
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Carols by the Barwon – Saturday 6 December 2025

The Climate Report

Nature, carbon, nutrition: 3 ways farming can shift from climate culprit to solution

Producing and distributing food is responsible for roughly a third of global greenhouse gas emissions. But food systems are highly vulnerable to the droughts, floods, fires and heatwaves made more intense by climate change. Agriculture is both culprit and victim.

In energy and transport, power sources and vehicles can be shifted to clean options to cut emissions. But it's harder to cut emissions from farming. Agricultural emissions come largely from animals, crops and food processing – methane from cattle, sheep and goats, nitrous oxide created by microbes in fertilised soils and carbon losses from degraded land, where soil disturbance and erosion accelerate release of carbon dioxide. Many countries have included agriculture as a way to tackle climate change in their national commitments. The question is how. One solution is to focus on making farming regenerative rather than extractive.

Our research has laid out an approach centred on net zero, nature positive and nutritionally balanced farming (3N for short). The goal: moving away from a narrow focus on cutting emissions to rebuild soil carbon, restore biodiversity and improve human nutrition simultaneously. Many people are already farming like this around the world, but rarely in a joined up way or at scale. Here's what it looks like.

Farming for net zero

Farmers can help achieve net zero and cut costs by reducing emissions and building soil carbon stocks.

Imagine a wheat and livestock farm using precise ways to apply nitrogen fertilisers only when and where plants can absorb it. Soil sensors and satellite imagery guide decisions about fertilising and irrigating. New technologies create fertiliser out of the nitrogen in the air without the large carbon footprint of traditional methods.

Planting nitrogen-fixing legumes on fallow fields restores soil organic matter and cuts how much expensive fertiliser is needed. Beneficial microbes are added to soils to boost carbon storage. Livestock are fed methane-reducing additives, while electric or hydrogen-powered tractors cleanly handle field



operations. Animal manure and crop residues are transformed from waste into fertiliser and renewable energy. The result: fewer emissions, healthier soils and lower bills for

Because agriculture takes up half the world's habitable land, it makes sense to bring back nature wherever possible. But restoring habitat and bringing back species isn't just decoration — it's infrastructure. Instead of bare fence lines and bulldozed creek beds, a 3N farm weaves nature through its working landscape. Hedgerows, shelter belts and native vegetation corridors link habitats and encourage the return of birds, insects and pollinators.

For farmers, this has real utility. Trees shade livestock, groundcovers cool soils, beneficial insects pollinate crops and eat pests and vegetation belts filter runoff, reducing nutrient pollution in dams and waterways. Livestock are moved around so paddocks can recover, allowing native grasses to thrive. Soil organisms and organic matter rebuild, improving how the soil holds water, and reducing erosion. Farm productivity remains high while resilience rises.



Its very nearly Berry picking, eating and preserving time What a delicious time of the year

We were given some berry canes when we first moved to Deans Marsh back in the 80s.

The giver referred to them as brambleberries as he was unsure of exactly what they were when he was given them. Over the years with many people suggesting a variety of berries, we feel they are most likely boysenberry and loganberry.

These are grown on a trellis made with 2 crossed star pickets at either end and another 2 lots spaced several metres apart along the length required. 3 strand of thick fencing wire is then firmly strained. The berries are clumped in bunches and can climb along the wires, bearing their fruit which will be picked with care to escape their thorns.

They are netted with a large net stretched over stakes that keep the netting off the fruit otherwise the birds will sit on top and peck through the netting to eat the berries! These berries will be pruned in the autumn.



Raspberries

We were also given raspberries, a wonderful staple for our garden and our enjoyment to devour! These are grown in clumps and also netted stretched over stakes.

These summer bearing raspberries fruit on their 2 year old canes which will be pruned at ground level when they die off after fruiting.

The new canes, which will fruit next season, we tie each bunch together with that wonderful hayband. Doing this allows us to easily identify them to prune them when their canes dry after they have finishing fruiting .



Raspberries

Along the way we came across some Everebearer raspberries which will fruit in the autumn, extending our enjoyment of raspberry eating.

These canes can be planted singularly and close together and all the canes are pruned with a hedge trimmer to barely 6 inches (15cm) once they finish fruiting and will then happily regrow and fruit again each year.



Strawberries

Home grown strawberries, so much more delicious than bought. We don't use black plastic but plant them in well composted soil and keep them well weeded and pull out any unwanted runners.

The 3 S's can be a nightmare; snails, slugs, slaters. We've tried tinsel, ash, pine needles, sauces of beer and goodness knows what else, all with varying success but, getting netting on early before those Ss can get in will help.

Blackcurrants, I adore their sour taste with breakfast, in salads and making cassis. They fruit on the previous years stems so don't prune those stems!

Last year we planted blue berries for the first time. We bought ones suitable for pots and put them in old concrete laundry troughs, getting to sample a small amount of fruit.

They are well mulched and netted and we're looking forward to, hopefully, more this year.

Berries; mulch them well, water them well, net them and you'll eat them well.

Memory Walk & Jog is coming back!

Dementia Australia

Dementia Australia's biggest annual fundraiser returns to Geelong to raise much-needed funds to support people living with dementia, their families and carers.

On Sunday 3 May 2026, walkers, runners and joggers will set off from Eastern Beach Reserve, Geelong to raise money, boost awareness and to get active for brain health.

Dementia Australia CEO Tanya Buchanan said the Geelong 2026 Memory Walk & Jog is more important than ever with dementia now the leading cause of death for Australians

"Memory Walk & Jog is more than a fundraiser," Professor Buchanan said. "In 2025, an estimated 433,300 Australians are living with dementia, including more than 5,341 in the Greater Geelong region.

"Without a significant intervention, the number of Australians living with dementia is expected to exceed one million by 2065.

Voluntary Assisted Dying Laws

Victorian Government

Amendments to the Voluntary Assisted Dying Act 2017 have passed, bringing Victoria's laws in line with some other states. Changes will take effect within 18 months and pave the way to access VAD without added barriers, improve clarity for practitioners, strengthen safety measures and make the system fairer and more compassionate.

- Removing the 'gag clause' so that doctors and some registered health practitioners are allowed to raise VAD with their patients during discussion about end of life care
- Requiring doctors and nurse practitioners who conscientiously object to provide minimum information to patients
- Extending the prognosis requirement (life expectancy limit for eligibility) from six months to 12 months
- Removing the need for a third prognosis for people with neurodegenerative diseases (like motor neurone disease) if their expected lifespan is between six and 12 months
- Introducing a new administering practitioner role to expand the workforce able to support VAD.

Zoetis celebrates \$1M milestone supporting rural mental health

Zoetis

Animal health company Zoetis has reached a significant milestone, marking its tenth year of continuous support for mental health in rural and regional Australia, with \$1 million contributed to Beyond Blue since partnering together in 2016.

This milestone includes a new \$100,000 donation to Beyond Blue, which will help provide vital mental health services for people living outside the nation's major cities.

Almost half of Australian farmers report experiencing feelings of depression, while 64 per cent say they have dealt with anxiety. 45 per cent of farmers say they have had thoughts of self-harm or suicide, and nearly a third have attempted self-harm or suicide. The situation is compounded by a reluctance to speak up.



International Men's Day 19 November Australia's Loneliness Epidemic

The Men's Table

The Men's Table is helping men find strength in connection

With male loneliness, suicide and social isolation at crisis levels, a Not-For-Profit grassroots movement called The Men's Table is transforming how Australian men connect - one dinner or lunch at a time.

In Australia, men account for around three-quarters of all suicides each year, making male suicide one of the nation's most pressing public health issues. The Men's Table's, latest data shows that nearly one in two members (46.1%) report a lived or living experience of suicide, highlighting the urgent need for safe places where men can talk openly, connect, and support one another.

What started in 2011 as a single gathering of men wanting to talk openly about life has become a nationwide network of more than 260 Tables. Each month, thousands of men meet over a meal to share stories, listen without judgement and build lasting friendships in a safe, trusted space.

"There is an unhelpful narrative that problematises maleness and alienates men," says Ben Moffatt, Table Program Lead of The Men's Table. "Being strong isn't about suppressing emotions or handling everything alone - it's about having the courage to be vulnerable, the wisdom to seek help, and the compassion to support others. The Tables are where men discover that strength truly comes from care."

In a society where stoicism and emotional repression continue to harm men's mental health, The Men's Table is proving that vulnerability and courage can co-exist – and that connection can save lives.

Bradley Warner has a history of depression, which is well managed through his relationship with his GP, but found it also important to carve out time for himself. "I joined The Men's Table as I can feel lonely at times and the idea of companionship with other men appealed to me," says Warner.



Alex Mottee, a clinical psychologist and director at AB Clinical Psychology, and a member of The Men's Table advisory committee, is committed to providing support to men in need.

"In Australia, 1 in 2 men will develop a mental health disorder in their lifetime. We know that men with mates live longer and healthier lives, but 1 in 4 men report having no close mates and 1 in 3 men experience loneliness."

Each month men across Australia will gather at their Tables to reflect, connect, and continue building a culture where strength is measured by care, not silence. "What's changed for me is a sense of commitment that I have to my Table. I now have to go every month. I feel like the Table won't work if I don't turn up and the other guys feel the same. I go for myself, but also for everyone else. We truly rely on each other to make this work," says Warner.

history of winchelsea

Reverend Tanner, Winchelsea's first Anglican priest

Edward Tanner (c1829 - 1888)

The first church in the town of Winchelsea (the Anglican church) was built with the help of the local grazier, Thomas Austin, in 1846.

The bluestone Victorian Picturesque Gothic styled vicarage at 5 Batson Street, Winchelsea was built in 1855 to a design by the Geelong architect and surveyor, A.C. MacDonald. The dwelling was constructed as the vicarage to St. Thomas's Church of England in Barwon Terrace, the first incumbent being the Reverend Edward Tanner. The vicarage was sold at auction in 2013 for approx. \$1.5M.

Born c1829 at Peckham, Surrey, England, the son of Benjamin Tanner, gentleman, and his wife Maria, nee Kirkham. Edward Tanner arrived at Melbourne on 24 January 1848 on the ship "Staq" from London, with Bishop Perry's party.

He was a licensed lay reader at Coburg, and ordained priest on 26 May 1850. He was Chaplain of Pentridge Gaol (1850-53). then Incumbent of St. Thomas', Winchelsea (1854-64).

Following seven and a half years of service by Rev. Tanner to St. Thomas's, Winchelsea, in 1862, John Rout Hopkins of Wormbete, who later became an Anglican priest, accused Tanner of Heresy on the grounds of his belief that all humans were eligible for salvation. On investigation by the Bishop, the charge was dismissed. In response, on Wednesday 19th November 1862, his parishioners described him as unpresumptuous and god-like, worthy and faithful. He was known to take an interest in anything that concerned the well-being of his fellow men.

His congregation unanimously agreed to present him with a handsome carriage and harness as a testimony of their respect. In just 64 hours about 120 subscribers had contributed near £70 (the equivalent of \$10k today). About one hundred locals assembled led by Charles Beale, Esq , J. W. Rout, Esq, and Dr Henry Meyler to present the carriage. Dr Meyler argued that had the collection remained open a short time longer, given the level of adoration of the town towards Rev. Tanner, that there would have been no difficulty in adding trained horses to the neat and graceful carriage

Church of England Barwon Terrace Winchelsea

Vicarage, Church of England 5 Batson Street Winchelsea

Cr. William Stirling, who we covered in last week's article, observed that he had never observed such eagerness to rush forward with subscriptions. Along with the Stirlings, Rev. Tanner was a member of the Ancient Independent Order of Oddfellows (A.I.O.O.F) Winchelsea Lodge No#.14.

When Tanner left Winchelsea for Camden Harbour, a short lived settlement in the Kimberley of Western Australia in 1864, a "monster tea party" took place as a farewell. The Loyal Winchelsea Lodge of Oddfellows formed a procession from the Barwon Hotel wearing ceremonial gold and silver jewellery and the bright colours of their regalia. The Winchelsea brass band headed the procession, which reached the cricket ground. The Worshipful Grand Brother George Anderson, the secretary expressed regret at losing so useful and worthy a brother. An address was printed on white satin, and read by Thomas Austin, Esq., Barwon Park to express the deep regret of the community at the departure of Rev Tanner.

Rev Tanner said that he admired the principles of oddfellowship because it brought men together in a kindly and social manner, and for the best of purposes, namely, to provide for the sick and distressed of the order, and still more because their meetings were calculated to rub off the sharp angles of prejudice among men. It had taught him that no matter the condition of life, there was something good to admire in everyone and to alleviate suffering and sorrow; no matter what the creed, country, or position.

After the Kimberly, Tanner served at At Kadina, Moonta and Wallaroo, South Australia (1865-66), All Saint's, Brisbane, (1866), and St. Mark's, Darling Point, Sydney, N.S.W. (1866-67).

He left the ministry and became a sugar-cane farmer doing occasional duty at Bowen and Maryborough, Queensland (1873-75). He never married, but lived with his sister, Clarissa Maria Tanner. He died on 1 January 1888 at Woongarra Grange, Barolin, Queensland, and was buried on 2 January 1888 at the Bundaberg Cemetery, Qld.





Bookkeepers Report 2024/2025

Financial Overview

- The House recorded a surplus of \$37,258, up from \$31,381
- Total income was \$374,017, with strong growth in Occasional Care income and stable government funding.
- Total expenses were \$346,120, with the majority directed to wages and staff costs.
- Net assets increased to \$241,466, reflecting a solid and secure financial position going forward.

Auspice Groups

The House continues to support a number of community groups through auspicing arrangements, including WYLD, the Men's Shed, Wurdal & Surrounds Recovery Network, Conquer the Corrugations, Wensleydale Rural Community, and Hesse Rural Health. These auspice funds increased this year, showing both growth and strong community engagement.

Reflections

This has been my first full year in the role of Bookkeeper for Winchelsea Community House. I am now well settled in the position, and I have enjoyed getting to know the systems, staff, and the important work the House does in the community. I look forward to continuing to support the House's financial management and to ensure clear, transparent reporting for the Committee and members.

Shire Hall Report 2024/2025

When handed the reigns from Jill in August last year as the Shire Hall Venue & Publicity Administrator I was contracted for 12 months. I got to work quickly learning the history of the Hall and surveying the community about what they'd like to see happening here. We also continue to see many private bookings from 1st to 90th birthday parties, memorials, reunions, family or community meetings and AGMs to large training events for Hesse Rural Health, Deakin, DEECA, CCMA and Barwon Water.

When you take into consideration all of the above programs and events, you can start to appreciate that for the most part the Shire Hall is buzzing with activity. It is a great fit for Winchelsea Community House as a community venue. Wendy and I coordinate bookings with each other in the Community House or Shire Hall depending on what is required.

We still need to increase our revenue further to even come close to a self-sustaining level of operation. I am incredibly grateful for the additional two year extension of the arrangement with Surf Coast Shire for the Shire Hall to continue to run under the Winchelsea Community House.

I have hit the ground running with more exciting events to come and the introduction of some new weekly Kids Dance and Arco classes and a Kids art and Craft Group starting in term 4.

It takes a lot to plan, promote and launch successful programs and events in the Hall. Volunteers are absolutely crucial to the success of so much that we do. We ask all community members to consider getting involved in the Community House and Shire Hall with so many various ways to volunteer your time and skills.

I am always open to all and any ideas ambitious or simple, my door and ear are always open, and I will always try my upmost to bring community ideas to life in the Shire Hall.

On a warm spring Thursday 16 October the Corangamite Rural Women's Network brought together women from across the region to Barwon Park, Winchelsea to honour International Rural Women's Day with a Women on Agriculture / Natural Resource Management (NRM) Boards and Leadership Forum.

Melinda Kennedy of Wadawurrung Traditional Owners Corporation welcomed us to Country before we walked through the grand entrance of Barwon Park Mansion. Inside Catherine Jenkins (former Chair Corangamite Catchment Management Authority Board and newly appointed Director at Southern Rural Water welcomed and facilitated the day and threw in valuable advice, wisdom and open questions throughout.

We were graced by the Barwon Park Her-story from Claudette Brennan, of the National Trust, Victorian Branch Network - a perspective from Elizabeth Austin, a formidable female pioneer, wife to Thomas Austin who together ran the property and built the mansion now cared for by the National Trust Vic. The Austin name is often associated with the Duke of Edinburgh visit to Australia, releasing rabbits and founders of the Austin Hospital. According to records it was in fact Elizabeth Austin, one of Victoria's earliest philanthropists who gifted a large sum of money to support the Hospital in its beginnings, after her husband's death. Elizabeth had to give the donation in Thomas' name, because women didn't have authority for those actions at the time.

A pre-recorded video was shown of Claire Braund OAM giving background into her life and advocacy for the 40:40:20 concept (40% women, 40% men and 20% either and/ or other genders) for representation on boards, and how the Women on Boards organisation she founded can support women interested in stepping into a board and/or leadership role. Claire was recently awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia for her service to business, women and the Central Coast (NSW, where she lives).

Alana Johnson AM encouraged us to remember what the women before us endured for us to have the opportunities we have today, encouraging us to be brave and creative and re-make what isn't working that suits women better and also benefits men. Alana is Chair of The Victorian Women's Trust – an advocacy body whose vision is a world where full gender equality is recognised. She is also a founding member of Australian Women in Agriculture,

and has served on many boards and advisory bodies and been recognised for her contributions by receiving a Member of the Order of Australia for her outstanding service to women.

Jo Plummer, recently stepping away after 10 years as Chair of the Barwon Water Group, currently Board Chair of the Country Fire Authority, Board Chair of Boomaroo Nurseries, an AICD Fellow & Faculty member and Director of her own company Out of the Box Executive that specialises in board performance and evaluation specialist welcomed us into her life next. It was a big surprise to her winning the Geelong Business Leader of the Year at the 2024 Geelong Business Excellence Awards. Jo explained she is here to unlock the spark of women. She sees women as well placed in building the relationships we need for a promising future with Australia's Traditional Owners and the next generation. One of her take-aways for dealing with difficult decisions is to remind herself that we and the person on the other side of the table are human beings first, before any job title. We can ask ourselves "How do I need to be in this moment?" and the steps forward will naturally unfold.

A Panel session with Alana Johnson, Andrea Mason, Olivia Lawson, and Ella Credlin facilitated by Cath Jenkins gave us insights into their experience on boards, advisory groups and councils across agriculture and natural resource management. A common thread was their own 'why' - what motivates them. Understanding their 'why' helped them know what they could bring to the table at a high level for decision making that could filter down to grassroots level, giving them motivation to keep showing up.

What might not seem apparent when you look at their CVs is they each started at community level - putting their hand up at a sporting club or for a school committee ... most of us have the skills required if we are interested and know who we can reach out to for support.

Thank you to the women elders, matriarchs of our community who reminded us younger folk to remove the 'just' in when explaining who we are and what we do, we aren't just women, just mothers, just working a couple of days a week, just in administration. In these roles we do so much, we are powerful, important and what we do matters.

Thank you to the National Trust Australia (Victoria) for the maintenance and treasuring of our history and heritage across the state, especially with what you share of Barwon Mansion an iconic landmark in our region.

The day provided a great opportunity for everyone to meet, connect, network and support each other.

We were very generously fed by Café La Hoot, Winchelsea and Birregurra Grocer, Birregurra, local businesses run by wonderful women.

The day was made possible through The Diverse Farms, Resilient Catchments project, supported by the Australian Government through funding from the Natural Heritage Trust under the Climate-Smart Agriculture Program and through the "Look Over the Farm Gate" community grants program administered by the National Centre for Farmer Health on behalf of the Victorian Government. It was coordinated by the Corangamite Catchment Management Authority, Upper Barwon Landcare Network and the Corangamite Rural Women's Network.



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National Asbestos Awareness Week 24-30 November 2025

This year, three times more Australians will die from asbestos-related diseases than die on our roads. By being asbestos aware we can help to save lives!

This is the start of National Asbestos Awareness Week 2025 and in the wake of the recent scare of asbestos being identified in children's play sand, now more than ever, parents need to understand that with asbestos-containing materials (ACMs) remaining in 1-in-3 Aussie homes, if these materials are not managed safely, they can pose a significant health risk to families.

There's no doubting Australia's passion for renovating. We love the challenge! But what many don't know is that they could be risking their lives and the lives of their loved ones (including their children) if they fail to respect asbestos risks and ensure asbestos-containing materials (ACMs) are managed safely.

It's heartbreaking that around 4,000 Australians die needlessly every year from avoidable asbestos-related diseases - that's three times the national road toll. 51% of current mesothelioma deaths directly linked to home renovations.

It's vital that we stop playing renovation roulette and start playing it safe by ensuring we understand the risks, know the sorts of ACMs to look for and what to do to ensure this silent 'serial killer' is managed safely. What homeowners need to know is that asbestos wasn't only used in the manufacture of flat and corrugated sheeting materials. It was used in the manufacture of more than 3,000 building and decorator products that remain

lurking in one third of homes including brick, weatherboard, clad homes and apartments. It was used everywhere!

ACMs were commonly used in wet areas such as bathrooms, kitchens and laundries but this potentially deadly fibre could be in places renovators might not expect. It could be lurking under carpets, linoleum, vinyl and ceramic floor and wall tiles, external and internal walls, ceilings, eaves, roofs and fences. Asbestos could be in any residential property, in any town or city across Australia if the home was built before 1990 and in any commercial property constructed before 2004.

Make no mistake, renovating, demolishing or maintaining properties that contains asbestos can be lethal if ACMs are disturbed and invisible asbestos fibres become airborne and are inhaled.

Keep yourself safe around water this summer

With the weather heating up, lifesavers and lifeguards are once again patrolling Victoria's beaches to help keep swimmers safe in the water.

From 15 November 2025 to 19 April 2026, more than 45,000 lifesavers and lifeguards will be safeguarding the community and patrolling beaches across Victoria.

Millions of people visited Victorian beaches last year and this coming summer is expected to be another busy patrol season for our dedicated lifesavers.

As well as swimming between the flags, beachgoers can keep themselves safe by never swimming alone, avoiding swimming after drinking alcohol, assessing the risks before entering the water and wearing a life jacket when boating or fishing.

Last summer, LSV lifesavers and lifeguards performed more than 1,000 rescues, attended nearly 1,600 major first aid interventions, and undertook almost 356,000 preventative actions to help people avoid danger in the water.

Despite these efforts, 52 people tragically lost their lives to drowning in Victorian waterways during the 2024–25 patrol season.

Campaign reminds e-scooters are not child's play

Last year, five people including one person under 16 years of age, lost their lives while riding an e-scooter on Victorian roads.

The refreshed campaign - If you think e-scooters are a toy, think again - uses stop-motion animation to depict toy-like riders engaging in dangerous and illegal behaviour, and has been expanded to include a new animation focused on underage riding and a video featuring emergency department doctors who share their experiences treating e-scooter injuries.

The campaign is aimed towards parents and guardians who might be considering purchasing an e-scooter as a gift this Christmas – to highlight the consequences of reckless e-scooter use and increase awareness of the permanent rules and penalties for underage riding, riding without a helmet, riding on a footpath, carrying a passenger and riding under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

The Government introduced laws in October last year to regulate the use of e-scooters on Victorian roads, including tough penalties for speeding, underage riding, riding without a helmet, riding on a footpath and carrying a passenger.

The campaign will run between Monday, 17 November to Friday, 30 January 2026 across a wide range of channels.

Expanding access to pill testing this summer

The Victorian Government's mobile pill testing trial continues this summer, with the next three events set to host the service confirmed.

Minister for Mental Health has announced that pill testing will be available at a mix of single-day and multi-day events over coming months, including Spilt Milk (6 Dec), Dangerous Goods 6XXL (24 Jan), and Pitch Music and Arts Festival (6-10 March) – with further events to be announced soon.

The service is completely free, confidential and staffed by an experienced team of experts who provide health information to help people make safer, more informed decisions.

The mobile service can test a range of drugs and if a high-risk substance is detected, the service works with organisers to rapidly warn partygoers through social media and event signage.

It follows successful mobile pill testing at five major music festivals last summer, where almost 1,400 samples were tested – with 11% samples not what people expected their drugs to be.

While the service seeks to save lives, reduce drug harm and improve public health at music festivals, it is also reducing pressure on frontline services and enhancing Victoria's drug surveillance capabilities by boosting early detection and rapid assessment of hazardous synthetic drugs substances.

Last season, 10 drug notifications were issued across the five events with two escalating to statewide advisories.

To support more Victorians accessing life-saving advice, the Victorian Pill Testing Service fixed site in Fitzroy will also expand its hours of operation over summer.

From 1 December, the service will operate extended hours on Thursdays and Fridays. The service will also be open ahead of New Year's Eve including 22-23 and 29-31 December.

In the first six weeks of operating, the fixed site is saving lives and providing critical drug monitoring data – testing more than 500 samples and conducting harm reduction conversations with nearly 300 people.

While 395 samples contained the expected drug, one in eight samples contained an unexpected psychoactive drug that, if consumed, would have unwanted effects, and in some cases caused serious harm.

Two drug notifications were also issued for counterfeit oxycodone pills containing dangerous nitazenes – a synthetic drug up to 500 times stronger than heroin.

The Victorian Pill Testing Service is delivered by the trusted consortium of Youth Support and Advocacy Service, The Loop Australia and Harm Reduction Victoria as part of an 18-month Labor Government's implementation trial.



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
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Winchelsea Bowls Club

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
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
