Investing in your child's future

In last year's Brentwood School Times, School Bursar and Clerk to the Governors, Jeremy Blunden CBE LVO provided an overview of recent developments and a look at plans for the future. In this article the Bursar describes two major developments that will open in Summer 2025.

Over the past 50 years, the site has seen numerous developments as the school has grown and added new facilities. While the school is not expected to expand significantly in size in the coming years, it remains committed to enhancing the site to ensure that current students have access to top-quality facilities and that future students continue to enjoy all that Brentwood has to offer.







New Boarding House & Sixth Form Café

In September, we will unveil a new, integrated space designed to serve our growing boarding community and offer a modern social area for Sixth Form students. Located behind Courage Hall, the new building will accommodate both boys' and girls' boarding houses in state-of-the-art facilities, providing 120-single bedrooms with ensuite bathrooms. Each boarding house will have dedicated areas on the ground floor, while a shared central space will serve as a dining and recreation hub. During the day, this central area will function as a Sixth Form café and social venue. An enclosed courtyard will also offer landscaped gardens where students can study and socialise.

Extension to Queens Building

An extension to the Queens Building will also open in September. Located in Wessex Square, opposite the recent extension to the Lawrence Building, this will provide an additional science laboratory, six additional classrooms and office space.

Coming up

Alongside these two major projects, visitors to the site this year will notice various enhancements reflecting the school's ongoing commitment to maintaining its existing buildings and enriching the environment for current and future staff and students. In addition to the recently completed Water Garden, there will be further enhancements of outdoor spaces – creation of more garden areas, upgrading playgrounds, adding a new cricket net facility at the Prep School and developing spaces that support outdoor learning. Looking further ahead, this year the school will submit a planning application to co-locate the school's Wellbeing facilities at the heart of the school in the area that currently houses the Maintenance Department.

It was an enormous privilege to take up the Chairmanship of our school's Governors in March 2024 in the footsteps of Sir Michael Snyder, an Old Brentwood who served Brentwood School as a Governor for over three decades with the greatest distinction.

Our school is in robust good shape, going from strength to strength in every area. Thanks to the commitment and dedication of our teaching staff – and our senior team under the visionary leadership of Michael Bond – our pupils continue to excel at every level. And, as a result of the painstaking custodianship of Governors over many years, we have strong finances which means we have been able to invest in the school, always with one end in mind: constantly to improve the pupil experience.



We are a big school, which allows us to have such extraordinarily wide-ranging academic and co-curricular provision, but one where all pupils – and their families – are important and cared for. We must ensure that always remains the case, and I am committed to doing so.

Big schools like ours require the space and modern facilities to allow young people to breathe and grow. An ambitious building programme over many years has enabled us to do just that and we are now reaching the end of a period of significant renewal. In particular, our new Boarding House – with a Sixth Form café – is a hugely exciting development. It is rapidly taking shape and will be home to up to 120 full and flexi-boarders from September, safeguarding a vital part of Brentwood's history and heritage.

Conservation and innovation walk hand in hand at Brentwood – something which is of great importance to me, as indeed is the way we support prospective students from disadvantaged backgrounds through life-changing Bursaries. We already have a long and distinguished record in this area, but there is much more we can do in order to ensure Brentwood remains an inclusive community that reflects the modern world in which all our pupils will live. That is why the work of the Brentwood School Foundation is so important to our future. Please get involved if you can.

This is particularly crucial as we face the real challenges arising from the Government's decision to impose VAT on school fees. As I have consistently said – in Parliament and elsewhere – I believe this is a cruel and vindictive policy that will simply be a tax on aspiration but will fail to achieve its aims of improving state education. We are in a strong position to withstand the fallout from this policy – and we will do so by continuing to work with and support our parents, and the wider school community, as we meet the challenge.

If you're reading the BST, you are doing so because Brentwood School is important to you – as an OB, a parent or pupil, or as someone who works at the school. In whatever role, I am grateful to you all for everything you do for us – and for your help in ensuring that our school continues to flourish in the interests of all those studying with us now, and long into the future.

It is indeed an exciting era we are entering with high-quality, world-class learning at the centre of everything we do as we begin to embrace a future we have yet to discover.


Mrs Mercer, Head of Reception

Every child played a significant role in retelling the Christmas story, featuring elements like dancing doors and talking lists, which brought joy and smiles to everyone in attendance.

To conclude their topic 'Very Chilly', Year 1 visited Colchester Zoo. The day was filled with animal sightings, including sea lions, penguins, lions, tigers, elephants, and giraffes. A highlight was a talk from zoo staff about penguin adaptations, during which some lucky volunteers dressed up as penguins. The children learned about penguins' spiky tongues for catching fish and had the rare opportunity to touch real penguin feathers.

During the Trinity Term, Year 1 engaged in discussions about reducing, reusing, and recycling, through the topic 'Our Wonderful World'. The children read Somebody Swallowed Stanley by Sarah Roberts, where they learned how a plastic bag ended up in the ocean and harmed sea creatures. In Art, the class created a display highlighting the staggering amounts of plastic and rubbish found in the ocean, empowering them to make a positive difference for the planet.



Poetry Week 2024

The Prep was a hive of creativity during Poetry Week 2024 as pupils immersed themselves in the world of poetry. Our EYFS children explored nursery rhymes with Reception children joyfully acting out their favourites. In Year 1, the children delved into similes and produced poems about the Northern Lights, paired with creative artwork. They also prepared an Easter poem for a Cathedral Service, showing their growing confidence in performing.

Year 2 focused on the vibrant theme of the circus, learning about verbs, adverbs, nouns and adjectives while writing their own entertaining circus poems. Meanwhile, older pupils explored various poetry styles, reading works from The Jabberwocky to ancient Greek odes. They engaged in team projects, crafted original pieces, memorised poems for performance, participated in poetry 'battles', and created class poetry raps, adding a modern twist. Overall, the week celebrated the joy of poetry, sparking creativity and collaboration among pupils, and fostering a lasting love for the written word.

Reading Week

During the Michaelmas Term, Brentwood Prep buzzed with excitement for a week of reading-focused activities, aimed at fostering lifelong reading habits. Friends of Brentwood School Ball



Investing in your child's future

A (second) warm welcome, this time to the Brentwoodian, a document that has been part of our School's history since it was first published in 1891.

The story told in the pages that follow illustrates how Brentwood is flourishing – despite (or perhaps partly because of) the challenges facing our country, schools in general and the independent sector in particular. The County of Essex has a long history of entrepreneurship and non–conformism, as illustrated by the story of Brentwood's emergence in the late 12th Century. Pilgrims en route to the shrine of Thomas Becket at Canterbury took advantage of a major fire in the forest around these parts to shorten their route to Tilbury. As they passed through the 'Burnt Wood' enterprising locals supplied weary travellers with provisions, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Of course, our own school emerged from the ashes, quite literally, of the religious struggles in 16th Century Tudor England and, whether Sir Antony Browne did or did not petition Queen Mary to found our school out of remorse for convicting William Hunter, it is at least reasonable to suggest that turning challenges into opportunities is part of Brentwood's heritage.

But enough about the past. Today's school is a hive of activity, based on the belief that the busiest people are usually the most successful (and content). Harvard University's 'Human Flourishing Programme' dissects the ingredients of a fulfilled and successful existence and setting them side-by-side in the pages that follow, it becomes clear that most have featured in our school over the past 12 months:

- Acts of kindness and gratitude (our Peer Mentoring programme and Mental Health First Aiders have offered outstanding support to fellow students).
- A service orientation (our Houses and Voluntary Service Association continue their excellent work within and beyond the school gates).
- Meaningful physical activity (over 1000 Senior School pupils were part of a school sports team last year).
- Engagement in the Performing Arts (over 70 concerts, shows and plays).
- Engagement with nature (all our Year 7 pupils follow an Outdoor Education programme).
- And perhaps above all, a sense of belonging and community (we enjoyed 46 House competitions last year)

All feature in Harvard's assessment of what makes humans flourish, and all can be seen in this year's Brentwoodian.

Thank you to all those who have been part of the stories told herein, and to those who have told them. In the true spirit of entrepreneurship, however, there is no sense of complacency at Brentwood, so while you enjoy reading about the highlights of the past year, readers can rest assured that those who study and work at the school, as well as those who support our community, are already engaged in the activities that will feature in next year's publication!

Academic Achievement



Students achieve exceptional success in GCSE results

Brentwood students achieved outstanding GCSE results this summer, significantly outperforming national averages. Around a fifth of their GCSE grades were Grade 9, compared to the national figure of 5.1%, and nearly 60% of grades were 7–9 (versus 22.6% nationally). A dozen standout students achieved a perfect score of 72 points, with 8 to 11 grade 9s. Additionally, 31 students earned a combination of 8–11 grades at 8 or 9, and 58 students achieved 7–9 grades across 8–11 subjects, reflecting the high academic standards of the school.

Within these impressive numbers are incredible individual stories. Skye Lake, a student who balanced academic excellence with co-curricular success in athletics and drama, earned all 8s and 9s in her GCSEs. Another impressive student, Nicholas Rashkov, a Dance Scholar and Bursary student, earned seven Grade 9s alongside numerous dance accolades.

The school continues to offer a broad, holistic education that combines academic achievement with personal growth and co-curricular success. Headmaster Michael Bond highlighted Brentwood's three Sixth Form pathways—International Baccalaureate, A Levels, and BTEC Extended Diploma—that help students maximise their future opportunities. The school is proud of its students' dedication and enjoyed welcoming many of them into the Sixth Form.



Whether A Level, IB or BTEC: Brentwood students excel in all directions!

Brentwood School's Sixth Form offers three distinct pathways—A Levels, the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IBDP), and BTEC Extended Diplomas in Sport and Business—allowing students to choose courses that best suit their strengths. The results for 2024 highlight the excellence of Brentwood's teaching staff and the dedication of its students.

The IB Diploma Class of 2024 achieved an impressive average of 38.3 points, placing Brentwood in the Top 10 IB Schools in the UK. Twelve students scored 40 points or more, with two securing the maximum 45 points. A Level results were equally impressive, with 37.2% of grades at A* or A, and a 100% pass rate. In the BTEC programme, all 31 students achieved their first-choice outcomes, with ten students earning the equivalent of A*A*A.

Notable individual successes include Faris Fahal, who secured three A*s and a place at Oxford University, to study Arabic. Twins Adnan and Salman Yaqub, who finished with top IB scores of 44 and 45 points, respectively, will both study medicine at Anglia Ruskin Medical School, after both winning prestigious prizes at Speech Day. Grace Sullivan, the youngest of four siblings to attend Brentwood, secured D*DD in her Business BTEC, and was excited to finally say she was an Old Brentwood!

Brentwood continues to support students in achieving their best, whether heading to top universities or pursuing alternative career paths like apprenticeships.






Performing Arts celebrates another landmark year

Brentwood School's Performing Arts Faculty has had another extraordinary year, marked by a diverse range of performances, competitions, and collaborations. With over 80 public performances, the faculty has showcased the exceptional talent and dedication of its students across the disciplines of Drama, Dance, and Music and is proud to be one of the leading Arts education providers in the country.

The calendar year came to a bombastic close with the faculty combining for a 5-night production of 'West Side Story', performed to sell-out audiences in the Wessex Auditorium to huge acclaim. A team of over 100 students, both on and off the stage, produced performances that would not have been out of place on a professional stage. It remains a point of pride for Brentwood School that our musicals are accompanied by a student orchestra and playing perhaps the most difficult score for musical theatre ever written, our 32-strong orchestra accompanied the show with complete dedication and musical maturity. On the stage, a plethora of stand-out individual and ensemble performances impressed the audience, with the ensemble sound for the infamously difficult 'tonight quintet' being a particularly special moment. Our dancers, not to be outdone, performed the Robbins choreography with poise and style, bringing an electric visual portrayal to this iconic dance musical. A unique aspect of Brentwood School's Performing Arts programme is the emphasis on student leadership.



Students have taken on significant roles, directing, choreographing, and musically arranging productions, and we are thrilled that each year the ambition of our student body grows.

Over the course of the year, the faculty has witnessed new heights of individual student success. Six students have secured places in the National Youth Theatre, while two have represented the UK in the Dance World Cup. Nearly 20 talented musicians are actively involved in national–level ensembles, choirs, and junior conservatoires. In local, national and international competitions, our young artists continue to thrive and it is fast becoming obvious how present Brentwood School students are in the wider local and national artistic landscapes. The school continues to enjoy a wonderful partnership with the Guildhall School of Music and Drama, where many of its star musicians study, as well as growing relationships with Trinity Laban and the National Youth Theatre.

The Lent Term was a hive of activity. Our musicians took to multiple stages, enthralling audiences with intimate chamber concerts, jazz gigs, Big Band concerts and a particularly memorable joint gig with the Seven Steps Big Band, where they more than held their own against a band of professional musicians. Our Drama Department continued their excellent relationship with the Shakespeare Schools Festival and our Year 10s performed, following extensive workshops, on the professional stage. The major focus of this term for our actors was the Middle School production of 'Wendy and Peter', which delighted a large audience with its thought–provoking twist on Barrie's classic tale.

A highlight of any PA calendar is the annual Dance Show, which last year entitled 'Rhythvolution; The Evolution of Dance'. This two-night run in Wessex saw students from our acclaimed Dance Academy, combined with students from our academic Dance curriculum in a high-octane series of large and small ensemble performances. Standing ovations from sold-out audiences, spoke to the quality and impact of this year's Dance Show.

Amidst these incredible large scale performances, the faculty continues to work tirelessly, with countless masterclasses, workshops and trips regularly inspiring our young performers. We were particularly delighted to celebrate our partnership with Steinway and Sons and welcomed international concert pianist Florian Mitera to Brentwood to the masterclass and perform alongside our many high-level pianists. Evensongs, theatre trips, dance workshops, choreography competitions and much more take place on a near daily basis to cater for the vast demand and myriad artistic interests of our students.

The musical highlight of the term came with our Symphonic and Choral Concert, held in Brentwood Cathedral. Here we welcomed Upper Sixth Virtuoso, Alex Lockyer, to perform the mighty Dvorak Cello Concerto, accompanied by the school's Symphony Orchestra. Perhaps one of the standout performances of recent years, Alex deservedly concluded his year winning the Vice-Chancellor's Scholarship for Musical Excellence for a place reading Medicine at the University of Bristol. The concert also included a massed Brentwood Choral Society performance of Britten's St Nicholas, where we were delighted to join forces with pupils (across both Prep and Senior Schools), parents, OBs and local choral societies to perform this truly remarkable work.

Sporting excellence

The **Michaelmas** Term started with the boys' 1st XI football team taking part in the annual ISFA Sixes national tournament – a 6-a-side competition played on full-size pitches. This event acts as the curtain raiser for the independent schools' football season, with the top 24 schools in the country taking part. The team performed strongly in the 'group of death', placing third to qualify in the plate competition. Once in the knockout stage, the team performed exceptionally well, defeating Chigwell School and Epsom College in the quarter and semi-final respectively, setting up a final with Royal Russell (who were the defending cup champions). Another outstanding display from the team saw them through with a 3-1 victory to win the plate for the 3rd time in the school's history (Brentwood now have 3 cup wins and 3 plate wins).

The first half-term is always a busy period for both our hockey and netball teams, as there are numerous qualifying rounds/tournaments to play to ensure qualification for county and regional finals. In hockey, our U12, U14s and 1st XI all qualified for their respective regional tournaments, while in netball, our U16 and U19 teams qualified for their regional finals.

In Rugby, our 1st XV got their county and national cup campaigns underway, with victories against Eltham College and Southend High School for Boys ensuring that the team would be in the latter stages in November. In swimming, our junior girls were crowned regional champions in the English Schools' Swimming Association relay championships, winning both the 4x50m freestyle and the 4x50m medley relay to qualify for the national finals.

The success of all sports teams means there is never a quieter period. In November and December all of our squash teams played well in the national cup first round to move onto the regional finals, while our U16 and U19 netball teams also qualified for their respective regional finals by winning their county rounds. The boys' 1st XI football continued their ISFA Cup run with a good win against Harrow School, scoring a last-minute goal to progress to the last 16.

Our girls' football programme was also starting to develop some momentum, with both our U12 and U13 girls winning their country cup games. In hockey, our 1st XI performed brilliantly to win the regional tournament, qualifying for the national finals for the second year in a row. The most significant performances of the term came from the junior girls' swimming team and the senior girls' cross country team who both performed well in their national finals. The team swam phenomenally well, placing 7th in the 4x50m freestyle relay and 9th in the medley relay. There were 30 schools that qualified for the finals, so to secure two top-ten finishes is an incredible achievement. The Senior Girls competed at the National Cross Country Cup Championships in what was a testing course at Woodbridge School. Not only did the girls have to tackle hay barrels, ice and four long hills, but the weather was also below freezing making it a challenging test of endurance. The team showed huge resilience and determination, finishing a fantastic 16th in the country, which was an excellent performance.

In Chess, our U19 A and B teams qualified for the regional stages of the English Chess Federation National School's Championships. This was formerly the Times Championships. Our U19 A and B teams also took part in the Eton College Rapid Play – making a welcome return post–Covid. It was great to see our U14s win the Essex qualifier of the ECF Junior Team Championships by a single game point to qualify directly for the National Final.

December also saw the school equestrian team participate in the NSEA Eventers Challenge at Brook Farm. The course was challenging; consisting of seven show jumps and eight simulated cross-country fences, with an unknown optimum time. Despite some setbacks, all riders displayed resilience, a positive attitude and excellent team spirit; this ultimately secured the riders a place in the NSEA Eventers Challenge Final at Hickstead which would take place in the summer.

Michaelmas Term ended with our ski racing team, who took part in the Independent Schools' Ski Championships in Sestriere, Italy. Pupils from both the Prep and Senior School took part in the championships over five days, with some notable results for the school. In the team events, the school placed first in the junior slalom, junior giant slalom and junior combined/overall. The senior team was also successful, with the boys placing first in the senior slalom and giant slalom, whilst the mixed senior team were crowned combined/overall winners. Despite there being so many individual and team successes, the most pleasing aspect was receiving an email from a member of the public who wanted to compliment the students on their exemplary behaviour at the airport.

The **Lent** Term began with the school golf team qualifying for both the ISGA and British Schools' finals, with excellent victories against Haileybury, New Hall School, Culford School, Framlingham College and St Edmund's College secured the team's passage for the third year in a row.

The boys' 1st XI football team bounced back from a narrow defeat against Rossall School in the ISFA Cup to reach the Elgin League final for the third year in succession, defeating Forest School in the semi-final.

Our squash teams played their age-group regional finals, with the U19 girls' team playing well to reach the national plate finals in Nottingham. January sees the regional netball tournament take place which has become a permanent fixture for Brentwood, with both our U16 and U19 teams in action. In what is always a tough competition, both teams missed out on making the national finals by an agonising one place, however, placing in the top three in a regional final is still a great accomplishment. The U19 team managed to bounce back by having an incredible cup run in the ISNC competition, reaching the semi-finals where they were drawn against Woodhouse Grove School. In what was an epic game, the team managed to claw themselves back into contention, as with one minute remaining, only one goal separated the teams. Our opposition managed to retain possession to win the game, however, our girls should be proud of reaching another national semi-final.

A key sporting event for the school at this time of year is the Public Schools' Fencing Championships; this was hosted at Lea Valley. The Brentwood School Fencing team finished 2nd overall behind Millfield School, with there also being several fantastic personal highlights for our students, including the Master in Arms trophy which is awarded to the best all-round fencer. The Fencing Department continues to produce some outstanding results, with yet more students achieving international honours this year. In hockey, our 1st XI reached the national tournament for the 2nd year in a row, playing at the Nottingham National Hockey Centre. The team placed 6th in the tier 3 competition, with the girls showing a fighting spirit throughout the tournament and demonstrating exceptional teamwork to produce some impressive hockey. At the same venue, our U13 hockey team reached the ISHC plate finals, where they also finished 6th on the day. This was a great day for our hockey programme, with two teams playing in such a prestigious competition.

In Chess, our U19 Girls (Nina Pert, Gracie Coppell and Anushka Kishore Kumar) qualified for and finished runners—up to North London Collegiate in the ECF National Girls' School Championships. The final took place across 9 rounds and 2 days at St Catherine's School in Surrey. After losing to us in the opening round, NLC won their next 8 matches without losing a single individual game to be worthy winners. The U14s finished 7th in the National Final of the ECF Junior Team Challenge in Birmingham and unfortunately our U19s lost to KEGS in the East Anglian region of the ECF National U19 Championships.

A highlight of the Lent Term is always the Rugby Sevens season, which culminates in the famous national schools' tournament at Rosslyn Park. Our U18 team performed well in a number of festivals, travelling to Oakham and Brecon to play against some of the best rugby schools in the country. The group acquitted themselves at Rosslyn Park, defeating Graveney School and Cardiff High School which meant that the team finished with a winning record. Our U16 netball team were also crowned county champions to round off a successful season, however, the boys' 1st XI lost their Elgin final to Aldenham but should be proud of reaching the final three years in a row. The term finished with the national squash plate finals, where our U19 girls performed brilliantly to win the overall competition.

The **Trinity** summer season always sees a big transition, with athletics, cricket and tennis becoming the main focus. However, it was our golf team who set the tone for a successful summer, with an incredible win in the ISGA national golf finals. The team travelled to The Player's Club in Bristol to compete in the two-day event, with practice rounds taking place before. With two scores of three to count, Brentwood's total of 147 meant that they were in joint 1st place with Radley College at the end of day one. This was unprecedented as Brentwood had never finished above 9th place at the finals. Day two brought more challenging weather conditions, with a blustery breeze making the course even tougher. There were some nerves amongst the team in the opening few holes, with several shots dropped to par from each player. There then followed an agonising wait for about half an hour, as two schools with players still out on the course could theoretically beat the total score for two days of 296.

However, after some careful checking of scorecards by the tournament organiser, the calculations were made and Brentwood prevailed by a single shot over RGS Guildford, and were crowned national champions! 130 independent schools entered the competition last year, with 18 reaching the national finals, and to win it represents by far the biggest golfing achievement in the history of the school.

After a warm weather training trip to Lanzarote in April, our athletics managed to achieve a number of team and individual successes throughout the season, with the inter-girls' team reaching the regional 'A' final, while the junior girls, junior boys and inter-boys all qualified for the regional 'B' finals. We had a number of students represent the district at the county championships, with a further two students then progressing to represent Essex at the English Schools' championships. It was also a very busy summer of tennis, with 177 fixtures being played, while some students also got to attend the tour to Vale do Lobo in Portugal. Our U13 boys, U13 girls and U15 girls were crowned Essex Independent Schools champions, while our senior boys' team reached the final of the Clark trophy at the Independent Schools' championships at Eton. A huge highlight was the performance of both our U13 and U15 girls' teams, who first won the Essex Schools' Cup and then progressed to the regional finals by beating Notting Hill and Ealing High School and St Paul's Girls' School in their respective regional qualifiers. The regional finals were scheduled to take place at the end of November.

It was another successful season for our cricket teams, with our U17 girls' team winning the county final in April (which was rearranged from the previous September). The honours didn't stop there as our U19 boys were crowned Essex champions for the first time since 2019, defeating an exceptional Forest School team who had been crowned national champions the season before. Our U15 boys' team were also crowned county champions which qualified them into the regional competition, where excellent wins against The Leys School and Bede's School took them to the regional final, where they lost to eventual national champions Harrow School. There were also some excellent league wins for our 14 boys' team, while our U12 and U13 girls' teams showed excellent progress throughout the summer, while our girls' 1st XI finished the year strongly with a good win against the MCC. We also had a number of students represent Essex age–groups sides from U12 all the way up to U18.

Overall, it was another outstanding year of school sports, with the number of students and teams involved in competitive sports being a key indicator of success. In total, 1,029 students represented the school across 14 different sports, involving an incredible 200 teams. Thank you to all students, staff and parents for your continued commitment and support, enabling us to create a positive sporting experience for all.

House Chess

After 5 rounds, 900+ games and 40,000+ moves, Merrymeade retained their House Championship. South won the tightest of races for second. For the first time, each House had a guest Year 6 player from the Prep. Games were played on www.lichess.org with the students on their iPads in the Bean Lecture Theatre so everyone could watch the tournament standings in live time on the big screen while they played and cheered for their House.

House Reading

House Reading proved that we are developing a strong reading culture, with over 2,300 reviews submitted by students and staff. Many of these reviews have been on display in the Bean Library and have become a popular source of recommendations for our reading community. Thorndon were the overall winners for the year, but it was close with only 20 books separating Hampden and Weald in second and third place respectively. House points and two individual prizes were awarded each term to reward our avid readers and those who demonstrated a real connection with their chosen books.

Last year also saw the launch of the first Parent House Event where a separate House Reading competition was run and shared with all parents in September. This was very successful with over 200 parents sharing book reviews and earning valuable House points. It was Hartswood who took the overall win for the inaugural event.













House Sports

At Brentwood School, House Sports fosters inclusivity and teamwork, with a goal to involve every student, whether as players, captains, or coaches. In the recent competitions, East House dominated across Netball, Hockey, and Football, emerging victorious. Merrymeade House put up a strong effort, securing 3rd place in the first term and improving to 2nd place in the next, demonstrating their determination and growth throughout the events. North and Weald also put in an excellent performance over the range of sports across both terms. The House Sports format allows for each House to play a select few in a pool competition before reaching place playoffs to create their final standings.

House Track and Field

The House Track and Field Day was a thrilling and action-packed event, bringing together ten Houses in fierce competition. Athletes participated in a wide range of events, from sprints, relays, and long-distance races to high jump, long jump, shot put, and discus. North House delivered an impressive all-around performance, securing the overall victory with standout efforts across both track and field disciplines.

The event wasn't just about team success, as several individuals put on incredible displays of athleticism. Notably, multiple school records were broken, adding an extra layer of excitement to the day. One highlight was the performance in the 100-metre sprint (Joe Payne), where a new record was set, with records in the triple and high jump (Sean-Connor Atafo; Zach Grainger) also achieved.

Throughout the day, the atmosphere was electric, with enthusiastic cheers from spectators, teammates, and staff creating a supportive environment for all the athletes. Despite the competitive nature, the spirit of sportsmanship was evident, with participants congratulating one another on their efforts. In the end, North House took home the trophy, but all Houses can be proud of their achievements in what was a memorable and highly successful event.

In addition to the athletic competition, House Track and Field Day also featured a range of charity stalls, adding a community-focused element to the event. Each House set up their own stall, offering a variety of activities, games, and refreshments to raise money for different charitable causes.

Other events

Football fever took hold of Brentwood with Euro 2024 but, more importantly, with the annual House FIFA event. Each House competed to decide a House champion in matches which involved brother vs brother and friend vs friend. These champions then chose an international team and took part against each other in a knockout tournament. Ultimately, the final came down to a hotly contested match between South and Thorndon where Jesh Sagoe kept his nerve for South and came out victorious.

North and Weald organised a charity Easter egg hunt in support of North's chosen charity the Niall Stringer Foundation. Year 7 and 8 students had fun working out and collecting clues which eventually led them to an Easter egg. It was good fun and the event raised £77.

Another popular event was the archery tag which was a new event and was well attended. The highlight, however was the talent show which displayed an array of talent from students and groups of all ages and saw the dancers in School House deservingly victorious.

Students were asked to promote the global plastic crisis during Geography Enrichment Week. In relay teams the Houses competed by collecting different items from the swimming pool (including plastic) which were worth different points. Weald were victorious, with a tactical plan very well executed by Mr Stannard and his elite relay team.

RAF Cadets at RAF Valley got hands-on with fast jet training simulators and mountain rescue services. Navy enthusiasts experienced damage control simulations at HMS Excellent.

Year 7 and 8 students had a blast in Cologne, enjoying a Rhine cruise, exploring Phantasialand theme park, and indulging at the chocolate museum.



Acting local

The VSA Programme

This past academic year, our School Volunteer Service Programme has made remarkable strides in fostering community spirit and encouraging students to engage in meaningful service. We have proudly established collaborations with Essex Wildlife Trust, Sparkle Malawi, and Remus Horse Sanctuary, helping to broaden our community engagement.

This year, our students dedicated over 2,430 minutes to volunteering. This commitment reflects our school's strong culture of service and the willingness of students to contribute positively to our community.

Our students have had the privilege of participating in a wide range of volunteer activities, partnering with local organisations such as Hamelin Trust, Hutton View Care Home, Leonard Lodge Care Home, Remus Horse Sanctuary, and Brentwood Theatre. Nine students achieved their British Sign Language Level 101 Qualification and twelve earned their First Aid Certification through St John's Ambulance.

Besides their regular activities, students engaged in full-day field experiences at Hopefield Animal Sanctuary, Barleylands, and Hanningfield Wildlife Reserve, where they contributed to animal welfare and conservation work and further enhanced their understanding of environmental management. These hands-on activities have been instrumental in fostering a sense of responsibility and care for both the community and the environment.

A real highlight of the year was our annual Christmas party in December where we hosted over 40 guests from local care homes including Leonard Lodge Care Home, Hutton View, Anisha Grange and the Shenfield Almshouses. Feedback from attendees emphasised how much they appreciated the students' efforts, creating memorable moments for all involved.

As we look ahead, we are excited to continue building on the past year's successes. Our goals include expanding our partnerships further and creating additional community roles for our students.





SAB: Debating & dialogue

Guest Speaker Programme

September 2024 marked the start of the programme's second year. The aim of the programme is to acquaint Sixth Form student members with speakers who talk on a wide range of topics, experiences

and careers. Last year's programme was a great success and was well attended by students. It featured speakers from the fields of law, politics, marketing, insurance, photography, adventure challenges, Al, language and linguistics, journalism, music and the film industry. The 2024/25 programme includes similarly exciting speakers, and started with our first four guests who collectively have been a professional footballer, oil trader, author, podcaster, NASA technician, electrical engineer, seed investor, Liberal Democrat councillor and key figure in the Thailand cave rescue, which was featured in the film 'Thirteen' – and that was just the first half-term!

Debating

The purpose of the debating side of the Sir Antony Browne programme aims to give students a platform to tackle contentious issues through the art of debating. In our weekly after school sessions, we have debated a wide range of topics including: 'Surrogate pregnancy is unethical', 'Performance enhancing drugs should be allowed in athletic competitions', 'Arms are more useful than legs' and many more! During the 23/24 academic year we also entered a number of prestigious debating competitions: the ESU mace, Cambridge Schools' Debating and also Oxford Schools' Debating. In the ESU

we progressed to the county rounds and this year we aim to do even better.







Giving back

The Charity Programme is built into our school system ensuring that all pupils in all year groups are engaged in experiences which will make them informed, caring, contributing citizens. A wide range of charities and community projects are supported on a local, national and international level through pupil and staff fundraising.

In 23/24, Houses raised money for local charities Gold Geese, Treasured Memories, Rainbow Trust, Niall Stringer Foundation and Brentwood Stroke, overall raising £810. Year groups raised money for national charities Great Ormond Street Hospital, Cancer Research UK, MS Society, Sommerville Heart Foundation and Place2Be and overall £2,738.68 was raised. Staff suggested international charities close to their heart for non-uniform days. Money was raised for Plan International, Hand in Hand and The Seva Foundation, with a final total raised of £10,054.

Other individual fundraiser initiatives from pupils and staff raised a total of £3359.14. This includes the Big Band playing at Broomfield Hospital raising £645.64 and Macmillan Coffee Morning for staff, raising £464. There was no shortage of fundraising from individual pupils including £172 for Children Liver Disease, and selling Mother's Day cards for Gingerbread charity, raising £113.



In total, across all local, national and international charities that we fundraised for in 23/24, over £17,000 was raised, with Brentwood School finishing highly commended in the 'Giving Something Back' category at the Muddy Awards 2024, held by Muddy Stilettos.

So what's been going on so far this year? Our Macmillan Coffee Morning for staff raised £305.50, and we held a Harvest collection in conjunction with the Chapel for Brentwood Foodbank. We have already kicked off our first year group charity week, with all proceeds from Year 8 fundraising week going towards Young Lives vs Cancer. We would like to thank the Brentwood School community for their continuous generosity in supporting these wonderful charities.



The great outdoors

Our Outdoor Education programme offers students a diverse range of experiences, blending personal development with environmental stewardship. Year 7 students begin their time at the school with outdoor adventures, forest school sessions, and community projects. Year 8 students take on a wide range of challenges at Thriftwood Scout Camp and participate in eco activities, gardening, and STEAM projects, blending together practical and creative skills.

In Year 9, 10 and 11, many students work towards The Duke of Edinburgh's (DofE) Award, in the time between their expeditions they spend time in activities that enhance both hard skills, like navigation and survival, and soft skills, such as leadership and teamwork. The Sixth Formers take an active leadership role, spearheading the Brentwood Bees project to install a school beehive and progressing in their bushcraft, archery, and self-defence skills, as well as many other skills. They also lead sessions for younger students in the Outdoor Education programme, promoting a culture of mentorship.

Alongside these initiatives, the school's facilities are expanding to support outdoor education. A new Water Garden serves as a wellbeing space, offering students a tranquil retreat for mental health and reflection. A separate garden area is being developed as a hub for outdoor education, featuring raised beds for gardening, student research spaces, and an outdoor classroom which will cater for a wide range of subjects. Additionally, improvements to the forest school area, such as fire pits and permanent covers, ensure that students can engage in outdoor learning year-round and in all weather.

These initiatives and new facilities reflect our commitment to providing students with enriching, hands-on learning experiences.









Another year of DofE success

This past year has been another great success for our DofE awards at Bronze, Silver and Gold levels. The continuation of the Tuesday training programmes at both Bronze and Silver levels has given the students opportunities to develop their campcraft and navigation skills in greater detail leading to the vast majority of students passing all 4 sections of the programme and receiving their relevant award.

The highlight of the DofE award is generally always the expedition section of the programme, which allows students to navigate and walk independently in small groups with at least one night of camping.

At Bronze level we had 45 students attend their practice and assessed expeditions in the local Essex countryside; Danbury and Roxwell respectively.

Twenty-nine of our Year 11 Silver DofE students began the year by venturing further afield to Ashdown Forest in Kent and braved the colder Autumn night temperatures, passing their final assessed expedition.

Into the summer months, came another two Silver DofE practice expeditions to the South Downs in Brighton, where a total of 32 students across the trips improved their navigation and campcraft skills across hilly terrain, surrounded by beautiful scenery.

Fifty-seven Sixth Form students took part in both practice and assessed expeditions this year in the Chilterns and Dartmoor (starting and finishing in Princetown), surviving 4 days of walking and camping for each trip.

Alongside the physical and skill sections of their awards, our DofE participants this year have been awarded a volunteering certificate from the central DofE team which commends the school on collectively completing 6,331 DofE volunteering hours, equating to £33,427 of social value.







CCF Highlights

Royal Navy

Brentwood School's CCF Royal Navy Section has developed considerably throughout the last year, expanding opportunities and achievements while maintaining an inclusive and supportive environment.

From Michaelmas Term 2023 to Michaelmas Term 2024, the training syllabus has been broadened to include new features such as Marines Training and CHAP (Cadet Humanitarian Assistance Project), in addition to the syllabus provided by the Ministry of Defence. Training sessions are varied between smaller watches, whole year group events or cross-year group events, helping the cadets to form connections with new people. The syllabus offers the chance for each cadet to get involved and be equipped with transferable, lifelong skills.

The syllabus is enhanced through October and July Field Days. Numerous trips are offered such as the thrilling on-water activities at Fairlop Waters, the immersive overnight trip at Chatham Historic Dockyard (staying on the WW2 Destroyer HMS Cavalier), the eye-opening National Maritime Museum visit, the memorable camping trip in Portsmouth... the trips are a definite highlight for the cadets! In addition to this, the Scuba Diving trip recently travelled to Mexico. It is a special experience being a cadet on a residential trip which has been demonstrated by many of our Royal Navy cadets voluntarily undertaking external cadet courses.

RAF

Over the past 12 months, the RAF Section has experienced a period of remarkable growth and achievement.

In April, leadership transitioned smoothly as F/L Chan succeeded as OC RAF Section. Our cadets actively participated in various activities, including 11 cadets taking to the skies at RAF Wittering and 13 had some very memorable moments in the Summer Camp at RAF Valley.

Additionally, Sgt F Chan and Sgt S Ahammod enhanced their leadership skills at the Essex Wing SNCO Training Course, while Cpl I North completed the JNCO course. During the Trinity Field Days, our cadets enjoyed two days of water based team building training. And as part of the Michaelmas Field Days, we hosted a formal RAF Mess Night, attended by nearly 70 cadets, CFAVs, and staff, with the Headmaster as our Guest of Honour. We also organised the largest single–service parade in recent memory, honoured by the presence of Air Vice–Marshal Ranald Munro, Commandant of the Royal Auxiliary Air Force, as the Reviewing Officer.

Army

The Army Section has had a hugely busy calendar, from adventure training and fieldcraft to a carousel of activities. These are all designed to reinforce what is learnt during Tuesday sessions, including stalks, ambushes, and harbour drills. As an Army cadet, their marksmanship skills are also regularly put to the test on the shooting range.

Our cadets had an unforgettable week away in Colchester, teaming up with Shenfield School CCF for a mix of fieldcraft and adventure. Paddleboarding, kayaking, climbing, and team-building challenges, were some of the main activities, all enjoyable and challenging while developing valuable skills.

Easter Adventure Training was another opportunity for cadets to experience an array of activities; forging, river traversing, canoeing, and caving through the Easter holidays.

Several cadets stood out for their leadership and there were some promotions of note: Toby Elliston was promoted to RSM, and Kitty Chalk stepped up to CSM. Congratulations to both of them, and all the cadets, who are developing and demonstrating admirable character in their CCF service.

Planning for the future: Careers & pathways

Empowering Informed Decision Making

Brentwood School is dedicated to providing exceptional career guidance to all students. This begins in Year 7 and supports the whole school's learning values – Virtue, Learning, Manners.

By helping students to recognise their own strengths, we hope to support and empower them to make informed decisions.

Brentwood School has been awarded the prestigious Quality in Careers Standard (QiCS), one of only 719 English secondary schools to have achieved the award. This nationally recognised award demonstrates Brentwood School's commitment to providing outstanding impartial, independent Career Education Information Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) to all our students.

Career Convention

In March, the annual Careers Convention took place in Courage Hall. It was attended by 205 students from Year 10 to Upper Sixth, accompanied by their family members.

We hosted 65 exhibitors including KPMG, Deloitte, The Brightstar Group and Tees Law. From the medical sector students had the opportunity to meet representatives from the Medical, Dentistry and Veterinary (MDV) fields. In total, there were 17 different industries including Education, the Emergency services, Travel, Technology and Engineering. Students engaged in meaningful interactions with exhibitors allowing them to expand their horizons while working on communication and networking skills.

Unifrog

Beginning in Year 7, students are introduced to Unifrog, a platform designed to assist them in exploring their skills, evaluating various options and considering their next steps after school. The use of psychometric testing facilitates the identification of students' interests and the potential career paths that may arise from them.









Unifrog maintains the largest database of post-16 and post-18 opportunities. It is particularly helpful as it enables students to compare universities in the UK alongside those internationally. Additionally, it features an extensive compilation of apprenticeships offered throughout the country, including higher level and degree apprenticeships.

Support in Year 11

At the start of the academic year, each student participates in a 45-minute meeting with an impartial Level 6 qualified Careers Guidance professional. The session culminates in a personalised Action Plan designed to aid in future planning. Following this all students have a 10 minute follow-up meeting with senior staff members with the purpose of ensuring that they are well-informed about their Sixth Form pathway options.

After completing their GCSEs, Year 11 students are invited to undertake a week-long work experience placement. This is an excellent opportunity to get an insight into the world of work and gain an understanding of the skills required to thrive in environments beyond Brentwood School. It helps students to develop transferable skills for the future as well as understanding how organisations work and bringing a job they have read about to life.

Sixth Form

All Sixth Form students are introduced to the University and College Admissions Service (UCAS) which will assist them in choosing universities or apprenticeships, as well as writing their personal statement. Each student has an individual UCAS Hub, in which they log information about their career pathway and future plans.

Any students applying to Oxford or Cambridge are assigned a personal, subject-specific mentor to aid in the application process. Similarly those who look to pursue competitive fields such as medicine, dentistry and veterinary science receive advice starting in Year 10 and continuing until their application is complete.

InvestIN

Brentwood School works with InvestIN, a company equally passionate about furthering students' career aspirations. In February, 776 students across Years 8, 9, 11 and 12 attended sessions that covered Finding your Future Career, Making the Most of Work Experience and Impressing at an Interview.





As we celebrate the 125th anniversary of the Society – although, of course, there were alumni from Brentwood long before that! – it has been fascinating to read the notes and minutes from the first meetings, in 1899, of the pioneering OBs who presided over the formation of the 'official' Society of Old Brentwoods. I note that The Chronicle began life within the school's magazine of the time, The Brentwoodian, and following many years as a standalone publication, last published as such in 2018, The Chronicle has come full circle to be found again within one of today's school magazines.

Thank you to Sam Mason and Theo Harris (OB 2009–2020) in the school's Development Office, to Liz Dortel the school's very talented designer, and to Martin Rowland (OB 1951–1961), former editor of The Chronicle who has penned several articles, for their immense time and effort into producing this edition. Having been in their position myself, I know just how much work is required to collate, print, put online and circulate. I hope you enjoy reading this year's offering!

It was a great honour to start my year as President, on what was an excellent and enjoyable Old Brentwoods Day in September – even the weather was kind to us! I am working hard with Sam, the Headmaster, and Chair of Governors, Guy Black (OB 1971–1981) on further strengthening the already positive relationship between the school and Old Brentwoods; there is an obvious and common desire to keep moving forward on this.

It is clear, to me at least, that the school is on a very firm footing and in excellent hands under the Headmaster's leadership. Having worked closely with him during my time in the Development Office and now in this different role, I have seen firsthand just how well the school is evolving despite an ever challenging global backdrop and it is sending students out into the world – and into the Old Brentwoods family – as the very best versions of themselves, with Virtue, Learning and Manners firmly rooted in their souls. The Board continues to grapple with the incredibly complex matter of the restructuring, as introduced in last year's edition, and my thanks to Chris Cooper (OB 1981-1992), his sub-committee, and the rest of the Board - who all give their time voluntarily for their ongoing hard work and stamina in ploughing on through a minefield of legal, accounting and constitutional issues as we look to set the Society and Clubhouse into an appropriate structure for today's world and fit for purpose for the next 125 years. Like my predecessors, I have some aspirations for my time in office. Continuing from my recent time back at school in the Development Office, I continue to personally support and promote the Foundation and hope to help foster greater OB support for bursaries, to give today's youth the opportunities that we all enjoyed; the need and demand for these will be greater with the upcoming fee increases once VAT is added. I was delighted to announce at the London dinner in November that, during my year in office, I will be attempting to raise sufficient funds for a 'President's Bursary' – all support gratefully received so please get in touch if you can help with a donation. It was great to have a London dinner back on the calendar again and it was a superb evening, at the RAF Club, to celebrate the Society's 125th anniversary.

Inevitably, OB activity is more centred around the school and the OB Club, but the Society's members are spread far and wide of course. One of my first thoughts on becoming President Elect in 2023 was to talk with Sam and the Headmaster about how we might take the Society and the school's Alumni team 'out and about' more. After much thought and planning, I am pleased that the first OB Regional Event took place in Exeter in November where OBs from 18 to 80 gathered in good numbers for an evening of great revelry. Landmark celebration for OBs

An Evening to Celebrate the 125th Anniversary of the 1st Society Meeting held in the now demolished St Philip's Church, Bethnal Green – Thursday 19th September 2024.

At the junction of Swanfield Street & Rhoda Street in Bethnal Green on September 19th, 2024, it was a mild evening but with a slightly foreboding sky. Perhaps not dissimilar to the same day in 1899 when sixteen Old Brentwoods met at the school room annexed to St Philip's Church in Bethnal Green. Led by Canon William Quennell, at that meeting it was resolved to launch the Society of Old Brentwoods, and what was to become an all-enduring society based on the fellowship of Brentwood School's alumni and a deep-seated love for and pride in their alma mater.

It was poignant that on this day in this year there were again sixteen Old Brentwoods present. As the church was demolished in the 1950s, the meeting convened on the exact spot (Lat/Lon 51.525794, -0.073088), in what is now a small parcel of open space.

This celebratory event took the following format:

6.30pm - Address by Christian Cooper, Chairman of The Society of Old Brentwoods

"Precisely 125 years ago just in front of no.52 Swansfield Street, sixteen Old Brentwoods met and formed the Society of Old Brentwoods. Present were the elected chairman: Canon Rev W. Quennell, D. Linklater, RW Field, WJ Knar, E. Bean, E.H.Wright, RH Lyons, HJ Bowen, WJ Holme, FW Clapham, AG Bister, GCR Taylor, AJ Kilby, A Lawton, CW Hill & JE Bennett.

The intention was nothing less than purely honourable, to build bridges between former pupils and their school, and was borne out of those bonds of friendship that all of us here today have enjoyed through our time spent at Brentwood School, and subsequently in serving the Society of Old Brentwoods." (An extract from the address)

6.37pm - A moment's silence and reflection to remember those founding members of the Society, and other Old Brentwoods who have been known to us and have now passed away.

6.38pm - Reading from the original minute book by Sarbjeet Singh, Hon. Secretary of The Society of Old Brentwoods.

6.43pm - A hearty rendition of The Old Red Wall (written by C.E.W. Bean in 1907). 1st, 3rd, and Last verses + chorus, with considerable amusement and confusion from local residents.

6.46pm - The first public reading of the Society of Old Brentwoods 125th Anniversary blessing, delivered with great reverence by the School Bursar, Jeremy Blunden, CBE, LVO. The blessing was specially prepared for this occasion by the Brentwood School Chaplain, Rev Dr Adrian McConnaughie.









With formalities concluded preprandial refreshments were taken at The Well and Bucket, an old Victorian public house where in all likelihood those original sixteen ended up after that very first meeting. At precisely **7pm** a toast was made, and an evening of conviviality ensued, culminating in a £367.95p bill from the Sheba Curry House in Brick Lane, where amongst other things forty-two pints of cobra and twenty-four poppadoms were enjoyed.

Modernising the structure of the Society of Old Brentwoods: it's about to happen

Developments at the Old Brentwoods clubhouse mean the 125-year-old Society must modernise its structure to ensure its continued viability and service to members and the community.

Since the creation of the Old Brentwoods Club nearly five decades ago, the clubhouse and grounds have increasingly welcomed non-Old Brentwoods who now account for the majority of its income and much of its usage. Consequently, it had become obvious that the Society's long established unincorporated association status could not meet the current and future requirements for running an evolving undertaking.

After a lengthy assessment of the situation, complemented by expert advice from Old Brentwoods and outside consultants, the Society's board has put together a new structure to encompass our established principles and new charitable intentions and commercial operations.

Half a century of change

The Society of Old Brentwoods has had its 'home and heartland' at the Clubhouse in Ashwells Road since 1976. OBs have enjoyed sports and social activity there ever since.

Brentwood School used to pay five years' Society membership fees for leavers. However, the expansion of universities has spread school leavers around the country with fewer staying locally and using Ashwells Road. This played a part in the substantial reduction in the late 1990s and early 2000s in the number of Old Brentwoods converting their free five-year memberships into the annual £23.50 subscription. In 2014, the school ceased its contributions, redirecting funds to its development office.

Further financial pressures emanated from Covid restrictions and the cost of living crisis which hit clubhouse revenue. Yet overhead costs remained high, a problem exacerbated by an ageing building and essential upgrades for new windows, fire prevention equipment, rewiring and disability facilities. Consequently, the Society Board had to trim its expenditure while sustaining OBs' use. However, it was becoming very clear that Ashwells Road could no longer carry on, financed solely by members' subs.

Opening a club for non-OBs. Accordingly, Old Brentwoods Club membership was opened in 2014 to the non-OBs in the area who play their sport in teams which consider the OB Club as their home ground. This quickly increased the numbers using the Clubhouse and has created a sustainable community sports club.

The Board has considered likely changes in the relative contributions of the three user groups. From 1976 to 2014, Society members had 90 percent of income. In 2014–21, this dropped to 25 percent, and in 2021–23, Old Brentwoods made up just five percent.

Initiatives to realise new income are bearing fruit. Monday to Friday daytime trading has been established and the school is using the clubhouse more for sports and leadership meetings. More functions are being booked, not least post-funeral wakes where guests can use the new lift which now provides step free access to the main clubroom.

Trading and financial factors

Accordingly, the Board initiated a broad review of the Society's operations in 2022/23, enlisting the advice of Society members with legal and accounting skills. *There was universal consensus that the Society would benefit from a form of charitable status, probably combined with a wholly owned trading subsidiary.* The Society would become focused on achieving charitable objectives including the encouragement of amateur sport at the new Old Brentwoods Club charity. The newly formed entity would also establish a limited company to run the commercial activities that increase revenue but are not deemed charitable activities, such as selling alcohol, under the rules of the Charities Commission. The relationship between the Club charity and trading company will allow the Society to maximise income without incurring significant tax liabilities.

Selling triangle land. Since 2021, the Society has been pursuing a possible planning opportunity on a piece of land at the OB Club – the triangle. A pre-application enquiry has been considered by Brentwood Council and a formal application is likely to be submitted in January 2025 as the new Government's approach to Green Belt regulations, might offer a better chance of success.

Established structure and its limitations

The Society has always been an unincorporated association which is not a legal entity. It is used by small volunteer-based groups which trade between themselves and have very limited interaction with third parties. The Ashwells Road land and assets have been held in trust on behalf of Society of Old Brentwoods members, the four trustees being themselves members. However, there are many restrictions on how such an association conducts its affairs. As an unincorporated association, the Society lacks legal status, exposing members to personal liability and limiting access to grants.

Restructuring: requirements and opportunities

The new entities should accommodate all the Society's sources of income and expenditure; maintain and expand the Old Brentwoods Club offering; and pursue charitable aims. The key requirements are to preserve the Old Brentwoods identity, achieve financial self-sufficiency, and maximise grants and tax efficiency.

Restructuring: two charities and an operating company

There will be two charities, separately and independently governed but linked in certain operational areas: the Old Brentwoods Society and the Old Brentwoods Club. The latter will oversee a new trading company, Old Brentwoods Club Trading Ltd.

Both charities will share the same charitable objectives: to promote community participation in recreation, to advance education for the public benefit, to provide facilities for recreation and other leisure pursuits and to pursue other charitable purposes.

Old Brentwoods Society Charity

Membership of the new Old Brentwoods Society charity will be open to all alumni of Brentwood School.

Existing subscribing members of the Society of Old Brentwoods will become founder members of the new Old Brentwoods Society charity if they choose to continue with their current membership subscription. All alumni who are not currently subscribing members are able to become members of the new Old Brentwoods Society upon payment of a membership fee to be set by the Board. The school will be a single member (to protect its beneficiary rights if the Society was ever dissolved).

The Old Brentwoods Society charity will be the owners of the land. It will grant a 125-year full repairing and insuring lease to the Club charity; approve the appointment of its trustees; and support it in seeking grants and loan applications and in its own fund raising activities.

Old Brentwoods Club Charity

Again, there would be two classes of members: associate members already paying the £30 annual fee and new members (including some OBs as individuals); and the Society itself to protect its formal rights.

The Old Brentwoods Club charity will promote the public benefit of community participation in recreation, particularly among people in and around Brentwood (the 'community amateur sports charitable purpose') using the land and facilities to run a charitable club in line with Charity Commission guidance. It will operate independently with responsibility for the governance of Old Brentwoods Club Trading Ltd and appoint its three directors.

There will be two categories of members. Current and future Club members will be associate members of the Old Brentwoods Club charity, paying the annual membership fee (currently £30). The Old Brentwoods Society itself will be the sole member to protect its formal rights. Old Brentwoods Club will grant a licence to the trading company to occupy land and buildings as appropriate; and enter into a loan agreement with the trading company to provide working capital.

Old Brentwoods Club Trading Ltd

A single £1 share will be owned by the Club charity.

It will use staff employed by the Club charity and agree with that body the disposition of costs, terms and benefits. It will use only Vatable supplies and enter a VAT group with the Club charity.

Old Brentwoods Club Trading Ltd will transfer profits to the two charities on a pre-agreed ratio within nine months of each financial year.

Next steps

With the end of the lengthy consultation process, implementation will be subject to formal approval of the proposals by the Society's Board. Special meetings of the Society will be required to pass the necessary resolutions, of which due notice will be given.

What happens to the original Society?

The original Society will continue only to transfer members' subscriptions to the new charity, ceasing other activities.



It has taken a fair amount of toil and tears to produce this structure. It had become starkly obvious that we could not continue to run Ashwells Road via the unincorporated association structure. It was increasingly inefficient and completely unsuitable for dealing with the demands of a growing leisure and sporting business.

I am full of admiration for my working party colleagues who have striven to develop a robust offering for the membership to assess. I am deeply thankful to all those who have contributed help and advice."

Proposal for 5 Open-Air Padel Courts


The Society of Old Brentwoods is applying for full planning permission for the installation of five open-air padel courts with associated landscaping. The site identified for the installation is the practice training field currently used for overspill football and rugby practice. This is positioned on the northeast part of the estate adjacent to the existing car park. Access remains via the entrance off Ashwells Road.

The scheme includes the following:

- 5 full Size LTA Compliant Padel Courts
- Perimeter Court Boundary Enclosure comprising tempered glass and grid-style fencing to 3m-4m in height.
- Low-level target lighting for courts (to replace existing lighting around the training field).
- Access to the padel courts remains precisely as per the existing car park access.
- A 'Remembrance' walkway for pedestrian linkage into the padel courts from the car park.
 Also, this gives access to the raised viewing gallery 600mm above ground level with a disability ramp.
- Extensive landscaping incorporating the planting of 58 trees, a new hedge line with trees and a new rhododendron border.

The Lawn Tennis Association (LTA) is padel's governing body, and they say that the UK is experiencing its own padel boom because padel is:

"Fast-paced, accessible and social – it's easy to see why padel is widely renowned as one of the fastest growing sports in the world"

They back this up with the following statistical evidence; the UK currently has over 250 padel courts in more than 50 clubs, which host major events such as the British Open Padel Championship. Compared to the 150 courts in 66 British facilities at the end of 2022, the numbers haven't stopped.

There's no doubt about it that padel is here and it's growing in popularity, with two sets of courts in Brentwood (six at Brentwood Padel Club in Childerditch and two at The Heron in Herongate having been built in Brentwood over the last two years.

The Old Brentwoods Sports Club has consulted widely with the membership and multiple stakeholders and there is no question as to the local demand. Moreover, the padel offering in Brentwood is currently serviced on the southside of the Borough with no representation to the North, leading to problems of accessibility.

Playing padel tennis offers a range of social and community benefits, including opportunities for social interaction, inclusivity, teamwork, physical health, mental well-being, community building, and the promotion of sports kinship. Padel is viewed as a 'very accessible' sport, it's easier on the body than tennis and squash, and is easy to pick up and hard to put down.

With regards to gender usage, padel is highly regarded for the female market. This is a quote from Women's Health – 'as padel does not focus on strength, but rather tactics, it's a great sport for all abilities. The game adapts to the rhythms of its players, and you determine the level and intensity of the game. It's also massively growing in popularity among women with 30% of padel players being women compared to just 15% in tennis.

To create a 'sense of place' the proposal has sought to create an exciting and vibrant celebratory entrance into the Padel Court complex, albeit small-in-scale and respectful to the site context.

The proposal is therefore to create a 'Remembrance Walkway' which directly connects to the car park. The walkway incorporates the following:

- Hardwood oak pergola structure forming planting opportunities.
- Memorial rose planting opportunities with plaques for 'fallen friends'.
- Wisteria planting to the east creating year-round visual interest to the walkway.
- Low-level ornamental shrub planting.

As at November 1st the planning application was still awaiting a decision. **Detailed planning consent granted by Brentwood Borough Council on 6.12.24.**

So how has all this come about? Two years ago, three Old Brentwoods were reminiscing about how much they enjoyed playing croquet at school and how it would be wonderful if they could play at the Old Brentwoods. So last year they 'borrowed' the cricket square and held the



first Old Brentwoods' Croquet Championship. All those who took part enjoyed it so much, they set out on a mission to create a croquet club. It's taken a lot of work but we are now a fully paid up registered club with Croquet England and have created a lawn in front of the veranda where on 22nd September, we held our first open day. Then by chance, we were contacted by Alison Maugham, Director of Communications for Croquet England, who asked if we would be interested in merging our club with hers with the combined clubs using the Old Brentwoods as its home ground. This winter will, subject to the agreement of the Clubhouse Committee, see the start of work to create 3 full size 'Association' lawns which will hopefully be ready for play this summer whilst in the meantime we intend to maintain the 'half size" lawn we established in front of the veranda for the open day in September so we can play during this winter. This is in addition to the indoor croquet events that we are planning to hold in the Courage Hall during this winter.

Football

All of the featured Old Brentwoods were interviewed and asked the same questions about their experiences at school and where life and career has taken them since.


Below is just a snapshot and you can read full stories on the Association website. We hope these stories are an inspiration and we feature their words of advice to current students graduating Brentwood.

David Eldridge (OB 1985-1992)

David went to the University of Exeter to study English Literature and Drama, with the hopes of being a theatre director. He went off that idea and started writing plays as an undergraduate. A full length play of his, 'Serving It Up', was picked up for production in 1996 by The Bush Theatre in London, becoming a hit, leading him to continue acting since then.



Dr Alice Scott (OB 1995-2002)

"Ignore conventional approaches and be open to success coming in ways you don't expect."

Alice studied Medicine at UCL, did various hospital jobs and then embarked upon GP training. After moving back to Brentwood and working in several local NHS GP surgeries, she started doing some private general practice alongside NHS work. After completing a Postgraduate qualification and becoming recognised as a British Menopause Specialist, she moved into full time private General Practice and private specialist menopause care.



Launched in 2023, the Brentwood School Association continues to build its reach to connect all those in our community. In November 2024 we held our first Association London Dinner and it proved a hugely successful evening.

Cantona's irreverence helps Toby with iconic nameplates

Toby Lyon-Brown (OB 1999-2006) has become a major player in recognising and developing the sophisticated communications skills that lead motorists to buy and retain particular vehicles-in his case Ford cars. As European newsroom editor and deputy editor with Ford's global newsroom, based in Dunton and Cologne, he looks for 'inspiration, opportunity and improvement from a wider media world.'

But it's tough going. "It is harder than ever to get through to the prospective purchaser." All communications have to be "set against an ever changing and ever more crowded media landscape, the rise of the creator/influencer, and the need to liaise closely with customers after purchase." All marketing and PR activity has to be more measurable against desired business

outcomes.

"Brand and product communications without human insight or cultural relevance just don't resonate with consumers. Monitoring conversations on social media has become increasingly important in getting us into the conversation."

Toby has been heavily involved in the recent relaunch of iconic Ford nameplates attached to electric vehicles: the Puma in 2019 (now the best selling car in the UK), the Mustang Mach-E in 2021 and, most recently, the Capri. "We knew not everyone would like the electric aspect." This was tackled by featuring Eric Cantona in the commercials and in social media as a symbol of irreverence. "The launch gained tremendous stats for awareness. It's not often a new car launch gets eight minutes on BBC Breakfast and 12 minutes on Sky News!"



"The vehicle market will get more and more crowded over the coming years. It's the brands that can effectively differentiate themselves from the pack who will win. The role of communications will be vital - and I'm looking forward to the fight."

The fast-paced world of innovative communications evidently suits Toby, who admits that he is never at his best when asked to focus on subjects in which he is not particularly interested. However, Brentwood School encouraged him to get stuck into things he was keen on. These included duties as Deputy Head Boy and a passion for rugby which made him a force in the 1st XV and earned him full colours. He was the first male pupil to study food tech for GCSE which no doubt whetted his appetite for commercial catering, demonstrated by his creation of Lyon-Brown Bespoke Catering, which he used to run with fellow OBs Andrew Burgess and Chris Prowting.

Toby was the first person in a long while to pass the full Regular Commissions Board whilst at school. He secured a commission as 2nd lieutenant RLC-Bomb Disposal Unit, which he took up in his gap year immediately after school. He represented the corps in the rugby 1st XV, winning the Army Cup.



Next step was Exeter University (2007-10), where he gained an upper second class economics degree and played for the 1st XV. Back in Brentwood, he played for Old Brentwoods RFC from 2011 to 2016, captaining the 1st XV for three of those seasons.

Toby is the President of the Old Red Wall Club. Its 16 OB members support many Old Brentwoods events and carry out their own fundraising. The club has raised nearly £100,000 for charities close to members' hearts.

A brief stint in the City brought a realisation that a career without creativity was not for him. He started on Ford Motor Company's graduate scheme

in 2011. Since then, he has held nine positions across marketing and public relations in Ford UK and Ford Europe.

All this imbued him with a lifelong sense of always striving to reach his potential. He remains wary of that "lingering feeling of underachievement "which can haunt those of us less robotic in our focus."

Martin Rowland (OB 1951-1961), Author

Sixth Form helped shape a headmaster's radical approach to pupil development

A pioneering educator with a radical approach to pupils' very different needs, Colin Reid (1951–61) was a teacher for 38 years, mostly as a headmaster, expanding the range and depth of pupils' education, complemented by innovative ways of achieving his goals. He was closely involved in the early development of the teaching of the International Baccalaureate, served as an independent schools' inspector, was active on reforming educational bodies and took up prison monitoring in his retirement.

Throughout his career, he set aside restrictive rules where he felt they limited pupils' development. Married to an active environmentalist, he cast a wide net to draw on ideas and inspiration from various beliefs and cultures. He regards his Sixth Form years at Brentwood as central to forming his outlook and approach.

Born in 1944, Colin's first memories were of Hong Kong, where his father Alan worked for Jardine Matheson and he attended an Anglo-Chinese school. A parental transfer to London in 1950 meant a short stay at



Harecroft Hall school in the Lake District. With the family ensconced near Ingatestone, it was time for Colin's academic mettle-and later those of brothers David and Keith-to be tested at Brentwood Prep. In his final year, he was head of Lawrence and remembers a group effort to build a race track for Dinky toys from bricks and dust behind the Upper and Lower One classroom block.

In the Senior School, being 'no good at games', he took the scouts seriously, attending camps led by Perk Rowswell and Tom Cluer. In the CCF, eventually as the WO2 of Support Company, he helped Jack Higgs with 'rather unrealistic' training in putting down colonial disturbances and aiding Civil Defence in the event of a nuclear attack.

A talented Arts VIth

Colin was a member of the Arts VIth for his Advanced level years. "Our experience was extended well beyond the stereotypical three A levels." A Christmas holiday reading scheme, a summer thesis and extra courses enhanced learning. "We benefited from exceptional teachers. These included George Elcoat and Terry Best in French, Sid Bergin in economics, Dennis Tarrant in geology and Tom Sheppard in Russian.

Tom Gardner, the newly arrived assistant chaplain, organised religion and philosophy conferences. Alan Mould, who had counselled Colin to take history, was succeeded by the "inspiring Peter Watkins-the greatest influence on my intellectual development. Watkins regarded history as a 'contested subject' and would deploy quotations about people and events and ask you to make up your mind."

Colin was one of an UVIth Arts party who, having just finished A levels, visited historical sites in France and Spain under Mr Watkins' guidance. He was a member of the Debating and History Societies and edited the journal Medieval and Modern. He enjoyed forays into Byron and other Romantics under the guidance of William Barron. 'Spud' also masterminded the school's theatrical productions—nearly always Shakespeare. Colin had roles in Julius Caesar, As You Like It and Hamlet.

His contemporaries were a talented crew. Sir David Eady and Rodger Hayward Smith, who became judges; Professor Sir Roderick Floud, economic historian and academic administrator; Malcolm Vale, an Oxford History professor; Bernard Porter, a professor specialising in imperial history at Newcastle; Stephen Halliday, author of books on London's history; solicitor Philip Crapnell; and Ian Small, Headmaster of the Bootham School, York. Colin remains in touch with Mike Carey, who became a headteacher in Yorkshire, and with Chris Causton who, after history at Oxford, became an IT specialist. A lifelong friend was Richard Sheppard, an Oxford Professor of German, who, as head boy, ceased the practice of praepostors beating boys!

Post-A level, Colin spent a term in the VIIth Form under Jim Rennie, leaving the school in December 1961. He regretted the passing of the Direct Grant scheme. In his day, about 85 percent of Brentwood pupils were state financed.

Nigeria, Cambridge and Exeter

Before university, Colin taught History, English and Latin at the Ijebu Ode Grammar School, Nigeria for nine months. He voyaged to and from west Africa as a member of a cargo ship's crew. Headmaster Ralph Allison's strong international outlook conveyed itself to the young Reid. Allison arranged for Brentwood and Ibjebu Ode sixth formers to spend exchange years at each others' schools.

From 1962–65, Colin read history at Corpus Christi, Cambridge. Then he attended Exeter University to do a PGCE (1965–66) where he met his future wife Betsy, also studying for her PGCE. Betsy came from Rhodesia where she had obtained a London University external degree in history. They were married in 1966. He was ready to teach.

Terence Best



When Terence Best, a Brentwood School teacher for 34 years, died on January 9th 2024, aged 94, it was difficult to know where to start in noting his achievements and recording his accolades. He was an exceptional educator, accomplished linguist, gifted musician and erudite musical scholar. He was recognised as a leading authority on the works of George Frideric Handel, one of the greatest ever composers of classical music.

Terence Best was born on 27th December 1929. He attended Bournemouth Grammar School and graduated from Jesus College, Oxford, before joining Brentwood School in 1956, where he remained until his retirement in 1990. He was a housemaster, Head of Languages and the first ever Head of Sixth Form (1989–90). He was a keen CCF Officer and led the 1957 400th anniversary CCF Parade. An accomplished musician, he played the harpsichord, which he donated to the school.

His funeral service was held in the Chapel on 29th January with a number of Old Brentwoods in attendance. The address was delivered by Revd Dr Adrian McConnaughie, the School Chaplain.

He cited the words of Mike Hall, Housemaster of School House, chemistry teacher and Second Master: 'In Terence Best we had a schoolmaster who combined first class

teaching with a strong pastoral interest." "This seems to take us to the very essence of the man whose life we celebrate today."

Terence quickly gained the reputation as an excellent classroom practitioner and educator. From 1962, he was Head of the Modern Languages Department. Under his aegis, it expanded and flourished with the introduction of Italian and the development of a French exchange programme.

Revd Dr McConnaughie had been "struck by the number of times his inspiration and passion for languages was spoken of by former pupils. Whether you were a struggling linguist or someone with a flair for the subject, Terence seemed to inspire those in his charge to reach their potential and even, at times, to supersede it.

Perhaps the last word should be with Andrew Phillips (OB 1966–1974): He had a great sense of humour, but also a quick temper and was not slow to bring mischievous boys to heel. He was in my humble opinion, not just a polymath, but a good allround fellow: fair, honest and with an integrity rare enough in the day, perhaps even rarer now. We were lucky to have known him and to have had him as a teacher."

Neil Loader (OB 1940-1946)

Stalwart of the Old Brentwoods, Neil Loader died on October 2nd, aged 95. The funeral took place at Christ Church, Warley on October 24th, attended by many Old Brentwoods. Neil was born in Chadwell Heath on 9th September 1929 to Charles and Emily. His early school reports indicated a very capable pupil. In 1939, the family was evacuated to a farmhouse in Bason Bridge, Somerset. Neil attended Dr Morgan's School in Bridgwater. They returned to Chadwell Heath – and the Blitz – in July 1940 and Alan and Neil were accepted into Brentwood School (annual fee £57!)

In 1946, he joined chemical company May & Baker. He attended evening classes and passed the executive exam to join the Civil Service. However, he was called up for National Service in the Navy – enjoying a tour of Japan and being stationed in Malta. On leaving the Navy, he decided against the Civil Service and became employed by Remington Rand, an electric equipment and electronics manufacturer, as a trainee salesman. Four years later, he joined Monsanto's UK plastics division, working his way up from sales trainee to UK Sales Director.

In 1973, Neil left the corporate world and set up Loader Chemicals & Plastics Ltd. He bought an office in Gresham Road, Brentwood in 1980 and extended it in 1984. Son Phil

joined Loader Chemicals in 1990. Four years later, Neil became the company's chairman, leaving the management to his son. He fully relinquished ownership in 2008. Neil settled into the Old Brentwoods in the 1950s. He was Secretary of the Football Club in the late 50s and early 60s, becoming President in the late 70s and early 80s. He was Cricket Club President from 1989–91, and Society President in 1974.

Neil was initiated into the Old Brentwoods Lodge, aged 29, in 1959. He became Master of the Lodge in 1973, subsequently serving as Assistant Secretary, Treasurer and Chaplain. He was awarded with Senior London Grand Rank and Senior London Grand Chapter Rank for his services to the Lodge and London Freemasonry. In 2019, in his 90th year, he was presented with his 60th certificate in 2019 by Sir Michael Snyder (OB 1961–1968).

Phil Loader told mourners: "He deserved all the respect and admiration from every member of every club or society he was such a part of, every hour of warmth, friendship and laughter shared with many friends, every ounce of love and affection from family, every minute of support received in later years."



Dennis Riddiford

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Dennis Riddiford, on 22nd September 2024, in Pisa, at the age of 97, after a short illness. A graduate of Brasenose, Oxford, Dennis joined our staff in 1951 after military service. He became the first of a golden post-war generation of long-serving teachers who came to Brentwood during that decade (alongside his great friends Terence Best and Frank Halford, Brian Tymms, Mickey Hall, Bob Jackson and Godfrey Thomas) and formed the backbone of the school for three decades. As Head of Classics, and tutor of VI (21) – his beloved Classical Sixth – he inspired a generation of pupils not just with a deep understanding of classical texts but a love of the ancient world and Greek and Roman civilisations.

Living in the tiny cottage on The Chase with his wife Maria – with whom he retired to Venice in 1988 – and his son George and daughter Luisa (both OBs), he was seen every day making his way to the Common Room with his trademark pipe locked firmly between his teeth – the origin of his affectionate nickname 'Bubbles' – and a volume of Vergil or another poet under his arm. And in the evenings he would often be seen on the golf course – a sport he relished playing until only a few years ago. (At the course in Venice, he once famously found himself playing alongside Arnold Schwarzenegger and Clint Eastwood who were visiting the City and asked him to join them.)

He celebrated his 85th and 90th birthdays at the school, and enjoyed keeping in touch with many of the pupils

whom he had inspired – exchanging emails which dispensed his profound wisdom, news about his beloved family, political gossip, intense scholarship, and observations about those great loves of his life, Italian food, wine and music (particularly the operas of Verdi). He remained active until very recently, his idea of slowing down being to translate Juvenal or Horace in the mornings and then enjoy a glass (or two) of Soave at lunchtime before taking siesta, and to reminisce about his time at Brentwood, among the happiest days of his remarkable and long life.


