he health crisis has been brutal to all of us. Too many of our loved ones including those from our ranks, some of them frontliner brothers and sisters in APO, have been lost to it. We mourn them no end.

But we keep moving forward, as we must, with as much optimism as we can muster because this is who we are. We know that how we, as an organization, meet the challenges foisted on us inevitably defines us. Our strength lies in how we are able to take initiatives during difficult times.

In this issue, we feature some of the projects our brothers and sisters from different parts of the Philippines and the world were able to implement, pandemic notwithstanding. Numbers were mobilized, and projects were planned and executed with remarkable success.

This, while the Philippines was in the midst of what Time magazine, among other news agencies, described as one of the world's longest and strictest lockdowns. In so doing, we were able to reach some of those most in need of assistance.

Food distribution services were organized, especially in areas where livelihood was adversely affected by quarantine restrictions. APO Telemed was also launched, which supplied medical kits to Covid-stricken members and their families. And many others.

As well, we did not shy away from bridging gaps as we encountered them. Webinars were held to keep members engaged. We even held our first ever elections through remote communication, and in the process made history in choosing the first woman National President to lead APO Philippines.

Chapters and APO administrative regions, sometimes unitarily and sometimes in coordination with each other, have brought projects to fruition. Reaching out to barangays in whose jurisdictions projects were conducted meant renewing networks built before and cultivating new ones too.

Our adaptability to changing situations coupled with our ingrained ability to truly value relationships within and even beyond the organization is our secret sauce, so to speak. We call it friendship.

For vulnerable communities facing unanticipated uncertainties, our efforts have had an impact in some measure. At the very least we were able to meet some of their needs, albeit temporarily.

From the Carmelite nuns of Lipa who were afflicted with Covid, to the Mangyans of Mindoro, to the inmates of the district jail in Tayug, Pangasinan, to the elementary schools in Bataan and Bulacan, and to the other notable service projects in CALABARZON, Bicol, Eastern Visayas, and other areas in the country, our members extended a helping hand. Every little bit helps, and for those we have managed to reach, very often each little bit means a lot.

We break barriers, we build social bridges, and we uplift lives, because this is what leadership, friendship, and service means.

Threat to APO

I will be clear. We embrace difference, not deviance. We are governed by laws and acceptable behavior and conduct. There should be no room for roques or saboteurs and those whose acts threaten the very existence of our organization. They will be dealt with swiftly, decisively and with the full force of the law.

The next two years shall be governed with transparency and regularity; plans and programs, with creativity but sustainability.

Our Thrusts

Current national projects that have proven themselves shall be continued. Especially so for those that reflect our social responsibility. APO Telemed foremost among them. As of today, this intervention has attended to more than 700 APO members and families, most of whom are covid-19 patients. It has saved countless lives and thousands or even millions of pesos of precious savings, mine and that of my family included. Thanks to our volunteer doctors, nurses, support groups and donors. Soon we will embark on similar and equally timely and timeless projects. We are a vast human resource with an insatiable appetite to do service to fellowmen.

We shall pursue the following:

- 1. Reinvigorating recruitment and enhancing leadership development. To this end, we will enforce fully the law on Anti Hazing;
- 2. Eliminating outdated illegal practices & seeking

BREAKING BARRIERS AS THE LIKE AD WOMAN BREAKING BY SIS DORIS IRENE S. PIGON

Ational President (NP) sis Norma Singson-De Leon made history as the first woman president of Alpha Phi Omega (APO) Philippines Incorporated, truly a milestone for our fraternity and sorority. It took 71 long years before a woman was elected to lead APO in the Philippines.

What better way to know our president than to personally speak to her and get a different perspective from another sister. Let's get to know her from my conversation with one of her very close sorority sister, sis Chary Diño, and the incumbent President herself, sis NP Norma.

Sis NP Norma is a mother of 5. All her children had already carved a name in their respective careers. Her eldest is a clinic manager in Medical City. One of her sons is a lawyer who now works in her law firm. Her other children's profession are as follows: a doctor, a nurse and a businessman. She raised all her kids almost alone while practicing her profession as a rehabilitation receiver lawyer. She deals mainly with receivership and liquidation of distressed companies. She has a law firm which started as APO law firm until such time that only three were left. Bro Atty Armand Arevalo, and Atty Arlene Gonzales (wife of a brod) as partners. Her lawyer son eventually joined her law firm.

She got separated from her husband when her children were still very young and recently became a widow due to Covid. Raising her 5

kids alone was indeed a great challenge. She had to juggle her time between her career and the needs of her children. There were moments when she had experienced difficulties with her children, she had to be firm and imposed discipline on them to make sure they were guided to the right path of being good and responsible individuals. Despite the hurdles she had to pass along the way as a single parent, her greatest achievement is seeing her children successful in their chosen careers. Indeed, she is one proud mother of all her children's achievements.

Her source of strength to surpass all her life struggles comes from her devotion to Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary - La Naval de Manila. During her children's early years, she encouraged them to join her every night in praying the holy rosary – definitely a very nice way to bond with family. Her greatest secret in raising her children to becoming Godfearing persons is her faith in God through the intercession of Mary.

From what she shared with me and sis Chary, she studied her elementary and high school years at St. Paul's College. Always praying the rosary was not new to her, it was inherent. But when she entered UP, she became lax for a while. When she started praying and made it her daily habit again, she noticed that as a devotee, she felt so lucky, things easily fell into place. It was like every puzzle was very easy to solve.

Years from now, [she] would like to be remembered as one who stood by her principle -- fairness, stood for what is right, respected the APO National Office, did not steal, and fought for APO. It was like she hasn't started putting her life in order and yet, everything is leading to the right direction already. Her devotion to Mama Marv has brought her to different places. Her colleagues, the officers of Medical City would travel roundtrip to Naga City yearly every September (either before or after but not during Our Lady of Peñafrancia Feast Day). They would patiently ride a bus, and experience the long travel time, to attend mass. Although some of her colleagues had already retired, she continued her devotion and went back every year. Since she is a regular visitor of Peñafrancia Basilica. She met the nuns from the convent of Daughters of Mary Mother of the Church, which is situated at the back of the church. The convent became her regular stopover where she would sometimes sleep and eat breakfast. If not for the pandemic, her yearly travel there would not have been interrupted.





She has gone to places all over the Philippines because of APO. Every time she visited a place, she made sure to find the nearest church so she could attend mass. It didn't matter if she was alone, or if she was new to the place, or if she got lost because she's not very familiar with the area, or if she forgot her hotel's name. As long as she can attend mass, her travel is complete. Her diligence has encouraged other brothers and sisters to join her and hear mass. Despite other brothers and sisters having different religions, she still gained their respect. What a good influence to strengthen a person's spirituality, right?!

Sis Chary witnessed everything that happened to sis Norma. She was acquainted with only a few people from the national office because she used to be so focused on her family. They started bonding together as both served as members of the 1st Board of Trustees of Eta Sorority Alumni Association. Sis Norma then organized the Prayer Battalion. They traveled together and that's where sis Norma saw the potential and strength of being an APO national officer. From sis Chary's perspective, if you wanted to effect change, you have to be active where you can really create the change you want. She didn't see sis Norma running for any position back then. But sis Norma saw the potential: there is APO all over, coming from all walks of life, and that to her is the organization's strength. APO is committed to SERVICE. Whenever an APO learns of any service project, an APO would definitely join. Hence, sis Norma was encouraged to run for a position in the APO national organization.

When the Covid 19 scare started spreading from China on the news, sis Norma thought this was going to be a disaster of disasters, and this became the impetus for an Alcohol Drive. With the support of some fellow members from Eta AA, they distributed gallons of alcohol as early as February 6, 2020 and the first recipient was the San Isidro Labrador Parish thru its parish priest Rev. Fr. Roberto Reyes. Additional gallons of alcohol were purchased and was distributed to some schools in Caloocan City through the assistance of Brod Archie Bugarin who was then the National Capital Administrative Region Regional Director (NCAR RD) and this DY's APO National Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Other organizations were tapped to support sis Norma's Alcohol Drive even before the lockdowns.

Nobody expected the pandemic to happen. Lockdowns were imposed all over the world. What better way to survive the pandemic last year than to start and strengthen her dedication with the members of the Prayer Battalion? They recite the holy rosary every 8:15 pm via Zoom of every day. This habit with Prayer Battalion has been going on since March 22, 2020. Aside from praying together, Prayer Battalion also donates 1 sack of rice monthly to Fr. Jansen's Kalinga (for the homeless).

A project that was started by VP Leni Robredo inspired sis Norma to organize APO Telemedicine (Telemed). Covid 19, has claimed a lot of lives already, and some of our brothers and sisters were also affected. They didn't know what to do, where to go, and hospitals were occupied to their full capacity. APO has a pool of doctors, nurses and other medical professionals. Sis Norma thought why not help our own. Many were hesitant and thought it impossible because so many things had to be considered but sis Norma was firm. She believed that we will develop as we progress. It started April 22, 2021. It was an ambitious project but when brothers and sisters learned about it, some immediately sent their donations even without any requests from her yet. The support was overwhelming. APO Telemed made our members feel that they have somebody to ask help from and can depend on. Our sick members did not feel alone because they have Telemed.

Sis Chary asked sis Norma: if there was one thing that the first woman president of APO can do best, what would it be? Sis Norma jokingly answered that the question is very difficult, but

seriously, one time, a brod mentioned that she is our mother. so she should be a mother to us, she has to nurture. love her children, and bring us all together. Her reply is "if I am the mother and my children are stubborn, you have to "pinch" them to discipline them. She cannot tolerate wrong doings, rules and regulations should be followed. But others just don't want to recognize them. It is hard to be a woman." A lot of brothers and sisters are proud to be with Sis Norma; they want to be photographed with her because they feel the sorority power. She is not a snob, she's not boastful, she listens, she has a natural rapport with others, and she talks to anybody.



Sis Chary shared that in 2016, sis Norma would ask her to join her travels in Prayer Battalion, enjoy, have fun, and eat wherever. They don't talk about serious things, they laugh, and they get along well. When they travel together, she liked to sing, and enjoy easy and light moments. For somebody who has reached higher heights in APO (she was the National Executive Vice President of the past DY), she observed that sis Norma was never a credit grabber. She'll organize it, she'll put it together, she'll make sure it runs well, and whatever is needed, she provides. She would ask sis Chary to talk in front of an audience instead of doing it herself. In sis Chary's words: "She is not in it for recognition."

Sis Norma would like to accomplish three major projects on her term.

1. Increase Recruitment

We know for a fact that we have a problem when it comes to recruitment. There are only 800 resident members all over the Philippines. That is such a small number considering that we have how many chapters? A lot has already died. Her question to our members is how many among us have children who entered APO. Out of 40-50 members, only 4-5 hands would be raised. When asked why didn't the others encourage their sons or daughters to join APO? The common answer she got was it's because of hazing or campus violence. She wants to stop hazing. She'd like to encourage the alumni members to have an active role in recruiting. What will the collegiate do if there are no longer collegiate members in the campus? Everyone should pitch in to help in the recruitment process. She wanted to make sure everyone abides by the Republic Act (RA) 11053 also known as "Anti Hazing Act of 2018." A board resolution has to be passed to address this issue.

2. APO House/Building

To be constructed on her term is our very own APO House/Building. She thinks that if every member would voluntarily donate at least two thousand pesos (2000.00), we can definitely have one. If an alumnus/ alumna does not have the capacity to pay the said amount, maybe somebody from his/her own chapter can shoulder the amount? Another option is to pay by installment like 100.00/day.

3. APO's 10 Most Outstanding Senior High Students from all over the Philippines

To probably give cash gifts to deserving students. It could be an early introduction of APO to senior high students and eventually be one form of recruitment to increase our APO numbers.

When sis Norma was asked what she felt about her winning the presidency, her answer was nothing. At the height of the campaign period for the national APO elections, she had Covid (Sept 10). In fact, her entire household got infected. When she was proclaimed the winner of the presidency,



now this has not really sank in. She feels awkward every time she is called "Pangulo".

She feels fearless because of Mama Mary, by whose grace she overcame her sickness. Her devotion is also the source of her fortitude, which enables her to cope with the stress of her position, and the attacks from left and right. She is able to take everything in a stride.



Region IV-A Continues to Render Services Amidst the Pandemic





APO Lipa AA 165 Eco Farmville Ampalaya Production Project for the Nation and Community

o serve the nation and community by providing vegetables as essential for food and nutrition security, source of fund for APO Lipa AA 156 and livelihood for members, were the main reasons why APO Lipa AA 156 started the Eco Farmville Ampalaya or Bitter Gourd Production Project on August 1, 2021 at Barangay Tangway, Lipa City. Adviser Sis.Edna Resma's family lent us a 2,000 square meter lot for vegetable farming projects.

APO Lipa President Bro Wilbert "Weng" Borres, leads and closely monitors the project from buying of tools, seeds, land preparation, planting, spraying, harvesting and up to selling of ampalaya.

"Yes, it is not easy, I even have to talk to the plants, telling them to bear more ampalaya," said Pres. Bro Borres. According to him, what you feel when gardening will reflect what you plant. His childhood experience in farming, present job at Department of Agrarian Reform and determination made way for the abundant harvest.

Vegetables are mankind's most affordable sources of micronutrients needed for healthier diets. In this time of Pandemic, where everyone is affected, our health is at risk.



We consulted experts on farming and decided to plant Ampalaya. APO Lipa members work on the farm and we also hired farmers paid on a daily basis for farm works, doing trellis, digging, removing grass and spraying. We provide food and snacks for them.

Ampalaya is a tropical vine, this can be planted and grown throughout the year but the profitable most arowina seasons are from October to December and from May to July. This vegetable is packed with several important nutrients, versatile, delicious, can help reduce blood sugar, may have cancer-fighting properties, could decrease cholesterol levels and may aid weight loss.

After three months, in November we got a taste of the fruits of our efforts in APO Lipa Eco Farmville Ampalaya Production. We started harvesting and selling organic, long, good quality ampalaya. Our buyers were colleagues, friends, market vendors and APO Lipa AA 156 members.

Ampalaya is easy to prepare and can be used in many different dishes and recipes. Can be enjoyed raw or cooked.

Here are some recipes: pan-fried, steamed, baked or even hollowed out and stuffed with your choice of fillings. Juice Ampalaya along with a few other fruits and vegetables for a nutrient-packed beverage. Mix into your next stir-fry to bump up the health benefits. Sauté alongside tomatoes, garlic and onions and add to scrambled eggs. Combine seedless ampalaya with your choice of dressing and garnish for a savory salad. Stuff with ground meat and vegetables and serve with a black bean sauce.

PANDEMIC and its Challenges for Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) in Roxas

oxas. Oriental Mindoro - In the local situation in this time of COVID-19 pandemic, PwDs are more likely to be disproportionally affected in many ways. People with intellectual, developmental, mobility, or other disabilities are more likely to become infected because they have a harder time understandingorfollowingpreventionmeasures like physical distancing, effective handwashing, or wearing facemasks. Furthermore, when public health advice was offered in inaccessible forms, people with intellectual, visual, or hearing disabilities may be unable to follow them (eq, verbally through opague masks). In addition, PwDs are institutionalized in other cities and provinces, and as a result, they are exposed to a high risk of physical contact, and are more likely to be affected by COVID-19 infection because they have a higher rate of chronic or secondary health disorders, such as those affecting respiratory and immune systems, heart disease, or diabetes. Moreover, pwds in Roxas community were frequently require assistance with daily tasks, such as obtaining basic necessities or seeking medical treatment, yet such assistance may be limited during lockdowns or sometimes not available. And finally, due to lockdown measures or a lack of readily available healthcare in Roxas, in-person access to general health and rehabilitation treatments may be limited. Still not mentioning the increasing number of cases of COVID- 19 that have been reported so far at Municipality of Roxas as of October 2021.


APO-EVAR HOLDS ANTI-HAZING WEBINAR BY SIS GW

Furthermore, EVAR also initiated an ID Run last October 30 which helped its members satisfy the necessary requirements before IDs are updated. In totality, 262 transactions were recorded by region's Committee on Membership. Everyone is hopeful that they will get their new ID cards very soon.

On October 24, EVAR met with the BOUs in Northern Samar for a consultative assembly with the members. The meeting focused on resolving conflicts, clarifying concerns, and planning activities, among others.

On Friendship

While members are into pursuance of their personal and professional development, EVAR also ensures that they have their own time to unwind and be with our brothers and sisters. There are activities in store for them in the hopes of continually fortifying the bond between and amongst the members. Foremost, apart from the fellowship sessions, is the conduct of PABALHAS, a series of sports activities, on November 11 by the EVAR Sports Committee. The region looks forward to more of this in the months to come and through them, hopes to keep EVAR's oneness intact.

On Service

EVAR continues its promise of inspiring and touching lives through the continuous delivery of needs-based and relevant services. The following are the conducted services of EVAR thus far:



Health

In the midst of the pandemic, the call to prioritize individual and community health intensifies. As such, EVAR gave premium to health initiatives. Primarily, the region organized flu vaccination in Tacloban and Biliran on November 7 and 13, respectively. This was thru the efforts of EVAR, Theta Zeta AA, Delta Phi AA, Epsilon Omega AA, Omicron Alpha Chapter, and APO BISLA AA, in partnership with Tingog Sinirangan Partylist. A total of 215 flu shots were administered to the recipients, 115 in Tacloban and 100 in Biliran.

Other health services include Theta Alpha's OPLAN PANLAWAS conducted on Oct. 16 at Brgy. Patong Hall, Calbiga City which gave free blood sugar, free blood pressure, and a lecture on the common medical misconceptions to around 150 residents in the said locality; Delta Phi's Food Drive in commemoration of the 8th anniversary of Yolanda on November 8; Epsilon Omega's RESBAKUNA mobile vaccination on October 26-28; PC 104's Hygiene Kit Distribution on October 16 at Alang-Alang Leyte; Eta Pi and VSU Villaba PC's Feeding Program on November 14, and; Mu Gamma, Delta Phi, Omicron Alpha, PC 014's Group Handwashing Facility Construction on October 9.

EVAR is hopeful that these initiatives would, at the very least, help promote health awareness, consciousness, and practice among community people.

Environment

EVAR also maintains that it should be at the frontlines of promoting green consciousness among people through the conduct of environmental initiatives. Zeta Epsilon, on October 16, launched its APO KAWAYANIHAN: Bayanihan Para Sa Kapaligiran, a bamboo tree planting activity which, to date, already planted 200 bamboos. As planned, the chapter looks forwarding to planting 1925 bamboos in anticipation of the 96th International Founding Anniversary of Alpha Phi Omega.

The Delta Phi Chapter conducted a schoolbased clean-up drive on November 5 in reference to its commitment to serve the student body and faculty. Meanwhile, the Xi Rho Chapter spearheaded a Mangrove Grooming and Planting on October 20 at Sto. Niňo, Bontoc, Southern Leyte. This was in coordination with several institutions and



organizations with the same intentions of saving the environment such as the PNP and DENR, among others.

Furthermore, the Theta Alpha Chapter successfully hurled its ZERO-PLASTIC WASTE CAMPAIGN on November 2 in reference to its environmental thrusts and advocacies. It released inforgraphics on plastic pollution and includes planned related activities such as plastic bottles and containers collection as well as coastal and inland clean-up drives. On October 22, as per request of the Catbalogan City Environment and Natural Resources Office, the chapter participated in the Coastal Clean-up Drive at Buri Baras Beach. Finally, Theta Alpha also joined in the City-Wide Pintakasi or general clean-up of Catbalogan City on November 14. Members were assigned in Brgy. Mercedes, particularly on the area which recently suffered from landslide, and the efforts were focused on the declogging of the drainage/waterway affected by the said landslide.

Indeed, as humans are responsible for the destruction of the environment, it is fitting that we also initiate efforts that rebuild and rehabilitate it. EVAR is firm that we need to act now and save the world from further devastation before it gets too late.

Education

The education system has been heavily disrupted with the onslaught of the COVID-19 pandemic. And so, EVAR also saw to it that we extend support to the education sector, both faculty and students. The highlight of the education-related services is Theta Alpha's SINGKO PARA SA RADYO, a fundraising project for the solar radio units given to the students of selected upland schools in Catbalogan City. The initiative was intended to support the students in their learning amid the health crisis. The solar radios worked supplementary to the modules of the students. It had two waves - 100 units were turned over to the school heads on October 7 and 106 on November 6. In total, 206 radios were turned over to 206 students of seven (7) upland schools. The project was able to raise a total amount of P76,385.57.

Omicron Alpha, Delta Phi Chapter, Delta Phi AA, and LNU PC 014 organized a service donating school supplies to the PDLs (persons deprived of liberty) enrolled in the DECS ALS program on October 30. Around 96 school kits were provided to them in aid of their learning. PC 202 of EVSU – Burauen Campus donated a wall clock, with a coat of arms design, to the library of the same campus on October 6. Theta Alpha also volunteered in an extension activity of the Samar State University – College of Arts and Sciences at Brgy. Ibol, Catbalogan City on October 20. The activity gave lecture on mental health awareness as well as training on soap production.

Our support to the education sector thus manifests our enthusiasm to help the youth in their learning. EVAR consistently believes that through these initiatives, we will be able to help our fellows acquire more knowledge and eventually secure a better and brighter tomorrow.



Livelihood Support

The region also makes it a point to extend support to the livelihood of those in the marginalized sector. A noteworthy initiative is that of the Theta Alpha Chapter entitled LAMRAG: Sell A Lantern, Help A PDL which is a partnership with the Samar Provincial Jail and aims to sell the lanterns personally handcrafted by the PDLs. The initiative started on the 11 of November. Members of Theta Alpha marketed these lanterns and as of writing, all lanterns are already sold. The proceeds generated from this initiative will be used to fund an initiative for the PDL come December.

The chapter found pleasure in helping the PDLs sell their lanterns as this would not only help them personally but also their families. As the Christmas season approaches, EVAR is committed to bringing light and hope to these people and their families especially in these trying times.

Disaster

In reference to the experience of the region during the Typhoon Yolanda, EVAR emphasizes the importance of capacitybuildings especially in terms of disaster preparedness. As such, we organize different initiatives that capacitate individuals and organizations in reducing and mitigating the impact of disasters.

The MuGamma Chapterorganized a Disaster Preparedness Webinar on November 14, 9am-4pm via Zoom accommodating around 50 participants, both APO and non-APO. The initiative tapped various experts on the subject matter from different

agencies and offices. The webinar aimed at imparting learning to the participants on the reduction of impact of disasters as well as developing a coordinated strategy that will cost less time, money, and effort. After this, the region hopes to deliver more webinars that will focus on other crucial subjects in disaster preparedness and response and in the process, be able to contribute in achieving a resilient community.

Other Services

Aside from the abovementioned services, EVAR also responds to the needs of other sectors, groups, and institutions. More than a month after, the project was completed and was turned over to the beneficiary on November 18 at Brgy. San Pablo, Catbalogan City.







Theta Alpha also conducted its Adopt-A-Waiting Shed project in partnership with Brgy. Maulong, Catbalogan City. The waiting shed of the said barangay was repainted and rehabilitated to provide a conducive and cleaner waiting area for the residents. The project was completed on October 20.

Additionally, APO Guiuan AA and ESSU Guiuan PC 501 conducted APO Handog T sinelas on November 13 and distributed around 133 pairs of slippers. The initiative came timely with the celebration of the National Children's Month. The activity ushered in the support of the BJMP, RHU, TESDA, NOVO, and LGU Guiuan. Vaccination, free massage and manicure



services, mass feeding and distribution of food packs were also done during the activity.

NCAR on Crossing Regions and Building Bridges to Serve: Healthcare, Gift Giving, and Legal Services Rendered for Mindoro

Bongabong, Oriental Mindoro – On November 20, 2021, a collaboration service project by the Municipality of Bongabong and King Builders Development Corporation thru APO Bongabong AA and APO Coast Mimaropa (IV-B) in partnership with APO National Capital Administrative Region (NCAR) was held.

A Free Medical, Tuli, Dental, Gift Giving, Haircut, and Feeding to the Mangyan tribe was successfully hosted by Municipal Mayor Hon. Bro Elegio Malaluan and son Bro Mike Malaluan. The service was organized by Sis Emerizza Caseres with the collaborative efforts of Regional Directors Kevin Dy and Toto Gabayno. Teams of APO doctors, nurses, dentists, law school students, and other volunteers crossed the bordering southern end by land and by sea, and further braved the slopes, heat, and risk of the mountainous red zone areas of Region IV-B to render service to the Mangyan tribe.

The team from NCAR was divided into three groups (Brgy. Lisap, Brgy. Hangan, and Brgy. Batangan). Hangan and Batangan were mountainous barangays situated in the rural areas and Hangan is a much nearer one to the national road. Men in uniform were deployed in the areas. Units of Special Action Forces thru Commanding Officer PLTCOL ALDWIN R. SANTOS, prior to the actual date of service were already on the areas to secure perimeter and the safety of APO volunteers. Units that served were 105th in Lisap, 103rd in Batangan, and 101st in Hagan; and also there were battalion from the Philippine Army. Deployed from the local unit were the 2nd PMFC Oriental Mindoro Police Provincial Office, Bongabong Municipal Police Station, Regional Anti-Cybercrime Unit, and Bureau of Jail and Penology. All these units aided not only for the safety and protection of all teams but In also assisted with the basic tasks most especially in the implementation of protocol adherence against COVID-19.

However, when guestioned about their adherence to vaccinations. Sir Jun stated that they are still unconvinced in this line of science.

NCAR had begun to cross borders and regions to deliver its service both within the circle and to humanity. Suguicay Island, Bulalacao, Mindoro – To respond to the call of Alpha Phi Omega's National Environmental Committee led by NVPA Sis Nancy Go and EnviCom Chairman Joel Alivia for a one-day Synchronized Tree Planting all over the regions, the team from APO NCAR's medical, dental, tuli, and gift giving mission continued to shed time to serve while in the area of MIMAROPA.



What supposed to be a side trip became a multi-task fruitful day to both serve and enjoy nature. Suguicay Island belongs to the 3rd class municipality of Bulalacao, Oriental Mindoro. APO Bulalacao AA had long been conveying with its local unit for project services that contribute so much to the welfare of the community around it. On November 21, 2021. APO COAST MIMAROPA had planted approximately 2,600 seedlings thru the leadership of Regional Director Bro Toto Gabayno, all around its sections. ARA WEBINAR: Leaders Should Be Good Communicators

he Administrative Region of Asia wrapped up its Developing Leintensified its Service to the Membership program with a webinar on Communication Skills and Roberts Rules of Order on November 21 2021. Over 100 brothers and sisters from ARA and other alumni associations signed up for the 5 hours-long session.

In his presentation, this writer (Bro Al R Dizon, 0401-1976 and a member of APO AAS 189) asserted that leaders are by default communicators, and that if one wants to be a leader, one must be equipped with good communication skills.

Drawing on his 25 years of journalism experience which allowed him to interview some of the leaders of industry, innovators and heads of state, he laid out the communication skills required that leaders must have.

He grouped the skills according to what he called a 'hierarchy' of skills, which



includes interpersonal, collective/team, comprehension, process and leadership skills.

Bro Al also urged everyone present use communication and communication channels to "rally all brothers and sisters, past and present around the same vision, and support the tenet that we are all in this journey together" and not to divide or fragment the fraternity.

He urged leaders to communicate more frequently, promote virtual communication, paint the big picture, embrace transparency and straight talk, listen more and with empathy, and make themselves available

In her segment, Sis Marlea P. Muñez (0008-1985), drew upon her knowledge of parliamentary proceedings when she ran through the key features of the Roberts Rules of Order.

Using various scenarios ranging from collegiate chapter and alumni association meetings to National Board of Trustees Meetings and Annual General Assembly sessions, Sr Marlea led participants through the rigors of setting an agenda, and explained the differences between determining, seeking and dispensing a quorum.

During the breakout sessions, participants had to brainstorm, handle group meetings and had some role playing to accentuate the learning outcomes.



She also enlightened the participants about the roles and responsibilities of the chairman of a meeting or of a presider in an assembly.

The webinar series for 2021-2022 is spearheaded by ARA Section 2 Chairman Sis Joan Paula Caritativo (1024-2000), who is also responsible for membership interpersonal development under the Service to the Membership program.

It has four parts:

- a) Developing Leaders (Leadership, Communication Skills and Roberts Rules of Order)
- b) Other Skills (IT, Cybersecurity)
- c) OFW Matters
- d) Health (Mental Health, Running etc)

In reviewing the communication webinar, Sr Joan highlighted the apparent conflict of schedules. There was a NAO-organised tree planting being held on the same day, which may have affected the response to the webinar.

Sr Joan has urged the NAO to release a calendar of all the planned synchronised activities of APO.

Once again, the APO Administrative Region of the Middle East has helped thousands of people despite the threat brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic, reminding everyone that when modern medicine fails to provide a cure, love and compassion will always be there. They have initiated humanitarian projects with advanced ideas and approaches in different places of the world to contain the spread of the virus and promote the welfare of people, especially our OFWs' in vulnerable and povertystricken communities.

The year 2020 has been a challenging yet fulfilling and productive year for the APO Administrative Region of the Middle East. They conducted and spearheaded several vital projects and services aimed at helping people who are in need in these trying times. At the end of each day, they feel physically bruised yet emotionally well. The feeling of an unexplained kind of happiness allows them to view life on a different spectrum.

In August 2020, APO UAE AA 96 extended their help through the distribution of PPEs, disinfectant, and hand sanitizer at Ibabao-Estancia Elementary School Mandaue City and Basak Elementary School Lapu-Lapu City. Not only that, but they also distributed school supplies for the Balik Eskwela Program. They believe in the power of education and its impact on the lives of Filipino children. Meanwhile, the APO Emarat 121, has proudly dedicated the services rendered within UAE and the Philippines related to the Covid-19 pandemic. All directions were unified to provide financial and physical share from awareness training, financial assistance, food, and goodies distribution. The service was a success due to the APO medical front liner's sacrifice and above all the unifying support of all its members.

It's a well-known fact that the Covid-19 pandemic has affected many people globally but not equally. Other people may love this lockdown, but for OFWs, it's another story. It's hard to be alone in a foreign place, being away from your family, losing your job, unable to move due to guarantine measures, running out of resources, and barely living decently. And to address this problem, the APO Kuwait AA has shown compassion to the displaced OFWs/ Kababayans affected by the lockdown. In August 2020, they conducted a relief goods operation in response to the need of the displaced OFWs, APOKAA-153 contributed and distributed assorted groceries and basic commodities in which over a hundred of our fellow Filipinos who were retrenched from work benefited.

In addition, another notable project centered on helping our OFWs' conducted by the APO Qatar AA entitled "APO Qatar's Covid-19 Food Assistance Program."The project's foremost goal is to help the OFWs, especially the distressed at POLO OWWA, and most importantly, fellow brothers and sisters affected by the lockdown and retrenchments brought by Covid-19.

Furthermore, APO Qatar AA97, in full coordination with the Philippine Embassy in Qatar, POLO-OWWA & Qatar Government (Qatar Charity), being a fully recognized active organization in Qatar, has successfully assisted in distributing food packs to the united Filipino Community to different locations and accommodation in the State of Qatar. The AA has also initiated its selffunded APO AYUDA Program intended for our brothers and sisters affected by the lockdown and termination due to the pandemic. APO Qatar was able to distribute food items to about 500 OFW's.

Moreover, on December 23, 2020, the APO Oman AA has extended their help and support to the Christmas Wheel of Hope and Project of APO Delta Omicron in BAAO, BUH, and IRIGA City. There were five beneficiaries of the said project.

To support the Kingdom's call to vaccinate and promote the welfare of people, most of the members of the APO Bahrain AA got vaccinated. Fortunately, the country has offered free vaccinations for all its residents providing the option to choose from four available vaccines approved in the Kingdom. Keep in mind that the available vaccine is the one that is best for vou. The members of APO Bahrain make sure not to add to the world's myriads of problems, but instead, they help one another and become part of the solution. They play their part by staying at home as much as possible, wearing their facemasks, observing physical distance, and avoiding social gatherings. Practicing these health protocols and getting vaccinated is the very least thing that they can do to help our front liners. Hence, the members believe that as covid-19 continues to ravage our communities and the world, it's a must for the people to follow health expert's advice on how to combat the virus and be ethical.

More so, due to the increasing Covid-19 cases, many hospitals need hospital beds. As a response to this crisis, the APO Jeddah AA has donated 1 unit of Electrical Medical Bed, medicines, hospital foam mattress, and adult bedside at the Philippine Consulate General last September 25, 2020.

Consequently, on January 15, 2021, the APO Riyadh AA Donated 100 Free Flu Vaccines to the 60 Volunteer Kababayan. They also provided Paracetamol tablets, sanitizers, masks, and sanitary kits to more or Less 95 Female Beneficiaries in coordination with the Philippine Overseas Labor Office, OWWA-RIYADH.

On the other hand, members of the APO Western Region of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia AA were deeply saddened by the death of their brother Mon Islao. As a way of showing their condolences, they have provided financial support to the bereaved family. This only reflects the extraordinary bond that exists among its members that even in the gloomiest days, they will show up and will always extend their helping hand.

On August 27, 2020, the APO Qassim AA conducted a Brigada Eskwela Project at Madawon Elementary School (Nabua West), San Roque Madawon Nabua, Camarines Sur. Over 890 pupils from Grade 1-6 benefited from the said project. Volunteerism and initiative are common ways to encourage community involvement in schools. In this connection, APO Qassim AA was considered as one of the Brigada Heroes who rendered service to the students, teachers, and community by giving away educational materials needed by the students and schools.

Interestingly, strong men and women of APO gradually gathered and assembled to form APO Dhahran 14th Alumni Association in the Eastern Province of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia. It has come to a point that certain members thought a nesting place would be a haven for all the members, particularly during weekends, to ease the longing they have from their families back in the Philippines. A flat has been rented altogether by fellow brothers and was later on called the BBH. BBH or the Big Brother House was coined sometime in 2010 after the phenomenal launch of the Pinoy Big Brother program in the Philippines which was also a hit in the TFC program in the Kingdom.

The Big Brother House is a place where anyone can feel the warmth and camaraderie known for outstandingly present between the members of APO Dhahran AA. It's a safe abode where sumptuous meals are continuously served, memories are created, stories are passed on, fellowship strengthened, and meetings and events are conducted. The place may not be huge nor grand, but the walls of their humble home had seen and heard a lot of historical circumstances that withstood the test of time. The place has been an avenue for them to overcome the stress and anxiety inflicted by the pandemic. It's indeed what the members of Alpha Phi Omega Dhahran Alumni Association can consider their home away from home.

Even in times of the pandemic, there are still people who strive for excellence. One of these is Ms. Karina "Karen" O. Retales-Pascual, MBA. She's the first Sorority president of APO Jubail AA DY 2021. She's hailed as the Outstanding OFW Women of 2020 and has received the Excellence in Community Service Award. Undoubtedly, Ms. Pascual deserves these awards because of her consistent support and dedication to several Filipino Community Outreach activities. She became the light and hope of her fellow Filipinos working abroad. She had been a long-time volunteer of the Embassy on Wheels and Consular Outreach Program (Jubail, Al Khobar & Dammam) and other humanitarian activities.



All the humanitarian services of the APO Administrative Region of the Middle East are an indication that the spirit of humanity and volunteerism are still widely vast in the society that we live in. That is a world full of depressing news and darkness, and people came and brought us light. People were the light. They showed up with their flashlights and helped us by being what we needed. time to waste, the here is no Administrative Region of the Pacific, together with its seven (7) recognized Alumni Associations in Australia and New Zealand is facing Alpha Phi Omega Philippines, Incorporated's Development Year 2021-2023 head-on. Led by its newly elected Regional Director Bro Raden Chavez (Eta Theta 85'), fearless and ready to calibrate the Pacific Region with a new master plan - 100% engagement and welfare to every member in the region. The objectives of the incumbent Regional Directorate are: to strengthen APO ARP by increasing communication, collaboration, and welfare of members; to unify the region; and to cooperate and align APO ARP to APO Philippines' national leadership.

A summarized road map called PDCA Board (Plan, Do, Check, Action) was introduced swiftly to the region and the national level, drawing an outline of what to do and how to achieve it within 21 months. APO ARP in synergy to institutionalize its service projects by creating a year-round calendar focusing on environmental services and enjoining the movement of COP26 (26th Conference of the Parties) to make enhanced commitments towards mitigating climate change and a move to end coal power and fossil fuel subsidies.

APO ARP is also ready to embrace and empower a growing team, preparing and organizing the petition for charter of APO South Australia Alumni Association and APO Lower South Island New Zealand Alumni Association. Nevertheless, seek authorization from the International Council of Alpha Phi Omega (ICAPO) through its incumbent Chair Sis Judge Alice C. Gutierrez (Alpha Eta '75) to expand and recruit collegiate members in New Zealand.

THE NATIONAL COMMITTEES OF APO PHILIPPINES

n order to effectively function as an organization, the Alpha Phi Omega By-Laws allows the National Board of Trustees to promulgate the policy charter which shall outline the principles, functions, organization and policies involving the National Committees of the fraternity.

Proceeding from this power, the National Board of Trustees, confirmed the officers and members of the National Committees of the organization. It is thus an honor to introduce the men and women who readily accepted the challenge of serving for the betterment of APO:

The Standing Committees

Section 5 Incidental Powers- All Committees shall have such incidental, residual and inherent power and authority to do and perform such other duties and functions as may be necessary and proper to fulfill their mandates.

Committee on Membership



The Committee on Membership shall be responsible for the formulation and implementation of all programs and policies pertaining to the general membership and the expansion thereof.

Committee on Membership shall perform the following duties and functions:

- To promote and encourage programs and activities that serves and supports the Chapters and Associations;
- To promote and encourage programs and activities for the enhancement of membership recruitment, retention and reporting;
- To promote and encourage the reactivation of inactive chapters and associations and/or the formation of new collegiate chapters and alumni associations;
- To formulate, institute, publish and establish a Code of Conduct, effective upon approval of the Board of Trustees, which shall be compulsory on all members and thereafter, to conduct the periodic review thereof to ensure its continued pertinency; and,
- To conduct a census every six (6) years on the demographics of the membership and distributions of collegiate chapters and alumni association for the purpose of realignment and reassignment of collegiate chapters and alumni associations in the administrative regions or sections.

Committee on International Relations



The Alpha Phi Omega Philippines, Inc. recognizes the significance of promoting the principles, ideals and purposes of Alpha Phi Omega throughout the world. It therefore adopts as part of the Code of By-Laws, not contrary to existing laws of the Philippines, any agreement or undertaking that may be entered into by the President and the Committee on International Relations with any national organization of Alpha Phi Omega based from without the Philippines. The Committee shall strengthen the existing relationships with other Alpha Phi Omega national organizations and promote the establishment of Alpha Phi Omega on a worldwide scale.

Committee on Finance (Ways And Means)



Committee on Finance (Ways and Means) shall be charged with the duty of recommending measures to the Board of Trustees for adequately financing the organization, its programs and policies.

The Committee on Ways and Means shall do and perform the following specific duties and powers:

- To devise ways and means to develop sources of funds needed for the programs and projects of the organization, and to oversee and coordinate -fund raising programs and activities; and,
- To prepare, propose and submit to the President, after consultations with the other officers and Committees, the budget of the organization for the next two (2) years.

APO Philippines National Committee on Scouting (ANCOS)



MISSION

Lead all APO members develop their worth and cultivate skills to become worthwhile members of the organization guided by the scout oath and law.

VISION

Inculcate scouting values and competencies of members that enable them to realize their full potential and share meaningfully in building the nation.

ANCOS DY 2021-2023 THEME

"APO makes it happen through Scouting".

The primary task of the APO NATIONAL COMMITTEE ON SCOUTING is to strictly to implement memorandum no 17 series of 2016. this is the partnership with the APO for promotion of the rover scouting and the community based program.

ANCOS will help in the promotion and propagation of the scout ideals, tenets and principles, and the overall development of the scouting movement, particularly the rover scouting and the community based scouting program of the Boy Scout of the Philippines.

The ANCOS has given the authority to assist in the conduct of the Rover Vigils and orientation seminars in coordination with the local councils of the BSP across the country. APO shall provide assistance and support in the conduct of scouting events at any level.

Committee On Elections



The Committee on Elections shall have the following powers and duties:

- To exercise general supervision and control over all elections and/or electoral exercises conducted by the Electoral College and the Administrative Regions;
- To pass upon the qualifications of candidates and members of the Electoral College or of the Administrative Region
- To decide, after due notice and hearing conducted on the basis of written protest, any complaint to disqualify any candidate or voter who violates the rules and regulations of the Committee.
- To promulgate rules and regulations to govern the conduct of the elections or any other electoral exercise.
- The Committee shall submit to the Board of Trustees at the latter's regular meeting immediately following any electoral exercise a report on the manner by which such election was conducted, as well as the results thereof.

Grievance And Adjudicatory Authority



The Jurisdiction of the Grievance and Adjudicatory Authority shall have the following powers:

- Exercise primary and original jurisdiction in all disputes and controversies involving actual rights which are demandable and enforceable, including
 - The validity of the election or appointment and removal of any National Officer.
- Review, revise, reverse, modify, or affirm on appeal the judgments and orders of the Regional Adjudicatory Councils.

The Committee's primary objectives are to verify the accuracy of accounts, detect errors and/or frauds, check internal controls, verify the organization's assets and liabilities and also to check the adherence and compliance to government rules and regulations. To fulfill this overwhelming task, the committee divided the team in two working sections. The first section is tasked to handle finance related matters and the second section is tasked to handle internal controls, policies and procedures with consideration for the period constraints.

GUIDELINES FOR CREDITING AND CLAIMING REGIONAL SHARES

Approved last October 24, 2021 during the first National Board of Trustees Regular Meeting

Rationale

Administrative Regions under the umbrella of Alpha Phi Omega Philippines, Incorporated are entitled to a share coming from the membership dues processed by the Region or Regional Officers. Regional Shares shall serve as financial aid to regions that drove the members under their Administrative Region to pay their dues and collate membership applications. With this, crediting and claiming regional shares should have clear-cut guidelines and procedures mandated to all Regional Officers.

Crediting Procedures:

- 1. An amount of 150 pesos per membership fee (APO ID) shall be credited to those regions that processed membership dues under their Administrative Region coordinated by the Section Chairman and the Regional Director.
- 2. Administrative Regions are encouraged to appoint their Regional ID Officer, provided with an endorsement letter or certificate from their respective BOUs.
- 3. Administrative Regions are mandated to create a Gmail account inline and uniform from the Gmail accounts of APO Philippines, Inc. Example:apophregion11@gmail.com
- 4. All ID Applications forms coming from the region should have the signature of the Regional Director.
- 5. Regional shares will be credited to the region with the following conditions:
 - a. For online processing of membership dues, membership applications forms should be submitted by the region's official Gmail account; or
 - b. Hard copies of membership application documents were sent personally by the Regional Director or Regional ID Officer.

Claiming Procedures:

- Regional Directors must submit a letter of request addressed to the National President and National Executive Vice-President through the National Executive Director and National Treasurer requesting for their Administrative Region's share provided with the following:
 - a. Specific reason and use for the regional share; and
 - b. Breakdown of probable expenses.
- 2. All requests shall be processed within 5-7 business days.
- 3. Cheques to be issued and deposited by the National Administrative Office shall only be named after the Regional Director, Regional Treasurer, or the Region's official bank account.
- 4. Upon the date of release of the initial request, the Regional Directors are directed to submit a liquidation with official receipts within thirty (30) to forty-five (45) days.
