ULSU Secretary General Appointed

After a lengthy process of advertising and interviewing, the Students' Union have appointed a new manager/ financial controller, Ms. Joanna Griffin, to manage affairs. Ms. Griffin's title will be Secretary General and she will supervise Union staff as well as keeping Union Finances shipshape and up to date.

There were over thirty applicants for the position, which was advertised in the national and local press and there were two round of interviews, after which Ms. Griffin secured the position.

Having recently studied at UL as a postgrad in the Women's Studies department, Ms. Griffin is a chartered accountant and former head of LIT Finance Dept, with a keen interest in University life. ULSU would like to welcome her into her new position, and into the ULSU team. Ms Griffin takes up her position offically on Tuesday May 4th, and will begin by becoming up to date on Union accounts over the summer.

Shoplifters face serious consequences

Shoplifting is a problem in almost every shop, and the ULSU shops in the Student Centre and Dromroe are no exception. While larger shops can simply write off the expense, the Student Shops are striving to make up the margins and bring the profitability of the shop up to a level where it can clear its debts and make some money for the Students' Union.

Since Christmas, major changes have been taking place to ensure that margins are as healthy as possible, and of late, this includes deterring shoplifters. The shop is fitted with security cameras, and these are used to identify culprits and are also used as evidence.

If a student is caught shoplifting, they are identified and brought before the University's Discipline Committee. This committee deals with serious offences, and the penalties imposed go from community service to expulsion. At the time of writing, there has been one recent case of this happening.


Shop manager Fiona Doyle said, "This is an ongoing issue, and we deal



with every person we catch in a very serious manner. If a person is brought before the Discipline Committee, a report of their conduct goes on their record. So if you're someone who's thinking about being lightfingered, remember that your reputation could be affected. Think about the consequences."

Seanad Report recommends major reform, including votes for UL Graduates

It has long been a bone of contention for UL and DCU that graduates of NUI and Trinity had the right to elect senators, but that UL UCD and the other Third-Level institutions in the country had none. In fact, many people saw the Seanad as being unwieldy, exclusive and out-dated, and definitely in need of serious reform. The latest Seanad evidently agreed, because it established a subcommittee to examine the current system and to try to come up with a better one.

The recently published Report of Seanad Reform published by the Seanad sub-committee on Seanad reform has put forward many recommendations as regards the

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> At present, the Seanad is made up of sixty members; 11 nominated by the Taoiseach, 43 elected by five panels representing vocational interests namely, Culture and Education, Agriculture, Labour, Industry and Commerce and Public Administration and six elected by the graduates of two universities: - three each by the National University of Ireland and the University of Dublin (Trinity College).

The Sub-committee focussed on the Composition and Functions of the Seanad, and recommendations were made on both of those points. As size, the committee regards recommended that the reformed Seanad have 65 members, 32 of whom would be directly elected, 20 indirectly elected and 12 nominated by the Taoiseach. The remaining seat would be filled by the Cathaoirleach. Of the 32 directly elected Senators, 26 would be elected by the general public, to a national constituency. The remaining six would be elected to a national higher education constituency, consisting of degree holders from recognised Third-Level institutions. The register for electing the 26 publicly elected senators would be the same as that for a general election, minus those who wish to vote in the Higher Education constituency. No one should be allowed to vote in both constituencies. These direct elections to the Seanad should take place on the same day as European Parliament and local elections. In order to run in the election for the Higher Education constituency, each candidate should be nominated by ten graduates.

The committee recommends that a once-off registration process take place for existing graduates, who can choose whether they would like to be on the Higher Education register of electors or on the National Register of electors. It would not be possible to be on both registers for Seanad elections. After this initial register is compiled, each succeeding year's graduates should choose on graduating between being on the Higher Education Register or the National Register.

This is an issue with particular resonance for UL graduates, and has been for many years. This year, a joint, written submission was made to the Sub-Committee by the University of Limerick, University of Limerick Students' Union, University of Limerick Postgraduate Student Association and University of Limerick Alumni Association. Early in Semester one, UL President, Roger Downer, along with Chancellor Seán Donlon and Jim Collins of the Alumni Association were invited by the subcommittee to a meeting to make their position clear.

As regards the role and function of the Seanad, it was recommended that its powers and abilities as regards Legislation, EU affairs, Public Policy and Senior Public Appointments should be enhanced and expanded, and that the Leader of the Seanad should have the right to attend meetings of Dáil Éireann with the status of a Minister or a Minister of State.

As of yet, the committee's recommendations are just that, recommendations. It remains to be seen how much of the report will be implemented and how soon. The next Seanad elections are due to take place in 2007. Maybe some of us will have a chance to vote in them!

Winners all round - Health Promoton Survey



Friday last, April 23rd saw Jim Foley, 4th Computer Systems receive a prize of €100 from Declan Aherne, Chair of the UL Health Promotion Working Group. Jim is the student winner of the recent Health Promotion Survey that was conducted by Elaine Kiely, UL's Student Affairs Officer.

The survey was carried out simultaneously by four Irish colleges - UL, Mary Immaculate, NUI Galway and Athlone IT, with a random sample of both staff and students of each college receiving the same questionnaire.

" The idea behind conducting the survey is to examine staff and student perceptions of health promotion services and activities that are available here in UL" explains Elaine, "and by conducting the same survey in four colleges we hope to develop a framework or template for

effective health promotion in college and university settings."

Asked about what is currently being undertaken by way of Health Promotion in UL Elaine explained that the Student Affairs Health Promotion Working Group comprises representatives from across all facets of the university and those involved in the group discuss, develop and deliver initiatives for UL students. Most recent of these initiatives was the setting up of Smoking Cessation Supports that are currently taking place each Wednesday lunchtime and the Sexual Health Competition that has up to €500 in prizes for UL students.

MA in Dance Passport to Teaching Dance in Education

The MA in Dance at the University of Limerick is the only taught part-time Masters in dance programme of study available in Ireland. The training and techniques taught during the course equip students with the skills required to work with children and adults in dance.

The MA in dance consists of two parts, The Graduate Diploma in Dance; a one-year, part-time taught programme of study, and the Masters Degree; a research year.



"The course aims to promote a dance culture and develop greater participation in the art of dance in Ireland", says Course Director Teresa Leahy. "At the same time, the Graduate Diploma in Dance really is the passport to teaching dance in Ireland and enables participants to acquire the necessary skills to teach at LCPE level.



The University of Limerick is home to Daghdha Dance Company, one of the leading professional dance companies in Ireland. The MA draws on the expertise available in the dance company with Daghdha staff providing practical and theoretical programmes. International Dance experts are also part of the teaching



team.

The Graduate Diploma in Dance is a taught programme in 9 modules covering the areas of dance technique, choreography, dance in education, dance appreciation, cultural studies and research methods. Students are required to attend classes on 12 Saturdays throughout the year and fulltime, for the first three weeks in July.

Students who graduate with honours may continue to the Masters programme. An independent research year, MA students are assigned a tutor and have full access to University of Limerick facilities to complete their own research programme and report. Graduates of the Graduate Diploma and Masters Degree in Dance include Gaye Tanham, Acting Arts Development Director at the Arts Council, Victoria O'Brien, Education Officer at Daghdha Dance Company, Dorothy Morrissey, lecturer in the Mary Imaculate College Limerick and Anne Donnelly, PE teacher in Galway. Interviews for the Graduate Diploma in Dance 2004 will be held in the University of Limerick during the first week of July. For some time now, the UL Environmental Committee has, in cooperation with Campbell Catering, been trying to reduce the number of plastic water cups used in the main restaurant. Current usage is around 5 000 per week, all of which of course end up in landfill.

The Committee has proposed, and Campbells have agreed, to implement the following scheme:

One cup for water can be taken without charge and refilled as often as required.

Customers who take more than one cup will be charged 10 cents per extra cup. This money will not go to Campbells but will be placed directly into one of two charity boxes at the check-out. The customer can choose which of the two charities; Hope and Homes or Milford Hospice, is to benefit.

Fees and Privatisation - A Student's View

In recent weeks, articles in 'An Focal' have detailed what I believe to be misleading and untruthful arguments against the re-introduction of third level fees and the privatisation of Irish universities.

These articles presented the view that the proposals of the government and Minister Dempsey are bad for the Irish student population. They however, failed to acknowledge that students are but one component of the Irish third level system. Other factors such as funding, research and the question of whether a third level education is a right or a privilege must be taken into consideration.

In Week 8's edition of 'An Focal' an article bemoaned the fact that lecturers in UL failed to work as hard or as diligently as those in Harvard. The simple fact that the author could even equate the two universities proves that their claims are spurious at best. Harvard is a better university than UL because it has more money to attract the best lecturers and also provide the best facilities. The key difference between Harvard and UL is the €40,000 a year tuition fees Harvard students' pay, which provide the university with stable and secure funding. As it is a private university Harvard does not have a set wage structure for its faculty, unlike in public universities, and can therefore financially reward the better performing lecturers. This encourages a high quality of teaching and attracts the best lecturers. By paying more for an education in a private university the student receives a better education because it is in the university's best interests to provide an outstanding level of education for it's students in order to maintain and increase it's revenue.

The article in the previous edition of 'An Focal', criticising the private fee paying teacher training website Hibernia, failed to note that postgraduate students voted with their money and left St. Pats. They did this because they got a better level of education for their money from the website than from St. Pats. If they did not then the website would have failed. Such a situation should be seen as a chance to encourage greater efficiency and higher standards from academic institutions. The students reacted with protests and picketed the Department of Education instead of demanding a better education from St. Pats to compete with Hibernia.

The central issue of tuition fees and the privatisation of Irish universities is funding. Quite simply, the situation at present whereby the exchequer provides the majority of third level funding is untenable. Either the taxpayer will have to foot the bill or students will, that is the stark choice. Opponents of fees seem to think that there is a magic reservoir of funds that can be tapped into to provide the Irish middle-class with free education and one of the lowest tax regimes in Europe. England attempted to keep fees as low as possible and encourage greater participation without raising taxes but only succeeded in haemorrhaging funds

from the third level sector and delaying the return of fees. Do we want our universities to suffer as much as the great academic institutions of England have? UCC is the latest Irish university to succumb to such financial pressures. It is some $\notin 60$ million in debt due mainly to the cost of its core areas of science and

medicine, which are of course expensive to teach. The fact is that the level of state support for universities does not reflect the true cost of teaching and universities that teach subjects requiring extensive facilities and equipment are always going to be at a loss. Burying our heads in the sand and demanding free education is not the solution to the far more important problem of the financial

security of Irish third level institutions. Students have to acknowledge that fees were gotten rid of by the rainbow coalition simply as an electoral sop to the middle-classes in 1995. There was no demand and no need for the abolition of fees. Either we dramatically reduce our expectations of the standard of education we wish to receive or we pay up. If fees are re-introduced at pre-1995 levels, in the region of €3,000 per year, then we students can demand and expect a much higher standard of teaching, lower class numbers and new and improved facilities. There is no point in complaining about the state of UL when we continually pass the buck onto taxpayers; ultimately taking resources away from vitally needed social and medical services.

Finally, opponents of fees see third level education as a right not a privilege. This is a dangerous assumption to make and one that has lead to disaster for many European education systems. Successive German governments subscribed to the belief that all German citizens were entitled to a university education and so created a university system that is dominated by bureaucracy in the German Standards at German regions. universities have plummeted, as admission to all courses, bar medicine and the biomedical sciences, must not be made on merit according to the German Constitution. This had directly led to a proliferation of small and localised universities that are barely worthy of the The great universities of title. Heidleberg, Göttingen and Tübingen are but a shadow of their former selves. This is due to government interference in the education system, which in effect means that no decision regarding resources or academic appointments can be made without prior consultation to regional education officials.

What has resulted is a system characterised by malaise, professional autocracy and dramatically declining academic standards. Student numbers on science, engineering and computer courses is at an all time low as the majority of students take courses in humanities in the hope that they will lead to a comfortable job in the government. The effect of these policies cannot be underestimated. In the past five years Ireland has produced a greater number of technology graduates than Germany. The OECD and the EU are under no

illusion that failings in the German university system have in part contributed to its recent poor economic performance.

As suggested by the author of an article in Week 10's edition of 'An Focal', a wholly private third level system is not the answer. It most be said neither is a wholly public one. According to the European Commission, every year 300,000 science and technology research students vote with their feet and leave EU countries for positions in the US. They do this because US institutions have the resources to provide them with far higher salaries and greater funding for their research than their EU counterparts. It is vital that action is taken to close the 'knowledge gap' between Europe and the US and ease the 'brain drain'. The only means to achieve

this is the return of fees and the privatisation of Ireland's leading universities.

The prospect of students paying tuition fees is insignificant in comparison to the prospect of Irish universities closing faculties, slashing courses and overcrowding classes due to lack of funds. So far the only viable proposals to solve the problem of funding have come from the government. Anti-fees activists propose solutions that exclude any form of private involvement in third level education yet put forward models of public ownership that have failed and are currently unsustainable. It is this intransigence and myopia that will damage the future of Irish education and not any supposed neo-liberal government plot.

Pop Goes the Century Icons of Pop Culture from the 20th Century Ayrton Senna

"If I'm going to live, I want to live fully and very intensely, because I'm an intense person. It would ruin my life if I had to live partially. So my fear is that I might get badly hurt. I wouldn't want to be in a wheelchair. I wouldn't like to be in a hospital suffering from whatever injury it was. If I ever happen to have an accident that costs my life, I hope it happens in one instant"

These are the chillingly prophetic words of Ayrton Senna, uttered just months before the sport he loved so dearly robbed him of his life. A devilishly handsome, charismatic, eloquent and proud Brazilian, Senna was sometimes misunderstood by the general public. Possessing raw natural talent, awesome speed and lightning reflexes he was a god behind the wheel, and when he stepped into a car normal rules of reality were suspended and the impossible could happen. But his ability was paralleled with unwavering motivation that manifested itself in ruthless and



aggressive driving. A complex, remote and deeply religious character, he often came across as cold, manipulative and arrogant. Nevertheless, his performances on track endeared him to fans across the globe as he enriched their lives with flashes of genius. The history of Formula One is marked with many bloodstains and teardrops, but on 1 May 1994, the heart of the sport itself was broken.

Ayrton Senna da Silva was born in Sao Paulo on March 21 1960. His father owned a metal works that specialized in manufacturing car components and, noticing his son's fascination with automobiles, he presented Ayrton with a 1-hp cart when he was four. Once thirteen he began racing officially, cutting his teeth in the South American Kart Championships and the World Kart Championships before graduating to Formula Ford 1600 in England. This



facilitated a move to British Formula three where he beat the great British hope, Martin Brundle, to the title. Further success in the Macau Grand Prix ensured attention from the world of F1. He tested for Williams and McLaren before eventually signing to race for Toleman in 1984.

He made his Formula One debut in front of his home crowd but his talent was crippled by an inferior car. At Imola he suffered the indignation of failing to qualify...an experience not previously encountered. At Monaco, however - a track that holds a special place in the Senna legend - the rookie began to sparkle...in the rain, Ayrton was supreme. Despite qualifying thirteenth, he had carved his way up to second by lap twenty. From there he mutilated Prost's 33.8 second lead so that when the race was stopped on lap thirty-one, he was only 7.4 seconds behind.

He reneged on his three-year contract with Toleman to join Lotus for 1985. Once a bastion of power in Formula One, Lotus were on an irreversible downward spiral. Although Ayrton blitzed the track in treacherous weather to secure his first win at Estoril and grabbed another victory in Belgium, he followed Honda to McLaren for 1988.

The McLaren years were the most successful of Ayrton's career...thirtyseven victories, three World Championships, and forty-six of his record breaking sixty-five pole positions. His time there also fostered one of Formula One's legendary rivalries Senna V Prost. Ayrton asserted himself by immediately upsetting the status quo and racking up six straight pole positions in a team that was centred on multiple Championship winning Prost. His focus in the car was riveting, chilling and unsurpassed and his racing personality betrayed an impenetrable desire to win at all costs; something his team-mate discovered when he was almost forced into the wall at Estoril at over 180mph. The McLarens were utterly dominant that season, claiming victory in fifteen of the sixteen races and Senna tasted the

sweet nectar of Championship glory as he acquired his first title. The 1989 campaign boiled down to the last race -Prost, refusing to buckle to a Senna overtaking manoeuvre, took both cars out thereby securing the title for himself. Ayrton was infuriated and returned the favour the following year by ruthlessly ramming Prost's Ferrari out of the final race to reclaim his throne. Ayrton added a third title to his tally in 1991 - along with a rejoiced home victory at Interlagos - but there was little incentive to remain at McLaren by the end of 1993. That year however, witnessed possibly his finest victory at the European Grand Prix at Donington Park. Though he remained unchallenged in wet weather, on the rain-lashed circuit he obliterated his opponents as he lapped the entire field in an inferior car and perilous conditions.

In 1994 he joined Williams-Renault. Despite racking up two more pole positions in the opening events, he failed to finish a race and a young upstart by the name of Michael Schumacher had taken both victories. By round three, the San Marino Grand Prix, he was determined to right this wrong but on Friday his Brazilian protégé, Rubens Barrichello, suffered a horrendously violent crash that could easily of taken his life but miraculously escaped with minor injuries. Senna was deeply shaken by the incident but decided to carry on. During Saturday afternoon, prior damage sustained to the front wing saw the Simtek of Roland Ratzenberger leave the track on the Villeneuve kink at almost 200 mph. He hit a concrete wall and was killed instantly. This, the first death to occur in F1 in twelve years, reminded the drivers how quickly their light could be extinguished. Some found it difficult to cope with, Senna in particular. On the telephone that night he told his girlfriend that he did not want to race the next day - for the first time in his life his resolve faltered and he felt the burden of his own mortality. But come Sunday Senna did the only thing his personality would allow him to do - he strapped himself

into his Williams and preened himself for battle. As he had done so often before, he started the race from pole and, after a long period behind the safety car, prepared to restart the race on lap seven. But as his Williams exited the Tamburello corner at approximately 190 mph, the car left the track and slammed into a concrete wall. The impact itself was substantial yet survivable but in an unfortunate twist of fate, a suspension arm had broken free and pierced his helmet with fatal results.

The true cause of the crash has never been established but there are two popular theories - one that the steering column Ayrton had had altered for comfort, broke during the race; and another that argues that low tires pressure due to a prolonged period behind the safety car caused the crash. Members of the Williams team were brought to court on manslaughter charges without conviction, although the case is due to be reopened again once more.

Brazil wept openly for its stolen son. His body was welcomed home amid a flood of emotion and his funeral was one that few heads of state would receive. Senna had inspired his country and given them hope. In life he had privately donated millions to charities and in death he left his people one final gift. He believed that "the wealthy can no longer live on an island surrounded by a sea of poverty" and before his death he had spoken to his sister about establishing an organisation to try and help the unfortunate. Although he never saw his idea in bloom, today the Ayrton Senna Foundation is working on the streets of Brazil to provide healthcare, education and nutrition for Brazilian children.

Few drivers could match Aryton's knowledge of the inner-workings of his car and fewer still could cope with him when he was at one with his machinery. When on song he reached a plateau few could dream of. Although his tactics sometimes bordered on reckless, his driving was pure poetry in motion and his indomitable will to win at all costs always ensured that he gave it his best. He never cruised, never backed off, never accepted anything less than the victory. Behind the wheel he had seemed immortal, the one person that it simply could not happen to. This made his death so much harder to endure.



Bryan opened the show with an enthusiastic version of Summer Of 69, backed by musical director, Ronan Johnston, a bass player, a guitarist and a drummer. Bryan looked entirely at home on stage, but then again, I guess he would want to be at this stage...er.... how many of these talent shows have you tried out for now Bryan?

Final Four were the first of the performers of the evening presenting us with a well-rehearsed and pleasant rendition of Crazy Love. The Limerick man, Martin Cosgrave got a good cheer from the home crowd, who certainly seemed to be well impressed with the lads, especially the young girl who was scooped from the audience only to be given a long lingering kiss from Lee. 
Burning in Water, Drowning in Flame Rest Album Launch May 6th, High Stool, Limerick

Alphastates Highstool - April 22nd

Cork band Rest are men of few words. They have been playing to hugely apreciative audiences in Cork, Limerick and around the country for a while now. Rest are Johnny (drums) Steve (guitar) Graham (guitar) and Mark (bass) and are sort of instrumental, sort of, heavy, sort of quiet and they've wormed their way into becoming one of my favourite bands. They've also been promising to release an album for at least the past seven months. Soon, they said... After Christmas they said... February they said.. Early March they said... Late March/Early April, they said. So when they said Late April/Early May, we believed them about as far as we'd believe Axl Rose.

And then along came Burning in Water, Drowning in Flame, and worth the wait it was too!

The opening track, 'contraceptives', starts out sweetly, and builds to a delicately pummeling finale, with forceful guitar sounds blended with



meditative strings and soaring guitar melodies.

Track two, 'our friends know nothing about density', was released as part of the Rest/Giveamanakick christmas single and layers electronic stylings over melodically interwoven guitar action, building once again to a climax... those rest boys like to climax!

Tracks three and four, 'to learn' and 'mother' have been around for a while at this stage, but subtle re-workings and the addition of strings and the calmly ethereal vocals of Annette Buckley on 'to learn' serve to freshen the palate and contrast nicely with the quietsweet/crashyloud dynamics of the guitars and drums. 'mother' is an onslaught of controlled frenzy almost all the way through, with one brief dip into quiet melody.

Tracks five and six are the title tracks of the album and 'burning in water' is a beautiful arrangement that swells to a string-imbued close and meets 'drowning in flame', a far more agitated affair instrumentally, with the collectedly soaring vocalist once again contrasting with the peaks and troughs of the beats and movement of the band. The last minute of the track is a surprising segue into pounding riffage.

'beauty' is a track of many changes, pauses, and suprises and 'rest go pop' does exactly what it says on the tin and very well too. the last track on the album 'is our blood not enough?' starts off sparse and sumptous, with e-bowed guitar, chilled drums and and laid-back vocals that are clear, yet smoky, and on its winding, ten-minute journey traverses many moods towards the most abrupt end I've ever encountered.

Comparisons don't do this album justice, it stands very well alone as a varied, contrasting and confident effort and it's well worth at least three or four listens! To demonstrate their utter lack of anything approaching verbosity, Johnny spoke to me briefly about how he felt about the album launch, the rest of the band, the development of their sound and out on a limb records.

His answers, in so many words were "Very excited. Love them loads. The sound is much more evolved. And I suppose Out on a Limb went out on a limb to release our album"

Is binn béal in a thost, I suppose. Rest are in the High Stool to launch Burning in Water, Drowning in Flame on Thursday May 6th. They're looking forward to it, and so should you! *SR*

Alphastates supported by the Supermodel Twins, The Highstool, Thursday April 22nd.

This is a night to rival any other in the musical abyss that is Limerick. The lingering scent of tobacco gives way to the blood; sweat and tears of the musical entrepreneurs on show tonight. It's here that I finally witness, what it is that has made the Supermodel Twins, (formally The Riffs) as of late, such an exciting musical phenomenon. From the moment Thom O' Keefe-vox/guitar, steps up onto the stage, the excitement level begins to build until it reaches an eventual paramount level in the backbar. Launching into a series of now familiar songs the three-piece turn their sound in a unique, varied and often inspiring way, which causes the crowd to leap headfirst into a tangle of musical mayhem, showing their reluctance to settle for anything less then perfection. I'm not saying this for the sake of it. I do believe the Supermodel Twins have a bright future ahead of them but music is only as important as it is pleasing for those who care enough to seek it out and are willing to allow for its expression. Signed to Irish Indy label, Wet-Clay Records, the Twins have enough support and gigging experience to push their promotional efforts as far as they have their musical capabilities. If you can you should check out the UL-based band whose material was recorded with Mark O Connor in the Balls Of Iron Studios. As the Supermodel Twins leave the stage, we're still reeling in shock from the astounding track, 'Exception.'

The headliners tonight come up and take to the crowd. The Alphastates are a Dublin based four-piece band, which since forming in April 2001 have caught both the ear and the imagination of the Irish public. With a sound so chilled, so melancholy, moving intricately and subtly in and out of calming silence, the intimate sound of the Alphastates is one to relax even the uneasiness of souls. Wielding their complete modesty to a level unknown to humanity, the Alphastates step up on stage and through their pulsating rhythms and catchy intermingling guitar work, endear us to their hearts. They possess a quality missing in recent years they have passion. It is caring, honest, inspired and hopeful music, which came about through the incessant work of skilled capable musicians, who travelled to France in order to record second EP, 'Conversations,' simply because it seemed like a good idea. Watching the Alphastates reeling off track after track in perfect musical ability, I see the culmination of a group of caring musicians who honed their sound through playing witness twice, The Olympia with Sinead O' Connor and Kila, The Ambassador with Throwing Muses and everywhere they could possibly reach since then within Ireland. Catching up with Jerry (Guitarist) and Catherine (Vocals) of the Alphastates in the Stool the night before they travel to gig in Paris, I asked a couple of strange auestions.

"What do you personally think of your own band, are you metal or alternative or...?"

Jerry, "We're not metal really, I don't know, alternative is a kind of catchphrase that takes in a lot of different styles of music, anything that's not necessarily commercial."

"Your main influences, your main inspirations, where did they come from?" Jerry, "They're from all over."

It's at this point that the soft-voiced front woman, Catherine, makes her presence felt, coming out of nowhere to take a seat.

"When I heard you play, I thought 60's Jefferson Airplane, Woodstock, love, calm and peace. How do you maintain

that sort of perspective in this whole world?"

Catherine, "Basically, I suppose our music is just kind of chilled out and well

I never saw the Woodstock movie." "Do you think you have a unique voice?" Catherine, "Basically, people say that I have this unique voice all the time, like everywhere and it kind of surprises me because personally I see nothing original, I just sing the way I sing, so I don't know what this original buzz is." "How many gigs have you been to, how

musical do you think you are?"

Catherine, "I feel very musical, I live on music."

"What are the gigs you love the most?" Catherine; "The gigs that blow my mind are like where a band says nothing or does nothing, there's not that many gigs you go to that blows your head away." Jerry. "If you go to a lot of gigs you find

that you standards are raised about what really blows your mind." " Are you people who believe in the idea

that music isn't degrading but is becoming disorientated, that music which exists isn't being sought out, like African drum beats of jazz singers in Cuba?"

Catherine; "An interview that blew my mind was Patti Smith in the Ticket, when she was saying back in her day people kind of believed in music and that today it's all about haircuts and the clothes you wear, so it's all career driven and when you go to a gig, that's essentially what it's about."

"When you write songs, do you write about hope or joy or love, do songs come to you when you're around other people or alone?"

Catherine, "I always write songs when I'm really sad, it's true that any song I've ever written has been really, really like really sad. You feel vulnerable, but because you're sad, you mightn't write about that fact but about some



experience you've already had, I think vulnerability sparks creativity."

"How often does it happen?"

Catherine, "Lately not very often, I've been so busy lately."

"The busier you get, the harder it is to write songs, is this true?"

Catherine, "To be honest, the last song I wrote was about a month ago because I've been so busy, but I feel as if there's a stockpile of songs just screaming to get out, but I haven't literally had a second. You always get them out when you have that little bit of space."

"You're dedicated to music."

Catherine, "Listen, music is the only thing I know."

" To get to the music you need, do you need the music industry?"

Catherine, "I hate the music industry, it's so horrible."

Jerry, "We're not signed to anyone, we just set up our own label."

There you have it, a band increasingly under strain yet coping quite ably, managing to stay true to themselves and their music, while always growing in popularity. The Alphastates debut album, 'Made From Sand,' is available in all good record shops. They return to the Highstool on May 15th, which is without a doubt a gig to go to. A snapshot of Lucas:

Playing the Scholars Bar, Tuesday May 4th The Highstool Friday May 21st

"Lucas' songs are melodic & meandering with enough unexpected twists to maintain interest, and an ultra confident singer boasting a voice like Vedder's, but with the high notes" Fiona Reid, Hotpress "Lucas' sound falls somewhere between the lighter moments of Pearl Jam and the sweet, melodic, heavenly gospel of Jeff Buckley" Kevin McGuire, Galway Advertiser.

Galway based band Lucas are Alan Gray (vocals/guitar); Anthony Higgins (lead guitar); Paddy Flynn (bass) and Ray Butler (drums). Formed in 2000 in Dublin they began to cause a bit of a stir by winning the Hotpress Ignition Unsigned Competition shortly after. They decided to move to Galway in the summer of 2002 and immediately Lucas started to impress the natives. Their 'Little Devil' single began to sell well in the local independent record stores and they ended 2002 playing a series of gigs around the tribal city including the legendary Roisin Dubh.

Things really began to happen for them in 2003 when they travelled to

New York and it was not long after they were off the plane that they began to play the legendary venues 'Sin-E' (a key venue in the early career of a young singer called Jeff Buckley), 'Arlene's Grocery' and 'The Bitter End' amongst others. Around the same time playwright Jessamyn Fiore was putting together "The mysterious world of birds" featuring Lisa Hannigan (from Damien Rice's group) and Lucas were recruited to provide the soundtrack. Fiore approached Rob Fraboni to produce the soundtrack with Lisa Hannigan on backing vocals. Fraboni, in the past, engineered recordings by Bob Dylan and John Lennon. He was chief engineer on The Band's 'Last Waltz' album and he had produced albums by Keith Richards, Eric Clapton and Joe Cocker. Rob Fraboni

was so impressed with the music by Lucas that he asked to record an album with them later that summer of 2003 - from which the first single 'Snapshot' will be released on May 20th 2004.

The play received rave reviews in

Galway and in Dublin during the ESB

Fringe Festival scoring 4 stars in the Irish Times. Soon after Lucas were asked to be the resident band at Roisin Dubh, their monthly Thursday and Saturday night slots have become the stuff of legend.

The buzz around the band has taken on a similar vein to that of The

Stunning in the early 90s (former Stunning leaders Joe and Steve Wall are huge fans of Lucas). Their support in Galway has almost reached fever pitch.

Most recently they have played support to such luminaries as Spiritualized, Damien Rice (at Vicar Street), The Frames, David Kitt and The Walls. They have also been added to the bill of this summer's Oxegen line-up alongside David Bowie, The Darkness and others. They play various venues in Limerick City in the coming weeks. On May 4th they play Scholars Bar and on May 21st they play The High Stool. Their debut single from their new (Rob Fraboni produced) album is due for release on May 20th. Movie View

WIN A DATE WITH TAD HAMILTON !



Reminiscent of John Hughes' angstdriven, romantic, '80s teen comedies like Sixteen Candles and Pretty in Pink, Robert Luketic's Win a Date With Tad Hamilton! is a thoroughly delightful, albeit predictable, piece of fluff about a small-town girl who wins a date with-and the heart of--a big-screen idol.

STORY

Sweet Rosalee Futch (Kate Bosworth) is an ordinary southern girl, living in Frazier's Bottom, West Virginia, working at the Piggly Wiggly with her best friends Cathy (Ginnifer Goodwin) and Pete (Topher Grace), and dreaming about meeting her all-time favourite movie star, Tad Hamilton (Josh Duhamel). Not a chance in hell that'll happen, right? Wrong! She gets her wish when she enters a contest and wins the grand prize: an all-expense paid trip to Hollywood to go on a date with Tad, much to Pete's chagrin (he is, of course, hopelessly and secretly in love with Rosalee). Tad's agent, Richard "The Driven" Levy (Nathan Lane) and his manager, also named Richard "The Shameless" Levy (Sean Hayes), have masterminded the "Win a Date" contest hoping to transform Tad, a bad boy who's let fame go to his head, back into the popular boy next door. But the Richards are ill prepared for the effect the contest has on their high-profile client. Once Tad spends an evening with Rosalee, he realizes what he's missing in his life and moves to West Virginia to be near her so she can "rub some of that goodness" off on him. Rosalee's dream may come true, but it's a huge headache for the Richards and a nightmare for Pete, who'd better tell Rosalee how he feels soon or lose her forever. Think he'll win out in the end?

ACTING

The performances in Tad Hamilton could easily have been formulaic but, fortunately, the engaging cast has enough verve and spontaneity to make you care about their characters. Bosworth (Blue Crush) has the hardest job--to keep Rosalee's sugary-sweetness from becoming too nauseating and to prove she isn't just another pretty-butdumb hick chick. The fetching Duhamel (TV's Las Vegas) plays the two sides to Tad perfectly--the charismatic cad who gets everything he wants and the vulnerable guy who's never really learned how to cope with being in love. Then there's Grace as the adorable Pete--the real boy-next-door with his puppydog face and great quips. It's a persona the actor has mastered on his hit TV series That '70s Show, and it's easy to see how Pete's endearing, if slightly neurotic, personality could win you over. As for the supporting cast, Goodwin (TV's Ed) as Cathy is a breath of fresh air, while veteran character actor Gary Cole's turn as Rosalee's father, who tries to talk showbiz lingo with Tad, is hilarious. As the Richards, Lane and Hayes are as outrageously over-the-top funny as you expect them to be.

DIRECTION

In the '80s, writer/director John Hughes was the king of the romantic teen comedies that featured a quirky love triangle between the girl, the geek and the hunk. Sure, the plot lines were generally unsurprising--and sometimes downright melodramatic--but the dialogue was zingy and the young talent sparkled. Director Robert Luketic's Win a Date With Tad Hamilton ! takes audiences back to those glory days. Like Hughes, Luketic (Legally Blonde) understands the tempo a film like this requires, with quick cuts and standalone comic vignettes. And although Hamilton 's script, by television writer Victor Levin, isn't quite Hughes' calibre, there are more than a few great lines in Hamilton ("He wants your "goodness" to rub off on him? He wants your ass to rub off on him!"), as well as tender moments, especially when the dejected Pete asks Tad if he ever noticed Rosalee has six different smiles. A little romantic tale like Hamilton won't win any prizes, but it is an endearing, smile-inducing film.

BOTTOM LINE

With a posse of fresh-faced up-andcomers, Win a Date With Tad Hamilton! has enough appeal and good-natured wit to overcome its inherent flaws and charm the pants off any hopeless romantic.



ETERNAL SUNSHINE OF THE SPOTLESS MIND



With Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind, writer Charlie Kaufman (Being John Malkovich, Adaptation) has succinctly combined his innate quirkiness with his intuitive imagination to create one of the more ingenious yet simplistic love stories ever written.

STORY

The title, taken from a poem by 17th century poet Alexander Pope, may be long and involved but it accurately

paints the film's scenario: A love affair, even if it turns out to be a painful one, can never really be completely obliterated. Joel Barish (Jim Carrey), just another sad sack living in New York, is looking for love in all the wrong places, until he meets Clementine (Kate Winslet), an impulsive gal who changes her hair colour as often as her mood. The two embark on an odd and wonderful yet tumultuous love affair, which ends badly. Distraught over the break-up, Joel finds out that Clementine has "erased" her memories of him on a whim, undergoing a procedure created by one Dr. Howard Mierzwiak (Tom Wilkinson). In retaliation, Joel decides to go through the same procedure, so medical techs Mary (Kirsten Dunst), Patrick (Elijah Wood) and Stan (Mark Ruffalo) pay him a visit, proceeding to hook him up to a machine, put him under and zap his brain. Yet, while reexperiencing his memories of Clementine just before they are erased, Joel rediscovers the reasons he fell in love with Clem and realizes he wants to hold onto those memories after all. Unable to regain consciousness, he devises a way to stop the procedure within the deep recesses of his mind, playing a sort of cat-and-mouse game and "hiding" Clementine from the memory zappers.

ACTING

Both leads play against type in Eternal Sunshine. Typical wild and crazy guy Carrey easily pulls off quiet and introspective Joel, which shouldn't come as much surprise; he has proven (The Truman Show, Man on the Moon) he is more than capable of handling dramatic chores. On the flip side, the usually prim and proper Winslet lets loose as the eccentric and wacky Clementine, swirling around Joel like a whirling dervish, making his life both gloriously happy and hellish at the same time but connecting with him in an extraordinary way. Wilkinson, Dunst, Ruffalo and Wood add their own refreshing characteristics to the film. Ruffalo (You Can Count on Me), with horn-rimmed glasses and messed up hair, is the techno geek who dances around in his skivvies, while Dunst, as ditzy Mary, gets the chance to show some real comic flair for once (Bring It On doesn't count). Turns out Mary actually has a major crush on the good Dr. Mierzwiak, played ever so smoothly by the always good Wilkinson (In the Bedroom). And Wood finally gets to take off his Hobbit feet and just be regular joe Patrick, an insecure guy who is just trying to find a little love in the world.

DIRECTION

With a few films--and two Oscar nominations--under his belt, it's gotten to the point where audiences go see a "Charlie Kaufman film" because they know it will be different; they know it will test conventions and turn genres on their heads. It's the kind of name recognition usually reserved for a director and/or star, rarely a screenwriter. But the fact is Kaufman truly has a remarkable gift in taking ordinary subject matter--in Eternal Sunshine's case, a simple love story-and turning it into something completely unique, occasionally weird and always fascinating. Eternal Sunshine shows the softer, romantic side of Kaufman's skewed psyche, and his work is definitely enhanced by director Michel Gondry. Having worked together on the blink-and-you-missed-it indie Human Nature, the two have turned in a nearly flawless second effort. Gondry's vision of Joel's memories matches the story's inventiveness, as Joel races around in his subconscious, grasping at straws and trying to keep Clementine in his head. In one particular moment, the beach house where Joel's last remaining memory of Clem takes places--the memory of meeting her for the first time--collapses around them as the images are slowing disappear as the memory is being erased. It's a distinctive and heartbreaking flash of visual brilliance. Oscar should come knocking once again.

BOTTOM LINE

Eternal Spotless Sunshine...wait, Eternal Sunshine Mind That's Spotless--OK, so it's hard to remember the exact title. Nevertheless, with its thoroughly original look at love, Eternal Sunshine of the Spotless Mind (yes!), will leave an indelible impression.



KILL BILL VOL. 2



With all the flashy, creative filmmaking of Kill Bill Vol. 1 and significantly less bloodshed, Kill Bill Vol. 2 should put Quentin Tarantino back on Hollywood's directorial A-List.

STORY

Kill Bill Vol. 2 picks up where the first instalment left off, with The Bride (Uma Thurman) delivering a "refresh your memory" monologue as she drives to her next victim, Budd (aka Sidewinder). These shots are cut through with flashbacks that tell the whole story of the "Massacre at Two Pines," and its instant-gratification city. First, we meet the wedding party, the reverend and his wife, and Rufus the piano player (Samuel L. Jackson in a cameo role). But most importantly, we meet the elusive Bill (David Carradine) for the first time. (He appeared in the first film only in voiceover.) You know from the start that this movie isn't going to rely on the same suspense devices the first film did, and you soon learn it doesn't rely as heavily on the blood and gore that so distinguished the first instalment. The creatively shot and intelligently

constructed opening scenes make Tarantino's epic of evil gripping right from the start in its own right. Amazingly, considering the way she ripped her enemies apart in the first film, The Bride doesn't always get her man in this one; Budd (Michael Madsen) actually gets the best of the Bride, at least temporarily, and entombs her in "The Lonely Grave of Paula Schultz," one of the most horrifying scenes of burial alive ever. Flash back to "The Cruel Tutelage" of kung-fu master Pei Mei (Gordon Liu), who taught The Bride how to break through wood planks with her fists from three inches away (which comes in handy now) and the Five Point Palm Exploding Heart technique (which will come in handy later). Freeing herself from her makeshift grave to do battle with her victims once more, the Bride dispenses with both Budd and Elle Driver (Daryl Hannah), who's conveniently appeared on the scene, and it's on to the greatest battle of them all, it's time to Kill Bill

ACTING

Thurman proves her calm, cool, collected mettle once more as The Bride (aka Beatrix Kiddo, aka Black Mamba), plucking out eyeballs, bloodying her fists punching wood, exploding hearts, and the like. But we also see her during completely vulnerable flashbacks to the time she spent in a coma after the attack (some pretty cool stuff happens in the hospital, but no spoilers forthcoming from this reviewer). And there's a softer side to Black Mamba when she's awake, too. In another flashback, we see The Bride on her last assignment before she quit the assassination business to become a wife and mom, the stick in her EPT has just turned blue when a rival assassin comes knocking through the door, and it's a poignant moment (with a Tarantino edge) as she tries to protect her unborn child. Carradine's Bill is somehow less menacing than one might have expected, but there's enough creepiness in the character for an audience to imagine what a real hard case he must have been in his glory days. Hannah enjoys a splendid comeback role as The Bride's fellow assassin, and she's regal in her adherence to the warrior code they share. Madsen wears Sidewinder's cowboy hat and slouchy jeans like he was born to them and swills whiskey like a ranch hand, yet he still captures the wistfulness of the once-great fighter, if somewhat ironically.

DIRECTION

Fans of Tarantino's Pulp Fiction can start rejoicing. He's finally made a film that lives up to the standard he set back in 1990. All the influences on the first film are still very much in evidence here, Asian martial arts films, in particular, but each chapter in this instalment, as in the previous, has its own look, creating a mix n' match patchwork feel that somehow manages to work in spite of itself. If there's one criticism, it's that it indulges a bit in its own cleverness, and that makes it a little too long. But Vol. 2 shouldn't see the big criticisms aimed at Vol. 1's dark, gory violence; instead, Vol. 2 finds kinship with its creator's first big hit in its story and characters. Sure, it's overblown; sure, everyone is evil on some level. That's the fun of it. And every now and then, a little compassion comes through, or a little humour, and it captures the ridiculousness of human nastiness, whether it's the petty arguments you had all day at work, or all the slaughter that's been perpetrated with a Hattori Hanzo sword.

BOTTOM LINE

One of the most entertaining movies of the year so far, Kill Bill Vol. 2 is twice as good as its predecessor and about half as violent.

SECRET WINDOW



Johnny Depp stars as a fiction writer who finds himself alone in his forest cabin with a nasty case of writers' block and an even nastier hairdo in Secret Window.

STORY

Mort Rainey (Johnny Depp) is just the kind of tortured, addlepated writer you'd expect to find all alone in a backwoods upstate New York cabin, in his ubiquitous ratty, moth-eaten robe, hair dishevelled from the couch pillows on which he's constantly sleeping, Jack Daniels bottle lurking conveniently on the coffee table, and a blank page in his typewriter. It comes as no surprise that Mort's been unceremoniously dumped by wife Amy (Maria Bello), whom he found cheating on him in a hotel room with unctuous Ted (Timothy Hutton). Not much for Mort to do then besides rattle around his cabin, trying (sorta) to stay awake long enough to pound out a few sentences of his latest work of fiction--until, that is, a black-hatted, good ol' Southern boy calling himself John Shooter (John Turturro) shows up on the doorstep accusing Mort of plagiarizing his short story, "Secret Window," several years ago. With only a few days to prove to this Shooter that his story was his own before the guy makes good on his threats to kill everyone Mort knows, Mort finds himself with a sticky situation on his hands--literally, as pretty soon first his dog, then his neighbours, start turning up with screwdrivers sticking out of them.

ACTING

Cast any other actor as Mort, and the movie would sink faster than a truckload of bodies in a rock-quarry

lake. As it is, this is pretty silly horror fluff that barrels headlong into camp territory--but Depp knows it the whole time, managing a self-awareness that avoids winking at the audience just enough to pull off some real tongue-incheek corkers. As he sinks his teeth into the corny stuff ("This is not my beautiful house. This is not my beautiful wife," he muses a la the Talking Heads while lurking outside his house now inhabited by Ted and Amy), he proves yet again that he can work miracles with the kind of material he's given. It's entirely to his credit that Secret Window ends up a highly entertaining little horror movie. He's not necessarily to blame, however, for the pathetic lack of chemistry he has with cuckolding wife Amy. Not only does she dwarf him physically, but it's also next to impossible to believe they were ever into each other, despite mushy flashbacks that show them lovingly decorating the cabin or cavorting in their big house in the 'burbs. Turturro chews the scenery with gusto, Hutton is effectively oily, and Charles S. Dutton makes a quick but decent turn as Mort's protective lawyer.

DIRECTION

Filmmakers seem to have a hard time successfully translating Stephen King's writing to the big screen, and have done so with wildly varying results (read: from Shawshank Redemption to Dreamcatcher). But you have to give credit to writer David Koepp (Spider-Man, Panic Room), who took on directing duties here, for winding up a pretty tight little B-movie that ends up being entertaining, in spite of (or perhaps because of) having more ham in it than an Easter dinner. Plus your guess about the "who" in "whodunit" will no doubt be spot-on. Despite all its homespun hokum, despite the fact that the entire first third of the movie seems to be a musing on whether Mort can ever get to sleep in peace, and despite the fact that the final third of the movie is about as secret as a glass window, the black hearted, true-to-King ending still comes as something of a shocker. Kudos goes to the moody, understated score by Philip Glass (The Hours), which ramps up the suspense without overwhelming it.

BOTTOM LINE

Like a cheap Saturday night in L.A., Secret Window veers off into the absurd, but it's still low-rent, pulpfiction fun.



The soup run takes place every night in Limerick City. The Conference of St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta looks after the Monday and Tuesday night runs. It's purpose is to meet homeless people who are hungry on the streets and who may not know of the hostels available to them. Each soup run has a driver and two volunteers, the task of the volunteers is to search the streets for homeless people on the soup run route which the driver uses. When a person is spotted, the volunteers will kindly approach the person with consideration and ask them would they like any soup and sandwiches for the present or if they choose to save some food for later. Perfect consideration for the individual must be observed as each person has their own reasons for being there, the person may not want to talk to a volunteer. This project has been running along without a hitch all year and hopefully will follow suit next year. Drop - in - Centre/ Home Visitation -Edel Sheahan

This takes place in co-operation with St.Finbars conference in Limerick City. The activity deals with the requests for assistance which are made within the area in Limerick. The home visitation group comprises of ten people of all ages, as a group the requests are analysed and a course of action decided on after the person has been visited to confirm whether it is a legitimate request or not. Requests can vary from a person who needs some clothes to an individual who needs help with financial troubles.

Outdoor Pursuits Club Review of the Year



Another year gone and while most clubs are winding down for the summer we would of course have to do the opposite and go rockclimbing nearly every weekend in preparation for our trip to the Alps. As usual the OPC has had an eventful 12 months since the clubs and societies ball last year where the Aconcagua 2003 Expedition, in our opinion, deservedly won Best Event. Over the summer seven OPC members headed to the Alps. It was the first time there for four of them and two attended a 3-day training course designed specifically for climbers without much experience while another attended an advanced alpine course to develop his mountain skills. All benefited hugely from this as it gave them valuable knowledge and confidence. Over the summer two new sections were added onto the climbing wall and the existing main section was repainted and regripped. UL can now boast of having one of the best bouldering walls in

Ireland.

In September we recruited/bribed over 350 unwilling people to join the club. There were 3 weekend trips to Cliften, Doolin and Killarney as well as rockclimbing trips to the Burren and Kilkenny. Numerous day hillwalking trips to Tipperary and Kerry also took place. Some members participated in a supervisor course for the climbing wall and rock-climbing leadership training. UL climbers also actively competed in national indoor climbing competitions. The icing on the cake last semester was the 10-day mountaineering trip which 18 people took to the Scottish Highlands. This was a fantastic experience for everyone! On the first day a group of beginners and a group of more experienced people were taken out by guides and shown everything from walking in crampons to avoiding avalanches. Mountains such as Buachaill Etive Mor, Stob Corra Na Lochan and of course the mighty Ben Nevis were climbed. Early mornings and long days weren't enough to deter the enthusiastic bunch! For many people this trip only whetted their appetite for mountaineering with many setting their sights on the Alps this summer.

Orienteering and caving are emerging as very popular alternatives to rockclimbing and mountaineering. Orienteering is a sport in which orienteers use an accurate, detailed map



and a compass to find points in the landscape. It can be enjoyed as a walk in the woods or as a competitive sport. Over the course of the year two people attended a training weekend in the forests of Offaly and another five went to the Intervarsities in Galway. Regular caving trips to the Burren were held throughout last year with the highlight being the caving forum in Fermanagh last Easter.

Then there were the rockclimbing intervarsities where climbers from collages from all over Ireland competed for a big (heavy) piece of granite! We didn't get it this year but at least Aoife won the female category.

In the past year and a half the OPC has helped about 80 people stand on top of Ireland's highest mountain -Carauntoohill (1039m), 19 stand on Ben Nevis - the highest mountain in Britain and Ireland (1344m), 2 people stand on the highest mountain in western Europe - Mt. Blanc (4810m) and 4 people stand on the highest mountain in the western hemisphere -Aconcagua. (6962m). Some members are hoping to stand on the roof of Africa by attempting Kilimanjaro (5800m) this August and after that the sky is the limit!!






EDUCATION - MADELINE

I know it's that time of year again and many of ye have been asking me for tips. So here they are sneakily copied from the Irish Times so they can't be half bad!!!!

The 10 commandments of exam preparation:

1 Study previous examination questions and prepare answers in bullet point or graphic format - that fit into the time allocation allowed.



3 Ensure that all the subjects you are taking are getting a balanced amount of your time coming up to the examinations. Students can often misread their need to concentrate on specific subjects to the detriment of those subjects they feel are not in need of much work at this time.

4 Don't attempt to start reading new material over the coming weeks. You have more than enough content in your head without adding more. The task now is to organise it in your head and on your revision cards in a manner conducive to presentation in 40 minutes.

5 Remember that in any race the eventual winner is very rarely the one who starts off at great speed. The ability to pace yourself over the coming weeks is crucial to how you will be able to perform in those last vital exams at the end of the second week.

6 Therefore, issues such as diet, exercise, relaxation time, sufficient sleep, are as vital to your eventual performance as time spent studying.

7 In any competitive process it is often the unexpected little things that trip you up, so prepare well.. Simple things such as pens, erasers, calculator batteries, rulers, all tend to run out or go missing at exactly the wrong moment.

8 Over the coming weeks, the temptation to phone a friend or the frustration of constantly going to the phone to take friends' calls can be very disruptive. A simple solution can be to organise a common time out from study with friends to simply chat or go do sports.

9 Because stress is such a factor for all concerned, simple mistakes can easily be made. The most serious mistake possible is not turning up for an exam, because you misread the timetable. 10. Smile
