It is with immense gratitude that I share with you the SLO Food Bank's Annual Report for the 2023-24 fiscal year, highlighting our response to the overwhelming need in our community.

This past year, the SLO Food Bank and our Hunger Relief Network significantly scaled up our food procurement and distribution efforts to meet the soaring community need resulting from skyrocketing inflation and the end of pandemic benefits. Together, we served an average of 39,000 INDIVIDUALS EACH MONTH, a 16% INCREASE from the previous year.

While the data and information is organized into colors and charts, the need is anything but neat and organized.

Each neighbor served represents someone that doesn't have the resources to fund life's most basic need — food. They might experience physical discomfort from hunger or anxiety about how they will sustain themselves. They may feel embarrassment or shame.

They might experience confusion as they attempt to navigate government programs. And, if that wasn't enough, it's very likely that food is just one of many components in their life that are underfunded (housing, health care, etc.).

The human reality of these statistics is difficult to think about, but it makes your support and the impact it has at the SLO Food Bank all the more profound.

As you read about the incredible work we accomplished together this past year, please remember that YOU make it all possible. Thank you for believing in the right to food for all, and for taking action to make that belief a reality.

Sourcing Sustenance

The SLO Food Bank leverages bulk purchasing, food rescue programs, government programs, and the generosity of our community to effectively secure nutritious foods for our community.

We received and distributed 4,679,500 POUNDS OF FOOD, nearly ONE MILLION POUNDS MORE than the year prior.

Thanks to your incredible support, we can efficiently purchase food that best meets the nutritional and cultural needs of our community.



Packing Hope

Our top priority is distributing food that is safe and nutritious. To make this happen, our team meticulously tracks all food that enters and leaves our warehouse. In between, volunteers and staff assemble orders for partners, produce bags for distributions, No-Cook Bags for people experiencing homelessness and the agencies that serve them, and Summer Breakfast Bags for children and families during the school break.

We packed and distributed close to **6,600** Summer Breakfast Bags and more than **30,400** No-Cook Bags.

Championing Change

We drive meaningful change through nutrition education, empowering eligible neighbors to access vital benefits through CalFresh outreach, and advocating for public policies that work towards alleviating food insecurity and malnutrition.

CALFRESH OUTREACH

CalFresh is one of the most effective tools we have for alleviating hunger in SLO County because it provides money for people to buy groceries at local stores and farmers' markets. Our CalFresh Outreach program aims to increase use of this critical benefit through targeted education, marketing, and outreach events.

We helped nearly **250** households sign up for CalFresh.

NUTRITION EDUCATION

The Nutrition Education program improves the wellness of our community through education programs for children and seniors, like our Children's and Seniors' Farmers' Markets, and by sharing informative materials and healthy recipes.

We served over **1,700** children and **700** seniors through Farmers' Market programs.



Distributing Nourishment

The SLO Food Bank provides food to people across the county through our distribution programs and Hunger Relief Network, which consists of agency and community partners working directly with neighbors in need.

Together, we distributed food to an average of **39,000** people each month.


OUR HUNGER RELIEF NETWORK

Thank You Volunteers

Every single meal we provide is touched by the hard work and caring hands of a volunteer in the journey to those who need it. Volunteers glean fresh produce from local farms and backyards, sort and pack food for our hunger relief network, hand out nutritious food at Neighborhood Food Distributions, and so much more.

1,900 volunteers provided close to 15,300 cumulative hours, or the equivalent of 7 full-time staff.




