Built to Serve - Fire Station #4 Breaks Ground

THE CITY OF SCHERTZ HAS EARNED THE POPULAR ANNUAL FINANCIAL REPORTING (PAFR) AWARD FROM THE GOVERNMENT FINANCE OFFICERS ASSOCIATION (GFOA) FOR ITS FY 2023 – 2024 PAFR, MARKING THE CITY’S FIRST PAFR RECOGNITION.

The GFOA’s PAFR Program recognizes governments that produce high-quality, easy-to-understand financial reports for the public. Created by the City’s Finance and Public Affairs departments, the report highlights Schertz’s financial performance, department achievements, and awards and accomplishments from the fiscal year. This recognition underscores the City’s commitment to transparency, accountability, and public engagement.

Additionally, this year, the City received the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for the first time for its FY 2025-2026 Annual Budget.

The Distinguished Budget Presentation Award reflects the City’s dedication to nationally recognized standards for effective budget development and communication. To receive this award, the budget must serve as a policy document, financial plan, operations guide, and communications tool, meeting rigorous criteria in each area.

In recognition of Baldwin's long service, the Schertz City Council established his namesake scholarship to encourage high school seniors (public, private, or homeschooled) who are residents of Schertz to consider public service as a career path.

The 2026 scholarship will be awarded on a competitive basis. The scholarship may be used for tuition or other fees or expenses for any postsecondary school that is accredited by a state, regional, or national accreditation agency and is a traditional 2 – 4-year institution or other educational institution offering courses, degrees, or other training suitable to a public service career.

Honoring a Legacy of Service: Schertz Police Celebrate Three Retirements

SERGEANT SHAWN CEEKO, SERGEANT ALBERT ARRIAGA, AND LIEUTENANT VIRGIL JONES EACH LEAVE BEHIND A LASTING IMPACT THROUGH THEIR LEADERSHIP, PROFESSIONALISM, AND COMMITMENT TO PUBLIC SAFETY.



Sergeant Shawn Ceeko began his law enforcement career in 2001 and joined the Schertz Police Department in October 2005. Over the years, he served in numerous roles, including Patrolman, Special Projects Officer, School Resource Officer, Criminal Investigations, and Quartermaster. He was promoted to Patrol Corporal in 2011 and Patrol Sergeant in 2023. A Master Peace Officer with more than 2,200 TCOLE hours, Ceeko also served honorably in the U.S. Marine Corps and achieved the rank of Corporal. Born in San Antonio and raised in Spring, Texas, he has been married to his wife Toni since 2018 and is a proud father and stepfather. In retirement, he plans to pursue business ventures in the livestock and equine industry after more than 24 years of service.

Sergeant Albert Arriaga began his law enforcement career in 1994 and joined the Schertz Police Department in April 2001. During his time with Schertz, he served as a Patrolman, Criminal Investigator, Field Training Officer, and



member of the Honor Guard. He was promoted to Traffic Corporal in 2009 and Traffic Sergeant in 2021. Arriaga is a Master Peace Officer with more than 3,300 TCOLE hours and has received both a Lifesaving Award and a Chief's Award during his career. A San Antonio native, he has been married to his wife, Valerie, since 2007 and is a proud father of two sons. In retirement, he is considering opportunities in political office or social advocacy within the Schertz community and looks forward to spending more time restoring classic vehicles and enjoying his hobbies after more than 30 years of service.

Lieutenant Virgil Jones began his law enforcement career in 1994 and joined the Schertz Police Department in June 2002. Throughout his tenure, he served as a Patrolman, Criminal Investigator, Field Training Officer, and Accident Reconstructionist before promoting to Patrol Corporal in 2007 and Criminal Investigations Sergeant in 2017. He was promoted to Lieutenant in 2020 and went on to command



the Criminal Investigation Division, Patrol Division, and Support Services Division. A Master Peace Officer with more than 3,700 TCOLE hours, Jones received Supervisor of the Year in 2010 and Detective of the Year for multiple consecutive years. He is a founding member of the Schertz Police Association and a strong advocate for Special Olympics. He will continue his law enforcement career with the Fair Oaks Ranch Police Department beginning in February 2026 after more than 31 years of service, while also looking forward to spending more time with his family and personal interests.

SEWER AVERAGING

2025 – 2026

Sewer averaging for the winter months began November 1, 2025, and will continue through March 15, 2026, for cycle billing.

Water usage over this period determines your sewer charge for the next billing year, which begins April 1. The water usage readings will be averaged and the average per thousand-gallon usage per month will be multiplied by \$5.40. The final calculation result will be your sewer charge for the next 12 months.

If you get your bill on the 10th day of the month your calculation period will be November 1 to March 1 and if you get your bill on the 25th day your period will be November 15 to March 15.

RESIDENTS WITH AN AVERAGE BELOW 12,000 GALLONS

That total will be added to the base rate of \$16.40 for residents with an average below 12,000 gallons.

RESIDENTS WITH AN AVERAGE GREATER THAN 12,001 GALLONS

The first 12,000 gallons will be multiplied by \$5.40 and the portion of the average above 12,000 gallons will be multiplied by \$12.38 and that total will be added to the base rate of \$16.40 for residential use.

12th Flying Training Wing Partners with USDA Wildlife Services and City of Schertz to Mitigate Bird Hazards



THE 12TH FLYING TRAINING WING IS WORKING CLOSELY WITH A U.S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (USDA) WILDLIFE SERVICES BIOLOGIST AND THE CITY OF SCHERTZ TO PROACTIVELY MITIGATE WILDLIFE HAZARDS THAT POSE RISKS TO BOTH MILITARY FLIGHT OPERATIONS AND LOCAL COMMUNITIES.

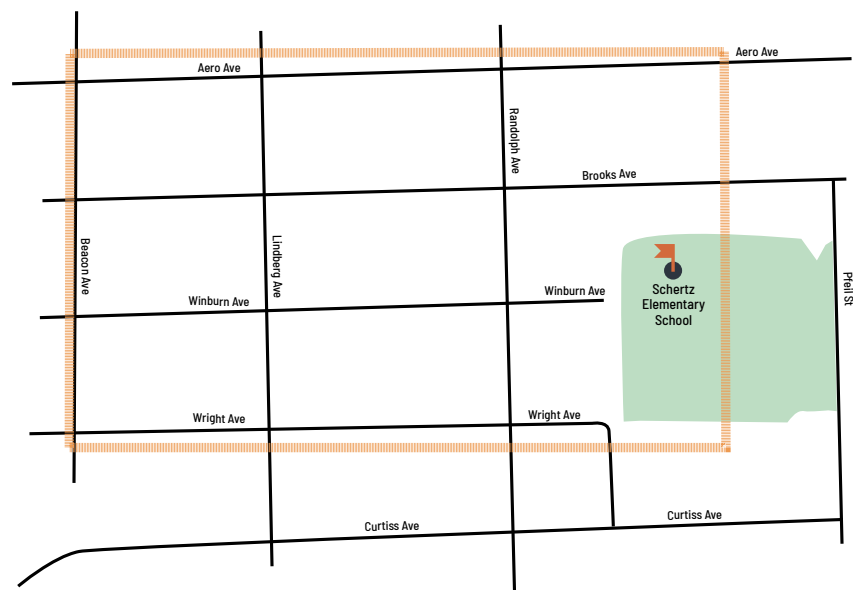
This partnership is focused on addressing the seasonal presence of large birds, particularly vultures, that have established roosts within the T-38 Talon and T-6 Texan II training aircraft traffic pattern. These roosts, located near residential areas and under low altitude flight paths, present a significant safety concern for aviators and the public.

Initial mitigation and dispersal efforts began in July 2025 but were later paused. Operations resumed at the end of February and continue as partners monitor bird activity and respond as needed.

Currently, the vultures are roosting in trees near homes on Brooks and Winburn between Randolph Avenue and Lindberg Avenue. They have also been observed as far north as Mitchell Avenue, as far south as Curtiss Avenue, and as far west as Oak Street. Activity is primarily concentrated in the neighborhood between Schertz Elementary School and Pickrell Park. Bird movement is unpredictable, and affected areas may shift over time.

Bird dispersal operations are conducted around sunset, lasting approximately one to two hours, and occurring one to three evenings per week depending on conditions and bird activity. These operations, conducted under the direction of USDA Wildlife Services, utilize approved dispersal techniques which may include the use of pyrotechnics or other noise making devices.

Residents may hear loud bangs or sounds similar to fireworks during these periods. These noises are intentional and part of the effort to humanely encourage the birds to relocate away from residential and flight critical areas.

The collaborative effort includes identifying attractants, adjusting habitat, and safely dispersing the birds in accordance with federal wildlife management best practices. These actions protect the integrity of flight training missions while maintaining ecological responsibility and community safety.

By working together, the 12th FTW, USDA Wildlife Services, and the City of Schertz are supporting safer skies for pilots and safer neighborhoods for residents while preserving the balance of the local ecosystem.

Committed to a Safe and Healthy Schertz

WHEN SCHERTZ RESIDENTS SIT DOWN TO ENJOY A MEAL AT A LOCAL RESTAURANT, TAKE THEIR KIDS TO A COMMUNITY POOL, OR BROWSE FOOD VENDORS AT THE ANNUAL HOLIDAZZLE EVENT, SAFETY IS OFTEN ASSUMED. WHAT MANY DON'T SEE IS THE CAREFUL, BEHIND-THE-SCENES WORK THAT HELPS MAKE THOSE EVERYDAY EXPERIENCES POSSIBLE.

In Schertz, that responsibility falls to the Environmental Health division of the Neighborhood Services Department, which operates within the City's Planning and Community Development Department.

Often referred to as Sanitarians or Environmental Health Inspectors, this team plays a critical role in protecting the health and safety of both residents and visitors. Their work spans far beyond restaurant inspections, touching nearly every corner of daily life in the community. From food establishments and temporary food events to schools, daycares, commercial swimming pools, and foster care homes, Sanitarians are tasked with ensuring that public spaces meet established health and safety standards.

At the heart of their work is prevention. During routine, unscheduled health inspections, Sanitarians evaluate cleanliness, proper sanitizing of equipment, safe food handling practices, employee handwashing, food storage methods, and temperature controls. These inspections are

designed to identify issues early, before they escalate into serious problems that could lead to foodborne illness, infection, or injury.

"Finding issues before they become a problem and potentially cause harm is key," the team explained. "That proactive approach is what helps stop potential outbreaks and keeps the community safe."

The expertise behind these inspections is backed by extensive education and training. To become a Registered

Sanitarian in the State of Texas, individuals must hold a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university, including at least 30 semester hours in basic or applied sciences. Candidates must then apply to be a Sanitarian in Training through the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation, pass a rigorous examination, and complete a minimum of two years of full-time field experience in environmental or consumer health before earning their registration.

That level of preparation ensures that Schertz’s Environmental Health team brings both technical knowledge and sound judgment into the field. But while regulations guide their work, the approach taken by Sanitarians in Schertz is rooted in education and collaboration rather than enforcement alone.

“Sanitarians are not just inspectors — they are educators,” said Lisa Locken, Neighborhood Services Manager. “Our team takes time to explain the ‘why’ behind the rules and work with business owners and managers to achieve long-term compliance, not just a passing inspection score.”

When violations are identified, inspectors observe food preparation processes and discuss concerns directly with the person in charge. By focusing on education during multiple inspections throughout the year, Sanitarians help businesses understand best practices and implement consistent, safe procedures. This approach not only improves compliance but also strengthens trust between the City and the local business community.

Food safety is a significant part of the job, and the team emphasizes that well-trained employees are the foundation of a safe operation. Ensuring staff members have Certified Food Handler credentials, understand temperature requirements, practice proper handwashing and glove use, and follow food labeling guidelines all contribute to maintaining compliance. When these practices are supported by standardized food safety processes, establishments are better positioned to succeed.

Beyond food establishments, the Environmental Health team’s responsibilities extend to a wide range of community services. Sanitarians conduct annual inspections of commercial swimming pools, taking the opportunity to perform comprehensive evaluations of pool systems and surrounding facilities. These inspections are especially important during peak swimming seasons, when residents rely on safe, clean recreational spaces.

The team also assists residents with mosquito prevention education, helping reduce potential health risks associated with mosquito-borne illnesses. In

addition, Environmental Health coordinates the Schertz Home Energy Efficiency Program (SHEEP), a grant-funded initiative that supports low- to moderate-income residents with energy efficiency upgrades. The program aims to lower overall energy consumption, improve home comfort, and reduce utility costs, further contributing to residents’ quality of life.

For many Sanitarians, the most rewarding part of the job comes from direct interaction with the community. Building relationships with residents, visitors, and business owners allows inspectors to see the real impact of their work.

Through every inspection, conversation, and educational moment, Sanitarians help ensure that Schertz remains a safe, healthy, and welcoming place to live and visit. While much of their work happens out of sight, its impact is felt every day — in safe meals, clean pools, successful community events, and confident residents.

“Our goal is for the community to feel confident that their health and safety are protected,” Locken said. “At the same time, we work collaboratively with businesses so they can continue to thrive and remain successful in Schertz for years to come.”

As Schertz continues to grow, the Environmental Health team remains a steady presence, protecting public health while supporting a vibrant, thriving community.

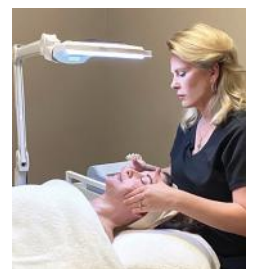

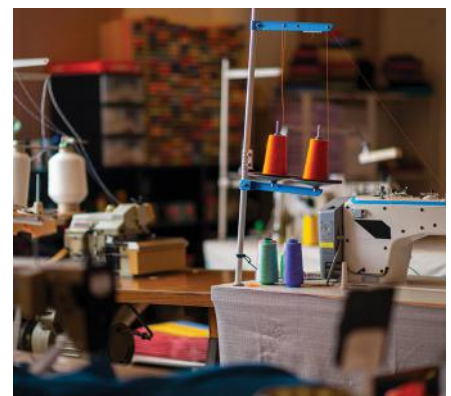

Johann Schertz: Settling New Braunfels, Schertz and Boerne

Found among the many contributions of our late SHPC founder, Dean Weirtz, is the historical recounting of the settlement of one of the seven children (six single, one married) that accompanied Joseph and Anna Marie Schertz aboard the Jean Key Teau sail ship departing in October 1843 from Antwerp, Belgium in route to Indianola, Texas. The Schertz family first took refuge in San Antonio, Texas and from there moved to New Braunfels, Texas along with Prince Carl of Solms-Braunfels Germany and his settler troop. The family became one of New Braunfels' first settler families.

The story of family members migration to areas outside of New Braunfels is told for some, but not all of the sons and daughters of Joseph and Anna Marie. The reader may be particularly familiar with the story of the family's eldest son Sebastian who is considered the founding father of Schertz, Texas. However, little is known or written about the remaining children.

Thus, it was a pleasant surprise to learn of son Johann Schertz' movements from New Braunfels to Boerne, Texas where he and his family became one of the first founding families. The source of discovery for Johann's family migration history is cited below and their family movements are summarized as well.

Johann's first settlement venture was the purchase of a five-acre lot (#115) in New Braunfels. In January 1849, Johann and his brother Sebastian purchased property (600 acres) along the Cibolo Creek in Guadalupe County Texas at a location latter to become Schertz, Texas.⁽¹⁾ The brothers are listed as residents of the purchased land. In 1851, Johann married Segunda Rude and a year later they moved to the Texas Hill Country at a location of what is today Boerne, Texas, becoming a first settler family of that community.

Johann and Segunda purchased two large lots on Main Street in Boerne and lived there for several years. In 1855, the couple purchased 160 acres on Spring Creek Road about three miles north of Boerne. They moved to the Spring Creek Road location soon after purchasing the 160 acres and began farming and ranching operations. Johann's family was one of the first German families to occupy land in the Boerne area.

Sadly in 1860, at the age of 36, Johann died suddenly of appendicitis. His wife and children moved back into Boerne and became active citizens in the affairs of the town and other Texas areas. The family relatives still reside in Boerne, New Braunfels and Schertz Texas.

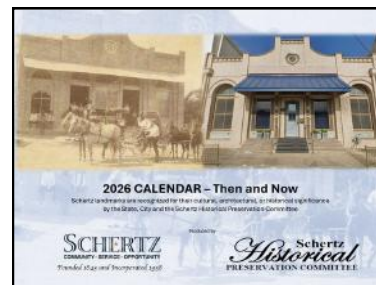

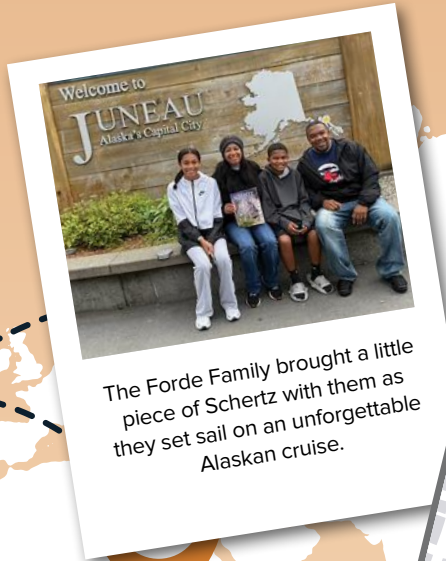
