


IDENTIFYING OPPORTUNITIES TO CREATE LASTING VALUE

ENHANCING PROCEDURES THROUGH STAKEHOLDER ENGAGEMENT




- Define Clear Objectives: Outline specific goals and questions to guide the focus group discussion, ensuring that sessions remain purposeful and productive.
