## FROM ONE COWTOWN TO THE COWTOWN, MEET MIDORI CLARK

You've heard all the buzz surrounding the arrival of Fort Worth's new library director. The Fort Worth Library



rang in the New Year with Midori Clark leading the way. Now, get to know your new library director, who comes with 20 years of library leadership experience directing library and cultural services.

Midori is no stranger to cowboy boots and spurs

the good folks of Fort Worth are so accustomed to. She calls the small town of Greely, Colorado home. Known for its farming community and cattle ranching, she feels quite comfortable in Fort Worth. "I do feel very comfortable and at home here because I also grew up in a Cowtown," said Midori. "Not the Cowtown, but a much smaller one."

As a kid, Midori often moved around because of her parents' work in higher education. Midori said being able to live in different regions across the country

allowed her to have a lifelong learning experience. "I love to learn. I'm very invested and connected to the notion of lifelong learning," Midori said. One of the reasons she chose to come to Fort Worth is because of how engaged the community is in the future of libraries. She says people are eager to talk to her about the library the moment they find out she's the new library director. "Since I've been here, I've already met with

many citizens who want to talk about the future of the downtown library. To me, that is very welcomed and exciting because the alternative is that no one cares – which could be a cause for concern," said Midori.

Midori spent her early career working in journalism where she enjoyed connecting and sharing information with the community. "When you think about it, that's a lot of what we do at the public library. For me, it was an easy transition and made a lot of sense. These are both information careers and are both about connecting people to community resources," said Midori. "How information is disseminated is different, but in many ways it's parallel and very similar."

As the first Asian American to have led a public library in Colorado, Midori says it's important to have diversity and make sure that the people who come through our library doors see themselves reflected in the people who serve them and on the leadership team. With cultural roots in Japan, Midori often visited her grandmother who lived in a small fishing village on the west coast of Japan. "I'm proud of who I am. I just own it and lean into it. This is me, this is who I am," Midori said. "I'm proud that other people of color can aspire to being library directors too. Asians specifically, can see that there's someone who helped build a foundation for other Asian people who want to immerse themselves in the library."

When she's not managing library operations, you can find Midori on the tennis court scoring championship points. She's played competitive tennis for 15 years and has even gone on to win state with her Pueblo, CO team. She also enjoys spending time with her two mini dachshund rescue dogs, Cooper and Bailey, who keep her active.

You can't help but smile when you're around Midori. Her charming personality and contagious positive energy are exactly what Fort Worth needs to usher in new library initiatives. Be sure to say hello if you see her around town.

#### **LAUNCHPAD: STUDENT SUCCESS**



This has been another busy and productive year for the LaunchPad college application advising program. We have had the pleasure of working individually with 140 high school students, coaching them on how to investigate and

create potential college lists, pursue financial aid, and brainstorm and hone their application and scholarship essays. Several current and post-graduate college students have also worked with us as they apply to a variety of graduate schools and programs.

As always, we have multiple college acceptances to many Texas public and private colleges and universities, including UT, A&M, TCU, SMU, Southwestern, and Baylor. Two of our local STEM-enthusiast students will be heading to Houston to attend Rice University. Many students have also been admitted to schools around the country, including MIT, UVA, USC, Amherst, Barnard and Penn State.

A few of our highlights from the past year include working with a homeschooled student who was accepted into TCU and earned the prestigious TCU Chancellor scholarship, which provides full tuition for four years. Also, one of our valedictorian candidates, who comes from a single-parent family and works multiple jobs to pay her expenses and help save for college, has earned at least three full-ride scholarships to East Coast colleges. Additionally, one of our students worked diligently on her essays to apply and be accepted to the UT Austin Plan II Honors program and get into her highly selective major.
