

A letter from our President and Founder

Dear Friends,

We began 2020 with great anticipation as our Life Centers were experiencing much growth. In addition, we were organizing mobile teams to serve in Africa, the Middle East and the Caribbean. So in early 2020, we took a teaching team to Haiti and then a medical training team to Lebanon. Just days after we returned from Lebanon, the world's airports shut down and we entered the new tragic world of the COVID-19 crisis.

Our global field partners were quickly overwhelmed by the needs of their communities. Many were facing critical needs of food, hygiene products and medical care. Our funding partners responded quickly and very generously. Harold C Smith Foundation, one of our key partners, came through with a very generous grant to allow us to provide a month's supply of Food and Hygiene Care Packages to more than 135,000 people in 7 countries: Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq, Turkey, Yemen, India and Pakistan.

For our Life Centers, the pandemic brought major challenges. One of our Lebanon Medical LCs had to shut down for several months and while our other LC stayed open, everyone on that staff got COVID at some point.


Our Haiti LC also had to close for several months as Haiti battled twin issues of a political crisis and the COVID crisis.

Nevertheless, our Life Centers persevered and made adjustments to our operating procedures such as implementing temperature checks, social distancing and masking rules. This impacted some of our enrollment and class schedules in Haiti as we had to split classes to accommodate the new rules. In Lebanon, our primary care team wasn't equipped to handle COVID cases, so these patients were referred to the main hospitals.

Thank you to our funding partners, donors, volunteers and our staff, both local and on the field. I've been blessed serving with you all.

2020 Focus: International COVID-19 Relief



Challenge: COVID-19


No country in the world has been spared by the effects of this pandemic, but the ones who have been affected the most are the poorest and most marginalized. One report said one billion jobs were lost, primarily the lowest paying, daily wage jobs that the vast majority of the world's poor rely on. The number of people heading towards acute starvation spiked to 270 million people.

The already precarious situation for the 80 million Refugees and Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) worldwide dramatically worsened over this period. Almost everyone from these groups lost their daily wage jobs, savings were depleted and international support declined.

Our Response

Thanks especially to Harold C Smith Foundation, WCF was able to partner with 22 different ministries across 8 countries (Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq, Turkey, Yemen, India, Pakistan and Haiti) to provide Food/Hygiene Care Packages, Medical Care, and other humanitarian aid to over 28,000 families, representing over 140,000 people..

Testimonies: Food/Hygiene Care Packages

We helped a family with 7 members where the father/husband lost his sight, so working is impossible for him, but his wife is trying to work cleaning houses. The husband was one of the patients that [WCF Mobile Medical Team]

Brother Jerry checked during his last visit to Yalova. Their financial situation is really bad, they eat only one meal per day so the food packages were a very great help for them, and the lady said that the [money] was a really great help for them. They were so happy and blessed by us helping her.

Abid was working in a small steel factory before COVID-19. When COVID-19 started, his factory was closed due to the lockdowns and Abid lost his job. He did not even get paid for the month he worked in the factory. Abid told us he and his wife only eat once a day so that they can save the food for their kids and sometimes they don't eat anything at all. He said it has been three months since his young children have had any milk. Abid is still struggling to find a job. He was grateful for the food and hygiene kits, especially the dry milk for his kids.

Lebanon Life Centers



Challenges:

- Ongoing Syrian and Iraqi Refugee Crisis with more than
 1.5 million refugees in Lebanon.
- Serious political and economic crisis which caused the economy and currency to collapse.
- COVID-19 pandemic led to major job losses.
- Massive explosion at the main Beirut port in August that resulted in hundreds dead, thousands wounded and more than 300,000 left homeless.

Our Response

WCF launched 2 Medical Life Centers in Beirut and North Lebanon in 2018 primarily to serve the overwhelming numbers of Syrian and Iraqi refugees fleeing war from their respective countries. In 2020, the multiple crises caused greater hardships for both the refugees and the local Lebanese. WCF responded by increasing the amount the LC subsidized physician fees, pharmacy, lab and imaging costs.

The Beirut Medical Life Center has seen 1,541 unique patients with over 2,971 total patient visits from November 2018 to December 31, 2020. 77% of our

patients were Syrian refugees, 6% were Iraqi and other refugees and the rest were Lebanese or migrant workers. We subsidized 2,846 medications and 1,510 Labs and Imaging Visits.

The North Lebanon Medical LC opened in May 2019 has seen 2,185 unique patients with 3,836 total patient visits from May 2019 to December 31, 2020. 91% of the patients were Syrian and the rest were other refugees and Lebanese. We subsidized 3,503 medications and 1,439 Labs and Imaging Visits.


Combined, our two LCs served 3,726 unique patients with 6,807 patient visits over the life of our project. We subsidized 6,349 medications and 2,949 Labs and Imaging Visits.




Lebanon Life Centers

Medical Training Trips

WCF normally organizes mobile medical clinics throughout the year, but most of these were postponed due to COVID. However, we were able to organize a Mental Health training in Lebanon prior to the shutdowns.

After several years of providing free medical clinics for the refugees in Lebanon, we noticed serious mental health issues in many patients. The trauma of witnessing war and death, the insecurity over living as a refugee and untreated mental illnesses are all important issues that we decided to help address by sending a team of our mental health experts to provide training for the refugees and community leaders. A total of 111 people attended the seminars and trainings that included topics such as PTSD, anxiety, stress, ADHD, depression, abuse, suicide, and coping mechanisms.



IRAQ: WCF provided ongoing financial support for our partner Operation Mercy in Iraq that specializes in Community Based Rehabilitation. This project serves 75 families in Internally Displaced Camps (IDP) in Iraq. Due to COVID, the project was only able to operate for half the year, but in that time, the teams were able to visit and serve their clients in the camps.

LEBANON: WCF also provides extended and emergency care for some patients that have very serious conditions. In one case, we met a 9 year old girl named 'Rana'. She was born in Syria during the Civil War. She was born with a cleft lip and palate. She had health complications shortly after birth resulting in developmental delay in her speech, motor function, and ability to thrive. She had several surgeries in Syria, but they weren't successful. Her family fled to Lebanon and our Partner began to assist the family. Through the consultation of the Life Center medical team and the sponsorship of WCF, she was admitted to a rehabilitation center that has specialists who can take care of her 5 days per week. She is provided for her basic education, as well as occupational and physical therapy. As a result, we have seen great progress over the past few years in her case.










Beirut Explosion Disaster



Challenge:

On August 4th, a massive explosion at the main sea port caused extensive damage throughout Beirut with countless homes, schools and churches severely damaged. Two hundred people died, several thousand people were injured and more than 300,000 people were left with damaged homes or completely homeless. It added to the ongoing turmoil for the Lebanese and the more than a million and a half refugees in Lebanon.

Our Response

WCF worked with our field partners such as RCB, ABTS and Heart For Lebanon to help the people in Beirut in multiple ways. We worked with RCB to provide Food, baby diapers and women's feminine products to the hardest hit families as well as some home repairs. We worked with Heart For Lebanon to repair 3 schools, 4 churches and about 5 homes. We worked with ABTS to provide temporary housing for 82 people newly homeless and subsequent repairs of their homes.

Haiti Life Center



Challenges:

Prior to 2020 Haiti had been experiencing country-wide instability, violent protests, school and hospital closures, and food shortages sparked by a major government corruption scandal. Then in March 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic led to Haiti shutting down the airport, schools, businesses and most government services for 5 months until August 2020.

During the lockdowns our Haiti Life Center switched to remote classes for our students, but most of them had no computers or Internet access so we had to make major adjustments such as providing access to our lab or providing printed handouts. Despite all of these challenges, we persevered along with our beneficiaries.

Our Response

At the start of 2020, the LC had served 131 ESL students and 18 Computer students for a total of 149 students. We started 2 more Computer Classes by February 2020 for a total of 42 Computer students.

When Haiti went into lockdown, we conducted Remote Classes with 73 students.

When we re-opened in August, we had to reduce the size of our classes to accommodate social distancing rules. We were pleasantly surprised that 82 students returned to finish the interrupted ESL and Computer classes. In November 2020, we began new ESL sessions and had 102 students registered with 17 on a wait list. Our Computer Classes had 23 students who are continuing their classes from before.

Character/Leadership Development

The Character/Leadership Class is an important distinguishing factor for the LC. Corruption is always an ongoing challenge in any country. The Character/Leadership class has been an environment that teaches students the importance of good character and ethical leadership in life and in business.

Humanitarian Programs: Haiti, India



Our Response

Our Food Program has been a critical help for the poorest families in our partner communities in Haiti and India. However, the COVID lockdowns caused temporary shutdowns of the regular food programs. In most cases, WCF replaced regular food program funding with emergency COVID Food/Hygiene care packages for the whole family.

During the times our Food Programs were running, our partners in Port-au-Prince and Jacmel in Haiti were providing meals to approximately 160 children in both partner ministries for 5 days per week. In India, WCF sponsored meals for 70 children who have been part of our regular program.

Education Programs: Haiti, India, Malawi



Our Response

Regular schooling for children and older youth worldwide was disrupted in an unprecedented way due to the many COVID related shutdowns.

Nevertheless, WCF continued to provide scholarship funding to the most at-risk children served by our longstanding partners in Haiti and Malawi. In India, WCF provided salaries for teachers at schools that our children attended.

In Haiti, WCF provided primary, secondary and University Education Scholarship funds for 66 students (31 students in Port-au-Prince and 35 in Jacmel).

In India, WCF provided teacher and staff salaries, education supplies and other education costs for 130 children. These children were children of prostitutes and stone workers and some came from slum areas. Another 17 women were provided vocational training in sewing for a total of 149 students in India helped by WCF.

In Malawi, WCF continued to provide partial scholarship funding for 21 children and youth. Six of the children have graduated from High School. Another six children finished college and are starting 3-month internships.

One of our students graduated from medical school and is now serving at a government hospital in Blantyre. He said that he is more excited about being a doctor now than he was pre-pandemic.

Testimony

After my High School Studies, I didn't expect to continue with my education, but God used you to help me study at one of the Universities in Haiti. My mother and my father could have never paid the fees. I am lost for words; I can't thank you enough!
