessity of cooperation between formal, nonformal and informal education sectors, aiming to enhance the implementation of relevant tools and policies to support democratic culture and education across Europe.

PREFACE

Amendments to these Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) are subject to the following:

Motion to adopt the new Constitution to permit BPW International's registration at the XXVII BPW International Congress, Helsinki, 21 June 2011:

- 1. BPW International requires registration in Geneva as per the motions and action required following the new Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual passed at the XXVII BPW International Congress, Helsinki, Fifth and Sixth Business Sessions, 21 June 2011 (Congress Proceedings)
- 2. As noted under the proceedings, the Constitution and Regulations as adopted are to comply with:

Swiss Civil Code: It is a requirement of registration in Geneva that this Constitution and these Regulations comply with the Swiss Civil Code; the relevant articles in the 2010 version of the Code are Articles 60 to 79.

BPW International:

Was registered at the CAGI – Geneva Welcoming Center – following Congress 2011 and has been maintained by the yearly submission of the audited annual financial statements of BPW International and the Congress Proceedings 2011 and 2014.

On the 3 March 2024, formal notification was received by the International President to inform her that BPW International had been removed from the CAGI Registration due to the non-submission of the proceedings 2017 and 2021 as one of the minimum requirements for compliance.

For compliance to meet Swiss Civil Code New Mandatory Clauses have been added:

- □ The Articles of Association to comply with Swiss Civil Code.
- Preliminary Clauses, to identify all supplementary documents that are to be read with the Constitution and Regulations, but not included in such.
- □ In order to comply with legal provisions, the "Affiliates" clause is renamed as "Members". This is because an Association is necessarily made up of Members.
- All Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs (where no Federation is present) are permitted to vote.
- □ The Executive or one-fifth (1/5) of the Members of BPW International (the Association), in accordance with art. 64 para. 3 CC (2010), may at any time request that an Extraordinary General Assembly be held, specifying the purpose thereof.



- Power of Representation, the International President and one or more Executive signatories
- Submission of the 'minutes' of the business sessions of the General Assembly, with a copy of the new Executive signatories, are to be submitted to the Registration office three (3) months after the International Congress.
- The Constitution and Regulations are to be updated with all resolutions adopted in the General Assembly and signed by the outgoing Executive signatories in the last business session of the General Assembly.

General Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations:

Following the submission of the existing BPW International Constitution and Regulations (2021), the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva, would not accept these and through the Welcoming Centre (CAGI) the recommendation for a review to bring these governing documents up to date was advised by the legal representatives.

A specialist Swiss legal practice who have assisted NGOs in obtaining formal Registration undertook a review to bring them in line with the original 2010 Articles (which BPW International voted on) and the updated Articles that were undertaken as a direct link to the AMLA 2023.

Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations have included rewording, sections relocated, and information taken from the Procedure Manual and implemented into the Constitution and Regulations sections accordingly. Other items have been placed into the Procedure Manual. Updated Definitions combined and under Appendices.

The draft Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) are presented to the:

- The 31st General Assembly, St Kitts, November 2024 for review, debate, vote and adoption of the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes).
- These are then ratified, signed by the outgoing Executive members (as noted) and submitted to the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva, with a copy of the minutes from the business session(s) within three months and a copy of the list of new Executive signatories for the 2024-2027 Triennium.

In compliance with the Swiss Civil Code the amended Constitution and Regulations resolutions must be adopted at the General Assembly; this is as per our existing Constitution and Regulations.

To achieve the required deadlines for registration in Geneva by the 1st July 2024, in compliance with the revision of the Anti-Money Laundering Act (AMLA) and its implementing provisions (RO 2021 656):

- I. Since 1st January 2023, any association which primarily collects or distributes assets abroad, directly or indirectly, that are intended for charitable, religious, cultural, educational or social purposes is now subject to a compulsory registration with the Commercial register (Art. 61 para. 2 ch. 3 Civil Code, CC).
- II. Despite this (deliberately [Federal Council Message on the revision of the Anti-Money Laundering Act of 26 June 2019, FF 2019 5278]) broad legal basis, it should be noted that among the above-mentioned associations, only those that



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present a risk of money laundering or terrorist financing, due to the amount, origin, destination or use of the funds raised or distributed, are subject to this new registration requirement (Art. 61 para. 2ter CC a contrario).

BPW International is subject to clause (i) above.

The proposed amendments to the Constitution and Regulations, will be ratified and signed by the current Executive before the close of the last business session of the General Assembly and any future amendments to the Constitution and Regulations must follow the same procedure.

RATIONALE

In order to comply with legal provisions, it has been requested to rename the "Affiliates" clause as "Members". This is because an association is necessarily made up of members.

They have been grouped together with the definitions of the various Members in this clause in order to clarify the distinctions between Members from the outset.

A paragraph has been inserted on the obligation to keep a list of Members. From 1 January 2023, associations entered in the commercial register must have an up-to-date list of Members. This list must include the name and/or business name and address of the members and must be accessible at all times (art. 61a CC). In addition, the information and supporting documents (including those concerning a member who has been struck off) must be kept for 5 years. *Note the list is to be held by BPW International of its Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs and Individual Members.*

It is also proposed that directly after the definition of Members, the provisions relating to the joining and leaving of a Member is included into the Constitutions.

Art. 61a (Statues 2024)

- 1 Associations that are required to be entered in the commercial register shall keep a register in which the members are entered with their first name, surname or company name and address.
- 2 They shall maintain the directory in such a way that it can be accessed at any time in Switzerland.
- 3 They shall retain the details of each member and any supporting documents for five years after the member has been removed from the register.

The Executive will give the Affiliate concerned three months' notice upon receipt of such a complaint or allegation to enable that Affiliate to have the right to reply in writing or in person before a decision to remove the membership is made.

- An Affiliate has a right of appeal to the General Assembly. Such an appeal must be lodged within three (3) months of the removal decision. Upon the lodging of an appeal, the Affiliate will be re-instated pending the hearing of the appeal at the following General Assembly
- Any member of BPW International including any Federation, Affiliate Club or Individual Affiliate Member will cease to be a member and must cease using the name BPW in its title, immediately upon cessation of membership of BPW International for whatever reason. BPW International is the sole arbiter on the question of who is or who is not deemed a member in whatever form.

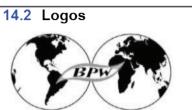

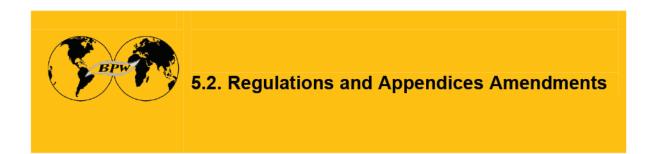

The next Congress will then be to the next Region who had submitted the appropriate documentation and received the approvals by the Executive Board.

RATIONALE

Regulation R9 and Procedure Manual 7.0 have been collated for inclusion into 3.1 International Congress as it states how the Congress location is selected and requirements for it to be held across the different regions.

There are specific new sections in respect to the Congress locations now being in specific order and the need to include in the Regulations what BPW International Executive must do if there is a requirement for the change of the location to an online (hybrid) General Assembly.

Incorporating Past International President, Dr. Chonchanok Viravan proposed amendments and rationale from 2021:

The world economy is changing dynamically. To bid 5 years ahead of Congress, any proposed budget would be inaccurate as value of the currency and cost of the expenditure can dramatically change. Experience with past Congress has shown that time to organize BPW International Congress, in extreme circumstance, can be in less than one year. So to conclude venue of Congress 2.5 years ahead of time should be adequate.

Also, when the bid is 5 years ahead of time, the Executive of host country is likely to change by the time of Congress. So the readiness of executive of the host country may change respectively.

This would allow International President and Executive Finance Officer, who are both responsible for the financial outcome of the Congress in their triennium, to be the one who make commitment regarding their financial decisions regarding Congress venues. It is unfair that they must deal with the consequence for financial decisions that they did made (make).

While rotation of Congress is a fair thing to do, but there should be room for exception if none of BPW affiliates in that region is ready to host BPW International Congress, they should not be forced to do so. The inadequate support of Host country, especially in fund raising and finding sponsors, can lead to poor financial performance of BPW International Congress. Therefore, it is best that BPW International Congress will be hosted by BPW Affiliate that are fully ready to assist BPW International.

8.5.3 Resolutions on financial expenditure or dues

Resolutions which refer to changes to BPW International financial expenditure or dues must be circulated to the International Board five (5) months before the General Assembly, with advice that any amendments to the resolution must be received within four (4) weeks. This is intended to allow any proposed amendments to the resolution from Affiliates to be circulated four (4) months before the General Assembly with the full list of resolutions.

8.6 Amendments to the Constitution, Regulations and Procedure Manual [R18]

Should the opportunity arise that the General Assembly business sessions of the International Congress could be live streamed, this would be at the discretion of the Executive based on a number of parameters (outlined in detail in the Procedure Manual):

- budgeted registration numbers for face-to-face attendees have been achieved for the International Congress, to ensure no financial risk/loss
- a specific registration cost associated to attend via a live stream recording of the business sessions only has been advised in writing to the participates before they register
- participants are unable to attend due to extreme circumstances the live stream sessions would permit those connected to be observers only with no speaking or voting rights.

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RATIONALE

The Regulative requirements around voting at a General Assembly are to be included into the specific section of the International Congress. The actual numbers for voting strength per Federations etc are to be included in the operation process under the Procedure Manual.

Lawyer's notes:

"..... it follows from the Civil Code (Art. 67 al. 1) that members must have equal voting rights at the General Meeting. This is not the case here. However, this provision is part of the law. According to certain authors, "a social inequality must however be justified and based on motivations that are not arbitrary or discriminatory in nature"). It is therefore potentially necessary to explain to the Commercial Registry why voting rights are provided for in this way. The same applies to the quorum applicable under article R3 3.8, which does not correspond to that of the Civil Code. You will also need to justify why this is the case."

Based on the review of the lawyers it has been proposed that a maximum of four (4) clubs in a country where there is no Federation (this is based on that a fifth club would equate to 100 members in the country and therefore they would become a Federation) would each have the right to vote. Under the existing voting numbers these would be required to be amended:

The number of voting delegates is:

- 500 or fewer members (ext 3) increase to 6
- 501 to 1,000 members (ext 4) increase to 7
- 1,001 to 2,000 members (ext 5) increase to 8
- 2,001 to 3,000 members (ext 6) increase to 9

and 1 additional delegate for every extra 1 to 3,000 members to a maximum of 15 delegates

Following the review of both the existing Constitution and Regulations and the Procedure Manual there were discrepancies on the number of votes per members, these are to be all updated and included in the Procedure Manual only.

The Constitution required further clarification on voting rights of PIP's and Chairs of Standing Committees if their Affiliate Federations or Affiliate Clubs had not paid their dues or any outstanding penalties:

- a PIP would have to pay her dues direct to BPW International to retain her voting rights
- Chair of Standing Committees would not be able to continue to hold their position or have voting rights if her Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club have not paid their dues
- Chairs of Standing Committees cannot be Individual Affiliate Members and have voting rights

The written proposal of the Executive or the International Board is sent by email to the Members entitled to vote through a Delegate at the General Assembly.
Members are given 20 working days to accept the written proposal in writing, by return e-mail. After this deadline, the written proposal is considered to have been rejected by the Member who has not responded in time and therefore their vote will be recorded as an abstention.

RATIONALE

Under our existing Regulations there are no rules around the decision-making process within the General Assembly. This is a mandatory requirement for inclusion into the amended Constitution and Regulations Statutes.



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It also includes an item that should a decision require approval from the International Board and Delegates who would be entitled to vote at a General Assembly then there is a specific process for this procedure.

If a Member/Delegate has not responded in time for a motion received in writing, their vote will be considered an abstention, not a 'no vote'. This is to ensure only votes recorded 'for' or 'against' are formally counted.

No vote received is considered the Members have abstained from voting.

	Mover / Seconder of Motions: The first speaker is the mover of the motion, usually have prepared the proposed resolution/motion and is in support of the motion going forward and the seconder provides additional support to the motion being presented.
	Office of the International President: each International President has the right to be provided with an Office, close to their home, in order to carry out all the tasks relating to BPW International (the Association). The Executive shall decide on the budget allocated for the rental or acquisition of such a place.
Past Presidents Past Presidents are Past Presidents of BPW International	Past International Presidents: Past International Presidents are Businesswomen and Professionals who have served as President of BPW International (the Association) in the past. The outgoing Former President has a place on the Executive for the first twelve (12) months of a triennium.
	Procedure Manual: The Procedure Manual contains additional regulatory standards, which supplement the Articles of Association and do not have to be included in the Articles of Association under Swiss law.



Property Property is real immovable property such as land or a building, other than rented premises used for the President's Office.
Standing Orders: The Standing Orders set out the procedures to be used during the BPW International Congress and International Board Meetings. The Standing Orders cover the rules for discussion, who may speak and who may vote. The conduct of the meeting is controlled by the general will of the membership, giving a majority decision after a full and fair consideration of the issues involved. The Standing Orders are designed to provide for constructive and democratic meetings to help, not hinder, the business of the meeting. 'Undue strictness' should never be allowed to intimidate members or limit full participation.
<u>Trustees</u> : A trustee is a person who holds the legal title of any property, assets, or group of assets on behalf of BPW International and will be their duty to manager on behalf of BPW International. A trustee may be appointed for additional purposes, such as bankruptcy, for a charity or for a trust fund.
<u>Ratified</u> : These Constitution and Regulations, following the adoption of all Constitution and Regulation amendments in the General Assembly, are to be updated and signed by the outgoing Executive for each respective Triennium and submitted, with a copy of the business session minutes, within three (3) months of close of Congress.
<u>Registration</u> : BPW International to be registered and all relevant documents to be submitted annually (financial audits) or every three years following BPW International's



Congress and General Assemblies. The Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) must be submitted in both English and French (as per 1939 resolutions) and language specified by the Registration office (e.g. French in Geneva).
<u>Regions</u> : There are five (5) regions within BPW International, each of which must host the International Congress in turn. The Regions are as follows:

1) The additional text "The President and Executive Finance Officer are responsible for Congress finance." is required as stated in past BPW International Constitutions and



it's a common practice for decades. This matter is too important to be stated obscurely in the procedure manual.

- 2) Concluding the congress account in 1 year is an existing rule. The additional part is the requirement to transfer fund from BPW International Congress account back to BPW International for operational purpose. This way, there is always only 1 BPW Congress account for one congress at a time.
- Preparation of BPW International Congress proceeding needs a team, not just 1-2 persons. Immediate Past president should have a right to select the qualified BPW members who work well with her in the preparation process.

This will provide a clear and transparent manner in financial handling of BPW International Congress Account.

Carried over from Past International President, Dr. Chonchanok Viravan (2021)

Taking an executive position in BPW International Executive Board is a good leadership training ground for BPW members. The ability to run for 2 terms at first glance promotes continuity. The fact that this privilege of running 2 consecutive terms is available for 7 out of 11 executives, it limits the opportunities for other members to develop their leadership skills through BPW International.

At an extreme case, for example, a regional coordinator can serve another 2 terms as executive secretary, 1 term as Vice President and 1 term as International President. This sums up to the maximum of 6 trienniums and total of 18 years a person can serve on the Executive Board.

PIP Dr. Amany Asfour:



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This amendment proposes to limit the tenure of regional coordinators to one term only. Presently, regional coordinators are allowed to run for a second term. However, this change aims to ensure fair leadership

opportunities and prevent potential misuse of incumbency

- 1. *Promoting Leadership Diversity*
 - Our organization boasts a large pool of talented and equipped members capable of taking on the role of regional coordinator. By limiting the tenure to one term, we provide more members with the opportunity to demonstrate their leadership and competence. This encourages a continuous influx of fresh ideas and perspectives.
- 2. *Encouraging Member Engagement*
 - Allowing only one term for regional coordinators fosters an environment where more members are motivated to engage and aspire to leadership positions. This amendment will ensure that the organization benefits from the diverse skills and experiences of its members, enhancing overall organizational growth.
- 3. *Preventing Incumbency Advantage*
 - When regional coordinators have the chance to run for a second term, there can be a reluctance to encourage others to run for the same post. Limiting the term to one ensures that current coordinators do not have an unfair advantage over potential new candidates, thus promoting a fair and competitive election process.
- 4. *Avoiding Favoritism in Decision Making*
 - Some decisions made by regional coordinators, such as the disbursement of funds, can sometimes be influenced by their desire to support affiliates who favor their reelection. By restricting coordinators to one term, we minimize the risk of favoritism and ensure that decisions are made in the best interest of the entire region.

This amendment is essential for fostering a dynamic and inclusive leadership environment within our organization. By limiting regional coordinators to one term, we ensure fair opportunities for all members to contribute their leadership skills. This approach not only prevents potential misuse of power but also enriches the organization with a diverse range of talents and perspectives. This amendment will strengthen our commitment to fairness, transparency, and continuous organisational growth

- 6. Flexibility and Accessibility:
 - Hybrid meetings offer greater flexibility, allowing members to participate according to their schedules and from any location. This accessibility is particularly important for members with family obligations, health concerns, or other commitments that might prevent them from traveling.
- 7. Resilience and Continuity:
 - In times of global crises, such as pandemics or natural disasters, face-to-face meetings may become impossible. A hybrid format ensures the continuity of the organization's activities and decision-making processes, regardless of external circumstances.
- 8. Enhanced Engagement and Collaboration:
 - Virtual platforms can facilitate innovative forms of engagement and collaboration, including breakout sessions, real-time polling, and interactive workshops. These tools can enhance the overall effectiveness and productivity of the General Assembly.

By amending the constitution to include a hybrid format for the General Assembly, the International Federation of Business and Professional Women can harness the benefits of modern technology, promote equality and inclusivity, reduce environmental impact, and ensure the continuity and resilience of its operations.

Its services are to assist non-governmental international organisations (NGOs) that are either already in Geneva or that wish to establish themselves in the region. It informs them, guides them and supports them.



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Formal Registration, with receipt of a Business/Registration Number, was not done at the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva.

By registering BPW International, the Members have reconfirmed the commitment of the Members at Congress 2011 to see the organization registered in Geneva, Switzerland

Recognising that:

Registration is the formal protection of an association, a professional body, a Federation, a Club or an individual.

It is a requirement of registration in Geneva that the Constitution and Regulations comply with the Swiss Civil Code (SCC); the relevant Articles 60 to 79 and the updated Anti-Money Laundering Act (AMLA) and its implementing provisions (RO 2021 656).

Registering ensures that the shared vision for positive change is implemented and the clear legal and formal structure provides credibility, legality and protection to the future of BPW International.

Through Registration BPW International members are not jointly and severally liable for the debts of BPW International. Currently every member of BPW is liable for the actions of another Member and no protection or recourse.

Acknowledging:

The existing BPW International Constitution and Regulations proclaim its registered address to be in Switzerland (as per cover sheet, registered address: Rue de Saint-Jean 26, 1203 Geneva, Switzerland).

The definitions of our Regulations refer to the Swiss Civil Code and acknowledge that the Constitution and Regulations comply with the Swiss Civil Code.

BPW International is an organisation that has over 120 Affiliated Federations, Affiliated Clubs and Individual Affiliate Members worldwide.

It was moved and voted by the Membership of BPW International in 2011 to be registered in Switzerland and to meet the Swiss Civil Code, which is internationally recognised law that covers volunteer organisations through to corporate bodies and humanitarian laws.

It is acknowledged the Swiss Civil Code of 2010 has evolved with additional sections added under 'Chapter 2: the Associations', as it is a legal document, it has been continually updated since its first publication in December 1907.

BE IT RESOLVED

BPW International, following ratification of its updated Constitution and Regulations, proceed with the formal registration at the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva.



Internal Resolutions for Constitution and Regulations

A copy of the approved amended Constitution and Regulations are translated in French and form the registration package for submission with a copy of the English version.

That the formal registration number is obtained, and all formal processes required to maintain registration is followed including:

- a copy of the minutes of the General Business Sessions are completed within three (3) months,
- a list of the signatories
- the completed registration application has been filed with the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva
- a copy of the receipt of the registration document is held on file, with all formal documents for reference for future Executive members.

RATIONALE

Registration provides for small and large scaled organisations the following:

- Provide legitimacy and credibility by being on an international registration database. It demonstrates BPW International and all its Affiliate members commitment to transparency, accountability and adherence to legal requirements.
- Provides an opportunity to access to funding. Many governmental and nongovernmental entities, as well as philanthropic foundations, prefer to support registered organisations due to their legal status and accountability measures. Registration can open opportunities for future grants, sponsorships and partnerships that will enhance the work of BPW International through its Mission, Aims and Values.
- Tax Exemptions and Benefits: registered NGOs are eligible for tax exemptions and benefits in accordance with Swiss Civil Code. These exemptions can help reduce operational costs and allow more resources to be directed towards BPW International's mission and programs.
- BPW International already holds a formal structure through its governing bodies including the Executive and International Board. BPW International has a clear structure for effective governance, decision-making and strategic long-term planning. The registrations ensure all Members continue to uphold BPW International's mission and values.
- Registering BPW International as was voted by the Members at Congress 2011 will enhance our organisation's visibility and global partnerships. It will assist in the effective collaboration with other stakeholders and to ensure retain our ECOSOC and United Nations standing in advocacy and lobbying. Being registered provides wider opportunities for engagement in other conferences, workshops and networking events to raise BPW International's profile with a wider audience.
- Registration provides legal protection to BPW International in an internationally recognised system. BPW International had been registered when they had a property in Battersea, UK, with the selling of this property it lost that registration.
- The registration will establish a distinct legal entity separate from it from its founders, protecting BPW International from personal liability in the case of legal disputes or financial obligations. The registration will provide the protection to ensure that BPW International can continue its work even when there are changes in leadership each triennium or because of unforeseen challenges.
- Registering BPW International ensures that the opportunity to collaborate and network with other organisations, stakeholders can occur locally and internationally. The partnerships can lead to share resources, expertise (e.g. Global Women, Zonta,



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International Labour Organization) and best practices, developing innovation and potential growth of women and girls around the world.

- Registering BPW International demonstrates the Members commitment to the organisation's long-term sustainability. It supports the development of the work being done internally and externally, the financial management (e.g. annual auditing) and ensuring monitoring mechanisms, reports, General Assembly business session minutes and Congress proceedings are uploading and available for all Members to have access too.
- Finally, BPW International will continue to abide by the Swiss Civil Code, which as an international legal document, provides the strong foundation for the organisation and future Executives and International Board Members to meet within the governance documents.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Registration is to take place within three (3) months following the close of the General Assembly at Congress in St Kitts, November 2024.

The Swiss lawyers are to confirm the application of the tax exemption and VAT exemptions have been applied for.

A copy of both the registration certificate and the tax/VAT exemption certificates are uploaded onto the BPW International website and notification issued to all International Board Members.

The process to ensure BPW International retains its Registration, with a copy of the original letter confirming Registration, will be held on file to ensure compliance is met each triennium.

RATIONALE

Ninety-four years ago, members of the International Federation of Business and Professional Women pledged themselves "to the eradication of the psychological causes of war: fear, ignorance and greed, and to the establishment of World Union based upon the recognition of the oneness of humanity, individual

responsibility and the interdependence of nations." This was recorded as one of the earliest pieces of policy at our inaugural conference in Geneva, Switzerland.

What a beautiful and timely reminder of what we have advocated for over almost 100 years, and how sadly relevant that first clause is today.

Our policy gives us power as united force - the power of the voice of tens of thousands of women. It is vital that our work at Congress continues on the international stage through the actions of our Vice President United Nations. In using our voice to influence high-level political fora and discussions on policy,

we can influence for better outcomes for all women, in all parts of the world.



Internal Resolutions for Constitution and Regulations

For the efficient implementation of advocacy action in our regions and countries, a policy document such

as the Policy Advocacy Resolutions Register is important to ensure we have policy information to hand, but it is critical this is up to date so that we are accessing and speaking about the most recent policy in our work.

This resolution aligns with current Procedure Manual clauses:

- 2.3.8 The duties of the Regional Coordinators, particularly: "raises awareness of BPW International aims and resolutions at the regional level", and
- 5.3.1 Selection of nominees for Subregional Coordinators, particularly: "The role of the Subregional Coordinator within her subregion is to assist the Regional Coordinator to: ... encourage Affiliates to undertake lobbying and projects in line with BPW International resolutions and international campaigns, and to support the work of the Standing Committees".

These clauses provide Regional Coordinators and Subregional Coordinator with the mandate to encourage Affiliates in their region/subregion in taking action on resolutions passed at Congress and play a powerful role in gathering, recording and reporting on the advocacy efforts of Affiliates.

BPW International has a Memorandum of Understanding with UN Women (signed October 2023) on the project "WITH Women's Entrepreneurship Trade". This agreement has a specified time frame, it can be renewed between both International Organizations in the future.

BPW International is establishing a separate entity/arm to the organization, a non-for-profit foundation for the management of the project "WITH Women's Entrepreneurship Trade" on the basis of the Memorandum of Understanding with UN Women. The Foundation is called "WITH – Women's Entrepreneurship Trade".

The Foundation is responsible for the lawful, secure, correct and economic use of the funds transferred to BPW International in accordance with the Agreement.

BPW International has an account with UNWomen to where the stakeholders will pay the funds. 8% of the amount will go as overhead costs to UNWomen and 12% to the With Foundation (BPW International).



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Per created incubator 500'000 Euros will be needed for 1 year. So far 18 countries in Africa, 4 countries in Eastern Europe, 3 countries in North America and the Caribbean are interested. It could be a quite big amount of 12.5 Million Euros or more in total.

Upon request of the country office of UNWomen to HQ in New York the funds will be transferred to UNDIP in the country. UNDIP will then pay the costs of the project.

The With Foundation needs to prepare professionally the projects, develop a draft project for a specific country that corresponds with the need of the country.

IMPLEMENTATION:

As soon as the funds will exist, the legal framework of a foundation needs to be established and certified.

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however be justified and based on motivations that are not arbitrary or discriminatory in nature"). It is therefore potentially necessary to explain to the Commercial Registry why voting rights are provided for in this way. The same applies to the quorum applicable under article R3 3.8, which does not correspond to that of the Civil Code. You will also need to justify why this is the case."

Based on the review of the lawyers it has been proposed that a maximum of four (4) clubs in a country where there is no Federation (this is based on that a fifth club would equate to 100 members in the country and therefore they would become a Federation) would each have the right to vote. Under the existing voting numbers these would be required to be amended accordingly.

Proposed amendment on voting received from Concetta Corallo, Presidente Nazionale FIDAPA BPW Italy, on 8.7.3 Rebalancing voting to number of the Membership was reviewed and noted that the proposed updates had incorporated the proposed voting with fair representation on numbers of members. Therefore President Concetta Corallo agreed their proposed resolution could be withdrawn.

" 6.2.5 The Battersea Fund is the proceeds of the leasehold sale of the BPW International building in the UK in 2001. The International Board agreed in 2002 that the proceeds of the Battersea Fund must not be used for operating costs or payment of debts, but must be kept protected in reserve for a future time. <u>The interest from the Battersea Fund can be used by BPW International at the discretion of the Executive</u>, but the capital invested can only be used for a purpose agreed by a resolution of the General Assembly with expenditure subject to the agreement of the International Board."

That is a clear indication that the fund should be invested and this amendment is being proposed to underline the fact that the account should be earning interest.

However low that interest rate might be it provides an asset that can be used while the original Battersea Fund is maintained at its set up value, which remains at $\pounds447,499.90$ and for at least two trienniums has been invested in an everyday account attracting zero interest and incurring administration charges of $\pounds5.50$ per month. This needs to be corrected.

This proposal for a 50% reduction in membership dues for countries within the International Federation of Business and Professional Women (BPW International) that have been struck by financial crises and experienced a 100% devaluation of their local currency. The discount aims to address the financial challenges faced by members in these countries and ensure continued access to the benefits and opportunities provided by BPW International.

- 1. Impact of Currency Devaluation
 - In countries experiencing a 100% devaluation of their local currency, the effective cost of BPW membership dues has doubled. Members must exchange their devalued local currency for Euros, resulting in a significant financial burden. This steep increase makes it difficult for members to meet their obligations, potentially leading to decreased participation and engagement.



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- 2. Addressing Financial Hardships
 - Financial crises severely impact the economic stability of individuals and businesses. Members in affected countries face substantial financial challenges, making it difficult to prioritize membership dues amidst other pressing expenses. A 50% discount alleviates some of this financial strain, allowing members to maintain their affiliation with BPW International during tough times.
- 3. Promoting Equity and Solidarity
 - BPW International is founded on principles of solidarity and equality. Treating all countries the same regarding dues without considering local economic conditions creates inequity. By adjusting dues based on the devaluation of local currencies, BPW International demonstrates its commitment to fairness and equality, ensuring that all members have an equitable opportunity to participate in the organization.
- 4. Maintaining Membership and Engagement
 - Financial barriers can lead to a decline in membership and engagement, weakening the organization's network. By offering a discount, BPW International supports member retention and ensures that women from financially distressed countries can continue to benefit from the organization's resources, networking opportunities, and support systems.
- 5. Reflecting the True Value of Membership
 - While the membership dues remain constant in Euros, their value in local currencies varies significantly due to devaluation. This discrepancy creates an unfair financial burden on members from affected countries. Adjusting the dues to reflect the true value in local currencies aligns with BPW International's mission to promote equality and support its members.

Implementation and Safeguards

- 1. Eligibility Criteria
 - Clear eligibility criteria will be established to ensure that only members from countries experiencing a 100% currency devaluation and financial crisis receive the discount. Verification through reputable international financial institutions will be required.
- 2. Transparent Application Process
 - A straightforward and transparent application process will be implemented for members seeking the discount. Necessary documentation will be required to verify eligibility, ensuring fairness and efficiency in the process. Implementing a 50% discount on membership dues for countries affected by financial crises and significant currency devaluation is essential for supporting our members during challenging times. This initiative promotes equity, supports member retention, and aligns with BPW International's core values of solidarity and equality. By addressing the financial burdens faced by members in these countries, we ensure that BPW International remains a strong and inclusive network, united in its mission to promote and support women's leadership and professional growth.

PREFACE

Amendments to these Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) are subject to the following:

Motion to adopt the new Constitution to permit BPW International s registration at the XXVII BPW International Congress, Helsinki, 21 June 2011:

- BPW International requires registration in Geneva as per the motions and action required following the new Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual passed at the XXVII BPW International Congress, Helsinki, Fifth and Sixth Business Sessions, 21 June 2011 (Congress Proceedings)
- 2. As noted under the proceedings, the Constitution and Regulations as adopted are to comply with:

Swiss Civil Code: It is a requirement of registration in Geneva that this Constitution and these Regulations comply with the Swiss Civil Code; the relevant articles in the 2010 version of the Code are Articles 60 to 79.

BPW International:

Was registered at the CAGI – Geneva Welcoming Center – following Congress 2011 and has been maintained by the yearly submission of the audited annual financial statements of BPW International and the Congress Proceedings 2011 and 2014.

On the 3 March 2024, formal notification was received by the International President to inform her that BPW International had been removed from the CAGI Registration due to the non-submission of the proceedings 2017 and 2021 as one of the minimum requirements for compliance.

For compliance to meet Swiss Civil Code New Mandatory Clauses have been added:

- The Articles of Association to comply with Swiss Civil Code.
- Preliminary Clauses, to identify all supplementary documents that are to be read with the constitution and Regulations, but not included in such.
- In order to comply with legal provisions, the "Affiliates" clause is renamed as "Members". This is because an Association is necessarily made up of Members.
- All Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs (where no Federation is present) are permitted to vote.
- The Executive or one-fifth (1/5) of the Members of BPW International (the Association), in accordance with art. 64 para. 3 CC, may at any time request that an Extraordinary General Assembly be held, specifying the purpose thereof.
- Power of Representation, the International President and one or more Executive signatories

- Submission of the minutes of the business sessions of the General Assembly, with a copy of the new Executive signatories, are to be submitted to the Registration office three (3) months after the International Congress.
- The Constitution and Regulations are to be updated with all resolutions adopted in the General Assembly and signed by the outgoing Executive signatories in the last business session of the General Assembly.

General Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations:

Following the submission of the existing BPW International Constitution and Regulations (2021), the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva, would not accept these and through the Welcoming Centre (CAGI) the recommendation for a review to bring these governing documents up to date was advised by the legal representatives. A specialist Swiss legal practice who have assisted NGOs in obtaining formal Registration undertook a review to bring them in line with the original 2010 Articles (which BPW International voted on) and the updated Articles that were undertaken as a direct link to the AMLA 2023.

Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations have included rewording, sections relocated, and information taken from the Procedure Manual and implemented into the Constitution and Regulations sections accordingly. Other items have been placed into the Procedure Manual. Updated Definitions combined and under Appendices.

The draft Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) are presented to the:

- The 31st General Assembly, St Kitts, November 2024 for review, debate, vote and adoption of the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes).
- These are then ratified, signed by the outgoing Executive members (as noted) and submitted to the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva, with a copy of the minutes from the business session(s) within three months and a copy of the list of new Executive signatories for the 2024-2027 Triennium.

This document being presented to the 2024 XXXI General Assembly Business Sessions includes the coordinated updates made by the CAC Committee and includes some proposed amendments submitted for consideration at the XXX General Assembly 2021.

CAGI and Registra du commerce (for information only)

Centre D'Accueil De La Genēve Internationale (CAGI) assists international non-governmental organizations (NGOs) already established as well as those wishing to establish themselves in the Geneva region. It works in close collaboration with <u>the United Nations</u>, <u>the Swiss</u> <u>Confederation</u>, <u>the Republic and Canton of Geneva</u>, <u>the City of Geneva</u> and other partners active in supporting International Geneva.

CAGI's support to an NGO is conditional upon its registration in the CAGI database. Registration: https://www.cagi.ch/en/practical-infos/registration-register-commerce/

Consequences of registration in the Register of Commerce. The consequences of registering an association in the Register of commerce differ depending on whether registration is compulsory or voluntary.

- Declarative effect of registration (art 60 CC): Registration with the Register of commerce plays no role in the acquisition of legal personality of the association.
- Obligation to update (art 933 CO): Any change in the facts registered in the Register of commerce must also be recorded (statutes, board, representatives, registered address, auditor where applicable...)
- Bankruptcy (art 39, al. 1, ch. 11, LP)
- Deletion from the Register of commerce: If the association is registered in the Register of commerce, the Board (or the judge) shall inform the Register of commerce of the dissolution so that the entry may be deleted (art. 79 CC). Appeals to creditors and the consent of the tax authorities are required (art. 93 cum 65 ORC). The deletion is required and carried out after the end of the liquidation, i.e. after a period of one year following the date of the third call to creditors published in the FOSC (art. 58 CC cum 913 CO which refers to art. 739 ff CO).

In addition, the following consequences apply in the case of compulsory registration.

Obligation to keep a list of the members (art 61a CC): Associations subject to compulsory registration with the Register of commerce are required to keep a list of their members which must include either the first and last name (if the member is an individual) or the company name and address (if the member is a legal entity) of each member. Associations must keep this list in such a way that it may be accessed at any time in Switzerland, and they must retain the details of each member and any supporting documents for 5 years after the member has been removed from the list.

- Obligation to have at least one member domiciled in Switzerland with power of representation (art. 69 para. 2 CC): Associations subject to compulsory registration with the Register of commerce must be able to be represented by a person who is domiciled in Switzerland. This person must have access to the list of members.
- Obligation to keep commercial bookkeeping and accounting (art 69a CC; art 957, para. 1, ch. 2 CO)
- For associations subject to compulsory registration with the Register of commerce, the provisions of company law on imminent insolvency and on over indebtedness and on the revaluation of land, buildings and equity participations apply accordingly (art. 69d CC).

- If the association does not have its own premises, the entry in the Register of commerce must specify where it is domiciled. The domiciliary must provide a declaration by virtue of which they grant domicile to the association at their address.

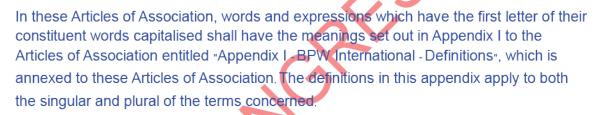

P3 Procedure Manual

The Procedure Manual is a supplementary document drawn up by the Association containing a set of regulatory standards which supplement or clarify the application of the Articles of Association. Under Swiss law, these rules do not have to be included in the Articles of Association.

The Procedure Manual may be consulted by any Member who submits a written request to the Executive Secretary.

Constitution and Regulations Amendments must be prepared with attached clear explanations rationales as to their impact on the Procedure Manual. When approved the changes, updating the Procedure Manual should be carried out at the same time as the updating of the Constitution and Regulations. There will be no need to make any further reference to the International Executive.

The Procedure Manual may can be amended by the Executive Board. Such between General Assemblies, but amendments apply only after they are each singly accepted by a majority vote of the International Board.

II. CONSTITUTION

C1. Title Name and Registration (or Headquarters)

The name of this non-profit organization (association) under private law is the INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN (IFBPW) (hereinafter "the Association" or otherwise called "BPW International"). It is governed by Article (art.) 60 and the following item (et seq.) of the Swiss Civil Code (hereinafter "CC").

BPW International's (the Association's) registered office will be in Geneva The registered address is Rue de Saint-Jean 26, 1203 Geneva, Switzerland,

BPW International (the Association) will be registered with the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva.

The administrative office of the International President is held in her city of residence during her triennium.

C2. Type of Organisation BPW International (The Association)

BPW International is a non-partisan, non-profit organization of unlimited duration with voluntary membership and leadership.

- It does not discriminate on the basis of background or beliefs, and respects human rights
- □ Its procedures are democratic, transparent and inclusive of all m Members
- □ Its decision-making bodies are accountable to the m Members
- Its funds are carefully managed and used to promote and achieve its aims

C3. <u>Aims (no change to title or text)</u>

BPW International aims to unite business and professional women in all parts of the world to:

work for women's:

- economic independence
- equal opportunity and representation in economic, civil and political life
- 2. encourage and support women and girls to:
 - □ develop their professional and leadership potential
 - undertake lifelong education and training
 - □ use their abilities for the benefit of others, locally, nationally and internationally

- 3. advocate:
 - □ for the elimination of all discrimination against women
 - □ for human rights and the use of gender-sensitive perspectives

4. undertake:

- world-wide networking and co-operation between business and professional women
- □ non-profit projects that help women gain economic independence
- to present the views of business and professional women to international organizations and agencies, and to business, governments and civil society

C4. <u>Structure (no change to title or text)</u>

The highest governing body for BPW International is the General Assembly held during the BPW International Congress.

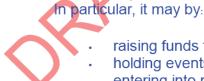
C8. Relationships

All the BPW International (*the* Association) **resources** must be allocated exclusively, directly or indirectly, to the achievement of its non-profit-making purpose and to its management.

No Member may claim any resources or property from BPW International.

C11. Liability (ies) mandatory clause

The debts of BPW International shall will be met exclusively from the resources of the Association.

No Member shall will be liable for debts incurred by the Association.

C12. <u>Membership Dues</u>

The General Assembly determines the amount of the annual Membership dues.

C13. <u>Members</u>

13.1. Definition

The INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN (IFBPW or **BPW International**) consists of the Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs and Affiliate Individual Members of the Association (the "**Members**").

Members may be legal entities and/or are all persons who have an interest in and/or wish to support the mission, social aim and objectives of BPW International (the Association).

Members up to thirty-five (35) years of age are officially recognized as Young BPW members.

BPW International (the Association) is composed of the following Members:

i. Affiliate Federations of Business and Professional Women ("Federation")

A Federation is defined as an Affiliate Federation of Business and Professional Women and is an Active Member of BPVV International.

The Affiliate Federation must consist of at least three (3) Affiliate Clubs. In addition, the Federation must be composed of a minimum of one hundred (100) individual members, who pay their dues, for a Federation to be recognized as such.

No more than one Federation may exist per country (territory comprising a geopolitical unit).

If the total number of individual members of a Federation falls below one hundred (100), recognition of the existence of the Federation shall will be suspended until such time as the number of individual members of the said Federation again increases to one hundred (100).

When the existence of the Federation is suspended, the Affiliate Clubs constituting the Federation automatically become Members of BPW International.

Affiliate Business and Professional Women's Clubs ("Club")

A Club is defined as an Affiliate Club of Business and Professional Women and is an Active Member of BPW International.

It is composed of at least twenty (20) Business and Professional Women.

An Affiliate Club is formed in a country where there is no existing Federation.

Where there is an existing Affiliate Federation, the new club becomes a Member of that Federation.

No Affiliate Club may become a Member in a country in which there is an existing Affiliate Federation which is already a Member,

Where an Affiliate Federation unless recognition of the existence of the Affiliate Federation is suspended due to fewer than one hundred (100) individual members making up the Affiliate Federation, each club automatically becomes an Affiliated Club with BPW International (the Association).

Where there are a minimum of three (3) Affiliate Clubs with a total membership of at least one hundred (100) members in the same country, these Affiliate Clubs must work together to become an Affiliate Federation of BPW International.

 Individual Affiliate Members (Business and Professional Women) ("Individual Member")

An Individual Affiliate Member is defined as any person, domiciled in a country where there is no Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club. This person must support and adhere to the objectives of BPW International.

Individual Affiliate Members are passive Members of BPW International. As such, they do not have voting rights at the General Assembly and are not eligible for election.

The Constitution of an Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club must be approved by BPW International and must be consistent with these Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) and ensure good governance.

BPW International (The Association) shall will maintain a list of the Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs and Individual Affiliate Members (art. 61a Swiss Civil Code). Information relating to each Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Club and Individual Affiliate Member and any supporting documents will be kept for five years after the Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Club or Individual Affiliate Member concerned has been deregistered (art. 61a para. 3 CC).

Refer to the Procedure Manual on what information and format is provided for the records.

13.2. Membership

Any Federation of Business and Professional Women, any Club of Business and Professional Women and/or any Business and Professional Woman may join BPW International (the Association) as a new Member if they comply with the conditions **outlined under 13.1 Definitions** above.

Any Federation of Business and Professional Women, any Club of Business and Professional Women and/or any Business and Professional Woman wishing to become an Individual Member must submit a written application to the BPW International Executive.

Where a country has a minimum of three (3) Clubs Affiliate to BPW International and at least 100 members in total within those Clubs, the Clubs must together apply to become a Federation Affiliated to BPW International.

Written applications for membership shall will be voted on by the Executive, which may approve or reject applications at its discretion and decide the effective date of admission.

A Business and Professional Women's Federation, a Business and Professional Women's Club and, or a Business and Professional Woman shall will not be recognized as a Member until the formal decision of the Executive.

13.3. Termination of Membership

Any Member's membership can be terminated by:

- i. Confirmation of the resignation of a Member from a Club/Federation, must be sent in writing to the International Executive, for their records, at least six (6) months before the end of the calendar year (art. 70 al. 2 CC):
 - Affiliate Federation to International Board Executive
 - Affiliate Club to their Affiliate Federation
 - Affiliate Club in countries with no Federations to the International Executive
 - Individual Affiliate Members to International Executive
- ii. Death, if the Member is an individual Membership is inalienable (art. 70 al. 3 CC).
- iii. Removal, i.e. the withdrawal of the Member by decision of the International Executive, subject to three (3)months' written notice to the individual Member or to the Member's President or, failing that, to the Member's secretary:
 - Affiliate Federation to International Executive,
 - Affiliate Club to their Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club to International Executive
 - Individual Affiliate Members to International Executive
 - Past International Presidents
 - Executive Members

The removal of a Member (e.g. Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs, Individual Members, Past International Presidents and Executive Members) may occur in particular to: (refer to the Procedure Manual section 4.4 on the process)

- □ When the Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Club, Individual Member has not paid its dues for one (1) year.
- □ Where a complaint has been made to the Executive regarding:
 - o misconduct by a Member in relation to the affairs of BPW International,
 - o or where an allegation against a Member gives rise to suspicion that the Member has acted in a manner likely to bring BPW International into disrepute,
 - o where a member has put BPW International at risk, for example through financial management, reputational loss, appropriating funds allocated for purposes of BPW, risk to registration and professional reputation

- o where a member has not met their obligations under the following:
 - BPW International Constitution and Regulations
 - BPW International Procedure Manual
 - other supporting documents for example Regional Regulations, Guidelines or By-Laws
 - □ Affiliate Federation and Affiliate Club Constitutions

In all cases, the current year's membership fee remains payable by the outgoing Member.

C14. Name and Logos

14.1. Legal Entity / Identification of BPW International

The name International Federation of Business and Professional Women (IFBPW) otherwise called BPW International, and the logos are in the sole ownership of BPW International.

BP

14.2. Logos

Identification with the International Federation of Business and Professional Women (IFBPW) Affiliates must identify themselves as affiliates of the International Federation of Business and Professional Women (BPW) on websites and letterheads at a minimum.

(Refer to the Procedure Manual on the colours and formal use).

III. REGULATIONS

R1. ORGANIZATION OF BPW INTERNATIONAL (THE ASSOCIATION) (MANDATORY CLAUSE)

The bodies of BPW International are:

The General Assembly

- The International Board
- The **"Executive (Board)**" (i.e., by analogy, the body referred to in the CC as the "Management").

R2. <u>GENERAL ASSEMBLY (MANDATORY CLAUSES)</u>

2.1. **Governance** General Information

The General Assembly is the supreme body of BPW International (the Association) within the meaning of art. 64 et seq. of the Swiss Civil Code.

It comprises:

- Members of the Executive
- Past International Presidents
- Delegates from Affiliate Federations
- Appointed Delegate of the Affiliate Clubs in the same country; and
- Chairs of the Standing Committees.

2.2. General Assembly For The Triennium

The General Assembly is held every three (3) years, at the time of the International Congress.

Elections, appointments and resolutions made at the General Assembly must comply with the rules set out in the Procedure Manual.

2.3. Annual Audited Accounts

Virtual General Assembly, or for distribution and electronic voting by the International Board.

The annual/yearly General Assembly Audited Accounts will be prepared and issued to the International Board convened (August September) virtually for the purpose of the review of the annual accounts and the audited report for the year for voting in accordance with Art. 64 of the Swiss Civil Code.

A copy of the annual accounts and the audited reports, completed every year, is sent through to the International Board for their records and voted at the virtual General Assembly. All three reports for the Triennium are included in the Congress Workbook.

A The triennial three-year budget is presented voted and is prepared by the Executive Board for approval ed at each triennial General Assembly at the time of the International Congress. Its is managed ment by the Executive Board, and the budget results (actuals vs budget), as well as the following year s budget changes for approval, are audited accounts presented annually to the International Board virtual General Assembly, along with the annual accounts and audited report.

2.4. Extraordinary General Assembly

The Executive Board or one-fifth (1/5) of the Members of BPW International (the Association), in accordance with art 64 para 3 CC, may at any time request that an Extraordinary General Assembly be held, specifying the purpose thereof.

The Extraordinary General Assembly must be held within eight (8) weeks of the request, virtually (online).

Decisions made at an Extraordinary General Assembly must be reported in writing and issued to the International Board and will be ratified at the following General Assembly (Congress).

R3. <u>GENERAL ASSEMBLY - INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS</u>

3.1. International Congress

The date and venue of the International Congress shall will be determined by the Executive of the same triennium in which the Congress will be held.

Five (5) years before the date of the Congress, the Executive shall will issue a call for applications from Members wishing to participate in the organization of the Congress.

Call for Congress bids and the selection process must conclude within the first 6 months of the triennium.

Offers of candidature must meet the criteria set out in the Procedure Manua

Unless otherwise decided by the General Assembly, the International Congress shall will be held in one of the following five (5) Regions:

- Africa
- Asia-Pacific
- □ Europe; or
- Latin America; or
- North America and The Caribbean.

In accordance with a rotation system, all regions must host the International Congress in turn. There is no predefined order. A Region can only be skipped when no country in the Region submits a bid.

In the event of a pandemic, war, climate disaster or world crisis, requiring the urgent cancellation of the face-to-face for the International Congress, this would be automatically upgraded to a full online meeting to ensure the safety and well-being of all Members of BPW International.

In the event that a proposed Congress location would put BPW International and its members in significant financial or personal risk due to political instability within a country, the Executive will have the authority to change the venue/country location, either in the same Region or in a Region that had previously submitted a bid for Congress.

To permit change in event and schedules, this is to be coordinated within six months OR 8 WEEKS AS PER THE 1/5TH EXTRAORDINARY VIRTUAL GA) of the original International Congress.

The next Congress will then be to the next Region who had submitted the appropriate documentation and received the approvals by the Executive Board.

3.2. Timeframes For Congress/General Assembly

A clear timeframe for the "Call to Congress", and invitations to Members, notifications, receipt of nominations, resolutions and final documentation is outlined under the

Procedure Manual. The following key items are to be met by the Executive Board, International Board and Affiliate Federations and Clubs.

i. Invitations for the International Congress and General Assembly:

The Call to the International Congress shall will be prepared by the President and the Executive Secretary and circulated distributed to the International Board eight (8) months before the International Congress.

The Executive shall will be responsible for sending invitations to Members.

The invitations sent to Members contain the agenda of the General Assembly.

All documentation relating for to the business of the General Assembly, must be made accessible to the general membership including the agenda, shall will be made available to Members on the BPW International website.

Invitations may be sent by e-mail.

ii. Six (6) months before the General Assembly:

Nominations, policy resolutions and Constitutional and Regulations and Procedure Manual proposed resolutions amendments must be submitted.

iii. Four (4) months before the General Assembly:

Nominations and proposed resolutions have been reviewed and acceptance confirmed. Supporting documents are circulated to the International Board.

iv. Three (3) months before the General Assembly:

Executive Immediate Past President, UN Representatives and Standing Committee Chairs must submit their reports for inclusion into the General Assembly workbook.

v. Two (2) months before the General Assembly:

The Executive Secretary must circulate the agenda for the pre-General Assembly meeting of the International Board and any other available material that is relevant for members, participation in the General Assembly.

Any proposed friendly amendments to the Resolutions or Proposed Amendments for the Constitution and Regulations, or Procedure Manual are to be received two (2) months prior to the General Assembly.

3.3. Meeting Mode

The General Assembly for the International Congress is held for all of the Members, Delegates, Alternate Delegates, Guest, Observers, Participants face to face.

(Process for any online attendance as observers is at the discretion of the Executive, refer Procedure Manual).

3.4. Proposals For Items On The Agenda

Proposals for items on the agenda to be submitted to the General Assembly must be sent by e-mail to the International President's office, and copied to the Executive Secretary, no later than six (6) months before the first day of the International Congress.

3.5. Powers

The General Assembly delegates to the Executive the powers to manage and represent BPW International (the Association).

The General Assembly retains the following inalienable powers:

- Adoption and amendment of the Constitution and Regulations (Articles of Association).
- Approval of the annual reports and accounts (audited)
- Decide to dissolve or merge BPW International (the Association).
- □ Management of all matters that do not fall within the remit of other bodies

3.6. Voting At The General Assembly (With Mandatory Clause Added In Red)

i. Principle

- Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs vote through Delegates. Only Delegates of Affiliate Members who are up to date with their dues (and any penalties) may vote.
- Individual Members do not have voting rights.
- A Delegate's vote corresponds to one vote. Delegates may be represented by their Alternate Delegate.
- Abstentions and invalid votes do not count towards the majority.

ii. Affiliate Federation Delegates



The number of Affiliate Federation Delegates is determined by the number of members each Affiliate Federation has, with a minimum of six (6) Delegates for Federations with a minimum of 100 to maximum of 500 members. The number of voting delegates increase pro-rate on the number of members the Federations have, these are set out in the Procedure Manual. Each Affiliate Federation is entitled to the same number of Alternate Delegates.

iii. Affiliate Club Delegates

Each country in which there are one (1) to a maximum of four (4) or more Affiliate Clubs are entitled to one Delegate. Each Affiliate Club is entitled to the same number of Alternative Delegates. The voting of each Affiliate Club, in a country where there is no Federation formed, is in accordance with Swiss Civil Code.

has a single Delegate and an Alternate Delegate. The single Delegate's vote is shared between the Affiliate Clubs in the same country.

- iv. Other participants at the General Assembly
 - Executive Members each have one vote and are entitled to vote in that capacity only.
 - Past International Presidents are entitled to vote solely in their capacity as Past International Presidents and if their dues, either as a member of an Affiliated Federation, Affiliate Club or Individual are paid in full.
 - Chairs of Standing Committees each have one vote and are entitled to vote solely in their Chairs of Standing Committees and if their Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club's dues are paid in full.

For further information, please refer to the Procedure Manual

3.7. Quorum

A vote of the General Assembly is valid only if a quorum of one-third (1/3) one-quarter (1/4) of the votes of the Members represented by Delegates who are present face to face at the General Assembly. The quorum is based on the number of votes of all Delegates present face to face and eligible to vote.

To permit face-to-face voting, this will be implemented through the engagement of an independent external online provider for secure voting with an audit system.

3.8. Decisions (Mandatory Clause)

3.8.1. Decisions During The General Assembly

The General Assembly decides by means of Resolutions that have been received. Resolutions on finance or dues must be issued four (4) months prior to the General Assembly.

A Resolution is a written proposal, submitted for inclusion in the agenda for addressing a specific operational matter or advocacy issue, these are identified as either:

BPW International Internal and Operational Matters:

- Operational and Governance
- Constitution / Mandates / Policies
- Constitution and Regulations
- Procedure Manual updates
- ii. BPW International Policy Advocacy Resolutions Register
 - □ Resolutions on External and Advocacy Matters, for Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs to use for advocacy within their countries
 - □ For submission to the United Nations

- iii. Formal decisions of Resolutions are held through the Standing Orders process, for rules of debate and voting:
 - Motions can be received from the floor from a mover/seconder and require a vote to "pass" or carry the motion.
 - □ Constitution and Regulation Resolutions require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the quorum present to be "adopted".
 - External Resolutions require a simple majority vote of the quorum present to be "adopted"
- iv. Reports, as presented in the Congress Workbook are received but before being adopted, any recommendations arising from a report must be seconded before it can be put to the vote, and a simple majority is required to pass the recommendation.

3.8.2. Decisions Outside The General Assembly

Outside General Assemblies, a written proposal from the Executive or the International Board, to which all Members, who are entitled to vote through a Delegate at the General Assembly, have subscribed in writing, shall will be equivalent to a Resolution of the General Assembly.

The written proposal of the Executive or the International Board is sent by email to the Members entitled to vote through a Delegate at the General Assembly.

Members are given 20 working days to accept the written proposal in writing, by return e-mail. After this deadline, the written proposal is considered to have been rejected by the Member who has not responded in time and therefore their vote will be recorded as an abstention.

3.9. Minutes And Proceedings (Mandatory Clause)

i. The Minutes of the General Business Sessions of the General Assembly are to be submitted three (3) months following the closing of the Congress and issued to the Registration office with a copy of the:



amended Constitution and Regulations adopted and signed by the outgoing appointed Executive signatories, in the final business session of the General Assembly

forms with the details of the newly appointed Executive and signatories for the next triennium

ii. The Congress Proceedings and Minutes of the General Assembly and the International Congress shall will be kept by the Executive, or on its behalf, the Executive Secretary.

Within twelve (12) months of the International Congress and General Assembly, the Immediate Past President is to work with the Executive Secretary and Executive Finance Officer from her term to ensure the Proceedings and the finalized accounts of the International Congress at which she presided are delivered are completed and forward to the International Board.

R4. <u>CONFLICTS OF INTEREST (MANDATORY CLAUSE)</u>

All Members are legally prohibited from being represented by their Delegate or from exercising their right to vote in decisions relating to a BPW International (an Association) matter or lawsuit where they, a close relative, their spouse or their parents or relatives in the direct line are involved (as pursuant to art. 68 of the Swiss Civil Code).

Elected or appointed officials are not to participate in making or in any way attempting to use her official position to influence a decision in which she knows or has reason to know that she has a conflict of interest.

Conflict of interest is when the BPW Member derives any personal, and/or financial gain, directly or indirectly as a result of the member s elected or appointed duties in BPW.

R5. INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

The President chairs meetings of the General Assembly

The President has a **casting vote** in the event of a tie, except in the case of elections, where the result is determined in accordance with the rules of the Procedure Manual.

The President is ex-officio on all International committees except for the General Assembly Nomination and Election Committees.

R6. INTERNATIONAL BOARD

6.1. Competence

The International Board is competent to:

- approve amendments to the Procedure Manual made by the Executive
- approve non-budgeted expenditure
- approve any authorized or emergency expenditure from the protected Battersea
 Fund
 - vote on the removal of a Member who has not paid their dues
 - vote on the expulsion of a Member who has behaved in a manner likely to damage the reputation of BPW International

vote on the withdrawal of a member of the Executive or of a member of a Standing Committee

- vote on the withdrawal of a Trustee
- vote on important matters referred to **it** the International Board by the Executive.

Refer to description of Member as outlined under section C13 Members under Constitution (above) and the Procedure Manual.

6.2. Composition

The International Board consists of is made up of the following members:

- · Members of the Executive
- Past Presidents of BPW International
- Each Affiliate Federation may appoint five (5) two (2) Representatives to the International Board for up to 1,000 members and an additional one (1) vote for every additional 3,000 members
- Delegate of Affiliate Clubs in a country where there is no Federation (and maximum of four (4) clubs), that qualify for a vote are represented by one (1) appointed representative per Club.

(with two (2) or more Clubs in one country) that qualify for a vote, are represented by 1-(one) appointed representative per country

· Chairs of Standing Committees.

6.3. Representatives / Delegates

Each Affiliate Federation may appoint five (5) two (2) Representatives to the International Board for up to 1,000 members and an additional one (1) vote for every additional 3,000 members.

In countries where there is no Affiliate Federation but only Affiliate Clubs, each Affiliate Club the latter must may appoint one (1) Representative to the International Board.

Affiliate Clubs from the same country share their Representative,

6.4. International President

The International President chairs meetings of the International Board.

6.5. <u>Meetings</u>

Meetings of the International Board shall will be held immediately before and immediately after the General Assembly.

Extraordinary meetings of the International Board may be convened by:

the President, or

must be called by her on the written request (as received by the Executive Secretary) of the majority of the Executive, or

at the written request of one third (1/3) of the members of the International Board.

One quarter (1/4) of the members of the International Board shall-will constitute a quorum at a meeting of the International Board.

Between meetings, t<mark>he International Board can make</mark> decisions **online by an electronic** vote.

6.6. Decisions And Voting By The International Board

The International Board takes decisions at its meetings by a simple majority.

Each Affiliate Federation Representative has one vote has two (2) five (5) votes, with each representative having one vote only. If one a Representative is unable to attend their vote is void.

Each Affiliate Club, in a country with no Affiliate Federation (100 members or more) has one (1) representative with one (1) vote.

Each Representative of an country with one or more Affiliate Clubs has one vote.

The vote of each Representative is suspended if the Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club concerned is not up to date with its membership fees (or any other penalty).

The other members of the International Board each have one vote

The International President has the casting vote in the event of a tie.

Outside meetings, the International Board may take written decisions by circular (by email) provided that all members of the International Board agree.

Decisions of the International Board must be recorded and distributed to the International Board within 30 days

Decisions of the International Board must be reported presented to the next General Assembly for ratification.

R7. <u>FUNCTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES</u> (MANDATORY CLAUSE)

7.1. Powers

The Executive is the executive body of BPW International (the Association). It has the right and duty to manage the day-to-day business of BPW International (the Association) and to represent it in accordance with the Articles of Association (Art, 69 CC). It decides on all matters not expressly reserved for the General Assembly and the International Board.

In particular, the Executive shall will take all measures necessary to achieve BPW international s (the Association's) aims / objectives, ensure the correct application of these Articles of Association and any other internal regulations, administer BPW International's (the Association's) property, assets and resources, keep the accounts and convene and organize the General Assembly.

The Executive executes and implements the decisions of the General Assembly. It manages BPW International (the Association) and takes all necessary measures to ensure that the stated aims are achieved. It bears collective responsibility for operational, financial and administrative matters.

In particular, at the beginning of the three-year period, the Executive is responsible for:

- Defining the priorities and the plan of action plan for the triennium three-year period, in line accordance with the theme and goals objectives proposed by the International President.
- Maintain a cloud-based digital platform for the work and storage of BPW International's official documents and official records, which the Executive can securely access securely from various a variety of locations.
- □ To appoint the Officers and define the composition of the Standing Committees.
- To make arrangements for the delivery of member provision of Services to Members Affiliates and Friends & Fellows.
- To make arrangements for the BPW International President's Office.
- To decide on the venue and date of the triennial International Congress, on the basis of documented bids submissions received and presented to at the General Assembly.
- To terminate the term of office of a BPW International officer and or committee member.
- Maintain an up-to-date list of all Members, refer to description of Members as outlined under section C13 Members under Constitution (above).

The extended powers of the Executive are set out in the Procedure Manual.

7.2. Composition

The Executive is composed of:

- The President
- The outgoing President, for a period of twelve (12) months from the end of her term of office
- The Executive Secretary
- The Vice President Membership
- The Vice President United Nations
- The Executive Finance Officer
- The Young BPW Representative
- The five (5) Regional Coordinators

All Members of the Executive are non-paid volunteers, who are reimbursed for their expenses, for example all disbursements, travel, accommodation, registrations, printing and products when required.

Members of the Executive must keep their expenses within the annual budget with the Finance Officer. All expenses for the annual Executive meeting are met by the budget for the annual Executive meeting (c.f. CAC draft operational guidelines 2013).

Precise descriptions of the duties of each member of the Executive are set out in the Procedure Manual.

7.3. Election

Members of the Executive (other than the outgoing President) are elected at each General Assembly by secret ballot.

Election of First and Second Vice President is confirmed in the General Assembly as outline in the Procedure Manual.

Their term of office ends when their successors are appointed or elected.

In the event of a vacancy, the Executive shall will have the power to appoint a successor until the next General Assembly.

7.4. Term Of Office Executive

Members of the Executive may hold the same role be elected to the same position only once (1), except for the positions of Executive Secretary, the Executive Finanecial Officer and Regional Coordinators, which may be held by the same person for two (2) consecutive three-year terms.

A past member of the Executive cannot be nominated for a role that she has previously held (c.f. CAC draft Operational Guidelines 2013).

7.5. Removal From Office And Resignation (Mandatory Clause)

i. Removal from office

The mandate of a Member of the Executive may be revoked by the General Assembly, in particular, if she has breached her obligations to BPW International (the Association) or if she is unable to perform her duties properly.

The mandate may also be revoked by the Executive with the approval of the International Board. The Executive Member concerned may appeal against the latter decision in the manner set out in the Procedure Manual.

ii. Resignation

Members of the Executive may resign at any time by submitting a written statement to the President of the Executive, specifying the date on which their resignation will take effect.

iii. Vacancies during term of office

In the event of removal or resignation during a term of office, the Executive may appoint a replacement member by co-opting, until the next General Assembly.

7.6. International President

The International President chairs meetings of the Executive.

7.7. Delegation

The Executive is authorised to delegate some of its tasks to one or more of its Members, including sub-committees, to third parties it appoints as volunteers or to employees it hires.

7.8. Power Of Representation (Mandatory Clause)

The International President with one of the following, will have the power to represent BPW Internationally and sign any document with one of the following authorized signatories:

- Vice President(s)
- Executive Finance Officer
- · Executive Secretary
- Regional Coordinators

They sign the relevant documents with the approval of the Executive, in the form set out in the Procedure Manual.

7.9. Meetings

The Executive shall will meet as often as necessary, but at least once (1) a year face-toface.

In the case of the year in which the International Congress takes place, the Executive meeting must take place before the International Congress.

If three (3) members or more of the Executive so request, a meeting shall will be held within fourteen (14) days of the request.

The quorum of the Executive to hold a meeting shall will be six (6) members of the Executive.

Members of the Executive may validly participate in a meeting of the Executive and make decisions in person, by video or telephone conference or by any other means decided by the Executive.

Meetings in person may be held in the country where the President resides or abroad.

Meetings of the Executive shall will be convened by the President of the Executive at least three (3) months in advance. In urgent circumstances, the President may call an extraordinary meeting with fourteen (14) days' notice, with availability confirmed by the Executive to ensure a quorum is present.

7.10. Decision-Making - Executive

Each Member of the Executive has one vote. In the event of a tie, the International President shall will have the casting vote.

Executive decisions may also be validly taken by circular, by e-mail or other online communication methods

R8. ACCOUNTING

The Executive draws up the accounts for each financial year in accordance with the applicable legal provisions.

R9. INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

The President of BPW International is elected by the General Assembly in a secret ballot. She chairs the General Assembly, the International Congress, the International Board and Executive meetings.

The President is ex-officio on all International committees including:

- □ Standing Committees
- Regional Committees and Sub-Regional Committees
- □ Ad-hoc Committees, for example:
 - Constitutional Advisory Committee
 - Resolutions Committee

The President is not an ex-officio member on the General Assembly Nomination and Election Committees.

The President is the principal officer authority in charge of the organization of BPW International (the Association) She has the role of leadership and management, including:

- Validating appointments
- Establishing external relations with other international organizations and leaders
- Supervision and responsibility for all planning, management and promotional activities

R10. DISSOLUTION

The dissolution of BPW International (the Association) is voted on by the General Assembly. A two-thirds (2/3) majority of the votes present is required.

On the dissolution of BPW International (the Association), any assets will be transferred to a tax-exempt non-profit organization with the same or a similar purpose. The distribution of assets among its Members is excluded.

R11. LIABILITY (IES)

BPW International (the Association) is solely liable for its debts, which are guaranteed by its corporate assets.

Members have no personal liability for BPW International's (the Association's) debts.

R12. TRUSTEES

In the event that BPW International (the Association) acquires property, three (3) Trustees will be appointed where required by law.

They will be nominated by the Executive, elected by vote of the International Board and formally appointed by the International President.

Trustees will hold property on behalf of BPW International (the Association).

Trustees can make a decision to sell property following a recommendation from the Financial Management Team and the International Board.

Trustees will hold office until death, resignation, or removal by the International Board.

R13. AMENDMENTS

The Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) may only be discussed and amended, upon receipt of resolutions for submission to the General Assembly of BPW International.

A vote of two-thirds (2/3) of those voting, a quorum being present, is required for an amendment to be adopted. Resolutions are as per outlined under the Procedure Manual.

Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed by:

- members of the Executive
- the International Board
- Past Presidents of BPW International
- Affiliate Federations who are up to date with their dues
- Affiliate Clubs in the same country, all of whom are up to date with their dues
- Chair of Standing Committees.

At any time, the Executive and/or the International Board may propose to the Members, by e-mail, that the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) be amended.

The updated Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) will be proposed through resolutions, amended, voted on and adopted at the General Assembly.

R14. ENTRY INTO FORCE (MANDATORY CLAUSE)

14.1. Updated Constitution And Regulations (Statues)

These updated Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) shall will be amended as proposed and circulated by the Executive to the International Board, by email, for voting at the General Assembly Meeting to be held within four (4) months following receipt of the proposal and draft proposed amendments, proposed amendments (left on the floor from Congress 2021, for the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) in accordance with the procedure outlined for Call to Congress.

These Articles of Association ("Constitution and Regulations") were adopted at the General Assembly, Business Sessions (2-5) held on _____(days) November (month) 2024 and came into force in the 6th Business Session on ____(day) November (month) 2024 on the same date.

These Articles of Association ("Constitution and Regulations") for "the Association" or "BPW International" will be put into force to meet the registration criteria of Article (art.) 60 and the following item (et seq.) of the Swiss Civil Code (hereinafter "CC") at the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva.

Draft Amendments to the BPW International Constitution and Regulation Statutes for Review/Approval Reviewed 15th July 2024

APPENDIX 1: BPW International Definitions

- <u>Adhoc Congress Committees:</u> (for example Resolutions, Elections, Voting, Nominations, Credentials, Registrations) body at the International Congress whose main task is to manage the organization of the General Assembly.
- <u>Amendment</u>: this is a proposal to amend the Constitution and Regulations, which may come from the members of the Executive, the Past International Presidents, the Representatives appointed by the Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs and the Chairs of the Standing Committees.
- <u>Association/BPW International</u>: The Association is an association under Swiss law called THE INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN (IFBPW or "BPW International"), founded in 1930, whose objective is to unite Business and Professional Women, of all professions and worldwide.
- **Battersea Fund:** This is a fund whose origin is from the sale of London premises by BPW International (the Association), deposited in a specific account and whose use is controlled.
- <u>Business and Professional Women</u>: These are women or people who identify as such who share the values of BPW International (the Association) through their business, labour and professional work.
- **BPW International Advocacy**: BPW International s advocacy is speaking on behalf of Members and outsiders and taking action to initiate change and promote the status of women, explaining an idea to others or seeking to convince and encourage them to implement BPW International's ideas and values.

Chairs of Standing Committees: a person who chairs a Standing Committee.

- <u>Civil Society</u> Civil Society includes non-governmental organizations that represent the interests of BPW International (the Association) to decision-makers but does not include government agencies or companies and commercial structures.
- Club: A Club is defined as an Affiliate Club of Business and Professional Women and is an active Member of BPW International.
- Constitution and Regulations (Statutes): The Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) of BPW International form the Articles of Association (AoA), these govern the internal operation of BPW International. Where required they include reference to other supporting documents and policy. the Constitution and Regulations of BPW International. Their content and application are specified in the Procedure Manual.

Country: A geopolitical unit which has full sovereignty.

- <u>Delegate</u>: a person appointed by an Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club to represent them at the General Assembly. Each Affiliate Federation is able to appoint a number of Delegates according to the number of Members it has. The Affiliate Clubs of in each country, where there are no Affiliate Federations are able to nominate one (1) Delegate per Club (maximum four (4) clubs or less than 100 members) country. Alternate Delegates must be appointed.
- **Executive**: This is the Executive body of BPW International (the Association), according to Art. 69CC.
- <u>Executive Finance Officer</u>: The Executive Finance Officer is a Member of the Executive She is elected at the General Assembly.
- **Executive Secretary**: The Executive Secretary is a Member of the Executive. She is elected by the General Assembly and her role is defined in the Procedure Manual.
- <u>Federation</u>: A Federation is defined as an Affiliate Federation of Business and Professional Women and is an active Member of BPW International.
- <u>Friends & Fellows</u>: these are people wishing to support BPW International (the Association) and making donations and bequests as they wish.
- <u>Financial Responsibilities</u>: Where required by law, the Trustees hold the properties on behalf of BPW International (the Association). They can be up to three (3) co-owners per property. The Trustees are appointed by the Executive and appointed by the President. Their withdrawal shall be decided by the International Committee.
- <u>General Assembly</u>: The General Assembly is the supreme decision-making body of the Association within the meaning of Articles 64 et seq. of the Swiss Civil Code. During the sessions of the General Assembly, Members discuss and vote on financial and other reports, Resolutions and Statutory Amendments, elect the members of the Executive, and debate any other matters.
- <u>Individual Affiliate Member</u>: An Individual Affiliate Member is defined as a natural person, domiciled in a country where there is no Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club. Individual Affiliate Members are passive Members of BPW International. As such, they do not have the right to vote at the General Assembly.
- Internal and Operational Matters: BPW International Operations Resolutions Register, which documents all Resolutions relevant to BPW International internal operations that have been passed at Congresses and Board Meetings since 1930 to the present time. It will be updated as new Resolutions are passed at future Congresses and Board Meetings.
- External and Advocacy Matters: BPW International Policy Advocacy Resolutions Register, which documents all Resolutions relevant to BPW International policy advocacy that have been passed at Congresses and Board Meetings since 1930 to the present time. It will be updated as new Resolutions are passed at future Congresses and Board Meetings.

International Congress: The BPW International Congress is a recurring gathering of BPW International Members and other stakeholders, including, International Board meetings held before and after the general assembly, workshops and networking activities. The General Assembly is held during the International Congress.

The International Congress is held every three (3) years, during the third year of the International President's Triennium.

International President: The President of BPW International is elected at the General Assembly. She Chairs the Executive, International Board and the International Congress and General Assembly(s).

Legal Entity: when registration has been approved, the name of BPW International (the Association) is formally enrolled on a register of NGOs, BPW International acquires existence as a legal entity. Legal entity status means that 'BPW International (the Association)' is liable for the debts, contracts, leases and obligations that are entered into, not the Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Clubs or Individual Members. Tax exemptions and VAT certificates are uploaded into the BPW International (the Association) website.

<u>Members</u>: there are several categories of Affiliate Members in BPW International, these can be active – have a voting right by representation – or passive – do not have a voting right. The Members of BPW International (the Association) are:

- Affiliate Federations
- Affiliate Clubs
- Individual Affiliate Members

In order to become a Member of BPW International (the Association), a written request must be made to the BPW International Executive

<u>Member Services</u>: Member Services takes care of technical support and administrative issues that may be faced by Members of the Association.

<u>Motions</u>: The formal process that is applied to when a business matter also known as a motion is put to the floor and seconded and opened for positive and interactive debate.

Mover Seconder of Motions: The first speaker is the mover of the motion, usually have prepared the proposed resolution/motion and is in support of the motion going forward and the seconder provides additional support to the motion being presented.

<u>Office of the International President</u>: each International President has the right to be provided with an Office, close to their home, in order to carry out all the tasks relating to BPW International (the Association). The Executive shall decide on the budget allocated for the rental or acquisition of such a place.

<u>Past International Presidents</u>: Past International Presidents are Businesswomen and Professionals who have served as President of BPW International (the Association) in the past. The outgoing Former President has a place on the Executive for the first twelve (12) months of a triennium.

- <u>Procedure Manual</u>: The Procedure Manual contains additional regulatory standards, which supplement the Articles of Association and do not have to be included in the Articles of Association under Swiss law.
- Standing Orders: The Standing Orders set out the procedures to be used during the BPW International Congress and International Board Meetings. The Standing Orders cover the rules for discussion, who may speak and who may vote. The conduct of the meeting is controlled by the general will of the membership, giving a majority decision after a full and fair consideration of the issues involved. The Standing Orders are designed to provide for constructive and democratic meetings to help, not hinder, the business of the meeting. Undue strictness should never be allowed to intimidate members or limit full participation.
- <u>Trustees</u>: A trustee is a person who holds the legal title of any property, assets, or group of assets on behalf of BPW International and will be their duty to manager on behalf of BPW International. A trustee may be appointed for additional purposes, such as bankruptcy, for a charity or for a trust fund.
- <u>Ratified</u>: These Constitution and Regulations, following the adoption of all Constitution and Regulation amendments in the General Assembly, are to be updated and signed by the outgoing Executive for each respective Triennium and submitted, with a copy of the business session minutes, within three (3) months of close of Congress.
- **Registration**: BPW International to be registered and all relevant documents to be submitted annually (financial audits) or every three years following BPW International S Congress and General Assemblies. The Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) must be submitted in both English and language specified by the Registration office (e.g. French in Geneva).

<u>Regions</u>: There are five (5) regions within BPW International, each of which must host the International Congress in turn. The Regions are as follows:

Africa
 Asia-Pacific
 Europe
 Latin America
 North America and The Caribbean

Regional Coordinators: The Regional Coordinator of each Region are Members of the Executive. The Regional Coordinators are elected at the General Assembly.

Representative on the International Board: this is a woman appointed by an Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club to represent them on the International Board. Each Affiliate Federation may appoint two (2) Representatives. In countries that do not have an Affiliate Federation but only Affiliate Clubs, they must appoint one (1) Representative who represents all from each Club (maximum four (4) or less than 100 members) in the same country.

- **Resolutions**: A Resolution is a proposal on the agenda voted affirmatively and adopted at the General Assembly. The Resolutions can be submitted by Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs, as well as any Member of the Executive, Chairs of Standing Committees and Past International Presidents.
- Term: A term is the period between 2 consecutive General Assemblies
- <u>Serious matter</u>: A matter which requires a decision that has substantial financial, organisational, legal or political implications for BPW International, supported by an analysis of the potential consequences.
- <u>Swiss Civil Code</u>: It is a requirement of registration in Geneva that this Constitution and these Regulations comply with the Swiss Civil Code (SCC); the relevant articles in the 2010 version of the Code are Articles 60 to 79 and ongoing updates specific to the function of Section/Chapter 2: **the Associations**, in the future.

<u>Urgent resolutions</u>: An urgent resolution must be about matters of international importance that arise after the closing date for submitting resolutions.

- <u>Vice-President Membership</u>: The Vice-President Membership is a Member of the Executive. She is elected by the General Assembly and her role is defined in the Procedure Manual.
- <u>Vice-President United Nations</u>: The Vice-President United Nations has a place on the Executive. She is elected by the General Assembly and her role is defined in the Procedure Manual.
- <u>Vice-President First and Second</u>: Following the election of the two Vice Presidents by the General Assembly, a second secret ballot is held for the election of who will be First or Second Vice-President by the General Assembly, this is determined by the member who achieves this highest number of votes.
- Young BPW Members, Young BPW form a Standing Committee composed of all Members under the age of thirty-five (35), belonging to an Affiliate Federation, an Affiliate Club or being an Individual Affiliate Member.

Young BPW Representative: The Young BPW Representative is an elected Member on the Executive. In this context, she presents the ideas of the Young BPW, establishes the link between the Executive and the Young BPW and encourages the activities of the Young BPW worldwide. She is elected at the General Assembly.

PREFACE

Amendments to these Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) are subject to the following:

Motion to adopt the new Constitution to permit BPW International s registration at the XXVII BPW International Congress, Helsinki, 21 June 2011:

- BPW International requires registration in Geneva as per the motions and action required following the new Constitution and Regulations and Procedure Manual passed at the XXVII BPW International Congress, Helsinki, Fifth and Sixth Business Sessions, 21 June 2011 (Congress Proceedings)
- 2. As noted under the proceedings, the Constitution and Regulations as adopted are to comply with:

Swiss Civil Code: It is a requirement of registration in Geneva that this Constitution and these Regulations comply with the Swiss Civil Code; the relevant articles in the 2010 version of the Code are Articles 60 to 79.

BPW International:

Was registered at the CAGI – Geneva Welcoming Center – following Congress 2011 and has been maintained by the yearly submission of the audited annual financial statements of BPW International and the Congress Proceedings 2011 and 2014.

On the 3 March 2024, formal notification was received by the International President to inform her that BPW International had been removed from the CAGI Registration due to the non-submission of the proceedings 2017 and 2021 as one of the minimum requirements for compliance.

For compliance to meet Swiss Civil Code New Mandatory Clauses have been added.

The Articles of Association to comply with Swiss Civil Code.



Preliminary Clauses, to identify all supplementary documents that are to be read with the Constitution and Regulations, but not included in such.

In order to comply with legal provisions, the "Affiliates" clause is renamed as

"Members". This is because an Association is necessarily made up of Members.

- All Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs (where no Federation is present) are permitted to vote.
- The Executive or one-fifth (1/5) of the Members of BPW International (the Association), in accordance with art. 64 para. 3 CC, may at any time request that an Extraordinary General Assembly be held, specifying the purpose thereof.
- Power of Representation, the International President and one or more Executive signatories

- Submission of the ·minutes · of the business sessions of the General Assembly, with a copy of the new Executive signatories, are to be submitted to the Registration office three (3) months after the International Congress.
- The Constitution and Regulations are to be updated with all resolutions adopted in the General Assembly and signed by the outgoing Executive signatories in the last business session of the General Assembly.

General Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations:

Following the submission of the existing BPW International Constitution and Regulations (2021), the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva, would not accept these and through the Welcoming Centre (CAGI) the recommendation for a review to bring these governing documents up to date was advised by the legal representatives. A specialist Swiss legal practice who have assisted NGOs in obtaining formal Registration undertook a review to bring them in line with the original 2010 Articles (which BPW International voted on) and the updated Articles that were undertaken as a direct link to the AMLA 2023.

Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations have included rewording, sections relocated, and information taken from the Procedure Manual and implemented into the Constitution and Regulations sections accordingly. Other items have been placed into the Procedure Manual. Updated Definitions combined and under Appendices.

The draft Amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) are presented to the:

- The 31st General Assembly, St Kitts, November 2024 for review, debate, vote and adoption of the proposed amendments to the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes).
- These are then ratified, signed by the outgoing Executive members (as noted) and submitted to the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva, with a copy of the minutes from the business session(s) within three months and a copy of the list of new Executive signatories for the 2024-2027 Triennium.

This document being presented to the 2024 XXXI General Assembly Business Sessions includes the coordinated updates made by the CAC Committee and includes some proposed amendments submitted for consideration at the XXX General Assembly 2021.

CAGI and Registra du commerce (for information only)

Centre D[.]Accueil De La Genēve Internationale (CAGI) assists international non-governmental organizations (NGOs) already established as well as those wishing to establish themselves in the Geneva region. It works in close collaboration with <u>the United Nations</u>, <u>the Swiss</u> <u>Confederation</u>, <u>the Republic and Canton of Geneva</u>, <u>the City of Geneva</u> and other partners active in supporting International Geneva.

CAGI's support to an NGO is conditional upon its registration in the CAGI database. Registration: <u>https://www.cagi.ch/en/practical-infos/registration-register-commerce/</u>

Consequences of registration in the Register of Commerce: The consequences of registering an association in the Register of commerce differ depending on whether registration is compulsory or voluntary.

- Declarative effect of registration (art 60 CC): Registration with the Register of commerce plays no role in the acquisition of legal personality of the association.
- Obligation to update (art 933 CO): Any change in the facts registered in the Register of commerce must also be recorded (statutes, board, representatives, registered address, auditor where applicable...)
- Bankruptcy (art 39, al. 1, ch. 11, LP)
- Deletion from the Register of commerce: If the association is registered in the Register of commerce, the Board (or the judge) shall inform the Register of commerce of the dissolution so that the entry may be deleted (art. 79 CC). Appeals to creditors and the consent of the tax authorities are required (art. 93 cum 65 ORC). The deletion is required and carried out after the end of the liquidation, i.e. after a period of one year following the date of the third call to creditors published in the FOSC (art. 58 CC cum 913 CO which refers to art. 739 ff CO).

In addition, the following consequences apply in the case of compulsory registration.

Obligation to keep a list of the members (art 61a CC): Associations subject to compulsory registration with the Register of commerce are required to keep a list of their members which must include either the first and last name (if the member is an individual) or the company name and address (if the member is a legal entity) of each member. Associations must keep this list in such a way that it may be accessed at any time in Switzerland, and they must retain the details of each member and any supporting documents for 5 years after the member has been removed from the list.

- Obligation to have at least one member domiciled in Switzerland with power of representation (art. 69 para. 2 CC): Associations subject to compulsory registration with the Register of commerce must be able to be represented by a person who is domiciled in Switzerland. This person must have access to the list of members.
- Obligation to keep commercial bookkeeping and accounting (art 69a CC; art 957, para. 1, ch. 2 CO)
- For associations subject to compulsory registration with the Register of commerce, the provisions of company law on imminent insolvency and on over indebtedness and on the revaluation of land, buildings and equity participations apply accordingly (art. 69d CC).

Registration request.....

- if applicable, the fact that it is not subject to the registration requirement under art. 61, para. 2, CC and that it is not represented by a person domiciled in Switzerland);
- If the association does not have its own premises, the entry in the Register of commerce must specify where it is domiciled. The domiciliary must provide a declaration by virtue of which they grant domicile to the association at their address.

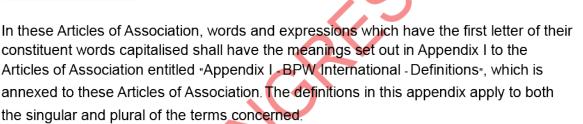

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P3 Procedure Manual

The Procedure Manual is a supplementary document drawn up by the Association containing a set of regulatory standards which supplement or clarify the application of the Articles of Association. Under Swiss law, these rules do not have to be included in the Articles of Association.

The Procedure Manual may be consulted by any Member who submits a written request to the Executive Secretary.

Constitution and Regulations Amendments must be prepared with attached clear rationales as to their impact on the Procedure Manual. When approved the changes, updating the Procedure Manual should be carried out at the same time as the updating of the Constitution and Regulations. There will be no need to make any further reference to the International Executive.

The Procedure Manual may be amended by the Executive. Such amendments apply only after they are each singly accepted by a majority vote of the International Board.

II. CONSTITUTION

C1. <u>Name and Registration (or Headquarters)</u>

The name of this non-profit organization (association) under private law is the INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN (IFBPW) (hereinafter "**the Association**" or "**BPW International**"). It is governed by Article (art.) 60 and the following item (et seq.) of the Swiss Civil Code (hereinafter "**CC**")

BPW International's (the Association's) registered office will be in Geneva.

BPW International (the Association) will be registered with the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva.

The administrative office of the International President is held in her city of residence during her triennium.

C2. <u>BPW International (The Association)</u>

BPW International is a non-partisan, non-profit organization of unlimited duration with voluntary membership and leadership:

- It does not discriminate on the basis of background or beliefs, and respects human rights
- Its procedures are democratic, transparent and inclusive of all Members
- Its decision-making bodies are accountable to the Members
- □ Its funds are carefully managed and used to promote and achieve its aims

C3. <u>Aims</u>

BPW International aims to unite business and professional women in all parts of the world to:

work for women's:

- □ economic independence
- equal opportunity and representation in economic, civil and political life
- 2. encourage and support women and girls to:
 - develop their professional and leadership potential
 - undertake lifelong education and training
 - □ use their abilities for the benefit of others, locally, nationally and internationally
- 3. advocate:
 - □ for the elimination of all discrimination against women

□ for human rights and the use of gender-sensitive perspectives

4. undertake:

- world-wide networking and co-operation between business and professional women
- □ non-profit projects that help women gain economic independence
- to present the views of business and professional women to international organizations and agencies, and to business, governments and civil society

C4. <u>Structure</u>

The highest governing body for BPW International is the General Assembly held during the BPW International Congress.

- Between General Assemblies, the International Board is the governing body
- BPW International is managed by the Executive
- The President is the Chair of the General Assembly, the International Board and the Executive

C5. Principles

The Constitution and Regulations are based on a permissive rather than a restrictive principle.

Matters not covered by this Constitution and Regulations, or the Procedure Manual will be decided by the Executive in a manner consistent with the social purpose (mission and values) of BPW International.

C6. <u>Languages</u>

The official languages of BPW International are English, French, Italian and Spanish.

In the event of any question as to the interpretation of the terms of the Constitution and Regulations, the English text of the Constitution and Regulations will prevail.

C7. BPW International Regions

BPW International is present in at least five (5) Regions including, namely:

- Africa
- Asia-Pacific
- Europe
- Latin America
- North America and The Caribbean

Each Region is made up of Members that are Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs, and Individual Affiliate Members.

Regional coordinators are elected, in accordance with the procedure set out in the Procedure Manual.

At least one (1) regional meeting of the Members from the same Region must be held between each International Congress.

C8. <u>Relationships</u>

BPW International will work to maintain its Special Consultative Status with the United Nations.

BPW International may develop new relationships with other organizations. Such relationships must comply with Chapter 12 (Relationships including the United Nations) of the Procedure Manual.

C9. <u>Means</u>

BPW International (the Association) may undertake any lawful activity conducive to achieving its purpose.

In particular, it may by:

- raising funds from private individuals and public bodies
- holding events
- entering into partnerships; and promoting and publicising its social purpose and BPW International (the Association).

C10. <u>Resources</u>

BPW International's (the Association) resources may come from:

- □ donations, legacies and "Friends & Fellows"
- □ sponsorship, partnerships and public subsidies
- Members[,] dues
- the yield and income generated by BPW International s (the Association s) assets
- income from events and activities organized by BPW International (the Association's), in particular
 - profits from events or from the sale of objects and the provision of services
 - any other legal resources or entities (refer to the Procedure Manual for examples).

All the BPW International (*the* Association) resources must be allocated exclusively, directly or indirectly, to the achievement of its non-profit-making purpose and to its management.

No Member may claim any resources or property from BPW International.

Refer to the Procedure Manual for financial management of the Association.

C11. Liability (mandatory clause)

The debts of BPW International will be met exclusively from the resources of the Association.

No Member will be liable for debts incurred by the Association.

C12. Membership Dues

The General Assembly determines the amount of the annual Membership dues.

C13. <u>Members</u>

13.1. Definition

The INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN (IFBPW or **BPW International**) consists of the Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs and Affiliate Individual Members of the Association (the **"Members**").

Members may be legal entities and/or are all persons who have an interest in and/or wish to support the mission, social aim and objectives of BPW International (the Association).

Members up to thirty-five (35) years of age are officially recognized as Young BPW members.

BPW International (the Association) is composed of the following Members:

i. Affiliate Federations of Business and Professional Women ("Federation")

A Federation is defined as an Affiliate Federation of Business and Professional Women and is an Active Member of BPW International.

The Affiliate Federation must consist of at least three (3) Affiliate Clubs. In addition, the Federation must be composed of a minimum of one hundred (100) individual members, who pay their dues, for a Federation to be recognized as such.

No more than one Federation may exist per country (territory comprising a geopolitical unit).

If the total number of individual members of a Federation falls below one hundred (100), recognition of the existence of the Federation will be suspended until such time as the number of individual members of the said Federation again increases to one hundred (100).

When the existence of the Federation is suspended, the Affiliate Clubs constituting the Federation automatically become Members of BPW International.

ii. Affiliate Business and Professional Women's Clubs ("Club")

A Club is defined as an Affiliate Club of Business and Professional Women and is an Active Member of BPW International.

It is composed of at least twenty (20) Business and Professional Women.

An Affiliate Club is formed in a country where there is no existing Federation.

Where there is an existing Affiliate Federation, the new club becomes a Member of that Federation.

Where an Affiliate Federation is suspended due to fewer than one hundred (100) individual members making up the Affiliate Federation, each club automatically becomes an Affiliated Club with BPW International (the Association)

Where there are a minimum of three (3) Affiliate Clubs with a total membership of at least one hundred (100) members in the same country, these Affiliate Clubs must work together to become an Affiliate Federation of BPW International.

iii. Individual Affiliate Members (Business and Professional Women) ("Individual Member")

An Individual Affiliate Member is defined as any person, domiciled in a country where there is no Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club. This person must support and adhere to the objectives of BPW International.

Individual Affiliate Members are passive Members of BPW International. As such, they do not have voting rights at the General Assembly and are not eligible for election.

The Constitution of an Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club must be approved by BPW International and must be consistent with these Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) and ensure good governance.

BPW International (The Association) will maintain a list of the Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs and Individual Affiliate Members (art. 61a Swiss Civil Code). Information relating to each Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Club and Individual Affiliate Member and any supporting documents will be kept for five years after the Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Club or Individual Affiliate Member concerned has been deregistered (art. 61a para. 3 CC).

Refer to the Procedure Manual on what information and format is provided for the records.

13.2. Membership

Any Federation of Business and Professional Women, any Club of Business and Professional Women and/or any Business and Professional Woman may join BPW International (the Association) as a new Member if they comply with the conditions outlined under 13.1 Definitions above.

Any Federation of Business and Professional Women, any Club of Business and Professional Women and/or any Business and Professional Woman wishing to become an Individual Member must submit a written application to the BPW International Executive.

Where a country has a minimum of three (3) Clubs Affiliate to BPW International and at least 100 members in total within those Clubs, the Clubs must together apply to become a Federation Affiliated to BPW International.

Written applications for membership will be voted on by the Executive, which may approve or reject applications at its discretion and decide the effective date of admission.

A Business and Professional Women's Federation, a Business and Professional Women's Club and/or a Business and Professional Woman will not be recognized as a Member until the formal decision of the Executive.

13.3. Termination of Membership

Any Member's membership can be terminated by

- i. Confirmation of the resignation of a Member from a Club/Federation, must be sent in writing to the International Executive, for their records, at least six (6) months before the end of the calendar year (art. 70 al. 2 CC):
 - Affiliate Federation to International Executive
 - Affiliate Club to their Affiliate Federation
 - Affiliate Club in countries with no Federations to the International Executive
 - Individual Affiliate Members to International Executive
- ii. Death, if the Member is an individual Membership is inalienable (art. 70 al. 3 CC).
- Removal, i.e. the withdrawal of the Member by decision of the International Executive, subject to three (3) months' written notice to the individual Member or to the Member's President or, failing that, to the Member's secretary:
 - Affiliate Federation to International Executive,
 - Affiliate Club to their Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club to International Executive
 - Individual Affiliate Members to International Executive
 - Past International Presidents
 - Executive Members
- iv. The removal of a Member (e.g. Affiliate Federations, Affiliate Clubs, Individual Members, Past International Presidents and Executive Members) may occur in particular to: (refer to the Procedure Manual section 4.4 on the process)
 - □ When the Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Club, Individual Member has not paid its dues for one (1) year.

- □ Where a complaint has been made to the Executive regarding:
 - o misconduct by a Member in relation to the affairs of BPW International,
 - o or where an allegation against a Member gives rise to suspicion that the Member has acted in a manner likely to bring BPW International into disrepute,
 - where a member has put BPW International at risk, for example through financial management, reputational loss, appropriating funds allocated for purposes of BPW, risk to registration and professional reputation
 - o where a member has not met their obligations under the following:
 - BPW International Constitution and Regulations
 - BPW International Procedure Manual
 - other supporting documents for example Regional Regulations, Guidelines or By-Laws
 - □ Affiliate Federation and Affiliate Club Constitutions

In all cases, the current year's membership fee remains payable by the outgoing Member.

C14. Name and Logos

14.1. Legal Entity / Identification of BPW International

The name International Federation of Business and Professional Women (IFBPW) otherwise called BPW International, and the logos are in the sole ownership of BPW International.

14.2. Logos

Identification with the International Federation of Business and Professional Women (IFBPW) Affiliates must identify themselves as affiliates of the International Federation of Business and Professional Women (BPW) on websites and letterheads at a minimum.



(Refer to the Procedure Manual on the colours and formal use).

III. REGULATIONS

R1. ORGANIZATION OF BPW INTERNATIONAL (THE ASSOCIATION) (MANDATORY CLAUSE)

The bodies of BPW International are:

- □ The General Assembly
- The International Board
- The "Executive (Board)" (i.e., by analogy, the body referred to in the CC as the "Management").

R2. <u>GENERAL ASSEMBLY</u> (MANDATORY CLAUSES)

2.1. General Information

The General Assembly is the supreme body of BPW International (the Association) within the meaning of art. 64 et seq. of the Swiss Civil Code.

It comprises:

- · Members of the Executive
- Past International Presidents
- Delegates from Affiliate Federations
- Appointed Delegate of the Affiliate Clubs in the same country; and
- Chairs of the Standing Committees.

2.2. General Assembly For The Triennium

The General Assembly is held every three (3) years, at the time of the International Congress.

Elections, appointments and resolutions made at the General Assembly must comply with the rules set out in the Procedure Manual.

2.3. Annual Audited Accounts

Virtual General Assembly, or for distribution and electronic voting by the International Board.

The annual/yearly Audited Accounts will be prepared and issued to the International Board (August/September) for the purpose of the review of the annual accounts and the audited report for the year for voting in accordance with Art 64 of the Swiss Civil Code.

A copy of the annual accounts and the audited reports, completed every year, is sent through to the International Board for their records and voted at the virtual General Assembly. All three reports for the Triennium are included in the Congress Workbook.

A three-year budget is prepared by the Executive Board for approval at each triennial General Assembly at the time of the International Congress. It is managed by the Executive Board, and the budget results (actuals vs budget), as well as the following year s budget changes for approval, are presented annually to the International Board along with the annual accounts and audited report.

2.4. Extraordinary General Assembly

The Executive Board or one-fifth (1/5) of the Members of BPW International (the Association), in accordance with art.64 para.3 CC, may at any time request that an Extraordinary General Assembly be held, specifying the purpose thereof.

The Extraordinary General Assembly must be held within eight (8) weeks of the request, virtually (online).

Decisions made at an Extraordinary General Assembly must be reported in writing and issued to the International Board and will be ratified at the following General Assembly (Congress).

R3. GENERAL ASSEMBLY - INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS

3.1. International Congress

The date and venue of the International Congress will be determined by the Executive of the same triennium in which the Congress will be held.

Five (5) years before the date of the Congress, the Executive will issue a call for applications from Members wishing to participate in the organization of the Congress.

Call for Congress bids and the selection process must conclude within the first 6 months of the triennium.

Offers of candidature must meet the criteria set out in the Procedure Manual.

Unless otherwise decided by the General Assembly, the International Congress will be held in one of the following five (5) Regions:

- Africa
- Asia-Pacific
- Europe; or
- Latin America; or
- North America and The Caribbean.

In accordance with a rotation system, all regions must host the International Congress in turn. There is no predefined order. A Region can only be skipped when no country in the Region submits a bid.

In the event of a pandemic, war, climate disaster or world crisis, requiring the urgent cancellation of the face-to-face for the International Congress, this would be

automatically upgraded to a full online meeting to ensure the safety and well-being of all Members of BPW International.

In the event that a proposed Congress location would put BPW International and its members in significant financial or personal risk due to political instability within a country, the Executive will have the authority to change the venue/country location, either in the same Region or in a Region that had previously submitted a bid for Congress.

To permit change in event and schedules, this is to be coordinated within six months (OR 8 WEEKS AS PER THE 1/5TH EXTRAORDINARY VIRTUAL GA) of the original International Congress.

The next Congress will then be to the next Region who had submitted the appropriate documentation and received the approvals by the Executive Board.

3.2. Timeframes For Congress/General Assembly

A clear timeframe for the "Call to Congress", and invitations to Members, notifications, receipt of nominations, resolutions and final documentation is outlined under the Procedure Manual. The following key items are to be met by the Executive Board, International Board and Affiliate Federations and Clubs.

i. Invitations for the International Congress and General Assembly:

The Call to the International Congress will be prepared by the President and the Executive Secretary and distributed to the International Board **eight** (8) months before the International Congress.

The Executive will be responsible for sending invitations to Members.

The invitations sent to Members contain the agenda of the General Assembly.

All documentation relating to the business of the General Assembly, including the agenda, will be made available to Members on the BPW International website.

Invitations may be sent by e-mail.

Six (6) months before the General Assembly:

Nominations, policy resolutions and Constitutional and Regulations and Procedure Manual proposed resolutions amendments must be submitted.

iii. Four (4) months before the General Assembly:

Nominations and proposed resolutions have been reviewed and acceptance confirmed. Supporting documents are circulated to the International Board.

iv. Three (3) months before the General Assembly:

Executive, Immediate Past President, UN Representatives and Standing Committee Chairs must submit their reports for inclusion into the General Assembly workbook.

V. Two (2) months before the General Assembly:

The Executive Secretary must circulate the agenda for the pre-General Assembly meeting of the International Board and any other available material that is relevant for members participation in the General Assembly.

Any proposed friendly amendments to the Resolutions or Proposed Amendments for the Constitution and Regulations, or Procedure Manual are to be received two (2) months prior to the General Assembly.

3.3. Meeting Mode

The General Assembly for the International Congress is held for all of the Members, Delegates, Alternate Delegates, Guest, Observers, Participants face to face.

(Process for any online attendance as observers is at the discretion of the Executive, refer Procedure Manual).

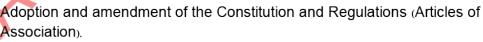
3.4. Proposals For Items On The Agenda

Proposals for items on the agenda to be submitted to the General Assembly must be sent by e-mail to the International President's office, and copied to the Executive Secretary, no later than six (6) months before the first day of the International Congress.

3.5. Powers

The General Assembly delegates to the Executive the powers to manage and represent BPW International (the Association).

The General Assembly retains the following inalienable powers:



- Approval of the annual reports and accounts (audited).
- Decide to dissolve or merge BPW International (the Association).
- Management of all matters that do not fall within the remit of other bodies

3.6. Voting At The General Assembly (With Mandatory Clause Added In Red)

- i. Principle
 - Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs vote through Delegates. Only Delegates of Affiliate Members who are up to date with their dues (and any penalties) may vote.

- · Individual Members do not have voting rights.
- A Delegate's vote corresponds to one vote. Delegates may be represented by their Alternate Delegate.
- · Abstentions and invalid votes do not count towards the majority.
- ii. Affiliate Federation Delegates

The number of Affiliate Federation Delegates is determined by the number of members each Affiliate Federation has, with a minimum of six (6) Delegates for Federations with a minimum of 100 to maximum of 500 members. The number of voting delegates increase pro-rate on the number of members the Federations have, these are set out in the Procedure Manual. Each Affiliate Federation is entitled to the same number of Alternate Delegates.

iii. Affiliate Club Delegates

Each country in which there are one (1) to a maximum of four (4) or more Affiliate Clubs are entitled to one Delegate. Each Affiliate Club is entitled to the same number of Alternative Delegates.

The voting of each Affiliate Club, in a country where there is no Federation formed, is in accordance with Swiss Civil Code.

- iv. Other participants at the General Assembly
 - Executive Members each have one vote and are entitled to vote in that capacity only.
 - Past International Presidents are entitled to vote solely in their capacity as Past International Presidents and if their dues, either as a member of an Affiliated Federation, Affiliate Club or Individual are paid in full.
 - Chairs of Standing Committees each have one vote and are entitled to vote solely in their Chairs of Standing Committees and if their Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club's dues are paid in full.

For further information, please refer to the Procedure Manual.

3.7. Quorum

A vote of the General Assembly is valid only if a one-quarter (1/4) of the votes of the Members represented by Delegates who are present face to face at the General Assembly. The quorum is based on the number of votes of all Delegates present face to face and eligible to vote.

To permit face-to-face voting, this will be implemented through the engagement of an independent external online provider for secure voting with an audit system.

3.8. Decisions (Mandatory Clause)

3.8.1. Decisions During The General Assembly

The General Assembly decides by means of Resolutions that have been received. Resolutions on finance or dues must be issued four (4) months prior to the General Assembly.

A Resolution is a written proposal, submitted for inclusion in the agenda for addressing a specific operational matter or advocacy issue, these are identified as either:

- i. BPW International Internal and Operational Matters:
 - Operational and Governance
 - Constitution / Mandates / Policies
 - Constitution and Regulations
 - Procedure Manual updates
- ii. BPW International Policy Advocacy Resolutions Register <
 - Resolutions on External and Advocacy Matters, for Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs to use for advocacy within their countries
 - For submission to the United Nations
- iii. Formal decisions of Resolutions are held through the Standing Orders process, for rules of debate and voting:
 - Motions can be received from the floor from a mover/seconder and require a vote to "pass" or carry the motion.
 - Constitution and Regulation Resolutions require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the quorum present to be "adopted".
 - External Resolutions require a simple majority vote of the quorum present to be "adopted"
- iv. Reports, as presented in the Congress Workbook are received but before being adopted, any recommendations arising from a report must be seconded before it can be put to the vote, and a simple majority is required to pass the recommendation.

3.8.2. Decisions Outside The General Assembly

Outside General Assemblies, a written proposal from the Executive or the International Board, to which all Members, who are entitled to vote through a Delegate at the General Assembly, have subscribed in writing, will be equivalent to a Resolution of the General Assembly.

The written proposal of the Executive or the International Board is sent by email to the Members entitled to vote through a Delegate at the General Assembly.

Members are given 20 working days to accept the written proposal in writing, by return e-mail. After this deadline, the written proposal is considered to have been rejected by the Member who has not responded in time and therefore their vote will be recorded as an abstention.

3.9. Minutes And Proceedings (Mandatory Clause)

- i. The Minutes of the General Business Sessions of the General Assembly are to be submitted three (3) months following the closing of the Congress and issued to the Registration office with a copy of the:
 - amended Constitution and Regulations adopted and signed by the outgoing appointed Executive signatories, in the final business session of the General Assembly
 - □ forms with the details of the newly appointed Executive and signatories for the next triennium
- ii. The Congress Proceedings and Minutes of the General Assembly and the International Congress will be kept by the Executive, or on its behalf, the Executive Secretary.

Within twelve (12) months of the International Congress and General Assembly, the Immediate Past President is to work with the Executive Secretary and Executive Finance Officer from her term to ensure the Proceedings and the finalized accounts of the International Congress are completed and forward to the International Board.

R4. CONFLICTS OF INTEREST (MANDATORY CLAUSE)

All Members are legally prohibited from being represented by their Delegate or from exercising their right to vote in decisions relating to a BPW International (an Association) matter or lawsuit where they, a close relative, their spouse or their parents or relatives in the direct line are involved (as pursuant to art 68 of the Swiss Civil Code).

Elected or appointed officials are not to participate in making or in any way attempting to use her official position to influence a decision in which she knows or has reason to know that she has a conflict of interest.

Conflict of interest is when the BPW Member derives any personal, and/or financial gain, directly or indirectly as a result of the member s elected or appointed duties in BPW.

R5. INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

The President chairs meetings of the General Assembly.

The President has a casting vote in the event of a tie, except in the case of elections, where the result is determined in accordance with the rules of the Procedure Manual.

The President is ex-officio on all International committees except for the General Assembly Nomination and Election Committees.

R6. INTERNATIONAL BOARD

6.1. Competence

The International Board is competent to:

- approve amendments to the Procedure Manual made by the Executive
- approve non-budgeted expenditure
- approve any authorized or emergency expenditure from the Battersea Fund
- · vote on the removal of a Member who has not paid their dues
- vote on the expulsion of a Member who has behaved in a manner likely to damage the reputation of BPW International
- vote on the withdrawal of a member of the Executive or of a member of a Standing Committee
- vote on the withdrawal of a Trustee
- vote on important matters referred to the International Board by the Executive.

Refer to description of Member as outlined under section C13 Members under Constitution (above) and the Procedure Manual.

6.2. Composition

The International Board consists of is made up of the following members:

- · Members of the Executive
- Past Presidents of BPW International
- Each Affiliate Federation may appoint five (5) Representatives to the International Board for up to 1,000 members and an additional one (1) vote for every additional 3,000 members
- Delegate of Affiliate Clubs in a country where there is no Federation (and maximum of four (4) clubs), that qualify for a vote are represented by one (1) appointed representative per Club.

Chairs of Standing Committees.

6.3. Representatives / Delegates

Each Affiliate Federation may appoint five (5) Representatives to the International Board for up to 1,000 members and an additional one (1) vote for every additional 3,000 members.

In countries where there is no Affiliate Federation but only Affiliate Clubs, each Affiliate Club may appoint one (1) Representative to the International Board.

6.4. International President

The International President chairs meetings of the International Board.

6.5. Meetings

Meetings of the International Board shall will be held immediately before and immediately after the General Assembly.

Extraordinary meetings of the International Board may be convened by:

- □ the President, or
- must be called by her on the written request (as received by the Executive Secretary) of the majority of the Executive, or
- \Box at the written request of one third (1/3) of the members of the International Board.

One quarter (1/4) of the members of the International Board will constitute a quorum at a meeting of the International Board.

Between meetings, the International Board can make decisions online by an electronic vote.

6.6. Decisions And Voting By The International Board

The International Board takes decisions at its meetings by a simple majority.

Each Affiliate Federation has five (5) votes, with each representative having one vote only. If a Representative is unable to attend their vote is void.

Each Affiliate Club, in a country with no Affiliate Federation (100 members or more) has one (1) representative with one (1) vote.

The vote of each Representative is suspended if the Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club concerned is not up to date with its membership fees (or any other penalty).

The other members of the International Board each have one vote.

The International President has the casting vote in the event of a tie.

Outside meetings, the International Board may take written decisions by circular (by email) provided that all members of the International Board agree.

Decisions of the International Board must be recorded and distributed to the International Board within 30 days

Decisions of the International Board must be presented to the next General Assembly for ratification.

R7. FUNCTIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES (MANDATORY CLAUSE)

7.1. Powers

The Executive is the executive body of BPW International (the Association). It has the right and duty to manage the day-to-day business of BPW International (the Association) and to represent it in accordance with the Articles of Association (Art. 69 CC). It decides on all matters not expressly reserved for the General Assembly and the International Board.

In particular, the Executive will take all measures necessary to achieve BPW International s (the Association's) aims / objectives, ensure the correct application of these Articles of Association and any other internal regulations, administer BPW International s (the Association's) property, assets and resources, keep the accounts and convene and organize the General Assembly.

The Executive executes and implements the decisions of the General Assembly. It manages BPW International (the Association) and takes all necessary measures to ensure that the stated aims are achieved. It bears collective responsibility for operational, financial and administrative matters.

In particular, at the beginning of the three-year period, the Executive is responsible for:

- Defining the priorities and the plan of action plan for the triennium three-year period, in line accordance with the theme and goals objectives proposed by the International President.
- Maintain a cloud-based digital platform for the work and storage of BPW International's official documents and official records, which the Executive can securely access securely from various a variety of locations.
- □ To appoint the Officers and define the composition of the Standing Committees.
- To make arrangements for the delivery of member provision of Services to Members Affiliates and Friends & Fellows.
- □ To make arrangements for the BPW International President's Office.
- To decide on the venue and date of the triennial International Congress, on the basis of documented bids submissions received and presented to at the General Assembly.

terminate the term of office of a BPW International officer and/or committee member.

Maintain an up-to-date list of all Members, refer to description of Members as outlined under section C13 Members under Constitution (above).

The extended powers of the Executive are set out in the Procedure Manual.

7.2. Composition

The Executive is composed of:

- The President
- The outgoing President, for a period of twelve (12) months from the end of her term of office

- The Executive Secretary
- The Vice President Membership
- The Vice President United Nations
- The Executive Finance Officer
- The Young BPW Representative
- The five (5) Regional Coordinators

All Members of the Executive are non-paid volunteers, who are reimbursed for their expenses, for example all disbursements, travel, accommodation, registrations, printing and products when required.

Members of the Executive must keep their expenses within the annual budget with the Finance Officer. All expenses for the annual Executive meeting are met by the budget for the annual Executive meeting (c.f. CAC draft operational guidelines 2013).

Precise descriptions of the duties of each member of the Executive are set out in the Procedure Manual.

7.3. Election

Members of the Executive (other than the outgoing President) are elected at each General Assembly by secret ballot.

Election of First and Second Vice President is confirmed in the General Assembly as outline in the Procedure Manual.

Their term of office ends when their successors are appointed or elected.

In the event of a vacancy, the Executive will have the power to appoint a successor until the next General Assembly.

7.4. Term Of Office

Members of the Executive may be elected to the same position only once (1), except for the positions of Executive Secretary, Executive Financial Officer and Regional Coordinators, which may be held by the same person for two (2) consecutive three-year terms.

A past member of the Executive cannot be nominated for a role that she has previously held (c.f. CAC draft Operational Guidelines 2013).

7.5. **Removal From Office And Resignation** (Mandatory Clause)

i. Removal from office

The mandate of a Member of the Executive may be revoked by the General Assembly, in particular, if she has breached her obligations to BPW International (the Association) or if she is unable to perform her duties properly.

The mandate may also be revoked by the Executive with the approval of the International Board. The Executive Member concerned may appeal against the latter decision in the manner set out in the Procedure Manual.

ii. Resignation

Members of the Executive may resign at any time by submitting a written statement to the President of the Executive, specifying the date on which their resignation will take effect.

iii. Vacancies during term of office

In the event of removal or resignation during a term of office, the Executive may appoint a replacement member by co-opting, until the next General Assembly.

7.6. International President

The International President chairs meetings of the Executive.

7.7. Delegation

The Executive is authorised to delegate some of its tasks to one or more of its Members, including sub-committees, to third parties it appoints as volunteers or to employees it hires.

7.8. Power Of Representation (Mandatory Clause)

The International President with one of the following, will have the power to represent BPW Internationally and sign any document with one of the following authorized signatories:

- Vice President(s)
- Executive Finance Officer
- Executive Secretary
- Regional Coordinators

They sign the relevant documents with the approval of the Executive, in the form set out in the Procedure Manual.

7.9. Meetings

The Executive will meet as often as necessary, but at least once (1) a year face-to-face.

In the case of the year in which the International Congress takes place, the Executive meeting must take place before the International Congress.

If three (3) members of the Executive so request, a meeting will be held within fourteen (14) days of the request.

The quorum of the Executive to hold a meeting will be six (6) members of the Executive.

Members of the Executive may validly participate in a meeting of the Executive and make decisions in person, by video or telephone conference or by any other means decided by the Executive.

Meetings in person may be held in the country where the President resides or abroad.

Meetings of the Executive will be convened by the President of the Executive at least three (3) months in advance. In urgent circumstances, the President may call an extraordinary meeting with fourteen (14) days' notice, with availability confirmed by the Executive to ensure a quorum is present.

7.10. Decision-Making - Executive

Each Member of the Executive has one vote. In the event of a tie, the International President will have the casting vote.

Executive decisions may also be validly taken by circular, by e-mail or other online communication methods

R8. ACCOUNTING

The Executive draws up the accounts for each financial year in accordance with the applicable legal provisions.

R9. INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

The President of BPW International is elected by the General Assembly in a secret ballot. She chairs the General Assembly, the International Congress, the International Board and Executive meetings.

The President is ex-officio on all International committees including:

- Standing Committees
- Regional Committees and Sub-Regional Committees
- Ad-hoc Committees, for example:
 - Constitutional Advisory Committee
 - **Resolutions** Committee

The President is not an ex-officio member on the General Assembly Nomination and Election Committees.

The President is the principal authority in charge of the organization of BPW International (the Association). She has the role of leadership and management, including:

- Validating appointments
- Establishing external relations with other international organizations and leaders
- Supervision and responsibility for all planning, management and promotional activities

R10. DISSOLUTION

The dissolution of BPW International (the Association) is voted on by the General Assembly. A two-thirds (2/3) majority of the votes present is required.

On the dissolution of BPW International (the Association), any assets will be transferred to a tax-exempt non-profit organization with the same or a similar purpose. The distribution of assets among its Members is excluded.

R11. LIABILITY (IES)

BPW International (the Association) is solely liable for its debts, which are guaranteed by its corporate assets.

Members have no personal liability for BPW International's (the Association's) debts.

R12. TRUSTEES

In the event that BPW International (the Association) acquires property, three (3) Trustees will be appointed where required by law.

They will be nominated by the Executive, elected by vote of the International Board and formally appointed by the International President.

Trustees will hold property on behalf of BPW International (the Association).

Trustees can make a decision to sell property following a recommendation from the Financial Management Team and the International Board.

Trustees will hold office until death, resignation, or removal by the International Board.

R13. AMENDMENTS

The Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) may only be discussed and amended, upon receipt of resolutions for submission to the General Assembly of BPW International.

A vote of two-thirds (2/3) of those voting, a quorum being present, is required for an amendment to be adopted. Resolutions are as per outlined under the Procedure Manual.

Amendments to the Constitution may be proposed by:

- members of the Executive
- the International Board
- Past Presidents of BPW International
- □ Affiliate Federations who are up to date with their dues
- □ Affiliate Clubs in the same country, all of whom are up to date with their dues
- □ Chair of Standing Committees.

At any time, the Executive and/or the International Board may propose to the Members, by e-mail, that the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) be amended.

The updated Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) will be proposed through resolutions, amended, voted on and adopted at the General Assembly.

R14. ENTRY INTO FORCE (MANDATORY CLAUSE)

14.1. Updated Constitution And Regulations (Statues)

These updated Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) will be amended as proposed and circulated by the Executive to the International Board, by email, for voting at the General Assembly to be held within four (4) months following receipt of the proposal and draft proposed amendments, proposed amendments ·left on the floor from Congress 2021, for the Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) in accordance with the procedure outlined for Call to Congress.

These Articles of Association ("Constitution and Regulations") were adopted at the General Assembly, Business Sessions (2-5) held on _____(days) November (month) 2024 and came into force in the 6th Business Session on _____(day) November (month) 2024.

These Articles of Association ("Constitution and Regulations") for "the Association" or "BPW International" will be put into force to meet the registration criteria of Article (art.) 60 and the following item (et seq.) of the Swiss Civil Code (hereinafter "CC") at the Registre du Commerce of the Canton of Geneva.

APPENDIX 1: BPW International Definitions

APPENDIX 1: BPW International Definitions

Adhoc Congress Committees: (for example Resolutions, Elections, Voting,

Nominations, Credentials, Registrations) body at the International Congress whose main task is to manage the organization of the General Assembly.

<u>Amendment</u>: this is a proposal to amend the Constitution and Regulations, which may come from the members of the Executive, the Past International Presidents, the Representatives appointed by the Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs and the Chairs of the Standing Committees.

<u>Association/BPW International</u>: The Association is an association under Swiss law called THE INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION OF BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL WOMEN (IFBPW or **BPW International**), founded in 1930, whose objective is to unite Business and Professional Women, of all professions and worldwide.

<u>Battersea Fund</u>: This is a fund whose origin is from the sale of London premises by BPW International (the Association), deposited in a specific account and whose use is controlled.

- <u>Business and Professional Women</u>: These are women or people who identify as such who share the values of BPW International (the Association) through their business, labour and professional work.
- **<u>BPW International Advocacy</u>**: BPW International s advocacy is speaking on behalf of Members and outsiders and taking action to initiate change and promote the status of women, explaining an idea to others or seeking to convince and encourage them to implement BPW International's ideas and values.

Chairs of Standing Committees: a person who chairs a Standing Committee.

- <u>Civil Society</u>: Civil Society includes non-governmental organizations that represent the interests of BPW International (the Association) to decision-makers but does not include government agencies or companies and commercial structures.
- <u>Club</u>: A Club is defined as an Affiliate Club of Business and Professional Women and is an active Member of BPW International.
- <u>Constitution and Regulations (Statutes)</u>: The Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) of BPW International form the Articles of Association (AoA), these govern the internal operation of BPW International. Where required they include reference to other supporting documents and policy. Their content and application are specified in the Procedure Manual.

Country: A geopolitical unit which has full sovereignty.

- <u>Delegate</u>: a person appointed by an Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club to represent them at the General Assembly. Each Affiliate Federation is able to appoint a number of Delegates according to the number of Members it has. Affiliate Clubs in each country, where there are no Affiliate Federations are able to nominate one (1) Delegate per Club (maximum four (4) clubs or less than 100 members). Alternate Delegates must be appointed.
- <u>Executive</u>: This is the Executive body of BPW International (the Association), according to Art. 69CC.
- <u>Executive Finance Officer</u>: The Executive Finance Officer is a Member of the Executive She is elected at the General Assembly.
- <u>Executive Secretary</u>: The Executive Secretary is a Member of the Executive She is elected by the General Assembly and her role is defined in the Procedure Manual.
- <u>Federation</u>: A Federation is defined as an Affiliate Federation of Business and Professional Women and is an active Member of BPW International.
- <u>Friends & Fellows</u>: these are people wishing to support BPW International (the Association) and making donations and bequests as they wish.
- <u>Financial Responsibilities</u>: Where required by law, the Trustees hold the properties on behalf of BPW International (the Association). They can be up to three (3) co-owners per property. The Trustees are appointed by the Executive and appointed by the President. Their withdrawal shall be decided by the International Committee.
- <u>General Assembly</u>: The General Assembly is the supreme decision-making body of the Association within the meaning of Articles 64 et seq. of the Swiss Civil Code. During the sessions of the General Assembly, Members discuss and vote on financial and other reports, Resolutions and Statutory Amendments, elect the members of the Executive, and debate any other matters.
- <u>Individual Affiliate Member</u>: An Individual Affiliate Member is defined as a natural person, domiciled in a country where there is no Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club. Individual Affiliate Members are passive Members of BPW International. As such, they do not have the right to vote at the General Assembly.
- Internal and Operational Matters: BPW International Operations Resolutions Register, which documents all Resolutions relevant to BPW International internal operations that have been passed at Congresses and Board Meetings since 1930 to the present time. It will be updated as new Resolutions are passed at future Congresses and Board Meetings.
- External and Advocacy Matters: BPW International Policy Advocacy Resolutions Register, which documents all Resolutions relevant to BPW International policy advocacy that have been passed at Congresses and Board Meetings since 1930 to the present time. It will be updated as new Resolutions are passed at future Congresses and Board Meetings.

International Congress: The BPW International Congress is a recurring gathering of BPW International Members and other stakeholders, including, International Board meetings held before and after the general assembly, workshops and networking activities. The General Assembly is held during the International Congress.

The International Congress is held every three (3) years, during the third year of the International President's Triennium.

International President: The President of BPW International is elected at the General Assembly. She Chairs the Executive, International Board and the International Congress and General Assembly(s).

- Legal Entity: when registration has been approved, the name of BPW International (the Association) is formally enrolled on a register of NGOs, BPW International acquires existence as a legal entity. Legal entity status means that BPW International (the Association)¹ is liable for the debts, contracts, leases and obligations that are entered into, not the Affiliate Federation, Affiliate Clubs or Individual Members. Tax exemptions and VAT certificates are uploaded into the BPW International (the Association) website.
- <u>Members</u>: there are several categories of Affiliate Members in BPW International, these can be active have a voting right by representation or passive do not have a voting right. The Members of BPW International (the Association) are:
 - Affiliate Federations
 - Affiliate Clubs
 - Individual Affiliate Members

In order to become a Member of BPW International (the Association), a written request must be made to the BPW International Executive

<u>Member Services</u>: Member Services takes care of technical support and administrative issues that may be faced by Members of the Association.

- <u>Motions</u>: The formal process that is applied to when a business matter also known as a motion is put to the floor and seconded and opened for positive and interactive debate.
- <u>Mover /Seconder of Motions</u>: The first speaker is the mover of the motion, usually have prepared the proposed resolution/motion and is in support of the motion going forward and the seconder provides additional support to the motion being presented.
- <u>Office of the International President</u>: each International President has the right to be provided with an Office, close to their home, in order to carry out all the tasks relating to BPW International (the Association). The Executive shall decide on the budget allocated for the rental or acquisition of such a place.
- <u>Past International Presidents</u>: Past International Presidents are Businesswomen and Professionals who have served as President of BPW International (the Association) in the past. The outgoing Former President has a place on the Executive for the first twelve (12) months of a triennium.

- <u>Procedure Manual</u>: The Procedure Manual contains additional regulatory standards, which supplement the Articles of Association and do not have to be included in the Articles of Association under Swiss law.
- Standing Orders: The Standing Orders set out the procedures to be used during the BPW International Congress and International Board Meetings. The Standing Orders cover the rules for discussion, who may speak and who may vote. The conduct of the meeting is controlled by the general will of the membership, giving a majority decision after a full and fair consideration of the issues involved. The Standing Orders are designed to provide for constructive and democratic meetings to help, not hinder, the business of the meeting. Undue strictness should never be allowed to intimidate members or limit full participation.
- <u>Trustees</u>: A trustee is a person who holds the legal title of any property, assets, or group of assets on behalf of BPW International and will be their duty to manager on behalf of BPW International. A trustee may be appointed for additional purposes, such as bankruptcy, for a charity or for a trust fund.
- <u>Ratified</u>: These Constitution and Regulations, following the adoption of all Constitution and Regulation amendments in the General Assembly, are to be updated and signed by the outgoing Executive for each respective Triennium and submitted, with a copy of the business session minutes, within three (3) months of close of Congress.
- **<u>Registration</u>**: BPW International to be registered and all relevant documents to be submitted annually (financial audits) or every three years following BPW International S Congress and General Assemblies. The Constitution and Regulations (Statutes) must be submitted in both English and language specified by the Registration office (e.g. French in Geneva).
- <u>Regions</u>: There are five (5) regions within BPW International, each of which must host the International Congress in turn. The Regions are as follows:
 - Africa
 - Asia-Pacific
 - Europe
 - Latin America

North America and The Caribbean

<u>Regional Coordinators</u>: The Regional Coordinator of each Region are Members of the Executive. The Regional Coordinators are elected at the General Assembly.

Representative on the International Board: this is a woman appointed by an Affiliate Federation or Affiliate Club to represent them on the International Board. Each Affiliate Federation may appoint two (2) Representatives. In countries that do not have an Affiliate Federation but only Affiliate Clubs, they must appoint one (1) Representative from each Club (maximum four (4) or less than 100 members) in the same country.

- <u>Resolutions</u>: A Resolution is a proposal on the agenda voted affirmatively and adopted at the General Assembly. The Resolutions can be submitted by Affiliate Federations and Affiliate Clubs, as well as any Member of the Executive, Chairs of Standing Committees and Past International Presidents.
- Term: A term is the period between 2 consecutive General Assemblies
- <u>Serious matter</u>: A matter which requires a decision that has substantial financial, organisational, legal or political implications for BPW International, supported by an analysis of the potential consequences.
- <u>Swiss Civil Code</u>: It is a requirement of registration in Geneva that this Constitution and these Regulations comply with the Swiss Civil Code (SCC); the relevant articles in the 2010 version of the Code are Articles 60 to 79 and ongoing updates specific to the function of Section/Chapter 2: **the Associations**, in the future.

<u>Urgent resolutions</u>: An urgent resolution must be about matters of international importance that arise after the closing date for submitting resolutions.

- <u>Vice-President Membership</u>: The Vice-President Membership is a Member of the Executive. She is elected by the General Assembly and her role is defined in the Procedure Manual.
- <u>Vice-President United Nations</u>: The Vice-President United Nations has a place on the Executive. She is elected by the General Assembly and her role is defined in the Procedure Manual.
- <u>Vice-President First and Second</u>: Following the election of the two Vice Presidents by the General Assembly, a second secret ballot is held for the election of who will be First or Second Vice-President by the General Assembly, this is determined by the member who achieves this highest number of votes.
- Young BPW Members: Young BPW form a Standing Committee composed of all Members under the age of thirty-five (35), belonging to an Affiliate Federation, an Affiliate Club or being an Individual Affiliate Member.

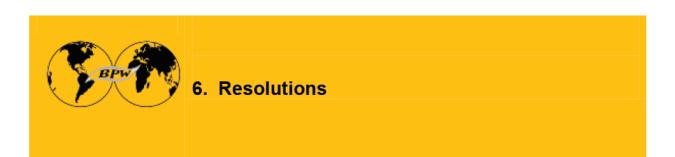

6.1. Proposed External Resolutions

6.1.1. External Resolution: Accessible, Affordable, Flexible and High Quality Childcare

Title of proposed resolution	Accessible, Affordable, Flexible and High Quality Childcare
Proposed by	BPW Canada

Financial Impact	Administration Costs only

MOTION:

Aware that in many countries childcare is too expensive, too far from home, low quality, and not flexible with hours of work. This results in women not entering or leaving the workforce, both having a huge impact on the economic status and quality of life of women, children and their families.

Mindful that research illustrates that affordable, accessible, flexible and high-quality childcare plays a significant role in women's earning potential, reducing the gender pay gap and breaking cycles of poverty.

Recognising that childcare is important to BPW International's commitment to achieving UN SDG 4, 5, 6; Convention on the Rights of the Child; and Universal Declaration of Human Rights (Art 23) – the right to work

Be it Resolved:

That all BPW International Affiliates urge their governments to:

- a. recognise the ongoing need and impact of accessible and affordable childcare programs on the economic prosperity of women and their families in reducing poverty and aligning with the human rights goals of the United Nations;
- invest in childcare programs that are affordable, accessible, flexible and high-quality in order to improve the social and economic conditions of women, children and their families (quality of life as well as economics); and
- c. invest in a workforce strategy to ensure a sustainable supply of high-quality childcare providers through improved working conditions, wages and innovative collaborative training and certification initiatives with educational institutions, community colleges, newcomer and childcare centres.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:

The impacts of not having accessible childcare services affect not only how much money a woman can make, but the quality of her children's life as well. Several European countries note that childcare places are too far from work and home, or hours are not flexible with work hours and vice versa. Even in wealthy countries it is highly unaffordable, with low-income parents in the needing to spend up to half their yearly salary on childcare. Also,



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eligibility criteria are often unfavourable for marginalised families, even though they need it most. In addition, there is a high rate of staff turnover and a lack of qualified childcare staff.

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6.1.2. External Resolution: Action on Pay Discrimination

Title of proposed resolution	Action on Pay Discrimination
Proposed by	BPW New Zealand

Financial Impact	None

MOTION:

Aware of the persistent gender pay gap globally, which is typically much worse for indigenous, ethnic and disabled women and that no country has yet achieved gender pay parity.

Recognising that the gender pay gap has numerous impacts:

- Women have lower retirement savings, and may receive lower pension benefits and because of reduced savings, women's earning potential and long-term financial stability is impacted, such as ability to own her own home and have secure housing or be resilient during health crises;
- 2. Women are more likely to spend their lives working and caring for the home and loved ones they are more likely to retire in poverty;
- 3. Societal expectations and family decisions about who takes the burden of unpaid care, exacerbating a women's lower lifetime earnings;
- 4. When women increasingly enter a field, the average pay in that field tends to decline, relative to other fields; and
- 5. Possible national level disparities in healthcare, education and other resources. Poorer economic outcomes for countries such as unrealised economic productivity, higher income inequality, higher rates of poverty and lower labour market participation for women.

Acknowledging the significant body of BPW International policy on pay discrimination, such as the value of women's work, economic participation of women, equal pay for equal work, equality of opportunity, from 1936 onwards.

Recognising international mechanisms calling for state parties to address pay discrimination, including:

- The Commission on the Status of Women Agreed Conclusions 2024
- The 1995 Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action
- The Sustainable Development Goals (SDG), in particular: SDG 5 Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls and SDG 10 Reduce inequality within and among countries
- The Women's Empowerment Principles which specifically aims to support signatories in prioritizing, establishing and implementing equal pay policies and practices to ensure that all women and men are treated fairly at work (Principle 2).

Be it Resolved:

That BPW International and its Affiliates advocate that governments:

a) establish legislation to prevent gender pay discrimination with an intersectional lens;



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- b) improve reporting on the gender pay gap with an intersectional lens; and
- c) collaborate with private companies to develop meaningful and measurable gender
- pay gap metrics with an intersectional lens, which are publicly reported.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:

An intersectional lens in policy making recognises that people should not be defined by one characteristic - we all have our own unique, interconnected, set of circumstances. The advantages and disadvantages we each face are different - they are made up by a totality of factors. Five years ago, a Forbes article called out the lack of inclusion in this space, saying "As more corporates are mandated to disclose their gender pay gap, discussions on the topic have become mainstream. But other identities such as race are largely invisible in such discussions."

Now, in 2024, there is very little reporting on the global gender pay gap with an intersectional lens. Pay parity issues link to poverty and impact strongly on the ability of women to support themselves and their families.

Around 470 million of the world's working age population have some form of disability. For disabled women, the wage gap for those with disabilities is not well reported. A 2023 longitudinal study from Norway found that gender is a defining predictor for income and that disabled women are particularly disadvantaged.

Pay transparency and wage mapping policies attempt to shine a bright light on gender wage gaps within organisations. The goal of such measures is to encourage employers to prevent, and address pay inequity, to give workers and their representatives more information to combat pay discrimination, and to help governments identify when, where and how to target gender wage gaps. Earlier this year, the World Bank reported that "only 35 economies have adopted pay transparency measures or enforced mechanisms to address the pay gap". We would like to see this improved.

IMPLEMENTATION:

BPW International and its Affiliates:

- 1. Increase awareness of the impact of pay discrimination on women through all levels of political engagement, with an intersectional lens.
- 2. Support and lobby governments to pass legislation.
- 3. Collaborate with other organisations and NGOs with expertise in pay discrimination to support their work.

MOTION:

Acknowledging that Objective 5, one of the 23 objectives in the Agreed Outcome document (December 18, 2018) from the Global Compact for Safe, Orderly and Regular Migration deals with enhancing availability and flexibility of pathways for regular migration.

Noting that to facilitate safe, orderly and regular migration as well as to realize the Sustainable Development Goals the following SDG targets must be met:

(i) Implementation of planned and well-managed migration policies SDG 10.7

(ii) Promotion of just, peaceful and inclusive societies SDG 16.2

The central promise of Agenda 2030 is to "Leave no one behind" However, challenges like climate change, poverty and conflicts impede the realization of the Sustainable Development Goals, particularly when it comes to addressing the rights and needs of refugees, internally displaced individuals and those forced to flee their own countries because they are at risk of serious human rights violations, persecution and violence.

Be it Resolved:

That Affiliate Federations and Clubs urge their governments to:

- a. expand humanitarian pathways to address modern trends in human mobility; and
- b. facilitate safe, orderly, and regular migration pathways and increase awareness of options available.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:

Since 1951 international regulations governing refugee admissions have remained unchanged. These were specifically designed to respond to the tragic events of World War II. However, international law has not evolved to address recent pressing threats such as the spread of firearms to non-military actors, escalating drug related and gang violence, devastation and loss of land due to climate change, and life-threatening economic crisis leading to starvation.

The numerous visa types per country are each regulated by complex requirements. Most legal frameworks categorise migrants as "voluntary" or "forced". To summarise, voluntary migrants are those who wish to relocate to advance their career and socioeconomic status, re-unite with family, invest in a business or study. Meanwhile, forced migrants are those faced with persecution and whose lives are in danger. However, in the modern-day world there are numerous individuals who do not fit into either one of those categories. In fact



there are forced migrants who don't meet the definition of a refugee in the meaning of the 1951 Refugee Convention.

The antiquated and restricted definition of a refugee must change to keep up with today's terrors. We need to go beyond the 1951 meaning of persecution which is limited to political beliefs, religion, race, nationality, membership of a particular social group. As global citizens, we must urgently respond to the world's modern trends in human mobility by expanding humanitarian pathways because human lives are at stake. BPW members around the world have a role to play in leading discussions and presenting resolutions to influence migration policies, access justice, promote inclusion, and international protection as an humanitarian act consistent with the spirit of international solidarity

IMPLEMENTATION:

Affiliates of BPW International can implement the initiatives in clauses a) to c) of the resolution and BPW International can also advocate on this issue through UN agencies and global stakeholders while understanding that BPW is in a position to lead the conversation on planned and well-managed migration policies, building and expanding humanitarian pathways through all visa types, as well as upholding human rights through access to justice.

MOTION:

Mindful that modern slavery and worker exploitation is both a human tragedy and a growing organisational risk, rooted in poverty, discrimination and lack of social protection, and disruptive to fair competition between businesses.

Aware that women and children are disproportionately vulnerable to modern slavery. Modern slavery occurs in almost every country in the world, and cuts across ethnic, cultural, socio-economic status and religious lines.

Acknowledging existing BPW International policy:

- a) Sexual Slavery and Trafficking of Women and Girls (2002-5)
- b) Human Trafficking (2008-14)

Mindful of international mechanisms with reference to ending modern slavery and worker exploitation:

- United Nations Declaration of Human Rights
- Convention on the Rights of the Child
- Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women
- International Labour Standards on forced labour
- Commission on the Status of Women 68
- 1995 Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action
- Sustainable Development Goals, in particular 8.7

Be it resolved:

That BPW International and its Affiliates advocate that governments:

- a. introduce legislation requiring all businesses take action to prevent, mitigate or remedy any instances of modern slavery or worker exploitation in their domestic or international operations or supply chains;
- b. impose graduated levels of action and reporting requirements commensurate with the size and resources of the business; and
- c. require mandatory contract clauses to prevent Modern Slavery.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:



The International Labour Organisation (ILO) advises that "forced labour and slavery are not a thing of the past." Their definition of forced or compulsory labour is: "all work or service which is exacted from any person under the threat of a penalty and for which the person has not offered himself or herself voluntarily."

A 2022 report from produced by the ILO and others estimated that 50 million people were living in modern slavery in 2021, of which almost half were trapped in forced marriage. The report found that the number of people in modern slavery has risen significantly in the last five years.

Most victim-survivors of human trafficking are women (46%) or children (34%) (UN). Globally it is estimated that one in four victims of modern slavery are children (Unseen UK). More than half (52 per cent) of all forced labour and a quarter of all forced marriages can be found in upper-middle income or high-income countries.

63% of forced labour happens in the private economy, according to the ILO. International NGO, Walk Free, describes the products most at-risk of being produced with modern slavery (which G20 countries spend the most on) - Electronics, Garments, Palm oil, Solar panels and Textiles. Walk Free explains "Although the highest prevalence of forced labour is found in low-income countries, it is deeply connected to demand from higher-income countries. The production and movement of goods between countries ... creates complex and opaque supply chains, many of them tainted with forced labour."

The UK and Australian Modern Slavery Acts require companies in all sectors to report on how they are addressing the risks of modern slavery in their direct operations and supply chains. Other countries with similar or part legislation are Canada, the Netherlands, France, Germany, Norway and the United States. A review of the Australian act found the positive impacts includes the establishment of over 4,000 modern slavery statements, increased dialogue between government, the business community, civil society groups, government agencies, and universities about the Act's requirements, compliance trends and best practice reporting, and increased awareness about the link between modern slavery practices and global supply chains. We call on all countries to adopt modern slavery transparency and accountability legislation.

IMPLEMENTATION:

BPW International and its Affiliates:

- 1. Increase awareness of the impact of modern slavery on women and children through all levels of political engagement.
- 2. Support and lobby governments to pass legislation.
- 3. Collaborate with other organisations and NGOs with expertise in modern slavery to support their work.

6.1.5. External Resolution: Action on Climate Change

MOTION:

Recognising the need for an effective and progressive response to the urgent threat of climate change on the basis of best available scientific knowledge.

Mindful of the specific needs and special circumstances of developing countries, especially those that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change and who are already experiencing the greater impact of climate change. Further, of the greater impact of climate change on women and children and the lack of access to financial support, or having a voice, following environmental disasters in their areas. In addition, of the global, regional, national and local risk to economic, social and political stability, or the exacerbation of instability, because of the impacts of climate change.

Acknowledging existing BPW International policy: Taking Initiative in Environment Challenges (2008-19) and Environment – Water (2008-20).

Recognising International mechanisms calling for state parties to address climate change and the role of women, including: the Commission on the Status of Women 67 Agreed Conclusions; General Recommendation 37 to the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women; the 1995 Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action; and the Sustainable Development Goals.

Be it Resolved:

That BPW International and its Affiliates advocate for urgent and lasting action on climate change by advocating with Governments to:

- a. ensure emissions targets and supporting policy will achieve 'net zero' carbon pollution, including by updating Nationally Determined Contributions (NDC's, a state's climate action plan to cut emissions and adapt to climate impacts);
- b. formally recognise women as agents of change in addressing climate change by implementing the principles and provisions of General recommendation No. 37 on gender-related dimensions of disaster risk reduction in a changing climate; and
- c. introduce mandatory, publicly available, climate change risk disclosure by all those publicly listed companies, financial institutions, insurance providers, investment funds and private companies that have total assets of over \$1 billion.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:

To strengthen the global response to the threat of climate change, countries adopted the Paris Agreement. The Agreement aimed to mobilise nations to take action to address rising



global temperatures. Over 194 states, totalling over 98% of greenhouse gas emissions, have ratified or acceded to the agreement.

In 2023, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report found that "Humancaused climate change is already affecting many weather and climate extremes in every region across the globe. This has led to widespread adverse impacts and related losses and damages to nature and people. Vulnerable communities who have historically contributed the least to current climate change are disproportionately affected." A 2023 International Monetary Fund report found that urgent and decisive action is needed planned action would see emissions cuts of 11 percent below 2019 levels by 2030, whereas cuts needed to be 50 percent. The report called for drastic increases in mitigation investment.

A priority concern for women and girls is the full implementation of the 2018 General Recommendation 37 (GR37) which addresses the links between human rights and the gendered impact of climate change would underpin good processes.

Private companies also have an important role to play through the reporting of climate change risk. We seek the adoption of legislation that would require organisations to evaluate and disclose the risk that climate change will have on their business, using an internationally recognised reporting framework. By requiring such organisations to measure the financial impact that climate change will have they will develop a greater understanding of the risk that climate change poses to their business. Placing a value on the risk will encourage investment in mitigation and adoption of low carbon strategies and bring evaluating climate risk and resilience into the heart of financial decision making. Shareholders, investors and lenders will also be able to make informed decisions as to whether to engage with an organisation based on their climate change reporting.

IMPLEMENTATION:

BPW International and its Affiliates:

- 1. Increase awareness of the impact of climate change on women and children through all levels of political engagement.
- 2. Support and lobby governments to pass legislation.
- 3. Collaborate with other organisations and NGOs with expertise in climate change to support their work.

MOTION:

Mindful that access to health care and health information is essential for good health and well-being and that this responsibility often rests on women.

Being aware that internet access and cell phone usage have changed how health is practiced and how health information is obtained. Digital equity, however, has not been achieved as marginalized and Indigenous women and those living in rural, remote, and underserved areas have limited access to this technology.

Recognizing BPW International's commitment to fulfilling the SDGs, including SDG 3, 4, 5, 9, 17 and the UN Women CSW67, March 2023. *Technology and the Digital Gender Divide Agreed Conclusions.*

Acknowledging that a significant portion of the global population still lacks access to vital healthcare services.

Be it Resolved:

That all BPW International Affiliates urge their governments to:

- a. advance gender equality by promoting a healthy society and promote health, education, protection, and well-being in all communities;
- ensure universal and reliable internet access that does not hinge on income or geographic location as per UN CSW67 Technology and the Digital Gender Divide Agreed Conclusions;
- c. increase investment in health systems and infrastructure for health education and services and advocate for sustainable funding for that implementation;
- include governance mechanisms that engage marginalised groups, Indigenous women, childbearing women; women living with disabilities, gender diverse, and elderly women, especially in rural, remote locations, and as stakeholders in a national digital health strategy;
- create a national information and communication technology (ICT) framework that facilitates alignment between the health and ICT sectors, and which can build globally;
- f. mandate a reporting process to measure data on services to marginalised groups, Indigenous women, childbearing women, disabled women, gender diverse, and elderly women, especially in rural, remote locations; and
- g. ensure access to education regarding digital and portable electronic device literacy to facilitate the advancement of these goals



RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:

Full and equitable participation in the digital society requires universal and reliable internet access that does not hinge on income or geographic location. New and updated health research is continually being published on the internet. Digital equity is a necessity and right for all women and girls to access crucial health and health education services.

Increased investment in health systems is needed to overcome these setbacks, address long-standing healthcare shortcomings, support countries in their recovery, and build resilience against future health threats.

It is important to acknowledge that different countries could be at different stages of development or implementation when it comes to their own national and local digital health strategies.

Addressing disparities is critical to bridging this gap and ensuring equitable healthcare provision. Various determinants of health, including environmental and commercial factors, need attention to achieve our common health objective for all.

Ensuring healthy lives for all requires a strong commitment, but the benefits outweigh the cost. Countries worldwide are urged to take immediate and decisive actions to predict and counteract health challenges. This becomes especially critical in safeguarding vulnerable population groups and individuals residing in regions burdened by high disease prevalence. MOTION:

Recognising the increasing prevalence and breadth of online harm and technology facilitated gender-based violence and the exacerbated impact on women, children, and many other vulnerable groups. Furthermore, the breadth of harm facilitated through digital platforms and the internet, including but not limited to Cyberbullying, Hate Speech and Discrimination, Misinformation and Disinformation, Online Grooming, Human Trafficking and Exploitation, Cyberstalking and Harassment, Privacy Violations and Data Breaches, Online Radicalisation and Extremism.

Acknowledging existing BPW International policy: Violence, Video Films and Television (1983-14); Pornography and the Media (1989-05); Violence on Television (1996-15)

Recognising international mechanisms calling for state parties to address online harm, including: the Commission on the Status of Women Agreed Conclusions 2024; General Recommendation no. 35 on gender-based violence against women, updating general recommendation No. 19 of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women; the 1995 Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action; the Sustainable Development Goals, in particular: 5.b and 9.c; and the Convention on the Rights of the Child.

Be it Resolved:

That BPW International and its Affiliates advocate that governments legislate with urgency for:

- a. stronger regulation of online platforms, including introducing global standards for social media reform to ensure effectiveness, connectedness and consistency (e.g. the Center for Countering Digital Hate's STAR Framework);
- b. improved transparency requirements, human rights protections and independent oversight around the algorithms, advertising, and rules enforcement for online platforms;
- c. rigorous government content filtering systems particularly for child abuse sexual material, with independent accountability mechanisms;
- d. requiring internet service providers to filter with rigour illegal content, with independent accountability mechanisms;
- e. strong civil and criminal penalties for people and organisations who commit online harm;
- f. strong civil and criminal penalties for online platforms that fail to create safe spaces and/or respond adequately when harm occurs;



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- g. improved national-level data gathering and reporting on online harm with a sociodemographic lens; and
- h. more investment in education around online harm that considers how to communicate effectively with target audiences such as young people, other vulnerable groups and potential perpetrators.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:

This resolution is asking for targeted and urgent action to prevent and reduce online harm. This asks for state parties to legislate and act in a number of different ways because this is a complex issue that requires a multi-pronged approach. A 2022 UN report, Intensification of efforts to eliminate all forms of violence against women A/77/302 which cites a global study and country specific studies that indicate more than 30% of women personally experience online violence. In 2023, the international association of online abuse reporting hotlines, INHOPE, reported that 83% of child sex abuse material (CSAM) depicts children under 13 years of age and 95% of victims were girls. They note that "self-generated CSAM content figures remained consistently high according to hotline analysts", and "the notable rise in CSAM appearing on mainstream online platforms registered by INHOPE member hotlines in 2023 and an increase in cases related to messaging applications such as to the International Telegram, Signal, and Enigma." According Discord. Telecommunications Union, around 80% of children in 25 countries report feeling at risk of sexual abuse or exploitation online, while over a third of young people in 30 countries have experienced cyberbullying, with such distressing experiences leading one in five of them to skip school.

In 2023, the Expert Group Meeting on Removal of Child Sexual Abuse Material from the Internet reported that "for every image of child sexual abuse there are two components. There is the effect of the original abusive act depicted and there is the additional layer of harm caused by the child knowing or later learning that images of their abuse, pain and humiliation are now in circulation on the internet." The Centre for Countering Digital Hate (CCDH), an international NGO, has found that 1 in 15 messages to the women in a study, breached Instagram's community standards and "Instagram failed to act on 9 in 10 abusive messages and violent threats over direct message (DM) reported using its tools and failed to act on any image-based sexual abuse within 48 hours." The CCHD also report that young women are targeted with eating disorder, self-harm, mental health and suicide content within minutes of joining TikTok. Meta's internal research (shared via a whistle blower) found that 13.5% of teen girls said that Instagram makes thoughts of suicide worse.

As April 2023, two out of three of the global population — over 5 billion people — utilize the internet (Statistica). Globally, legislative action has not kept pace with the role that online platforms play in our lives. In most countries, under the existing regulatory frameworks, there is little that can be done after online harm and abuse has occurred - after something harmful is posted, it can be very difficult to get it taken down and the ramifications can keep re-traumatising a victim over and over. Women and children have a right to online safety as much as we do in all other spheres of our lives.

IMPLEMENTATION:

BPW International and its Affiliates:



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- 1. Increase awareness of the impact of online harm on women and children and other political groups through all levels of political engagement.Support and lobby governments to pass legislation.
- 3. Collaborate with other organisations and NGOs with expertise in online harm to support their work.

MOTION:

Aware that women are the backbone of the care economy, comprising 67% of the global health and social care workforce and performing 76% of unpaid care activities. Care work is highly gendered, undervalued, and often associated with poor working conditions and low pay; and unpaid care work is highly invisible.

Mindful that the world is faced with an increasing aging population and although traditionally families cohabited and provided care for aging family members, living arrangements have changed in recent years and there is a heightened demand for different forms of care.

Acknowledging that government laws and policies related to care and support of the elderly as well as the conditions of work for those providing care, are important to achieve SDG 3 (healthy lives and well-being), SDG5 (valuing unpaid care and domestic work), and SDG8 (productive employment, decent work, equal pay for equal value).

Recognising that there is a lot of variability across countries' labour codes, definitions and standards of care workers and the International Labour Organisation differentiates between institution-based and home-based personal care workers.

Be it Resolved:

That all Affiliates urge their governments to:

- a. ensure that laws and policies for care workers. in both the informal and formal sectors, include social protections, such as workplace safety, benefits (e.g., health care), and pay equity;
- b. develop high quality standards for staffing, staff education and training to drive better outcomes;
- c. recognise the value of care workers by ensuring equal pay for work of equal value;
- d. develop policies based on the 5R approach (recognising, reducing and redistributing unpaid care work and rewarding and representing paid care work); and
- e. establish standards and benchmarks with targets, measures, and national reporting.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:



People across the world are living longer and there is a higher chance of frailty, illness, disability and health needs. For many elders, insufficient care services and support limit their right to independent living and quality care.

Women carry the majority of unpaid care which impacts their income and mental health, and places them at risk for a life in poverty. Due to unpaid care responsibilities, they often adapt their work patterns by taking career breaks, working part-time or leaving the workforce prematurely. Vulnerable groups, such as domestic and migrant care workers, are particularly challenged.

As for paid care, the international long-term care community suffers from staffing shortages, wages below a living wage, and an unsupportive work environment. Those in paid employment are not receiving equal pay, with women earning on average 24 percent points less than men who are doing similar work. The 5R approach (recognizing, reducing and redistributing, reward and represent) is central to policy approaches to decent care work.

The UN Sustainable Development Goals are our agenda to save the world.

BPW has an opportunity as a leading women's organisation to be at the forefront of the policies and campaigns that will have an effective, meaningful and long - lasting impact on our families, business, societies and the world altogether.

BPW has the potential to lead impactful policies and campaigns addressing climate change's disproportionate effects on women and girls. Rising temperatures and extreme weather increase health risks, especially for pregnant women, the elderly, and children. Resource scarcity exacerbates violence, making women and girls vulnerable to gender-based violence. Women in agriculture face extreme weather and poor indoor air quality. MOTION:

Mindful that we still have a small number of young people compared to our overall membership. This is largely due to economic constraints. Many young people are either unemployed or studying and cannot afford the membership fee.

Be it Resolved:

That we allow young people to be exempt from membership fees for the first three years of membership of BPW International to:

- a. support many young members to join and help us expand our membership in BPW International; and
- b. actively encourage members to invite their friends to join in order for young women to help us promote our association and attract new members.

RATIONALE FOR THE RESOLUTION:

The presence of young women in BPW International is necessary if we want our association to continue to be relevant and interesting for all. We must allow them to participate in BPW without paying the membership fee for the first three years. This will give them the opportunity to join BPW and will be an added value for us.

Older members are very important in BPW because of their background and experience and they can be mentors to the young.

But the presence of the young is necessary in an ever-changing society with a strong demand for innovation all over the world.



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We believe that the presence of young women is essential if we are to ensure the sustainability of BPW International in the future taking into account the recent developments in artificial intelligence, innovative business strategies and new communication tools.

IMPLEMENTATION:

A budget without Young members' dues must be planned.

In 2022, there were approximately 1200 Young members. We do not yet have precise figures for 2023, but we believe that the same number of Young can be considered.

Whereas, BPW International has had resolutions prohibiting discrimination in three separate General Assemblies, to wit: 1958, 1959, and 1967 [See: BPW International Operations Resolutions Register 1930-2014, pp. 25 and 26, "Discrimination Within IFBPW Memberships" (1958); "Eradication of Prejudice and Discrimination" (1959); "Eradication of Discrimination Regarding Race, Language, Religion and Sex (1967)];

Non-discrimination Statement

BPW does not and shall not discriminate, on the basis of gender, race, religion (creed), age, nationality or geographic location, disability, marital status, or sexual orientation, in any of its activities or operations. We are committed to providing an inclusive, welcoming, and empowering environment for all members.

This role included advising on constitutional and procedural matters, supporting affiliation procedures, reviewing and approving the Constitution and Regulations of new Affiliates and more.

At the Federation level, I served as **President of BPW Canada** during the Centennial Year of Women's Suffrage and Canada's Sesquicentennial, 150th Anniversary of Confederation. This was after serving as **First Vice President and later as Immediate Past President on the board of BPW Canada (2014 to 2020)**. The highlights were highest number of resolutions presented to the Prime minister's Office compared to the previous decade, increased membership by 20%, establishment of diverse clubs (French speaking, from east to west, and members from male dominated occupations), as well as recognition of one hundred like minded organisations across Canada and presenting Defender of Human Rights Awards to BPW visionaries across Canada.

Locally, I served as **President of BPW Calgary, Canada** which was established in 1927, prior to the formal establishment of BPW Canada and BPW International. This was after serving as First Vice President and later as Immediate Past President on the local board (2010 to 2016). Achievements included taking the Equal Pay Day Campaign from the streets, schools and boardrooms into parliament garnering attention from different levels of government, the media, business sector and provincial human rights commission. These efforts resulted in a petition to the House of Commons to demand Equal Pay for Equal Work with the support of the leader of the Green Party of Canada.

EXECUTIVE FINANCE OFFICER BUDGET REPORT

Three-year period 2021-2023

PREMISE

It has been an honor and privilege for me to serve BPW International for the period 2021-2024 as Executive Finance Officer. It has been a very demanding job, and I have tried to do it as best I could and in the interests of BPW and to retain the legacy which has been handed down to me. I have always made sure that all expenses were within the budget planned and approved at the International Congress in 2021. I have always complied with the rules of the Procedure Manual and punctually sent all the financial documentation to the Financial Management Team, to the Executive and to the Regional Coordinators, monitoring not only the expenses, but also the payment of the Fees by the Federations and of associated Clubs. My action plan has been carried out in compliance with legal and accounting principles. I have implemented the financial policies of the IFBPW in accordance with the BPW Constitution and the BPW Procedure Manual and Regulations. I am committed to managing the international budget effectively and efficiently. I have tried to support Clubs and Federations in difficulty.

FINANCIAL REPORT

During the three-year period 2021-2023, together with the Accountant Dr. Barbara Russo, I developed the periodic financial reports and the situation regarding the Dues Oustanding, providing the appropriate payment reminders; and we have collected over 85% of the Dues. My approach to transparency and legality has characterized my mandate and I think everyone has been able to see this.

For BPW International's financial year, which runs from 1 January to 31 December each year, I have drawn up the Balance Sheet and the annual Profit & Loss Account with the report and the Notes to the financial statements explaining the main items. Each financial situation has been examined annually by the independent auditor.

The annual audit usually starts around March of the following year and ends in June. The International Board receives each year's Balance Sheet and P&L by the end of January each year, the fiscal year end report of the independent examiner (6) months after the year end and the EFO Report.

OVERVIEW OF FINANCIAL RESULTS (2021-2023)

Financial surplus

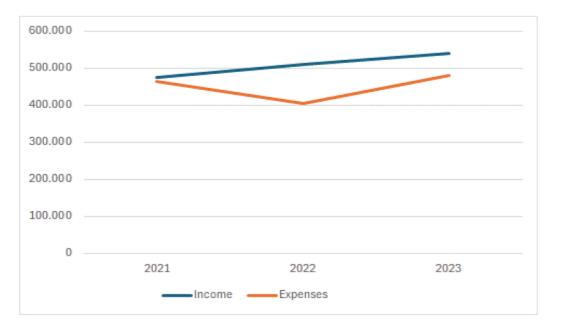
In this three-year period, BPW International has almost always had a conservative surplus.

BPW International's main source of income is membership fees. However, other sources of income such as the sale of pins and scarves have also contributed to increasing budgetary income to support BPW's secretarial costs.

The expenses include various elements: the costs of the President's Staff, important for carrying out the President's mandate; the costs of the day to day management of BPW, bank charges, expenses assigned to each member of the Executive and to the Regional Coordinators, currency gains or losses as BPW pays invoices mainly in euros but also in other currencies. Thanks to the donations received we have been able to finance projects especially in favour of Ukraine considering the war that has now continued for over 2 years.

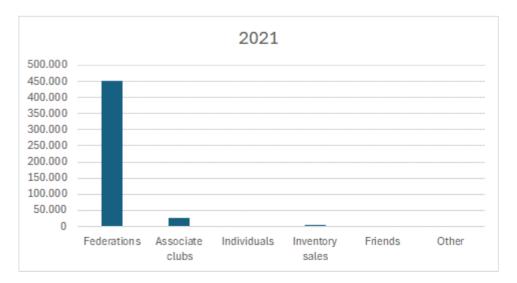

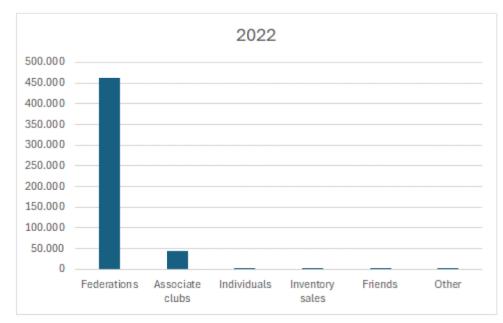

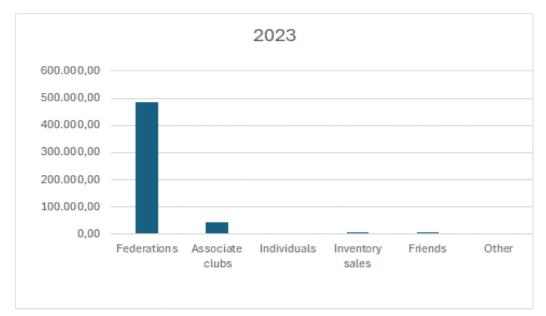
Below is the graph showing 2021 revenue as a percentage:

Below is the percentage breakdown of the Dues by individual Region:

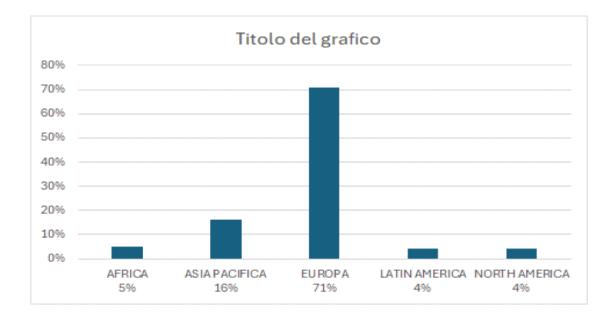

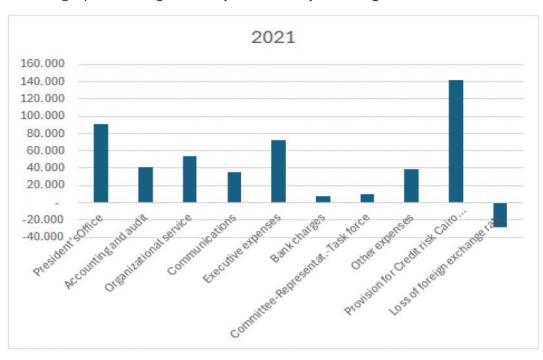

In 2021, total expenses were kept below the budget by 7%, considering that an amount of 141,840 euros was set aside for the credit risk fund for the 2017 Cairo Congress.

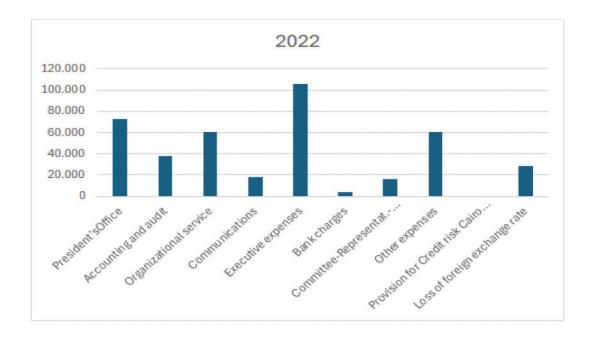
In 2022, total expenses were carefully managed and kept under budget by 18%.

In 2023, total expenses were carefully managed and kept below the budget to the extent of 2%, considering that an amount of €34,200 was set aside for the risk of non-collection of Dues not paid before 2021 and for Clubs and Federations to be abrogated; and also an amount of 25,000 euros for risk of non-collection of Dues not paid in the three-year period 2021-2023 and for future risks and charges.

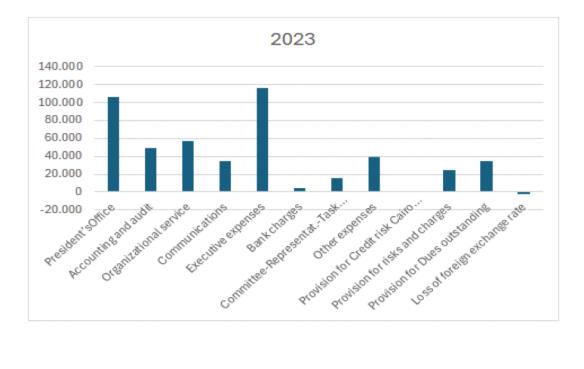


Below is the graph showing **2021 expenses as a percentage:**

To the members of the Board of International Federation of Business and Professional Women

Opinion

I have audited the accompanying financial report, of International Federation of Business and Professional Women, which comprises the statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances at 31 December 2021, the statements of revenue and expenditures, and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes and the statement.

MANAGEMENT REPORT EFO

In the P&L and in the Balance Sheet sent to the BPW Board at the end of January 2022, in accordance with the Manual of Procedure 2.3.6 - 6.1.2 and 6.2.1 all the revenue items and all the expense items by type are shown in an <u>analytical manner</u>. Each item presents the comparison with the single budget approved during the General Assembly of March 2021 for each single year of the three-year period 2021-2024, as well as with evidence of the balances of the previous year.

Within each item, the amounts deriving from the expenses incurred by the members of the Executive and by the International President for the work carried out on behalf of BPW during each fiscal year are collected by competence.

The amount of the Dues is established every three years by the General Assembly, to financially cover the expenses that BPW incurs in order to be present through its delegates, first and foremost the International President, in every country in the world and in every major forum worldwide.

Each Affiliate Federation and each Affiliate Club pays its membership Dues based on the number of members it claims to have had at the end of the previous year. The Dues request takes place annually and is accounted for on an accrual basis.

The amount of individual expenses is constantly monitored by the BPW EFO and by the Financial Management Team consisting of no. 5 members appointed according to the Procedure Manual at point 6.1 with control and super vision functions.

Each expense is checked and authorized by the EFO and International President and the related accounting entries are made monthly with reconciliation of bank account statements. During the Executive meetings, the EFO sends all the accounting documentation to the Financial Management Team in advance for control and to the Executive and prepares a presentation of the entire financial situation updated to the previous month.

The monitoring of the Dues is carried out monthly, with reminders to the Affiliate Federations and Affiliates Clubs that had not paid the dues and sending the schemes to the Regional Coordinators whose support is precious.

The budget and costs of the President's Staff are essential for the concrete operation and continuity of BPW's energetic and constant activity and action, and each expense is monitored and perfectly inherent to the aforementioned activity.

The international coordination and synergy activity with the most influential women's organizations in the world, and the indispensable presence of the international President at the meetings organized and at the most important offices due to the consultative status that BPW has at the UN, and its agencies since 1947, a warranty of the influence that BPW has with these Organizations.

Together with the final balance sheet, I, as EFO, will prepare my report, giving an account of the most significant items of the balance sheet which constitute the report of the operational, administrative and financial management of BPW. The financial statements are subjected to voluntary auditing by an independent statutory auditor who verifies the correctness, the relevance also under the accounting and documentary aspect of each individual expense, for some items analytically and for others on a sample basis.

At the end of the aforementioned audit, the Auditor issues his Report, certifying its truthfulness and compliance with the accounting principles for drawing up the financial statements, as well as the consistency of the EFO Report. The financial statements are subjected to voluntary auditing by an independent statutory auditor who verifies the correctness, the relevance also under the accounting and documentary aspect of each individual expense, for some items analytically and for others on a sample basis.

At the end of the aforementioned audit, the Auditor issues his Report, certifying its truthfulness and compliance with the accounting principles for drawing up the financial statements, as well as the consistency of the EFO Report.

The EFO draws up the monthly budget for its constant monitoring together with the operating expenses. The budget for each single year of the three-year period will then be approved by the General Assembly to be held in 2024, together with the reports referred to above.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

December 31, 2021 and 2020

NOTE 1. General Information

International Federation of Business and Professional Women (BPW INTERNATIONAL) was founded in 1930 and aims to develop professional, business and leadership potential for women at all levels.

NOTE 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of BPW International have been prepared in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standards.

Revenue Recognition

Revenues are recognized on an accrual basis

Inventories

Inventories include pins, card holders, buttons and books and are stated at the cost or net realizable value whichever is lower.

Foreign currency transactions

Foreign currency transactions during the year are converted into Euro at the average exchange rate of the end of the month. Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies at the end of the year are converted into Euro at the bank buying and selling rate on the balance sheet date. The gain or losses from translation are included in determining the earnings.

NOTE 3. BALANCE SHEET

Within ASSETS

***Cash:** The amount is related to the cash collection of the sale of scarves and pins during international conferences.

***Banks:** This is the liquidity in the current accounts held by BPW, including the Battersea Fund "HSBC GBP Account", at the exchange value on 31 December 2021.

With reference to the CHASE USD Operating Account, please note that the amount refers to the balance on February 28, 2021 last available statement. BPW is currently taking any legal action necessary to be able to proceed with formal access to the current account data. The value at the date is around euro 8.000.

Within CURRENT ASSETS

Accounts receivable: are the Dues still to be collected for the year 2021 and in some cases even for previous years. The total amount is euro 39.888.

Inventory: are the final inventories as of 31 December, 2021 on the base of those effectively existing to the aforesaid date. The total amount is euro 8.498.

Provision for Doubtful Debts: is a provision for risk of lower collection of credits allocated before 2019 (registered in the Current Assets but with a negative sign). The total amount is euro 25.000.

Within NON-CURRENT ASSETS

Credit for advance Cairo Congress advance: is the amount to be received from the bank account of CHASE BANK, for which it is putting in place any necessary legal action, as specified below under note "Provision for Credit Risk Cairo Congress" of the P&L. The total amount paid is euro 157.600.

Within LIABILITIES

Congress Contingency: is a fund for congress expenses to be kept prudentially in the Balance Sheet. The total amount is euro 30.000.

Deferred Revenus: is the collection of Dues during 2021, so the BPW from which the transfer arrives is unknown. The total amount is euro 9.295.

Solidarity Fund: has been allocated for each R.C. and for Young BPW an amount equal to the difference between the expenses incurred by each Regional Coordinator in the year 2021 and the total amount of their budget approved by the G.A. The total amount is euro 23.683, divided as follows:

The total amount is euro 490.057.

*Current year earning => Net profit 2021. The total amount is euro 12.531.

*Retained earning => Net profits previous years set aside. The total amount is euro 398.404.

MANAGEMENT REPORT OF EFO

In the Income Statement and the Balance Sheet transmitted to the Board of BPW at the end of January 2023, according to the Procedure Manual 2.3.6 - 6.1.2 and 6.2.1, all revenue items and all expense items by type, are shown analytically. Each item presents the comparison with the budget, approved during the General Assembly of March 2021 for each year of the three-year period 2021-2024, as well as with evidence of the balances of the previous year.

Within each item are included, on an accrual basis, the amounts deriving from the expenses incurred by the members of the Executive and the International President for their activity carried out on behalf of BPW International during each financial year.

The amount of the Dues (Dues) is established every three years by the General Assembly, to financially cover the expenses that BPW incurs in order to be present through its delegates, first and foremost the International President, in every country in the world and in every most important forum in the world.

Each Federation and each Club pays its membership fee based on the number of members it claims to have had at the end of the previous year.

The request for membership fees (Dues) takes place annually and is accounted for on an accrual basis.

The amount of the individual expenses is constantly monitored by the EFO and the Financial Team composed of 5 members, with control and supervisory function, appointed in accordance with point 6.1 of the Procedure Manual.

Each expense is audited and authorised by the EFO and the International President and the relevant accounting records are updated monthly with reconciliation of bank statements. During the Executive Meetings, the EFO provides all the accounting documentation to the Financial Management Team for control and the Executive in advance and prepares a presentation of the entire financial situation updated to the previous month.

Monitoring of the Fees is carried out monthly, with reminders to the Affiliated

Federations and Affiliated Clubs that have not paid their fees and schedules are sent to the Regional Coordinators whose support is invaluable.

The budget and costs of the President's Staff are fundamental for the sound operation and continuity of activity and the dynamic and constant action of BPW, and every expense is inherent to the activity of the Federation and is constantly monitored. The international activity of coordination and synergy with the most influential women's world organizations, and the fundamental presence of the International President at the meetings organized and at the most important forums for the consultative status that BPW has had at the United Nations and its agencies since 1947, is a guarantee of the influence that BPW has with these organizations.

Together with the final balance sheet, the EFO prepares her Report, giving an account of the most significant items of the financial statements that constitute the report of the operational, administrative and financial management of BPW.

The financial statements are subject to voluntary auditing by an independent statutory auditor who verifies the correctness, the inherence also from an accounting and documentary point of view of each individual expense, for some items analytically and for others on a sample basis.

At the end of the aforementioned audit, the Auditor issues his Report, certifying its truthfulness and compliance with the accounting principles for the preparation of the financial statements.

The EFO draws up the monthly budget for the continuous monitoring of operating expenditure.

The budget for each year of the three-year period will then be approved by the General Assembly to be held in November 2024, together with the reports mentioned above.

NOTES to the Financial Statements at 31 December 2022

NOTE 1 General information

The International Federation of Business and Professional Women (BPW INTERNATIONAL) was founded in 1930 and aims to develop professional, commercial and leadership potential for women at all levels.

NOTE 2 Accounting policies

BPW International's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

Revenues

Revenue is recognized on an accrual basis.

Merchandise

Inventories represented by scarves and different types of pins, are declared at cost or net realizable value, whichever is lower.

Foreign exchange transactions

Foreign currency transactions carried out during the year are converted into euro at the average exchange rate at the end of the month. Foreign currency assets and liabilities at the end of the year shall be converted into euro at the buy and sell rate of the bank at the balance sheet date. The gain or losses from conversion are included in the determination of gains or losses.

NOTE 3 BALANCE SHEET

ACTIVE

Cash: The amount relates to cash receipts from the sale of scarves and brooches during international conferences.

Banks: This is the cash in BPW's checking accounts, including the Battersea Fund "HSBC GBP Account", at exchange value as at 31 December 2022.

With respect to the CHASE BANK USD Checking account, BPW is taking all necessary steps to proceed with access to the current account.

CURRENT ACTIVE

Receivables: these are the fees still to be collected for the year 2022 and in some cases also for previous years. The total amount is € 76.590.

Inventory: these are the final stocks at 31 December 2022 based on those actually existing on the above date. The total amount is 8.305 euros.

Provision for Risks: it is a provision for risk of lower collection of receivables assigned before 2019 (recorded in Current Activities but with a negative sign). The total amount is \notin 25.000.

NON-CURRENT ACTIVE

Cairo Congress advance credit: this is the amount to be received from the bank account of CHASE BANK SAVINGS, for which any necessary action, including legal, is being implemented, as specified under the Note "Provision for Credit Risk Cairo Congress" to the Report attached to the P&L 2021. The amount is 157.600 euros.

CURRENT LIABILITIES

Congress Contingency: it is a fund for congressional expenses to be kept prudentially in the Balance Sheet. The total amount is € 30.000.

Deferred revenues: refers to the shares collected whose actual origin is not yet known, as it is not specified in the HSBC Statement. The total amount is 8.915.

NON-CURRENT LIABILITIES

Solidarity Fund: an amount equal to the difference between the expenses incurred by each Regional Coordinator in the year 2021 and 2022 and the total amount of their budget approved by the G.A. has been allocated for each RC and for Young BPW. The total amount is 25.976 euros. In addition, a solidarity fund has been allocated to help Federations and Clubs in economic and financial difficulty for \notin 7.000; this amount comes from savings in the budget allocated to IP for 2022. In 2002 the International Board agreed that the proceeds of the Battersea Fund should not be used for operating costs or debt payments, but should be held in reserve for a future period. The interest of the Battersea Fund may be used by BPW International at the discretion of the Executive, but the capital invested may only be used for a purpose agreed upon by resolution of the General Assembly with expenses subject to the agreement of the International Council. The total amount is € 490.057.

Current year profit: Net profit 2022. The total amount is € 103.189.

Retained earnings: Net profit for previous years accrued. The total amount is € 410.326.

MANAGEMENT REPORT OF EFO

In the Income Statement and the Balance Sheet transmitted to the Board of BPW at the end of January 2024, in accordance with the Procedure Manual 2.3.6 - 6.1.2 and 6.2.1, all revenue items and all expense items by type, are shown analytically. Each item presents the comparison with the budget, approved during the General Assembly of March 2021 for each year of the three-year period 2021-2024, as well as with evidence of the balances of the previous year.

Within each item are included, on an accrual basis, the amounts deriving from the expenses incurred by the members of the Executive and the International President for their activity carried out on behalf of BPW International during each financial year.

The amount of the Dues (Dues) is established every three years by the General Assembly, to financially cover the expenses that BPW incurs in order to be present through its delegates, first and foremost the International President, in every country in the world and in every most significant forum in the world.

Each Federation and each Club pays its membership fee based on the number of members it claims to have had at the end of the previous year.

The request for membership fees (Dues) takes place annually and is accounted for on an accrual basis.

The amount of the individual expenses is constantly monitored by the EFO and the Financial Team composed of 5 members, with control and supervisory function, appointed in accordance with point 6.1 of the Procedure Manual.

Each expense is audited and authorised by the EFO and the International President and the relevant accounting records are updated monthly with reconciliation of bank statements. During the Executive Meetings, the EFO provides all the accounting documentation to the Financial Management Team for control and the Executive in advance and prepares a presentation of the entire financial situation updated to the previous month.

Monitoring of the Fees is carried out monthly, with reminders to the Affiliated Federations and Affiliated Clubs that have not paid their fees and schedules being sent to the Regional Coordinators whose support is invaluable.

The budget and costs of the President's Staff are fundamental for the sound operation and continuity of activity and the dynamic and constant action of BPW, and every expense is inherent to the activity of the Federation and is constantly monitored. The international activity of coordination and synergy with the most influential women's world organizations, and the fundamental presence of the International President at the meetings organized and at the most important forums for the consultative status that BPW has had at the United Nations and its agencies since 1947, is a guarantee of the influence that BPW has with these organizations.

Together with the final balance sheet, the EFO prepares her Report, giving an account of the most significant items of the financial statements that constitute the report of the operational, administrative and financial management of BPW.

The financial statements are subject to voluntary auditing by an independent statutory auditor who verifies the correctness, the authenticity also from an accounting and documentary point of view of each individual expense, for some items analytically and for others on a sample basis.

At the end of the aforementioned audit, the Auditor issues his Report, certifying its truthfulness and compliance with the accounting principles for the preparation of the financial statements.

The EFO draws up the monthly budget for the continuous monitoring of operating expenditure.

The budget for each year of the three-year period will then be approved by the General Assembly during the International Congress to be held from 17 to 21 November 2024, together with the present report including Auditor's report.

NOTES to the Financial Statements as at 31 December 2023

NOTE 1 GENERAL INFORMATION

The International Federation of Business and Professional Women (BPW International) was founded in 1930 and aims to develop professional, commercial and leadership potential for women at all levels.

NOTE 2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BPW International's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards.

<u>Revenues</u>

Revenue is recognized on an accrual basis.

<u>Merchandise</u>

Inventories represented by scarves and different types of pins, are declared at cost or net realizable value, whichever is lower.

Foreign exchange transactions

Foreign currency transactions carried out during the year are converted into euros at the average exchange rate at the end of the month. Foreign currency assets and liabilities at the end of the year shall be converted into euros at the buy and sell rate of the bank at the balance sheet date. The gain or losses from conversion are included in the determination of gains or losses.

NOTE 3 BALANCE SHEET

ACTIVE

Cash: The amount relates to cash receipts from the sale of scarves and brooches during international conferences.

Banks: This is the cash in BPW's checking accounts, including the Battersea Fund "HSBC GBP Account", at exchange value as at 31 December 2023. During 2023, the Saferpay payment system was fully reconciled as of 31 December 2023.

With respect to the CHASE BANK USD Checking account, BPW is taking all necessary steps to proceed with access to the current account.

Inventory: these are the final stocks at 31 December 2023 based on those actually existing on the above date. The total amount is eur 7.468.

Provision for Doubtful Debts: it is a provision for risk of lower collection of receivables assigned before 2019 (recorded in Current Activities but with a negative sign). The total amount until 2022 was eur 25.000, increased by eur 34.200 in 2023, for a total amount at 31 December 2023 of eur 59.200 considered the Dues unpaid before 2021 of Clubs and Federations to be abrogated.

NON-CURRENT ASSETS

Credit for advance Cairo Congress expenses: this is the amount to be received from the bank account of CHASE BANK SAVINGS, for which any necessary action, including legal, is being implemented, as specified under the Note "Provision for Credit Risk Cairo Congress" to the Report attached to the P&L 2021. The amount is eur 157.600.

CURRENT LIABILITIES

Congress Contingency: it is a fund for congressional expenses to be kept prudentially in the Balance Sheet. The total amount is eur 30.000.

Deferred revenues: refers to the shares collected whose actual origin is not yet known, as it is not specified in the HSBC Statement. The total amount is eur 3.947 and refers mainly to years prior to 2021.

approved by the G.A. has been allocated for each RC and for Young BPW. The total amount is eur 25.976. In addition, in 2022, a solidarity fund was allocated to help Federations and Clubs in economic and financial difficulty of euro 7,000, increased in 2023 by eur 3.315 as a result of the savings in the budget allocated to IP in the years 2022 and 2023, almost entirely used during the year 2023.

Congress Fund: the amount of eur 23.086 is the fee for the International Congress requested annually from the Federations and Clubs, which is indicated in the Invoices issued for the Dues.

Friend & Fellows Fund: The "Young BPW Fund for Congress" fund has been decreased by 10% of the total revenue for Friends Fee received in the three-year period 2021-2023 in favour of Young BPW, and has therefore been increased, as required by the Procedure Manual.

Risk Fund for future charges and losses: The amount of eur 25.000 has been set aside for unpaid Dues in the 2021-2023 three-year period and for future risks and expenses.

Provision for Credit Risk Cairo Congress: This is a provision on the amount advanced by BPW International related to a payment requested and remaining unpaid and not honoured since 2017 for the Cairo Congress. The payment became outstanding following the legal request received at the headquarters in Geneva and subsequent motion by BPW Kuwait voted by the International Board on February 2021.

At present BPW International is putting in place any necessary legal action aimed at gaining access to Congress' American bank accounts in order to recover the sum. The amount set aside in 2021 was 90% of the amount of eur 157.600 (or eur 141.840) also taking into account any legal fees that might be incurred.

EQUITY

The total amount is eur 1.052.144.

It consists of:

-Buttersea Fund: The Battersea Protected Fund registered for eur 490.057 in Equity is the proceeds from the sale of the BPW International building in the UK in 2002. In 2002 the International Board agreed that the proceeds of the Battersea Fund should not be used for operating costs or debt payments, but should be held in reserve for a future period. The interest of the Battersea Fund may be used by BPW International at the discretion of the Executive, but the capital invested may only be used for a purpose agreed upon by resolution of the General Assembly with expenses subject to the agreement of the International Council. The total amount is eur 490.057. As at 31 December 2023 it amounts to eur 515.727 and is in the HSBC GPB Account.

-Current year profit: Net profit 2023. The total amount is eur 48.572.

-Retained earnings: Net profit for previous years accrued. The total amount at 31 December 2023 is eur 513.515.

Organisational Service: refers to various management costs.

President's staff costs: concern the expenses of office and secretarial staff and equipment and services

Provision for Dues outstanding: concerns the provision of 2023 to increase the Fund provision Doubtful Debts in Balance Sheet and contingent liabilities already allocated to eur 25.000 and increased in 2023 by eur 34.201 against unpaid Dues before 2021 and Dues unpaid of Club & Fed to be abrogated.

Task force Archive and Task force Pilot program: these are costs related to the general archive and related research and costs that refer to the Pilot program.

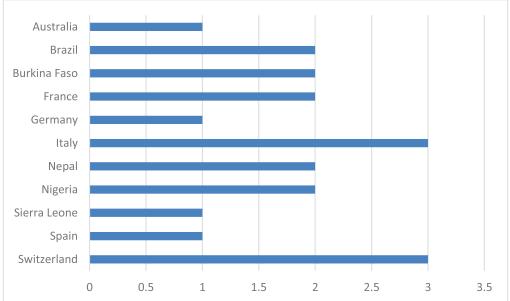

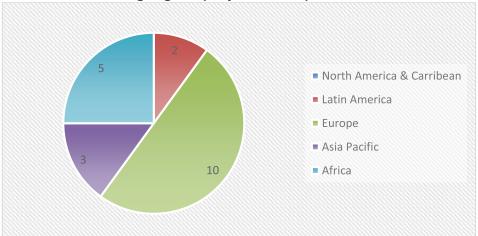

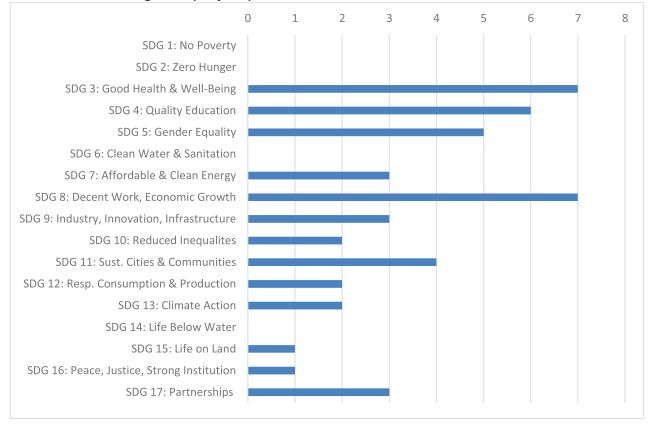
Distribution according Countries (Project Leaders)







Distribution according SDGs (Projects)

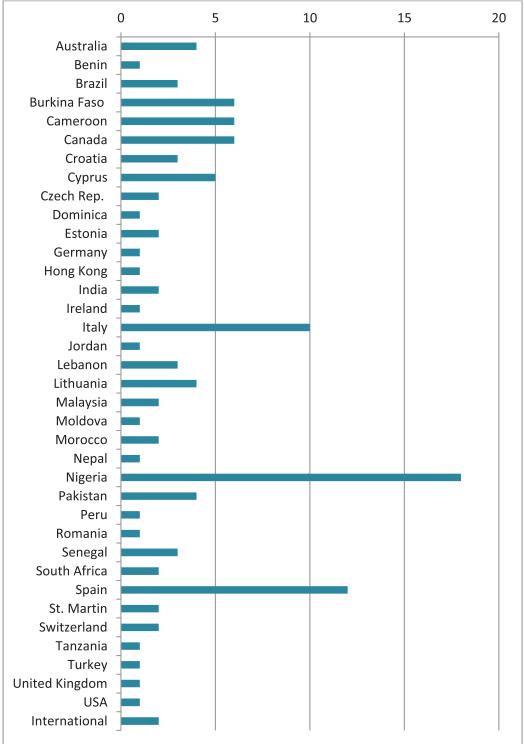




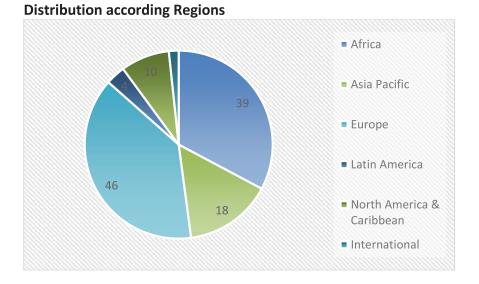

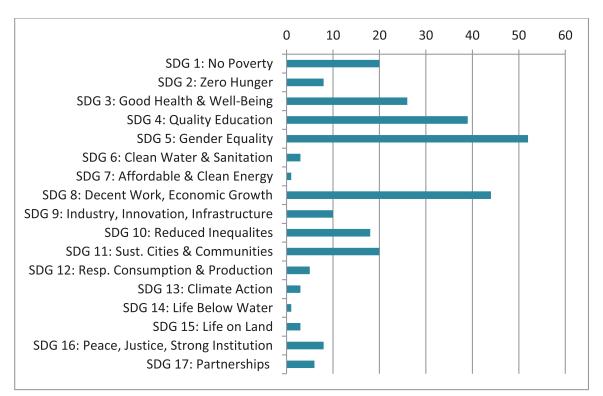
Distribution according Countries







Distribution according SDGs

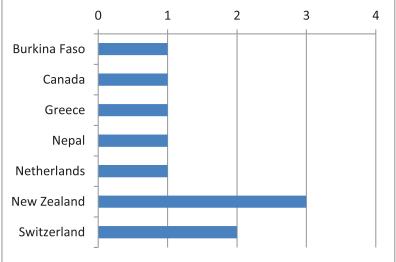




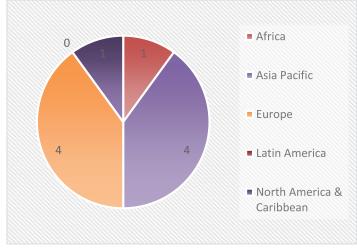

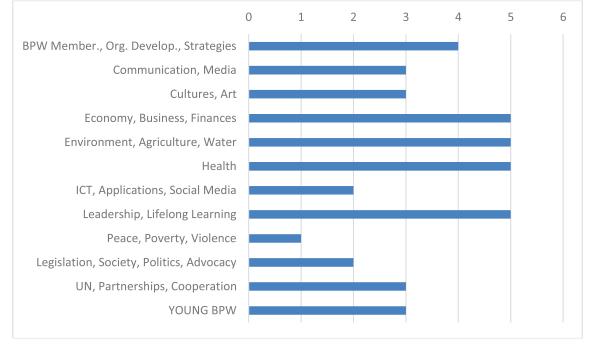

Distribution according BPW Topics (Member Projects)

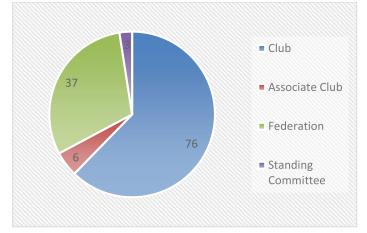

The BPW International Collect

History of the Collect

The Collect Prayer was written by Mary Stewart in Longmont, Colorado in 1904 to instil a sense of unity among women working together with wide interests and important goals.

Mary worked for women's suffrage in the USA and when BPW Federation of USA was launched in St Louis in 1919 she was elected the organisations first corresponding secretary. She took an active part in the growth of BPW in it's early days and served as Chairman and member on a number of national committees. Mary remained involved with BPW until her death in 1943.

The Collect Prayer has resonated globally, underscoring the unique bond shared by women.

It's official adoption by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs at their second Convention at St Paul in 1920 and acknowledged in the U.S. Congress in 1949 solidified its historical importance.

Now as we navigate the complexities of the 21st Century, with the emergence of new technologies, natural disasters, economic crises and pandemics, let us reexamine the Collect and cherish it is words and meaning.

The BPW Collect is said at the beginning of meetings and events to install in us a sense of unity and intention in out work together.
