In the Primary School, we focused on strengthening mathematical skills and boosting student agency, and we made remarkable progress. Our tamariki have met challenges head-on and surpassed expectations with our passionate teachers' unwavering commitment. Our ongoing collaboration with Massey University's **DMIC research team** continues to elevate our teaching strategies, and the improvement in **Mathematics outcomes** speaks for itself. In the Secondary School, 2024 marked a significant shift with the introduction of the new NCEA Level 1



standards and a start-up trial of Project-Based Learning (PBL). Our Year 11 students embraced the new NCEA standards, and we are eagerly awaiting the Literacy and Numeracy co-requisite results for our Year 10 students, who were given the chance to tackle this early. Across Years 7-10, the trial of PBL was an exciting innovation in Term Three, offering our students realworld learning experiences that fostered critical thinking, collaboration, and creativity. The enthusiasm from both students and teachers was inspiring, and we look forward to expanding this approach further.

In addition to mahi relating directly to our Strategic Plan, a group of talented students across primary and secondary schools were identified for extension across the curriculum. This project was financially supported by the Ministry of Education. They researched and wrote three books, which we are looking forward to sharing with you in the near future.

Looking ahead to 2025, we will adapt to the significant changes in curriculum and learning requirements introduced by the New Zealand Government. These changes aim to modernise education, making it more relevant to the evolving world our students will face. We are confident that our school's strong foundation of WAKA values, innovation, and academic excellence will ensure a smooth transition, enabling us to continue providing an outstanding learning experience for all our students.

Of course, none of this progress would be possible without the collective effort of our amazing community. Term Two was a big term for the arts, with the production of Seussical providing both a challenging and fun opportunity for the students.



Students get a taste M4 students spent two weeks towards the end of

the year using a career education resource called "The Real Game". The came introduces students to the world of work and helps them develop an understanding of the options and opportunities available to them and the implications and importance of their choices. The students worked through a series of modules starting with a 'dream cloud' where they could choose different types of housing, travel, transport and leisure activities. Following this activity, they were handed an envelope with two job roles. They could pick the role that they thought they would enjoy the most. Whilst for some students the role was not one that they would ever imagine doing, they all stayed with their chosen roles and "walked in the shoes" of that role for the remainder of the game.

Opportunity was given for the students to find out about each other's role profiles, including approx. salary, hours of work, educational requirements etc. Midway through the unit the students were given the task of dressing up as their "role" for a day.

The students' arrived at school the following day with the majority being creative and dressing up as their role. The next module was all about income and expenses. Using a worksheet, the students entered their income from their role profile and then calculated expenses based on their dream cloud the day before. Some students found out that they could not afford to live in the accommodation they had previously chosen and some also needed to change their transport options. Manipulating of expenses had to take place until there was a nil or credit balance. Following this the students learned about employment related issues such as gender discrimination, disability and equal opportunity.

Compassion and the ability to be resilient were needed, as the next module introduced the verv real issue of redundancy. One member of each group was handed an envelope giving reasons for their redundancy. The reasons included advancement of technology, economic decline, cheap imports and company competition. Each group had to come up with a solution for their redundant member. Some of the solutions included retraining, setting up business for themselves and taking on a different role until they could rectify their situation - all real life stuff!

The unit ended with the students reviewing what they had learned and looking at how their skills, qualities and education will all enhance their prospects of employment enjoyment.
